INJUNCTION IS
RULED OUT BY
AUSTIN JUDGE

HOLD NEW LAW DOES
NOT APPLY FOR
JANUARY SALE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—The
district court today upheld
J. T. Robinson, land commis
sioner, in the injunction suit
brought by the state joined
by the regents of the Uni
versity of Texas, to enjoin
him from selling oil and gas
rights in public lands. The
injunction was ordered dis
solved.

The court decided the law passed
by the present legislature with draw
ing the lands from the market was
invalid insofar as the January 2
sale, stopped by temporary injunc
tion, was concerned.
Judge J. D. Moore, who rendered
the decision, said he found the in
tervenors in the suit had vested
rights in the approximately 50,000
acres advertised for sale on January
2 and which Robinson refused to
postpone on grounds that the law of
1925 was mandatory and required
him to make sales when he had re
quests.

The court held the land commis
sioner had discretionary power to
postpone the sale from one date to
another, upholding in this respect
the opinion of the attorney gen
eral's department, which had advised
Robinson he could postpone the
January 2 sale.

The law taking all leases off the
market was passed by the present
legislature on January 11, three
days after it convened. It ordered
the bureau of advertising, American
newspaper publishers association, in
an address here today before the
New York State Publishers associa
tion.

"Newspaper advertising," he said
"is the link that has connected sell
er and buyer in the scheme of mass
production. It has brought the
amazing buying power of the Amer
ican people into contact with the
equally amazing production power
of the American manufacturer."

ROYAL UNION IS RUMORED

REPORT GIOVANNA OF
ITALY TO BECOME
BULGAR QUEEN

(By Associated Press)

SOFIA, Jan. 31.—Indications that Princess Giovanna of Italy would visit Sofia convinced many Bulgarians today she would be their queen.

Preparations at the Italian legation for visitors were understood in well informed circles to concern the Duke and Duchess of Aosta and their niece, the princess. Bulgaria, therefore, was awaiting announcement that King Boris, 35, would have the 21-year-old princess as a bride.

Commemoration of the fiftieth anniversary of Bulgaria's liberation from the Turks will begin shortly and the prediction was made today in an authoritative quarter that the wedding would take place in connection with the celebration, which will last for some time. The time of this observance was also regarded as the proper occasion for the official coronation of Boris, which would be the first solemn coronation since the liberation of Bulgaria.

The religious barrier which stood in the way of the marriage is understood to have been removed. King Boris by the constitution must profess the Greek Orthodox religion. Pope Pius is understood to have granted Princess Giovanna a dispensation under which she may marry Boris provided that Bulgaria concludes a concordat with the Vatican. The agreement would permit the appointment of a Papal Nuncio to Sofia, replacing the present unofficial apostolic representative.

Six Firemen Hurt In Wall Collapse

CHICAGO, Jan. 31 (AP).—Six firemen were injured, one fatally, when a wall collapsed, while they were fighting a fire today at the Wet Wash Laundry company on South Chicago avenue.

John J. Carey, 33, who suffered a fractured skull, died in a hospital. Timothy Donohue, who also suffered a fractured skull, was seriously injured.

COYOTES ARE DECREASING

SWEETWATER, Jan. 30 (AP).—A year ago government trappers began exterminating wolves in the Nolan county and ranchmen are running their sheep loose, says Walter Doohie, livestock raiser. The trappers have slain about 150 coyotes and thirty wildcats to date.

While the general impression continues that Assistant Attorney General Donovan will be the attorney general, there is as yet no confirmation of this by Mr. Hoover himself. The same applies to Secretary Jardine, who is believed to be slated for Secretary of Agriculture.

Mr. Hoover was ready today to start on his second anding expedition for sail fish and other big game fish in the waters off Long Key in the Yacht Saunterer.

Figure This Out
The gentlemen who have been commissioned to crown the new heavyweight champion by presenting him with the Tunney-Muldoon trophy have ruled that the name of Tommy Burns shall not appear on the trophy as a former champion.

It is their ruling that Burns never won the championship in the accepted manner and that, during the period between the time of Jim Jeffries' retirement and his return to the ring, there was no other champion.

The idea of appointing a committee to name a heavyweight champion of the world is a silly one and the committee is making its assignment sillier by ruling Burns off the list.

If proper succession to the heavyweight championship can be determined only when a champion is defeated in the ring by another fighter, how can the name of the new champion be engraved on the trophy unless the new champion knocks off Tunney?

There was precedent. The gesture that Tunney made in offering the trophy is the same one, in principle, that Jeffries made when he said that Hart was the new champion and the same one that Jack McAuliffe made when he retired undefeated and turned over his belt to Kid Lavigne.

To be technically correct, McAuliffe did not turn over the belt to Lavigne but he said that he was the champion and he gave him the hook ticket for the belt.

Smart Words, Duke!
Mr. Muldoon, the Iron Duke of the New York commission and the head man of the selection committee, said a few words recently that caused a scowl from his associates on the committee.

"Why waste time in executive sessions?" he asked. "Why discuss so many plans for finding the new champion? Dempsey is the champion and he has been since the night in Chicago when Tunney got the long count."

LEON TROTSKY GOES IN EXILE

ONCE SOVIET LEADER IS BANISHED TO TURKEY

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, Jan. 31.—Leon Trotsky, once powerful Russian leader, was reported in dispatches today to be on his way to Turkey as an exile. The Turkish government agreed to give the former leader of the Red Army shelter in Angora.

A Jewish telegraphic agency dispatch from Berlin quoted a "leading Soviet official" as saying rumors prevalent in Moscow indicated Trotsky had been seen in Tiflis on his way to Batum. From there he will be transported to Constantinople and presumably later to Angora.

Decision to exile Trotsky was taken by the Politbureau, the most important branch of the Soviet government. Five members voted to banish him, one abstained from voting and four, Kallinin, Kyrkov, Zhdanov and Tomsky, voted against the decision. The resolution was proposed by Trotsky's principal foe, Joseph Stalin, secretary of the Communist party and iron man of Russia.

An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Riga said it was first proposed to deport Trotsky but that this idea was dropped because of the ex-ile's popularity in certain circles.

California Judge Leaps To Death

WHITTIER, Calif., Jan. 31. (AP)—Judge Madison T. Owens, 76, Southern California jurist, committed suicide Tuesday night by leaping from the second story window of a hospital where he had been convalescing from a stroke of paralysis. It was learned today.

Judge Owens was a friend of Mrs. Herbert Hoover's family and entertained Mr. and Mrs. Hoover when they were in Los Angeles last autumn.

T. H. Ford Seriously Hurt By Automobile

T. H. Ford, 1718 Avenue H, was seriously injured at about 7:30 o'clock last night when he was struck near the Hub filling station. He was carried to the West Texas hospital in a Bynum Brothers ambulance.

Mr. Ford was bruised about the shoulder and received slight lacerations about the ear. No bones were broken, an X-ray revealed.

GUATEMALAN REBEL KILLED

GUATEMALA, Jan. 31. (AP)—Colonel Fernando Morales and Lieutenant Colonel Carlos de Peon Regil were executed at Quetzaltenango today after a court martial had found them guilty of rebellion.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Jan. 30. (AP)—A disagreement was reported today by the jury considering the case of Glenn Jennings, United States coast guardman charged with manslaughter, for the fatal shooting last May 6 of Jacob D. Hanson, secretary of Niagara Falls lodge of Elks. The jury was discharged.

EINSTEIN LATEST WORK PUBLISHED

(Copyright 1929 by the Associated Press)

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—Professor Albert Einstein, originator of the theory of relativity today published his latest work, a six page pamphlet of mathematical formulae for which scientists throughout the world have been waiting eagerly.

The pamphlet, representing the labor of ten years, is called "Zur Einheitlichen Feldtheorie" or "On a Uniform Field Theory" and sells for one mark.

Dr. Edward Stove Aksey, American physicist of Chicago, now at the Institute for Theoretical Physics in the University of Berlin, summarized Einstein's discovery in this language in part:

"He has obtained a theory representing this fusion of geometry, mechanics and electro-magnetism in the form of twenty independent field equations connecting sixteen fundamental quantities, while between the equations eight identical relationships exist. To determine whether this is the theory sought for, much difficult investigation still will be necessary."

German Princess Seeks Citizenship

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. (AP)—Princess Alexandra Victoria Ruseman, former member of the German royal family, intends to become an American citizen, she said here.

The princess divorced Prince August Wilhelm, son of the former Kaiser, in 1926 and now is the wife of Alexander Ruseman, once a commander in the Imperial German navy. She is in her own right a princess of Schleswig-Holstein.

During the past three years Princess Alexandra, an artist, has spent much time in this country. Her husband also will apply for citizenship.

Install Equipment In City Laboratory

Installation of newly arrived equipment in the city laboratory, in the city hall where the Boy Scout headquarters formerly were located, began in earnest yesterday. The laboratory will be used by city health officers in testing milk and carrying out other city health ordinances.

LONDON, Jan. 31. (AP)—A message to the Daily Mail from Warsaw states that the entire Lithuanian army is hostile to Premier Wladimir. It says that an open insurrection is expected hourly.

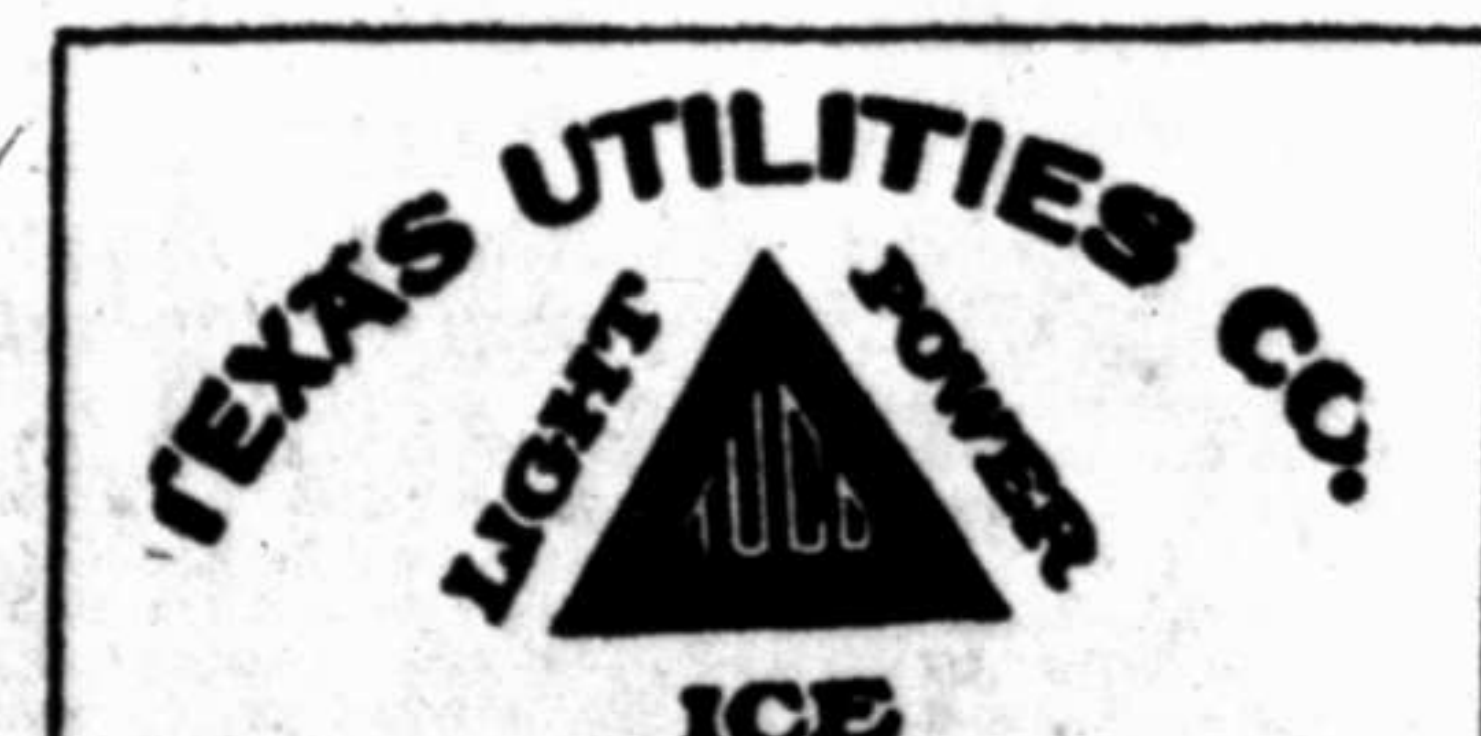

Amanullah's Lesson

In all this semi-ludicrous busi-
ness of King Amanullah of Af-
ghanistan who last has throne be-
cause he tried to modernize his
somewhat stiff-necked subjects
there is more of less food for
thought for us Americans, distant
as Afghanistan may be.

Amanullah, petty and pompous
as he may have been, was a man
with rather advanced ideas. Af-
ghanistan was hardly the place for
such things. It had existed in semi-
barbaric seclusion for centuries, and
its wild, untamed folk didn't
like the idea of change.

So the airplanes, European
clothes, electric lights, barber shops
and automobiles that the worthy
Amanullah tried to compel his sub-
jects to take up, soon became be-
cause a source of friction. The Af-
ghanistans, as one man rose and
chased Amanullah over the border.
They will continue in the "good
old ways" of their grandfathers.

Our sympathies, naturally, are all
with Amanullah. The world has
moved ahead rapidly in the last few
decades, and sooner or later the
manners and appearances of the
machine civilization will penetrate
every corner of the earth. It seems
hard that an enlightened monarch
should lose his throne simply for
trying to hurry the process along.

But it is right there that we can
read a bit of a lesson into Amanul-
lah's downfall.

Reforms or changes of any kind
great or small have to start at
the bottom to be very effective. Peo-
ple can't be pushed out of old ways
and into new ones by a few royal
leaders on top. A community or
a nation will always stick to its old
ways until the desire for a change
has permeated all ranks.

It follows, accordingly, that any
reform of any consequence in the
social, cultural or economic system
is bound to come very slowly. It
can't be engineered from the top.
It can't come overnight. Years of
discussion, argument and thought
are required.

Take, for instance, the matter of
world peace. Having passed the
Kellogg's treaty, we are apt to think
we have done a good deal; and
when government officials take oc-
casion to announce that war with
such and such a nation is "un-
thinkable" we shall be further en-
couraged. But we've only scratched
the surface.

War is an institution—one of the
oldest in existence. It can't be put
out of existence by a few treaties
or by well-intentioned speeches.
When war is finally abolished it will
be because the great mass of the
people are determined in their
hearts that it shall be abolished.
We can never be led quickly into an
era of eternal peace.

That's the way it is with every
reform. They have to well up from
underneath to be effective. If you
don't, ask Amanullah.

Unwieldy Cities

It is quite possible that in some
not-distant day city boosters and
chambers of commerce will be try-
ing, not to exaggerate their city's
population, but to underestimate
them. It is slowly becoming evident
that it is quite possible for mere
size to progress to a point where it
is a hindrance.

New York, choked nearly to death
by traffic, is trying out a series of
new and drastic regulations. If they
reduce congestion, a new skyscraper
will go up and make the situation

symbol of protection, but a symbol
of restriction.

Better Motors

Mrs. L. A. Scott of McKinney,
Texas, thinks the toy pistol is the
logical explanation of the gun to-
ters habit in Texas. In a letter re-
cently printed in the Letters From
Readers department on this page
she developed the thesis that a
child who plays with toy guns tends
in some degree at least to grow up
into a man who uses pistols which
are by no means toys.

It is an uncomfortable suggestion.
In this day and time anything is
uncomfortable which suggests to
the parent that he can and ought
to do something about his own chil-
dren. It is easier to form a society
to do something about other peo-
ple's children. It is still easier to
pass a law commanding or forbidding
something about everybody's chil-
dren. But when a mother or father
is brought to the realization that
the thing to be done must be done
at home by the authorities of that
home to the children of that home
the result is not welcomed.

There is no need to pass a law
abolishing toy pistols. Any man
can remember when corncocks served
the purpose. Pretty much all of
us have been robbers and pirates
for many happy hours in days gone
by. Nowadays the youngsters are
hijackers and knobknockers. They
are to that extent a part of their
time. That parents should assume
any responsibility for what their
children play is a radical departure,
perhaps, from modern practice. But
Mrs. Scott suggests a need for
something of the sort.

These youthful criminals came
from somewhere. Most of them
came quite recently from American
homes. And they brought thence
their ideas of property and human
rights. All too frequently those
ideas are little above the level of
the kennel or the hog pen. In the
old days that adults look back to,
every boy wanted to be a policeman.
That was the coveted role. Of late,
however, it seems that the police-
man has but a minor part of the boy's
dramatization of grown-up delin-
quency. Toy pistols figure in that,
perhaps. But toy pistols are really
the cause of it.—Dallas News.

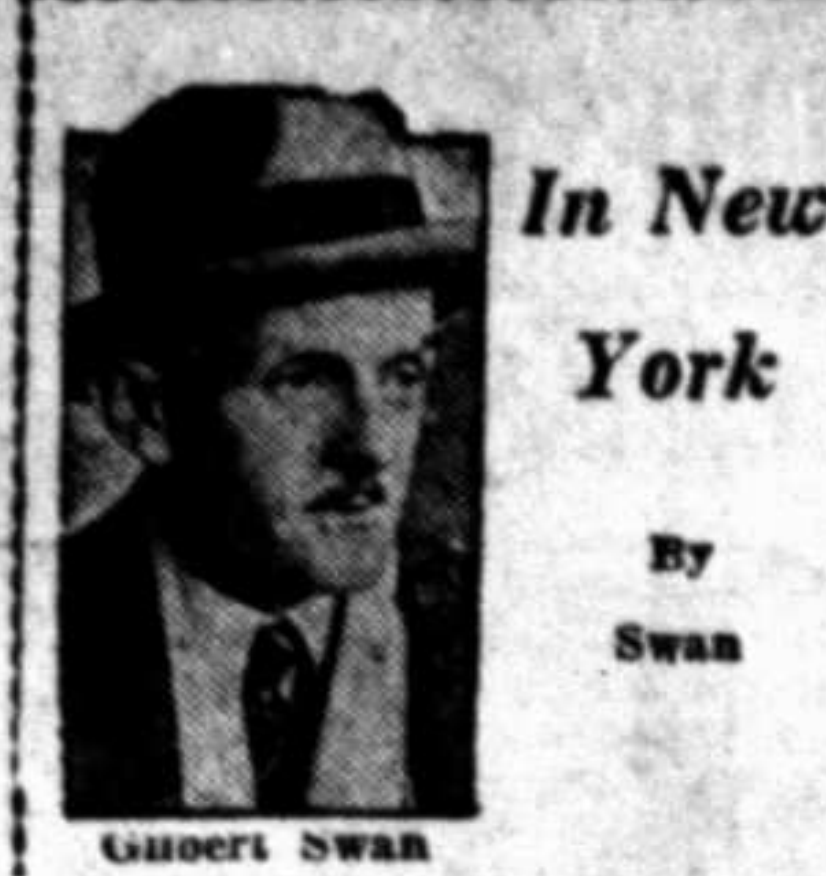

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—Just as the
experimental "little theatre" grew
up in Greenwich Village in years
ago as "protests against the com-
mercial theatre" so are the artistic
little motion picture playhouses
crops up as the cinema castles
continue their invasion.

The last word in the modernistic
cinema playhouse is soon to make
its modest bow but a few blocks
from the spot where the Provincet-
own Playhouse launched the little
theatre movement in America.

While plans are drawn up for up-
town talkie palaces that will seat
thousands, the Film Art Guild
completes a little playhouse
unique and completely "ultra"—
as different as the widely-heralded
experimental theatres of Ger-
many or Russia.

Simon Gould, who pioneered the
introduction of "little theatre" art
films, was telling me about it the
other day. To begin with, it is the
design of one Frederick Kiesler of
Vienna and Paris, who has con-
tributed to the expressionistic in-
ternational theatre exhibition.

It will be shaped somewhat like
a funnel, with four screens upon the
walls. Three of these will be black
and so executed that the entire in-
terior of the theatre can be changed
in appearance by means of pro-
jectors. Thus if it is desirable that
the theatre appear to be a Gothic
cathedral the illusion can be achiev-
ed in a few moments by the projec-
tion of necessary scenes upon the
screened walls. In another moment
the place can be converted into
the replica of a night club or a
circus tent.

I am told that if the experiment
is successful the "little theatre" of
the films will undergo a revolution-
ary change—and may be the birth-
place of such experimental novel-
ties as are to be found among the
younger groups of European drama
innovators.

Kiesler has created three types
of motion picture playhouses, none
of which have before been seen
in America—the "ray," the
"double cone" and the "megaphone."
The latter type is to be the first
tried because of the problems of
sound that may arise. Its design is
that of the inside of a camera,
with seats sloping down toward the
shutter. The walls and ceiling are
continuous black screens which are
placed in a tunnel-like arrangement.

The stage is also something new to
theatrom. It is known to Kiesler
as the "screencene." The pro-
scenium and curtains are eliminated
and the illusion of being inside a
camera is carried out by a "camera
eye" arrangement for the picture
screen. This is equipped with "dia-
phragmatic openings" of various
sizes.

If desired a picture can be thrown
on all four walls at once "so that
the spectators can be immersed in
the drama they are watching."

"Take for instance a war play,
such as 'What Price Glory' or 'The
Big Parade,'" explains the inventor.
"The cannons and trucks could ap-
pear to passing down the sidewalk,
the airplanes would be flying over-
head and the story itself would be
under way on the stage screen. It
is possible to split a picture into
many parts in this manner and
give an incredibly realistic effect."

Diet and Health

Ancient Health Rules
The ancient and middle ages
were rife with ignorance and super-
stitions, but we find that some of
their rules for the maintenance of
health did contain the truth.

As the winter litch, we have
would have to take some wire
brushes and dig the very skin off
you?

Perhaps you have what is known
as the winter litch. We have
many complaints of that now. The
technical name for this winter litch
is Pruritis Hiemalis. The word
pruritis used alone means itching
without apparent cause. (However
there is a cause for any disagree-
able sensation in the body.) We
know that general disorders, gas-
tro-intestinal disturbances and the
unbalanced diet can cause inflam-
matory conditions in the skin as
well as other organs, so if you are
a sufferer of winter litch or any
other disorder, you should have a
physical examination.

Winter litch is usually noticed in
climates where there are wide
changes in temperature. Do you
wear woolen underwear? That
seems to be very irritating to some
skin. If it does afflict you, then
wear linen or silk next to the skin
and put the woollens over this, if
necessary.

If your skin is dry (dry skins are
most apt to be itchy) drink liberal
amounts of water and rub some
glycerine solution all over the body.
(One-fourth glycerine and three-
fourths plain or rose water is a good
proportion for most.) Some find re-
lief by applying a saturated solution
of boric acid. Others find that gen-
eral baths with baking soda, about
10 ounces to the ordinary tubful of
water, are helpful; and strange to
tell, just the opposite type of bath,
an acidulated one, with an ounce of
hydrochloric acid to the ordinary
tubful of water, helps others.

CHILDREN MUST READ
One of my prejudices tells me
that there are not enough good
books for children being written.
Whenever I see a really artistic and
well-written book for children, of
whatever age, I feel that I ought to
give a party for the publisher who
has sufficient sense to recognize
good reading matter and good pic-
tures for the younger Americans.

Good literature for children is
difficult to produce. It can be
written by a genius who has a turn
for that kind of thing, or by a per-
son of considerable talent who
knows all about the child mind but
hasn't one himself.

The trouble with much stuff that
is turned out for children to read
is that it was written by a person
with a juvenile mind, and is there-
fore not well done and not com-
pletely done.

"Millions of Cats" is a little book
for young children, just nicely es-
tablished in the habit of reading.
It can be read aloud to children
who are just trying to learn to read.
It has the child psychology work-
ed into it, with handsome illustrations
well placed.

The very idea of millions and mil-
lions of cats is in itself fundamen-
tally attractive to most children. A
cat is a darling, but a dozen cats
would furnish heaven. Millions
and millions and billions of cats,
covering the landscape as far as the
eye can reach, and every cat having
his own lovely individuality, is a pic-
ture no child can resist.

My two little girls are not per-
mitted to have cats or dogs, because
we live in an apartment house. The
rules are against pets, and should
be. If people will live the artifi-
cial life of the apartment house in
a crowded city, they should be re-
quired to forego the pleasure of as-
sociation with animal pets that
might annoy other residents.

So my children get along with
dolls and four goldfish for pets.
They long for cats, and the story of
"Millions of Cats" entertains them
immensely.

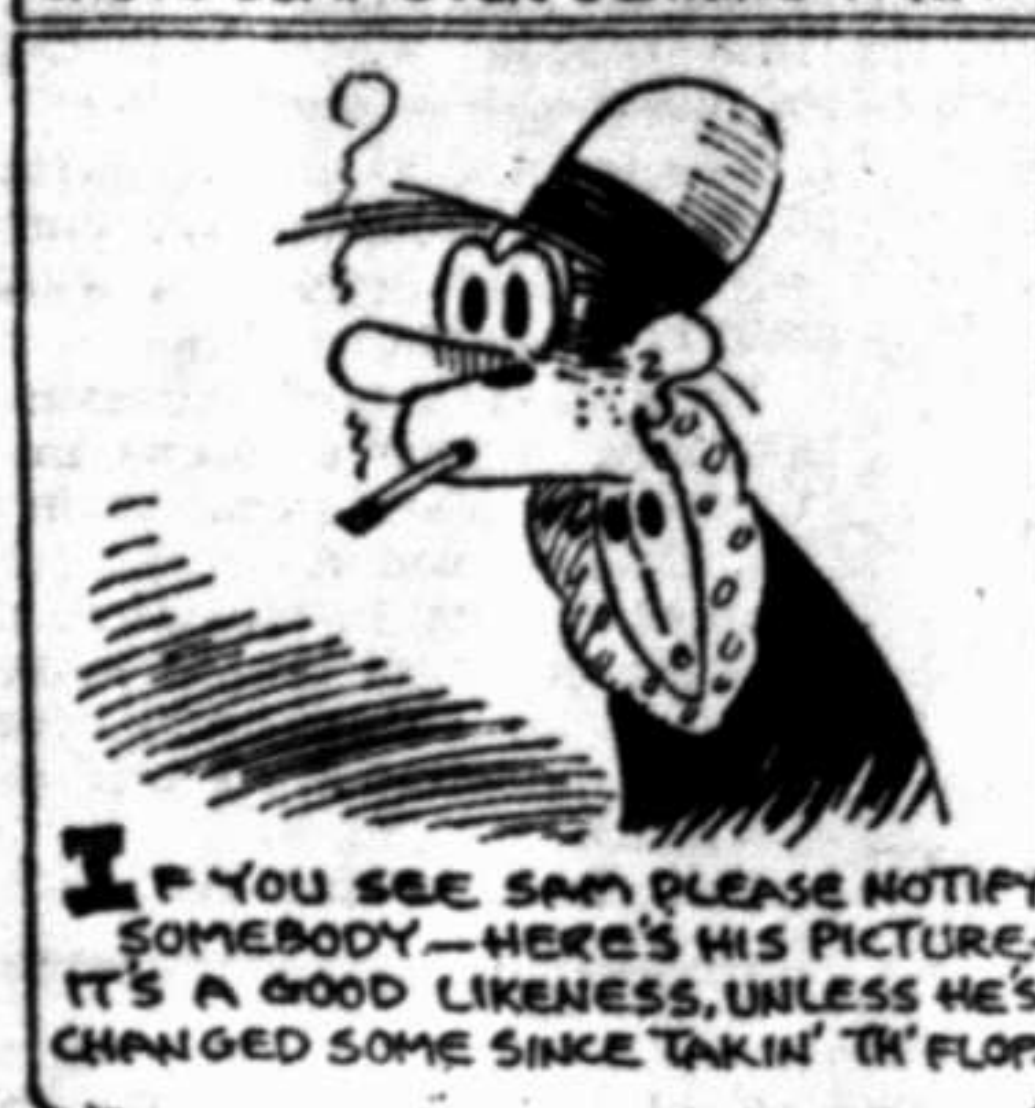

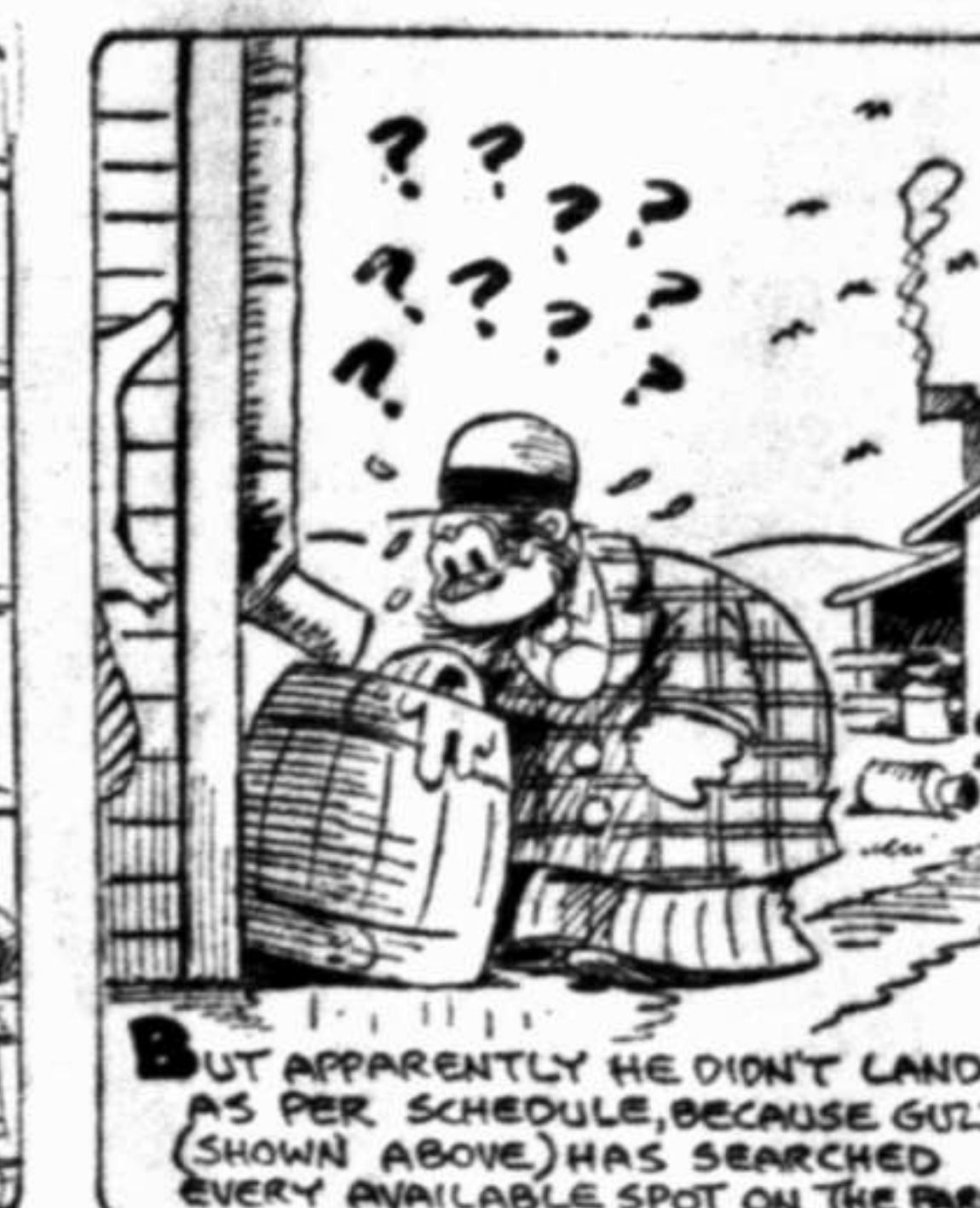

STOCKS HAVE UPWARD MOVE

UNITED FRUIT SOARS TO 8 POINTS WITH OPENING

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP)—The stock market opened buoyantly. United Fruit jumping 8 points to 158, a record high. Some of the rails were in good demand. Atchafalaya and New Haven rising a point and more, and Norfolk and Western 3 points. International Harvester, American Smelting, Commercial Investment Trust and American Tobacco B. sold 1 to 1-1/2 points higher.

A feature of early dealings was the revival of strength in the railroads, ascribed to the excellent December earnings reports. Western Maryland, Rock Island, Chesapeake and Ohio, Canadian Pacific, Katy, and Erie rose 1 to 2 points.

Some irregularity cropped up in the utilities, owing to profit taking on yesterday's advances. Columbia Gas and American and Foreign Power mounted 2 and 3 points to new peaks, while North American and Electric Power and Light yielded a point or so. Midland Steel Products preferred, Warner Brothers, American International and Johns Manville gained 1 to 2 points. Briggs and International Nickel sold off about a point.

Foreign exchanges were again somewhat easy, sterling opening at 4.847-8, off 1-32.

Swain Obtains 81 Percent Of Hatch

The best hatch ever obtained is reported by R. E. Swain, owner of the R. E. Swain Feed & Hatchery, upon completion of the first incubator-load of eggs hatched this year. An average of 81 per cent was obtained in baby chicks from eggs placed in the 94,000 capacity incubator.

"Mr. M. S. Gunn, who specializes in white leghorns, beat this average record, however," Mr. Swain said. "With 414 eggs put into three trays of the big incubator, Mr. Gunn averaged 94.1 per cent hatching."

Two Lose Lives In Steamer Fire

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 31 (AP)—Two men of the crew of the President Johnson, of the Dollar steamship line, lost their lives today when a fire broke out in the forecastle of the steamer, docked at the foot of twelfth street. Both bodies are as yet unidentified.

One, a junior engineer, lost his life when, after making his way from the burning quarters of the crew, he went back to retrieve his clothing. The other was burned to death in his bed.

The fire caused little damage. Four men, including one Jersey City fireman are suffering severe burns.

Spanish Regiments Held In Barracks

GIBRALTAR, Jan. 31 (AP)—Infantry regiments stationed in neighboring towns were confined to barracks today on instructions from Madrid.

The Spanish government yesterday announced the suppression of a revolt which centered around Ciudad Real. Border advances today said stringent censorship prevailed.

MARKET HAS STEADY TONE

SLIGHT ADVANCES ARE MADE ON BASIS, CABLE NEWS

NEW YORK, Jan. 31 (AP)—The cotton market opened at an advance of 1 to 4 points in response to the steady showing of Liverpool and rallies of several points in the market for Egyptian cotton at Alexandria. At the end of the first half hour was selling around 18.70 and new October 1930, or about 1 point under to 2 points over yesterday's closing quotations.

NEW ORLEANS HAS STEADY OPENING

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 31 (AP)—The cotton market opened steady at an advance of 2 to 4 points in response to higher Liverpool cables than due. Prices advanced a point or two additional after the start but the improvement met selling.

LEGISLATORS PUZZLE OVER CRIME

DALLAS MEN STRESS ALARMING GROWTH OF LAWLESSNESS IN THAT PART OF STATE

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—Joint committees on criminal jurisprudence today had the benefit of advice from Jed Adams, Democratic national committeeman, and Dean Charles S. Potts of the Southern Methodist University law school, in their study of proposed legislation.

The two Dallas men appeared before the committees last night in advocacy of a number of criminal reform measures.

Potts and Adams stressed the alarming growth of crime in the United States and especially in Dallas. Both argued for a central bureau of criminal investigation, qualification of jurors by the judge instead of by counsel, and prosecution by information as well as indictment.

Dean Potts argued for penalties for escapes and attempted escapes from jails and prisons and for jumping bail. Adams asserted that while he did not subscribe to all the views along that line advanced by the other speaker, he favored legislation to curb activities of the "professional bondsman" in the larger cities.

Adams also suggested a reform in the method of appealing a case and expressed opposition to a bill to allow while prosecuting attorney to comment on the failure of the defendant to testify. That bill was voted favorably out of the house committee, and has been submitted to the senate group.

A measure providing for the establishment of a criminal identification bureau has been reported favorably to the senate.

AFGHANISTAN CAPITAL GOAL

AMANULLAH BAKERS SURROUND KABUL, MAIN CITY

LONDON, Jan. 31 (AP).—Ad-
vices from Russia today described
Amanullah's efforts to regain the
throne of Afghanistan as involving
a battle for control of Kabul, the
capital.

His followers were stated by the
Afghan minister to Moscow to have
surrounded Kabul.

They were planning to drive from
the throne Habibullah Khan, who
forced Amanullah's brother to ab-
dicate. The minister expressed
confidence that Amanullah would
soon be back in control.

Another tribal leader was stated
in a dispatch from Peshawar, In-
dia, to have joined in the fighting.
He was Malik Chahseidin, leader
of the Ghilzai tribes in an expedi-
tion against royal troops. His fol-
lowers claimed he had supreme
power in Kabul province.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, British
foreign secretary, speaking in the
House of Commons, said Amanullah
had formally announced his abdi-
cation to the British government.
Consequently until it was clear that
in spite of his abdication, Amanul-
lah was regarded as their king by
the people of Afghanistan, the
British government would be unable
to regard Amanullah's government
as the rightful government of Af-
ghanistan.

TWO UTILITY BILLS HEARD

VARIOUS SCHEMES FOR REGULATION ARE IN COMMITTEE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Jan. 31.—Members of
the senate committee on state af-
fairs today had two bills on public
utilities regulation before it—one
giving a state commission complete
regulatory power, and the other al-
lowing cities original authority and
granting the state body only appel-
late jurisdiction.

The second measure, sponsored
by the city attorneys' association,
was formally presented to the com-
mittee at a hearing last night as a
substitute bill by Senator Hol-
brook, who withdrew his original
substitute. The Holbrook measure
would allow the state commission
original jurisdiction only over rates
affecting cities of less than 2,000
population. It would not disturb
existing franchises and would leave
unmentioned the indeterminate
franchise and certificate of conve-
nience and necessity provisions
which representatives of public uti-
lities demanded virtually unani-
mously.

The original bill, offered by Sen-
ators Westbrook and Wirtz, would
give the railroad commission au-
thority over all cities, but Wirtz of-
fered an amendment which would
eliminate municipally-owned and
operated public utilities.

Representatives of public utility
companies appeared before the
committee to urge an all-powerful
state commission and attack the
feasibility of dual control.
A. M. Feltz, representing the town
of Elgin also spoke in behalf of the
original bill, asserting if the larger
cities were allowed to drive their
own bargains, the utilities com-
panies naturally would favor them
and the small cities would be hurt
in consequence.

Among the utilities representa-
tives who spoke were J. R. Kelso,
president of the Texas Utilities
Company, J. B. Earle of Waco,
president of the Long Distance
Telephone Company of Waco and
the North Texas Telephone Com-
pany of Sherman, and R. B. Stitts,
Tyler, president of the Independ-
ent Telephone Association of Texas.
Joe Ryan, San Antonio city at-
torney, and John McGlasson, Waco
city attorney, extolled the merits of
the Holbrook substitute measure.

POVERTY-STRICKEN CHEER PRINCE

WALES CONCLUDES THREE DAY TOUR THROUGH COAL FIELDS OF NORTHERN ENGLAND

(By Associated Press)

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Eng.,
Jan. 31.—Heartick and some-
times horrified at the conditions
which he has found in his three-
day tour of the Northern coal fields
where unemployment is rife, the
Prince of Wales has been deeply
touched and patience of the suffer-
ing workers.

Winding up his visit to dozens of
mining villages where poverty and
hunger struck him at every turn,
the prince seemed to sum up his
impressions in a remark which he
made this afternoon to the Mayor
of Durham, to whom he said:

"I have been deeply touched by
what I have seen of the bravery,
patience and hope of these poor
people. It has been very difficult
to know what to do to solve this
most pressing problem. I am sure
things will be righted, but I'm
afraid it must take time. The peo-
ple I have met during this tour
could not have been nicer to me
personally. It was wonderful."

When the prince left the station
hotel to visit the Bishop Auckland
narea of County Durham, he was
cheered by crowds in the streets.
He appeared tired, but acknowl-
edged the cheers smilingly as his au-
tomobile left Newcastle.

Stopping off at Jarrow, the prince

inspected conditions among the
steel workers and shipyard men. He
shook hands with fifty men there,
many of whom have been without
work for eight years.

As he rode through Durham
towns made desolate by the spectre
of unemployment, people crowded
to see him. When his car stopped
in the main street of Jarrow where
there has been great poverty and
sickness, people surged around him
and above the crowd came the dis-
tressed cry of a woman pushing her
way through.

"Let me just touch him," she
cried.
She was Mrs. Annie Smith, who
is blind. The prince heard her cry
and raising his hat requested the
crowd to make way for her. He
shook her hand warmly and talked
quietly and sympathetically with
her.
