SERVICE CAR DRIVER KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Jack Edmondson met instant death in an auto wreck on the Ballinger-San Angelo highway, six miles West of Ballinger and two miles East of Rowena, about 7:00 o'clock Friday evening when a large touring car went in the ditch. Three passengers in the car were slightly injured. The automobile caught fire and burned up following the accident, but all the occupants had escaped and the dead man's body was pulled from the wreckage before the car burned.

A message came to Ballinger calling for physicians and an ambulance, but the man was instantly killed, his neck being broken, and other injuries sustained which would probably also have proven fatal. An ambulance brought the body to Ballinger and it was placed in the morgue of the King-Holt Co. after being embalmed, and later was prepared for burial.

I. M. Brown, of the Crews country, was one of the passengers in the car, another service car driver and a third party whose name The Ledger failed to obtain, were coming to Ballinger as passengers, and according to statements made by the passengers, Edmondson, who was driving the bus, lost control of the automobile while traveling at a pretty rapid rate of speed when the lights from another car which they were meeting blinded him. The glare of the lights caused the young man to miss the highway and the car plunged over as it went into the ditch, turning over several times, it was said by Mr. Brown, who grabbed hold of the back of the middle seat as he saw the impending accident. The automobile, a seven-passenger Studebaker, caught fire after the accident and was destroyed.

According to information received here Edmondson was making his first trip, driving the car

which he had just traded for and was establishing an independent service car line between San Angelo and Ballinger, co-operating with other service cars operating between Ballinger and Northern and Eastern points. He was due to meet the Abilene cars in Ballinger and exchange passengers with them. He left San Angelo at 6:00 o'clock.

Edmondson was previously employed by the Union Bus Line, which operates cars between Ballinger and San Antonio and San Angelo and San Antonio, but he had not been on the run as a driver. He formerly worked at San Antonio as a hustler for the transfer lines and came to San Angelo to work for the bus line company and decided to engage in business for himself, traded for a car and was making his first run. The headquarters of the Union Bus Line at San Antonio was notified of the accident in order to locate the unfortunate man's relatives, and by this means the dead man's mother, Mrs. Josie Wilson, was located at Goldthwaite and notified of her son's death. She arrived in Ballinger Saturday morning.

Prior to the arrival of the mother of Edmondson, Undertaker King received instructions from a party at Goldthwaite to prepare the body for burial and make arrangements to hold the funeral and bury the body at Ballinger. The message stated that the deceased was the only son of Mrs. Wilson, and that he was 24 years of age.

Pending the arrival of the mother no hour for the funeral had been fixed, but local former service men were making an effort to learn whether the young man served in the World War in order that proper recognition might be made and service rendered in carrying out the funeral arrangements.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson, step-father and mother of Jack Edmondson, who was killed in an auto accident last night, arrived shortly after noon Saturday from Goldthwaite, and the funeral of the young man was held from the King-Holt undertaking parlors at 3:15 o'clock.

Elder Clark, pastor of the Church of Christ at Winters, conducted the funeral services, and the remains were laid to rest in Evergreen Cemetery.

HEAD PYTHIAN SISTERS DEAD

WEATHERFORD, Nov. 1.—Mrs. Virgil Watkins, Grand Senior of the Grand Temple of Pythian Sisters of Texas, died at her home here last night. She had been ill for three months. Had she lived she would have been elevated to the Grand Chief of the Temple next May. The deceased will be buried Sunday.

Four Shot in Effort to Stop Klan Parade

NILES, Ohio, Nov. 1.—Warfare between the Ku Klux Klan and the Knights of the Flaming Circle, an anti-Klan organization, resulting from an attempt to thwart plans for a Klan parade through the city streets here tonight, blazed into serious street disorders this afternoon. Four men were shot and three injured in the street fighting.

All of the victims of the shooting suffered only slight wounds from which it is expected they will recover.

NILES, Ohio, Nov. 1.—Frank McDermott, age 19, said to be an opponent of the Ku Klux Klan, was shot three times early today in the first outbreak between members of the Flaming Circle, an anti-Klan organization, and the Ku Klux.

The shot was fired from an automobile in a crowd.

McDermott's condition is said to be serious, and he was rushed to a hospital for medical aid.

In a second attack which followed shortly after the first firing into a crowd, two robed Klansmen were attacked by an excited group of pedestrians in the business section of the town. The two Klansmen were seized near the headquarters of the Knights of the Flaming Circle, the anti-Klan organization, which has arrayed itself against a parade which the Klansmen had arranged for this afternoon.

A crowd of more than a score of men dragged the Klansmen from their car and beat them up and ordered them out of the neighborhood.

The situation is serious and an appeal has been made for state troops.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 1.—A regiment of National Guardsmen have been ordered mobilized for duty at Niles this afternoon. Gov. Donahy ordered the troops mobilized upon advice from Niles, where the situation is said to be serious on account of disorders between Knights of the Flaming Circle and the Ku Klux Klan as a result of an attempt of the Klan to parade in that city.

The robbers made their escape in an automobile, going in the direction of Wichita Falls. Local officers joined in making search for the robbers.

CLAIMS BIG VOTE FOR L'FOLLETTE

DALLAS, Nov. 1.—The prediction that the LaFollette ticket in Texas will receive 225,000 votes in the general election, was made today by N. W. Murphy, state manager of the LaFollette forces. Murphy declared that the votes for LaFollette would come from labor, the Socialist and Republican ranks.

THIEF IN JAIL; CAR RECOVERED

A man giving his name as C. E. Baker is in jail at Tulsa, Oklahoma, and a Ford roadster, the property of R. J. Macken, of this city, is in custody of the officers at Tulsa, according to a message from the Tulsa chief of police to Sheriff Flynt. The man will be returned to Ballinger and face charges of stealing the auto, and the car will be disposed, or also brought back to Ballinger and the insurance company will make adjustment with the owner of the machine.

The automobile was stolen in Ballinger during the Rannels County Fair here two weeks ago. It was on the last day of the fair, and in broad open daylight, while Mrs. Macken and a friend were seeing the sights at the fair, that the thief "borrowed" the car and forgot to return it. Mrs. Macken left the car parked near the entrance to the carnival lot at Fair Park, and when she returned the car was missing.

Sheriff Flynt notified the auto theft bureau, and also sent out a description of the automobile to officers throughout Texas and Oklahoma, and the good news was received Saturday morning that the car had been recovered and a man by the name of Baker held in jail charged with auto theft.

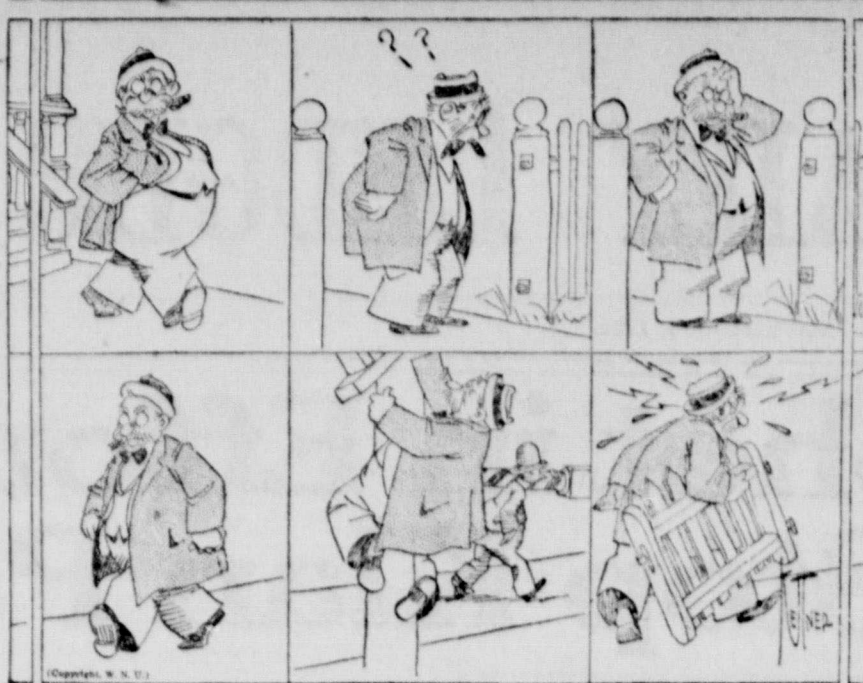

ELECTION NEWS TUESDAY NIGHT

Yes, we'll have some election news.

The Ledger has completed arrangements for giving the county, state and national election returns next Tuesday night. While the service may not be as early as in the primary elections, it will be the most complete service. The ledger has ever given on general election night.

The Ledger is a member of both the Associated Press and the Texas Election Bureau, and both these news gathering organizations will serve The Ledger next Tuesday night.

Beginning at 6:00 o'clock Tuesday evening the Associated Press will give us a fifteen and thirty minute bulletin service on the national election. The A. P. is the only organization which gathers its returns from the national election. No members of the Associated Press are permitted to broadcast the returns by radio, and the only returns to be broadcast will be such returns as other broadcasting stations pick up from bulletin boards and put out second-hand.

The Texas Election Bureau is the only news gathering organization in Texas which will gather its returns from the state election, and this service will come to the Ledger in bulletins every 15 and 30 minutes, showing how "Ma" and "Doc" are counting their votes.

The double service—bulletins from both the A. P. and the Texas Election Bureau—will make it possible for us to give a report on the election every few minutes, and this service will continue as long as the interest justifies.

The public is invited to come and hear the returns at first hand. With the permission of the city authorities the street in front of The Ledger will be roped off.

Ballinger got off to a 6 point lead in the first quarter when "Son" Rayburn scooped up a Roby fumble and sprinted 33 yards for a touchdown. They added another touchdown in the second quarter as a result of line bucks and long passes. With the ball in the shadow of the Roby goal line, the locals hit the line for the touchdown. Campbell bucking across with the ball, Lon Woodson drop-kicked goal. Score, Ballinger 13; Roby 0. In the 3rd quarter Ballinger unleashed a brilliant aerial attack that carried them to the Roby 10 yard line from where they smashed the Roby line for the third touchdown. McCarver bucking across with the ball, Woodson again drop-kicked goal, making the score 20-0. In the fourth and final quarter the locals, by virtue of short end runs line bucks and long passes worked the ball up to the Roby 3-yard line. It was the first down for Ballinger with only 3 yards to go, when the whistle blew ending the game.

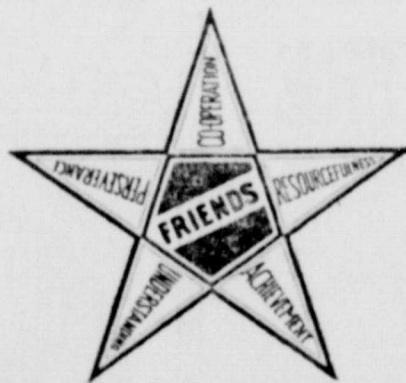
