THE GERMANS AGAINST TAMMANY HALL.
That able and energetic democratic jour-
nal, the Staats Zeitung, takes a position of
decided hostility against Tammany Hall
and the government of the democratic party
by William M. Tweed, Peter B. Sweeney,
A. Oakley Hall, and Richard B. Connolly.
"These gentlemen," says the Staats Zeit-
ung "through their failure to publish the
accounts of this city, have struck a fatal
blow at themselves. Never has contempt
been more boldly cast upon the will of the
people than in this case. Fortunately, the
opportunity of correcting the evil is not
distant. In two months the Legislature
will be chosen, which will apply a reme-
dy." Besides, as the Staats Zeitung con-
tinues, "the approaching Democratic State
Convention will show itself adequate to the
situation, and will not be behind any
other party in that portion of its platform
which will relate to the reconstruction of
cities. If this should not prove to be so,
a Republican victory will temporarily be
rendered possible; but at the same time the
hour will be advanced for a complete
transformation of parties in the State, and
probably also in the whole country."

many stand which it takes in such in-
terest as these; and we congratulate the
people on the prospect of a better govern-
ment for this city through the interven-
tion of the intelligent and conscientious
German democracy.—N. Y. Sun.

mittee having the meeting in charge, the

In Canada a pit was discovered, containing 900 skeletons of enormous size. They were buried 5 feet below the surface and many of them measured 9 feet, the skulls being large enough to place over the head of an ordinary man. They were piled in regular layers some had necklaces of beads, and stone pipes in their mouths. Many of the skulls were deformed, as if the owners had been killed in fight. The pit is supposed to be near the site of an ancient city.

Whereas, the Legislature of this State, by virtue of a Joint Resolution, approved May 2, A. D. 1871, has authorized and required the Governor to call a special election to fill the vacancies occasioned by the expiration of the term of office of our Representatives in the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States.

Now, therefore, I, EDMUND J. DAVIS, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby direct that an election be held in the several Congressional Districts and counties herein below mentioned to fill the said vacancies in the United States Congress, said election to be held for four consecutive days, commencing on the First Tuesday after the First Monday (being the 3d day) of the month of October next, at the county seats of the several counties, and to be conducted by the officers holding the same in all respects in conformity with the law providing for the mode and manner of conducting elections in this State, and with the provisions of this proclamation.

For Representatives to the Forty-second Congress of the United States. In the First Congressional District, comprising the counties of Anderson, Angelina, Cherokee, Chambers, Harrison, Henderson, Houston, Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Liberty, Nacogdoches, Newton, Orange, Panola, Polk, Rains, Rock, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Shelby, Smith, Trinity, Tyler, Van Zandt and Wood, one Representative.

In the Second Congressional District, comprising the counties of Bowie, Collin, Cooke, Dallas, Davis, Denton, Delta, Ellis, Erath, Fannin, Grayson, Hopkins, Hood, Hunt, Jack, Johnson, Kaufman, Lamar, Marion, McKinney, Palo Pinto, Parker, Red River, Tarrant, Titus, Upsher and Wise, one Representative.

In the Third Congressional District, comprising the counties of Austin, Brazoria, Burleson, Bosque, Freestone, Falls, Fort Bend, Grimes, Galveston, Harris, Hill, Leon, Limestone, Montgomery, Milam, Madison, McLennan, Matagorda, Navarro, Robertson, Walker, Washington and Wharton, one Representative.

In the Fourth Congressional District, comprising the counties of Atascosa, Baster, Bee, Bell, Brown, Burnet, Blanco, Bandera, Bexar, Colorado, Comanche, Coleman, Concho, Caldwell, Callahan, Cameron, Coryell, Dewitt, El Paso, Fayette, Gillespie, Guadalupe, Gillespie, Goliad, Hamilton, Hays, Hidalgo, Jackson, Kerr, Kendall, Karnes, Lavaca, Lampasas, Llano, Live Oak, Mason, Medina, Maverick, Nueces, Real, San Saba, San Patricio, Starr, Travis, Uvalde, Victoria, William.

The votes will be counted and returns made out and forwarded to the Secretary of State in conformity with the provisions of Section 33 of the act of the Legislature of Texas, approved Aug. 15, 1870.

The attention of officers of the law, voters and others is called to the provisions of the law of this State and of the United States enacted to secure the free exercise of the right of suffrage, and the punishment of those who may, in any manner, attempt to interfere with this franchise.
