

New Effort Made To Take Foreign Men From Spain

Evacuation Commissions Are
Decided On; Britain Hopes
To Lay Groundwork For Truce

LONDON, June 21 (AP)—Delegates of Europe's major nations today agreed to send evacuation commissions to Spain in an effort to remove foreign troops from the 23-month-old civil war, and Britain strove to make this a means of obtaining a truce.

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, defending his government's failure to halt Spanish insurgent bombings of British vessels, indicated to the House of Commons that an armistice was the only practical way to end "all these difficulties."

"All we can say," he went on, "is that we shall from time to time try and take some means with a view of seeing whether there are any favorable prospects of success and that when the time comes we shall be only too glad to offer our services, either alone or in conjunction with others, in bringing this inextricable conflict to an end."

Germans Call Jewish Purge Self-Defense

Papers Assert Pros-
perity Attracting
Hebrews To Berlin

BERLIN, June 21 (AP)—Stung by eye-witness reports in American and other foreign newspapers, the German press today broke its silence of the anti-Semitic drive which seems aimed at "cleansing" Berlin of its 140,000 Jews.

A scornful editorial in the lead in Nazi organ, Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's own Volkischer Beobachter, sought to justify the drive as an "act of self-defense by the people against Jews who are swamping Berlin, especially from Austria."

Although the drive began June 1 continued, the ministry of economy exempted foreign Jews living abroad from property registration regulations which the United States had protested. New regulations also relaxed the rules as they apply to German Jews living abroad.

"Paradoxical though it may seem," the Beobachter declared, "the louder the foreign press has railed about anti-Jewish persecutions, the more the Jews have wanted to come to Germany."

"It is the material prosperity of the Reich that attracts them and makes them submit willingly to any restrictions placed upon them for the Jews are notoriously thick-skinned."

The Beobachter charged the new influx consisted primarily of "strugglers of drugs and currencies, counterfeiters and professional swindlers." It accused the Jews also of "behaving with intolerable impertinence to Aryan women and girls."

It became increasingly clear, however, that emigration of Jews was an objective of the persecution. Jews among the 2,000 estimated arrested in raids said all who declared their willingness to leave the country were released from custody almost immediately.

Benson Holds The Lead In Minnesota

Governor Has Narrow
Margin In Farmer-
Labor Primary

MINNEAPOLIS, June 21 (AP)—Gov. Elmer A. Benson, Minnesota, pushed ahead of his challenger, Hjalmar Petersen, for the farmer-labor nomination in Monday's primary election, as additional returns were compiled today. The lead had changed hands frequently.

Lead Of 5,628
Benson had a 5,628 lead on the basis of 1,689 of 3,739 precincts in the state. Petersen's margin, built up with rural votes, was slashed heavily when a batch of ballots came in from Hennepin county (Minneapolis), Benson stronghold. The vote with about half the precincts reported, was: Benson 112,996; Petersen 107,367.

The two farmer-labor candidates polled 75,000 votes more than the four republican aspirants, leading credence to the belief that thousands of republican voters had jumped the party fence in a move designed to eliminate Benson from the general election in November. The farmer-labor race overshadowed the republican and democratic contests. Harold Staasen, republican, and Thomas Gallagher, democrat, both young lawyers, were leading their respective fields.

WPA Man Involved
Although the national administration kept out of the campaign, President Roosevelt recently approved the ouster of Victor Christgau's removal, and Petersen criticized the dismissal.

Petersen broke with Governor Benson shortly after the latter's induction into office in 1937. Since then he repeatedly has attacked the governor, promising in his campaign to "drive the political racketeers from Capitol Hill."

BARROWS WINS
PORTLAND, Me., June 21 (AP)—Governor Lewis O. Barrows' claim that a "business-like administration" entitled him to nomination for a second term was upheld overwhelmingly today by Maine's usually dominant republicans.

Barrows, endorsed by the republican state convention, handed a stunning defeat to yesterday's primary election to youthful, insurgent State Senator Roy L. Fernald of Winterport, and won the right to face former Gov. Louis J. Brann (D) in the September state election. Barrows' majority was more than 40,000.

TEMPLE WITHDRAWS PWA APPLICATION

TEMPLE, June 21 (AP)—Temple city commissioners last night cancelled an application to the PWA for construction here of a municipal light and power plant and distribution system, then filed an amended application for a \$400,000 water and sewer improvement project.

The commissioners took the action by resolution, notified PWA officials; then the city filed the amended application.

Interest, Sinking Fund
Interest and sinking fund expenditures for the month amounted to \$1,418, making a total of \$17,780 disbursed from the fund during the current fiscal year. Of the amount, \$5,000 went to retirement of bonds, \$4,000 for warrants, and \$8,780 for interest and exchange. Balance was \$40,722.

Water revenues for May reached \$10,531, a gain of \$579 over April and \$133 over May a year ago. During May administration, sewer, park and airport departments were slightly above their budget allotments for the period. However, there was a net under-run of \$2,003.

Moreover, only the park and sewer departments showed to be over appropriations for the two months period. Schedule on the swimming pool and golf course showed revenues of \$1,297 for May, including 1,181 adult and 2,101 children swim tickets, exclusive of season admittances. Cash balance in the fund increased from \$584 to \$1,406 during the period.

Likewise, the cemetery fund showed an increase of approximately \$100 for the month.

STEWARDESS VISITS
Miss Lois Smith, former surgical nurse at the Big Spring hospital, arrived in Big Spring Monday afternoon via American Airlines for a short visit here with friends before returning to Chicago, where she has a position as stewardess with American Airlines. She will resume a regular run between Chicago and Fort Worth July 1st.

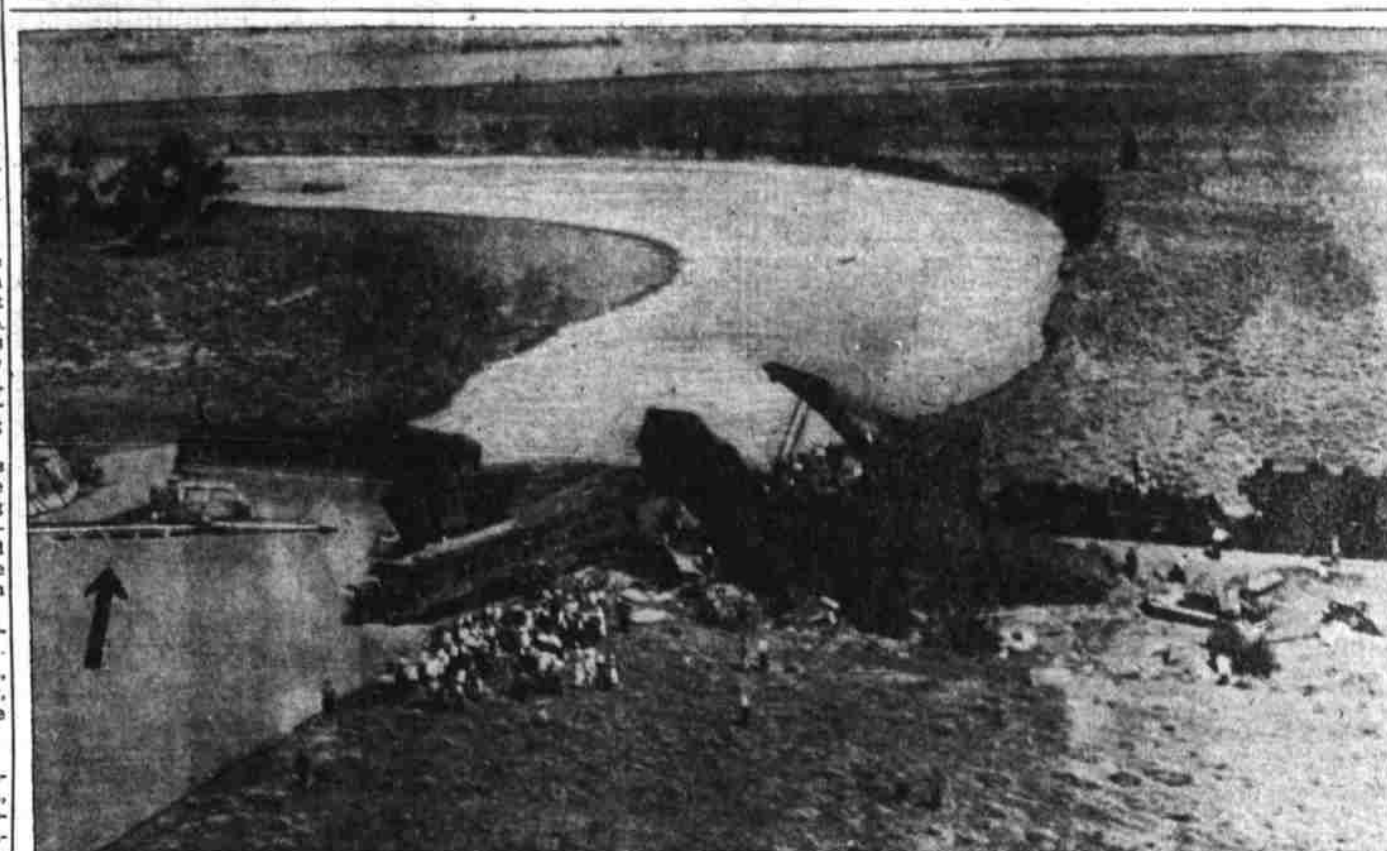
Of the 18 indicted, only four were in custody. The others were in Germany, where they are safe from extradition proceedings. The German foreign office in Berlin said it regarded the whole matter as "an attempt to create a sensation in the United States for obvious reasons."

"It is quite evident that the allegations overshoot the mark," a foreign office spokesman said. "It is not so much a case of spies caught as spies imagined." But United States Attorney Hardy indicated the investigation was far from finished without saying there would be more indictments. The grand jury, now in recess, was ordered to hold itself ready for additional evidence.

The defendants were charged with conspiring during the last three years to obtain U. S. defense secrets and deliver them to the German government or "factions" in Germany. Two other indictments detailed specific acts—those of plans for an army pursuit plane from the Seversky plant at Farmingdale, Long Island, and theft of an army and navy code book.

Expect To Recover 12 More Wreck Victims

Twenty-Three Of 31 Known Dead In
Train Mishap Are Identified

MILES CITY, Mont., June 21 (AP)—With 31 already known dead, fatigue-worn searchers worked today to lift up again from the slithering bed of Custer creek a tourist sleeper which railroad officials estimated contained 12 more victims of the nation's worst railroad tragedy in a decade.

Twenty-three of the 31 known victims were identified. The bodies of two unidentified women were taken last night from the sleeper which plunged with the Milwaukee railroad's crack "Olympian" train through a flood-weakened trestle early Sunday. Twelve other bodies were found earlier yesterday and a woman died in a hospital.

Railroad and government officials launched an investigation of the wreck. All save one of the victims met death instantly, officials said. Lucille Stumley, Volga, S. D., nurse, died last night at Holy Rosary hospital here. One other person, a train porter, was still in a serious condition in the hospital.

Of the 65 injured who were rushed to the 85-bed hospital here, nearly all were released after minor treatment.

At Chicago, H. A. Scandrett, president of the Milwaukee road, declared the wreck "resulted from a condition which developed without warning and was not due to any shortcoming in the operating organization."

Every day's delay to the Japanese, the Chinese said, has been used to bolster strategic points blocking what is expected to be Japan's line of attack deeper into China's heart.

They said Chinese lines now were virtually prepared to withstand any onslaught while Japan's mechanized army still was bogged in the mire of the flooded battlefield and her air squadrons were grounded by rain.

Sixty new divisions, numbering about 500,000 men, were said to have been prepared to take up positions in Hankow's last line of defense.

The unexpected delay also was vital help, Chinese declared, in assembly of new equipment, including a large number of planes from Soviet Russia and elsewhere, 1,200 Russian tanks, 380 Russian guns and 300 other guns.

Blocked by the floods, the Japanese were reported in a great retreat from the Honan province front where, two weeks ago, wavering Chinese resistance placed Chengchow, junction of the north-south Peiping-Hankow and west-east Lanchow railroads, in peril of capture.

ROOSEVELT CONFERS WITH KENNEDY

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 21 (AP)—President Roosevelt shifted briefly today from the clean-up work after a session of congress to an important discussion of what's going on in Europe.

Joseph P. Kennedy, home from his ambassador's post in London, was on the chief executive's engagement list for a call.

The terse White House disclosure that Kennedy would head for the presidential study on his second day back in this country gave no hint of what course the conversation would take.

Stocks Sweep Upward Again, \$3 A Share

Better Sentiment
On Business Out-
look Noted

NEW YORK, June 21 (AP)—The stock market swept upward again today with gains of fractions to \$3 or more general throughout the list.

Steels, motors, retail stores, farm implements, aircraft, oils, utilities, rails and metals all joined in the advance, which was attributed to better sentiment concerning the business outlook, and expectations of the government's lend-lease program might take hold quicker than had been anticipated, and stimulate trade improvement.

Some leaders gained \$5 and Allied Chemical was up \$10 at one time. Near the close Eastman Kodak was \$5.25 ahead, Johns-Manville \$4.25, U. S. Rubber \$2.50, Alcoa \$1.50, U. S. Steel \$1.12, and Standard Oil of New Jersey \$1.12.

Transactions were at the rate of better than 1,400,000 shares, the second more-than-a-million day in a row.

Bonds were strong, and some commodities tilted upward with the share market.

O'DANIEL SAYS HE HAS NO POLL TAX

FORT WORTH, June 21 (AP)—W. Lee O'Daniel, Fort Worth, candidate for governor, said in Sherman last night he had no poll tax and explained why.

The flour merchant charged that "dozens of agents" of his opponents have "swamped down on Fort Worth and are frantically trying to find something in my past they can attack."

"The professional politicians have things in Texas in such a mess," O'Daniel said, "that thousands of good citizens have become disgusted. They felt there was no use for them to go to the polls any more, so they just saved the \$1.75 which a poll tax receipt would have cost them. I am one of those thousands and I am not ashamed of it."

TREASURY, FEDERAL RESERVE IN DISPUTE ON BANK POLICY

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The disagreement between the treasury and the federal reserve board over bank examination policy reached a climax today in a demand by Secretary Morgenthau for immediate adoption of his program.

Morgenthau announced he would send his recommendations to the president for approval without the endorsement of Chairman Mariner S. Eccles of the federal reserve board if the latter were not received in 48 hours.

The treasury head has held up the new policy two weeks in an effort to get Eccles' approval. The comptroller of currency, the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation and the National Association of State Bank Examiners already have endorsed it.

Eccles has opposed the policy on the ground that it does not go far enough in liberalizing bank examinations. He has reiterated in recent weeks that "restrictive" rules were retarding the flow of credit into business and thereby delaying recovery.

Morgenthau holds that the first duty of banks is to their depositors, and bank examinations should be strict enough to insure full compliance with that obligation. "Eccles contends that deposit insurance, by removing the threat of bank runs, should permit more latitude in making loans and that liberalized credit policies would stimulate recovery."

Agents Called To Testify In Alpine Case

Mother Of Victim
Tells Of Lad's De-
parture From Home

ALPINE, June 21 (AP)—Two insurance company representatives today testified Francis Marion Black, Jr., made repeated efforts to buy large policies on the life of 13-year-old Marvin Dale Noblett only a few weeks before he plummeted to death down a craggy Big Bend mountain-side.

No Cross-Examination

Black, slender 25-year-old former San Antonio filling station operator, sat beside a defense counsel that failed to cross examine the state's first seven witnesses in his slaying trial. On April 1, Earl F. Rumbo, Harlingen insurance agent, testified, Mr. and Mrs. Black came to his home.

"They told me they wanted to buy an insurance policy for an adopted child. They insisted on knowing the rates so I went to my office and gave them the figures. They told me the boy was in Dallas with his mother."

Rumbo said the Blacks inquired about a \$5,000 policy and added that "I didn't even make out a prospect card on them" because he could not get sufficient background on the lad.

Dr. Max E. Johnson of San Antonio, state witness, then testified the Blacks came to his office on April 23 and "wanted me to examine a boy for life insurance."

Sought \$5,000 Policy
They wanted a \$5,000 policy and named themselves as beneficiaries, Dr. Johnson testified. The physician said he made the examination and sent the application to the company's home office.

"On May 20," he testified, "the Blacks returned and wanted to know why they had not received the policy. I told them I didn't know why."

Dr. Johnson said Black came back to his office "around May 27" with another physical application blank on another insurance company and asked him to again examine the boy. The physician testified he filled out the blank and mailed it to the home office.

Tears welling in her eyes, Mrs. Bobbie Smith, widowed mother of the dead boy, covered her eyes with unsteady hands as she told of her son's departure from her Harlingen home two months ago.

Let Son Go
She told the court she went to Harlingen little more than a year ago with her three sons after residing in Oklahoma. She said she "was hard up" and obtained employment in a second hand clothing store. Marvin, she said, worked at odd jobs in filling station and ice cream parlor and attended school.

The Blacks were introduced to her by a mutual acquaintance, she testified.

"They told me they wanted a boy to work in an ice cream parlor they planned to open in San Antonio and promised to send Marvin to school and buy his clothes in return for work. They came back two months and then, on April 20, a bus ticket to San Antonio came in the mail."

"I took my boy to the station and told him good-bye. It was the last time I ever saw him alive."

District Attorney Roy Jackson of El Paso, after hearing the mother testify she received a post card from the boy telling her he was going on a fishing trip, asked: "You never heard from him again?"

"No," came the answer from Mrs. Smith. She brushed tears from her eyes, identified the boy's photograph and left the stand.

The defense in the hands of Arthur E. Owens and Mrs. Mae Ament waited its turn to present a defense based on the subnormal mentality of their client. Owens made it clear the defense would not claim insanity but would try to prove the thin-faced defendant did not have full possession of his faculties. To that end the defense had on hand a renowned Texas psychiatrist, Dr. Paul L. White of the University of Texas.

STAPLE REMOVED FROM MEXICAN LAD'S WINDPIPE

A half inch staple was removed from the trachea of Lorenzo Lopez, Midland, here Monday afternoon, apparently saving the Mexican child's life.

The object had been lodged in the windpipe and was turned so that it snagged when attempts were made to pull it out. The lad was rushed to a Big Spring specialist for the removal.

Last week a Dallas child swallowed a quarter and had to have it removed here.

The German schlager came in for his first bout with the wonder negro. The fight experts on that occasion thought they heard the tumbrels rolling through the streets and the odds were 6 to 1 and up that Schmeling was a goner.

This time he comes as the proud, confident conqueror, certain that by midnight tomorrow he will be hailed as the first man ever to regain the heavyweight title. He knocked the young negro out in the 12th round of their first meeting, and he means to do it again before an expected throng of 75,000 and a \$500,000 "house."

Again the weight of expert opinion is against the 32-year-old German, but only in a slight degree by comparison with the 1936 fight. This time a poll of experts reveals that about 40 per cent of them like his chances.

Schmeling is making the five-hour trip from Speculator by automobile and train, arriving here at 10 tonight.

Louis, unless he changes his plans, will not motor in from Pompton Lakes until he goes to the commission office for the official weigh-in at noon tomorrow.

For once, there are no reports that either fighter has been injured in training, or is in any way off his feed.

The latest ex-champion to tons in his nickel's worth is old Jack Johnson. He is approximately the same color as Louis, but he thinks Joe still has a lot to learn, and that Schmeling will repeat. Jack Dempsey by this time has picked each man a half-dozen times. Officially, he likes Schmeling; privately, he thinks Louis will win by a knockout.

The town is filling up fast with ticket-holders, and the advance sale continues to be brisk. It is evident, though, that the weather must remain elegant and there be a hefty sale at the stadium if Jacobs is to realize his dream of a million-dollar gate. Radio and screen rights may boost the gross over the charmed figure.

Max's latest observations reveal that he is as cocksure as ever, and even a little spiteful in his evaluation of Louis. "He talks much about knocking me out," says Max, "but he remembers how I hit him. Don't worry—he remembers. He knows that he hit me, too, and that I took it."

Louis, who appears to have developed a genuine distaste for the German, repeats dogmatically that he will score a quick killing.

Fette, With Hard Luck Trailing Him, Falter As Reds Move On

If you look far enough down in the National League pitching records, you'll find the name of Lou Fette of the Boston Bees, and figures to show he has won only one game—and lost eight. Right beside the name you can imagine a big black jinx.

Lou was one of those oldsters who won 50 games for a second-division Boston club last year. This season he has been making up for that surprising showing by getting all the bad breaks.

In the normal course of events, Fette would have had a victory yesterday instead of watching the Bees go down to a 13-inning 3-1 defeat by Cincinnati.

At the same time, the Reds would have been returned to third place in the standing.
Alters Ruling
The Reds were officially moved ahead of Chicago's Cubs yesterday when League President Ford Frick altered his original ruling on the protested game against St. Louis May 14. Instead of letting the game stand as a Cardinal victory until it is replayed in August, Frick decided to call it a tie game for record purposes and thus Cincinnati moved a few points ahead of Chicago in the percentages.

The Reds remained there when Ival Goodman's triple off Johnny Lanning, Fette's successor, broke

up yesterday's game. The Cubs, meantime, were knocking off the Brooklyn Dodgers 5-1 behind Hill Lee's seven-hit flanking to keep pace. The only other game yesterday returned the New York Yankees to second in the American League by a three-point margin over the Boston Red Sox as they conquered St. Louis 8-4 in the replay of Sunday's tie.

Walk Costs Victory
Although Fette wasn't charged with yesterday's loss, the game was a fine sample of the sort of thing that has been happening to him. In the nine innings Lou pitched, he gave only five hits and one walk, but that pass cost him the victory. Lonnie Frey drew it, took third on an error by Debs Garms and scored after Goodman's fly.

The Bees didn't tie it up until the ninth when Bob Reis, batting for Fette, singled to bring home Bob Kable. Then in the 13th, Goodman's triple brought in Walter Berger with the winning run. Goodman also scored after Buck McGraw's fly.
Cincinnati's run paved the way for another red-hot series as the Reds go to New York today to take on the league-leading Giants. A similar affair is starting in the American League where the Yankees invade Cleveland. Although virtually tied with Boston, the Yankees are a game and a half behind the pace-setting Indians.

Hull Works On Plan To Humanize Wars

Would Have Nations Band Together, Halt Bombing Of Cities

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Secretary of State Hull has begun developing a program to humanize warfare, with the particular objective of stopping aerial bombings of civilians.

Persons close to the state department disclosed today that Hull is devoting much of his time to this subject, brought to his attention by airplane attacks on Spanish and Chinese cities.

Details are not yet ready, nor has the secretary entered into diplomatic discussions with other nations.
State department officials, however, viewed with sympathy the suggestions advanced yesterday in London by Norman H. Davis, chairman of the American Red Cross.

Davis proposed neutralized hospital zones, an international convention prohibiting or restricting bombing of "open" towns and cities, and zones of immunity for women and children within cities under attack.

Undersecretary of State Welles emphasized that Davis spoke in his Red Cross capacity rather than as a representative of this government. Nevertheless Davis, who has been President Roosevelt's ambassador-at-large and disarmament expert, is in close touch with the states department.

May Go Ahead
Hull probably will not wait until the next session of congress to proceed with his program. He can sound out other nations without waiting for congressional approval.
Chairman Pittman (D-Nev) of the senate foreign relations committee declared the storm of protests in this country against bombings of cities in the Far East and Spain raised a question to the military worth of such attacks.

"There has been a difference of opinion among military strategists since the World war on the bombing of civilian populations," he said.
"Some claim the attacks break down the morale of the people by fear and intimidation. I don't agree with that. I think it actually hardens the people and makes it more difficult to eventually obtain peace.
"It's a complete return to barbarism. I think nations might as well condone the poisoning of wells and all water supplies."

START CAMPAIGN

LINCOLN, Neb., June 21 (AP)—The chips were down and 140 hands aboard in the 38th annual Trans-Mississippi golf tournament here today.

The 18-hole qualifying round got under way not long after sunup with 64 of the Midwest, south and west's best shotmakers destined to wind up in the championship flight.

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—A special house committee appointed to investigate campaign expenditures pledged itself today to do as little work as possible and to try to spend nothing from a \$20,000 appropriation.

After a meeting of five of the seven members, Chairman Lewis (D-Colo) said he was authorized to announce:
"We will go on no fishing expeditions. We are not going to issue any warnings and we are not going to send out any questionnaires."
Lewis explained the committee would take action if it received affidavits concerning alleged violations of the election laws.

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See Increase In Number Of Aged

LOS ANGELES, June 21 (AP)—Townsend old age pension advocates heard at their third national convention today that population studies indicate a greatly increased proportion of elderly persons in the next several decades—an increase that may stimulate further efforts toward publicly-supported old age security.

In his long-range analysis, Dr. Warren S. Thompson, population expert of Miami university, Oxford,

Ohio, took 65 as retirement age. On the basis of decreasing births since 1910, the 65 and over group by 1980 will number more than four times the 1930 census figure. Dr. Thompson told the convention. The 1930 retirement eligibility group, he said, numbered 6.6 millions, constituting 5.4 per cent, or one-nineteenth of the population, while the 1980 group will total 22.1 millions, or one-seventh of the expected population then.

"It is not surprising," said Dr. Thompson, "that there is a growing demand that adequate care of the aged be recognized as a public function. Nor can there be any

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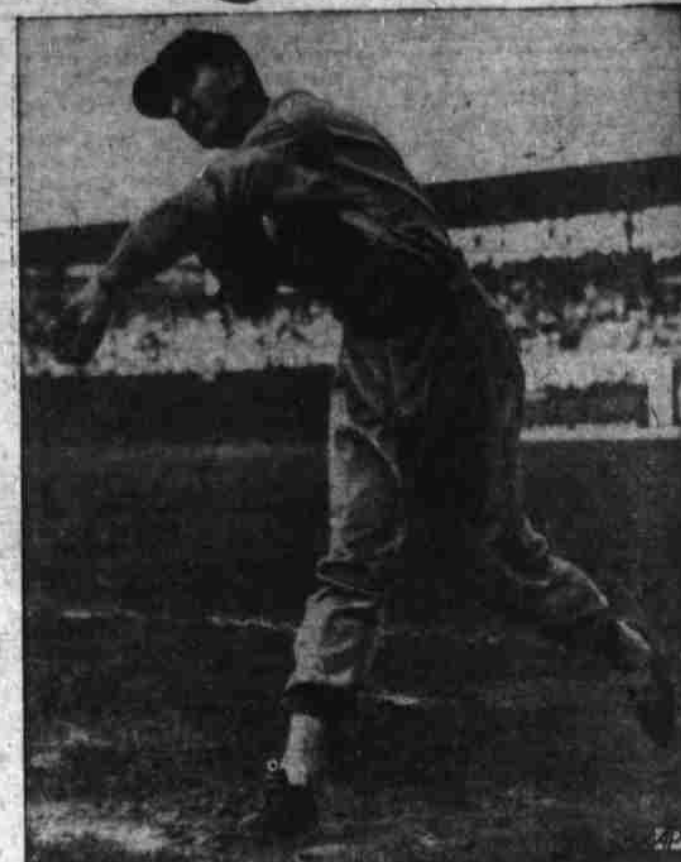

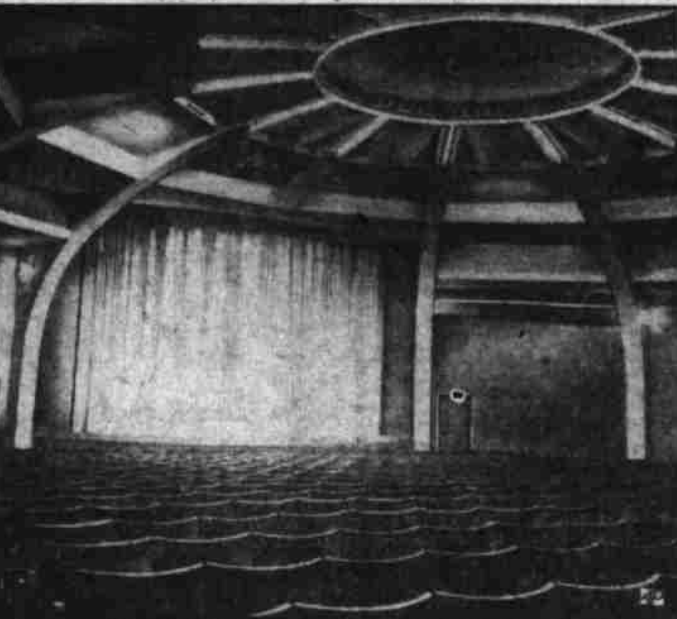

"WOMAN ABOUT TOWN," by Allis McKay; (Macmillan: \$2.50).

"Woman About Town" by Allis McKay is the most old fashioned novel we have found in a long time. That is to say, it is typical of hundreds that were published in the speakeasy era, and books of that era seem more old fashioned, less interesting, than books of Civil war vintage or earlier.

You doubtless know the type of competently written novel we are talking about. There is always a heroine, one of those independent women who make their own living and darn well, too. Miss McKay's independent female is named Leila.

There is always the boss—Miss McKay has two for good measure, one of whom is a darn good oil skate, and takes Leila to the printing plant to make up catalogs at night—the other is rather a crab, but once in a while he discloses a silver lining or a heart of gold.

There is always the suspicion of a broken heart. Leila has separated from her husband (they just couldn't seem to make it go; you know, what tells the use?) and divides her spare time between walking the child of a girl friend (legitimate, of course), and mooning over other people's happiness.

There are always those other friends, girls in business like the heroine, who competently manage home and "career," girls who smoke long cigarettes or cigarettes in long holders and manage to live with a capital "L," girls who are to this reader complete and ghastly bore.

And there are (have you followed so far? Heaven knows nobody will blame you if you drop out) always boy friends. This boy friend is named Don, and he is, up to page 191, which is as far as we got, about as dull as witchwater. He has lovely eyes, and he seems to spend a good deal of time just looking at Leila—feasting his eye is, we believe, the technical term for the exercise.

Anyway, all these characters, all of whom you know, go from party to party, house to house, advertising agency to hell, and nobody actually gets any place whatever. There is a panel on certain comic pages whose catch line is "born 30 years too soon." "Woman About Town" was, possibly, born 10 years too late.

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TRAIN THEM FOR WORK

Every boy and girl should know how to do something with their hands, besides holding the steering wheel of a car or applying lipstick. They should be taught something that could be used in making a living if their living has to be made, and cannot be made without the use of the hands.

Vocational training in all schools is the answer. No matter if the child is one of a wealthy family, the time may come when that wealth has disappeared and the child, then perhaps grown to maturity, be helpless or dependent on charity of the government or of friends or relatives.

Value of vocational training is shown by a statement of Dr. Howard Oakley, educational director of CCC. He said that last year 90,000 young men had been taken off the CCC rolls and put into private employment. Of these youths about one-third were actually placed in private employment by the CCC program. The remaining two-thirds used what they learned in camp to get jobs for themselves, through the interest of friends or the employment service. Nearly half of them had jobs for which they had been qualified through training received in the CCC camps.

How many high school or literary college graduates apply for employment with qualifications to do work with their hands? True, some schools offer vocational training, but not enough do. It should be done by all. An apprenticeship that will help get employment can be given in connection with a literary education, and it should be given and made mandatory. The youth who is studying and expecting to be a doctor or lawyer or other professional man will not be hurt by being trained in a mechanical trade or something besides brain work. With the double-barreled education there would be less unemployment and that is something that this country is striving for.

Washington Daybook

By Preston Grover

WASHINGTON—It is quite possible that the more hectic lubrications of the 75th congress—the court fight, anti-lynching, reorganization—will be overlooked in the years to come and the session remembered longest for two comparatively obscure health acts.

One is the act creating the National Cancer Institute. The other is the measure launching a well-financed national campaign against syphilis and gonorrhea.

Such health bills often remain in the public mind. Probably there are not many who, offhand, can name another single act of the 1906 session of congress, for instance, except a health measure. It is recalled to the memory of millions by the simple little formula printed on so many bottles and cans. It goes something to the effect that the enclosed product is "made in compliance with the pure food and drug act of 1906."

The Cancer Institute got an initial \$750,000 for a building and \$400,000 for research and curative work. With almost exciting dispatch for a federal agency, it spent \$200,000 for its first year's allowance for 10 grams of radium. That provided 20 units for distribution about the country to recognized cancer treatment institutions. It made radium treatment available to hundreds of cancer victims who otherwise never could have come within reach of an institution rich enough to buy the expensive stuff.

Research Projects Aided
The law is broad in scope with a view to inviting wide research by skilled specialists at the same time more are being trained. Subsidies are provided for recognized research projects. To Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence of the University of California went \$30,000 for continued work on his cyclotron, which induces radium ray activity in such inert objects as common salt. Experiment must determine whether it is more effective in this form than from free radium.

Dr. Louis Fieser of Harvard has received \$8,000 to continue his experiments with coal tar derivatives which have been found to cause cancer in mice. Finding a cause may help to disclose a cure.

Sixteen physicians are being trained in cancer treatment at government expense. Fellowships are granted to apt students to continue special lines of research.

The Social Disease Front
For treatment of syphilis and gonorrhea the legislation authorizes up to \$3,000,000 a year. Of this, \$2,600,000 goes to the states for use in providing laboratory facilities to aid physicians in diagnosing and treating the diseases and in publicizing the need of treatment.

The remaining \$400,000 goes to the venereal disease division of the bureau of public health for use largely in hunting new methods of diagnosing the diseases and in finding cures for them when identified.

Specific tests and specific cures for syphilis are known and widely used, although open to improvement. Gonorrhea, however, has been a medical stepchild, often ignored or frequently left to the ministrations of the least reputable physicians in a community.

Badly needed are, first, a means of determining under varied conditions when the disease has been contracted, and second, and equally important, a test to show when the disease has been cured.

SAYS U. S., MEXICAN OFFICERS CAN AID EACH OTHER

EL PASO, June 21 (AP)—Elimination of the United States-Mexico border line as far as law enforcement is concerned was a subject before city marshals and chiefs of police of Texas today.

Agaspito Pozo, chief administrative officer of the Mexico City police, advocated such a move in an address before the annual convention here yesterday.

"Good feeling between Mexican and American officers, particularly along the Texas border, has developed tremendously in the past few years," Pozo declared. "I want to see the day when there will be no Rio Grande or any other kind of boundary line between Mexico and the United States, so far as enforcement of laws of both nations is concerned, and as far as officers on one side of the line can aid officers on the other side."

WEEK'S OIL OUTPUT SHOWS INCREASE

TULSA, Okla., June 21 (AP)—Production of crude oil in the United States increased 2,681 barrels daily during the week ended June 18 to an average of 3,136,105, the Oil & Gas Journal reported today.

Oklahoma production declined 18,725 barrels daily to 446,090, East Texas dropped 503 barrels daily to 363,497 and the state of Texas increased 1,111 daily to 1,189,636.

Louisiana's output increased 8,607 barrels daily to 262,975, Kansas swelled 10,906 daily to 199,590 and California hiked 7,750 daily to 679,500.

McCraw said \$5,000,000 can be saved through a businesslike overhauling of the state departments.

Veteran Rivermen Dubious About Trip Down The Colorado Gorge

GREEN RIVER, Utah, June 21

(AP)—Not a single "riverman" volunteered to join the Nevills' expedition when it pushed out into the muddy waters of the Green river to start a hazardous 666-mile trip down the mile-deep gorges of the Colorado river yesterday. They told why today.

"They're taking the trip at the wrong time," declared one "river rat" and prospector. "The water's too high. You couldn't pay me to join them."

He referred to the six of this latest of Colorado river expeditions, headed by Norman D. Nevills, Mexican Hat riverman. With him were Elzada Clover, University of Michigan botanist and her assistant, Lois Jetter; Don Harris, U. S. geological survey scientist; Eugene Atkinson, University of Michigan zoologist; and W. C. Gibson, San Francisco artist-photographer.

Silently watching the three 16-foot boats push into the swollen waters of the Green river, the bearded observer, who claimed four

river trips—all of them on a raft declared:

"See how the water pushes them along right here on the Green. Well, that isn't anything to what they'll find when they strike the Colorado."

"So they're looking for flowers and Indian caves," observed a white-haired veteran. "Well, I don't know about that, but I do know they'll find a peck of trouble before they get through."

Those who knew—and others who thought they knew—agreed there would be no danger for the first 124 miles.

"But then the two rivers join and if you ever saw a pile of water it's there," declared one.

PARALYSIS FUND PRESENTED TO FD

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 21 (AP)—Officials of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis presented to President Roosevelt today a check for \$1,010,000 to be used in the foundation's nation-wide drive to wipe out the disease.

Presentation of the check — it was a yard long and six inches across — was made by Basil O'Connor of New York, foundation president; Keith Morgan of New York and others on the committee which conducted the money-raising campaign.

Most of the \$1,010,000 was raised by the president's birthday balls on Jan. 30, but \$80,000 came from the "March of Dimes" to the White House.

FIANCEE INJURED, YOUTH ATTEMPTS HIS OWN LIFE

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 20 (AP)—Vivian Randall, 19, and her 20-year-old fiancé, Arthur Owens, lay in a hospital here today—victims of an automobile accident and remorse. Neither was expected to live.

Owens was driving the car when it crashed yesterday. He was unhurt but his fiancée's back and pelvis were broken. He sent her to a hospital in an ambulance.

Then he knocked on the door of Adolph Schubert's farmhouse and borrowed a gun "to shoot a dog." A minute later, Coroner W. D. Turner said, Owen pressed the gun against his head and fired.

Pleads For Fund To Finance War On Accidents

AUSTIN, June 21 (AP)—Declaring "highway slaughter" had gone far enough, Lowry Martin of Corsicana, president of the Texas Good Roads association and a vice-president of the Texas Traffic Safety Council, today appealed for an adequately financed endowment to combat traffic accidents in Texas.

He suggested an endowment to support possibly an annual training school for traffic officers, a bureau of traffic research or other worthwhile project systematically to study traffic problems.

"There should be some wealthy big-hearted Texan who wants to do something for himself, his community and his state willing to make an endowment to help provide for this work," Martin said.

"I pray someone will lend his name and financial support in answer to this appeal. The gravity of the situation demands our attention; highway slaughter has gone far enough. We must act."

ABANDONED WELL TO BE CLEANED

Application to clean out an abandoned oil well in an attempt to obtain production has been granted to the Greene Production company of Fort Worth.

The hole is plugged and abandoned in the center of the north-east quarter of section 27-30-15, T&P, three-quarters of a mile Snyder pool. Greene-Getty drilled the test as their wildcat No. 1 Snyder eight years ago. It was carried to a depth of 3,502 feet. Elevation is 2,311 feet. Production would be sought around the 3,000 foot level, and operations are to start July 1.

HUSBAND ACCUSED IN WOMAN'S DEATH

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 21 (AP)—A coroner's jury brought in a verdict today that Mrs. Elizabeth Brown, 17-year-old expectant mother, was "deliberately and maliciously" strangled to death by her husband, Fred Brown, before her body, weighted with pillow points, was thrown into the Nanticoke river June 14.

Brown, husky farmer of nearby Vienna, was composed and showed little concern when the verdict was returned.

IS SENTENCED TO BE GOOD 20 YEARS

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 21 (AP)—William G. Tripp, 31-year-old Phoenix barber, convicted of criminal assault of a Brawley, Calif., woman hitchhiker, must be "good" for 20 years.

Superior Judge E. G. Frazier ordered Tripp to stay at home nights with his family and refrain from drinking.

"If you make the slightest mistake, you will be sent to prison," the court warned.

ON MELLON ESTATE IS ADJUSTED

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The government settled today for \$668,029 a \$3,000,000 tax controversy involving the estate of the late Andrew W. Mellon, former secretary of the treasury.

The settlements included \$485,509 principal and \$182,220 interest, figured from 1931, the year in which Mellon allegedly underpaid his income taxes.

A ruling by the board of tax appeals had awarded the government \$408,053 plus interest and had exonerated Mellon of income tax fraud charges. Both parties agreed today not to appeal that decision.

Robots To Be Used In Making Weather Observations

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The army, navy and weather bureau are getting ready to turn over to aerial robots work which human fliers have been doing for years.

Beginning July 1, the weather bureau will send aloft small balloons at six scattered points to make weather observations at heights up to 11 miles.

By an ingenious radio mechanism reports of temperature and humidity, indispensable in weather forecasting, will be flashed from the balloons to receiving apparatus on the ground.

The balloons, officials said, may not save money at the outset, but will save lives. Several military and commercial pilots have been killed in crashes while making observation flights.

Furthermore, the automatic reporting is more accurate and more extensive, since fliers are unable to reach such heights.

The army will put robot reporters to work at Patterson field, O., and Barksdale field, La. The navy started the daily balloon flights June 1.

The weather bureau will put the mechanical reporters to work July 1 at Oklahoma City, Oakland, Calif., Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.; Nashville, Omaha, and Fargo, N. D.

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Conservation Law To Highest Court

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Ligation challenging constitutionality of an Oklahoma conservation law came before the supreme court today.

The 1935 legislation divided oil producing land into units and, with certain exceptions, restricts drilling to one well for each unit.

In the event there are two or more separately owned tracts in a unit all share to some extent in the production.

century mark but one time this season—and so in a sense summer weather probably is ahead.

At 8:04 p. m., say the scientists, the sun will shine overhead at a point farther north on the earth's surface than it will reach again this year. It will be directly over the Tropic of Cancer and its rays will strike the North Pole at an elevation of 23 degrees and 27 minutes from the horizon.

Although the days will become shorter from this date, warmer weather is to be expected for a month or two because the radiation from the earth's surface at this time of year is not as great as the heat received from the sun.

The day in Big Spring will have been 14 hours and 15 minutes long when the sun sets at 7:53. Rising time this morning was 5:40 a. m.
