Big Question Mark Hangs Over Fate Of Red Hunters

Sheriff Tells Liquor Group Life In Danger

AMARILLO (AP) — State crime probes today had the testimony of a sheriff who said his life was threatened after he spurned a bootleg payoff offer.

Sheriff Roy Hillin of Crosbyton told his story yesterday to the House Crime Investigating Committee as the panel began a hearing on what has been termed multi-million dollar bootlegging in the Panhandle and West Texas.

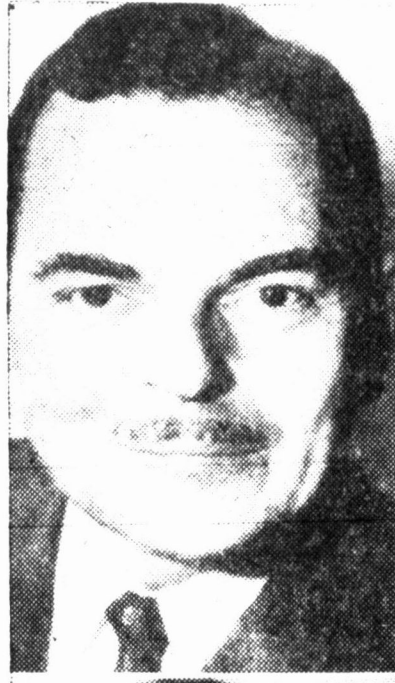
The sheriff said George Aaron, former Amarillo liquor store operator, came to Crosbyton in November, 1950, and offered Hillin \$1,000 monthly if the sheriff would allow five bootleggers to operate in Crosby County.

Hillin testified: "I told him that I had been voted in by the good people of Crosby County to uphold the law, that there would be no bootlegging as long as I had anything to do about it."

Aaron came to Crosby County again Dec. 16, 1950, and sought out Hillin on the latter's farm, the sheriff continued.

"He wanted to know if my mind was made up. And I told him I wouldn't allow any bootlegging," Hillin testified.

"He said he might be able to do a little better for me. And he offered \$1,500 a month if I would let seven bootleggers operate."

GOPs In Congress Bicker Over Spoils

Congressional Republicans bickered over the spoils of the Eisenhower landslide victory today as the President-elect prepared to send his first invasion wave into Washington.

Senate GOP members found themselves embroiled in a possibly bitter fight over their party leadership.

Sen. Styles Bridges of New Hampshire spread the word he would rather be temporary president of that body and third in the line of succession for the presidency than keep the job he now holds.

Allied Guns Hammer Reds

SEOUL (AP) — The biggest guns in the U. N.'s Korean arsenal hammered Red positions on the Central Front today and jubilant artillerymen claimed they were winning the bloody battle of the hills.

Allied officers said about half of the 200 Chinese field pieces around Triangle Hill and Sniper Ridge have been destroyed or damaged.

The Kumhwa valley shuddered under the impact of the all-out Allied barrage.

Irony Twist May Doom Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A big question mark hung over the future of the Senate's internal security sub-committee today in an ironic twist to the Republican election victory.

In the last two years, under the chairmanship of Democratic Sen. Pat McCarran of Nevada, the sub-committee has supplanted the House Un-American Activities Committee as the chief congressional group probing for Communist influences in and out of government.

A unit of the Senate Judiciary Committee, of which McCarran is also chairman, the sub-committee has a number of investigations under way now. One of these is a hunt for any American Communists working for the United Nations.

Republican control of the Senate will knock McCarran out of his Judiciary Committee chairmanship, and the outlook is that his successor will be Sen. William Langer (R-ND).

U.S. Mum On First H-Bomb

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States may have exploded the world's first full-scale hydrogen bomb—and is keeping it secret.

This year's nuclear weapons tests at Eniwetok, announced for the "autumn months," are either completed or nearing an end. They generally were expected to include a use of a standard atomic bomb to touch off enough hydrogen to produce a super-sized blast.

The Atomic Energy Commission has made no announcements of results such as followed the previous mid-Pacific experiments beginning in 1948.

All of these have been closed to the press and public, but restrictions were unusually tight this year. The AEC said they were to be "conducted under full security provisions" of the Atomic Energy Act. One source said there was no certainty there would be any announcement this year.

Ammunition Dump Explosion Kills One

McALESTER, Okla. (AP) — One man was killed today in an explosion at the U. S. Naval Ammunition Depot eight miles south of here.

He was identified as L. J. Yancy, Red Oak, Okla. Yancy was loading a five-inch projectile when the explosion occurred. There is no indication of what caused the accident.

Thirty-seven other persons were working in the building but escaped with no worse injuries than cuts from flying glass.

All windows were blown out of the building and the roof was damaged. A small fire was extinguished quickly with little damage.

It was the second fatal accident at the depot since it was established in 1943. The other was Dec. 5, 1944, when 11 persons were killed in an explosion.

The depot, which covers the southwest quarter of Pittsburgh County in the hill country of Southeast Oklahoma, is the second largest in the U. S.

It employs about 3,500 civilians. The explosion occurred as many of the workers were reporting for duty.

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (AP) — A 21-year-old girl sat in a police cell today accused of striking her father four hammer blows on the head because "he's ugly looking and he made me that way."

The girl is Mary C. Burns of Daytona Beach, Fla., who police say is not unattractive. She is charged with assault with intent to murder.

The father, Ralph Burns, 52, of Lakewood, R. I., is in poor condition in a hospital, suffering from a depressed fracture of the head.

Mrs. Mary Burns, the girl's mother, said in Daytona Beach that her husband is not unattractive either. "There is nothing wrong with his looks," she told a reporter.

His Appies For Parole From Jail

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department says Alger Hiss has formally applied for parole from the Lewisburg, Pa., Federal Penitentiary.

Hiss, a former State Department employe, was convicted of perjury in 1950 in denying he gave secret documents to a Communist courier and began serving a five-year term in March, 1951. He becomes eligible for parole Nov. 21, when he will have completed one-third of his time in prison.

Kills Self In Lovers' Spat

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — A refugee student from Austria, upset after a lovers' quarrel with his young American fiancee, committed suicide late yesterday by eating poisoned cookies, a city detective says.

The student, 27-year-old Heinz Berger, killed himself in a University of Texas science laboratory.

His body was found slumped in a chair by his fiancee, Miss Elizabeth Tracht, 22.

Berger and the Ft. Worth coed were to have been married next week.

After they quarreled yesterday afternoon in Berger's laboratory, Miss Tracht went to another lab to continue her own experiments. She returned an hour later with another coed to see her fiance again. His door was locked and the building superintendent was called.

Detective Merle Wells said Berger, described by professors as "very brilliant," had smeared cyanide on cookies and ate them.

He was working for a doctor's degree in bacteriology.

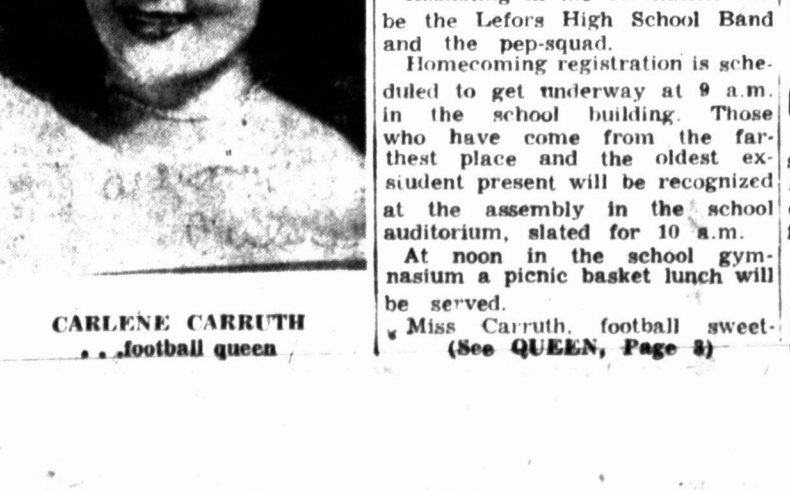
Members of the meeting learned that the club had lost \$1600 from selling 40 head of cattle for about half of what they had cost. Cause was attributed to the depressed cattle market.

Liquor Probe Won't Be New To Lubbock's Waggoner Carr

EDITOR'S Note: This is the last of a series of stories giving background on events leading up to the state House Crime Investigating Committee's decision to hold public hearings Nov. 6-7 on charges a wide-spread bootleg ring exists in Texas.

AMARILLO (AP) — When the state House Crime Investigating Committee opens its public hearing on Texas liquor traffic, it won't be a new investigation to Rep. Waggoner Carr, Lubbock.

The West Texas area member of the Crime Committee is well acquainted with the bootleg problem. He vigorously prosecuted liquor violators during a term as Lubbock County attorney and became well acquainted with other phases of the problem as an assistant district attorney.

Other members of the committee, which is to hold its public hearings in Amarillo Nov. 6-7, include Reps. Fred Meredith, Terrell, chairman; Charles Murphy, Houston; Horace Houston, Dallas; and Bill Wood, Tyler.

Carr acting head of the committee for the Amarillo hearings on appointment of Meredith, who said the young Lubbock attorney understands the problem better than other members.

It was Carr who recommended

that the public hearing be held at Lubbock. Carr also recommended grand juries from both Potter and Lubbock counties asked for the session and after the committee heard some testimony in a closed-door meeting in Austin.

Carr told newsmen "he would never be satisfied with anything less than a public hearing" and members of the committee backed his recommendation by slating Carr as one of at least 30 witnesses. Among those summoned are a number of bootleggers, liquor dealers and past and present employees of the state Liquor Control Board.

The Lubbock representative has been one of the key interrogators in all of the committee's former hearings. The committee thus far has held meetings to consider bootlegging and other organized crime in most of the major cities in Texas.

The committee was appointed March 8, 1951, and held its opening policy making session only two weeks later.

The committee, according to Meredith, was appointed for two purposes: "First, to conduct an investigation into reports of organized criminal activities in Texas, and second, to conduct an investigation of the enforcement of the criminal laws of the state by local officials."

Meredith pointed out that the directive of the resolution creating the committee is that all of the "investigations shall be" reported to the House of the Representatives of the state Legislature, setting forth our findings together with recommendations for legislation.

The committee, in its search for truth, has the power to punish witnesses by contempt or criminal action if a person refuses to testify. Penalties for refusal to answer questions of the committee may range from fines of \$100 to \$1,000 and 30 days to a year in jail.

Carr, in announcing the public hearing in Amarillo, said he felt the people of Texas had a right to know more about Texas' bootlegging. He said guilty persons should be held up for public examination and those not guilty of complicity in bootlegging should be given the chance to clear themselves publicly.

At the same time, Carr indicated it is probable indictments will result from the public hearings in Amarillo.

Germans Planning A Mountain Climb

MUNICH, Germany (AP) — A German Himalayan expedition is quickly preparing here to scale the great Nanga Parbat peak as Germany again takes up the threads of its war-disrupted ventures into scientific achievement.

Dr. Karl von Krauss, chairman of the society which plans to launch its first expedition in one aimed at science only, is choosing the 26,653-foot-high Nanga Parbat, the Germans have picked a mountain which already has turned back the best of German Alpinists. Thus far the expedition includes nine climbers.

Four previous German attempts failed to scale the peak, located where the borders of Russia, China and India meet. Last to find defeat at the hands of the towering Himalayan mountain was a party which attempted it

Taft Sees Southern Split As Permanent

CINCINNATI (AP) — Sen Robert A. Taft believes the split in the once-solid South is a "real one," but he doesn't foresee any Southern Democratic leaders moving into the Republican party right away.

The Ohio Republican, commenting on Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's victory for the presidency, said he did not look for immediate assistance for Republicans in Congress from persons like Price Daniel, the senator-elect from Texas who supported Eisenhower.

Taft said: "I believe that this break in the ranks in the South is a real one. It is my opinion that they supported Eisenhower because he is a conservative. I don't want to take over their schools, tidelands and that sort of thing — but I do not expect any immediate move into our party by Southern leaders."

Speaker Says United Nations Path To Peace

Mrs. Ruth Rhode, alternate United States delegate to the United Nations, pictured the UN as the "path to peace" in an address to members of the Knife and Fork Club Thursday night in the high school auditorium.

"We can only make it an instrument of peace, however, by realizing the alternatives," she told an audience of more than 300.

One of the alternatives listed was the possible destructive use of the new forces of nuclear fission which, she said, scientists fear may destroy civilization as it is known today. But, she added, the UN can become the control.

Member Of Posse

Comparing the UN to the first organized law enforcement in early frontier towns, Mrs. Rhode continued, "Prior to organized law, posses were formed to hunt down the bandits who 'shot up the towns.' The United States has twice in the last half century been a member of a world posse."

"The primary difference," she added, "is that pioneer citizens vested law enforcers with the power to act while in drawing up the UN in San Francisco seven years ago, there was not enough common confidence to give the group power to act. They can only recommend."

On the subject of publicizing the organization, the speaker commented she was "sorry the public knows so much about what is wrong and so little about what is right with the UN."

She quoted Trygve Lie, UN secretary general, as saying, "I regret that the UN has not yet captured the imagination of the world."

Plan Publicity

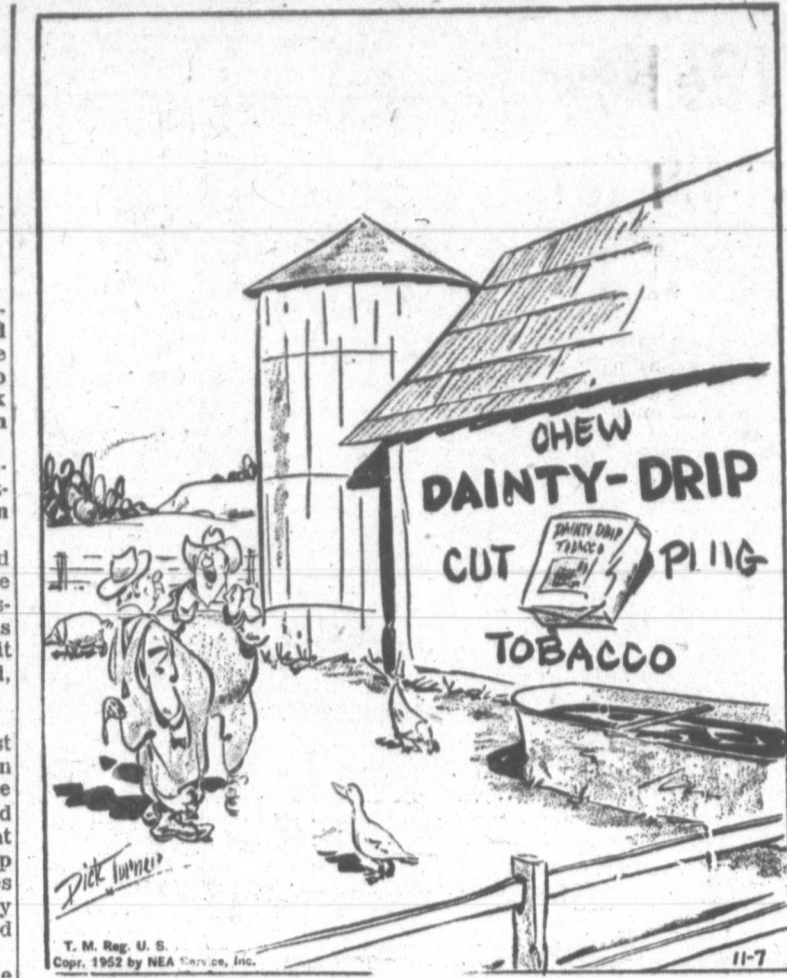

Small College Passing Mark In Danger

NEW YORK (AP) — A trio of small college forward-passing marksmen, aiming for a new completion record, have their goal in sight.

Sophomore Wes Bair of Illinois State Normal is the forward passing leader among small-college performers with 105 completions.

Don Gottlob of Sam Houston State, who had set the bare all season is second with 103, and Noel Rebenacker of Massachusetts ranks third with 100 completions.

Each tosser has two games remaining in which to surpass the record of 114 completions, set last season by Andy MacDonald of Central Michigan, figures released today by the NCAA disclosed.

Gottlob, who tops the aerial artists in attempts 201, yards gained 1,804 and touchdown passes 15, also heads the list in total offense with 1,863 yards gained rushing and passing. Rebenacker is runnerup in this department with 1,627 yards.

Both Gottlob and Rebenacker have a chance at eclipsing the total offense record of 2,008 yards, which was set in 1949 by Connie Callahan of Morningside. Gottlob needs only 144 yards to surpass the standard.

Ad Rutschman has gained the most yardage rushing — 1,076 yards in eight games, followed by Leo Lewis of Lincoln U. Mo., with 1,036 yards in seven contests.

Halfback Mac Moore of Sam Houston State and End Jim Iadil of Bowling Green share pass-catching laurels with 33 receptions apiece. Lead, the nation's top-scoring pass receiver, with 10 touchdowns, needs one more TD via the air lanes to tie the all-time small-college record of 11.

Colorado Western State's Virgil Stan is the most effective punter with a 44.2 yard average. Al Conway of William Jewell ranks as the No. 1 scorer in the nation with 95 points on 16 touchdowns.

Undeclared West Chester (Pa.) boasts the best defensive club in small college circles, allowing their opponents an average of 124.8 yards per game for five games, has unleashed the most potent total offensive in racking up yardage at the rate of 461.7 yards per contest.

In Class A Honey Grove kicked the century mark in scoring, as they defeated the Fort Worth district 13, La Feria downed Lufkin, 20 - 12, in District 32. (Read The News Classified Ads)

UT, Rice, A&M Picked To Win

The Southwest Conference football race, hewing to form better than any immediate predecessor, rumbles past the half-way mark Saturday with nothing final to be decided except that another team will take the last leap.

There is no way to forestall next week's climatic Texas-Texas Christian struggle. It could be less crucial, however, should Baylor's battling Bears do the unexpected—beat Texas tomorrow at Waco.

That is the big game of the week. It matches the game that wasn't supposed to do more than fight to keep out of the cellar against the team that has favored the neck as to bog down in its own worries.

Texas Is Favorite
Texas should be furrowed with worry—it's a 1-2 point favorite over a Baylor outfit that can leave you with every weapon in the book just when you have the Golden Bear hibernated.

Should Texas win, however, it can face Texas Christian next week knowing that a victory will put it in the Cotton Bowl. TCU's status can't change. The Horned Frogs play Wake Forest at

Fort Worth in the next to last inter-sectional game on the conference schedule. TCU is supposed to win this one—by at least seven points—if it's playing Wake Forest and not Texas. The Frogs are likely to be looking ahead and that's quite a handicap.

A loss by Baylor will knock it out of the championship race since it already has one defeat and one tie.

Watch The Aggies!
Southern Methodist and Texas A&M clash at Dallas in a survival-of-the-fittest game. Neither has a chance left at the title but whatever it is will be eliminated in his game. That is, for the loser.

Up in the Ozarks Rice will be trying to stop its worst losing streak in years. Five straight times have the Owls taken it on the chin. Their opponents, the Arkansas Razorbacks, have lost three straight. The meeting of these two teams won't mean much except maybe decide the cellar dweller, a playing much better held by Rice.

Texas lost to Baylor last year for the first time in 12 seasons but the last time a Longhorn team was beaten in Waco was 1939. A crowd of 33,000 will be there to see the hard-riding Longhorns, boasting the conference's best offense and defense, seek to add another win to their armor of invincibility so far as title play goes.

Dallas Gets Crowd
The biggest crowd will be at Dallas where the Aggies aim all guns at faltering Southern Methodist, a team able to win only two games out of six. The Methodists are 6-1-2 point favorites but the reason is obscure. The Aggies have been playing much better football. Anyway, 40,000 were due to be in the Cotton Bowl for air always colorful game.

Arkansas is playing Rice on Dad's Day at Fayetteville. That's when the fathers of the football players sit on the bench and urge their sons to greater things. Although Lew Carpenter, the fine Arkansas fullback, will be on the bench with his father because of an injury, the Razorbacks will be tough customers for the frantic Owls.

Texas Christian isn't giving much indication of taking the Wake Forest game seriously. The Frogs better Wake Forest gave Baylor a rugged afternoon before losing, 17-14 in the last 14 seconds. Baylor played TCU to a 20-20 tie.

Those Picks Again!
Hitting three out of four last week, with a tie in the other one, we see them like this Saturday: Baylor-Texas—A Bear can't handle a Longhorn if he can't catch him; Texas by two touchdowns—Texas A&M—Southern Methodist—The Aggies are just tough enough to saddle-break a Mustang in 60 minutes; Texas A&M by a whisker.

Rice-Arkansas—You can run into a lot of trouble in the Ozarks but the Razorbacks have had their tusks removed; Rice by a touchdown.

Texas Christian—Wake Forest—This isn't Texas you're playing. Frogs: Try real hard and you'll win by about 20 to 7.

Why Are Prisoners Rioting? Welfare Expert Blames Public

NEW YORK (NEA)— Ask Robert S. Hannum who's to blame for the recent wave of prison riots and you get an angry answer.

"The public's to blame, that's who," he says. "Most people think that the best way to deal with prisoners is to belt them with a good thick club. And as long as they feel that way, you're going to keep on having trouble."

Hannum's opinion means something because he's had plenty of experience with convicts. As an official of the Osborne Association, famed prison welfare society, he's helped hundreds of ex-cons back on the path that leads to "straight." And as a leading authority on prison conditions, he was called in to help settle the recent series of riots in New Jersey.

Prison revolts never have just one cause, he says, they have many. Things like bad food and brutality always contribute. But the basic reason, he insists, is the "punish em" attitude of the public that allows mistreatment to continue.

"Our main idea," he says, "seems to be to throw a criminal into a dungeon and then forget about him with ut trying to correct him. If we're going to do this, why send the man to prison at all?" Why not just shoot him and get it over with?"

Hannum feels that a prisoner can gain much from prison experience if the prison does even a little to help him. But aside from a few of the federal institutions, he says that the prisons are falling down on the job miserably.

He describes a typical case of "rehabilitation." "Look at the man in prison for a long term. He sits around for months in idleness. He spends 24 hours a day in his cell, his only time of a bird or tree being through a slit or a triple set of bars. When he is given work to do, it normally has little value for him."

"When we discharge this man, we give him a \$15 state-made suit, \$10 spending money and tell him to go get a job. But it's not that easy."

"If he makes a clean breast of his record as he's been taught, he cares the outside world half to death, and doesn't get a job. If he doesn't tell, he takes the chance of being found out later. And mal should be segregated. Mixing

first-offenders with old-timers is never advisable, but is being done all over the nation.

7. Prisons should be modernized. Many are more than 100 years old, are nothing but vermin-infested slave quarters.

8. It should be made easier for a man to get a parole hearing. Some men wait years for hearings (which usually average two minutes), then are turned down without being told when to expect another. On the other hand, those with "connections" get special breaks.

"Perhaps the public will one day realize," says Hannum, "that crime is costing them more than \$40,000,000 every day of their lives. Is there a taxpayer who thinks that's good business?"

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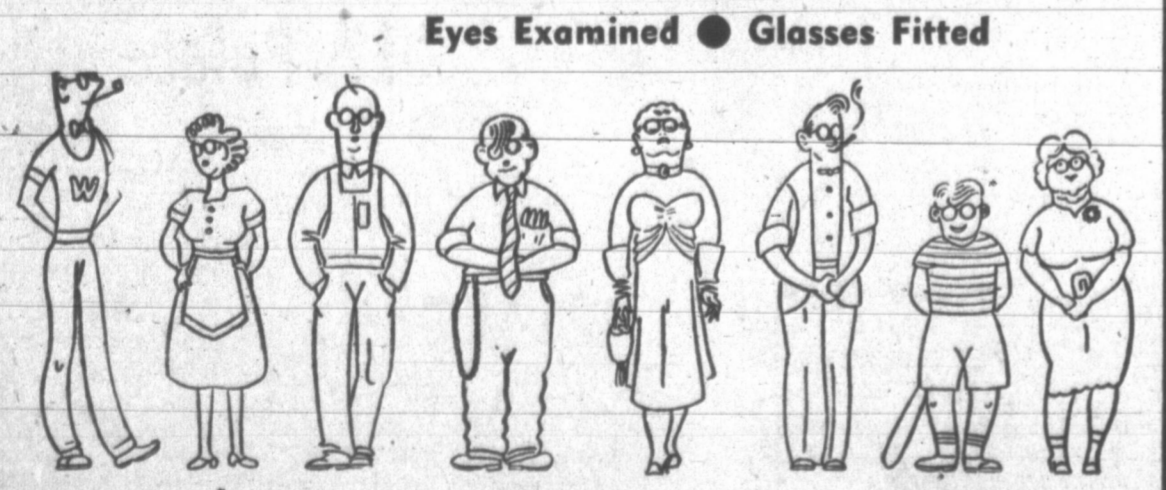

JACOBY ON BRIDGE This Bid Justified By Careful Playing

Perhaps the slam contract in today's hand was too ambitious. Nevertheless, it is difficult to find fault with South's jump to six hearts. North would not go to five clubs without some strength, and there would be a play for a slam if North had as little as both black kings.
South justified his ambitious bidding by careful play. After winning the first trick with the ace of diamonds, South thought deeply about the best way to bring in twelve tricks.
An optimist might draw trumps and try to cash the entire spade suit. With the spades breaking badly, however, South would have to fall back on a single club finesse, and he would wind up losing two club tricks.
The actual declarer drew three rounds of trumps, discarding a diamond from dummy. East likewise discarded a diamond.
South now led the nine of spades from his hand and overtook with dummy's ten of spades! This play gave East a problem immediately. He finally judged the situation correctly and decided that South would have twelve ice-cold tricks if he (East) won this trick with the jack of spades.
This was quite accurate. South would win any return and overtake the queen of spades in dummy to discard three clubs on dummy's remaining spades.

More Tires To Be Sold Next Year

NEW YORK (AP) — The rubber industry expects to sell more tires next year—whether times are good or bad, and no matter what the new president and Congress do.
Industry leaders base this prediction on the fact that in 1950 and 1951 the auto industry sold a record number of new cars. And just about next year you'll have to start replacing the original tires on them.
Times ought to be good through next year anyway, with nothing but minor setbacks to be expected, according to James J. Newman, vice president of J. F. Goodrich Co.
"Even during slumps, the tire replacement volume holds pretty steady," says E. J. Thomas, president of Goodyear. "People do without other things before they stop driving their cars. So tire replacements depend largely upon the number of cars built in previous years."
People bought up a lot of tires they didn't need in 1950 when the Korean War scared them, so replacements fell to 34 million in 1951, Thomas says. This year the replacement total should be 45 million. And next year 49 million tires will be replaced, an increase of 8.8 per cent, Thomas believes.
Both natural and synthetic rubber should be in ample supply.

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Election attempt: Fifteenth Street officially became Truman Road, Jan. 29, 1949, the day President Truman was inaugurated.

IT'S YOUR DEAL Try To Spice Up Poker Game

"Would you please settle a poker argument for me?" writes a New Jersey correspondent.
"The following hand of seven-card stud produced several arguments."
"The first two cards were dealt down, and the third up as usual. After the first round of betting, one of the players turned up one of his down cards, which was a deuce, and asked for his next card to be dealt down, instead of face up."
"As this was a friendly game among neighbors, no objections were raised at the time. The dealer, though, turned his fourth card up, which made his cards high on the board with a pair of tens. He now had three face cards to the other players' two and one down card to two for the rest of the players."
"The fifth card was also turned face up for him as for the others, giving him three tens showing, keeping his hand high on the board. The sixth card was finally dealt down for him and the hand was completed."
"The following questions arose during and after the deal:
"1. We realize that there are hundreds of variations used by different groups of players. In this game, no rule was made at the start, allowing a player to expose a deuce in order to get a better card to replace it. Is there such a rule in official poker, allowing a player to do this?"
"2. Having the high hand on the board with one more faced up card than the other players, is he entitled to open the betting, or must he pass to the man on his left?"
"3. The betting was five chips and ten chips. If he is allowed to open the betting, can he bet

the ten chips if there are no other open pairs?
"4. If he is compelled to pass, can he raise on his turn to bet, or must he just call, if some other player opens the betting?"
In ordinary seven-card stud a player is not permitted to turn up a hole card in order to get a different hole card. There are, however, some variations of poker in which a player is allowed to do this.
Since nobody objected at the time, the only fair course was to proceed as though you were playing one of the variations in which a player is permitted to turn up a hole card and get a different down card.
It was very careless of the dealer to turn up the fifth card and the sixth card instead of giving the player a down card at the first possible opportunity. The dealer cannot be severely criticized, however, since it is evident that he was not used to the idea of dealing one card down and all the other cards up.
The player who had the extra card face up was entitled to all of the advantages and the disadvantages resulting from the cards that were exposed. Since his hand was actually high, he had an open pair, he was entitled to bet ten chips.
Incidentally, we recommend this type of game to those poker players who are looking for a variation to spice up the game. After each round of betting any player may expose a hole card and request that the next card be dealt down instead of up. Some very interesting betting and psychological situations develop when this is permitted.

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
