

Schools Pass 70-71 Peak 1,713 Students In Colorado City Schools



Tour Highlights

Enrollment for Colorado Independent School District already has surpassed last school year's high mark.

A total of 1,713 students were enrolled in all grades and classes Tuesday.

That's 114 more students than were counted in pre-class enrollment at the end of last week.

The 1,713 figure also is 21 more than the 1,692 counted in Colorado City schools last January when the peak enrollment was reached for the 1970-71 school year.

When school started last fall,

enrollment amounted to 1,650 students. It gradually climbed upward to the 1,692 peak in January, then dropped slightly during the spring.

Supt. Lloyd McKee had predicted last week that the number of students in all 5 Colorado City schools would go above the 1,700 mark and probably reach 1,725.

Increases are evident in 9 out of 15 levels of enrollment measurement, McKee reported.

All of the first five levels have more students now than at the 1970-71 peak last January. These include bilingual

and regular kindergarten and grades 1 through 4.

Also with higher enrollment are sixth, eighth, tenth and twelfth grades.

Slightly below last January's peak are fifth, seventh, ninth, eleventh grades and the special education class.

One major reason for the increase in the current enrollment is the fact that St. Ann's Catholic School closed its doors at the end of its regular school term last spring. Naturally, these students continuing to live within the Colorado district, helped the enrollment of the elementary grades here.

However, even without that influx, enrollment in the first four grades was considered strong in comparison with scholastic trends across the country.

Higher first grade and kindergarten enrollment definitely reflected growth trends for the community's factors in -volving overall population and younger-age families.

Here is a grade-by-grade comparison of the district's enrollment Tuesday compared with the start of school last September:

Bi-lingual kindergarten -- 41 now, 29 last year.

Kindergarten -- 48 now, 32 last year.

First grade - 142 now, 130 last year.

Second grade -- 131 now, 127 last year.

Third grade - 132 now, 131 last year.

Fourth grade -- 137 now, 132 last year.

Fifth grade -- 135 now, 146 last year.

Sixth grade -- 153 now, 114 last year.

Seventh grade -- 137 now, 141 last year.

Eighth grade -- 134 now, 140 last year.

Ninth grade -- 139 now, 143 last year.

Tenth grade -- 132 now, 121 last year.

Eleventh grade -- 114 now, 143 last year.

Twelfth grade -- 131 now, 110 last year.

Special education -- 7 now, 11 last year.

Farm Tour Shapes Up As Busiest

Mitchell County's annual farm tour Sept. 9 will spotlight a score of different agricultural techniques and experiments.

It will be one of the busiest tours in recent years, too, with about 15 points of interest on the morning route.

A barbecue, costing \$1.50 per persons, will conclude the event which is sponsored each year by Chamber of Commerce, federal and state agencies including Texas A&M Extension Service, Agricultural Stabilization & Conservation Service, Soil Conservation Service and Farmers Home Administration.

Persons on the tour will observe experimental top soil herbicide treatment for cotton, variety demonstration plots for dry land and irrigated cotton, narrow row cotton, parallel terracing, alfalfa and small grain for cattle, coastal Bermuda replacing cotton on high sodium land, seeded native grass on former cropland, waterway shaping and usage, wheel-moving irrigation system.

Another feature will be limousin crossbred calf born in Mitchell County.

County Agent Bobby Lemons said Wednesday that the tour route was almost complete.

"We believe it will be of prime interest to both business men and to farmers and ranchers," he said. "The tour has variety, but it also has key practices that are of special concern now to our agricultural industry."

Tickets for the tour's barbecue lunch are available at offices of county agent, FHA, SCS, ASCS and Chamber of Commerce.

Departure time for the tour--which will be by school buses--is set for 9 a.m. Sept. 9 at Lone Wolf Electric Cooperative's Co-opatorium. The buses will return to the co-opatorium where the barbecue will be served.

Interest points along the tour will include:

James Cox home farm, Long-fellow community--for experimental herbicide to be incorporated into the ground, also 5 cotton varieties planted June 5 by Cox on Mrs. Ned Smith's farm south of Buford.

James Watlington's narrow row cotton planted June 24 adjacent to Buford Gin plus narrow row cotton planted June 9 on Cliff Etheridge's black-land soil across Loraine-Hermleigh highway.

Parallel terracing for cotton on Warren Anderson place north of Buford with blanks planted to sorghum in August for erosion control and Murrell Blasingame's fenced alfalfa and sudan for cattle, east of Buford.

Henry Hoyle's Crop Land Adjustment program north of Loraine which seeded native grass instead of sorghum on land previously used for row crops.

Six varieties of irrigated cotton on Kenneth Merket's farm as well as demonstration of 9 varieties of sudan varieties also on Merket's farm.

Waterway seeded to coastal Bermuda will be observed at Charles Finley's Loraine farm and irrigated cotton will be viewed at Billy Cornutt's place.

The county's first limousin crossbred will be at Kenneth Merket's. It was born last week -- a cross between the exotic cattle from France and a short-horn cow.

Schedules for both programs will be set after the registration is completed.

Big 'If' For Cotton

Cotton Has Race With Frost

County Agent Bobby Lemons is placing a big "if" on Mitchell County's cotton crop.

Rains have sent estimates for the 1971 harvest moving upward from a perilous drought condition.

But Lemons has applied the "if" almost between disaster and prosperity.

The crop does make the best of August rains and recover for a fine harvest, the county agent says that:

1. Frost date must come late--later than the Nov. 9 average date for this county.
2. Hot weather must prevail and nights remain relatively warm up into fall.
3. Blight and boll weevils must not cause excessive damage.

Estimates have climbed as high as 25,000 bales and more since the heavy moisture received in August.

The county agent indicates the crop could amount to that figure or drop to slightly more than 10,000 bales, depending upon conditions between now and harvest.

Cool wet weather has definitely improved yield prospects in grain sorghum.

Cotton production, despite the tremendous moisture benefit, has been slowed "considerably," according to Lemons, with reduced fruiting and a stimulation in vegetable growth.

"They still pay off at the gin on cotton," Lemons emphasized, "and not on the size of the stalk."

"Some maturity time has been lost since Aug. 1 that can never be completely recovered."

It will be worse if frost is early.

"We need a later frost than the usual Nov. 9 date," explained.

"A boll set from a white bloom in late August will require 60 to 70 days to open depending upon temperature.

"Bolls being set now will not reach maturity before Nov. 1. Lower than normal temperatures would lengthen the boll period and bolls set after this date would be more subject to severe damage by first freeze."

The agent pointed out that fi-

ber development stops when night temperatures drops below 60 degrees.

"If we get normal or higher temperature and a normal freeze date," Lemons said, "much of our cotton has an opportunity to make good yields and quality fiber."

There are more problems, including blight and weevils which are expected to hurt the crop.

The agent is hopeful there will be no problem from worms.

"But we are now getting the fourth generation of weevils. And, it is this fourth generation is when we get our build up."

One producer already has re-

ported to the agent that his cotton has more weevils now than in previous years.

Weevils become a problem first on irrigated crops and move off those crops to dry land cotton irrigation cotton is stripped.

Vegetative or top growth has come impressively with the rains. This takes away from the fruit development.

Thick canopy of leaves will prevent sun light reaching lower parts of the plants and may cause young bolls to shed and slow down development of cotton in the lower portion of plants.

Lemons said the prolonged cloudy period may also result in excessive shedding of squares and young bolls.

"Shedding of small bolls usually occurs 3 to 10 days after white bloom," according to Lemons, "but completion of the shedding process is slowed by low temperature and may not be too evident until the temperature rises again."

"Bolls that are 10 days or older will seldom shed. Rapid vegetative growth usually follows excessive fruit shed."

Lemons said producers can also expect an increase in wilt diseases because weather conditions the last few weeks have been ideal for infection to develop. These symptoms will become evident as warmer weather returns.

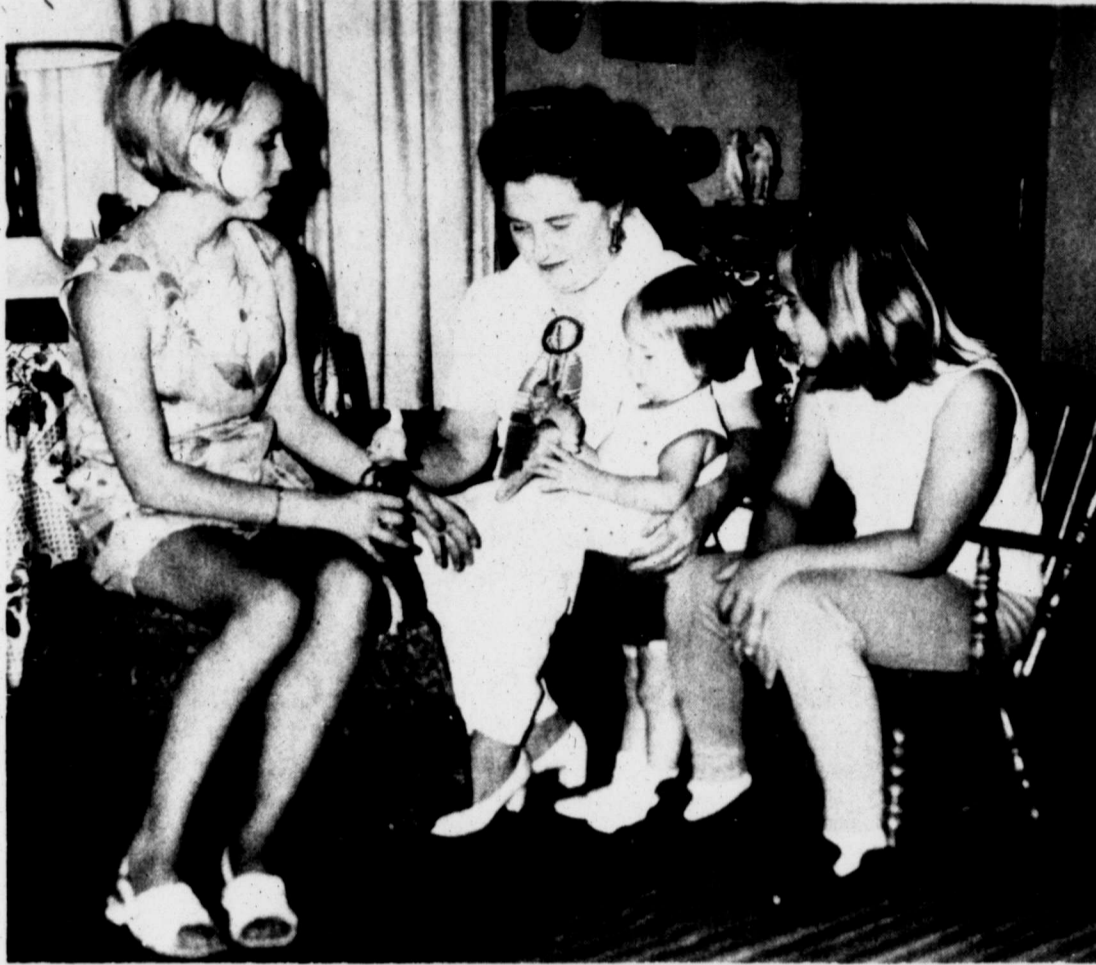

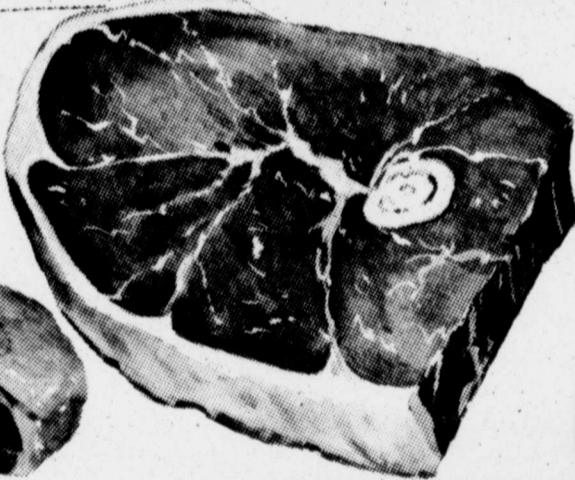

Sliding glass doors open from the fireplace wall onto a covered patio in the fence back yard.

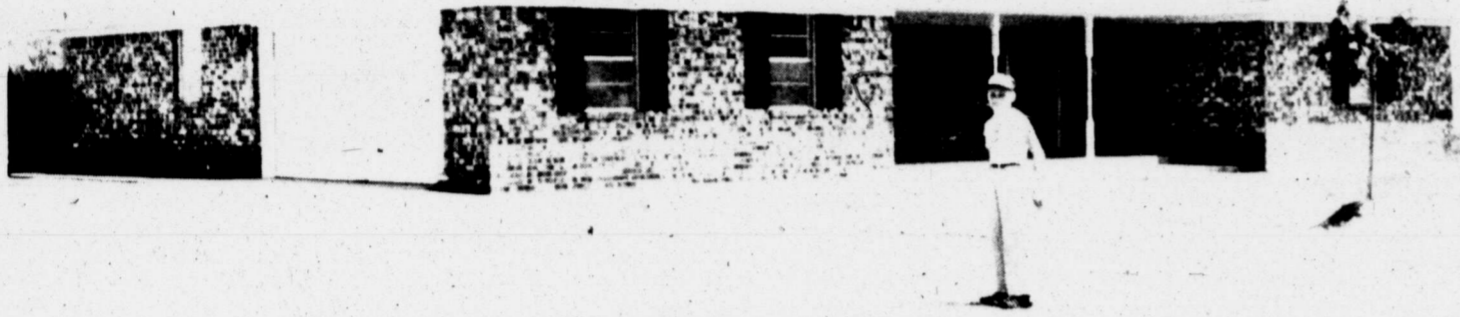
Pebblestone inlaid tile covers kitchen, den and breakfast room floors.

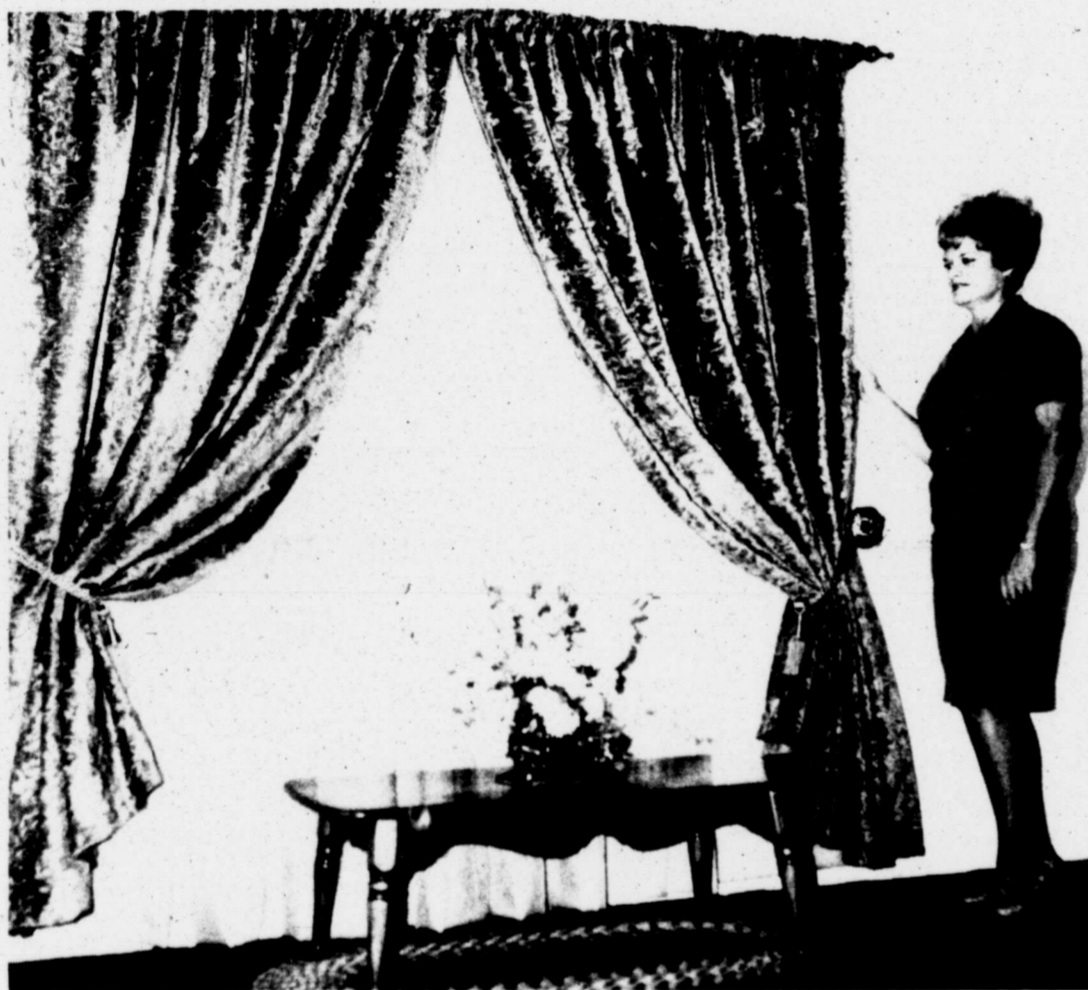
Mike Bodine Gets Degree At Tech

What is the excise tax?

The excise tax on cars is a 7% Federal tax imposed on the wholesale price of the car and is included in the manufacturer's suggested retail price as shown on the price label on the car.

Who will receive the refund if the excise tax is repealed?

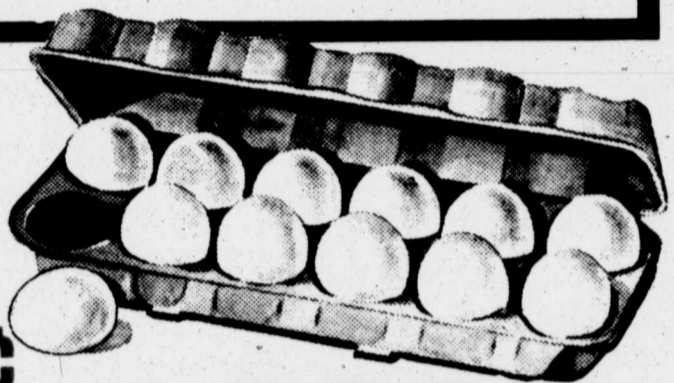
