LORLAINE COMMUNITY FAIR IS COUNTY WIDE THIS YEAR

The Loraine Community Fair this year will be open for entries in the parade and all exhibits to anyone in Mitchell County who desires to participate. This action was taken because Colorado City will not have a fair this year, and some persons in that area had made inquiries about it.

As usual, cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be given for first, second and third places for floats entered in the parade. No cash prizes will be given this year for entries in exhibits in the fair. The point system will be used again, however, to determine the best exhibitor in each division and the best overall exhibitor of the fair. Rosettes will be given in lieu of cash.

Efforts are being made to provide three sessions of varied entertainment during the fair. If possible, the form of entertainment will be announced later.

General rules for the fair are to be published in The Mitchell County News next week. Be watching for them and use them as a guide in preparing your exhibits.

COLORADO CITY CHURCH TO RECEIVE HISTORICAL MARKER

The official Texas Historical Marker of First Presbyterian Church in Colorado City, will be erected October 11, announced Mrs. A. L. Geer, Mitchell County Historical Survey Committee Chairman.

The marker will be placed at the site, Chestnut and Fifth, in Colorado City. Dedication plans will be announced by Mrs. Geer.

The cast aluminum marker, with Swedish steel effect, measures 27x42 inches and is sponsored by the Mitchell Co. Historical Survey Committee. This is the 23rd Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Mitchell County.

The inscription on the marker reads:

THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

"On the second Sunday of January, 1881, the Rev. O. F. Rogers, a Presbyterian minister and school teacher from Mississippi, preached the first sermon ever heard in Colorado (City). The congregation met in a saloon, only large place in the tent town. The bar was covered with wagon sheets, and after the sermon, a collection was taken for the minister.

"A dug-out, floored with corn stacks and equipped with boxes for seats, housed the first formal church, organized in May with 11 charter members. W. J. Miller was installed as elder and the church was placed under control of the Texas Central

Presbytery. In a few weeks, a tent was erected to accommodate church services, Sunday School and public school. P. C. Coleman, prominent doctor and educator, and J. E. Riordan, banker, were then named elders. Later church members worshipped in the newly built school house.

"The first permanent church building, located at Locust and Second Streets, was dedicated May 3, 1891. The first trustees were Dr. P. C. Coleman, W. J. Miller, William Kennedy, C. A. Arbuthnot and John Carlisle. The present church building was completed August 30, 1925, when the Rev. W. M. Elliott was pastor. An education unit was added in 1937, under the Rev. Earl Clary, pastor."

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is part of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee's 5-year RAMPs Program to Record, Appreciate, Mark, preserve and Survey Texas history. More than 3,300 Official Texas Historical Markers have been awarded throughout Texas since the RAMPs Programs was begun in 1964.

This marker and its location will appear in the next edition of the Guide to Official Texas Historical Markers, in tourist guides and maps to stimulate tourist interest in this area, to provide interest on historical tours, and to acquaint people of Mitchell County with their own unique historical past.

"Monganga Paul," by Lois Carlson, is the electrifying story of Christian heroism that caught the world's imagination - the story of the California surgeon who took his family into the steaming Congo, only to be gunned down by rebel Simbas, the "lion men."

The horror of Dr. Paul's death on a side street in Stanleyville, as rescuers raced toward him, evoked shocked reactions all over the world. The full impact of that event is described in this book by Lois Carlson, Dr. Paul's wife and helpmeet who shared his years of preparation and struggle, and the temptation to settle for the comforts of a wealthy suburban medical practice, but turned their backs on that life and took their young children with them into the Congo. This is a true story you will not want to miss reading.

"All Things Are Possible Through Prayer," by Charles L. Allen, asks the question "Is God really concerned about my day-to-day problem?" This book answers these questions. Why should I pray? Is physical healing possible through prayer? Does God always answer prayer?

"All Through The Night," is another novel by Grace Livingston Hill that tells of the faith of a beautiful girl, Dale Huntley, through the death of a dear-loved grandmother, is left to the mercies of a rapacious aunt and two completely unlovely cousins. Though daunted at times by her seemingly insoluble problems, Dale, through prayer and faith, remains steadfast to the teaching of her much loved relatives. This latest story from Mrs. Hill's pen moves intriguingly from incident to incident and her devoted readers will welcome reading another of her beloved books.

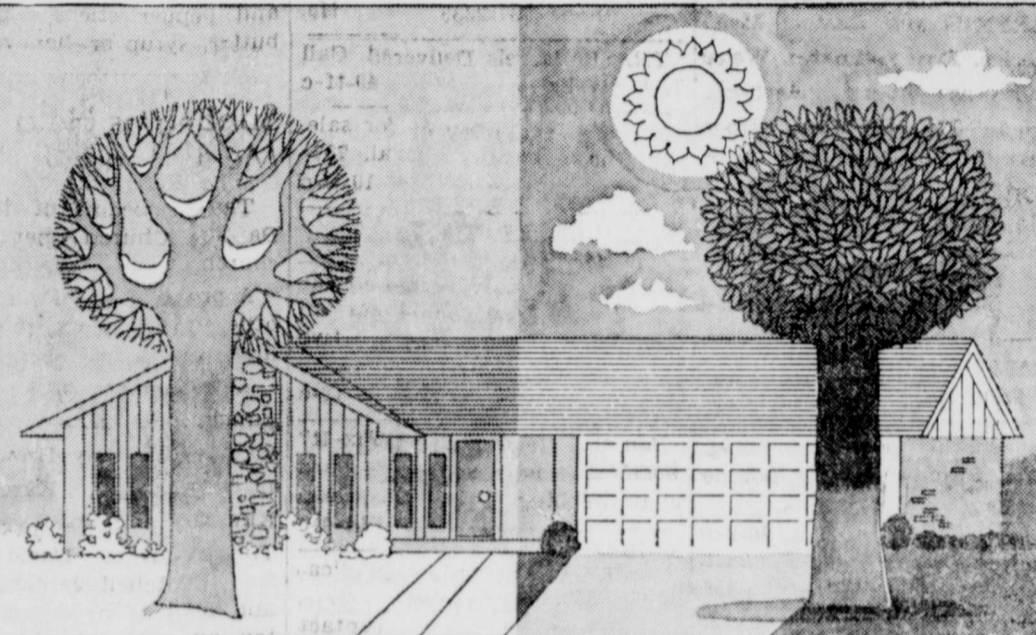

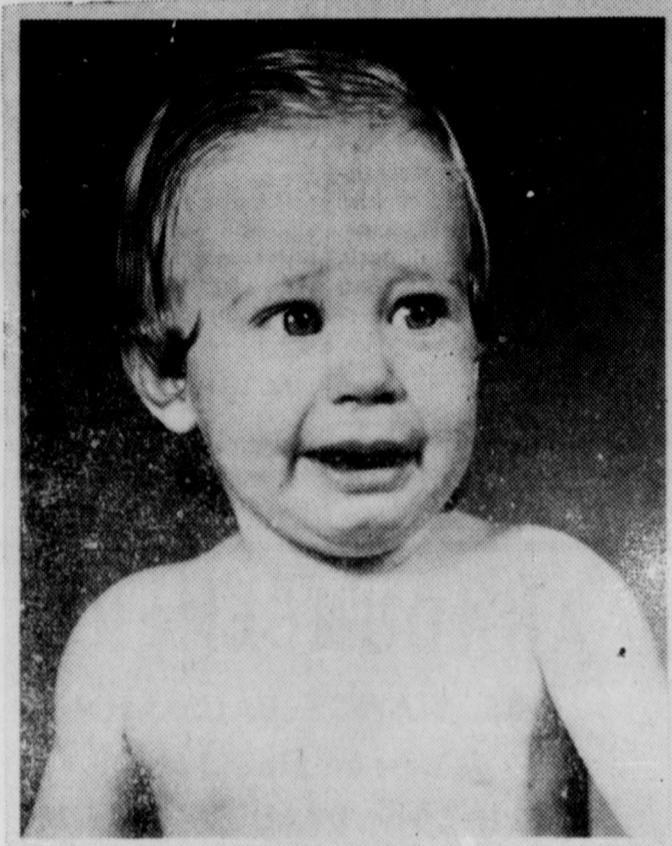

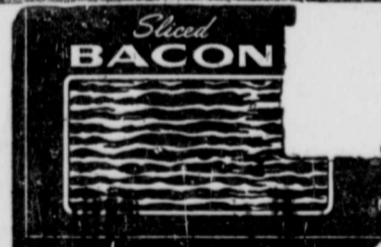
