TALCO TROJANS DEFEAT QUEEN CITY 42 TO 20 FRIDAY NIGHT

The Talco Trojans remained in contention for the crown in 17-A by downing the Bulldogs of Queen City at Queen City Friday night 42-20.

The Trojans are now tied with Jefferson for the conference lead. Both teams have two wins in two starts.

Halfback Jackie Dixon gave the Trojans a two touchdown advantage in the first quarter. The speedy Dixon, until the last two games, overshadowed by teammates Rhodney Russell and Sidney Bonds, gave the Trojans an early lead. Dixon romped 23 yards on the first Talco play from scrimmage for the first score. He then hauled in a Bulldog pass. On the next play the Trojan speedster broke free for a 25 yard touchdown gallop.

The Queen City Bulldogs finally got on the scoreboard when Dickie Campbell scored on a one yard plunge.

But Talco bounced back. Quarterback Ronnie Nelson heaved to

fullback Rhodney Russell who scampered in for a 40-yard pass and run.

Larry Clayton powered his way over from the one yard line in the second quarter.

In the fourth quarter Nelson passed to end Butch Perdue for another Trojan score. Sidney Bonds scored the PAT. Dixon then scored, with Bonds again adding the PAT.

Darrel Fincher returned a Talco kick-off 75 yards for the last Queen City score.

Talco ended the scoring spree with a 28-yard scamper by Nelson.

The Trojans meet Bogata Friday night.

Texas DPS Center Hunters May Kill Three Deer In Certain Areas

Austin.—Col. Homer Garrison Jr. announced today ground has been broken for a \$630,000 underground state emergency operating center at the Texas Department of Public Safety capable of withstanding a 20 megaton nuclear blast three to four miles distant.

The project, jointly financed by the state and the federal office of civil defense, will cover some 12,000 feet of floor space and will be capable of uninterrupted operation for approximately 30 days under "button up" conditions, the public-safety director said.

He said the new center will replace the existing state control center in the basement of the DPS headquarters where many natural disaster relief operations have been coordinated since 1954.

It is part of a long range program designed to increase the effectiveness of the civil defense effort which includes modernizing and expanding the DPS communications facilities over the state.

"Our experience in Hurricane Carla last year proved that our present facilities were inadequate to handle major disasters at peak efficiency, and pointed up the need for a much larger, more modern and better equipped center with the capability of meeting the requirements of the state government in almost any situation," Garrison said.

The center is designed to provide safe facilities for the Governor's Council of Defense and Disaster Relief which is charged with the implementation and direction of the Texas Operational Survival Plan and for such elements of federal and state governments having emergency responsibility in a local or national emergency or disaster situation.

It is designed to provide maximum safety and protection to its occupants and equipment against the effects of air blast, thermal radiation, initial and residual radiation, including fallout, and of chemical and biological agents of warfare. The necessary space equipment and supplies will be provided to maintain efficient operation and prolonged occupancy during periods of intense fallout.

The center will be manned and operated on a 24-hour schedule daily at all times, providing monitoring service on all warning channels and will be maintained on a constant ready basis for full activation when impending or threatened disaster is evident, as is done now in the present control center.

The message center facilities will be used by DPS communications personnel in maintaining and operating the department's statewide police communications network.

The new structure will be large enough to accommodate approximately 120 persons, with dormitory facilities. It will be equipped with a kitchen, dining

The fact that the new 1962-63 hunting license has three deer tags attached does not mean that you will be allowed to kill three deer this year anywhere you wish, but only under carefully regarded conditions, and in certain areas.

The third tag, or Bonus Tag, attached to the left side of the license, does not mean that you can kill a doe deer, or an antlerless deer, without the benefit of landowners permit on the prescribed form.

John M. Carlisle, Region 3 Director for the Game & Fish Commission, advises the hunter to examine the law to determine exactly what the hunter may and may not be allowed to do.

Under existing laws, the Game & Fish Commission shall issue to bona fide landowners, or their authorized agents, permits for the taking of antlerless or doe deer. These permits will be issued only in certain designated areas, and only after the landowner or agent has applied in writing for such permits. The landowner or agent shall then issue permits to individual hunters only after hunters have bagged an antlerless deer on the designated area for the individual permit.

Therefore, the hunter may, with the use of the two tags on the right side of the license, kill one buck, or if the area in which he hunts allows the taking of two bucks, he may then use both tags for his two bucks. Or, he may kill only one buck, and then secure a permit for an antlerless deer, if the taking of such deer is allowed in the area. After using his two tags on the right side of the license, if he secures another permit from the landowner, he may then kill the third, or bonus deer, in those areas where bonus deer may be killed legally.

Tags from the license must be properly filled in, and the spaces for the month and day of the kill must be punched out with knife, fingernail or other implement, then attached to the carcass before transporting. Antlerless deer are those with no hardened antlers protruding through the skin. All other deer are buck deer. In many areas a legal buck deer

The center will have its own independent water supply from a well capable of pumping 500 gallons per minute, an independent fuel supply and auxiliary power for utilities.

It also will be equipped with a decontamination area at the entrance for exposed persons or equipment entering the center, and it will have blast proof doors at the entrance and emergency exit.

\$393,000 Land Sale Completed

A land sale, involving almost 5000 acres adjoining Sulphur River in oil-rich northern Titus County, east of Talco, was completed last week with filing of a deed in the county clerk's office. Sale price was approximately \$393,000 for 4,922 acres.

Seller of the property, which involves tracts ranging from 30 to 1212.5 acres, was L. C. Traylor and Mrs. M. G. Perry of San Antonio, trustees for the John-nye Perry Lloyd Trust.

The land was purchased by Ray McGlothlin of Abilene, an oil operator and rancher.

The sale was the second large one in Titus County in recent years. On Aug. 30, the Pewitt Ranch, covering 43,000 acres, was sold to a Maryland holding company for \$3.9 million.

Contract Awarded Titus Road Work

A contract for 1.3 miles of construction on US 271 in Titus County has been awarded to a Dallas firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission. Subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads Sira & Payne submitted the low bid of \$265,450 on the project. Grading, structures, flexible base and one course surface treatment from Spur 134, 0.4 mile south of US 67 to FM 1734 is expected to take 140 working days, according to G. A. Youngs, District Highway Engineer at Atlanta. J. H. Crawford, Resident Engineer at Mt.

CONNALLY, PATMAN WIN OVER THEIR REPUBLICAN OPPONENTS

Democrat John Connally defeated Republican Jack Cox for governor. All other Democratic nominees for state offices were elected in Tuesday's general election.

Voters rejected the controversial "trial de novo" proposed constitutional amendment.

Latest incomplete returns released by Texas Election Bureau listed:

Governor: Connally 737,110, Cox 622,605, Carswell (constitution), 2,404.

Congressman Wright Patman polled 24,755 votes to the Republican nominee, James A. Timberlake's 11,992.

Titus County voters cast 2700 votes in the general election. Six of the 14 amendments also won approval in Titus County. They were Nos. 2, 4, 7, 8, 9, and 11.

For Congressman First District Wright Patman received 1810 votes to Republican James Timberlake 884. Patman polled 144 votes and Timberlake 37 in Talco. Talco voters favored Connally for governor. He received 116 votes and Cox 58. A total of 188 votes were cast. Mrs. Elton

Deer Season Open Nov. 16 In Most Local Counties

Numerous hunters will take to the woods next week seeking to kill a deer as the season opens Nov. 16.

The season in Lamar County will be from Nov. 16 to Nov. 20 inclusive. In Red River and Bowie counties the season is Nov. 16 through Nov. 30 inclusive, except at Red River Arsenal which is extended to Dec. 5. In Franklin, Delta and Hopkins counties the season is Nov. 22 to Dec. 1, both days inclusive. Out of county hunters must register with the county clerk in these counties. Limit is one buck per season.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Sale of deer hides is permitted.

The area designated for doe hunting in Red River County during the 1962 season opening Nov. 16 will be the same as last year.

The daily bag or possession limit may not include, in the alternative, more than:

- (a) 1 White-fronted goose
- (b) 1 White-fronted goose and 1 Canada goose or subspecies
- (c) 2 Canada geese or subspecies

IN THE BLACK — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reports that his department is in such good financial condition that it won't need to ask the Legislature for an appropriation for the Veterans' Land Program, out of General Revenue, for the next two bienniums.

While \$15,847,000 is due to be paid out during the next two years, for bonded indebtedness, the program has more than \$17,000,000 set aside to meet the obligations.

Sadler said that \$16,500,000 in installment payments from veteran purchasers, and \$3,000,000 in interest from federal securities, will be collected in the coming biennium.

AUTO TAX BACKED — Assessing automobiles for city and school taxes, without assessing "all other personal property on an equal and uniform basis," has been upheld by the Austin Court of Civil Appeals.

Court reversed a judgment of the Hays County District Court which had denied the City of San Marcos Independent School District judgment against F. W. Zimmerman for delinquent taxes on three motor vehicles. Suit was for back taxes for 1956 thru 1959.

Farm Facts

Scientists are evaluating bird-repellent grain sorghums. Growing from seed coverings of test varieties are sharp spines which seem to keep birds from feeding.

Agricultural Research, published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, reports some of these sorghums have been grown in south Florida and tests are being conducted at Beltsville, Md., and in Mississippi and other states.

An effort will be made to cross sweet sorghums with the grain sorghum strains to learn if widely adaptable bird-repellent sweet sorghums can be produced.

Bird feeding on sorghums is a problem in the South and Southwest.

Agronomist F. T. Boyd, in charge of the Plantation Field Laboratory of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station at Fort Lauderdale, found the bird-repellency characteristic during tests of hundreds of sorghums.

Blackbirds, rice birds, Eng-

lish sparrows, and Florida grackles left two sorghums strictly alone. By crossing these with others, some 50 strains have been developed with their own built-in bayonets.

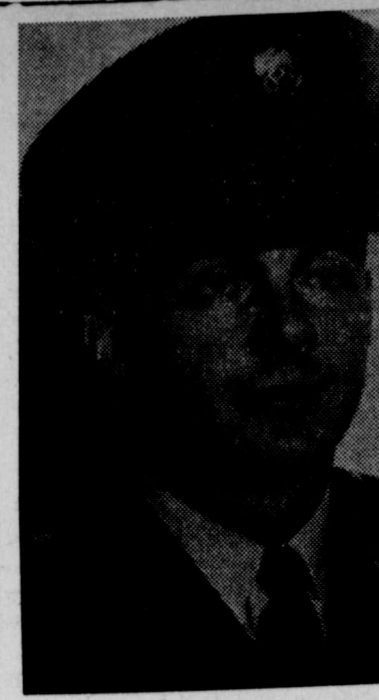
