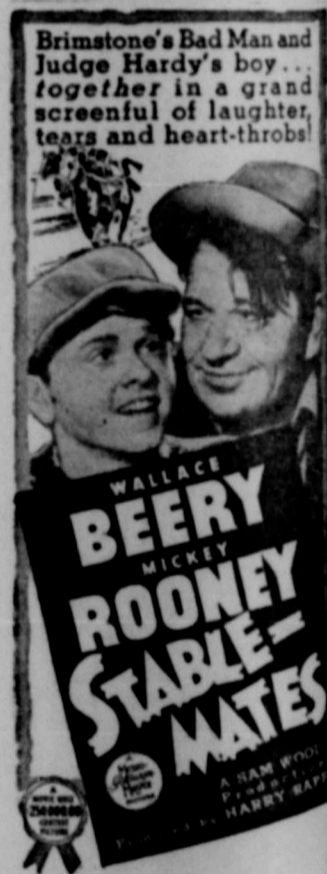

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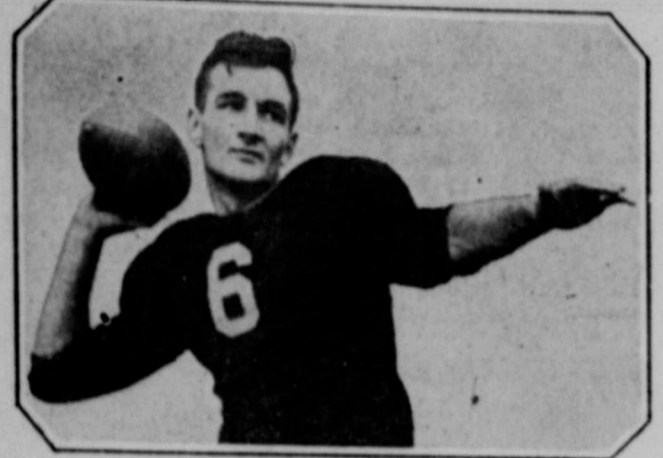
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Sophomore Stars Force Way Into Gridiron Prominence

SOPHOMORES usually aren't given a lot of consideration in top-notch collegiate football these days, but there are a couple dozen first-year men who have been so brilliant this season that they virtually have forced themselves into the spotlight.

Heading the list of promising newcomers in the east is Frank Reagan, Pennsylvania's 185-pound quarterback, who in addition to being a great runner and passer, handles the Quakers like a veteran.

John Kuzaman, Fordham's 220-pound tackle, is considered one of the best line prospects ever to play for the Rams, and Dick Banger of Syracuse is a whole of a halfback.

SOPHOMORES have been the chief cause of Michigan's return to the list of gridiron powers, and Fritz Criesler has two bang-up backs in Tom Harmon, a 190-pound, runner-passer de luxe, and Paul Kromer.

Illinois has George Rettiger, a 195-pound fullback, and Ohio State exhibits Charlie Maag, a 215-pound center.

Missouri's John Christian looks like the best thing ever to hit Columbia, and Joe Nicholson of Indiana will make the Hoosiers a team to be feared in another season.

Connie Sparks, a bruising 200-pound fullback, had to be good to crack a veteran Texas Christian lineup and Colorado thinks it might have another Thinner White in Bill Stranigan.

In Bob Pepples Southern California has a potentially great fullback, Peoples, one of the few men in the country who can heave a javelin more than 200 feet, is a powerful line smasher and a swell blocker.

In addition, the Trojans have two classy sophomore ends in Al Kreuger and John Stonebraker, the former being the lad who took the forward pass which beat Ohio State.

Georgia has a likely-looking quarterback in George Hise, and North Carolina claims it can match him in Jim Lalanne.

Those are just a few of the names who will steal the headlines for the next two years. In another season they'll be ready for the biggest test of all—the battle for All-America.

Washington Sidelights

In the current discussions of the farm bill many of the most desirable features have been overlooked. Some people have thoughtlessly urged that the measure be repealed. They overlook some very worthwhile features of the bill which I do not believe any thinking person would want repealed. Among these are the following:

1. The freight rate provision, which authorizes the Secretary of Agriculture to file applications to correct the rank discriminations against agricultural products in the freight rate structure of the country. This has been one of the greatest burdens agriculture has suffered. I do not believe any thinking person actually interested in the success of the American farm would want this provision repealed.
2. The research provision, which provides for the establishment of laboratories in the different sections of the country and for the search for new markets, new outlets, and new forms of distribution for the various farm products that are produced. Surely no one wants this desirable feature repealed.
3. The export provision, which provides for 30% of the tariff collections to be devoted to exporting farm commodities and to distributing these commodities and their products among the needy people in America. Surely no wise person would want this provision repealed.
4. The soil conservation provisions. Every man, woman, and child in America is interested in the conservation and rebuilding of the soil. Some of the finest work that has been done in this generation has been in connection with the soil conservation provisions of the act. I do not see how anyone can object to this provision.
5. The loan provision, which is intended to prevent complete price collapse. Last year we produced the greatest cotton crop in history. We produced the greatest wheat crop since 1915. In 1932, with a smaller cotton crop than in 1937, cotton sold at 4c and 5c per pound. In 1932 with a smaller wheat crop than in 1937, wheat sold at 30c per bushel. Low and unsatisfactory as prices are now, they are infinitely better than they were in 1932. In addition, the cotton and wheat farmers are receiving soil conservation payments. The cotton farmer is receiving a price adjustment payment, and the cotton and wheat farmers are to receive some additional parity payments.

If any cotton or wheat farmer will take his pencil and figure these payments and prices along side the 1932 tragedy, he will find how much better off he is with the present program than he would be with no program at all.

At the beginning of the 1938 cotton picking period there was a carryover of 13,000,000 bales—more than twice the annual consumption of cotton in the United States. Any program, any plan that may be offered must deal with this tremendous carryover.

Everyone familiar with the facts knew that the new farm act of 1938 was going into effect during the most difficult period that could be conceived. The tremendous surplus that had been produced in our major crops complicated the problem to an extreme degree.

It seems to me that anyone sincerely interested in the success of the farm program should be willing to wait until there is a thorough try-out of the new measure or at least until one season has passed before beginning to sow seeds of discord and to stir up dissatisfaction.

No one claims the new law is perfect. On the other hand, no fair man can deny that it has many desirable features. No man is wise enough to predict in advance just how it will work out. This much is certain: anyone who is attacking it when the new season has just started is not making a contribution to the welfare of the farmer.

No doubt in the light of the experience, some changes will be found necessary. These changes can and should be made.

International Sunday School Lesson

Personal Rights

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Oct. 30
Text: Ecclesiastes 2:1-3, 10-11;
Romans 6:17-23; 14-21

PERSONAL rights have been an important question through the ages. The Bible reveals how important these rights were in ancient times.

What are the limits of personal liberty? To what extent should an individual restrain himself because of the possible effect on others?

There is no uniform answer to the questions which arise. It is easy to lay down general principles, but it is not so easy to apply these in every case—and there is a wide range of conduct in which the individual must be free to choose his own course; otherwise, his conduct would be one of compulsion rather than of liberty.

It seems clear that the individual has no right to liberties which infringe upon similar liberties of other people. Such liberties, exercised by individuals, become matters of special privilege.

BUT a difficult problem arises, because undue regulation

and regimentation mean the breaking down of initiative and the destruction of personal liberty if they are pushed too far. What is necessary is that men should see the problem of the attainment of liberty from both angles, and should develop a proper balance between the rights and liberties of the individual and the welfare of society as a whole.

It is of no value to develop large liberty on the part of a few individuals which is used and exercised to make vast numbers of their fellowmen virtual slaves. On the other hand, all individuals become virtual slaves if they live under a society where the individual has no rights and privileges at all.

Religion, as our lesson suggests, ought to have something to do with these issues; in fact, the Christian religion has a great deal to do with them.

Christianity lays profound emphasis upon the love of man to man. The Christian experience brings to the individual a great sense of freedom. Nothing is more evident than that in the history of Christian experience. But this freedom becomes exercised in wise self-restraint, action, and good judgment.

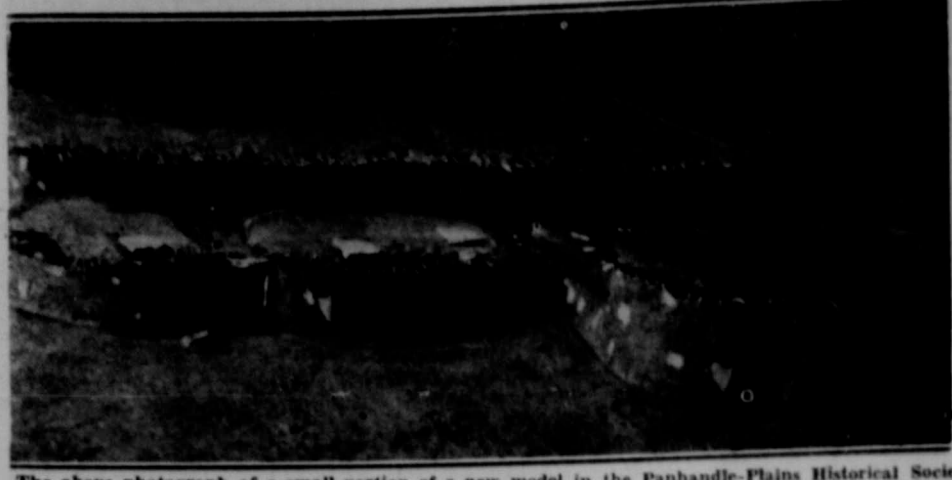

FSA SUPERVISES HOME CANNING TO HELP REDUCE LIVING COSTS

Thousands of cans of fruits and vegetables have been prepared by the farm women in Ochiltree county as a means to reduce living costs of their families and at the same time improve their health through an adequate and balanced diet, according to Mrs. Sallie E. Allen, Home Management Supervisor for the Farm Administration, with offices at Booker, Texas.

The striking feature of this, Mrs. Allen says lies in the fact that some of these farm women had never processed foodstuffs before they solicited the aid of the Farm Security Administration. Cookers, sealers, and other canning supplies had been made possible through loans obtained from this federal agency.

Early last spring and all during the growing season Mrs. Allen planned and worked with the women in the management of their gardens. Mrs. Allen advised with the farm women concerning the varieties of garden stuffs to plant and just how to get the maximum returns from each, ever looking to the necessity for preparing balanced meals from the foods thus preserved.

Now that the season for canning fruits and vegetables is almost passed, Mrs. Allen is working with her farm women and preparing for the meat canning season.

"I am especially proud of the record made by these farm women in the homes where I am working," Mrs. Allen said, and it is quite evident that the cost of living will be much less as a result of these activities than it would have been had these families been compelled to purchase all of their supplies during the winter months.

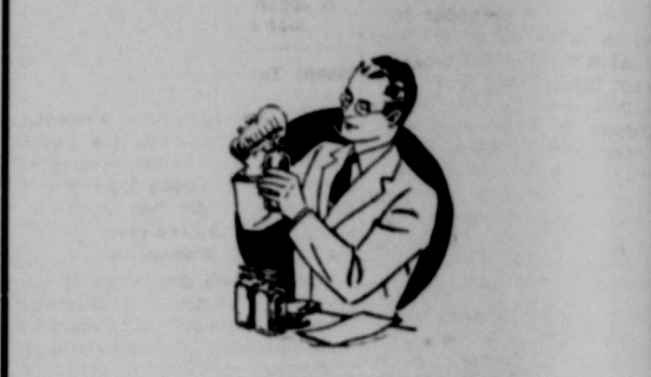

FARMS ON CONTOUR INCREASE

SUCCESS OF METHOD OF CULTIVATION CONVINCES FARMERS OF ADVISABILITY OF USING PRACTICE

AMARILLO, Texas—More and more acres of Southern Great Plains farms are being cultivated on the contour as each planting season rolls around, according to H. H. Fennell, regional conservator of the Soil Conservation Service.

Many farmers who observed increased wheat yields on neighbors' contour-tilled farms this year now are changing from straight-row to around-the-slope tillage methods, and others who are observing the increased row crop yields this fall are planning to adopt contour methods next spring, they declare.

Planting crops in rows that run around the slopes rather than up and down them has many advantages, farmers are learning. The contour furrows catch and hold most of the water where it falls, thereby reducing run-off with soil losses and at the same time storing moisture for use in producing better yields and providing a protective cover during the period of high winds.

Planting and harvesting crops on the contour have been found to reduce power and operation costs of farm machinery in areas where the

slopes are steep. The uniform distribution of water which results from contour tillage and terraces helps in obtaining even crop stands. Farmers also are finding that the washing out of seed and the necessity for replanting are being eliminated to a great extent where farming operations are on the contour.

On erosion control demonstration areas where farmers are cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service in instituting complete programs on their farms, practically all plantings are on the contour. On many farms, fences have been relocated and placed on the contour to serve as permanent guide lines for contour planting.

During the winter, farmers have observed that the contour rows are more effective than straight rows in holding the snow evenly over the fields and preventing drifting. When

the snow is distributed evenly, there is a resultant even distribution of moisture.

LLANO—One hundred game conservation signs which will protect 85,000 acres of ranch land have been made with the help of National Youth Administration boys at Llano, working under the supervision of the county agricultural agent, J. C. Kellam. State NYA Director, has been advised.

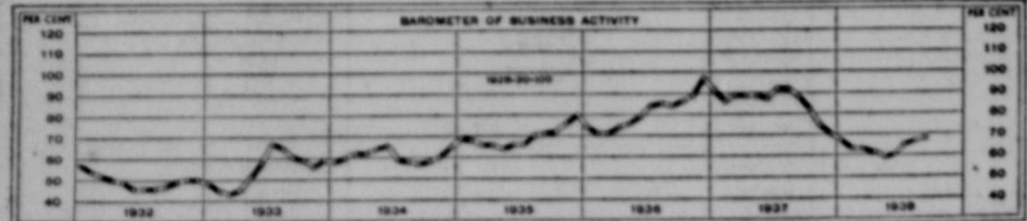
