Annual Red Cross Drive Starts On Monday, 26th

Bahlman and Hays Make Statements Of Position In City Alderman Race

To the Citizens of Winters:
I am a candidate for re-election to the office of Alderman of the City of Winters, and I solicit the vote and support of every citizen in the City Election April 3.

I would like first to express my appreciation once again for the confidence placed in me by the people of Winters in electing me to the office of Alderman in the special election last August. The opportunity to be of service to the people of Winters during these past several months has been both gratifying and educational.

At the present time our City government is functioning smoothly, both in administration and operation of the several different departments. This is being accomplished by coordinated and planned policies.

I am in favor of extending the operating franchise of the West Texas Utilities Co. At the present time it would be virtually impossible for the city alone to adequately supply the demands for electrical power without adding to an already burdensome debt. Also, there have been no funds set aside for replacement of power plant machinery and distribution system. When it is worn out, another bond issue must be voted to re-finance and replace the present system. These facts cannot be ignored by the thinking people of Winters. Furthermore, I am not in favor of running any legitimate business out of Winters. At a time when we are trying to attract business and industry to strengthen the economy of our community, I believe it is unwise to dissuade any legitimate business from operating in Winters. I believe in the free enterprise system. I further believe that there is a moral responsibility associated with granting an extension to the West Texas Utilities Co., in accordance with the democratic tenets under which this country was founded and has grown.

I am in favor of continuing the garbage pick-up service, under the provisions of existing ordinances. The health of our community demands this. I do not believe that anyone who has the interest of Winters in mind would question the necessity of keeping our City clean and disease-free. I believe that every resident expects to accept his part of the responsibility for this service, and does not desire to shift the entire burden to the property owners alone.

Along with most everyone else, I am tax-conscious. I believe that the tax situation in the City of Winters should be under study at all times. However, the tax structure should be commensurate with the demands of the people.

I would also like to urge every citizen to support and elect J. W. Bahlman and R. C. Thomas as Aldermen. I feel that together we can work with the Mayor and the rest of the council for a better Winters.

I further want to publicly state that I am not under obligation to any person, group or organization of any kind, other than the citizens of Winters, and pledge to represent all the people of Winters to the best of my ability.

Dr. James Basden Is Evangelist For Baptist Revival

Dr. James Basden of Dallas will be the preacher for the First Baptist Revival beginning Sunday, March 25. Services will be held each week day at 10 a. m. and at 7:30 p. m. Sunday services will be held at the regular time.

A minister for more than 20 years, Dr. Basden has pastored churches at Germantown, Tenn., and at Ector, Belton and Brownwood, Texas, before assuming his present position as the Human Welfare Secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas in August 1960. He formulates plans for allocating funds among hospitals, children's homes and other services.

Born in Memphis, Tenn., August 19, 1915, Dr. Basden received an A. B. Degree from Union University, Jackson, Tenn., in 1938. Other degrees include Th. M. and Th. D. Degrees from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth. He is married to the former Evelyn Jeter of Brownsville, Tenn. They have two children, Jeter and Bill.

J. O. Strother, music and education director of the First Baptist Church in Pecos, will direct the music. A graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Strother has also served as music director in Kermit and Breckenridge.

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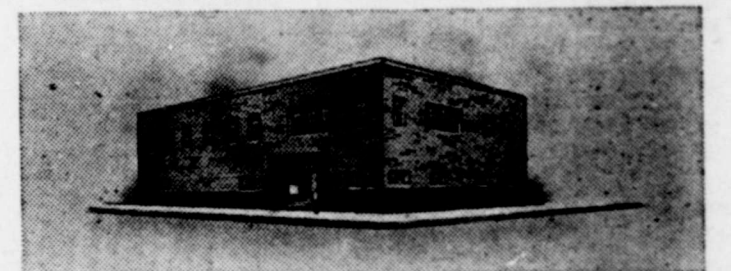

STATE CAPITOL HIGHLIGHTS

Congressman-At-Large Candidates Have To Campaign Entire State

By Vern Sanford
Texas Press Association

State campaign headquarters for Congressman-at-Large report that considerable confusion exists about this particular race.

Many voters seem to think that the various candidates for Congressman-at-Large are running against present office holders. Namely the Congressmen now representing the various Congressional districts in the State.

They are not! This is a statewide race where in Texas gets an extra Congressman—representing all the people of Texas, not just a district.

This office is being created because the population of Texas has increased sufficient to entitle it to an additional representative in Washington.

The Texas Legislature has the right to re-district the state to provide for an extra Congressman. But the Legislature has not yet done so. Alternative therefore is to create a statewide position.

Therefore, the following candidates are competing against each other for this high post and not against any present office holder: Democratic Primary: Judge Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso; Manley Head of Austin; Warren G. Moore of Tyler; Joe R. Pool of Dallas; Charles H. Stevenson Jr. of Corpus Christi; Russell T. Van Keuren of Houston; and Phil Willis of Scurry.

Republican Primary: Desmond Barry of Houston; Giles E. Miller of Dallas; and Joe B. Phillips of Lubbock.

A Congressman-at-Large race is not without precedent in Texas. The same thing happened in 1952. Martin Dies was elected and served from 1952 to 1958.

THUNDER FROM THE TOP
When GOP's from all over the state gathered in Austin for the State Republican Executive Committee meeting Monday, democratic pressure to hold primaries in every precinct was a topic of conversation.

Jim Leonard, GOP executive director, criticized the SDEC for urging county clerks to refuse to place Republican candidates on the November ballot unless the Republicans held a primary in every precinct. Leonard charged that it was the same as asking them to break the election laws.

He likened the democratic announcement to "thunder from the top," and called the issue a tempest in a teapot and a compli-

ment to the growth of his party in Texas.

TEXTBOOK CHOICES POSTPONED

The State Board of Education voted to postpone the decision of whether to reorder high school solid geometry, economics and shop texts, as well as one on driver education, until the matter of revising these courses is decided.

Several board members also asked a committee to read the economics textbook, because they objected to its content. Objectors all were attorneys.

Penrose Metcalfe of San Angelo asked to hold up on the drivers' course test, because he questions a recent decision to change this class from eighth to ninth grade.

He said some West Texas superintendents want it kept in the eighth grade, since most of their students drive by that time, anyway. He will ask for a vote at the April meeting, to put the course back in the eighth grade.

WATER WORK DIVIDED

After 10 years, Vice President Lyndon Johnson finally got an answer as to who will do what toward implementing the \$4,000,000 plan to provide for Texas Water and soil conservation, flood control, navigation, water supply and irrigation projects.

Federal Agencies now have agreed that the Army Corps of Engineers and the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation each will take on about \$1,000,000,000 worth of dam and conveyance construction; local and state agencies will assume \$1,000,000,000 worth of work; and the U. S. Soil Conservation Service will handle \$2,000,000,000 worth of small dam and soil conservation work.

Balance of the project is navigation, irrigation, recreation and local flood protection.

Agreement still needs approval at the Washington level, but for the first time in its history, Texas has a water plan and water agencies and engineers have come to an understanding on Texas' future water needs.

Governor Daniel called for public support of the drive, and said he will recommend action by the Legislature to continue the services the center offers to victims of crippling accidents and diseases.

Fifty-four patients now are under treatment at "Gonzales Warm Springs." If operating funds were available, the foundation could care for 120 patients.

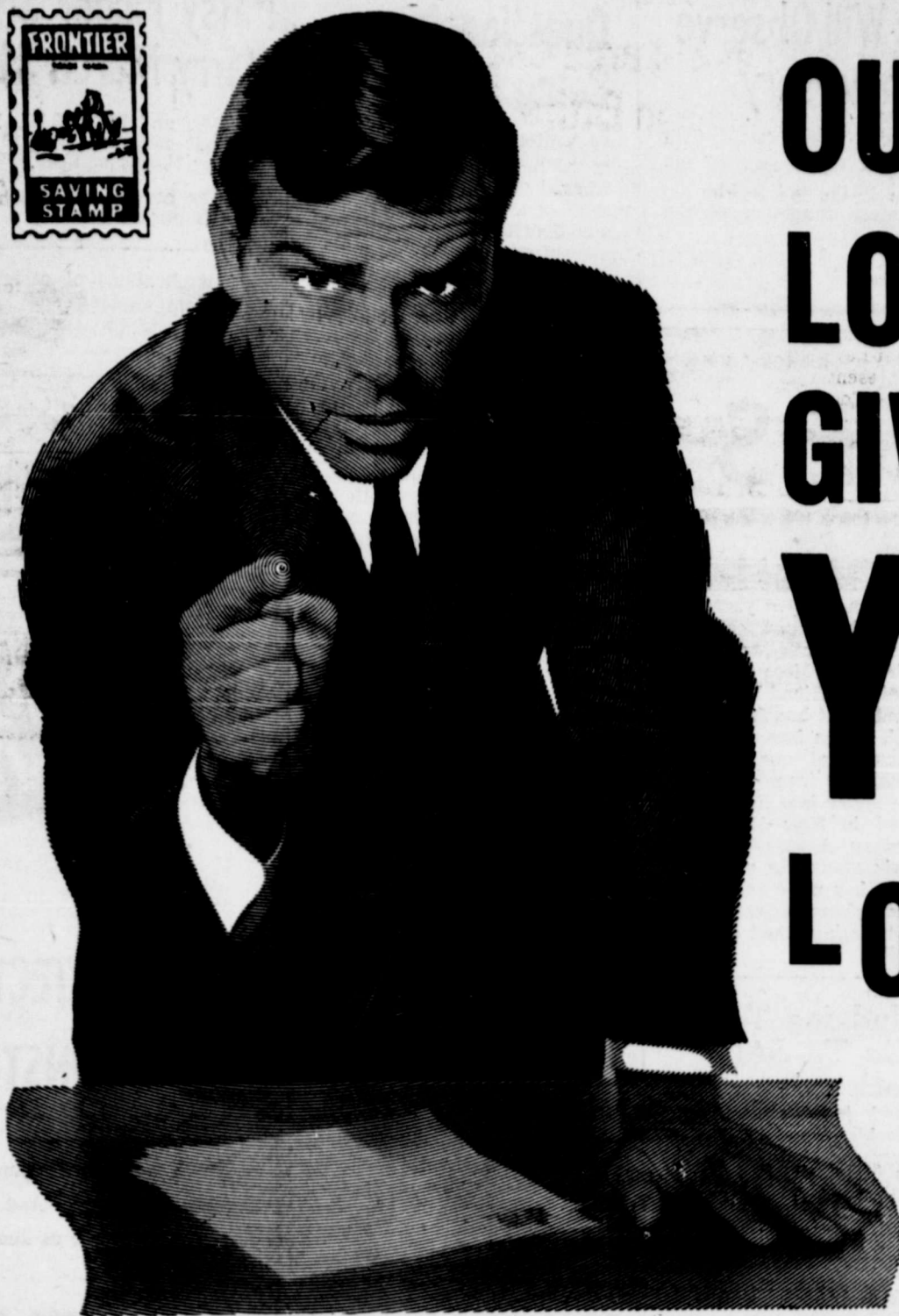

WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

Questionnaires Being Returned, Interest High

Stepped up interest in governmental affairs in the 21st Congressional district is indicated by the Opinionaires now pouring in from our district. The results, now being tabulated as the returns are received, should give a fairly accurate barometer of the composite thinking of the people of our area on many issues now pending. At least 15,000 returns are anticipated.

A Kerrville store owner points to a weakness in our unemployment compensation system, with this comment: "I sincerely believe that Unemployment payments are creating or continuing the number of unemployed by at least 75 percent; that is, the number that refuse to work as long as they have any income. This is the State's problem; however, if the Federal Government would ask for a check-up on all people receiving this aid, I feel sure the number of unemployed would drop 25 percent."

The cost of the public debt is brought into focus in the current appropriation bill for the Treasury Department which was approved in the House last week. Interest on that debt jumped from \$8.9 billion last year to \$9.3 billion this year—an increase of \$400 million in one year. Yet, many liberals insist the size of the debt is of no concern because "we owe it to ourselves."

A compromise has been agreed upon by Senate-House conferees on the job re-training bill. The House version called for \$263 million to be spent over two years to help for training jobless workers and give them subsistence payments while being trained. The Senate version called for a four-year, \$655 million program. The compromise splits the difference and calls for an outlay of \$455 million. Thus, another welfare program is beginning which, unhappily for the taxpayers, involves

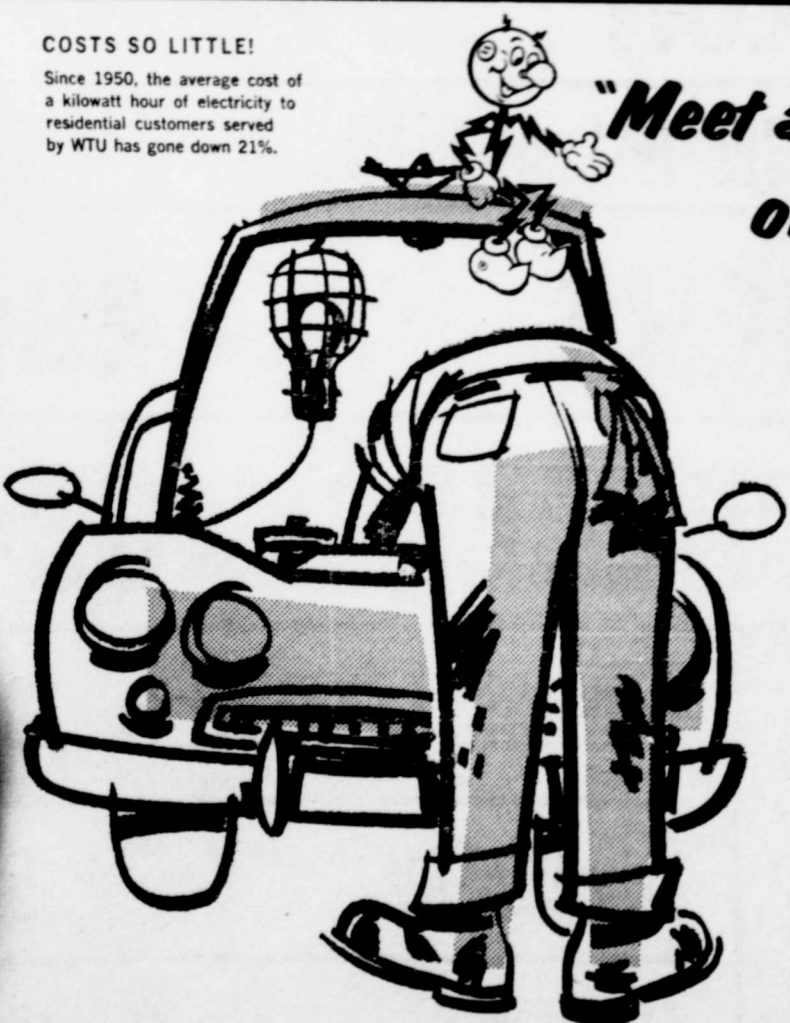

Alvin Flury, inland fisheries project leader for the South Texas area for a number of years, will handle I&E problems in Region IV, with headquarters at Houston, 2370 Rice Blvd., Tel. Jackson 8-0516.

Region V will have as its I&E representative L. D. Nuckles, former conservation officer stationed at Castroville. Headquarters for this region is the marine laboratory at Rockport, P.O. Box 1117, Tel. Southfield 4-6472.

The selection of these men was made only after they had qualified through a test designed specifically for the job, and interviews and study of past records. They have been assigned to these areas to extend the Commission's Information-Education activities.

Fish Kill On Inks Lake Said Good

Biologists estimate that the selective fish kill performed on Inks Lake in Central Texas, March 1, was an average to good kill. Information based on a net sample after the treatment, and shoreline counts, indicate that about 60 percent of the fish removed consisted of shad, 24 percent were drum, and only 3 percent were game fish, primarily catfish, white bass and crappie.

Gary Wood, biologist in charge of the project, reported the first night's netting showed that approximately 85 percent of the lake's shad were eliminated during the kill. Most game fish affected by the rotenone treatment were channel cats from 8 to 12 inches in length.

No drum were taken in the nets; however, since this species is difficult to catch in nets, it's impossible to estimate accurately the percentage of drum removed. Nevertheless, biologists feel certain that the drum population in Inks was greatly reduced.
