Castleman Rites Held Saturday

Funeral services were held at 4 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church in Bogata, for James Edward Castleman of Bogata, who died Thursday in the crash of a light plane at Cox Field, Paris, about 12:20 p. m.

Rev. James Barnes, pastor of the Bogata Church, where Castleman was a member, and a former pastor, Rev. Blake Dunagan of Dallas, were officiating ministers. Burial was made in Meadowbrook Cemetery, Paris, by Bogata Funeral Home.

Full Masonic rites were observed. Pallbearers were O. A. Broussard, C. C. Bussell, Johnny Gill, Morris Trimm, Pleas Turner, Tommy Varner.

Son of J. A. and Eula (Powell) Castleman, deceased was born October 15, 1917 at Detroit. He was married June 30, 1937 to Miss Floy Thompson.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Floy Castleman; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Castleman of Bogata, and two sons, Ken Castleman of Austin, and Al Castleman of Dallas.

Mrs. Joe E. Russell of Annona, flying student, was also killed in the crash as the plane was attempting a landing.

A resident of Bogata since childhood, the deceased had attended Paris Junior College, and during World War II, held the rank of lieutenant colonel, as chief flight instructor for British cadets at the government-supervised civilian aviation school at Terrell.

Former owner of the Bogata Lumber Company, he was currently vice president of Red River Haven Nursing Home and a farmer and rancher here, being also a partner in the Bruce Air Service, Paris, where he was FAA examiner.

At Bogata, he was a deacon of First Baptist Church, a Masonic Lodge member, past president of the Chamber of Commerce, and a former school trustee. He was vice president of the NeTso Trails Boy Scout Council and held Scouting's highest award, the Silver Beaver.

J. T. Garrett Dies In Grain Elevator

Mrs. Jim Garrett of Bogata was in Fort Worth Monday to attend funeral of her brother-in-law, Jessie T. Garrett of Fort Worth, who suffocated Saturday afternoon when buried beneath tons of wheat in a Saginaw grain elevator.

Co-workers said Garrett crawled through a porthole in the base of the 110-foot elevator at Burrus Feed Mills to determine why wheat had jammed.

It was explained that moist wheat can expand and form a plug which blocks the grain from falling to the bottom of the elevator. Investigators were told that Garrett jammed at a plug and the wheat crashed down on him, burying him for 45 minutes.

Funeral services were held at 1 p. m. Monday in Fort Worth, with interment there. A former resident of this area and son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Garrett, deceased was born Jan. 22, 1899. He was married in 1921 to Miss Maude Risinger, who survives.

He is also survived by two daughters, Mrs. Maxine Cannon of Fort Worth, Mrs. Christine Holmsback of Garland; one brother, H. V. Garrett of Bloomington, Mo.; a sister, Mrs. Maybelle Morgan of Dallas, and seven grandchildren.

Four Charged In Bank Burglary

Marshall. — Federal charges alleging the burglary of two banks have been filed against four men who are also charged with the burglary of the Elysian Fields Security State Bank.

Billy Joe Suel, 25; Larry Dean Grammer, 19; Jerry Wayne Grammer, 25; and Charles Gene Grammer, 22, are charged with burglarizing the Talco State Bank at Talco on Aug. 29 and the Fannin National Bank in Windom on Sept. 5.

The four had earlier been charged with the burglary of the bank at Elysian Fields on July 25 in which \$3,200 was taken.

Three of the men — Suel, Jerry Wayne Grammer and Larry Dean Grammer — had also been charged in federal court with the burglary of the Donie State Bank at Donie on May 29. These three men were arraigned on that charge in Lake Charles, La., after their arrests in Leesville, La. Bond was set at \$10,000. Also arrested at that time was Charles Grammer who was returned to Marshall shortly afterward.

The other three men were returned to Marshall by U. S. marshals Friday. The first charges in the Elysian Fields Bank case were filed Aug. 2 against Suel and Jerry Wayne Grammer. Reports from Windom and Talco were that holes were drilled in the vault doors at both banks but nothing was taken.

The four men were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Don Rives Friday on the burglary of the bank at Windom. Bond was set at \$15,000 each.

Charles Grammer is also under \$15,000 bond on the Talco bank charge while the other three men, who were arraigned in Louisiana on that allegation, are under \$5,000 each.

Ernest Matthew Phifer, farmer and lumberman of Cuthand, died at his home there at 7 a. m. Tuesday, after long illness. Services were held at 2 p. m. Austin. — Although the primaries are not until next May, Texas politicians, here and there, already are beginning to get in and out of statewide races.

Big question still is whether Gov. John Connally will run for an unprecedented fourth term. He says he hasn't made up his mind.

If he doesn't run, it now appears that it will be at least a three-way race in the Democratic primary — between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, who already has announced, Speaker Ben Barnes and former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

If Connally does run, Barnes and Carr probably will vie for lieutenant governor, though neither has as yet announced a definite decision.

In the state Supreme Court, both Associate Justice James R. Norvell and Meade F. Griffith say they will not seek re-election in 1968. Woodrow Bean of El Paso and former state Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio are being mentioned as possible candidates for those two posts.

HIGHWAY OFFICIALS PROMOTED — On January first B. L. DeBerry, Dallas district highway engineer, will replace Assistant State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall. Dingwall will replace State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer, who is retiring.

There will be four other administrative changes in the Highway Department: Archie J. Sherrod, now district engineer in Odessa, will be promoted to chief engineer of maintenance operations. John G. Keller, Beaumont district engineer, will succeed DeBerry.

Franklin Carter Young, district administrative engineer in San Antonio, will take over Keller's job. Paul H. Coleman, assistant district engineer at Odessa, will replace Sherrod.

RESEARCH AWARD TO TEXAS — Texas Research League was presented the top research award of the Governmental Research Association for its report, "Metropolitan Texas: A Workable Approach to Its Problems."

Award was made in Boston. Accepting were Alvin A. Burger, executive director of the League, and James W. McGrew, research director and head of the project. League's report was made after an 18-month study requested by Governor Connally. It contained seven legislative recommendations, but only one of them passed the Legislature. That one provided \$250,000 of state money for regional planning.

TEXAS TOURISM PUSHED — Texas' official travel exhibit — pushing the state as a vacation land with a "World of Difference" — was seen by approximately 450,000 persons at the Canadian National Exhibition at Toronto.

CITY SALES TAX FAVORED — Saturday midnight was an important hour in Austin, in so far as many Texas municipalities were concerned. That was the deadline date for reporting city sales tax election results to State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

As of this writing, 12 of the 13 municipalities that have voted on whether or not to adopt a 1% city sales tax, along the lines of the state's 2% sales tax, have favored the proposal.

Voters in Electra, near Wichita Falls, turned it down. Voters in the following cities adopted the new-to-Texas taxing device: Aransas Pass, Austin, Elgin, Orange Grove, Henrietta, Ingleside, Nacogdoches, El Paso, Port Aransas, Taylor, Texas A&M and Wichita Falls.

Rivercrest Falls To Queen City

Queen City took advantage of Rivercrest Rebels' miscues Friday night at Queen City and hammered out an 18-7 victory over the Rebels.

Many of the Rebels offensive efforts were erased by red flags, being penalized 13 times for 162 yards. Queen City also was penalized more than usual, drawing 10 step-offs for a minus 97 yards.

Queen City put the first touchdown on the scoreboard in the opening period when Hill went over from three yards out. The second Bulldog score was made by Fincher in the second period, and they led 12-0 at halftime.

DeBerry Named Assistant State Hiway Engineer

Austin. — Five top-level administrative changes were announced today for the Texas Highway Department.

B. L. DeBerry, District Engineer at Dallas, will become Assistant State Highway Engineer effective Jan. 1, 1968. DeBerry will succeed J. C. Dingwall, who becomes State Highway Engineer on the same date.

The announcement was made jointly by State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer and Dingwall. DeBerry is a native of Bogata, Red River County. He joined the Highway Department as an instrumentman in Sherman immediately after graduation from the University of Texas in 1937.

After serving in various engineer field capacities in the Paris District, he was transferred to San Antonio as Assistant District Engineer in 1953. In 1958, he was named District Engineer at Lufkin and in 1960 took over as head of the seven-county Dallas district.

During the past seven years, DeBerry has been responsible for one of the five largest highway construction programs in the history of the Department.

During World War II DeBerry served both with the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the Navy. He and his wife, Pauline, have a daughter, Mrs. Thomas H. Moore of Lufkin. He is a member of the Christian Church.

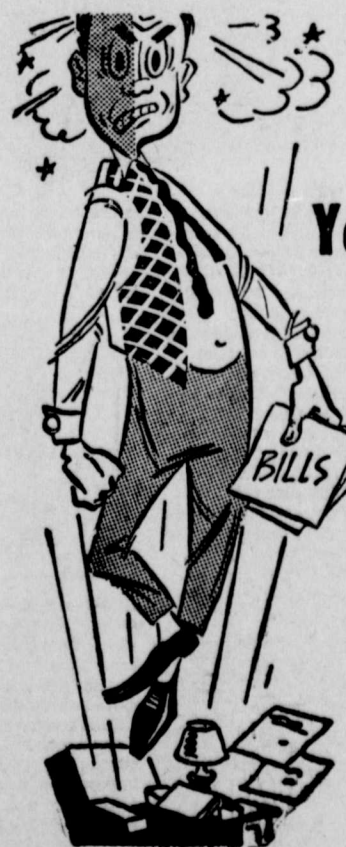
