Mosier Named To Zoning Commission

R. D. Mosier, Jr., CPA and Aransas County auditor, has been named a member of the City Planning and Zoning Commission to take the place of Fred Bracht, Jr., who resigned.

The City Council Monday appointed Mosier to serve out Bracht's unexpired three-year term.

In other actions at the council meeting:

—International Harvester Co. was awarded a contract for a tractor on its low bid of \$2,157.75. Jackson Tractor Co. bid \$2,470.11, and Anderson Machinery Co., \$3,250.

—Considered purchasing some insurance on a number of water well motors. Tabled the matter for further study. Council indicated it may consider doing its own "insuring" by setting aside the equivalent of insurance premiums to pay for repairs and replacements.

—August financial statements were approved.

—C. D. Duckworth was awarded a contract to stripe Austin Street from the railroad to Market street, including parking spaces, for \$80 per thousand feet. Duckworth will use a gravity feed striping using white paint.

—At the request of the Women's Auxiliary of the Rockport Volunteer Fire Department, Council voted to supply the necessary amount of paint to paint the front room and a cabinet in the Fire Station.

—Council voted to allocate \$200 to play host Nov. 23 to the annual meeting of the Coastal Bend Water and Sanitary Association here.

Sheriff Attends Crime Seminar

Sheriff Joe Earl Hunt attended a crime seminar sponsored by the FBI in Port Lavaca Oct. 6-9. Highlights were a welcome address by Port Lavaca Police Chief James Duke and a talk by Frank V. Hitt, special agents in charge of the Houston FBI office.

Another feature was a report on the National Crime Information Center which will be a computerized system whereby officers may check on stolen items or wanted persons from any state and have an answer within three minutes.

In Texas this information will come from Austin and then be dispatched to any city in the state.

Aransas County Water Resource Study Approved

The go-ahead for a detailed study of ground water supplies and locations in Aransas County was given this week by the Texas Water Development Board.

The work will be done under a cooperative agreement with the U.S. Geological Survey, part of \$1,328,430 to be spent by the state and federal agencies during the current state fiscal year.

The study, when complete, will provide a report on amounts and usability of underground water supplies in the county.

Brazoria and Ward County studies are also being launched during the year ahead.

The program includes continuation of the long-range studies on ground water supplies for San Antonio, El Paso, Houston, Galveston and the Trans-Pecos region. These have been carried on, in cooperation with local agencies, for several years.

New Causeway To Open Oct. 20

The new \$2.5 million causeway across Copano Bay is scheduled to be opened to traffic Thursday, Oct. 20, Texas State Highway engineers said today.

Stretching more than 9,000 feet across the bay, the new causeway was built by the Austin Bridge Company for \$2,481,078.07. Work was started Feb. 26, 1964, and 470 working days out of 550 have been put in to date. High winds and rain caused the off days.

The 1966 United Fund drive will officially start Monday, Oct. 17th. According to Dr. H. F. Elliot, steering committee chairman, there will be a kick-off breakfast for workers on that date starting at 7 a.m. at the VFW hall.

County Within Budget During First 9 Months

Aransas County operated well within its budget for the first nine months of 1966, according to the financial report issued by County Auditor R. D. Mosier, Jr.

The budget for Jan. 1 through Sept. 30 was \$377,644.36, and the amount of money spent was \$370,248.59. Thus the county was \$7,395.77 under the budget.

The total of operating funds as of Sept. 30 was \$275,856.97, compared to \$236,716.57 a year ago, or an increase of \$39,140.40.

The total of all funds (operating, interest and sinking, Social Security and others) on Sept. 30, 1966 was \$359,703.61 compared to \$309,963.83 a year ago, or an increase of \$49,739.78.

Long Range Plan to Be Developed For Progress of City, Area

Confident that the Rockport area will continue to grow and progress, the City has employed a nationally known firm of planners and engineers to prepare a long-range comprehensive plan covering the next 20 to 25 years and including not only the city but also the five-mile surrounding area.

The decision to take this forward step was made by the City Council at its regular meeting this week.

The firm of Harland Bartholomew and Associates of St. Louis was hired to make this important study and prepare the plan. Cost to the city will be only \$5,750 with the Federal government expected to pay the balance, \$11,250, or two-thirds of the total cost of the project, \$17,000.

Application for a grant from the Federal government under Public Law 701 is to be made immediately. Only if the grant (continued on page 8)

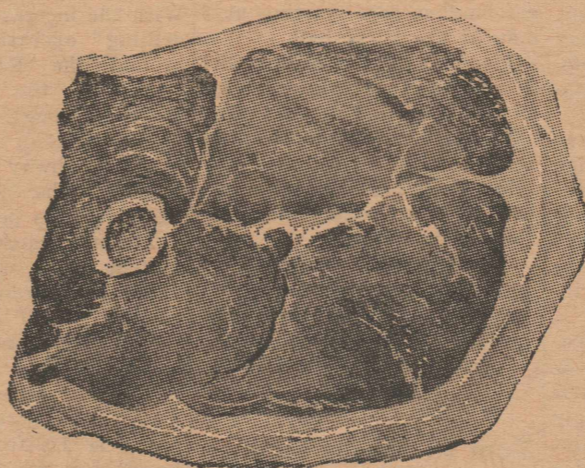

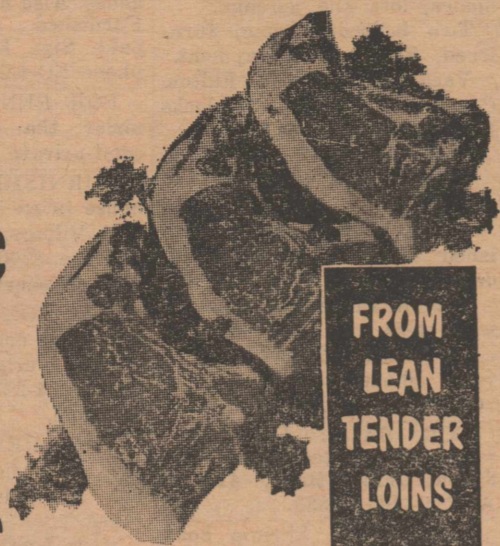

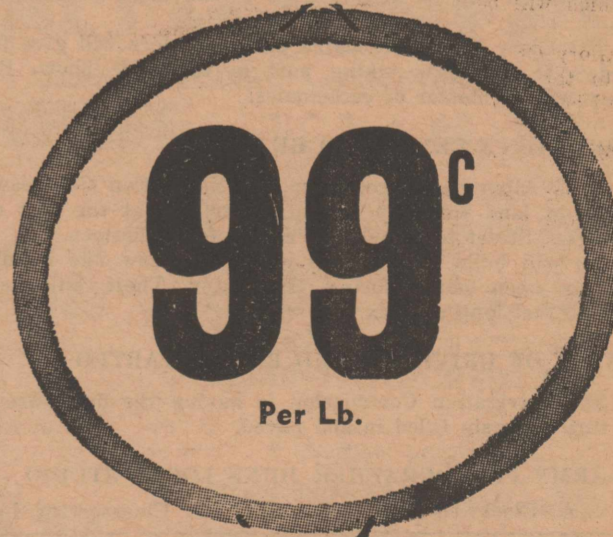

Editorial

THE CHICKEN STORY

Now comes a release from the Department of Agriculture telling housewives that chicken is one of the best bargains to be found in the stores.

Frying chickens dropped from 62 cents a pound in 1951 to 37.8 cents in 1964 and 1965. The housewife is paying 40 per cent less currently than 14 years ago. A careful shopper can save even more on certain weekends.

But the handout doesn't say that the poultry industry, despite pressures from several angles, including the government, has shouted in no uncertain words that it wants no part of government controls.

Poultry is one of the few agricultural products today that is not subjected to controls, except indirectly. There are no subsidies, supports and marketing orders. Poultry is free to do as it pleases, raise prices or lower them, over-produce or under-produce.

At the same time, however, it is penalized by having to pay higher prices for food to grow chickens to sell to the housewife at the lowest price in history. Corn and soybeans, a principal feed ingredient, are now selling at record prices and these commodities are government controlled.

A few years ago when poultry prices skidded there was a cry for government marketing orders. Some industry men wanted them, but the majority said no, leave us alone and let us work out our own problems. They won.

Recently the National Commission on Food Marketing investigated the poultry industry, along with others. Leaders testified as to conditions in the trade. They were asked by commission members how they felt about government controls. Time after time, witnesses said they just wanted to be free to produce without restraints and controls.

The commission was told that the poultry industry is the "sweetheart of the housewife" because it is one that has done more than its share in reducing the cost of feeding her family.

So we say to the men who produce fried chicken at a lower cost, congratulations. You've proved a point. When the government seeks to control a commodity, inevitably the price goes up to the consumer.

EDITOR'S VIEWPOINTS

NOW: PENNIES FROM PHILLY

On the theory that it makes sense to spend money to make money, Uncle Sam—never too tight with a loose buck anyway—is putting out \$37.7 million for a fine new coin factory in Philadelphia.

The new plant will replace the outmoded 65-year-old mint that used to be regarded as pretty snazzy until we learned how to really spend money.

It's hard to believe this, but only three or four years ago the mints at Denver and Philadelphia were turning out only a measly four billion coins a year. The target for the current fiscal year is \$11.2 billion.

And once upon time a production line that stamped out 300 pennies a minute was considered the cat's whiskers, to resurrect a quantity of that era.

Well, the new money factory in Philadelphia will have a superdooper machine that can punch out 10,000 pennies a minute!

Now, some may think Uncle Sam is getting a little copper kooky. But in view of the current coin shortage, any fair-minded penny-pusher has to admit it makes cents.—Spartanburg (S.C.) Herald.

NATION ON WHEELS

The U. S. automobile industry, the giants which produced 7,942,125 passenger cars in 1955 had not equaled the mark in the decade since. And it still had to record a 8-million car production.

Instead, in 1965, it jumped all the way over that figure and landed in the 9-million class. Production for last year came to 9,335,560 units, a fantastic total.

In 1940, factory sales of new cars (a figure virtually equivalent to production totals) came to 3,717,000. In 1950, sales were 6,660,000, and in the record production year of 1955, they were 7,920,000.

Not until 1963 did they reach 7,000,000 again, when the total came to 7,638,000.

Official figures showed a registration of 71.9 million passenger vehicles in 1964, after 5.2 million had been scrapped during the previous year. At that rate of attrition, the 9.3 million cars joining the parade in 1965 will bring the number registered to about 75 million—or enough to give every U. S. citizen a ride at one time and with no more than three persons in any car.—Chattanooga Times.

THE SOUND OF MUSIC

The electronic organ far many people is an instrument synonymous with sickly, treacly sound. This is not wholly fair, but one can understand what Sir Malcom Sargent was driving at when he sighed a wish that electronic organs might get back a sound more like that of the English cathedral organ. What

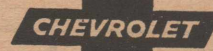
impressed him about electronics is the ever greater volume of sound it makes possible.

That is true, but it is surely a continuation of what happened to the English organ itself during the 19th century. Victorian wealth enabled the organ builder to get ever greater volume from the instrument—at the expense, some will feel, of quality of tone.

A number of people, hearing records of 17th and 18th century organs, sigh for what was lost from the English organ when wealth made greater power possible.

The small pipe organ is, in fact, undergoing a revival.—Birmingham (Eng.) Post.

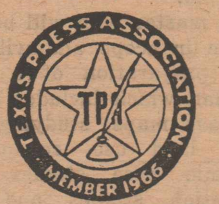

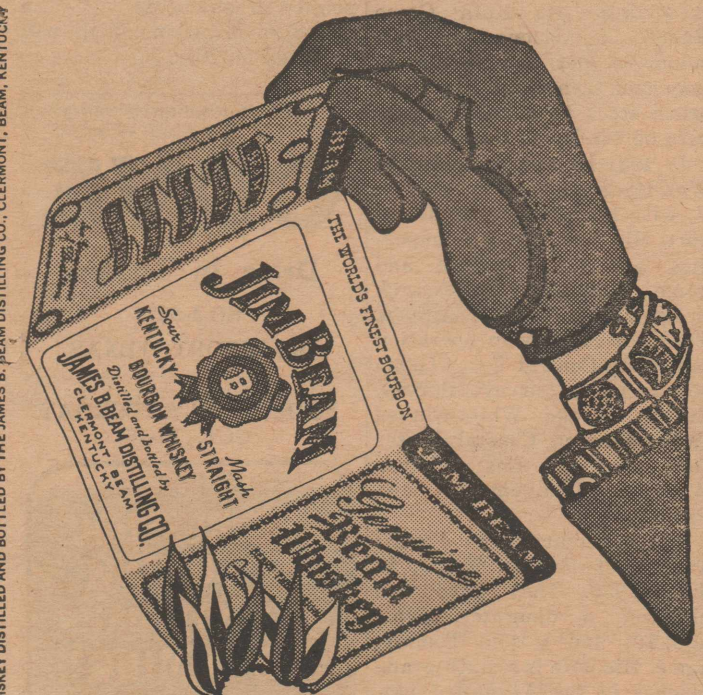

is forthcoming will the city be obligated to pay its share, or \$5,750.

The master plan will be extensive in scope and will include preparation of a land use plan which includes making base maps, studying existing land use, conducting economic base studies and population studies and developing a land use plan.

Another phase of the project will be the production of a thoroughfare plan covering traffic and major thoroughfares.

Next will be the preparation of a downtown business district plan covering condition of structures, parking facilities, functional arrangement of the commercial center, and recommending a plan for short-range and long-range growth.

Another part of the project will be the community facilities plan, a study of existing public buildings and probable future needs.

The study also will include

scrutiny of public utilities with recommendations citing the adequacy of existing facilities and their capacity for expansion to serve growth areas.

Parks and recreation facilities will be considered with special emphasis on their importance to tourists and to the local economy.

Another phase of the project will be creation of a public improvements program, including compilation of a list of recommended public improvements and a study of the means of financing these improvements.

These long-range plans, to be effective, must embody a set of regulatory measures and a method of administration, so the project will set forth specific recommendations of this nature.

Alderman N. F. Jackson made the motion to employ the Bartholomew firm for this study. Alderman N. C. Vandagriff seconded it. Jackson, Vandagriff and Alderman Earnest Harrist voted in favor of the motion. Alderman Charlie Garrett abstained from voting.

Texas Air Tour Group Enjoys Rockport Stop

"We sure enjoyed your hospitality."

These remarks were made by members of the 18th annual All Texas Air Tour who stopped at Aransas County Airport last Thursday for about an hour.

The members are flying enthusiasts who own their own planes and plan an extensive tour of Texas once a year. This year's tour which started Oct. 1 and ended Oct. 8 covered 25 cities.

About 35 planes landed at Aransas Airport last Thursday between 3:10 and 3:30 p.m. Between 90 and 100 persons stepped from the sleek planes, some of which cost as much as \$35,000.

On hand to greet the fliers was a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce who welcomed them and chauffeured them to the Studio Club at the Sandollar Motel.

There the guests had coffee and doughnuts and a friendly visit with Chamber members who later transported the guests back to the airport to resume their tour.

During the visit, Chamber members invited the fliers to plan an overnight stop here during their 1967 tour. A formal letter of invitation also was sent by the Chamber to E. M. "Tex" Anderson, Jr., Medina, president of All Texas Air Tour, inviting the group for an overnight stop next year.

This type of activity is typical of the Chamber's stepped up program of action for the benefit of the Rockport area and its residents.

Area Fishermen Buying RYSCO Steel Trawlers

Seven commercial fishermen in Aransas Pass have ordered steel trawlers from Rockport Yacht and Supply Company during the past five weeks, John P. Mitchell, Jr., vice president, announced today. The orders were placed for early spring delivery.

"This construction was made possible," Mitchell said, "through First State Bank of Aransas Pass which is handling the financing through the Federal Mortgage Insurance Plan."

Six shrimp trawlers produced by RYSCO this year were financed by First National Bank of Rockport. Approximate value of the trawlers is \$500,000.

Mitchell said shrimp boat production records in 1965 and so far in 1966 "are proving the excellent capabilities of the company's steel trawlers."

ing points on the mainland of the United States and adjacent islands.

Ed Harper, president of the Rockport Sportsmen Conservation Association, made arrangements to have 200 turtles located in this area where they once were abundant and were the means of a thriving food business.

A Parks and Wildlife Department plane flew the little turtles to Rockport where Parks and Wildlife personnel will care for them until they are large enough to fend for themselves. In four or five months they should be from six to eight inches long and ready for release.

The sands of Matagorda Island's gulf beach will be the release site, and it is hoped that in a few years these same turtles will return as adults to lay their eggs on Matagorda.

All sea turtles are protected by Parks and Wildlife Department regulations in Aransas County. Perhaps the time will come when the turtles will again be plentiful enough for harvest.

Runaway Boy, 16 Apprehended Here

At 1:30 a.m. Monday morning Chief of Police Bob Hewes stopped a car because only one headlight was working. The driver was a 16-year-old boy from Houston who had no driver's license.

The driver and two older boys, all appearing nervous, were taken to police headquarters by Hewes who placed a call to the Juvenile Bureau at Houston.

It was learned from that department that the boy was a runaway and that he had taken a .22 pistol from his father's room and told a friend that he was going out and rob a service station.

A thorough search of the car by Patrolman Joe Dominguez revealed the pistol concealed behind the rear seat speaker. A check was made with the Department of Public Safety headquarters in Corpus Christi to ascertain if any places between Houston and Rockport had been robbed and they reported no.

The boy was placed in the juvenile shelter where he stayed until mid-morning Monday when his parents came for him. The two other boys in the case were released without charges and the last words they uttered before leaving the Police headquarters were, "let's get out of this town."

foot horizontal clearance between fenders.

The existing 9,191.3 foot causeway consists of 337 nineteen-foot spans on the north and 144 nineteen-foot spans on the south end, with treated timber railing, piling, caps and stringers. It also has a 20-foot concrete roadway deck with a 52.3-foot-long bascule span with timber and steel deck.

This bascule span offered an opening of about 40 feet to the water traffic and when the span was opened, vehicle traffic was stopped. The lift span was tended 24 hours a day, and large water traffic either phoned ahead or whistled for the lift span to open.

Approximately 497 feet of the old structure, including the bascule span, will be removed and the remaining north and south ends will be turned over to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for further development into fishing piers for tourist attractions.

The new causeway which will facilitate the increasing flow of traffic will bring this section of highway up to the standard desired by Texas Highway 35—United States Highway 11 Improvement Organization whose ultimate goal is to have a multi-lane divided highway route extending from Montreal to Mexico City.

This group, also known as the "Hug the Coast Highway Association," has been meeting since 1926. In April, 1960, an organizational meeting was held in Bay City, Texas, to promote "additional traffic and secure improvements" with membership made up of city and county officials, chamber of commerce representatives and interested citizens along the route of Texas Highway 35 from Jefferson, Chambers, Galveston, Nueces, Kleberg, Genedy, Willacy and Cameron counties.

from the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge.

In April 1949, he moved to El Paso County as Project Leader on the scaled-quail project. For two years he worked the white-winged dove project, and an antelope trapping and transplanting project in Presidio and Brewster Counties.

He spent two more years in that area trapping and transplanting mule deer and antelope during the winter and assisting on the white-winged dove project in the summer.

For two years he was Assistant Leader, then Project Leader, on a Trans-Pecos Game Management Survey Project. In 1958, he became Project Leader and Area Manager of the Black Gap Wildlife Management Area in Brewster County.

At the same time he was also Project Leader of the Big Horn Sheep Development Project. He took a trapping crew into the Kofa Game Range in Arizona for four summers and one spring to trap and transplant Big Horn brood stock to a holding pasture on the Black Gap Area.

In 1961 he was promoted to Wildlife Supervisor of Region V, with headquarters in Rockport. His duties were to supervise and plan wildlife and game management research projects within this region. The projects now in operation are South Central Texas Game Management Survey; Survey, Status of the White-winged Dove; Survey, Coastal Water fowl, and the Las Palomas Wildlife Management Area Project.

He was married to Phyllis Trahan of Uvalde, Texas, in June 1955. They have two children, a daughter, Jane, age 10; and a son, Tommy, age 8. His wife is a sixth grade teacher in the Aransas County Public School System.

He is a member of the First Methodist Church of Rockport, Texas, and the Masonic lodge.

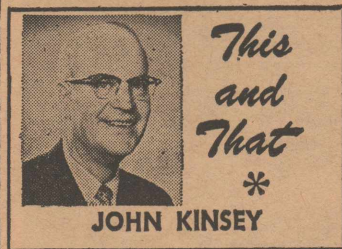

Half a Million Tons of Stone

The Great Lakes Dredge and Dock Company is operating from a point on the Intracoastal Canal just north of Aransas Pass as it fulfills its contract with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to repair jetties at Port Aransas. About 500,000 tons of stone are being placed. Slabs of stone, each weighing 16 to 18 tons, are brought to the operating point on flat railroad cars. A barge slip has been dug from the Intracoastal Canal to meet the railroad track that has been laid to the point.

Fifty of the large stones are carried on one barge to Port Aransas. These are the cap stones placed on the bed of smaller stones.

A period of almost three years has been required for repairs to the jetties. The cost exceeds \$3.5 million.

The jetties protect the ship channel which is 42 feet deep and 700 feet wide at the entrance.

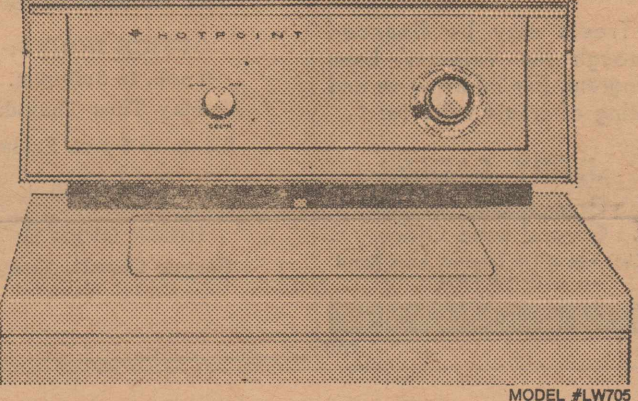

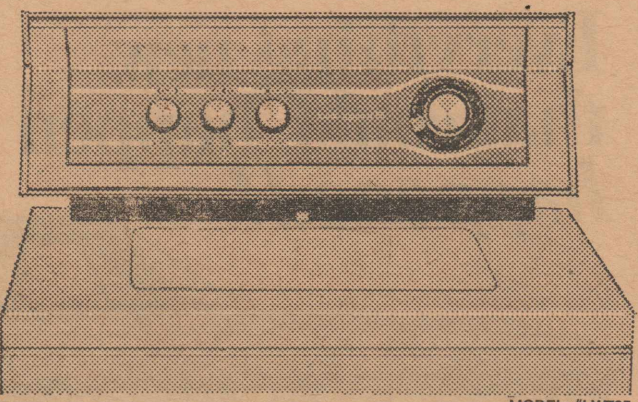

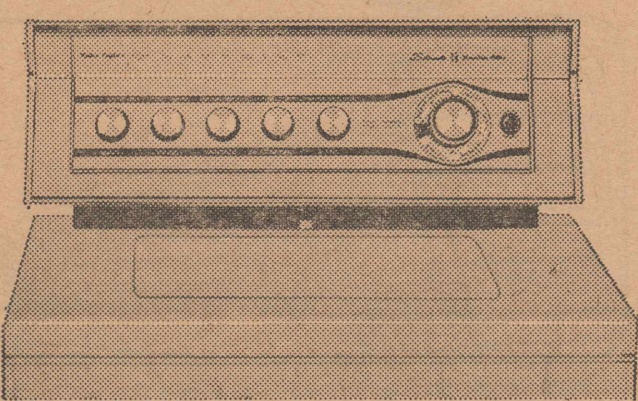

However, as Taft tried to run the ball out of this critical position, Pirate defensive man Thomas Lewis charged through the Taft line to give the Pirates a two point touch back.

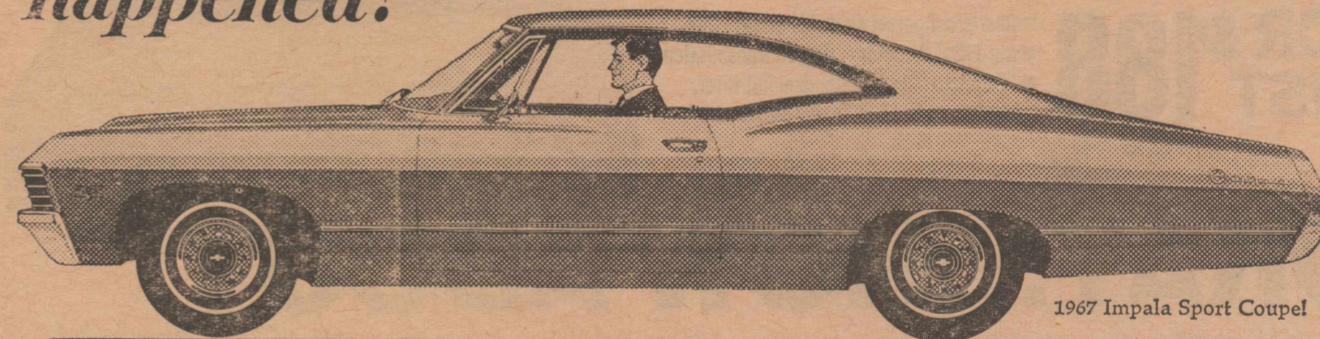

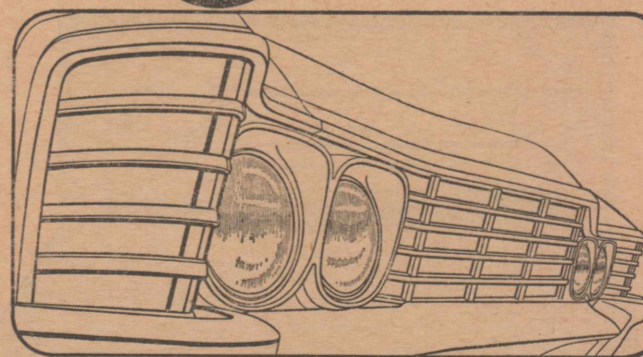

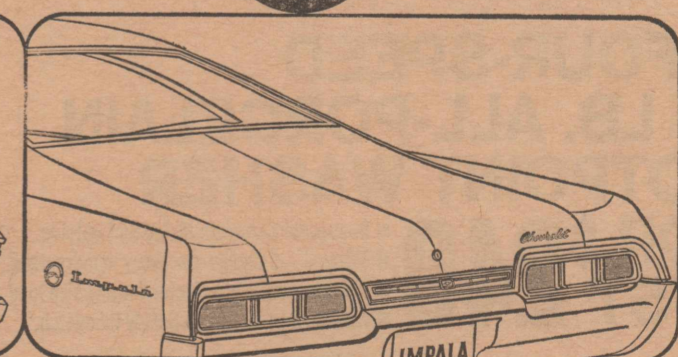
