WATERS FAMILY DONATES CLOSED CIRCUIT - V

Thursday evening marked the realization of a dream long held at Methodist Hospital. A closed circuit television system, originating in the Hospital's chapel and broadcasting to all television sets in the building, was officially dedicated in a private ceremony at 7:30.

The television system was officially presented to George Brewer, hospital administrator, by Dessie Fay Neal and Lee Roy Waters of Abernathy and their parents, William Abner Waters and Molly Melvina Waters. A bronze plaque signifying the donation will be placed in the chapel.

A reception for the donors was held in the hospital board room following the dedication ceremony.

The idea for the closed circuit television system was conceived when it became evident that the hospital's small chapel could not possibly accommodate the hundreds of patients, hospital employees, and visitors who wished to attend Sunday morning worship services. Now, thanks to the Waters family, worship services can be seen and heard at the patient's bedside. Furthermore, a close-up of the chapel altar will be broadcast over the system on a 24-hour basis. Thus, a patient may have the benefit of the chapel altar at his bedside in the event he feels the need for meditation or prayer.

A program is also planned for the future whereby ministers and priests from all churches in the surrounding area may hold daily devotional services for broadcast over the system.

Homecoming highlights include the basketball game with New Mexico State University at 3 p.m., March 2 and "H-SU Showcase: the Spirit of '76," student musical, in Behrens Chapel that night. The musical will include the winners of this year's "All-School Sing" and other special productions, all directed by Dr. T. W. Dean, dean of the school of music.

The Cowboy Band Show will be at 11 a.m. in Behrens Chapel. Band executives will be entertained during the weekend by Abilene band alumni. An informal get-together for former Cowboy Band members will be held following the musical.

The annual homecoming alumni luncheon will be at 1 p.m. in the H-SU Dining Room. The Alumni Association officers board meeting will be at 7 a.m., March 2. Byron Bryant, director of alumni affairs, said.

Reigning over all activities will be Homecoming Queen Kathy Sloan of San Diego, California.

The Cowboy Band was the first civilian group ever to play at the inauguration of a chief executive. They performed for the inaugurations of presidents Herbert Hoover, Franklin Roosevelt, and Dwight Eisenhower. European tours have brought the cowboy musicians into international prominence. They have been on parade in England before English monarchs, King George VI and Queen Mary. In America the band has traveled from coast to coast marching in parades down New York's Fifth Avenue, and in Madison Square Garden. Chicago's Michigan Avenue, San Francisco's Market Street, New Orleans' Canal Street, and Hollywood Boulevard.

Pallbearers were Bob Rogers, Billy Pittman, M. D. Evans, R. D. Slough, Charles Caswell and Ollie Murray.

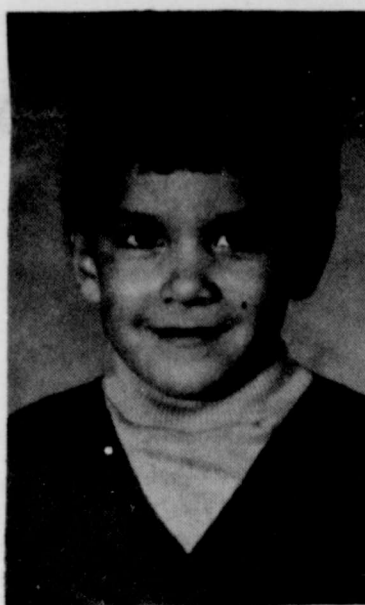

5. Form good diet habits by serving more food low in saturated fats.

6. Make doctor check-ups a family routine.

The Heart volunteers also will receive Heart Fund contributions, and, at residences where no one is at home, will leave behind a pre-addressed mail-in envelope in which a contribution may be sent conveniently to Heart Fund headquarters during the next few days.

COTTON FARMERS

Can you afford to divert cotton acres?

Following are some facts to consider:

Government stocks of cotton on January 19, 1968 were only 814,991 bales.

Reports from across the cotton belt indicate that December 1, 1967 estimate of 7,618,000 may well be 300,000 bales too high.

There is a great possibility that there will be no marketing quotas on the 1969 crop. The Law is very clear. It says that the Total Supply of Cotton MUST be MORE than the Normal Supply in order to have a Marketing Quota which provides subsidy, diversion payments, etc. What was the National Marketing Quota Determination for the 1968 crop? Federal Register 10/14/67 shows the Normal Supply beginning 8/1/67 as follows:

1. Estimated domestic consumption----- 9,000,000 bales
2. Estimated exports----- 4,700,000 bales
3. Allowance for carryover (30% of total)----- 4,110,000 bales
4. NORMAL SUPPLY----- 17,810,000 bales

If the normal supply remains the same, meaning that we will get no increase in domestic consumption from the new CPI program and the Department will not increase exports to our share of the world market as they were directed to do, the TOTAL SUPPLY would have to be as follows to justify the 1969 Marketing Quota Proclamation and a Marketing Quota for 1969 with loans, support payments, etc.:

1. Carryover on 8/1/68---(U.S.D.A. Estimate) ----- 6,500,000 bales
2. Estimated imports----- 30,000 bales
3. 1968 Crop of at least----- 11,280,000 bales
4. TOTAL SUPPLY----- 17,810,000 bales

This means that we will need to produce about 4,000,000 more bales in 1968 than we did in 1967 or about 62% more.

Where is this increase in cotton production in the U.S. going to come from? Has HISTORY and past production meant anything in the administration of the present program? What about trends?

We know that farmers must make money to stay in business just like everyone else. What will happen if 30%, 40%, 100% of Texas Cotton Acreage goes into feed grains?

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Please check all figures and all statements concerning the LAW with your County ASCS Office. If you decide to grow cotton, get together with your neighbors and with the Program Building Committee in your County. A good crop of high quality will mean more profit to the grower and much to the economy of your State and your Community.

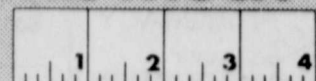

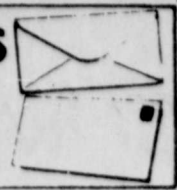

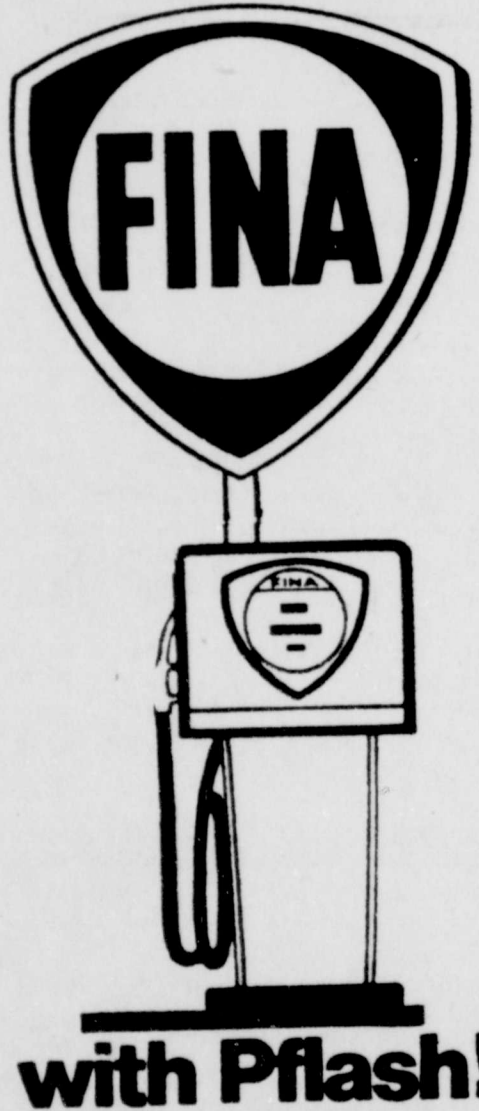

Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election by posting copies of this order at three different places within the boundaries of said school district, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election.
