## Well water coming late this week

High pressure testing revealed leaks at opposite ends of the City of Colorado City's new well water system, but both were fixed and the city remained on schedule to begin piping well water into the municipal system late this week.

The historic tap-turning was first planned for mid-morning Thursday, Oct. 8, but a leak found late Monday afternoon

had necessitated more testing.

City Manager Steve Shutt, who has been shuttling back and forth from his office to the wellfield near Loraine several times a day, said Tuesday afternoon that more than five months of water rationing will end when the system is proved sound.

Contractor Triple L Utilities of Dumas has been putting the

inch-thick 16-inch pipe under 150 pounds of pressure six miles west from the wellfield, under South Hwy. 208 and north a half-mile to the Wallace Center water tower.

The tower will feed the towers north of 17th Street in north C-City.

"We found a leak last week between the top of the hill and the wellfield, about a half-mile

west, where a housing had slipped loose -- found it and fixed it," Shutt said.

"Then we kept it under pressure for three hours and had a leak right at the end of the test at the Wallace tower Monday afternoon. I'm going to test it for five or six hours Wednesday, and we may turn it on Thursday or Friday.

"We'll leave it in place for a

day or two to make sure there are no more problems, and then rationing will be ended."

He said the pipeline will normally carry only 60 to 70 pounds of pressure, so the testing is a severe gauge of what it can handle.

The city is also testing the well water for bacteria and other contaminants, which it does

## Remodeling discussed by hospital board

Mitchell County Hospital Board members last week discussed the feasibility of remodeling and enlarging the hospital's emergency room.

In a discussion that was accidentally deleted from the CCR's account of the Tuesday, Sept. 28, meeting, board member Corky Houston said he had come to view the hospital's small emergency room as one of its worst problems.

"I want to think about an

emergency room," he said. "I talked to some people who are involved in it, and they need a big one -- bad."

"How much of our total problems will that solve?" asked Board President Kent Boyd.

"It will solve a bunch of them," said Houston, adding that he wants the board to seek input from architects and local physicians about such a pro-

## Prison term is assessed in bank embezzlement

Scott Gassiot, former vice president and cashier of Snyder National Bank, was sentenced last Friday morning to 27 months in a federal prison for embezzling more than \$400,000 from the bank over a five-year period.

Federal Judge Sam Cummings said Gassiot must report to an unnamed federal prison by 2 p.m. on Oct. 22.

Gassiot must also forfeit two pieces of property in Colorado City that were purchased with the funds, and make restitution to the bank's bonding company in the amount of \$407,689.50. He was also ordered to make restitution to Snyder National Bank in the amount of \$20,000.

Gassiot took the stand in his behalf Friday morning and told U.S. Attorney Steve Sucusy that he did not feel that he abused his position of trust as an officer of the bank when he embezzled the money.

However, Judge Comings ruled that Gassiot did abuse his position of trust.

In defense strategy, Gassiot's attorney, public defender Helen Liggett, questioned whether it was just a matter of sloppy controls that Gassiot took advantage of when he took the money. Gassiot replied that it was.

Liggett also argued that outside audit firms did not do a proper job in auditing the

Showing its usual musical strength and some newfound marching ability, the Colorado High School Fightin' Wolves Band earned a "superior" rating at the Big Country Marching Festival Saturday at Wylie High School in Abilene.

The 94-member group scored "1's" for music and marching at the exhibition, which was a practice contest for the University Interscholastic League Regional Contest

Oct. 16 at Shotwell Stadium in Abilene.

Twenty-four schools from Classes 1-A through 5-A took part.

Co-Director Jincy Ross said Tuesday that the band has the fortunate ability to "turn it up a notch" for important performances.

"They have a very mature sound, and they just perform

extremely well when it's time to perform.

"Sometimes they're not so serious in rehearsal, but that's because they really turn it on when it's time.

"Their marching gets better every day. They're getting the idea now of marching in step and making the formations happen.

## Mrs. Bassham favors new hospital

Two things captured Marion Bassham's interest as a girl, and after more than 50 years in Colorado City and Mitchell County, the Spade Ranch and the county hospital are still primary concerns.

The 200-square-mile ranch in Mitchell, Sterling and Coke Counties has been in her family since 1889, and she fell in love with it when she and her family began visiting here in the 1930's.

Born Marion Chappell in New London, Conn., in 1918, she is the great-granddaughter of I. L. Ellwood -- a partner in

the company that made most of the barbed wire with which the Old West was divided into manageable ranch properties.

Her father, Frank H. Chappell Sr., and brother Frank Jr. were shipyard workers and sailors who often sailed around Long Island Sound and Fisher's Island.

Some of her earliest memories are of meeting the Polish and Italian men who worked in the shipyard, cleaning and repainting yachts and other vessels.

She visited here with increasing frequency after 1935 and

would ride out with the cowboys before dawn to spend all day on the range.

But she had a parallel interest in medicine and one day surprised her mother Jessie Jean "when I told her I wanted to go to nursing school."

She attended Fairfax Hall for Girls in Waynesboro, Va., and finished high school at a combination high school and junior college in Chevy Chase, Md., near Washington, D. C.

"It was when FDR was in office, and Eleanor Roosevelt would receive girls from the

## County tax notices delayed, assessor-collector tells court

The sending of annual property tax statements to Mitchell County taxpayers has been delayed, county commissioners were told Tuesday.

Tax Assessor-Collector Faye Lee reported at a 9 a.m. commissioners court meeting that programmers in her office had received tapes from the county appraisal district office and were "reformatting and converting" them in preparation for the statements to be mailed.

Ms. Lee said she did not know when they would be sent.

The statements were originally scheduled to be mailed by Oct. 1.

Other business in the called meeting, which lasted 17 minutes with all members present, included the appointment of Scurry County Sanitarian Bennie Marricle of Snyder to act as interim Mitchell County sanitarian.

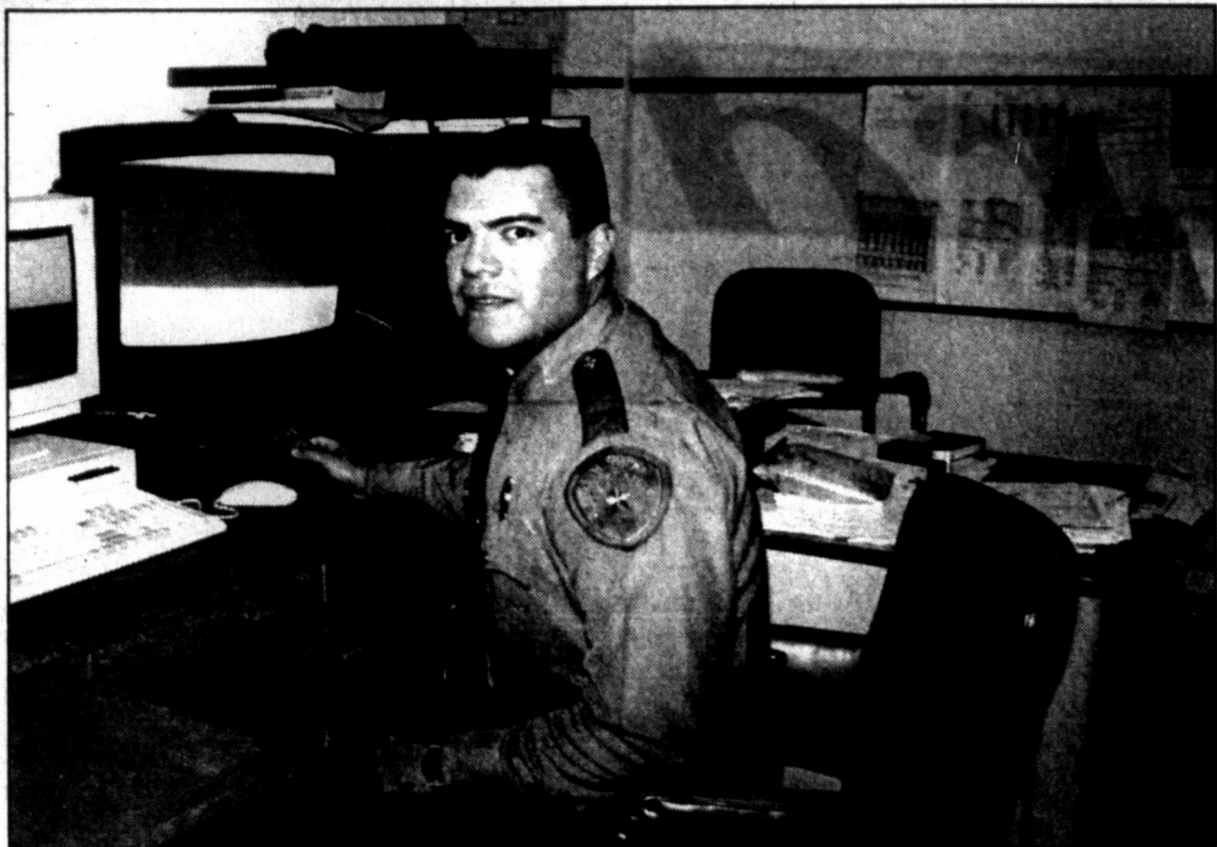
County Judge Ray Mayo

explained that Sanitarian Buz Rich had inadvertently let his state license expire but that he is in the process of getting it renewed.

When Rich's license is reinstated, Judge Mayo said, he will resume his duties, which primarily entail inspecting the installation of two or three septic systems per month.

The court voted to raise the inspection fee from \$115 to \$125.

## DA Edwards purchases new equipment for DPS troopers

Department of Public Safety troopers in Mitchell, Nolan and Fisher Counties are enjoying the novelty of having a public official with a more than adequate budget who wants to buy them law enforcement equipment.

District Attorney Mark Edwards of Sweetwater, whose 32nd Judicial District encompasses the counties, had been concerned for some time that the 12 troopers did not even have standard equipment like cellular telephones and beepers.

So he used \$10,687 to buy equipment from the \$500,000 he was given out of the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force's seizure of \$9.9 million in drug profits from an El Paso tractor-trailer rig east of Colorado City last April 13.

He bought a dual deck video display terminal, a computer, a window tint meter, cell phones and other long-needed equipment for C-City-based Troopers Shane Johnson, Donald Wilks, Carlos Diaz and Jeremy Usener.

Troopers Wilks and Johnson, the senior men here, prepared the "wish list" at Edwards' request.

Some of the troopers had cell phones they were paying for themselves, but the DA got free ones for everybody with the package service deal.

Only one Fisher County sheriff's deputy had a bullet proof vest, having bought it himself, so the DA purchased vests for that office.

The Mitchell County Sheriff's Office was also allocated \$500,000, and Sheriff Patrick Toombs has been mulling over bids for equipment that he and his three full-time deputies and reserve deputies need, including video cameras in each car.

Edwards is now in the process of buying beepers for all the troopers and a new computer for Texas Ranger Sgt. Johnny Billings of Snyder, fulfilling a pledge he made when the drug money was seized.

"Some of them have beepers, but they're paying for them out of their own pocket," he said Friday.

"They need cell phones because many times, they call me at the office or home from out on the interstate and ask how they should proceed."

"Obviously, they need bullet proof vests for protection, and with the new budget kicking in, they will get new vests."

Asked why the troopers had come up so short on equipment, Edwards said they are basically supplied by a combination of state appropriations and county funding from the commissioners courts and he does not know how the situation developed.

"I didn't get the same thing in each county," he said. "They were better supplied in Nolan County than they were in Mitchell."

Fisher County has one DPS trooper, Allan Armwine, and Nolan County seven -- Mark Negri, Todd Snyder, Scott Stevenson, Joe Lozano, E. J. Nunez, Jason Graham and Mike Ybarra, along with Sgt. Donald Graham.

## Builders of haunted house need volunteers, canned food

Pat Crow's haunted house at PJ's Wrecker Service at 1529 East Hwy. 80 was the talk of the town last Halloween, when more than 700 people tremulously made their way through it.

So here's the news: it's going to be even scarier this year.

Asked what the "features" will be, Crow said, "We don't tell. They'll learn at the end."

"Some of it's pretty gruesome. There's a man cut in two -- a real person. It looks really good."

"It's just kind of visual effects -- nothing to hurt anybody."

Crow and his family and friends will start work in the big garage building Saturday and be busy each weekend this month to construct the Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Oct. 28-30, Halloween attraction.

Admission was \$1 a person last year, when \$600 was raised for the Community Mission at 244 Chestnut St.

That will increase to \$2 for adults and \$1.50 for children under age 12 this time with 50 cents to be taken off the admission if you bring a can of food.

Crow seeks donations of old sheets or clothes, money, lumber, sheetrock, plywood and food for the 20 to 25 people who will work there each night.

He may be reached at 728-2737 at work or 2345 at home.

"If anyone wants to donate anything, we'll be more than happy to come pick it up because we need lots of stuff," he said Monday night.

"We used to do it on a small basis years back. We've got a big shop, and we don't use the back."

"It's to benefit the mission. They need it. It's getting pretty sad over there."

"If we just get a quarter of them who bring food, we'll get over 200 cans, which is a lot of food. Food is better than money in the long run."

He explained that canned food is needed for the mission and ready to eat food, drinks and snacks for the haunted house operators.

"It cost us enormously last

year, and we have a lot of stuff this year," Crow said.

"We're going to make it better."

He said anyone who wishes may take part in the construction over the next three weekends.

The plastic walls that were used last year will be replaced with sheetrock this time to avoid the possibility that someone might fall through them, he said.

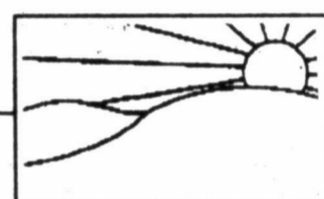

schools," she said. "So we'd go have tea with Eleanor Roosevelt."

She studied nursing for three years at a hospital in New London, the Yale Hospital for Communicable Diseases, affiliated with Yale University in New Haven, Conn., and the Connecticut State Hospital for people with mental problems.

She married Randerbrook Spade Ranch cowboy Byron Demont "Dee" Bassham in 1946 when he returned from military service in World War II.

Mrs. Bassham stayed home with their children for 10 years before putting her professional training to use at Root Memorial Hospital, a forerunner of Mitchell County Hospital.

She worked as a registered nurse for 20 years before having to resign because she had been elected to the hospital board.

She also served on the city council and was C-City's first lady mayor.

She and her husband and children, Frank, Brian and Ida Jean, lived near the hospital at 14th and Elm Streets, and she sometimes enjoyed walking to work.

Frank, 52, took to the cowboy's life and still works at the ranch. Brian, 46, lives in C-City and Ida Jean, 40, married T. J. Goss and lives at Nacogdoches.

Dee Bassham died in April 1971. Mrs. Bassham has 11 grandchildren.

Her brother worked at the ranch and took part in its management before and after World War II.

He then lived in Lubbock for 20 years, helping also to manage Ellwood Spade farm and ranch property west of Lubbock, and retired to Waterford, Conn., in the early 1970's.

"Some of the happiest years of my life were when I was working for the hospital," Mrs. Bassham said in an inter-

view last Friday at her home at 898 E. Eighth St.

"I was not interested in medicine so much as I was in helping people who needed to be helped. I met all kinds of people, all kinds."

"I have always been a person who wants to be a helper and wants to be needed. My ambition would always be to be needed by somebody."

She has closely followed the public discussions this year about building a new hospital, and she has these opinions:

-- A new hospital should be constructed because the old one has been added onto too many times and is worn out and awkwardly arranged;

-- A \$10 million plan to build a hospital, doctors' offices, nursing home, specialty clinic, home health agency and other facilities is too ambitious and should be pared down to just a new hospital and doctors' offices;

-- And the Texas Department of Criminal Justice's interest in remodeling the old hospital and converting it into a geriatric center for aging inmates is attractive, although the concerns of neighbors and Kelley Elementary School parents and administrators should be considered.

"If you have an old car and you keep fiddling around with it, eventually you decide this is not worthwhile and I need a new car," she said.

The proposal to build everything the district needs with revenue bonds "is an elegant plan," she said, but probably beyond the district's financial ability.

"Since somebody has donated the land that is apparently big enough to accommodate all these things, I was just wondering if it would make sense to build what we need most first."

She referred to the square 20-acre tract the state has donated to the district north of the Wallace-Ware Unit prisons west of town on the south side of Interstate 20.

A second plan to build just a new hospital and doctors' offices would be financed with a \$7 million revenue bond issue.

Mrs. Bassham said the hospital emergency room is too far from the laboratory and X-ray departments and constant remodeling over the years has created so many different levels that the building "is just one little hill after another."

She had been at the hospital long enough in 1969 to take it upon herself to organize its auxiliary, or "Pink Ladies,"

without telling highly conservative administrator Charles Root until after the fact.

Her co-conspirators included Edna Pace, Versie McMullan, Josie Carter and Bonnie Farrar, the current president.

Root voiced surprise but no objection when told of its existence.

Mrs. Bassham is proud, and a little amazed, that the group has contributed more than \$260,000 for hospital equipment and nursing scholarships in the past 30 years, along with working tens of thousands of volunteer hours.

"You can't have any kind of quality of life in a town the size of Colorado City without a good hospital," she said.

"Things happen. You need help in a hurry, and going to Snyder or Big Spring would be a hassle for a lot of people."

routinely each month with the Lake Colorado City water that the well water will replace.

Shutt said the five wells in the east field will supply a million to 1.2 million gallons of water a day, which will be adequate for the city's wintertime demands.

Lake water will be used in the summertime with an expected ratio of two-thirds to three-quarters well water.

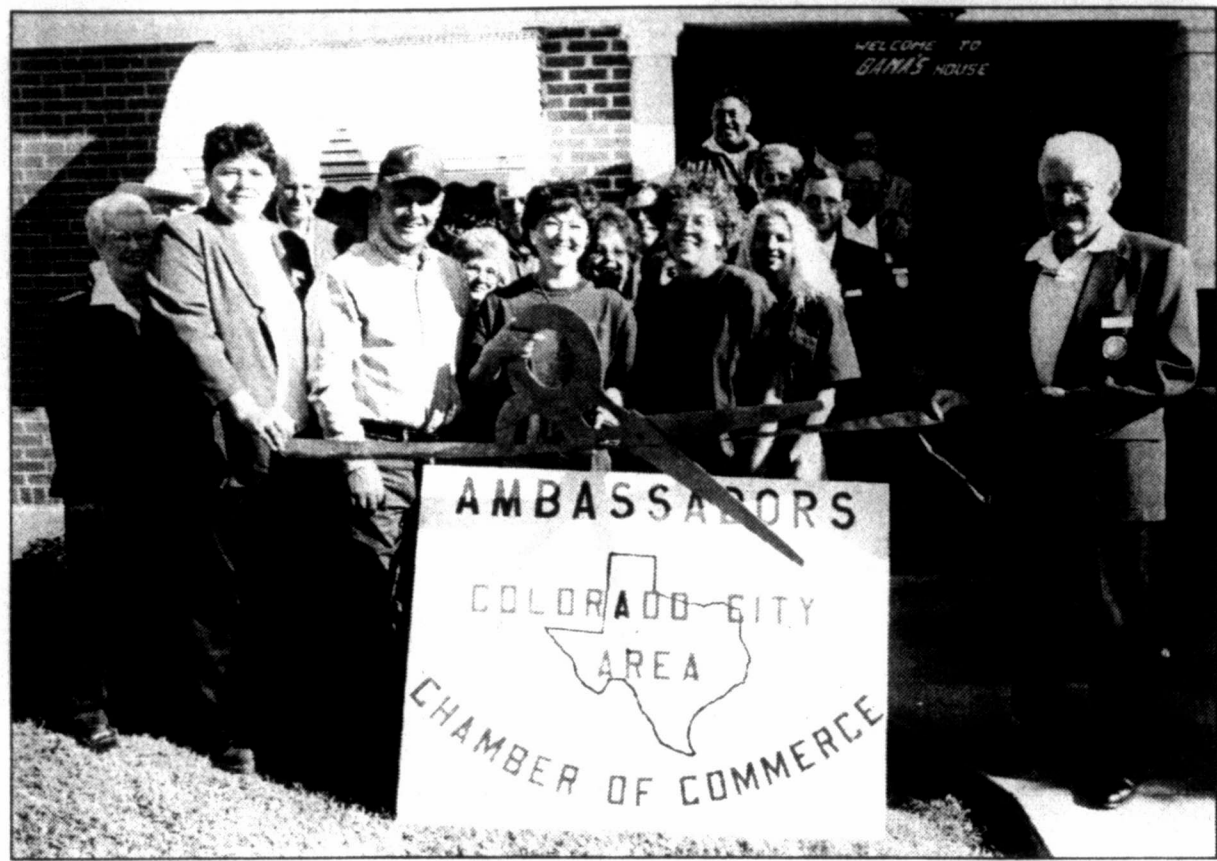

ject. "If we built a new emergency room, we would end up in a full-fledged remodeling job," board member Kenneth Beasley said.

"I don't want to spend as much on remodeling as we would spend on a new hospital."

Board members Houston, Beasley, Lee Roy Miller Jr. and Dale Geiger have been opposed to considering revenue

bond issuances of \$7 million or \$10 million to build a new hospital, doctors' offices and possibly other facilities.

Boyd, Kenneth Rogers and Larry DeBusk support such an initiative.

Saying the board is "to the point where we have to make some decisions one way or another," Boyd won the other

members' assent to appoint committees at the board's Oct. 26 meeting to develop recommendations on what course the hospital should take.

He said one of the committees will consider the financial aspects of the hospital district's future.

Two board members who favored building a new hospital with revenue bonds, Tom Carlock and Shirley Clifton, were defeated for re-election last spring.

Boyd and Rogers were re-elected while Miller and Houston won first terms.

Geiger, Beasley and DeBusk will be up for reelection to two-year terms next May.

The State of Texas has donated a square 20-acre tract of land north of the Wallace and Ware Unit prisons to the hospital district for it to use if it decides to construct a new building to replace the current one at 1543 Chestnut, which was built in 1927.

## American Cancer Society to remind women of checkups

Members of the Mitchell County Chapter of the American Cancer Society will call women on Fridays throughout this month to remind them of the wisdom of having periodic mammograms.

In observance of Breast Cancer Awareness Month, they have put up pink wreaths at the county hospital, Family Medical Associates at 505 Chestnut St., the Loraine Senior Citizens Center and the Westbrook Post Office.

The hospital district's Specialty Clinic at 441 Walnut St. will stay open until 8 p.m. every Wednesday this month to accommodate working women.

Technician Sandy Smith will do mammograms for the bargain rate of \$60 each -- a decrease from the regular fee of \$78.

You may schedule an examination by calling Ms. Smith at the clinic at 728-5108.

The fee includes having the mammogram read by a radiologist and filing for Medicare, Medicaid and other insurance benefits.

Denise Crawford, local Cancer Society president, said Friday that many women do not know the importance of getting regular checkups.

"A lot of people just kind of let it slide," she said.

"You need to have it done yearly after age 40 unless you have a high risk familial history. Then you need to consult your doctor.

"The risk of breast cancer does increase after you get older."

Between ages 20 and 39, women should have a clinical examination by a doctor every three years and do monthly self exams.

Cancer Society volunteers'

weekly "Tell a Friend" telephone campaign is designed "to make sure they know the criteria and get mammograms done routinely," Ms. Crawford said.

# Autumn twilight evocative

I have always thought that Autumn is the best season. The summer heat gives way to cool weather, the leaves fall and winter is in the air. The nights are chilly and the days are cool, and the season is evocative of many things, life, love, the import of the day and the textures of the past.

Autumn is an extended twilight when the edges of things are vaguely defined, a dreamy interlude.

I like winter more than summer, so the prospect of winter is more pleasing than the certainty of summer in the spring.

I have three subjects to write about this week -- somewhat disparate and yet related.

They are Casey Merket, Jeremy Everett and Los Dias de los Muertos -- "The Days of the Dead."

The Grace Museum at 102 Cypress St. in Abilene is having a program on "Our Saints Among Us: 400 Years of Southwestern Devotional Art" at 7 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 7.

An art exhibit will be there through Nov. 7.

Los Dias de los Muertos are an important part of Mexican culture, observed annually Oct. 31 through Nov. 2.

"It is believed that on these two days, the dead have permission to leave the afterworld and visit friends and relatives on earth to be sure they have not been forgotten and that all is well with their families," says Stephanie O'Banion at the museum.

You probably saw the Edgar Guest poem dedicated to Casey Merket in last week's paper.

I intend to do a story about him because everyone says he was a swell guy and the Boer Goat Cookoff was started in 1994, the year he died in an airplane accident, as a way of remembering him.

The cookoff was suggested by a good friend of Casey's, Don Bennett of Loraine.

We just ran the story about Jeremy Everett of Kermit and Colorado City, who suffered from chronic diabetes and succumbed on Sept. 22 as he drove toward Snyder.

Both were young, Casey 32 and Jeremy 18.

In his photograph, Casey looks like one of those friendly, robust fellows who is too exuberant to have any time for negativity.

According to Mike Everett of Kermit, Jeremy's father, Jeremy was the same type.

"Jeremy loved friends, family, horses, classic cars, hunting and fishing," Mike said in a note to the CCR.

"He ran the good race. He fought the good fight. He has gone to a place where he will never be sick again."

## The Bass Performance Hall

One Saturday morning in Fort Worth we took a friend's advice and went to the Bass Performance Hall for a tour. We took the elevator tour, which begins at the top and works down. When I stepped through the door to the upper gallery and looked down at the scene below, it literally took my breath away. It was the same reaction I had when I saw La Scala in Milan.



The multipurpose concert theater, built in the classical European opera house style, opened in May of 1998. It is home to the Fort Worth Symphony, the Fort Worth/Dallas Ballet, Fort Worth Opera and the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition and Concert Series.

The 2,056-seat Bass Performance Hall is called the crown jewel of one of the most successful downtown renovations in the country. Located in the center of Fort Worth's historic Sundance Square, the hall was built at a cost of 71 million dollars, all private money donated by more than five thousand people. The hall enjoys a 10 million dollar capital reserve endowment fund to maintain and preserve the facility for generations.

Limestone angels, 48 feet tall, holding long gold trumpets, are mounted on the Grand facade. The angel motif is carried throughout the building in light fixtures and paintings. The angels were carved by Marton Varo of California.

Every aspect of architect David M. Schwarz's design focuses on superb acoustics, clear sight lines and ambiance on a level with the great halls of Europe and America. The audience chamber features six levels arranged in successive horseshoe-shaped tiers and includes two piano boxes, unique to the Bass. The seats are covered in Texas mohair. Ceilings of entry lobbies are painted in murals of dramatic skies (morning in the east dome, evening in the west). The Bass has been called one of the top ten opera houses in the world.

Audiences hear no doors opening or closing. Each box or balcony entrance has an ante room to muffle the sound. Masonry, wood, draperies and wall coverings were all installed with sound in mind. Sound equipment is state of the art. To keep patrons from coughing, trays of wrapped cough drops are located at each audience entrance.

Two huge contributions, 18 million from the Sid Richardson Foundation and 10 million from the Burnett Foundation, helped get the construction of the hall off to a healthy start. Nancy Lee and Perry R. Bass, for whom the hall is named, donated the land for the building. The hall is a project of Ed Bass, who named the hall for his parents. Perry Bass is the nephew of the legendary Texas oilman Sid Richardson.

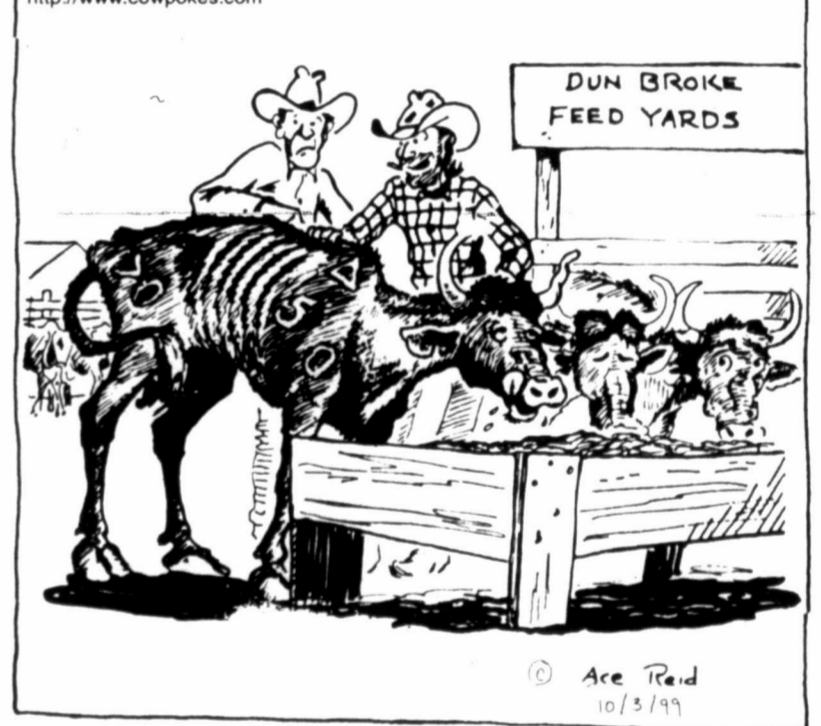
Architect Schwarz designed The Ballpark in Arlington and the American Airlines Center, under construction now and soon to be the new home of the Dallas Mavericks and Stars. The 48 year old Yale-trained architect also designed Sundance Square, office buildings and apartment houses in downtown Fort Worth.

The free Saturday morning tour includes a view of the ladies' restroom in the main lobby area. It has the longest line of stalls to be found anywhere and looks like a mirrored reflection, but the row of doors is the real thing.

### Substance Abuse Trends

In response to a growing concern among parents, educators and other members of the community, the Colorado City Record, in cooperation with Al-Anon support groups and the Snyder Area Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, is devoting this column to questions about the increasing threat of substance abuse.

#### Troubled Teens Risk Rapid Dependence on Marijuana

Marijuana use by teenagers who have prior serious antisocial problems can quickly lead to dependence on the drug, according to a recent study by researchers at the Addiction Research and Treatment Service, University of Colorado School of Medicine. The study, published in the Journal of Drug and Alcohol Dependence, also found that, for troubled teens using tobacco, alcohol and marijuana, the progression from the first use of marijuana to regular use was more rapid than the progressions to regular use for alcohol and about the same as that for nicotine.

Dr. Thomas Crowley of CU said more than two-thirds of teens referred to his drug treatment and study program by social or criminal justice agencies complained of withdrawal symptoms when they stopped using marijuana.

"I want to emphasize that this is a group of kids in treatment for substance problems. This is not your average kid in a sophomore class," Crowley, a psychiatrist, said. "Nevertheless, cannabis makes big troubles in the lives of some people who are very troubled."

A team of researchers at the CU-based Addiction Research and Treatment Service interviewed and examined 165 boys and 64 girls aged 13 to 19. More than 80 percent of the boys and 60 percent of the girls were clinically dependent on marijuana. Researchers used the official criteria of chemical dependency as defined by the American Psychiatric Association - including the development of tolerance, development of withdrawal symptoms, and continued use well after the person realizes it causes problems.

Ninety-seven percent of the teens in the study said they continued to use marijuana even after they realized it had become a problem for them. Eighty-five percent admitted their habit interfered with driving, school, work, personal relationships, and home life.

"The withdrawal symptom that these kids complained of were tiredness, sleepiness, weakness, trouble concentrating, yawning, changes in appetite and psychological depression," Crowley said. "In addition, 25 percent of the kids said they used cannabis to relieve withdrawal symptoms."

Most said their problems started before they started using marijuana. A high percentage of the youths in the Colorado study came from disrupted homes or from situations where the parents were emotionally disturbed or were themselves using substances. Many of the teens were involved with the criminal justice system prior to the study.

There are about 825,000 juveniles arrested and sent to court each year in the United States. Crowley said about half those kids had marijuana in their urine at the time of arrest. There could be a physical basis for marijuana dependence. Scientists have identified a brain receptor - a place where chemicals hook onto brain cells - that specifically responds to THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, and also responds to a chemical known as anandamide. The role of anandamide in the brain is not known, but the chemical is also found in chocolate. "There clearly is a biology behind this," Crowley said. "What its purpose is there in the brain, we don't yet have a very good idea." He believes there could be an as yet unexplored genetic factor.

Alcoholism, which has a known genetic component, was very common in the teenagers' families. "This is a population that is very vulnerable to substance problems," Crowley says.

# TXU puts plants on sale block

TXU Electric, a wholly owned subsidiary of TXU, announced recently that it will offer for sale six of its natural gas-fired electric generating plants in Texas.

The plants being offered for sale are Mountain Creek and Parkdale in Dallas, North Main in Fort Worth, Lake Creek and Tradinghouse near Waco, and Rivercrest outside of Mount Pleasant.

With 3,116 megawatts of capacity, the plants make up about 15 percent of TXU's generating capacity in Texas. They consist of 14 gas-fired units, three diesel generators and all associated generating assets, including land, lakes, water rights, air permits, emission allowances and fuel transportation contracts.

The sale will allow purchasers to bid on an individual plant or any combination of plants. Individual units within a plant will not be offered separately.

TXU believes these plants will be attractive to potential purchasers and that they will bring a very good price. These

plants compose a competitive, efficient portfolio of base, intermediate and peaking capacity.

They are currently operational and have skilled personnel, excellent locations on the transmission grid, water rights and air permits, and access to natural gas fuel markets.

Texas is recognized as a very attractive market in which to operate when competition begins, and many entities are expressing interest in owning generating facilities in the state.

The sale will allow TXU to benefit from this interest and still maintain a strong competitive position in the Texas market. The sale provides additional flexibility for TXU to

manage its portfolio of generation assets in the future.

Electric service reliability, a TXU priority, will be maintained. TXU will replace the plants' energy, when needed, by purchasing power in the wholesale market. Since the plants are likely to remain in operation under new owner-

ship, their sale will not affect electricity supply and demand in Texas.

TXU expects that the 126 employees assigned to these plants will continue operating them after the sale. The Texas electric industry restructure legislation requires that any plants sold be operated and maintained by the same operating personnel for at least two years if the sale is concluded before January 1, 2002.

The company plans to proceed with initiating the modifications required to meet new environmental standards and compliance deadlines required by the industry restructuring legislation.

TXU's financial advisor for

the sale is Merrill Lynch & Co. TXU expects to complete the sale by the end of 2000.

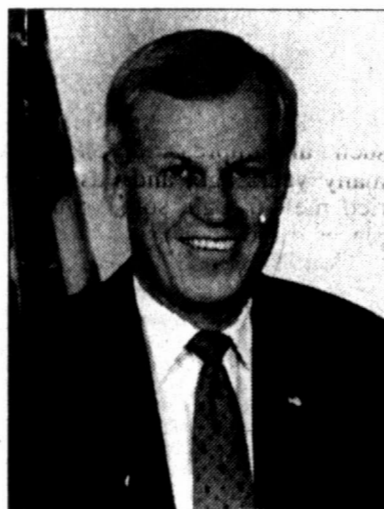

bank. Gassiot also testified that it was his daily job to balance the cash in the vaults, and he would just slip a stack of \$100 bills or other bills into his pockets.

The former bank officer said the fact that other bank employees trust him made it easier to conceal the missing money on a daily basis.

"I told them it was hard for someone who did not balance the vault daily to make it come out right. I could do it easily because I did it on a daily basis."

Gassiot also told the court that he reported false amounts daily on his regular cash reports.

Gassiot was indicted in March by a federal grand jury on the embezzlement charges and originally entered a plea of not guilty.

Gassiot, 38, had no prior criminal record.

Law enforcement authorities were summoned to Snyder National Bank on March 5 when bank personnel discovered a possible case of embezzlement. On the following Monday, Sheriff Darren Jackson and Texas Ranger John Billings were summoned back to the bank to yet another but unrelated case of embezzlement.

Gassiot testified this morning that he admitted taking money from the other case was discovered.

## NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this notice: September 26, 1999, in the *Colorado City Record*, published in Mitchell County.

1. Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869, has filed an application with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for a State permit to conduct weather-modification operations to change, or attempt to change, the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized herein below.

2. The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather-modification license that was originally issued in 1975 and has been renewed annually. The most recent license renewal was granted by the Commission on October 16, 1998 and expires on August 31, 1999. An application by the District for renewal of its license for 2000 was filed by the CRMWD on June 15, 1999 and is now being considered by the Commission.

3. The purpose of weather-modification operations is to increase rainfall to affect the inflow of fresh water into the J.B. Thomas and E.V. Spence reservoirs located in Borden, Coke, and Scurry Counties of Texas. The requested period of the permit is four years from the date of issuance by the TNRCC.

4. The proposed weather-modification operation is to be conducted by and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.

5. The proposed weather-modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area". The operational area is that area described by being between an outer boundary, defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather-modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, in Howard County, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84, thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, southerly to Robert Lee, in Coke County; thence, westerly to Highway 87 at a point approximately thirteen miles northwest of Sterling City, in Sterling County; and thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas. That is, the target area includes all or part of Howard, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Nolan, Mitchell, Coke and Sterling Counties.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation include a licensed meteorologist who will select cumuliform or other appropriate clouds for seeding, using a weather-radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, surface weather observations, and pilot reports. The licensed meteorologist will direct one or more aircraft equipped with flare racks or generators to dispense either glaciogenic or hygroscopic seeding material into the updraft portions of selected clouds to perform seeding operations.

8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact George Bomar, MC-160, TNRCC, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087, (512) 239-0770.

9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087. The petition must contain (1) the signature, full name, address and phone number of each person requesting the hearing; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the last date the Notice of Intention is published in week one of the mandatory three-week period required by 289.17 (j) of Commission rules. If at least 25 eligible persons make written request, the Commission shall hold a public hearing on an application prior to issuance of a permit.

## COOK'S CORNER

Here are a few more recipes for Halloween that I thought would be good. Don't let the "scary" names bother you.

#### FINGER PIZZAS

1 red bell pepper  
12 sticks mozzarella  
8 small baked pizza crusts  
1 cup purchased pizza sauce  
Core, stem and seed pepper, cut lengthwise into 1" wide strips. Cut each strip crosswise into 1/2" pieces (fingernails). Round corners on one end of each piece.

Cut each cheese stick in half crosswise. On round end of each stick (finger) cut out a 1/2" square notch into which a pepper piece will fit to make a nail.

Lay crusts slightly apart on 3 baking sheets. Spread 2 T. sauce evenly over each crust. Lay 3 cheese fingers well apart on each crust. Fit a red pepper nail onto each. Bake in a 450° oven until cheese just begins to melt, about 8 minutes.

#### DOUBLE DELICIOUS HALLOWEEN BARS

1/2 cup margarine or butter  
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs

1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk  
1 pkg. (12 oz.) milk chocolate chips

1 cup peanut butter chips  
Preheat oven to 350° (325° for glass dish). In 13 x 9 inch baking pan, melt margarine in oven. Sprinkle crumbs evenly over margarine; pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over crumbs. Top with chips, press down firmly. Bake 25 to 30 minutes or until lightly browned.

#### CREEPY CRAWLY GELATIN

1 1/2 cup boiling water  
1 pkg. (8 serving size) orange flavored Jell-O

1 1/2 cups cold water  
Gummy worms  
Stir boiling water into gelatin in large bowl at least 2 minutes until completely dissolved. Stir in cold water.

Pour into 9 inch pie plate that has been sprayed with non-stick cooking spray. Refrigerate about 1 1/2 hours or until thickened (when a spoon drawn through leaves a definite impression). Push gummy worms into gelatin. Refrigerate 2 hours or until firm. Unmold by dipping pie plate in warm water about 15 seconds. Gently pull gelatin from around edge with moist fingers. Place moistened serving plate on top of pie plate. Invert pie plate and serving plate; holding plates together, shake slightly to loosen. Gently remove pie plate and center gelatin on serving plate. Garnish with additional gummy worms, if desired.

#### CANDIED APPLES

2 cups granulated sugar  
2 cups corn syrup  
1/3 cup cinnamon candy  
1 cup water  
3/4 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. vanilla  
1/4 tsp. cloves  
3/4 tsp. red food coloring  
6 med. apples.

Remove stems from apples, wash and pat dry. Insert a wooden skewer in each apple, running through the apple from stem end to base without protruding all the way through the bottom end. Combine sugar, corn syrup, cinnamon candies, and water in medium-sized saucepan. Cook until candies dissolve, stirring constantly. Be careful not to boil. Add cinnamon, vanilla, cloves, and food coloring. Mix thoroughly. Boil mixture to 300°, remove it from heat and quickly dip each apple - one by one - into the mixture until it is thoroughly coated. Set coated apples, standing on their bottoms with skewer pointing up, on baking sheet until mixture hardens.

Let apples reach room temperature before eating.

#### BLACK WIDOW SNACK CAKES

1 pkg. Devil's food cake mix  
Vegetable cooking spray  
4 cups powdered sugar, sifted  
5 to 7 Tbsp. milk

1 cup powdered sugar, sifted  
1/4 cup unsweetened cocoa  
2 Tbsp. milk  
Plastic spiders  
Prepare cake as directed on package. Pour into 2 - 8" square aluminum foil pans coated with cooking spray; bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes or until tested done. Cool in pans on wire racks. Combine 4 cups powdered sugar and 5-7 tablespoons milk in a large bowl; spread a thin layer evenly over each cake. Combine 1 cup powdered sugar, cocoa and 2 tablespoons milk; spoon into a small zip-lock bag. Close bag securely and snip a tiny hole in bottom corner of bag. Carefully pipe concentric circles onto each cake. Pipe straight lines at intervals from the inner circle through the outside circle.

## NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

1. All applicants must complete an application for assistance. Supporting documentation must also be supplied upon request.

3. Income eligibility will be subject to current indigent income guidelines as noted in the CICHM Manual.
4. Ineligibility for other health programs (i.e. Medicaid, Texas Rehabilitation Commission, etc.) must be presented in writing.
5. Applicants will be notified of additional items needed to determine indigent status. If required information is not provided within fourteen (14) days, the application will be denied.
6. A supplemental authorization to verify eligibility must be signed by the applicant.
7. On request of an applicant, a Hospital District employee shall assist an applicant in the completion of forms. Each applicant will be informed of the availability of assistance.
8. The Hospital District will require the applicant to sign a written statement in which the applicant swears to the truth of the information supplied.
9. The Hospital District shall provide a process for reviewing application and allowing applicants to appeal a denial of assistance. An appeal may be requested within thirty (30) days of receipt of a written denial. A form noting the availability of the appeals process shall accompany each denial. Appeals may be offered to the Governing Body of the Hospital District at the next scheduled meeting of the board following notification of intent to appeal.
10. The Hospital District shall maintain the records relating to each application for at least three (3) years after the date on which the application was submitted.

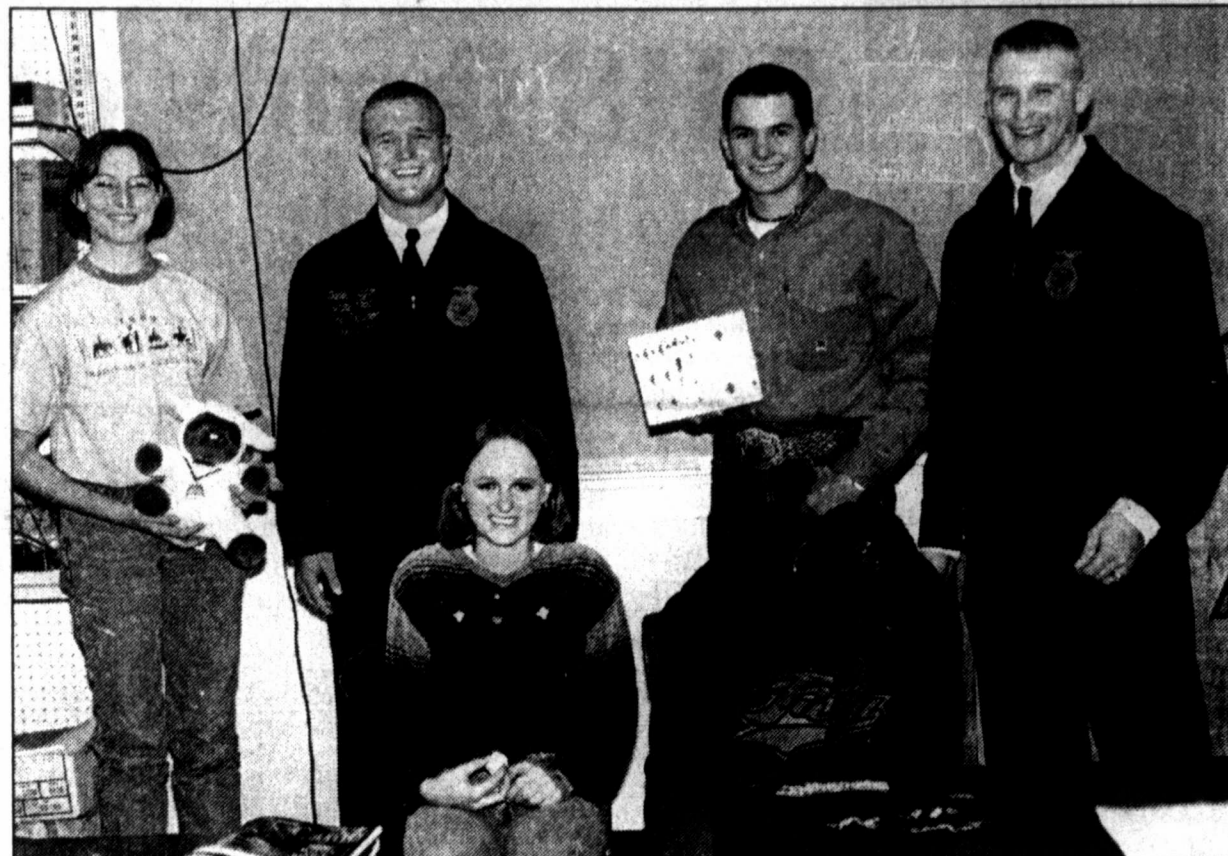

Though this is his first year at the helm, Coach Garcia feels that the season's success has boosted the kids' faith in him.

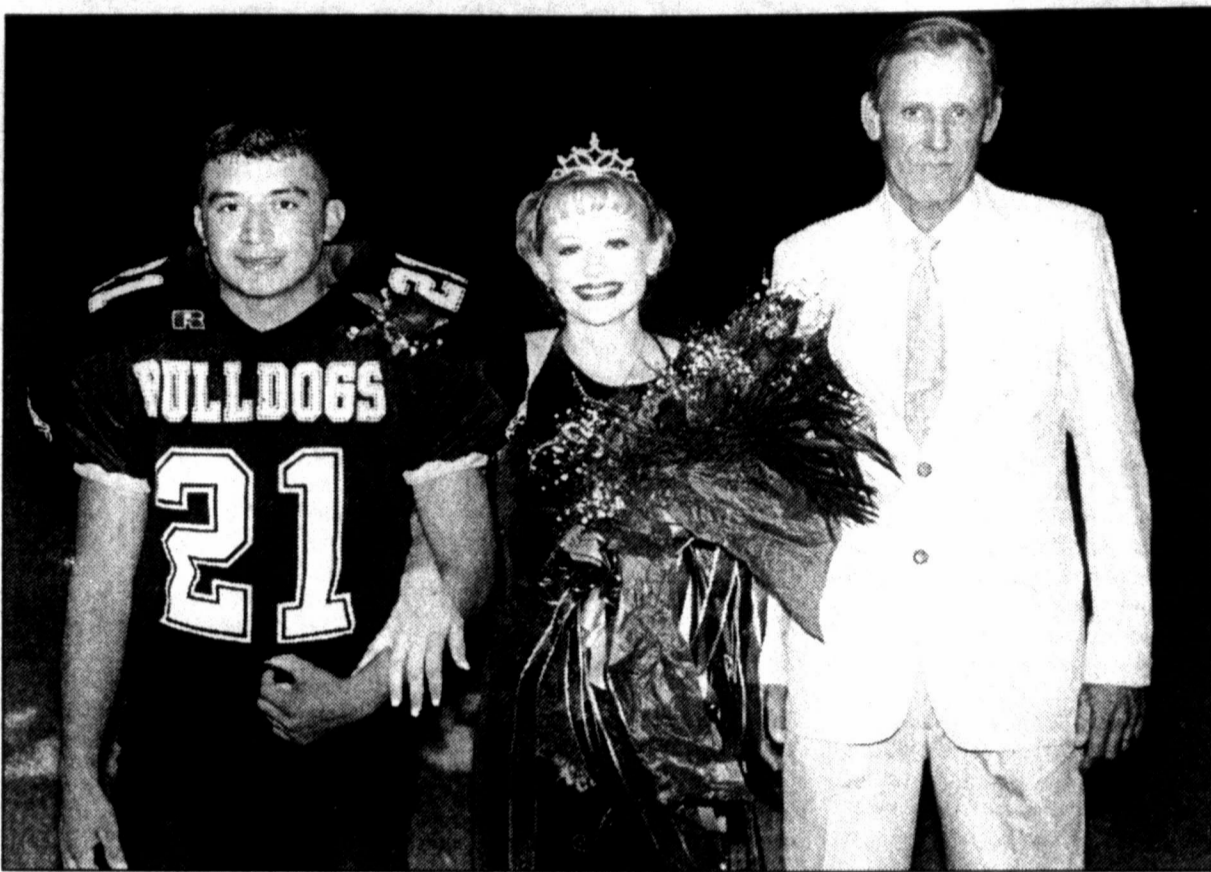
However, like the chicken and the egg, which came first?
