'39 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

The 1939 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Mitchell County last fall, counted 617 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Total land in farms was 693,477 acres. The average size of farms was 1,123.9 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$37,167.

Of the county's farm operators, 190 owned their farms, 162 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 261 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm in the county was 50.4 years. There were 86 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 617 farms in the county, 543 were commercial farms.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1934.

FARMERS ADDING BURS TO FIELDS TO CONSERVE SOIL AND WATER

Many fields in Mitchell County are beginning to turn white with cotton burs. The farmers, applying the burs, know that cotton plants, after the leaves have dried and blown away, add very little residue back to the soil and the thin stalks offer little resistance to the high winds of winter and springtime.

There are several advantages to be obtained by applying burs. They conserve moisture by reducing runoff and evaporation and help prevent crusting and compaction of the soil by breaking up the force of the raindrop. Burs help to maintain the organic matter level in the soil, and thus improve the physical, chemical and biological condition of the soil.

Wind erosion is also controlled to a certain extent, depending on the amount of burs applied. The burs should be applied at the rate of at least 3 tons per acre and spread evenly over the surface of the soil.

Under irrigation, more benefit is obtained by adding 10 lbs. of nitrogen per 100 lbs. of burs to the residues, thus making them a soil improving crop.

The majority of the gins of the county are equipped to haul burs. Ginners should be contacted for complete information.

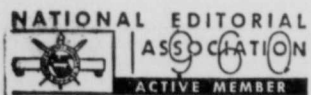

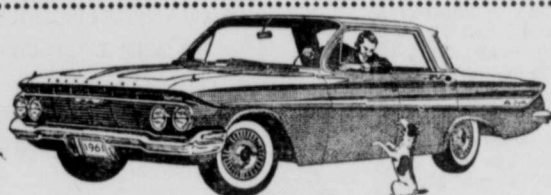
