## Home Delivery Mail Service To Be Available In Hart

Postmaster Jewel Brooks said today that a new order from Postmaster General Winton M. Blount will mean substantial improvements in mail delivery services.

The new order will make home delivery services available for the first time to four million Americans.

The service improvement applies to persons served out of 18,700 first, second and third class post offices over the country that do not have city delivery services. Affected are those postal customers living more than a quarter mile away from these offices and less than half a mile away. Persons living less than half a mile away previously had not been provided this service.

"To get the new service," Mrs. Brooks said "It is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmasters to provide it, and a majority of those to be served must want the home service."

Under Blount's order, those persons living less than a quarter mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at these offices. That area,

the postmaster noted, is just a few blocks.

This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where large numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties."

The expansion of services should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery service areas - under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommend-

ations of local postmasters - by February 1, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery stops to already existing rural delivery routes or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural route for the purpose. A limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

## Vehicle Owners Reminded Of April 15 Deadline

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in three persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$4,140.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock DPS Region for January, 1970 shows a total of 460 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed, 183 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$648,408 as

compared to January, 1969 of 447 accidents resulting in 26 persons killed, 260 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$424,881.

The Sergeant reminded all motor vehicle owners that still have their inspection stickers on the lower right-hand side of their windshields that April 15 is the deadline for having the new sticker placed on the lower left-hand side of their windshields. The Sergeant also stated only about 33 per cent of the registered vehicles in the surrounding area have been inspected.

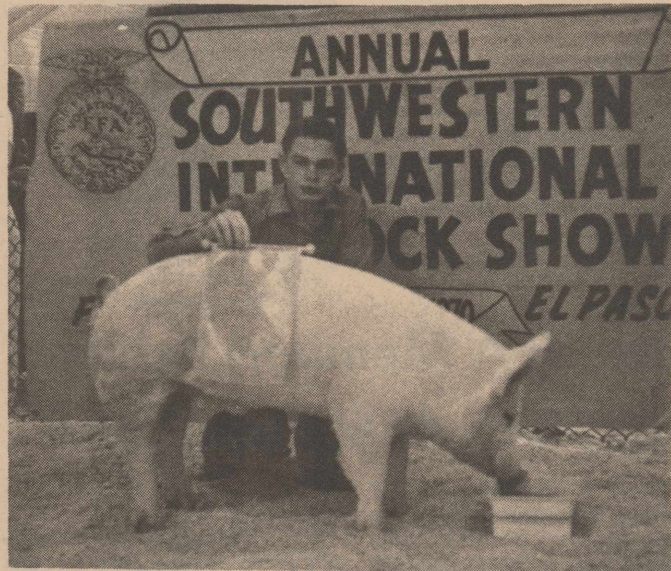

Is a bank obligated to pay on an oral order? The answer is no. While some banks have honored oral orders, this is not common practice. Banks are obligated to pay only on written orders.

Is a bank compelled to make partial payment on a check? A check wherein funds are insufficient to pay the amount in full? A bank is not compelled to make partial payment on an NSF check.

It is not unlawful to post-date a check.

Suppose the date of a check has been omitted. Does the holder have the right to insert a date? Yes. But it should be the date the check was issued. The "date of is-

sue" is considered to be the date check was delivered.

### SEVENTH LARGEST

The University of Texas System enrolled the seventh largest number of students among higher education systems in the U. S. during the 1969-70 fall semester. A survey released by the University of Cincinnati shows the UT System with a total enrollment of 64,572, including students enrolled in extension courses. The UT System also was in the seventh place the previous year. Systems with more students than the UT System are the State University of New York, 286,707; the California State Colleges, 265,537; the City University of New York, 167,302; University of California, 106,274; University of Minnesota, 70,234, and the University of Wisconsin, 68,109.

## Moments OF Meditation

"The greatest of these is love," I Cor. 13:13.  
"For God so loved the world ..." John 3:16.

If one were to attempt to select the greatest word in the entire Bible, I suppose that "LOVE" is the word we would choose, for love describes God in one word, and likewise describes man at his best.

First, we see that God's fundamental attribute is that of love. As early in the Old Testament as Deuteronomy, we read "The Lord did not set His love upon you, nor choose you, because ye were more in number than any people; for ye were the fewest of all people; but because the Lord loved you." (7:7-8a) With the coming of Christ and the example of true love which He portrayed we see the greatness of the Father's love. We know that God's love for man is individual and personal. Someone asks, "With all the millions of people on earth, how can God single ME out as His companion?" If we limit God to man-made space and time, this is, of course, hard to conceive. But God is not so limited, and those who have experienced-and daily experience-His companionship can testify that, it is a fact.

The love of God, reflected in and transmitted through man is unlike any other love. It is not a physical passion; nor is it simple concern, it is, indeed unique. It takes into consideration the fact that in our re-

### DOUBLE CHEESE BAKE

1 c. elbow macaroni  
1/4 c. butter  
1 c. soft bread crumbs

1 c. shredded cheddar cheese  
1/2 c. shredded Swiss cheese  
1/2 c. sliced ham  
3 eggs, well beaten  
1 T. minced onions  
1 T. chopped parsley  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1 1/2 c. milk, scalded  
Paprika

Cook macaroni according to package directions; drain. Add butter; toss until coated.

Add remaining ingredients except paprika; mix well. Turn into greased two quart casserole. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 325 degrees 40 to 50 minutes. Makes 6 to 7 servings.

### ICE BOX CAKE

1 can of Eagle Brand Milk  
Juice of 2 lemons  
1 c. or 1/2 pt. carton whipping cream  
1/3 c. sugar  
1 can pie cherries (no juice)  
1 c. pecans

Whip sugar and whipping cream. Fold in Eagle Brand Milk, and lemon juice. Then fold in cherries and pecans. Line pan or bowl with vanilla wafers or graham cracker crumbs. Save some crumbs for the top. Set in the ice box over night or until chilled till firm.

1/2 c. shortening  
2 squares chocolate (melted)  
vanilla  
nuts

Beat eggs, add sugar, put in flour, melted chocolate, shortening and add vanilla and nuts. Beat and put in greased pan. Bake in 350 degree oven.

## Accent on Health

Drugs! How many times have you heard the word?

Abuse! Just what does it mean?

Taken together "drug abuse" is probably one of the most talked-about topics in Texas and the nation today. The topic is attacked from various sides--law enforcement, morality, punishment. It is also attacked from another side--education.

It's this attack which has been launched by the Texas State Department of Health's Division of Public Health Education. The Department has long felt a very real concern about this growing menace to the total population because of its direct implications to public health.

About two years ago the Department became aware that a serious deficiency existed in the area of public health education concerning drug abuse. As the deficiency became increasingly apparent, and because of the Department's existing activity in registering wholesale drug outlets, the Division of Public Health Education began to accept requests for its participation in drug abuse programs in schools, teacher training programs, civic organizations, etc.

During this two year period, the Division has had instructors traveling to various parts of the state presenting an educational concept of drug abuse control.

To date, more than 500 such classes have been held with an audience of some 50,000 students.

The actual course consists of showing one of several films--ordinarily the film entitled "Marihuana", a "no preaching, tell-it-like-it-is" film. The film depicts a "pot party" being raided by the police. As each person is taken from the party to awaiting patrol cars, each expresses his or her

views about smoking marihuana and defends the use of it.

As the film progresses, however, each of these defenses is refuted with sound, proven evidence.

After the film has been shown, the program is opened to student participation through a question-and-answer period, and drug literature is distributed.

Although the course covers all drugs, marihuana and LSD seem uppermost in the minds of the students.

The whole idea of the education approach is to make the students think about the danger of drugs.

The State Legislature has now charged the Texas Education Agency with the responsibility of establishing a comprehensive drug abuse program for students in grades five through 12, assuring student exposure to the subject. The State Health Department now is shifting its emphasis to adult groups.

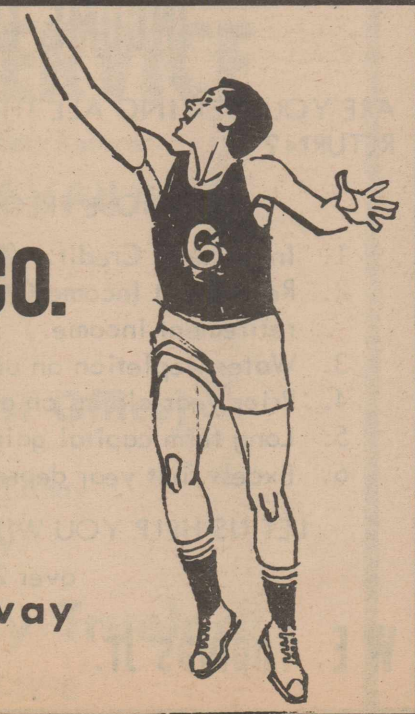

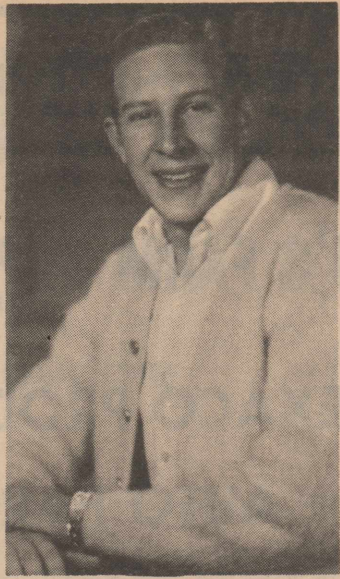
## Ricky Bennett Elected Prexy Of SPC Club

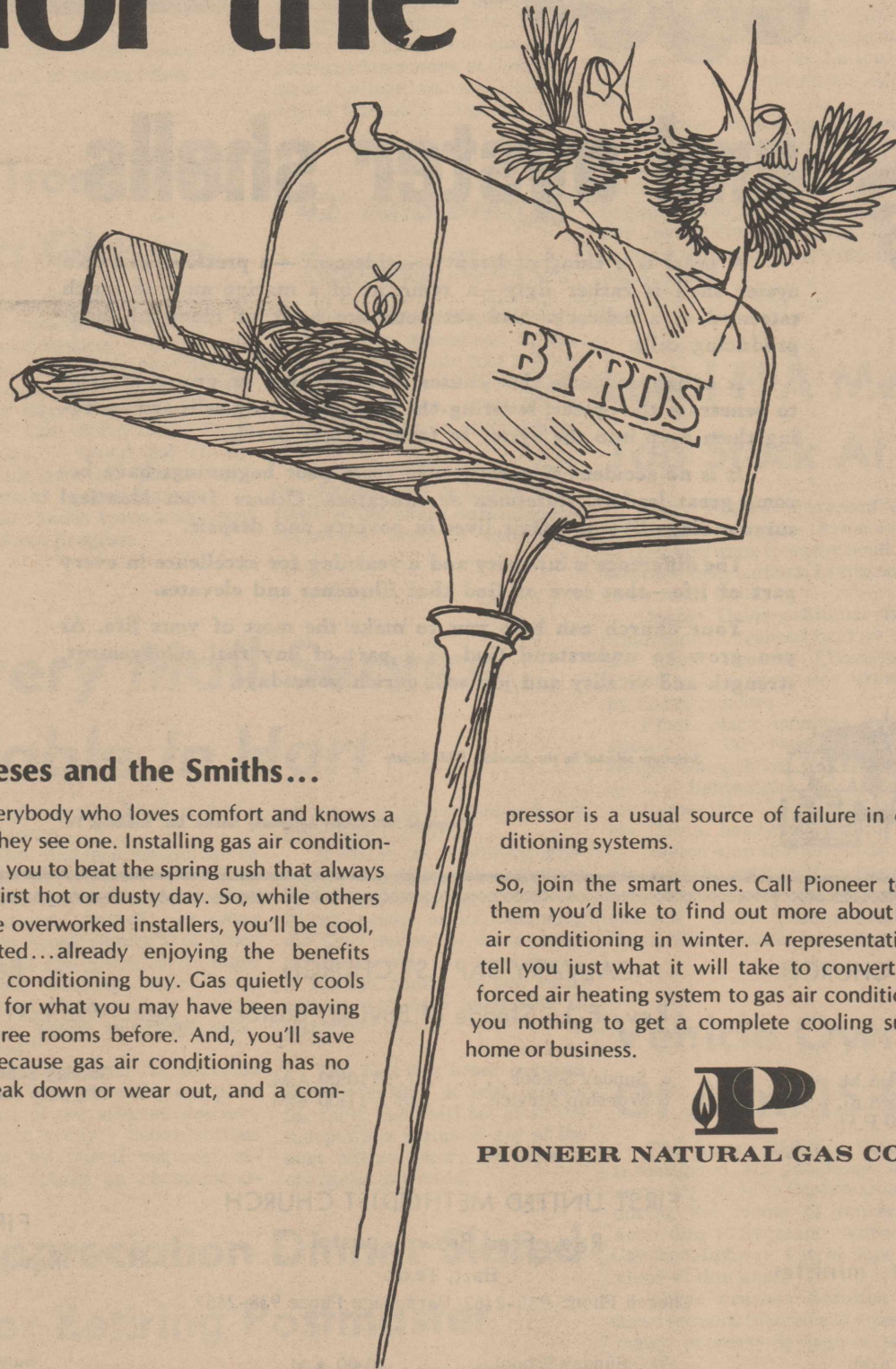

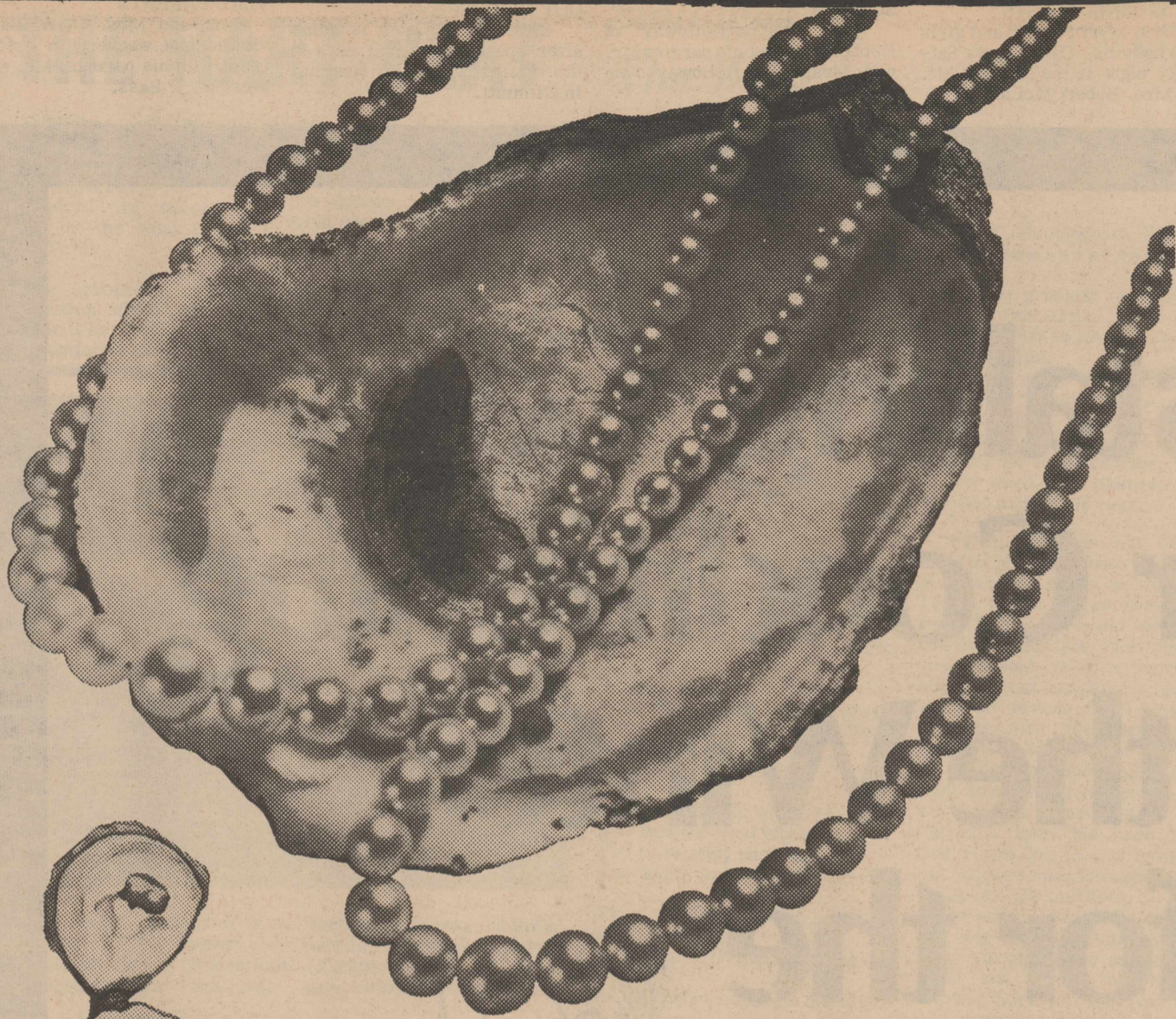
