Former Tech gridder finds joy in music ministry

When Richard Campbell steps onto the turf at Jones Stadium to sing the national anthem, he likes to think he makes at least a minor contribution to the athletic program that was a dominant part of his life in the late 1960s.

As a gospel singer who has been in full-time evangelism for the better part of 13 years, he says he cannot provide the kind of financial support that some alumni can contribute. But Campbell believes in Coach Jerry Moore and the future of the football program at Texas Tech University and he enjoys expressing his confidence by being a part of the pre-game activities whenever possible.

A defensive end, Campbell was named all conference in 1968 and 1969 and was a second team all-America selection in 1969. He played in the Hula Bowl and Coaches' All-America all-star games following his final season at Tech. Campbell was the first participating player ever to sing the national anthem preceding both the Hula Bowl and Coaches' All-America games.

Center stage has been the norm for Campbell for most of his life. Not only was he a high school and college football standout, he also was active in drama and musical comedy, lending his rich baritone voice to numerous local productions while he was a Tech student. He also performed at Six Flags Over Texas two summers.

THE MATADOR native first gained a measure of area recognition for his musical talents with a group of high school performers known as the Sourdough Singers. His football expertise brought him the attention of college recruiters.

"No school offered me money, but some made promises that even a boy from a Class B school

knew they couldn't keep, promises that I could be a starter for them as a sophomore," Campbell recalled. "Tech leveled with me and that's why I came to Tech."

But eventually the ball game is over. The stands are quiet. The acclaim is yesterday's fame and life stretches ahead for the athlete accustomed to attention and faced abruptly with reality.

"It's kind of like your god dies," Campbell said. "One percent or less of college players have a chance at the pros. But, I was ready to move on."

MOVING ON FOR Campbell meant going to the West Coast for a crack at the entertainment business. He had met "Doc" Severinsen's daughter while at Six Flags, and that contact gave him some audition opportunities, he said. But after a year in Southern California, he was disillusioned and decided to head back to Texas and enroll at Tech again to complete his course work.

Campbell says he became a Christian during a revival in Edmonson where he was leading the music in 1972. "I was a good Baptist until then, going to church on Sunday and doing what I wanted to the rest of the week," he said.

The conversion experience brought real changes, he recalled. For years he had depended on coaches to tell him what to do. "I was not a natural athlete. Football was hard and consumed all my time. When you get out, it can be a really shattering experience to make your own decisions."

He would never have envisioned himself as a gospel singer, he said, but, "It's the greatest thing that ever happened to me."

Campbell describes his style of Christian music as "easy listening" and admits that he is a little disturbed at what is happening in gospel music circles. The attempt to "cross over" into a

more secular style of music to please a secular audience is a fallacy, he believes.

AS FAR AS THE world is concerned, it (Christian music) won't be acceptable anyway," he said. "I'd rather stay with a strong message and melody center."

He also thinks a large percentage of those within the church are not having their music needs met when church musicians attempt to follow the trends in secular music.

"Christian rock has its place, but it's just not my cup of tea," he said.

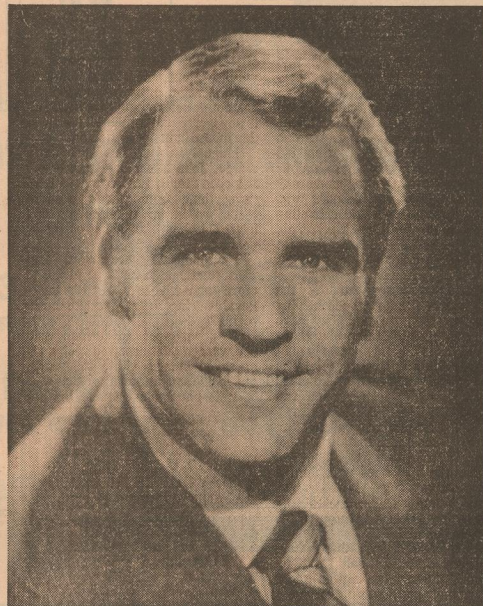
Although the star athlete role is far behind him and his stage is in the pulpit area of churches instead of on Broadway, Campbell notes that the gospel singer must be aware that there is a danger inherent in being seen as a performer.

"The music ministry is one of the hardest areas when it comes to walking in the Spirit," he said. "The tendency is to see the person instead of the message."

THE ITINERANT music evangelist still enjoys football as a spectator, but finds his work so rewarding that he says he wouldn't change a thing. He averages singing in about 20 revivals and performing between 20 and 25 concerts yearly. He also participates in one or two youth camps each year.

The majority of his engagements are booked outside Texas, he said. The Campbells moved back to Lubbock less than two years ago from Nacogdoches where he was associated with evangelist Rick Scarborough for five years.

"I can do what I do anywhere, but Lubbock is a great in-between place," he said. One of Lubbock's pluses for Campbell is the youth program at First Baptist Church, where he and his family are members. He and his wife Ann have three daughters and a son.

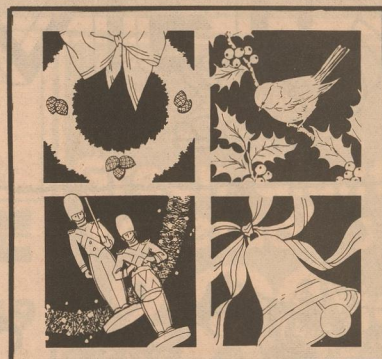

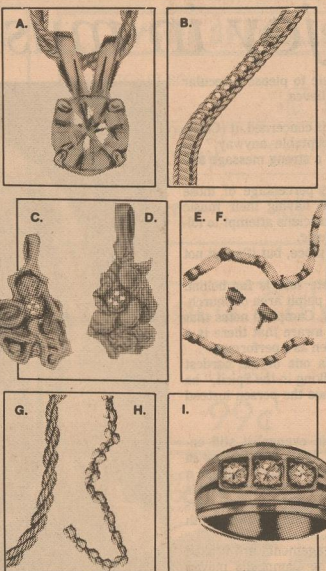

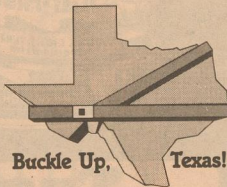
and Daughter of the evening. Mrs. Hand then gave the Mothers' Welcome followed by Kim's Daughters' Response.

ENFORCEMENT OF NEW SEAT BELT LAW BEGINS DECEMBER 1



Fines begin December 1, 1985

Austin--Department of Public Safety enforcement of the new Texas safety belt law begins on Sunday, December 1, 1985. The law, expected to save hundreds of lives in a year in Texas by encouraging more motorists to buckle up, took effect September 1. Drivers and front-seat passengers of cars and trucks up to three-quarter ton capacity will be subject to fines of \$25 to \$50 for violations committed on or after December 1.

"Informal observations by DPS troopers indicate that two-thirds of Texas motorists are already complying with this law," said Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director. "Those motorists who are not observing this statute are risking losing their lives or being seriously injured in a vehicle accident, and soon they'll also be facing the prospect of paying a fine for their oversight."

Adams said that in most instances, troopers will be checking for compliance with the safety belt law during routine traffic violator contacts. However, he pointed out that troopers will have the option of stopping motorists if the officers have probable cause to believe the law is being violated.

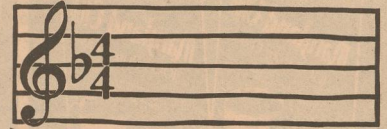
"The possibility of paying a fine for failing to use a safety

belt should increase the incentive for observing this law, but much greater consequences could be involved for motorists who don't use this proven, lifesaving device," Adams said. "What value can be placed on the loss of a human life or a long-term, serious injury resulting from a crash in which a safety belt could have made the difference?"

The new law did not change the child safety seat statute, which provides that children under two years of age must be secured in a federally-approved child safety seat system when they are riding in a passenger car or light truck (3/4 ton capacity and less). Children from two to four years of age must be secured by a safety belt or safety seat system when riding in a car or light truck.

The only persons exempted from the safety belt law are U. S. Postal Service employees while performing their carrier duties and motorists who possess a written statement from a licensed doctor stating that the person cannot wear a safety belt for medical reasons.

Obituaries

Mrs. Marvin G. Brotherton

Funeral services for Mrs. Marvin G. Brotherton, 87, were conducted at 11 a.m. Tuesday at the First United Methodist Church, with Rev. Eddie Marcum, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Mynatt Funeral Home.

Mrs. Brotherton died early Sunday, November 24 in Quana Hospital after a brief illness.

The former Mattie Robison was born November 9, 1898 in Farmersville and attended Electra High School, Texas Wesleyan College and West Texas College (University). She taught school in Barwise before her marriage May 31, 1923 to Rev. Marvin G. Brotherton, a young Methodist circuit rider preacher for Canyon and Floydada circuits in the Northwest Texas Methodist Conference.

Mrs. Brotherton served as church secretary for several years as a member of the Methodist Church. She was a member of the Womens' Missionary Union of the Methodist Church and of the Order of the Eastern Star, of which she was a past Worthy Matron.

She was affectionately known by her given name, Mattie, by all her friends, and told many interesting stories of her early married life as the wife of a circuit rider preacher. 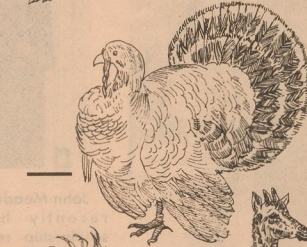
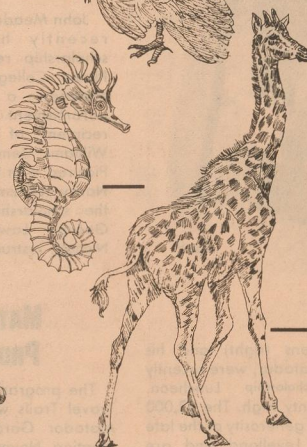
