Lamesa Has New Financial Institution

Lamesa has a new financial institution. It is the Lamesa Federal Savings and Loan Association. It is capitalized at \$35,270.01 and can loan on this capitalization up to \$100,000. The association is backed by the Federal Government on a three to one basis. Mr. Sam Strauss, Field Organizer for the Federal Home Loan Board, of the Washington office was here early this week and assisted in the set up of the local organization.

The officers of the new organization are: W. V. P. Baker, president; F. T. McCollum, vice president; O. H. Morris, secretary and treasurer; Carl Rountree, attorney. The directors are: J. D. Dyer, R. Richardson, Dr. A. H. Smith, T. A. Painter, S. L. Forrest and Owen C. Taylor.

Practically all types of loans can be made including remodeling, new buildings, refinancing, etc., just so the loan is justified on the basis of collateral and ability to repay up to 60 per cent of the value. The rate of interest will be 8 per cent.

On the saving end of this new institution it will open for investment from fifty cents up. Any one in the community who desires safety and a reasonable rate of interest on his money should investigate the opportunities here for investment. From the community view point the organization is welcomed. It is Lamesa's opportunity to hook up with the government to start a program of needed work and building repairs. It also gives Lamesa people a double opportunity to help in the building program of their community and at the same time invest their money in a safe, sound and dividend paying enterprise.

Again we say such actions as taken by the several enterprising Lamesa citizens in this undertaking is in all reality "Building From Within".

Arrest Man Wanted In McCamey Here Sunday

Emil Daniels, a young man about 24 years of age, was arrested here last Sunday night by deputy sheriff A. N. Randle. Daniels was charged with the theft of tires and a machine belt.

Daniels had attempted to sell three truck tires and a machine belt valued at several hundred dollars to several local firms at greatly reduced prices. Operators of one of the firms became suspicious and called the law. Daniels was arrested and upon investigation it was discovered that a truck had been stripped of its tires in McCamey a few days previous and that an oil company had had a machine belt stolen. The stolen goods was identified and Daniels was returned to McCamey to face charges.

More Boys to Go To CCC Camps In Dec.

According to the information received in the Dawson County Relief office another group of boys will be sent to the CCC camps the latter part of January or December. Those persons interested in enrolling in the CCC will please report immediately to the Dawson County Relief Office, in order that they may complete a list of names to be sent in to the headquarters.

Dawson county has only a small allotment, and you are interested in going it will be necessary that you report at once. No man discharged for any cause from the CCC during a previous enrollment period or discharged at expiration of term of service at the close of the enrollment period is eligible for reselection. In other words those who have already served in the CCC and who have a discharge, honorable, administrative, or dishonorable, cannot be reselected.

Hot Lunches To Be Served to School Children on Relief

Plans are being made at the Dawson County Relief office to serve hot lunches to school children whose parents are on relief. The lunch room is to be located in the home of J. P. Jackson on South First Street.

It has been reported that 28 families have already submitted names of school children to be fed under this plan. The supervision of the diet will be in charge of Miss Madeline Cox, County Home Demonstration agent. All sanitary rules and regulations are to be strictly adhered to by employees handling food to be served in the lunch room.

Those children who wish to take advantage of this will please report to the Dawson county relief office for meal tickets. This additional expense is to be deducted from the regular budget of the relief client.

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

"I, Franklin D. Roosevelt, President of the United States of America, hereby designate Thursday, the 29th day of November, 1934, as a day of thanksgiving for the people of the nation.

"Thus to set aside in the autumn of each year a day on which to give thanks to Almighty God for the blessings of life is a wise and reverent custom, long cherished by our people. It is fitting that we should again observe this custom.

"During the past year we have been given courage and fortitude to meet the problems which have confronted us in our national life. Our sense of social justice has deepened. We have been given vision to make new provisions for human welfare and happiness, and in a spirit of mutual happiness we have cooperated to translate vision into reality.

"More greatly have we turned our hearts and minds to things spiritual. We can truly say, 'What profiteth it a nation if it gain the whole world and lose its own soul?'

"With gratitude in our heart for what has already been achieved, may we, with the help of God, dedicate ourselves anew to work for the betterment of mankind.

"In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done in the City of Washington, this fifteenth day of November in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and thirty-four and of the independence of the United States of America the one hundred and fifty-ninth."

Information About Car Owners On Relief

Austin, Nov. 28.—Destitute persons who own automobiles will NOT be denied relief so long as funds granted them are used for subsistence needs, Adam R. Johnson, state relief director, has announced. At the same time, Johnson said county administrators will not grant funds when it is evident that an appreciable part of them are being used to operate automobiles for purposes of pleasure. The director states the policy towards automobile owners as follows:

"No county relief administrator is to demand from the owner of an automobile his license plate and key as a condition to receiving relief.

"It is the desire of the Texas Relief Commission that no relief funds be used for the purpose of operating passenger cars in a manner not strictly and entirely in conformance with the subsistence needs of the clients. It is recognized that many clients must use their cars to go to and from work relief employment. It is recognized also that in some instances cars are necessary for the clients to reach headquarter offices where they may secure relief grants.

"It is not the desire of the Texas Relief Commission, however, that any county administrator continue giving relief to any client when it is evident that the client is expending any appreciable amount of his relief funds for operating expenses of an automobile for pleasure purposes.

"It is within the discretion of the county administrator, after considering each individual case on its own merits, to deny relief to any family which persists in expending relief grants on the operation of an automobile which is not essential to their welfare."

Golden Tornadoes Defeat Brownfield By Score of 36-2

Opening up with a touchdown spree that scored a touchdown on the fifth play of the game and going on to score two more touchdowns in the first quarter and one in each of the other three quarters the Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes defeated the Brownfield Cubs here last Friday night 36 to 2. This game gave Lamesa the championship of the southern half of the district and gave them the right to play the Ralls Jackrabbits on Thanksgiving Day for the District Championship.

Taking the opening kick-off the Tornadoes marched on three plays to the Cub 40-yard line. Then Boswell tossed a pass to McKinnon who scored without being touched. On the second touchdown Jordan ran through the center of the line for 15 yards and a counter. McKinnon circled right end for 30 yards and the third score.

In the second quarter Jordan took a pass from Boswell to run 45 yards for the fourth touchdown. In this quarter Brownfield scored their two points when the Lamesa team punting from behind their goal line fumbled and Brownfield recovering behind the end zone.

There was no scoring in the third quarter but both teams threatened, especially Brownfield who opened up with a passing attack that made several nice gains, but which failed when within scoring distance.

In the fourth quarter Lamesa scored twice both on passes. The first was a lateral from Boswell to McKinnon and the second was on a forward from Boswell to McKinnon.

NOTICE TO TAX PAYERS

The Legislature passed a bill during their last session known as H. B. No. 7.

This bill will take effect (that is if the legislature does not pass another bill between now and then) on February 9, 1935. Said bill will remit interest and penalties on all taxes delinquent prior to August 1, 1934 provided they are paid on or before March 15, 1935. It will also remit all accumulated interest and penalties provided the taxes are paid by the following dates at the graduated penalty shown below:

- Before April 1, 1935, with 2 per cent penalty.
 - Before May 1, 1935, with 3 per cent penalty.
 - Before June 1, 1935, with 4 per cent penalty.
 - Before June 30, 1935, with 5 per cent penalty.
- After that date, these taxes will carry 8 per cent penalty and 6 per cent interest from July 1, 1935.

GAVE THANKS FOR HEALTH ON ORIGINAL THANKSGIVING

Austin, Texas, Nov. 27.—Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, has asked all citizens of Texas to give some thought to health, both personal and public, on this Thanksgiving Day. The original Thanksgiving was held by the Colonies for the purpose of giving thanks for their health.

Great advances in the treatment and prevention of disease have been made since that first Thanksgiving. Yellow fever, plague, cholera, have practically ceased to exist. Smallpox, diphtheria, and typhoid can be eliminated as a cause of death if a person will have himself and children immunized. Malaria and many other diseases can be controlled if the public would demand that the government furnish such protection.

Due to the advancement in the knowledge of disease, concerning its prevention and cure, fifteen years have been added to the expectation of life. This means that a child born now can be expected to live fifteen years longer than he would if he had been born fifty years ago.

We have a great deal more to be thankful for now, even with a depression, than did our Pilgrim forefathers; so let each one in his Thanks giving pledge to assist in furthering the work being done to improve health conditions in Texas.

1935 Corn-Hog Program Discussed

College Station.—A corn-hog program for 1935 has been definitely decided upon by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, and the contract and other forms are being prepared now" according to E. M. Regenbrecht, Extension swine husbandman. "Farmers will be invited to sign these contracts either late in December of this year or early in January 1935.

"The 1932-33 base already established will be used again in carrying out both the programs. Farmers will be permitted to produce hogs up to 90 per cent of the established base and benefit payments will be figured at \$15 per head for the 10 per cent not produced. Another feature of the 1935 hog program is that it permits the unrestricted purchase of feeder pigs by contract signers from contract signers.

"An outstanding feature of the 1935 corn program lies in the fact that the exact amount produced is optional with the farmer within the limits of 70 per cent to 90 per cent of the established base. Benefit payments will be made at the rate of 35 cents per bushel on the appraised and adjusted yield.

Steamed Cranberry Pudding
 1/2 cup water
 1 cup sugar
 3 eggs
 3 1/2 cups flour
 1-2 cup milk
 1 1-4 tsp baking powder
 1 12 cups cranberries or cherries.
 Cream butter, sugar and eggs. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with the milk. Add the cranberries or cherries. Turn into a buttered mold, cover and steam 3 hours. Serve with thin cream sweetened and flavored with nutmeg.

Fruit Pudding
 1 cup finely chopped suet
 1 cup molasses
 1 cup sour milk
 1 1-2 tsp soda
 1 tsp cinnamon
 1-2 tsp cloves
 1-2 tsp salt
 1 1-4 cups chopped raisins
 3-4 cup currants
 3-4 cup nuts
 2 3-4 cups flour.
 Add molasses and sour milk to suet; add two cups flour mixed and sifted with soda, salt, and spices; add fruit and nuts mixed with remaining flour. Turn into buttered mold, cover and steam four hours. Serve with Sterling sauce.

Sterling Sauce
 1-2 cup butter.
 1 cup brown sugar
 4 tablespoons cream
 1 tsp vanilla
 2 tablespoons fruit juice
 Cream butter, add sugar gradually and add cream and flavoring drop by drop to prevent separation.

Steamed Fruit Pudding
 1-4 cup butter
 1-2 cup sugar
 1-4 cup milk
 2 tsp baking powder
 1-4 tsp salt
 2 egg whites
 2 1-4 cups flour
 Mix as a butter cake. Partly fill oiled molds with jelly or preserved fruit. Pour batter on the fruit and steam 1/2 hour. Serve with pudding sauce.

Fig Pudding
 1-4 lb. suet
 1-2 lb figs chopped
 1 large sour apple, chopped
 1 cup brown sugar
 1-4 cu milk
 2 eggs
 1 1-2 cups bread crumbs.
 Mix as stated. Add egg whites last. Turn into buttered molds and steam three hours. Serve with lemon sauce.
