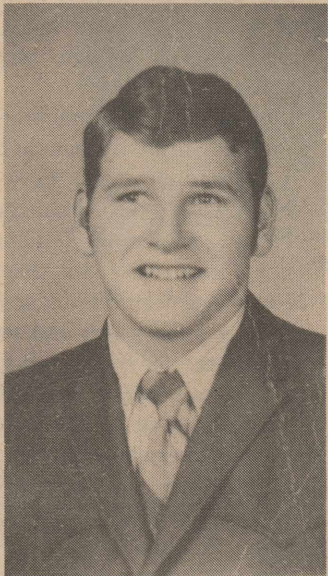

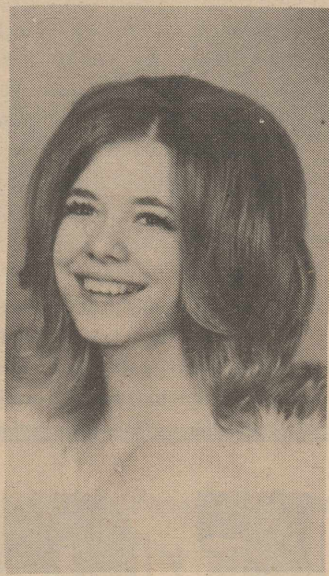

Longhorn All Stater, Stan Dyer, has been selected to play in the annual Greenbelt Bowl Football Game Aug. 11 in Childress. Rhonda Newsom will compete in the Greenbelt Queen contest.

The Greenbelt Bowl game annually presents graduated seniors from high schools in Texas and Oklahoma and is designed to give the young men an opportunity to show their abilities to scouts and coaches from colleges and universities in assisting the young men in obtaining scholarships to fur-

ther their education and careers.

Candidates for the queen's contest are selected by the players themselves with the queen being selected Friday night in a ceremony staged on the portico of Childress' First National Bank. Pay & Save Grocery Slates Formal Opening Observance

Formal opening of Pay and Save Grocery's newly enlarged and remodeled store will be observed next week, Monday through Saturday's Hart Day Celebration. J. B. and Juanita Allensworth extend invitations

to all residents of the Hart area to stop by for a visit during the week.

The Allensworths observed their fifth year in Hart June 1, moving here from Amherst. J.B. had 11 years experience in

the grocery business in Amherst before going to work in a drug store there.

Juanita was born and reared in Amherst and made a Texan of Oklahoma-born J. B. following their marriage. They met each other when her cousins married his cousins.

"I didn't know anyone out here but Juanita and her mother and father," J. B. recalls of his move to Texas. "I didn't even know her brothers and sisters."

The Allensworths farmed west of Anton their first year of marriage and J. B. filled in with odd jobs he could find, working at the gin in the fall.

Folks recall those days as "hard times," J. B. says and remembers, "We lived on \$15 a week." Juanita explains they stretched that amount to cover their butane, electricity and a \$10 installment payment on a refrigerator. "We lived on what was left."

The Allensworths are very much aware of the wage and cost of living crisis today, too. Grocers, just as the buying public, are faced with the high and increasing costs plus the unavailability of goods.

Pay and Save Grocery traces its origin through a number of ownerships with perhaps the longest tenure by the Walt

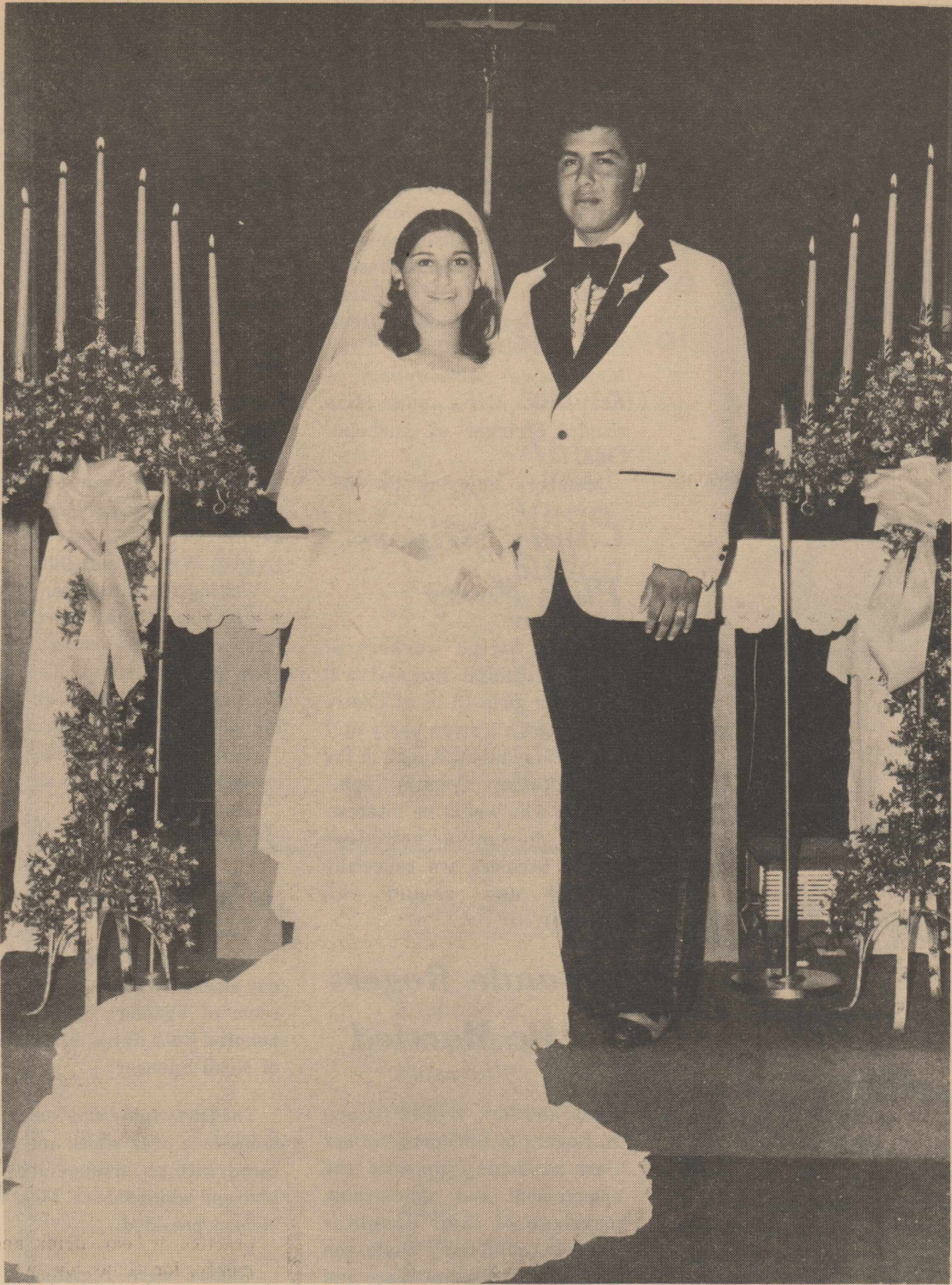

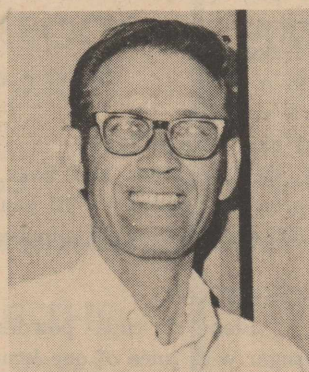

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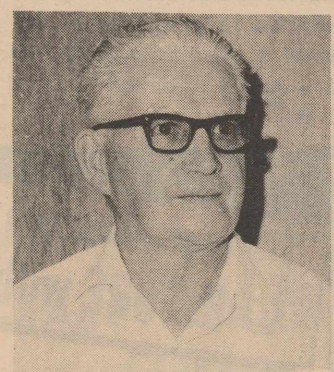

GA's Attend One-Day Camp

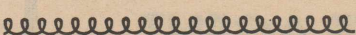

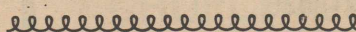

¾ c. oil
¾ c. water

1 pkg. orange Jell-o
Beat together and bake in greased, floured 9 x 13 pan in 350 degree oven 30 minutes.

FROSTING

Blend 2 cups powdered sugar with juice of one lemon. Prick hot cake all over with ice pick and pour frosting over hot cake.

2 pkgs. butterscotch chips (6 oz size)
1 can small cocktail peanuts, chopped

1 can chow mein noodles (4½-5½ oz) crushed slightly

Melt chips over hot water. Combine peanuts and noodles with melted chips. Drop by spoonful on waxed paper. Let cool. Remove and store in cool place.

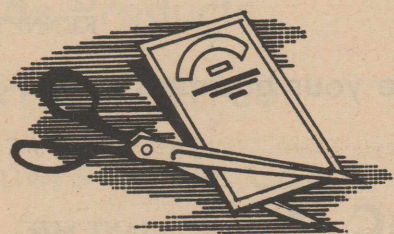

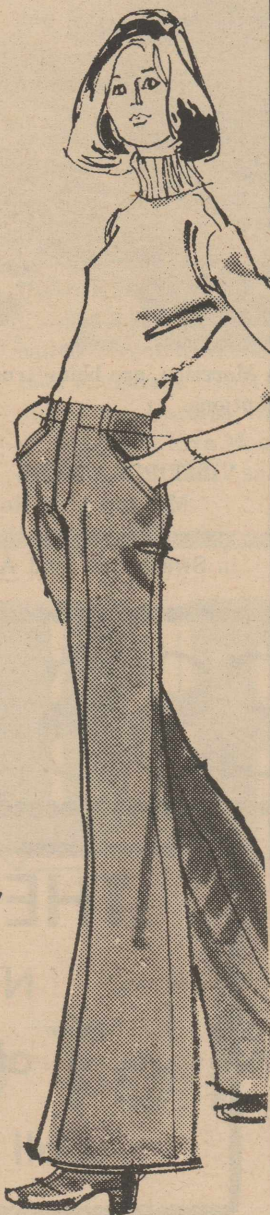

Hansens, who operated a grocery store from 1956 until 1965. Earlier owners were Robert Brooks and the Gilmins. Following the Hansens were the Brewers, Browns and Harlins.

The firm has undergone three expansions since J. B. became manager although he vowed after the first, "I don't ever want to go through another remodeling." The first expansion took in the locker next door to the small grocery store and later, Newsom Grocery was purchased.

Newsom Grocery began in 1935 with a small business selling just canned goods and staples with no market facilities. It moved in 1940 to the building which was the latest incorporated into the present modern Pay and Save Grocery.

The new store features a complete line of grocery stock and up-to-date market department. In addition, customers find numerous items found in a drug store from patent medicines to cosmetics; household items and gift ware; ready-to-wear and piece goods and sewing notions.

One of the most popularly accepted new lines has been boots for men, women and children and a line of infant goods.

A notable change in the small town grocery store which J. B. has noted and is grateful for, is that customers no longer bring in cases of eggs to trade for groceries. He recalls vividly the time consuming chore of counting and candling eggs while the customer shopped and says he got to be pretty proficient at candling eggs in those "days gone by."

"When a customer brought in some 30 dozen eggs for you to count and candle, you had to get pretty fast." He smiles as he recalls he "broke a few" learning but could handle six eggs at one time before that era passed.

The Allensworths have three sons. Jimmy, the eldest, is

married and lives in Odessa. He and his wife, Donna, have a three-months-old son named Cody Shane who has become another delight of the Allensworths.

Ricky, 19, works with his folks at the store. Bobby, 14, also helps out.
