LETTER REVEALS DETAILS  
OF LEN LEE'S CRASH

Mrs. George Lee received this letter P. H. Torrey Jr. of the 22 Fighting Sq. of which her son Len was a member.

Dear Mrs. Lee:  
Referring to our telephone conversation of a few days ago, I regret that the connection was poor and feel that as a result you received little satisfaction. I realize your anxiety at this time but regret to say that there are no further developments.

I have just forwarded a letter to Mr. Russell Lee who requested answers to several questions concerning the accident. Perhaps some of this information was not included in my first letter to you, and desiring that you know all the details, I will proceed. Roy, as I stated previously, was engaged in gunnery exercises. His plane was noticed in trouble and he was instructed to jump. The parachute opened and a normal descent was made. The Executive Officer, who was leading the flight, immediately detailed all planes to circle the parachute and mark the spot where Roy entered the water, then proceeded to a nearby Coast Guard Station for help. Roy was observed to enter the water but never sighted again. He was wearing a self inflating life jacket painted bright yellow at the time he entered the water. The jacket had been tested the day before. Planes continued to circle the spot which was marked, until fuel shortage forced them to return to the field. Meanwhile the entire squadron commenced a systematic search which was continued until dark. Planes from Naval Air Station, Norfolk, Va., Coast Guard Air Station, Elizabeth City, N. C. and a Navy blimp from Naval Air Station, Elizabeth City assisted in the search. Several small craft including Coast Guard cutters arrived shortly, and thoroughly searched the area in vain. The blimp and small craft continued the search during the night. The next day this squadron continued searching but no signs of pilot or plane were ever found.

May I again extend sincere sympathy to you in your great loss. Roy was an excellent officer and a good "shipmate". His loss is greatly felt here in the Squadron. Please do not hesitate to communicate with me if there is any information you may desire.

BOMAR GIVES SUMMARY OF  
WEATHER FOR 1942

Ray C. Bomar, government observer for this area has made a summary of the weather we enjoyed (?) in 1942. One of the most surprising things the report showed was that 1942 produced almost as much rainfall as did the preceding year, when crops went down and rotted under the heavy precipitation. The 1941 rainfall totalled 32.01 inches and 1942 went to 28.91, only three inches under the "wet" year.

August of 1942 produced the most rain for any one month — 8.02 inches. January and November were the light months, each showing only .01 of an inch. January of this year had even less with only a "trace" in the government gauge.

Other interesting bits concerning the 1942 weather were: There were 211 all clear days, 96 partly cloudy days, and 57 partly cloudy days. May had only one cloudy day, while April had the most, ten days being cloudy that month.

Mr. Bomar's weather equipment does not include an official thermometer, nor barometer. He is hoping that they will be added to his equipment in the future. He has a complete day by day record of rainfall, and will be glad to show you whatever you may wish to know.

## Rationing Registration Feb. 24-27th At Silvertown School House

RULES FOR DISCHARGING  
MEN OF 38

Men over 38 years old will be discharged from the Army according to these rules and requirements: (1) At least 38 years old. (2) Enlisted or inducted on or before Feb. 28, 1943. (3) Has submitted voluntary request for discharge to his commanding officer (must be before May 1, 1943). (4) Has submitted statement from responsible person showing that he will be employed in essential industry, including agriculture. (5) Release of soldier must not seriously affect the efficiency of his unit.

V-Mail FOR SAILORS

Your V-Mail letter to a sailor will have a better chance of getting to him without delay now, for the Navy has expanded its V-Mail services. Four new V-Mail stations have been sent abroad. Small, portable machines that can be quickly set up in remote areas will now be available to speed up the delivery of V-Mail to sailors.

applicant should clip this declaration, fill in the answers and bring it with them to the registration site. The applicant should not sign his name before going to the registration site.

Registration for point rationing processed foods, canned, bottled and in jars to be held in Silvertown, February 24, thru 27th will be simple and quickly accomplished if the householders and individuals who must file Consumer Declarations in order to obtain War Ration Book 2 will prepare their Declarations before they go to the registration site. L. K. Gilkeyson, chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board declared today. The registration will be held at the Silvertown High School Building, starting at 4:30 Wednesday P. M. and other days starting at 9 A. M.

"The volunteer organization which will assist the board has been carefully instructed in its duties Mr. Gilkeyson said.

"Here are the things to do to be ready to get the new books:

"In every household, someone must count the cans, bottles and jars 8 ounce size or larger of fruits and vegetables, on hand at midnight Saturday, February 20. That will be a Sunday morning task in some homes. The count include canned fruits, canned vegetables (including spices) fruit and vegetables juices, soups, chili sauce, and catsup. Take from the total five cans for each member of the family. The new total must be reported on the Declaration form, or if there are no more than five cans each, the report will be 'None'.

"These are not to be counted: Canned olives, canned meat and fish, pickles, relish and jams, jellies and preserves, spaghetti, macaroni and noodles, home-canned food, if not for sale.

"Persons who are not living as members of their family group must make their own Declarations and get their own ration books. Domestic help is not a part of a family.

"Official Declaration forms will be printed in nearly all newspapers and should be clipped and used for making the formal declaration. Be sure to write in all the information ask for by the Declaration.

"Coffee on hand November 28, 1942, must be declared, minus one pound for each person whose age stated on Book 1 is 14 or over.

"Remember to take Book 1 of all persons listed on a Declaration to the registrars when applying for Book 2. No Book 2 will be issued unless Book 1 is presented at the place of registration for 'tailoring.'

"The Owl", independent newspaper of the Silvertown School, issued its second issue of the year Monday. It is by far the best school paper this writer has ever seen. Chock-full of news and editorials, it is a far cry to the old time school paper of little news and worse puns. Very little space is used except for serious, down-to-earth news writing. Clyde Mercer is editor of the paper, which is printed in the shop of the Briscoe County News. 500 copies were printed for local distribution this week.

SHOES RATIONED

Some kinds of shoes are not covered by the rationing order that went into effect Feb. 9. Unrationed are soft and hard-soled slippers and bedroom slippers; infants' soft-soled shoes; ballet slippers; ordinary waterproof footwear; gaiters; work, dress, clog, and toe rubbers, and lumberman's overshoes.

Those rationed (one pair per person between now and June 15, obtainable through Stamp 17 of War Ration Book One) include all types of boots and shoes made in whole or in part of leather, and all rubber-soled shoes.

Shoe stamps are transferable; can be used by any member of the family. In emergencies local ration boards will issue a shoe purchase certificate.

More Civilian Goods? — Beset with rationing problems and pretty well convinced that three-thirds of the nation would soon be ill-fed, ill-clothed, and ill-housed the consumer got a badly-needed boost when War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson revealed that some members of the WPB now feel that the civilian belt may already have been drawn too tight. He also expressed his own conviction that not much more can be trimmed from the civilian economy and that's good news. Big problem now is to manufacture the material's available for consumer's goods with a minimum expenditure of manpower. Barron's national business and financial weekly, points out that the manpower shortage is already definitely curtailing production in some of the "soft goods" lines, such as shoes and textiles, and that the agricultural manpower shortage this year will be acute. Possible solution is the standardization and simplification of goods and the concentration of production for civilian consumption within a few plants for each product.

## THE HOME FRONT

Approximately 21 million War Ration Books Two are now in the hands of nearly 800 local war price and rationing boards in Louisiana, Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri, ready for distribution to consumers during the coming week. The office of Price Administration has been working night and day for many weeks in order to have material ready for the gigantic task of registering millions of Southwesterners for the point rationing program. Thousands of forms have been distributed for the registration of processors, wholesalers, retailers, industrial users, consumers and others.

It is a gargantuan task that will require the patience and cooperation of every consumer and every business man. It will require the help of thousands of volunteers—school teachers, civilian defense workers, local rationing board, volunteers and other public-minded citizens. The groundwork for such a job has been laid in other registrations; consequently, it is hoped that the work will run smoothly. The registration procedure has been tested hundreds of times in order to get the "bugs" out of the system. Registrars have been trained and hard-working local board members have been instructed on the entire procedure. All have cooperated 100 percent because it is a job that must be done lest we find ourselves without food.

Despite the immensity of the task, despite the long hours that many have worked on the program, and despite the inevitable complicated angles, the registration procedure for the consumer is a simple 10-minute task. The consumer merely fills out a consumer declaration form, takes War Ration Book One and this declaration form to the registration site and receives War Ration Book Two. It is as simple as that.

So, just remember, if your neighbor comes home with a "red hot tip" that they are going to start rationing clothes tomorrow, you remind him that it takes months to print 130,000,000 ration books and it takes months to print other necessary forms. The problem of distribution itself is one of tremendous magnitude. The authority to ration anything must first be given the OPA by the War Production Board, which determines our shortages are and where they are likely to be. WPB Chairman Donald Nelson said this week that WPB has not given the OPA authority to ration clothes. Once OPA has the authority it then must plan the entire program.

Scare-buying of clothes during the past week only serves to emphasize the fact that we should quit listening to rumors. People on the Home Front should understand that the American people are not going to starve and they are not going to be without clothes. When shortages become too apparent, the government will institute a rationing program which will insure each of us his fair share. We will still be able to "keep up with Mrs. Jones" because Mrs. Jones will get just as many points as we will get. If one hears a rumor, he should check it with persons in a position to know the truth before he accepts it as a fact. Such a procedure will save the American people a lot of grief. Hitler whipped several strong countries by planting rumors among the people on the home front. A rumor is a dangerous and disastrous weapon which we must counter with our own good common sense.

The rationing of shoes, which began on Feb. 9, was ordered because for several months civilians have been buying shoes at a rate

faster than manufacturers could make them and at the same time keep our soldiers and sailors supplied — and the armed services, which require a huge number of shoes, comes first. In the last six months of 1942 one out of every 10 pairs of shoes manufactured in the United States went to men in the military forces. Every soldier who landed in North Africa, for example, was outfitted with three pairs of shoes and the convoys carried additional reserve supplies. A pair of shoes doesn't last a soldier as long as a civilian they must be used on the harsh mountain trails of New Guinea and Tunisia in muck and water of South Pacific islands, on the burning sands of North Africa, or in the snow and ice of Alaska and the Aleutians.

Under the shoe rationing plan, three pairs of shoes will be made available during the next 12 or 13 months to every man, woman and child in the country. Stamp 17 in War Ration Book One is good for one pair of shoes until June 15, and stamps may be transferred from one member of a family to another. Anyone who needs shoes but has no Stamp 17 in his own book or in the family books may apply to his local rationing board for a shoe purchase certificate. The stamp must not be presented loose but must be torn out in the presence of the person making the sale. In the case of sales by mail order, the stamp may be torn out and presented with the purchasing order.

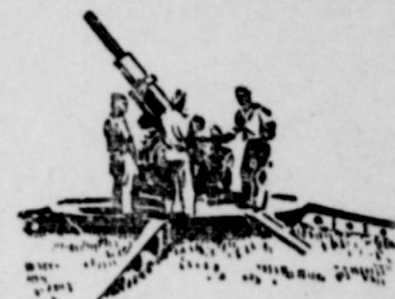

### War Crop Goals Announced

Briscoe County has been allotted 300 acres of peanuts, 200 acres of soybeans and 41,346 acres of grain sorghum as War Crop Goals for 1943.

The County and Community Committeemen will work out farm goals for each farm within the county in the near future.

Farms receiving War Crop Goals will be penalized \$15.00 per acre for each acre by which the sum of the acreage planted to war crops on the farm is less than 90 percent of the sum of the war crop goals for the farm.

On the other hand incentive payments have been announced for the acreage planted on the farm between February 1st and September 1st, 1943, in excess of 90 percent of the goal, but not to exceed 110 percent of the goal. The rates of incentive payments are Soybeans, \$15.00; Peanuts \$30.00 and Grain Sorghums \$8.00 per acre up to 110 per cent of the farm war crop goal.

### Pooling of Transportation Facilities

The Farm Transportation Committee has been asked by the Office of Defense Transportation to work up some plan in each community whereby all transportation facilities can be pooled as much as possible.

At present a plan has been worked out to place a "Notification board" on the partition wall between the AAA Office and Tull Implement Company, one in the hall of the Courthouse at Silverton and in the First National Bank in Quitaque.

Any time, anyone is going to Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo or other out of town places and can take one or more passengers, or if going in a truck, can haul more freight or livestock, please list your name, the date you will make the trip and the number of passengers or amount of livestock or freight you will be able to haul. In doing this you may save one or more trips for other cars or other trucks. Don't forget to "pool" your transportation if possible.

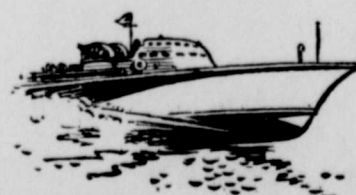
