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FEDERAL TAX CUTS

This year witnessed the largest tax cuts in the history of the federal government. Virtually everyone will feel the benefits — farmers, businessmen, salaried employees, people who receive income in the form of dividends, hourly workers, working mothers, and so on. All the excise taxes were reduced save the historic ones on liquor and tobacco. On top of that, the federal tax laws were given an all-out overhaul for the first time in 75 years.

That adds up to good news. It means that individuals and enterprise will be able to keep many billions that would have gone to Washington under the old tax rates and laws. However, there is a big fly in the ointment, in the

The Wall Street Journal tells the story, in a feature article by Lindley H. Clark, Jr. In the 1933 fiscal year, state general expenditures outran general revenues by nearly \$299,000,000. It is believed that the complete 1934 figures, which aren't yet available, will show a similar trend. As Mr. Clark explains it, "... the lawmakers still insist on spending more money than the collectors can rake in from the taxpayers."

Mr. Clark then sums up some of the current fiscal troubles that are cited by state tax officials and administrators. The federal government has moved in on sources of revenue that once were exclusive state prerogatives — the gasoline tax is an example of this. In some states, sales tax revenues have been below last year's level, and this tax is the biggest money-producer the state now have, accounting for some 23 per cent of the total. State income tax receipts have also tended downward. Local governments are asking more and more state aid, for such purposes as schools, roads and welfare, and this demand is more likely to increase than to decrease. The materials shortages during the war virtually eliminated state building and improvement activity, and so that load is extremely heavy now.

Where will states go in search of more money? The answer, according to Mr. Clark is that "states generally are trying to pry all the revenue they can from existing taxes before trying new levies. . . . State officials find the hunt for new revenue sources a difficult one." Thus, the pressure is on to squeeze more money from such sources as gas taxes, sales taxes, and property taxes. Also, attention is being given to tightening up tax law enforcement. Last fiscal year, total state tax collections hit a record \$11,100,000,000. That was five per cent above '33 and 10 per cent above '32. And next year, to quote Mr. Clark once more, "nearly all legislatures will meet in either regular or special sessions and indications are they'll be hammering out new tax laws by the hundreds."

The moral that can be drawn is simple. Most of us think of tax matters primarily in respect to federal levies and policies — but state fiscal affairs are mighty important too.

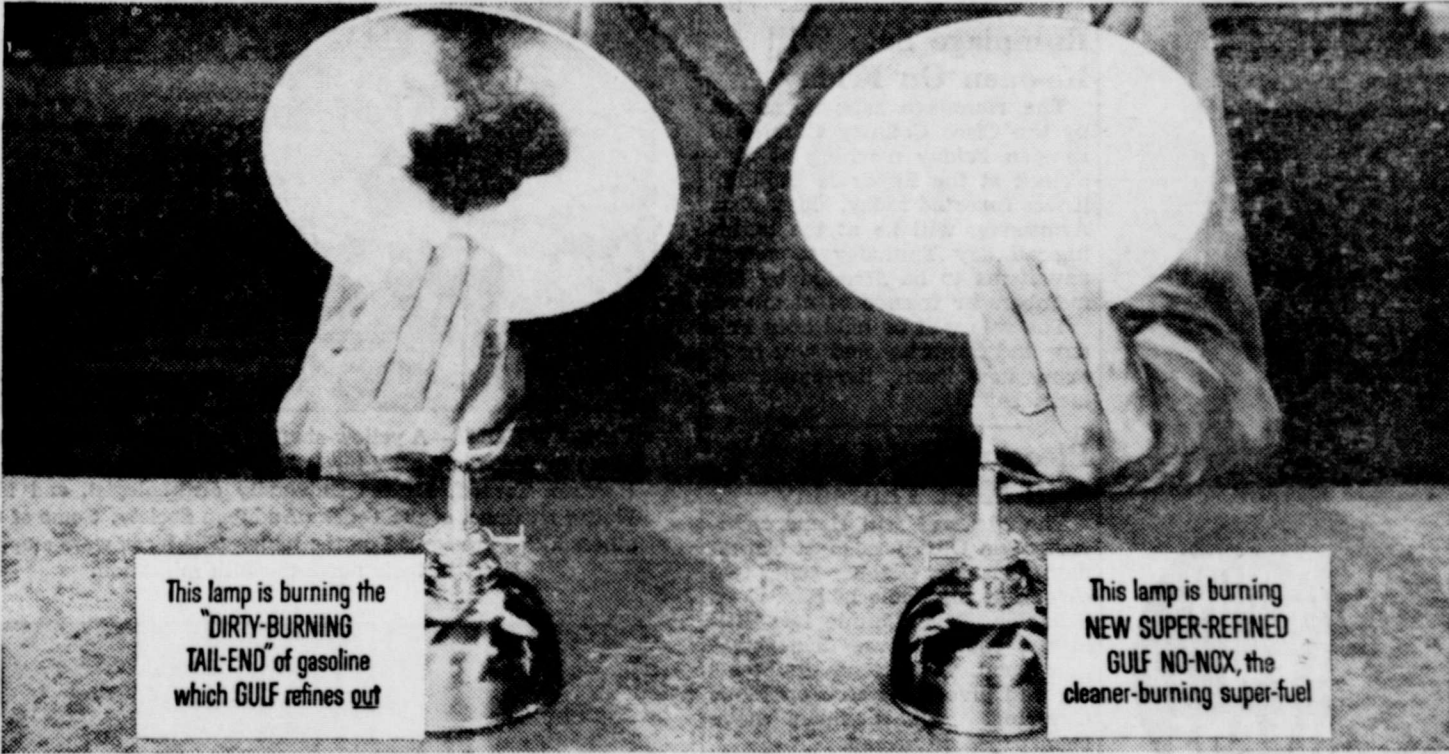
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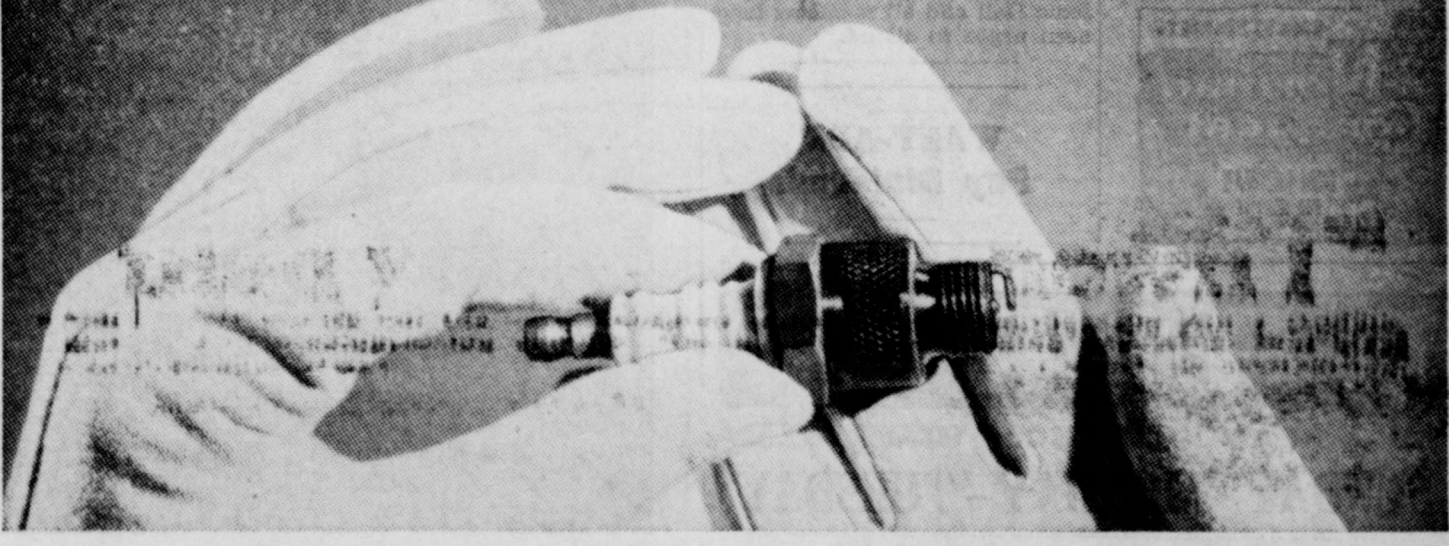

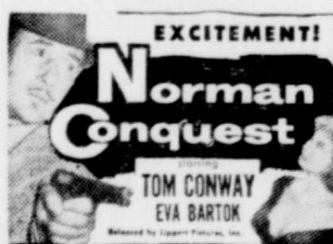

coulters in front of the sweeps can work through a mat of residue without difficulty. Depth-gauge wheels on tillers add materially to the smoothness of operation.

Machines such as the skew treader may be used to pack the soil somewhat and help eradicate weeds. This machine consists of two lines of fingered wheels which cultivate as they rotate.

A planter equipped with disk furrow openers is desirable for working through residue. To avoid clogging, a disk rolling coulters between the disks may be used.

To maintain residue on the surface until the row crop has reached considerable height, a sweep type cultivator has been used. Large sweeps help to keep the mulch on the surface. Disk tillers may be mounted next to the rows to help eradicate weeds in the rows.

When clean tilled crops which provide little protection against wind erosion are grown, strip cropping with sorghum or suitable grass may be necessary. The rows should run about at right angles to the direction of the prevailing winds. The erosion resisting strips should be spaced closely

enough to protect the non-erosion resisting crop. The strips probably be not less than four rows wide and may be wider. The width of the main crop strips may vary but generally should not be greater than 12 rows. The actual width will depend on soil type, direction of rows, and type of crops involved.

No rigid system of cropping or rotation has been devised that can equal a flexible cropping plan in effective wind erosion control and economy of production. Such a plan should take into consideration the soil, moisture and fertility conditions at each successive planting period of the year. Crops should be selected which will provide sufficient cover under these varying conditions.
