Enrollments Told For Hart Schools

Total enrollment at Hart Schools stands at 584 as of Aug. 19, according to a report from Ted Averitt, superintendent of schools.

Of that number, 142 are high

school students, with 35 seniors, 22 juniors, 41 sophomores and 44 freshmen.

Eighty-eight are junior high students, with 58 seventh grade students and 30 eighth

grade students.

Elementary students topped the enrollment with 354 total. Kindergarten students numbered 47, first grade, 34; second grade, 52; third, 53; fourth grade, 62; fifth grade, 61; and sixth grade, 45.

The figures may vary the first few weeks of school, it was noted.

Boys Ranch Rodeo Set For Labor Day Weekend

The 30th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo will be held over the Labor Day weekend, Sept. 1 and 2.

Approximately 10,000 friends of the boys are expected to attend the two performances of the rodeo at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday afternoons. The only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which the only contestants are boys riding professional rodeo animals, the event is also a reunion for the more than 3,000 boys who have lived at the Ranch since 1939.

More than 150 boys will be riding calves, steers, Brahma bulls and bucking brones. Old-

er boys compete for the title of Senior All-Around Cowboys and a Junior All-Around Cowboys is named from the younger boys. All of the boys will have some part in the rodeo, either as contestants or working in the many behind-the-scene activities.

The Boys Ranch Band will provide the music for the rodeo, while other boys operate concessions for bar-be-que beef and other refreshments. Reserve box seat tickets for \$2.50 are available at the Boys Ranch office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo, or can be obtained by writing to Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, P.O. Box 1890, Amarillo, Texas, 79105. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75 cents for children.

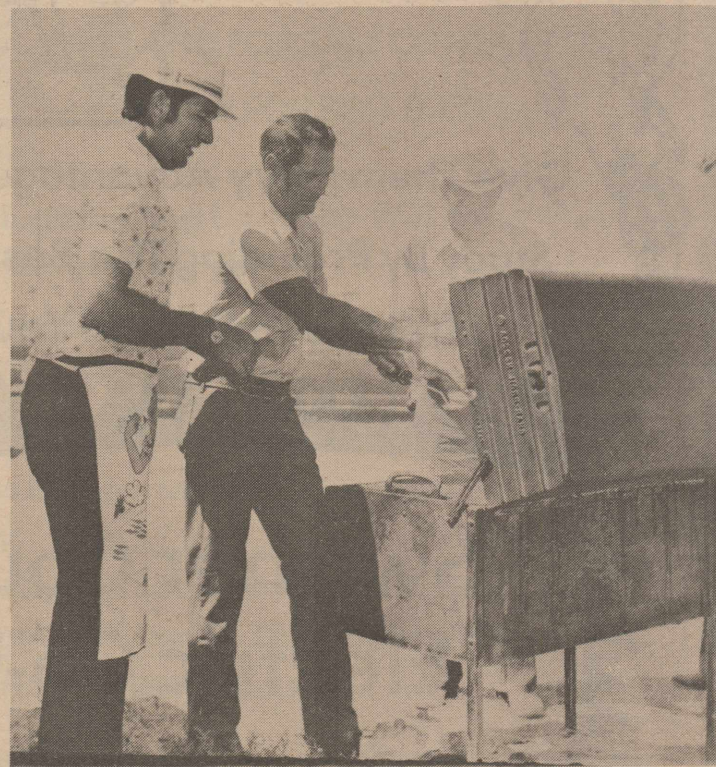

Feminine Look At Football

I admit I still don't know all the finer points of the game but as a captive audience for televised football every weekend I am nevertheless in a position to offer my observations, conclusions and suggestions. I now feel qualified not only to comment on gridiron activity as presently conducted, but also to give advice on how its quality and safety can be improved and, especially, how to speed it up although playing time is supposed to be only one hour, I have never seen a game completed in less than two.

First of all, it's asking too much for all the boys to play with just one ball. Giving each side its own would cut down considerably on all the dangerous pushing and shoving that goes on when everybody fights for the only available ball. Then the players themselves should come to a firm decision about which way they want to go instead of chasing halfway down the field and then suddenly deciding they prefer to move in the opposite direction. They should also quit changing their minds about whether they even want to play, rather than to keep running back and forth from the sidelines onto the field every few minutes.

One of the most obvious practices slowing down the game is their habit of doing so many things twice. They run, pass or kick and they do exactly the same thing again only this time very, very slowly. No wonder a 15-minute quarter lasts an hour!

There is another contributing factor, the stadium clock leaves a lot to be desired. They're always stopping and the participants have to hang around waiting until they get them started again. The players could speed the action up a good deal if they'd hold the joke until later instead of gathering their pals together in a tight little knot to tell them the latest, right in the midst of the game.

Though my husband is always too intent on watching the action to further my education in the esoteric realm of pigskin parlance, I have on my own absorbed the idea that a screen pass is viewed on the television screen; an offside is a team that is having an off day; two quarterbacks make a halfback and two halfbacks make a fullback and a 220 pound safety man doesn't sound very safe to me.

My final bit of free counsel to those who would make football a better game is send in those men in striped shirts who are always hanging around the field, they are the fastest runners of all.

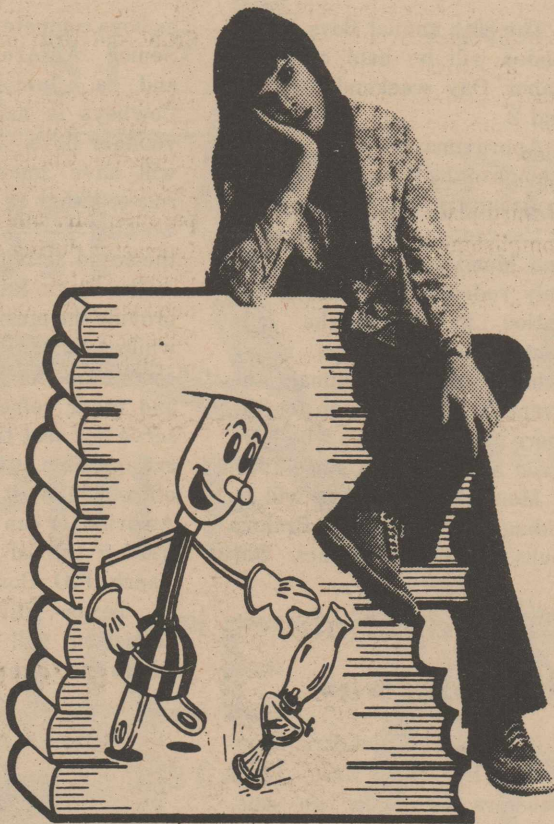
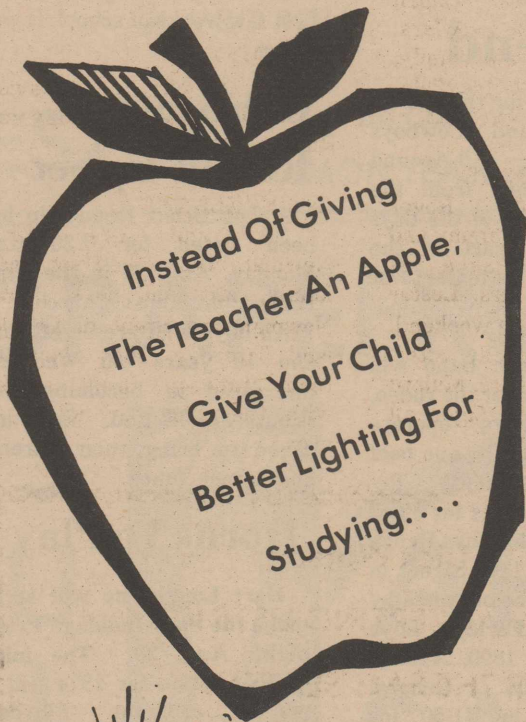

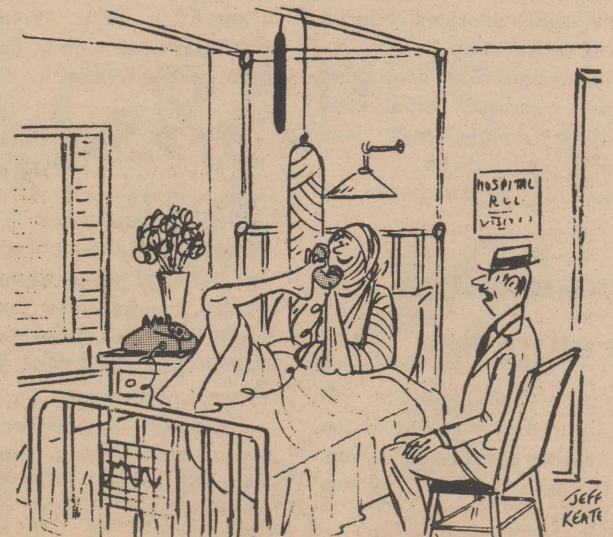


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Tamie Gilcrease Is Crowned Moore County Rodeo Queen

A RECIPE TO RELISH



When it's time to put up tomatoes, consider turning some of the crop into Tomato Relish. The recipe here calls for light corn syrup which gives the right amount of sweetening without watering the mixture.

TOMATO RELISH

- | | |
|-------------------------------|----------------------------|
| 3 pounds ripe tomatoes | 1 tablespoon salt |
| 3 medium onions, chopped | 2 cups cider vinegar |
| 1 large green pepper, chopped | 1 tablespoon mustard seed |
| 1 cup Karo light corn syrup | 1½ teaspoons whole cloves |
| | 1½ teaspoons celery seed |
| | 2 (3-inch) sticks cinnamon |

Dip tomatoes in boiling water just until skins are softened, about 1 minute. Remove skins and stem ends; coarsely chop. Place tomatoes, onion, green pepper, corn syrup, salt and vinegar in 4-quart saucepan or kettle. Tie mustard seed, cloves, celery seed and cinnamon in cheese cloth; add to vegetable mixture. Bring to boil over medium heat; reduce heat and boil gently, stirring occasionally, about 2 hours or until mixture thickens. Remove spice bag. Leaving 1/4-inch head space, ladle into clean hot 1/2 pint jars with 2-piece metal caps. Seal following jar manufacturer's directions. Process in boiling water bath 10 minutes. Cool on wire rack or folded cloth. Label and store in cool dry place. Makes about 5 (1/2 pint) jars.

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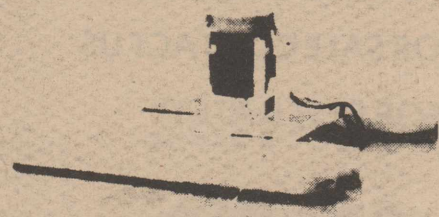
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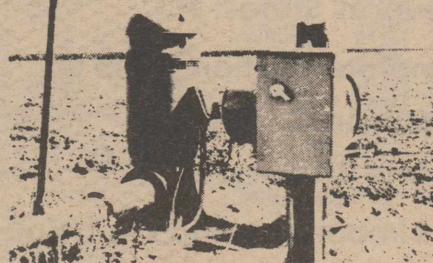
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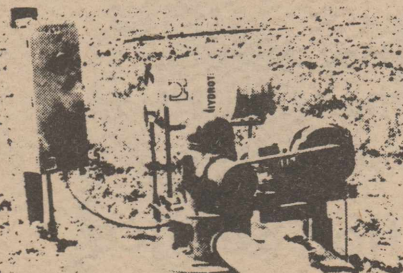

Salt Water Irrigation Tests Made Researchers

Can salty water be used to extend our supply of fresh water and grow more food? Research scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station are working on methods to use high saline (salty) water for irrigation.

Households, industry and agriculture are all making increasing demands on our available supplies of fresh water. And agriculture, as quantity of water diminishes, increasingly turns to poorer quality well and river water.

It's well known by agricultural producers that irrigation water over a certain salt content will cause problems and hurt yields. But TAES researchers seek to combine use of salty water with a known water saver, trickle irrigation. This type irrigation does water out in a very miserly way, just a spot by each plant, and it really does save water. Or using the same amount of water, it can boost yields by 50 per cent over furrow and sprinkler irrigated land.

Soil researchers during 1972

and 1973 studied the effects of trickle irrigating with high-salinity water on medium-to-heavy-textured soils.

"The primary objective of this research," says Dr. Ed Hiler, professor of agricultural engineering with the Experiment Station, "was to determine the effects of trickle irrigation with three different concentrations of saline water. We wanted to know the effects on sorghum growth and yield and on the environment of a salt loam soil."

An additional objective was to compare the effects on sorghum of irrigation water at one level of salinities, using both surface and trickle irrigation.

Salts were purposely not leached between seasons so that salinity buildup effects could be evaluated, explains Hiler.

"For purposes of comparison you should know that tap water often contains 450 ppm (parts per million, salt to water; and Rio Grande irrigation water in the Valley has 1600 ppm. A comparison of five different types of irrigation levels or methods were made," he points out.

The study showed:

1. At the 1600 ppm salt level, trickle irrigation gave significantly higher yields than surface irrigation.

2. Even with trickle irrigation, in the second season the very salty water (2400 ppm) caused significant reductions in growth. This indicates the need for leaching between seasons when using high-salinity water.

3. For irrigation water with 1600 ppm salt, the soil directly beneath and between the double rows had lower salinity levels for the trickle irrigation treatment than for the surface irrigation.

"More research is needed in the area of trickle irrigation with high-salinity water," contends Hiler. "Consideration of irrigation amount as a variable (in addition to salinity level) is a logical next step. And work is needed to find practical leaching approaches when trickle irrigating high-salinity water. Only through such research can we discover the best means to make full use of all of our water, including that high in salts."

"Some trust in chariots, and some in horses, but, we will remember the name of the Lord our God" Psalms 20:7

And if we satisfy ourselves with such answers as "I am a child of God", we must go on to the interpretation of the answer. It is very likely that our meditative thought will bring us to the conclusion that we are utterly dependent upon God. Our birth, our death, our life beyond death, are thoroughly dependent upon God. Our destiny lies in trusting him.

The writer of the 20th Psalm knew that many persons of his day trusted in instruments of war for the preservation of the nation and for their own peace and happiness. It is no different today. Jesus spoke of those who trust in riches (Mark 10:24), that, too, is a present day phenomenon. He pointed out, also, the limitations. (Matt. 6:27). Then there is man's self-determination.

With a deep sense of dependence upon God, the 20th Psalm suggests that to the utmost we can put our trust in him. We can put our trust in him in the day of trouble, (V 1). Notice the verbs in the early

verses of the Psalm. "The Lord hear thee, defend thee, send thee help and strengthen thee."

In our dependence upon the saving strength of God, we can rejoice in our salvation (V 5) and in our rejoicing, set up our banners of victory. We can stand upright (V 8). How suggestive. Trust God and stand upright. You won't be toppled over. The 20th Psalm was also a prayer for a King, but it stirs the blood of ordinary men, just to stand upright and put their trust in a real and living God.

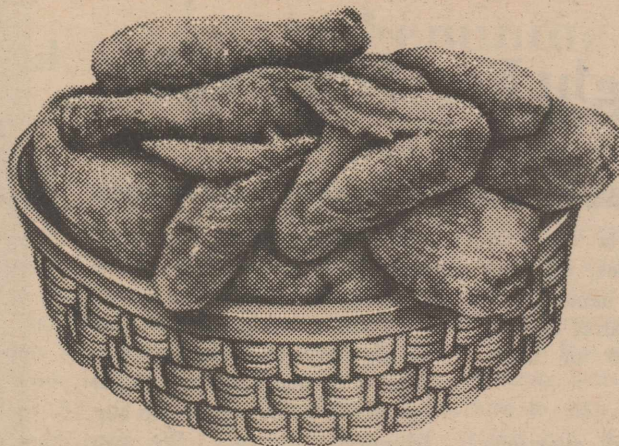
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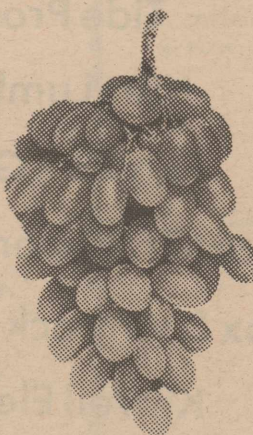
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
