Citizens Ask Officials To Take Action Against 'Hot Rodders'

Mayor Thelma Brooker called the meeting to order when the Santa Anna City Council met last Thursday evening at the Mountain City Community Center at 7 p.m. All councilmen were present for the meeting.

Dale Bradley was heard by the council as he voiced a complaint about "hot rodders" in the city. Other citizens were on hand with the same concern. After much discussion, Police Chief Ken Brixey said the police could do nothing unless they witnessed the "hot rodding", or unless a number of written complaints were received on any one individual. That individual could then be fined, but if he pays his fine, nothing else can be done. If the fine is not paid and the individual is not a minor, he could spend up to three days in jail. The council will be doing some more checking into the matter which seems to be a major concern for a number of people around town.

The council opened bids for the 76 Dodge pickup the city was advertising for sale. Two bids had been received, one of \$100 from Willis Morris and one of \$35 from

John Burns. Morris' bid was accepted.

The council set May 9 as the date for a meeting to canvass the votes in the May 6 election. A time for the meeting will be set later.

City Administrator Max Eubank was unable to be present for the meeting, but left information for the council with city clerk, Alys Pelton. The results of the meeting with Brownwood Water District, was among the items left for the council. The Brownwood Water District board has agreed to reduce the number of gallons of water the city is to pay for, whether used or not, to 35 million per year, rather than the 50 million they now are on contract for. This will mean a savings of \$6,543 per year. Documentation will be received soon for the council's action.

Among the progress reports, it was heard that the City did not get the sewer grant they had been seeking, but will try again at a later date, possibly with new engineering and administration firms. If things work out, the project should be fundable.

An information sheet on under-

ground fuel storage tanks was reviewed. The information confirmed the State is going to start testing the tanks to be sure there is no leakage, and to make sure they are operating properly.

Eubank recommended the City support the State Legislature in raising the utility use tax (for street & alleyways, etc.) from 2% to 5% of the utility's gross revenues to conform with House Bill 2155 and Senate Bill 1040. The tax will be charged to gas and electric utilities. The Council approved the proposal as stated by Eubank.

The council granted Lone Star Gas access to the landfill to lay a pipeline just inside the City's fence.

The matter of the budget was tabled until Eubank could be present.

After a lengthy executive session, which according to the published agenda, included maintenance employees, police department, and landfill and trash pick up mishaps, the council returned to open session and reviewed and approved accounts for payment, before they adjourned.

Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. will distribute USDA Commodities in Santa Anna Tuesday, April 25 at the Civic Center (armory).

Items to be available are beans, raisins, pork, flour and peanut butter.

CTO has no control over what items are available or the quantity of the items. Allocation of all commodities depends on the availability of food items from the USDA.

All eligible persons will receive food emergency assistance without regard to race, sex, political beliefs, age, national origin, or handicap. Shut-ins are encouraged to designate an authorized representative to pick up for them. Commodities will be distributed on a first come/first serve basis. Volunteers are greatly needed and appreciated to help with this much needed program.

Board Sets Calendar For Next School Year

A calendar for the next school year (1989-90) was set during last week's regularly scheduled meeting of the Santa Anna school board. Before agreeing upon the proposed school calendar some lengthy discussion was held on the issue of spring break versus Fridays off during the spring. The Fridays off plan seems to allow students to participate in the spring literary events, band, and sporting events with fewer classes missed. One suggestion from a board member was to opt for a spring break. This failed to pass with the vote 3 against the proposal and 2 for. Another suggestion was to alternate yearly between the two plans. This also failed, 3 to 2. The board then passed with a 3-2 vote to retain the spring Fridays off plan.

The calendar, as adopted, is as follows:

August 25, 29, 30, 31—Teacher in service/work days.

September 1—First day of school.

November 23-14—Thanksgiving holidays.

December 20 through January 1—Christmas holidays.

January 22-23—Teacher work days.

March 16, 23, 30; April 6, 12, 13, 16—Spring holidays.

June 1—Last day of classes.

James Land Remembered

The Santa Anna News recently ran a notice of the death of James N. Land, who died Feb. 22 in Bedford, Pa. A distinguished member of the banking profession and a 1912 graduate of Santa Anna High School and 1957 Ex Student of the Year, Land is remembered in the following article by an old friend, Lila Smith White of Odessa, also a native of Santa Anna and graduate of Santa Anna High School. She writes:

Jim taught in Brownwood High School after graduating from Daniel Baker. He received a Master's Degree in Economics at Princeton University in 1917. A Christmas time in 1916 he interviewed some bankers in New York in order to get more material for a term paper. When he returned to Princeton he received a letter from Guaranty Trust Company in New York offering him employment after his graduation. He was at the bank for only a short time before going into the Navy, but the position was held open for him. He was in the bond department, which later moved to Edward B. Smith & Co. (Now First Boston) When he left New York after more than twenty years, he went to Mellon National Bank and Trust Co. with headquarters in Pittsburgh, Pa.

As was said in the brief obituary, he was the senior vice president and chief economist of that chain of banks at retirement time. He had the experience of being on President Eisenhower's Council of Economic Advisors for seven years. He also served on the board of directors for the Memorial Hospital of Bedford County.

Jim and his wife, Frances, met while they were students in Daniel Baker. She came from Ohio to Texas to live with her half-brother who was a Presbyterian minister there, on the death of her father. Her mother had died several years earlier.

She taught in Rotan, Tex. after three years at Daniel Baker and then took her senior year at Southern Methodist University—in the very first graduating class after it became a four year university. She taught in Honeygrove, Tex before going to meet Jim in New York where they were married in the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church.

He is survived by his wife and the following children: Robert E. Land of Bedford, Pa.; Jane Land Hudson of Pittsburgh, Pa.; Marjorie Land Eshelman of Bloomsburg, Pa.; and James N. Land Jr. of Short Hills, N.J.; ten grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

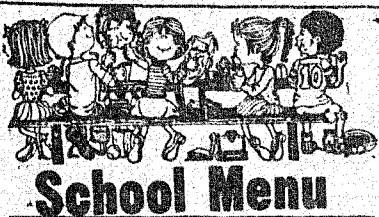

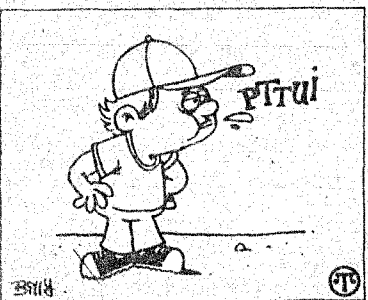
Smokeless Tobacco Causes Oral Cancer

Smokeless tobacco use is on the rise, especially among teenage boys. Sixteen percent of all males between the ages of 12 and 17 chewed tobacco in 1985 and the number has increased. Many of these teenagers believe smokeless tobacco is a "safe" alternative to cigarettes. Well, it's not!

There was a fourfold increase in chewing tobacco users and a 15-fold increase in snuff users between 1970 and 1986. Two thirds of smokeless tobacco users start before they are 21, according to the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services.

Studies have shown that smokeless tobacco is more addictive than cigarettes and may be harder to "quit." "When the tobacco is chewed or dipped," says Roy Sessions, MD, Committee on Head and Neck Surgery and Oncology for the Academy, "the nicotine and other chemicals are absorbed directly through the stomach and mouth into the bloodstream. It is through this process that the user gets a 'nicotine high,' but also develops mouth cancer."

In addition to a high risk of developing oral cancers, smokeless tobacco users run an increased risk of

- high blood pressure
- constricted blood vessels
- stained teeth
- bad breath
- gum recession
- tooth decay

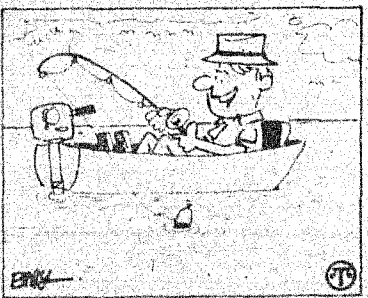

America On Water

Boating has never been more popular. Some 70 million Americans go boating every year, and that number is projected to grow to more than 95 million by the year 2000. One reason for boating's popularity: today's typical boating package costs less than \$8,000.

Consider: the best-selling boat package—a 16-footer with outboard motor and trailer—averages just about \$7,700, according to the National Marine Manufacturer's Association (NMMA), the national trade organization of boat and marine equipment makers. NMMA president Jeff Napier says, "Boating is so popular among average Americans that it can be considered the 'vacation home' of America's middle class."

The number of boats sold yearly in the U.S. is about 725,000, an increase of nearly 50 percent in the last five years. The vast number of



boats sold are family runabouts, fishing boats and other recreational crafts. "The average boater is not a 'yachtsman,' but simply the average American," says Napier. "And the most popular boat is the small outboard runabout."

More outboard-motor boats are sold than any other kind—over 315,000 a year—and most are used by fishermen. Waterskiing, canoeing and sailing are also enjoyed by millions—without going overboard on their budget.

The SAHS boys set a new school record in the 1600m relay while taking first place with a time of 3:34.37.

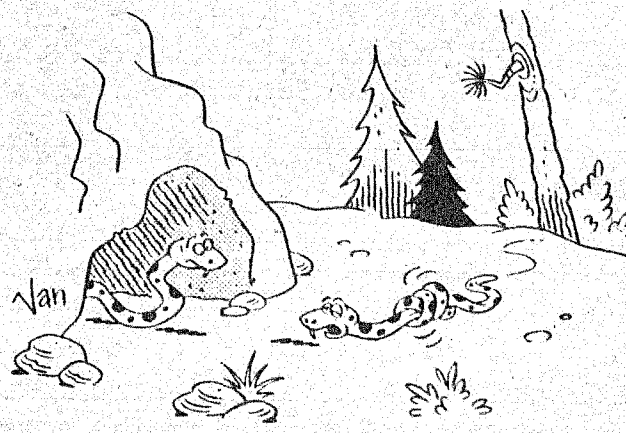
SAHS Citizen Of The Week

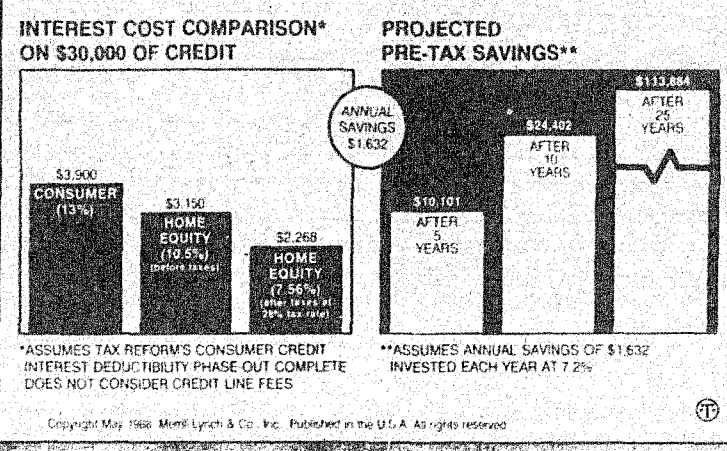

Back To Basics With A Balanced Financial Plan

HOW CREDIT MANAGEMENT BUILDS SAVINGS



Focusing on long-term financial goals is the new order. A balance of increased savings, continued investment growth and less expensive credit will help investors fulfill present needs while increasing their net worth and preparing for tomorrow. Dennis Hess, senior vice president at Merrill Lynch offers the following tips for investors in improving their balance sheets.

1. Increase savings by setting aside a fixed amount every week. Many people who are employed can now automatically deposit part of their paychecks into an employer sponsored savings and investment plan.

2. Review your savings and investments to make sure they are performing well in light of personal investment objectives. If changes are in order a financial consultant can help you focus on goals, determine how much risk is appropriate for you and select the best investments to suit your needs.

3. Re-examine credit spending. Due to tax reform, many of the credit strategies put in place only a year or two ago may no longer be the most cost-effective. For instance, the deductibility of consumer credit interest expense is being phased out from 40 percent in 1988 to 0 percent in 1991.

4. Replace consumer debt with less expensive credit to lower credit costs. Securities-based credit and home equity credit, for example, at rates of between 10 and 12 percent, are usually less expensive than consumer credit, even before taxes.

• Interest on securities-based credit used for investment purposes is deductible to the extent of net investment income. In addition, in 1988, 40 percent of the interest in excess of net investment income is also deductible—up to \$4,000.

The remainder may be carried over into 1989.

• Qualifying home mortgage interest, including interest on home equity credit lines on first and second homes, is another source of deductible interest. Rental property may qualify as a second home if the owner uses it for more than 14 days, or more than 10 percent of the time the property is rented, whichever is greater. Homeowners can borrow amounts secured by their residence up to a total of \$100,000, not to exceed the fair market value of their home, to buy or substantially improve their first and/or second home and fully deduct the interest. Homeowners can also deduct the interest on an additional \$100,000 on home equity credit lines borrowed for any purpose such as paying off consumer debt or funding a college education.

While not for everyone, home equity and securities-based credit can reduce taxes and interest expense while building reserves for the future.

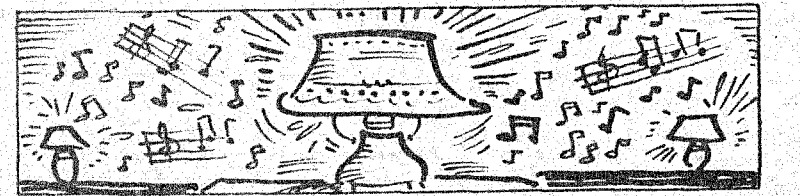

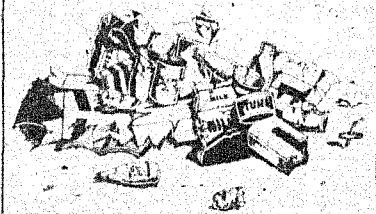

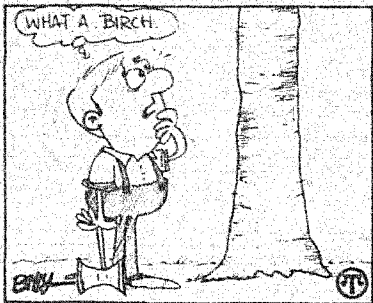

Did You Know...

The Sweet Facts

• The first known man-made sweetener was manufactured by the Romans. They boiled wine in lead pans to make a thick syrup called sapa. The resulting lead poisoning may have contributed to the decline of the Roman Empire.



• The material used for the production of xylitol, a natural sugar substitute, is birch wood. Although this may seem an unlikely source of sweetness, it is rich in the necessary xylan. One factor above all sets xylitol apart from other 'alternative' sweeteners: It simply cannot cause dental decay.

• A textbook from 1576 recently led United States scientists to extract a sweetener from a Mexican herb traditionally used by the Aztecs. The sweetener is called Hernandulcin, after Francisco Hernandez, the Spanish author of the book. A remaining problem is that its sweetness is followed by a bitter aftertaste.

• The West African miracle fruit (synsepalum dulcificum) has no taste of its own. Yet it has a unique effect on the palate: anything which is normally sour is made to taste extremely sweet. This effect can last for hours and makes the miracle fruit valuable for research into taste perception.

• Fructose is nearly twice as sweet as ordinary sugar. It is present in all sweet fruit and the oldest sweetener of all, honey, is 40% fructose. In some places, sweetness is so highly sought that tribesmen climb hundreds of feet, risking life and limb, for the prize of a honeycomb.

CHAIN SAWS INJURE ABOUT 23,000 PEOPLE ANNUALLY

COLLEGE STATION--Think safety when handling chain saws, since injuries caused by them send about 23,000 people to hospitals annually.

A safety expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said a chain saw potentially is one of the most dangerous power tools on the market today.

Thomas D. Valco, an agricultural safety engineer, said people who use lightweight chain saws for trimming trees, cutting firewood or clearing brush from land should be aware of hazards associated with their use.

"Two of every three chain saw injuries to operators and bystanders are caused by inadvertent direct contact with the blade of the saw resulting from failure to follow recommended operating procedures," Valco said. He said chain saw accidents occur in many different ways.

"For instance, the operator may reach across or hold work too near the moving saw or may lose control of the saw through loss of footing, sudden turns, climbing above ground level, or shifting the saw's weight while cutting at or above waist level," he said.

DIXIE PEANUT BRITTLE—OLD RECIPE UPDATED

Because raw shelled peanuts are now available in the produce sections of many grocery stores across the country, Peanut Brittle continues to be a popular homemade hostess gift, as well as a favorite snack of peanut lovers everywhere.

This Dixie Peanut Brittle recipe from the "good ole days" has been updated to accommodate a candy thermometer, assuring perfect results every time, and modernized even further for quick and easy microwave cooking.

Dixie Peanut Brittle (Stove Top)

2 cups granulated sugar
1 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup water
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 cups raw peanuts, skins on

2 tablespoons butter
2 teaspoons baking soda

In a heavy saucepan heat sugar, syrup, water and salt to a rolling boil. Add peanuts. Reduce heat to medium and stir frequently. Cook to hard crack stage (293°F). Add butter, then baking soda (mixture becomes light and foamy). Beat rapidly and pour onto a buttered surface, such as a baking sheet or marble slab. Quickly spread to about 1/4-inch thickness. When cool break into pieces. Store in an airtight container. Makes 3-1/2 pounds.

Peanut Brittle (In The Microwave)

1-1/2 cups raw peanuts, skins on
1 cup granulated sugar

1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon butter
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon baking soda

In a 1-1/2 quart microwave safe container stir together peanuts, sugar, syrup, and salt. Microwave on high for 4 minutes, remove from oven and stir. Return to oven and microwave on high for 4 more minutes. Remove from oven; stir in butter and vanilla. Return to oven and microwave on high 2 minutes more. Remove from oven, quickly stir in baking soda, (mixture becomes foamy). Immediately pour onto a lightly greased surface, spreading thin. When cool, break into pieces. Store in an airtight container. Makes 1 pound.

A Guide to Texas State Agencies

Landmark Legislation Opens State Government

AUSTIN — In 1850, city of Galveston officials passed quarantine laws to combat an outbreak of yellow fever epidemics. It was one of the first attempts at public regulation in the new state of Texas, and eventually resulted in the establishment of the Department of Health in 1879.

Today, the list of regulatory agencies has mushroomed to almost 300 in number. Their powerful influence extends to every facet of public and private life, from banking to education to molhair. Only recently have Texans glimpsed the increasingly complex machinery of administrative law and been given the opportunity to effectively participate in the decision making process.

During the next few months the Texas Register section of the Office of the Secretary of State will publish a series of state agency profiles. Each feature will focus on the history, functions and regulatory authority of a single agency. We hope these articles will help citizens better appreciate the roll and scope of contemporary Texas government and encourage participation in the shaping of public policy. The series begins with a brief history of administrative reform in Texas and events leading to the creation of the Texas Register.

By the early 1950's the alarming proliferation of state regulatory activity during the first half of the twentieth century had aroused considerable interest in the future status of administrative law in Texas. Legal and political debate centered on "the dilemma of balancing the need to expedite agency action

in the public interest with the need to preserve private rights through due process of law." Editors in the May 1969 *Texas Law Review* framed the problem this way. The two major goals of administrative government, they observed, are functionality and fairness. However, achievement of one goal too often involves sacrificing the other. The article concluded that much of the blame for this inconsistency must ultimately rest on Texas' failure to produce an administrative procedure act applicable to all agencies with statewide jurisdiction.

The Administrative Law Committee of the Texas Bar Association had laid the groundwork for such a comprehensive act as early as 1953, but official action on the issue proved slow in coming. A report published by the Texas Civil Judicial Council in 1957 opposed the sweeping proposal, recommending instead that its scope be confined only to rulemaking.

Four more years elapsed before the 57th Legislature in 1961 passed Article 6252-13. Following the Council's recommendation, it established minimum guidelines for filing procedural rules with the Office of the Secretary of State. Significantly, the statute did not address the difficult topic of substantive rules, nor specify a particular method of publishing rules for public access. These questions would have to wait for nearly 15 years.

Over the course of the next decade, the Administrative Law Committee continued its efforts to formulate an administrative procedure act specially suited to the

needs of the state's burgeoning bureaucracy. Senate Bill 16 and House Bill 761 were finally introduced in 1971, but failed to come to a vote in either house. Similar bills were introduced again in 1973 with similar results. The Bill was introduced for the last time in 1975 as S.B. 41 and H.B. 531. After amending it to incorporate the provisions of the Texas Register Act, the final version passed in both the House and Senate.

On April 22, 1975, Governor Dolph Briscoe signed into law the landmark Administrative Procedure and Texas Register Act. The move capped over 20 years of controversy surrounding the push for regulatory reform in Texas, and for the first time prescribed a program to codify and disseminate agency rules for public scrutiny.

The Texas Register published its first issue on January 6, 1976.
