Horns Off To Regional Contests

Longhorn tracksters compiled 124 points for third place in the team totals of the District 3AA track meet held Friday in Farwell. Seven thinclads will be competing in nine events in regional competition.

Chad Black and Kevin Belt will compete in three events each. Other seeking "tickets to state" are Santos Valenzuela, Arnie Gonzales, Daniel Guzman, Robert Martinez and Dale Scott.

Black qualified for regional with a second place win in the 220 yard dash with 23.66 and first place wins in the high jump (6') and pole vault (10'3"). He narrowly missed qualifying the broad jump, finishing third with 20'9".

Belt qualified in the 120 high hurdles with a 15.7 second place win. He was first in the 330 intermediate hurdles and ran the last lap in the mile relay.

Other members of the second place relay team were Martinez, Guzman and Gonzales. Their time was 3:40.48.

Gonzales was second in the 880 yard run with 2:07.98.

Valenzuela was runner-up winner in the discus with 114'. Scott came in second in the 100 yard dash with 11.24.

Martinez, Guzman, Black and Scott ran third in the 440 yard relay with 45.22 and fifth in the highs with 17.4.

Dave Ingram finished fourth in the shot with 41'3 1/2" and Rene Gonzales was fifth in the 440 dash with 56.0.

TSTI Mobil Unit

To Be At HHS

One purpose of a high school education is to become exposed and/or acquainted with various career options available after graduation. Seniors and juniors of Hart High School will be shown options open to them in the field of vocational education. The opportunity will come Wednesday, May 6 when the mobil unit of TSTI visits the local high school campus. A student services representative of the Amarillo Campus of Texas State Technical Institute will bring the specially equipped van to Hart. The large van seats about 20 students for audio visual presentation of the three campuses, Amarillo, Waco and Sweetwater. The film shows scenes from each campus and gives an overview of programs at each.

Programs available on the Amarillo campus will be explained and seniors acquainted with costs and the process of enrolling should they desire training in one of the programs offered by TSTI. These programs prepare students in such trades as air frame mechanics, auto and/or diesel mechanics, secretarial training, cosmetology, electronics, truck driving, butcher, shoe repair, saddle making and others.

David Grayson, counselor, explains that a few years ago, students interested in enrolling in vocational or trade schools had to go to Dallas, Denver or Phoenix. This usually proved expensive. Now, through TSTI at the old Amarillo Air Force Base, and Amarillo College Vocational, students can receive the necessary training near home, at minimum costs. Both schools are accredited and meet requirements for eligible students to receive financial assistance through the basic grants.

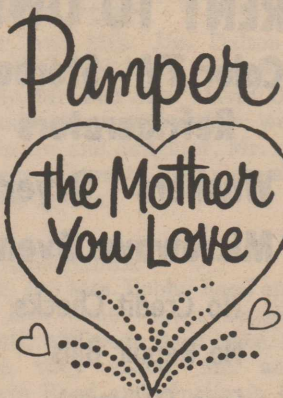

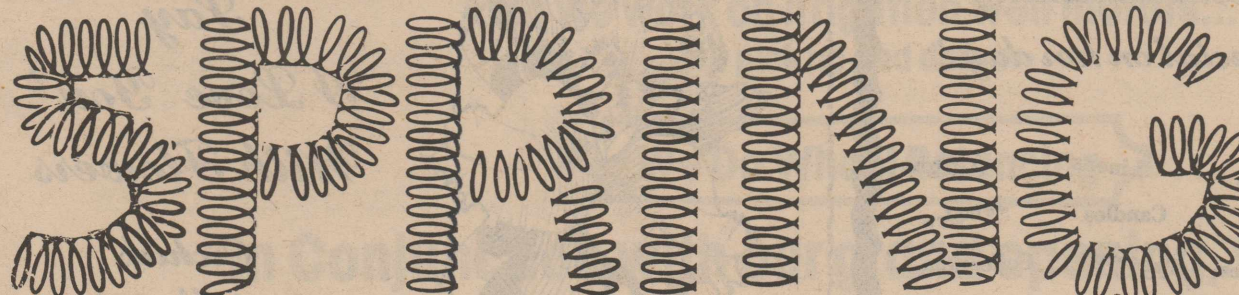

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Marlos May Is Representative Of Federal Land Bank Meeting

Marlos A. May of Dimmitt, has just returned from Houston where he represented The Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt at the 26th Annual Stockholders Meeting of The Federal Land Bank of Texas. The meeting, held at the Houston Oaks Hotel, was attended by members of 60 Federal Land Bank Associations in Texas. There were about 750 persons in attendance.

Thomas H. Benson, president, in his report to the stockholders, stated that there was an increasing demand for new loans in 1980. This was the second largest year of loans closed in the Bank's history, with 3,744 loans closed for a total of \$322.3 million. This compares to 1979 figures of 3,960 loans closed, for a total of \$337.8 million.

"In this period of historic high interest rate, the advantages of the variable rate were apparent with our members paying rates somewhat below the prevailing rate," Benson explained.

Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports



AUSTIN -- Grain is very important to the people in our district. We grow more grain in the Panhandle and the South Plains than is in just about any area of the state.

Everything that is important to people will cause a dispute from time to time. Grain, and particularly the quality of grain, is no different.

Every dispute needs a referee. That's why we passed a bill to license grain samplers.

There have been too many disputes between buyers and sellers of grain about the quality of the grain. Generally the grain is sold out of an elevator to, for example, a feedlot. The better the grain, the higher the price it brings.

The buyer and the seller agree on a price for grain of a certain quality. So what happens if, after the grain is delivered, the buyer and the seller disagree about the quality of the grain? It may be too late then to take another sample. The grain may have been shipped overseas; it may be seed grain, or it may have been consumed by that time.

Those who deal in grain know that it is possible to take different samples from the same shipment of grain. The quality of those sam-

ples may vary widely. So who wins?

Under our bill to license grain samplers, there would be more than just the word of one interested party against the word of another interested party. This bill will license and bond grain samplers to provide a means to decide on the quality of grain from objective standards. Certainly many organizations will soon employ at least one licensed grain sampler, though this bill is not mandatory.

But we think the licensed grain sampler will be a form of insurance for the buyer and a point of pride for the seller. The number of disputes about the quality of grain should be few, and the requirement that the sampler be bonded will provide an incentive for his careful performance.

Training and testing for the grain samplers will be under the direction of the Commissioner of Agriculture. It should be short and to the point. The Commissioner will work out the details of the program.

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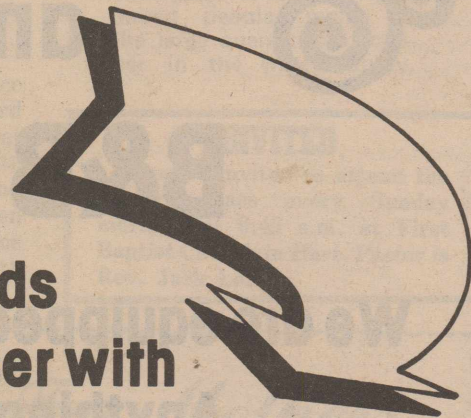

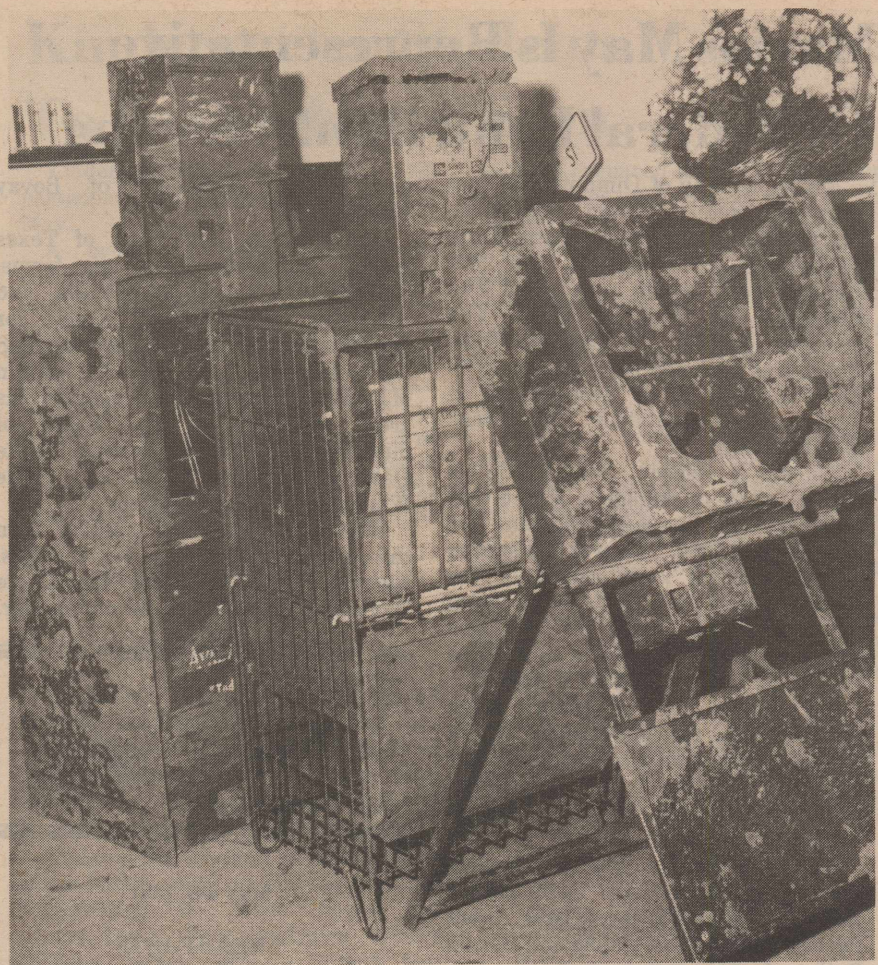
