IS IT MASS Hysteria?

The picture, once again of mysterious unidentified objects in our skies has hit the front pages of newspapers across the nation.

What might be most interesting to Colorado City residents is that a large percentage of these reports UFO's are reported from the West Texas-New Mexico area.

Not generally known, however, is the fact that the first object seen in the vicinity of Colorado City was reported in 1936.

Police here reported Monday that a Colorado City woman told them Monday morning that she had seen an unidentified object in the sky near her home.

She said she sighted the object at about 9:30 in the evening several days before a rampaging, brightly lighted, egg-shaped "thing" frightened a number of motorists in the vicinity of Lovelock.

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Daniel's Legislative Program Near Passage With Changes

Texas Press Association Gov. Price Daniel's special session legislative program apparently is on the way to being passed with additions and changes here and there.

Both Senate and House passed water bills differing quite a bit from each other, and even more from the measure the governor requested.

Governor Daniel asked for a statewide water planning division with an appropriation of \$1,024,000. He also asked for state authority to contract with the federal government for water storage in federal reservoirs.

Cut-out of the House bill was the water storage provision. Appropriation also reduced to about \$500,000.

Senate cut the appropriation to \$600,000 and gave the proposed new division authority, Waco research, but not to formulate an overall plan.

It authorized conservation storage agreements, but only if they are first approved by the Legislature.

Biggest wrangle came when some House members tried to insert an amendment that would allow landowners to use water from small farm lakes for irrigation.

Result was a city vs. farm battle of the sort that has derided overall water programming efforts for years.

Amendment was killed in the House.

Lobby Proposals House and Senate committees looked pretty much alike on them, by lobbyists.

Both would require registration of paid lobbyists and report on how much they spend to influence legislation.

Senate would require details on how the money was spent.

A proposed substitute measure in the House would make the lawmakers responsible for reporting money spent on them by lobbyists.

Supporters of the crime study commission bill were dismayed at the turn it took in the House.

Before passage, the House put in a provision that the commission's sessions should be behind closed doors.

It was the only change in part which disturbed the governor. Main purpose of the commission, he said, was to give the public more information on law enforcement and crime prevention.

Tangled Trail Senate investigation committee continued efforts to chop through the tangled financial history of three Dallas insurance firms.

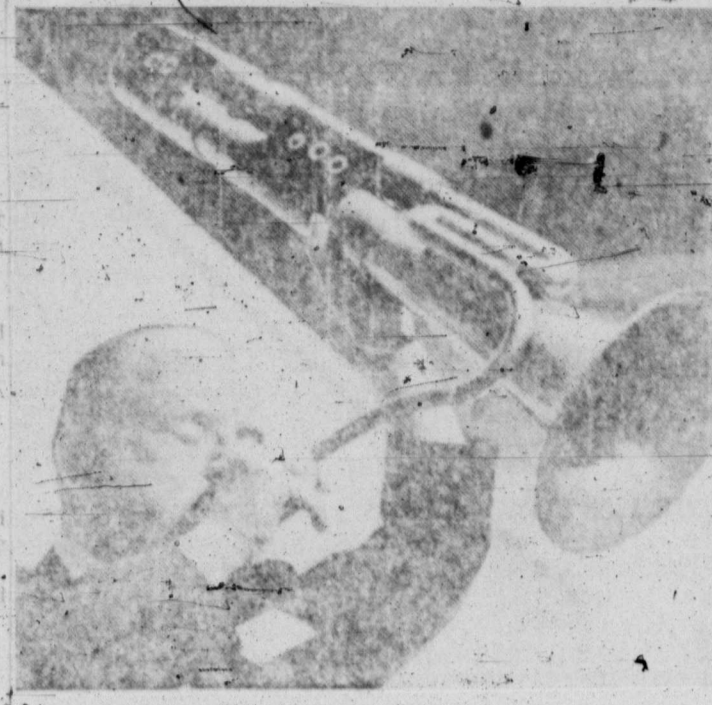

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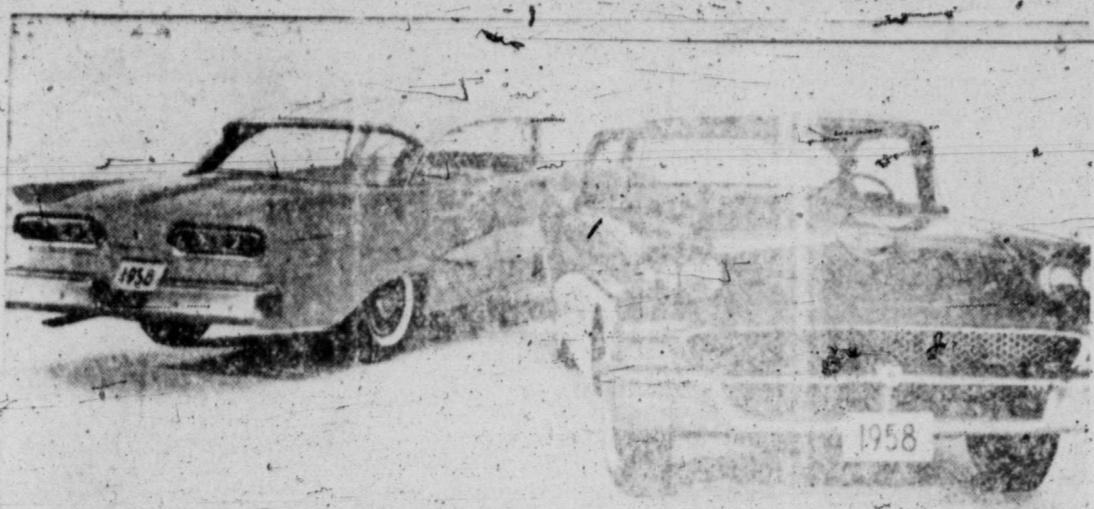
