Callahan County Commissioners Meeting Held

Peit jury panels in district, JP and county courts in Callahan County will be picked by electronic means after Callahan County Commissioners' voted to adopt a resolution to that effect during a regular commissioners' court meeting Monday, September 12.

County Judge Bill Johnson said commissioners' voted unanimously to adopt a resolution to select persons for jury duty by electronic means beginning immediately.

Judge Johnson stated the Secretary of State furnished Callahan County with a computer list of county residents using a person's driver's license or voter registration card. He said the state also furnished the county with a computer program which will choose people for jury duty randomly.

Johnson said previously, jury panels were picked after a person's name was drawn from a hopper. He said names of

Tax-Aide Volunteers Needed

American Association of Retired Persons Tax-Aide volunteers come from an amazing variety of backgrounds. With the support of the Internal Revenue Service, AARP supplies the organization to put that eagerness to work. The training program emphasizes precise knowledge of tax items affecting older persons. Classes taught by IRS employees and specially trained AARP Tax-Aide volunteer instructors.

The training normally lasts five days and volunteers are required to pass an exam before they are authorized to be counselors. Volunteers are reimbursed for necessary out-of-pocket expenses such as mileage, parking, meals, post-

age, and basic supplies.

Tax counselors enjoy the work so much and are so dedicated that many return year after year. However, the program continues to grow and more volunteers are always needed.

county residents appeared on separate pieces of paper and were drawn under the supervision of the county sheriff.

Judge Johnson said grand juries will still be chosen in the same way. He said grand juries are appointed by a grand jury commission. The grand jury commission is chosen by the district judge.

Other items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—The county commissioners voted to approve the tax rate in Callahan County for the 1994-95 fiscal year. The county's tax rate totals .3553 cents per \$100 of property value. The rate approve by the commissioners is this year's effective tax rate, the tax rate which will generate the same amount of tax revenue as last year. The effective tax rate was slightly higher than last year's tax rate because of a \$6 million decline in the county's tax valuation. This year's tax rate includes .2724 cents per \$100 for general county and .0829 cents per \$100 for Farm to Market roads.

—County commissioners arranged for federal government food commodity distribution in the county on Wednesday, September 14.

—Commissioners met with County Attorney Allen Wright in regards to the county attorney's budget using seized money. The county attorney must have the budget approved by the commissioners every year.

Wright stated \$9,408 in seized funds has been budgeted. He said \$6,000 will be used to supplement the county investigator's salary, \$1,719 will be used for office supply purchases and \$1,689 will be set aside for in-service schooling.

—County commissioners tabled setting fees charged by the county sheriff and constables. The item is being tabled until the September 26 commissioners' court meeting date.

—Commissioners voted to set the early voting polling places in Callahan County for the upcoming general election in November.

The early voting locations include the Clyde Justice of the Peace office, the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office and the County Clerk's office at the county courthouse in Baird.

Early voting for the November 8 general election will be held from October 19 until November 4. Early voting will take place at the three early locations during regular business hours from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. weekdays.

GARDEN TIPS OF THE MONTH

September-when sultry weather turns into the crisp days of fall-is the month to dig tender bulbs for winter safekeeping. Handle and care for each bulb as directed on the package or as directed by your nursery person. Dahlias, tuberous begonia, canna caladium and many others need special care.

You can turn your garden into "brown gold" this month by saving leaves, grass, weeds, flowers, and other spent organic material that you'd otherwise throw away. When decomposed, compost will return nutrients to the soil and improve soil drainage.

To construct a compost bin, set four corner stakes and attach wire mesh to enclose the area. Arrange your compost pile in layers. We recommend this

recipe: 12 inches organic matter, 1 cup 5-10-5 fertilizer or layer of manure, 1 or 2 inches of soil, 1 cup of lime. Repeat layers until the pile is 5 feet high.

Moisture is essential to the decaying process, so spray the pile frequently with a hose. After two weeks, turn the heap over to aerate the contents.

Because organic material depends on warmth to break down quickly, compost will decay slowly during the winter months. But once mild weather returns in the spring, the compost should be ready to use in about six weeks.

It takes four pounds of tea leaves to make a pound of manufactured tea.

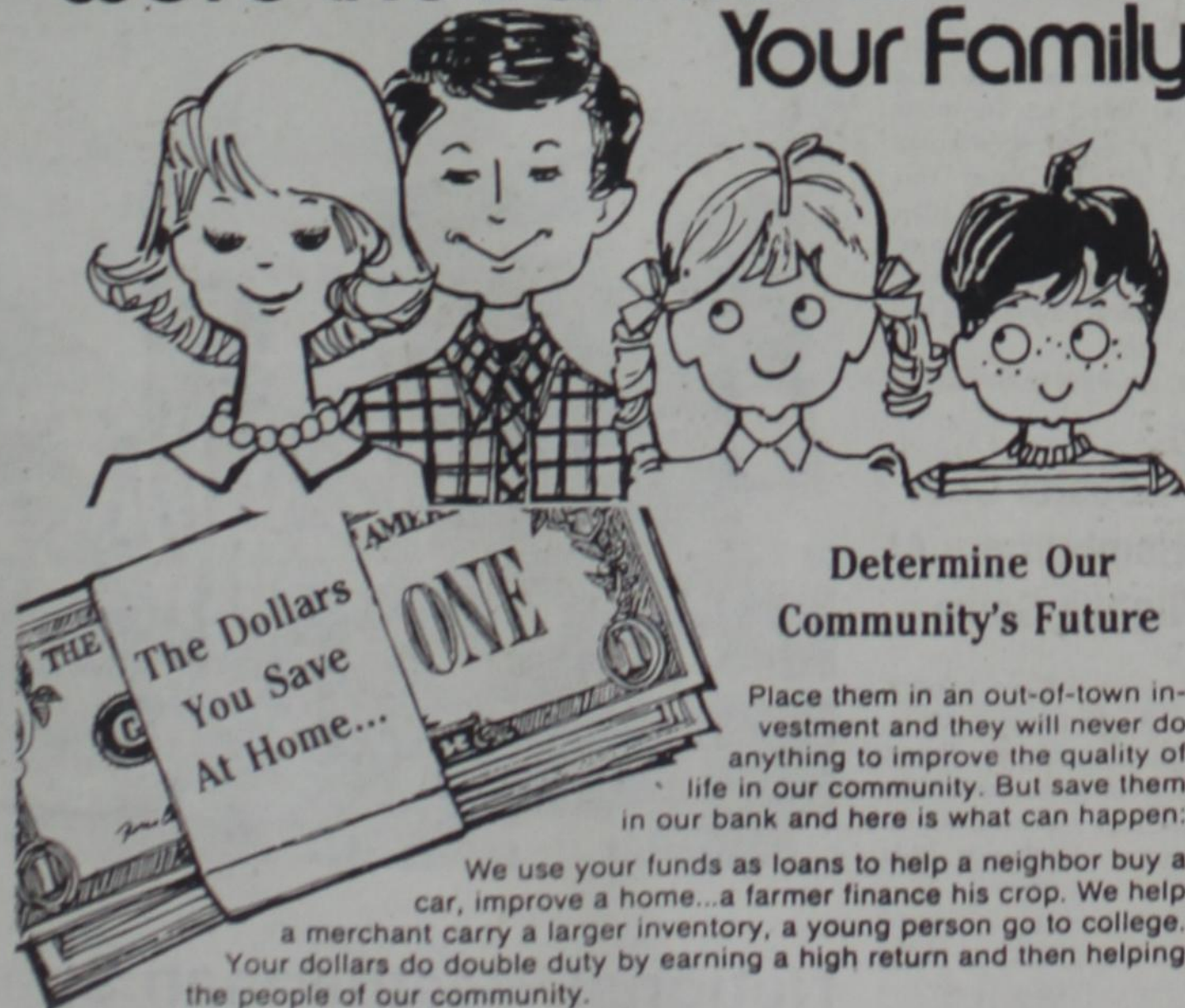

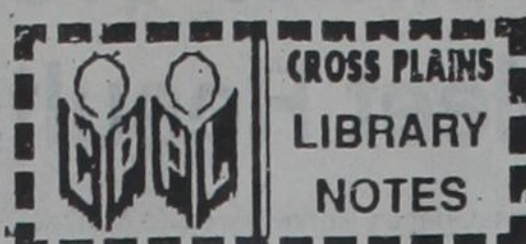

Belews Attended Army Reunion In Georgia

Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Below left for Savannah, Georgia on August 23 to attend Hubert's 4th Armored Division Reunion that was held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel. There were around 650 men and their wives attending the 48th Annual Reunion. Hubert was able to visit with two men he hadn't seen since the war was over in 1945, Arthur Toth from Alexandria, Virginia and Bev Fitchett from Richmond, Virginia. Fitchett lived only 70 miles from where Hubert was born and raised in Charlottesville, Virginia. Fitchett and Hubert recalled hitchhiking from California, where they were stationed, to Virginia and then joined the division at Camp Bowie in Brownwood.

From their room on River Street, Hubert and Celia could see the Landing Burge. They viewed the tug boats, the Savannah River Queen, and a new bridge that had been built across the river which had not yet been named.

The couple went on a bus tour of old Savannah and saw a lot of landmarks. They saw the Waving Girl Statue and relived the Legend of Florence Martus, who was known for her vigilance to her fiancé who sailed away in the 1800's and never returned. Florence waved a white scarf by day and a lantern by night to every ship that passed her lighthouse home for 40 plus years in vain. The reason for her long vigil died with her, but the legend lives on.

The Belews went with Arthur and Rena Toth to Pulaski State Park where they viewed monuments and read about battles fought during the Civil War. They saw a picture of where the South made their last stand, which was interesting to Celia as her grandfather, John Petty, died in 1916 in the Civil War. He lived in Louisiana at the time.

They attended a banquet on Saturday night, August 27, and had a group picture made. After more visiting, they had to say good bye and hoped they would see each other in St. Louis in 1995. This division lost 1,519 men in action during World War II.

The Belews left for home on Sunday. They also stopped at Vicksburg, Mississippi and went through the battle field and cemetery and visited more historical monuments. They arrived at Cross Plains on Tuesday thankful to the Lord for a safe and wonderful trip.

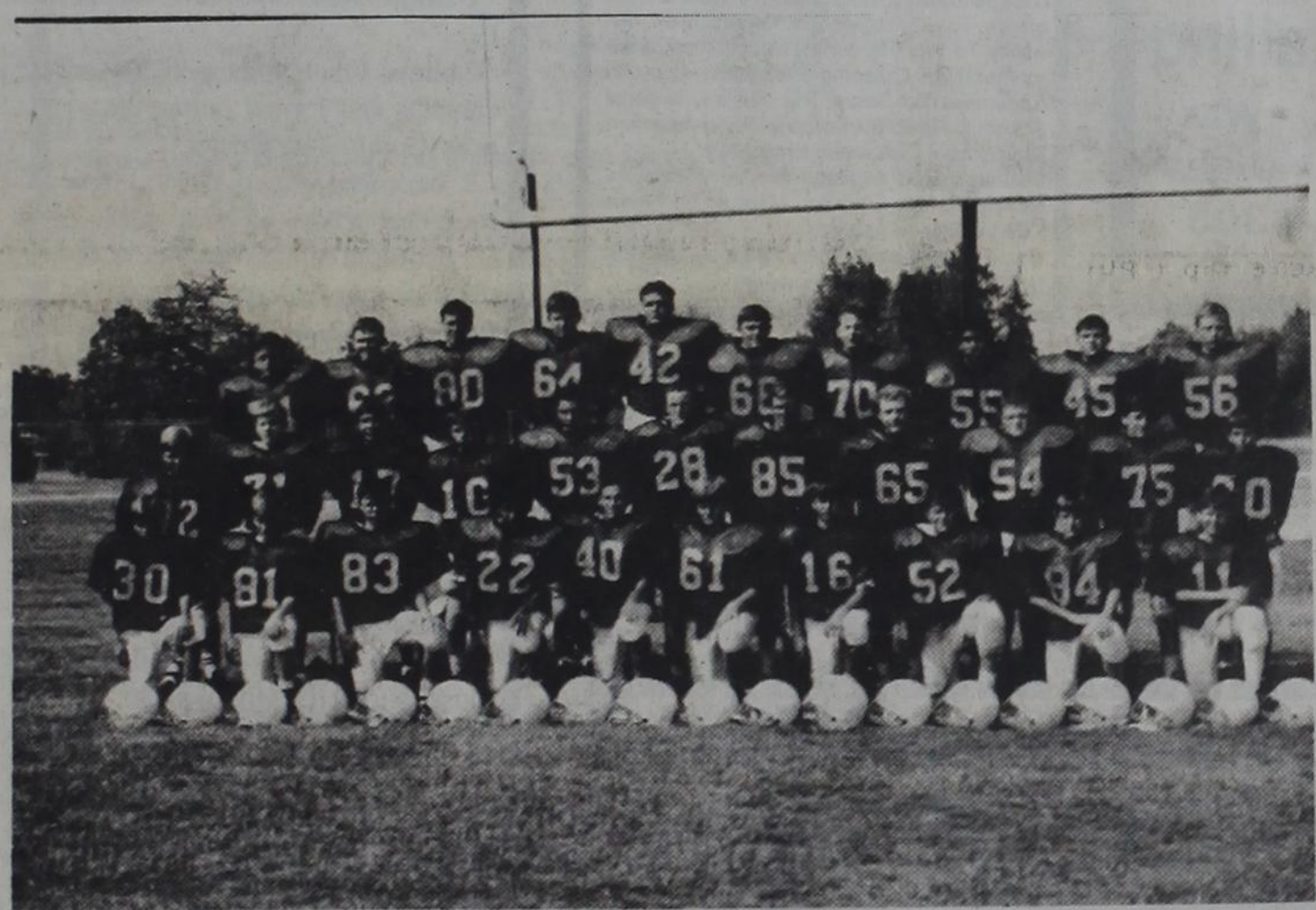

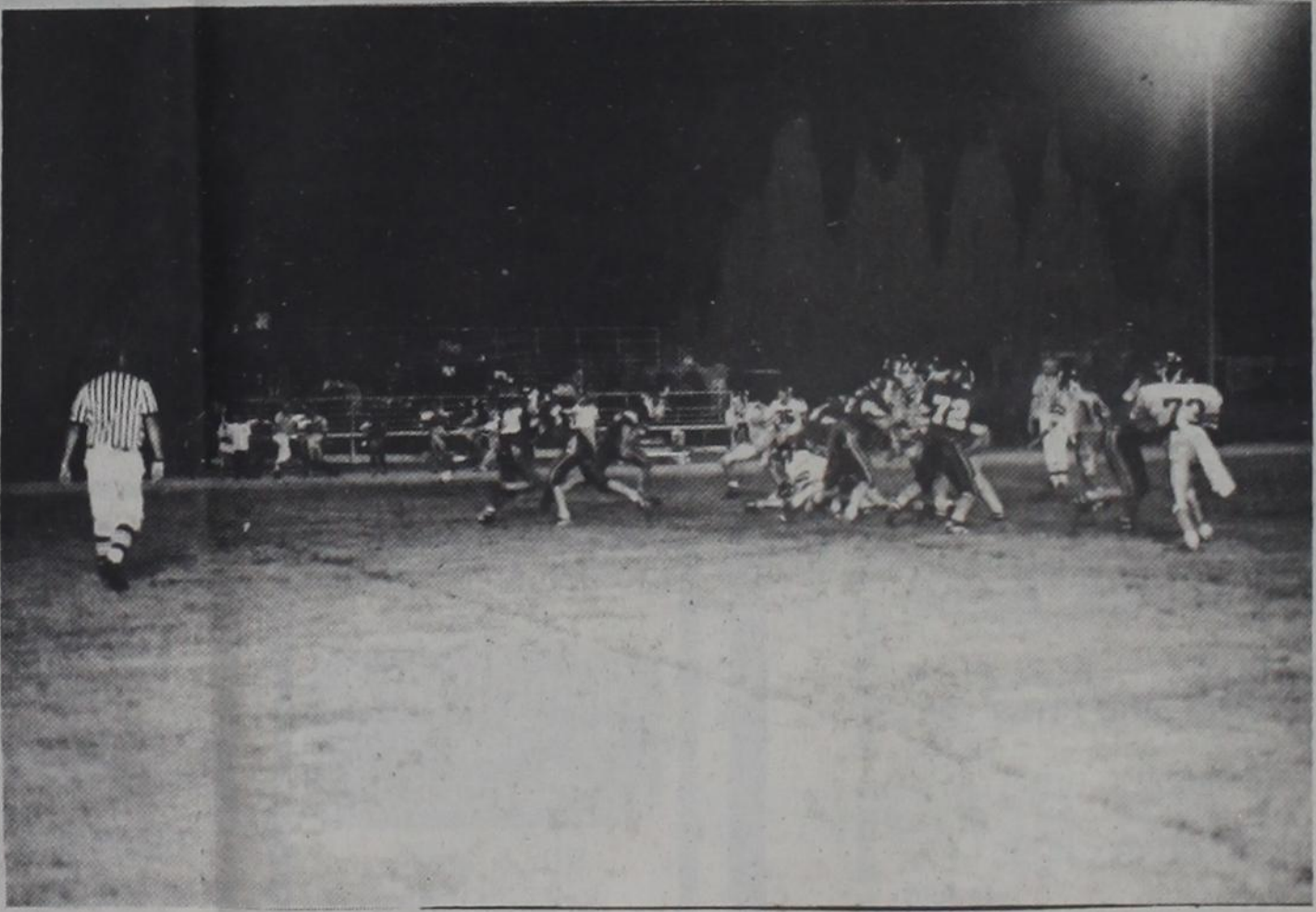

Hi, everyone in Cross Plains,

Well I know that it has been a long time since I've written, but I've been real busy with work and other things.

There are a lot of different things to do and see here in Japan. They have a small version of the Statue of Liberty in a town 45 kilometers from where I'm stationed.

They have firework festivals and others types of festivals. It is hard to describe the different festivals that they have over here. But they are a sight to see.

On the tenth of August, they had the 94 Air Show here on base, and 120,000 people showed up. Blue Impulse, the Japanese version of the Thunder Birds, and Thunder Birds were here. The Thunder Birds had not been in Japan since 1953, and the people enjoyed their aerobatic displays the best.

It is really nice over here and I'm having a great time. I'm learning the language and I have been eating many different types of local dishes. The food is good, and the people here are real friendly.

Right now, I may be leaving her in December 94, or January 95. I may be going to Okinawa or New Jersey, but right now I'm not sure. I'm hoping to get to go to Okinawa because I'm not ready to come back state side yet. There is too much to see and I want to learn more of the culture.

Ever since I've been in the Air Force, I have been to a lot of different countries and seen a lot of different cultures. There is one thing that I know, and that is that the best way to learn about a culture is to go and find out about it in person.

I know this for a fact because I have been to England, Germany, Africa, Spain, and now, Japan. I've learned a lot of different things from all of my travels. But the most important one is that you should never turn from God, because there are a lot of different temptations out here in the world. God will always be there to help, no matter what the hardship is.

If any of this year's Seniors are thinking about joining the military, my suggestion to them is to make sure the military is right for them. The military is changing. It is reorganizing and down-manning. And sometimes it seems that one person is doing as much work as three people used to. Now don't get me wrong, I do like the Air Force, but I'm just letting the Seniors know that they should at least ask the military recruiter a lot of different questions, such as how the reorganizing and down-manning will affect them.

I guess school has already started back there. I just want to say good luck to everyone who participates in any extra curricular activities. To all of the faculty and students, I want to say have a good year. To everyone in Cross Plains, I want to say I'm sorry about all of the damage done by the tornadoes, and that I miss everyone back there.

Co. Jobless Rate Falls

Callahan County's unemployment rate dropped nine-tenths of one percent between June and July 1994, according to unemployment figures released Friday, September 2 by the Texas Employment Commission.

The county's unemployment rate now stands at 4.6 percent, down from the 5.5 percent jobless rate recorded in June of

1994.

Of the 5,682 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 5,420 had jobs during July 1994, and 262 didn't, giving the county a jobless rate of 4.6 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 5.5 percent in June 1994. Of the 5,657 civilian labor force in the county last month, 5,347 had jobs while 310 or

5.5 percent did not.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County include: 4.7 in May, 4.7 percent in April, 6.0 percent in March, 6.7 percent in February, 4.6 percent in January 1994, 4.6 percent in December 1993, 4.5 percent in November, 5.1 percent in October, 4.8 percent in September, 5.0 percent in August and 5.3 per-

cent in July, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and their unemployment rates for July 1994 include: Brown, 8.0 percent; Coleman, 6.8 percent; Eastland, 6.7 percent; Jones, 5.0 percent; Runnels, 4.4 percent; Shackelford, 6.4 percent; Stephens, 6.0 percent; and Taylor County, 5.8 percent.

The unemployment rate in the state during July was 6.8 percent, down from the 7.2 percent jobless rate in June. The jobless rate in Texas one year ago last

July was 7.2 percent.

The total civilian labor force in the state was 9,623,100 for July 1994. The total unemployment was 657,000 in July. Total employment in July was 8,966,100.
