Hundreds Engaged With Improvement Programs

Dawson County Has Started Building Boom

A steady building pace that was started in the late fall, with harvest of cotton crops, has continued into February and business leaders together with building tradesmen anticipate the largest building development in Dawson county since 1929 to continue for some time. A careful survey reflects tradesmen are active, supply yard report business normal and prospects good, while a few report boom sales as new homes are beginning to get underway particularly in the rural area and plans are announced for improvements within the city.

New building projects, renovating and additions are included in the majority of programs now being conducted in virtually all parts of the county.

A checkup reveals the following known results: Abilene Spraberry of the Midway community, fourteen miles southeast of town, has a new five-room and bath, rock veneer home in the course of construction. Mr. and Mrs. Jim Waldrup, of the McCarty community, six miles east of town, are credited with having rocks on the location where markers have been staked for a six room rock veneer. W. C. Cowager's rock home was scheduled to have started this week, nine miles south of town on the Stanton Highway. Walter Lawrence, stockman and farmer of the Hancock community, northeast of town has a nice rural home under construction. While minor projects include re-modeling on five-room house for B. Fancher, southeast of town; a new two-room house for W. T. Carroll, completed last week west of town; M. F. McReynolds, of Patricia, made improvements on his home recently; J. H. Foster, Klondike farmer is adding two rooms, and there are countless others.

NEW SERVICE STA. WILL BE ERECTED AT MAIN-SECOND

T. B. Fulkerson, Cosden Petroleum Company distributor for Dawson and Gaines counties, announces plans have been completed for a permanent building for his local retail station now located in the I. E. Huddleston building on North Main. The site is northeast of his present location and will front North Main and North Second Streets.

Mr. Fulkerson stated he only recently planned to build a stucco building with other improvements, since purchasing a five room home at 305 North Main. The station will occupy a part of the lot which is 75x140 feet and is an ideal location for his business.

Work is scheduled to begin the first of next week when concrete and the foundation will be started. A double garage on the property was begun on Wednesday. He expects to occupy the new location in the late spring if possible before the first of May.

His improvements are in keeping with those now underway by his company which is spending \$100,000 revamping their Big Spring plant, ranked as one of the largest in the South.

BROWNFIELD CITIZENS HOLD CONFERENCE TO SECURE ROAD SURVEY

Lamesa Is Represented In Terry County Session

A committee of local civic leaders went to Brownfield Wednesday afternoon to meet with the Commissioners' Court of Terry county and interested citizens for discussion relative to the Lamesa-Brownfield proposed highway. The Committee was arranged at the request of the Brownfield Lions club together with the Lamesa Luncheon club.

The local delegation including Judge W. M. Yates, Carl Rountree, A. G. Bearden, O. G. Kelly, J. E. Barron, Seaborn Collins, Louis B. Reed and Vernon D. Adcock, were guests of the Lions club at noon after which they went into conference with the Commissioners. Much interest was shown by this group who stated they would make a request to the Highway Commission that survey be granted Terry county in the near future whereby plans for securing right-of-way easements can proceed, stating they hope to be able to go ahead with grading and draining to Dawson county's line soon.

Brownfield is eager to rush the project in as much as they will be given a direct highway outlet to points south and east by the way of Lamesa where the proposed thoroughfare will join Highway 9 and 15. The road is also considered a very important farm to market improvement from a business angle and will afford outlets to farmers in this trade territory.

The Dawson county survey was ordered at the recent Highway Commission meeting and George M. Garrett, division engineer of District 5, is expected here soon to make the survey.

NEW LAMESA FIRE TRUCK EXPECTED IN THIRTY DAYS

The new municipal fire truck which was ordered on December 30, is expected to arrive here within the next thirty days from the American LaFrance Company at Elmira, New York. James Sumpter, city fire chief, announces the truck is expected shortly after the first of March as specifications for this special order call for its delivery within a designated period.

When the truck arrives Lamesa's fire department, already better than the average town of its size, will then compare favorably with the larger cities of West Texas. The old International truck will be disposed of upon receipt of the new purchase and the fire department will have two good trucks.

Only recently the city commission purchased 400 feet of hose. Enough small hose was purchased with their new truck to take care of the booster and the city's key rate may be reduced as soon as present penalties can be lifted.

BIG DAWSON COUNTY INDUSTRIAL WORKS EQUIPS MACHINERY

Henningsen Bros. Egg Cracking Plant To Open

W. F. Hessler, manager of the local Henningsen Bros. Egg Processing Plant, which is located at the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation in the northeast part of Lamesa, is preparing to start operation within the next few days and will likely be run full capacity in a few weeks.

The plant which has been operated some every year since 1932 is preparing for one of their heavier seasons in Dawson county this year. Their plant has a capacity to handle from 900 to 1,000 cases of eggs daily, which they ship to the eastern markets after they are powdered. The plant is equipped with two drying processes with spray and pan systems.

Farmers of Dawson county are indirectly affected when this plant is in operation and it is said the price is usually boosted. Eggs are purchased from the local jobbers, grocers and produce houses over the area.

Henningsen Bros. Inc., operate similar plants in Denison and Fort Worth but find that Dawson county's poultry interest cannot be equalled in other sections of the state.

Elizabeth Arnett Has Leading Role In Stage Production

Arnett returned from Dallas Wednesday night where they attended the opening of Dallas Little Theatre production "Stage Door" by George Kaufman and Edna Ferber in which their daughter, Elizabeth, was cast in the leading role as Terry Randall, the girl to whom the theatre means everything.

Miss Arnett who is a graduate of the Lamesa high school, apparently turned in a wonderful performance according to Dallas critics who wrote the following accounts:

This little girl has come a long way, and in this her best part to date, she plays with attractiveness and skill. \$83,000 School Bond Election Called March 3

A petition signed by more than sixty persons was presented to the local school board at their meeting Tuesday night requesting an election within thirty days for the purpose of voting bonds in the amount of \$83,000 for erection and equipment for two new school buildings. The petition requested the bonds to be serial and paid within thirty years bearing a rate of interest not to exceed four and one-half per cent.

As a result the proposition of constructing additional public free school facilities for the Independent school district will be the text of an election called for March 3, 1938 according to an election order passed by the Lamesa school board. The issue naturally will be settled by Lamesa tax payers on the date of election.

The most crowded conditions in the local schools are in the primary grades. Five classes are housed in the high school building and others are in the rooms of the elementary school building which is sub-floor, cement floored and not too well lighted. It is proposed at the present time, to erect a building especially adapted to the instructional needs of the primary grade children to consist of twelve rooms storage space and auxiliary rooms necessary to a modern school building. This is regarded as the most serious need.

The other structure proposed is a Physical Education and Health unit for the children of all grades, adapted to the indoor use of both boys and girls with separate accommodations.

The structures proposed will relieve both the present buildings of overcrowded conditions. Additional pupil space is needed in both buildings, according to school authorities, who state in many instances three pupils must use a locker designed for one. Space for group practice in band and choral club music is also needed and will be met if the new plant is constructed.

Nineteen new pupils were admitted to the elementary grade, this week and two more were enrolled in the high school to bring the total enrollment to 1,603 white children. There were four pupils who withdrew during the same time, leaving a net gain of fifteen in the net enrollment. The number of pupils now belonging in the elementary grades are 1,068 while the enrollment reached in the high school is 535. More than thirty pupils are enrolled in the colored school.

The seating capacity has been exceeded regularly during the term. Chairs tables and improvised seating arrangements are being used until additional equipment and room are available.

Conservation Was 1937 Theme of West Texas Extension Service

College Station, Feb. 7.—The Texas A. and M. College Extension Service District 6, made up of 39 counties in West Texas, saw a big increase in range, soil, and water conservation, trench silos, and other activities, supervised by county agricultural agents in 1937, the annual report of District Agent J. D. Prewitt shows.

More than 10,400 farmers and ranchmen signed up 24 million acres and will receive benefit payments in return for conservation practices which they have carried out. The year saw 98,162 acres terraced and an additional 71,536 acres contour-planted on 1,308 farms and ranches.

In Reagan county alone, 2,388,000 feet of pasture terraces were constructed on 10,150 acres of range land under the supervision of the county agricultural agent.

Farmers built 1420 tanks which enabled them to utilize their grazing land to better advantage. More than three million yards of dirt were moved in building these tanks.

Deferred grazing was practiced on 1,235,555 acres involving 288 ranches. Prickly pear was removed from 323,200 acres of range land and an additional 110,333 acres were rescued from lechuguilla.

County agricultural agents supervised the construction of 228 spreader dams and spreader terraces on 77 ranches for the purpose of diverting run-off water to range land.

Prewitt gave credit for much of the work to commissioners' courts in a large number of counties where road machinery was furnished at cost for constructing terraces on farms and ranches.

Cotton improvement work drew considerable interest with 555 farmers organizing 11 one-variety cotton communities with a total acreage of 35,835. Other activities in the district included 1,070 swine, 795 sheep and 99 swine demonstrations.

L. E. Eager Announces Candidacy For Mayor

In making this announcement for Mayor of Lamesa, I have in mind that I have been a citizen among you for the past nine years, and by that record you shall make your decision as to my fitness for the office. I have some thoughts as to some measures I would favor if elected and will name them briefly as follows:

I favor a well defined traffic system with definite regulations which the public can understand and enforcement agencies will be required to follow.

It is my opinion that conflicting and unenforceable ordinances should be repealed and that all city ordinances be enforced, as I think a lack of enforcement causes disrespect for all laws and discredits the whole system.

I favor proper improvement of our city water system to insure adequate supply at all times as a guarantee to users and to provide against losses by fire.

The improvement of the sewerage system and disposal plant to meet the State sanitary code is a serious need and I would favor this improvement as soon as the proper funds are available, as we need to provide for the future needs of a growing city.

Clean streets and alleys and an attractive as well as clean environment are needs that I favor and promise to work for.

Fire hazards are a menace to life and property and penalize all policy holders of fire insurance. I favor strict adherence to all State and City regulations regarding fire hazards so that life, property and citizens in general may be protected against unnecessary losses.

It would be my aim and desire to work with all civic, religious, educational and other organizations to assist in increasing the goodwill of the inhabitants of our trade territory that they may feel welcome and enjoy coming to Lamesa to trade and other purposes, and to assist in all other activities that would make Lamesa a better town in which to live.

Federal and State funds have been and may continue to be available for municipal enterprises, and I promise in the event of my election to work hard to obtain all possible aid from this source, to apply on any worthy work project in the City so as to furnish employment to our citizens and that we may receive the benefits in improvements.

I favor the thorough organization of the City's departments through which the public is served, setting out the duties and responsibilities of each employee and requiring proper performance of each such assigned duty.

It is my belief that the business of the City is large enough and important enough that it should be conducted as any other well organized and well correlated business establishment, that the same economy and attention to detail should be practiced and that the City's dollar should purchase as much in any commodity as the dollar of any other business in this locality.

If I should have your confidence and goodwill sufficient to be elected to this responsible position, I will accept the full responsibility of the office and by hard work, diligent study of the City's problems and common sense judgment, make every effort to make you a progressive and efficient mayor.

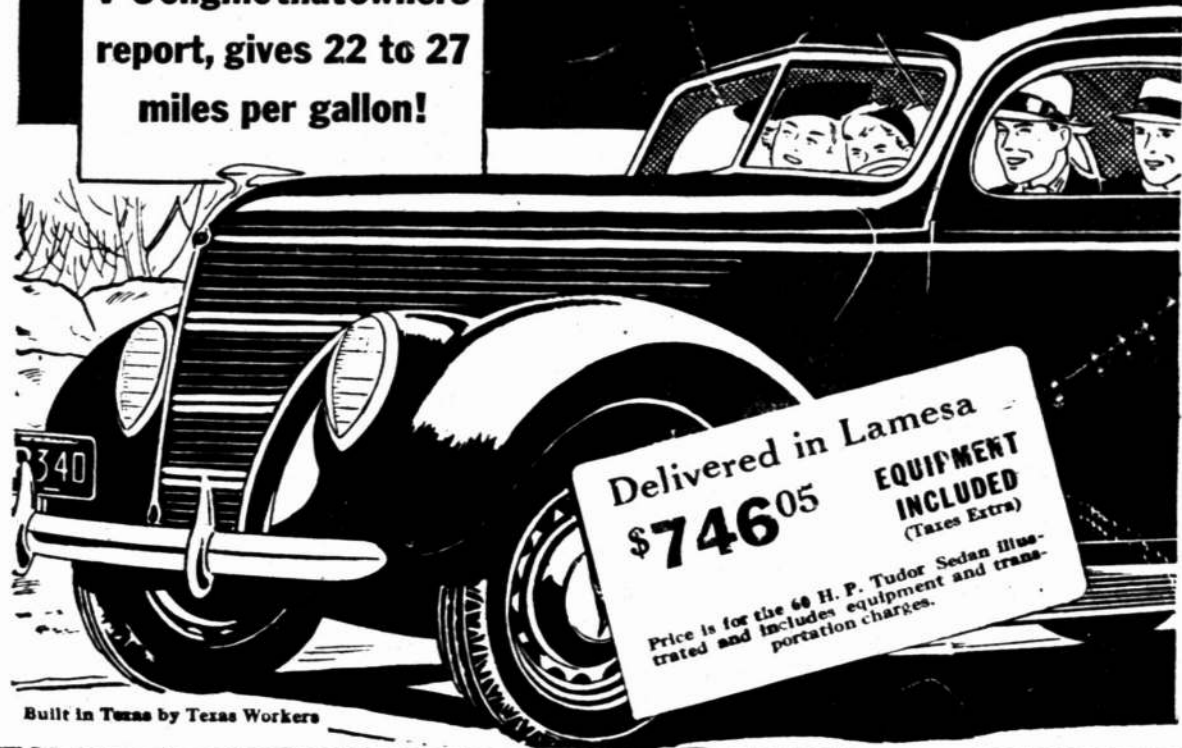

Early Chicks Mean Extra Profits Says Extension Poultrymen

College Station, Feb. 7.—Poultry flocks over the state will be increased by some 40 million baby chicks during the next few months, according to Geo. P. McCarthy, poultryman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Purchasers of baby chicks can realize extra profits by buying early and by securing chicks from nearby hatcheries, McCarthy said.

Early hatched chicks are usually in a higher priced bracket than those hatched after March 15, he said, but the difference in price is more than made up by other benefits. Early chicks grow off faster and cockerels from this group find a better market as fryers. There is also usually less loss from disease, especially in the case of coccidiosis.

Pullets from early hatched stock come into production earlier and lay more during the late summer, fall, and winter when eggs are relatively high, he pointed out.

Many Texans feel that they can purchase chicks of higher quality if they order from distant states. It is far better to buy chicks from hatcheries whose products are known than to depend on the reputation of out of state operators, according to McCarthy.

"It is perhaps an old thought that the farther pastures are the greener but in reality we find these at our very door," McCarthy pointed out. "I say this because Texas breeders and hatchery men are producing and selling chicks that are of as high quality as can be found anywhere."

The importance of preparing for the chicks was stressed. The breeder house should be cleaned and disinfected and the brooder stove set up and adjusted before the chicks arrive, he warned.

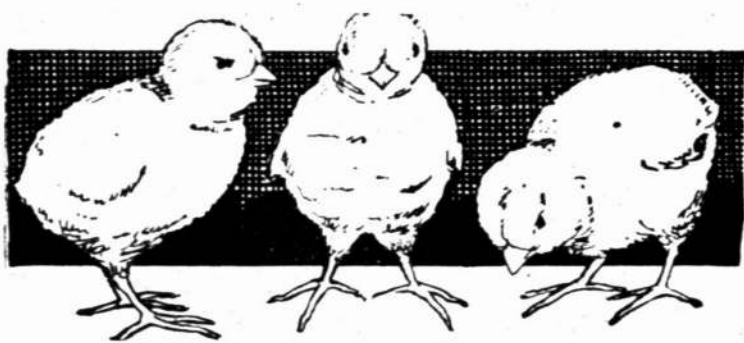
SCOUT COMMISSIONER SPEAKS

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT TO ACCEPT SEALED BIDS ON MK'T ROAD

Two Highway Projects To Get Early Attention

The State Highway Department announces sealed bids for reconditioning flammable base from the Sparenberg community, 18 miles southeast of Lamesa to the intersection 7 miles from town, will be received from bidders until February 21, when they will be publicly opened and read.

It is expected the contract will be awarded immediately on this farm to market road, which will be topped with asphalt for a distance of 5.3 miles.

Attention of the bidders is focused on special provisions required in subletting contract, the selection of labor and hours and conditions of employment. The contractors notice is contained in detail in the Courier this week.

Contract for the Wayside Park, three miles southeast of Lamesa at the intersections of highways 9 and 15, is also expected to be let about the 21st State and Federal funds in the amount of \$8,500 were set up for this improvement in 1937 and all of the easements have been turned over through civil leaders to the division engineer. The original appropriation set for \$5,000 was boosted and further improvements will be made for beautification of the triangle, which is about a half-mile either way.

This park site containing approximately twenty-five acres is said to be the largest of this type in the state. Local citizens and the city commission made contributions toward beautification and erection of gasoline engine other improvements while the highway department erected a pump house 500 trees were put out in the park recently and it is considered likely a larger appropriation was granted owing to the local interest shown.

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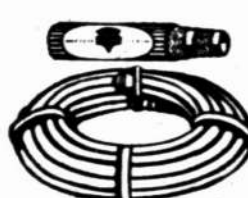

"Smile if it hurts you when you are entering the room of a sick patient said Mrs. C. A. Russell in her demonstration on the Care of the Sick to the club members in the home of Mrs. G. E. Salaried Persons File The Majority of Tax Income Reports Yearly

Of the millions of income tax returns that are filed annually, the vast majority are from salaried persons and wage earners whose income is derived from personal services.

In general, compensation for personal services should be reported for taxation purposes in the year it is received or unqualifiedly made credit to the account of or set apart for a taxpayer without any substantial limitation of restriction, and which may be drawn upon by him at any time, is subject to tax for the year during which so credited or set apart, although not then actually reduced to possession. If the services were rendered during the year 1936, or even prior thereto, but the compensation was not received, or made unqualifiedly subject to demand by the taxpayer until the year 1937 the entire amount is taxable in the year received or made unqualifiedly subject to demand when the taxpayer is reporting on the cash receipts and disbursements basis, which is the basis used by most persons in reporting net income.

The names of all employees to whom payments of \$1,000 or over a year are made must be reported. The information return should be made on Form 1099, accompanied by transmittal Form 1000 showing the number of returns filed. These returns should be filed on or before February 15, 1938.

All of the various types of compensation, unless specifically exempt by statute or exempt by fundamental law should be included in the taxpayer's return of gross income such as salaries, wages, fees, commissions, bonuses, tips, honorariums, prizes, awards, retiring allowances for past services, etc. Where services are paid for in whole or in part with something other than money, the fair market value of the thing taken in payment must be included as income. Other items subject to tax are fees received by ministers of the gospel for funerals, baptisms, masses, and like services; executors' fees; directors' fees; Federal jury fees; and prizes received in contests of various kinds.

The salaries of Federal officers and employees are subject to tax, including the salary of the President of the United States and judges of courts of the United States taking office after the date of enactment of the Revenue Act of 1932, which was June 6, 1932 the salary of the Vice-President of the United States, and the salaries of members of the House of Representatives and the members of the United States Senate are also subject to income tax.

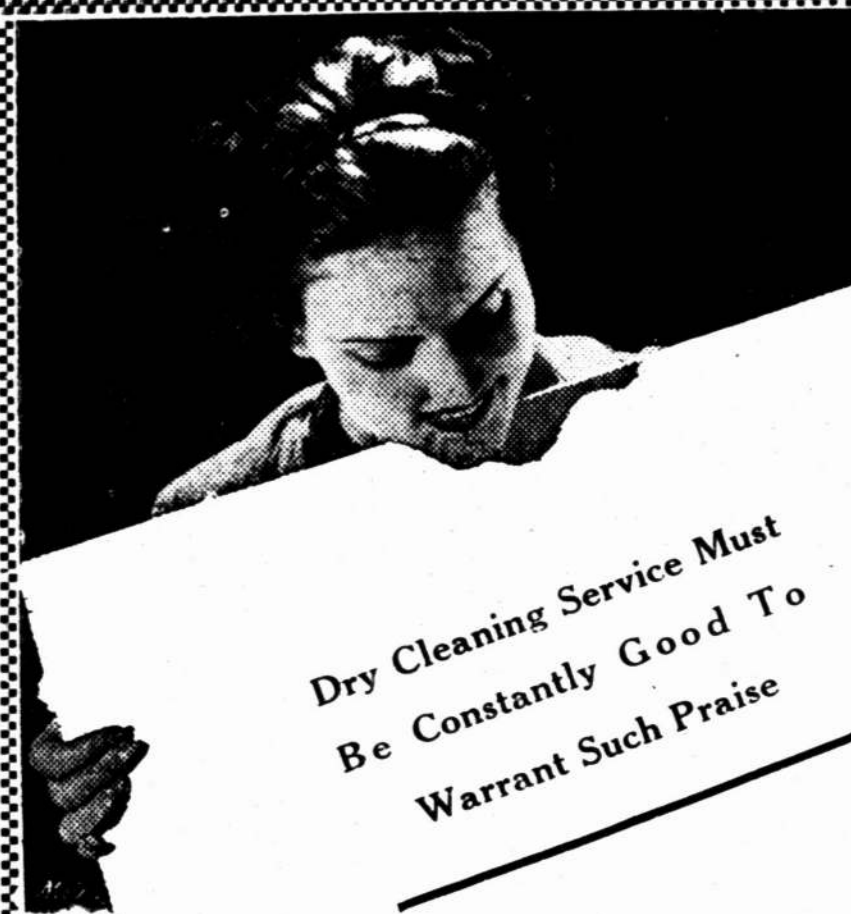

W. O. JONES FAMILY HAVE OUTSTANDING RURAL RESIDENCE

New Rock Veneer Home Has Seven Big Rooms

Mr. and Mrs. W. Owen Jones recently occupied their new modern rock veneer home for which construction was started in the late fall on their 640 acre section, located two miles south of the McCarty community on Highway 15, east of town.

Their beautiful seven room home which includes bath and was designed by Mrs. Jones. It has among other features built-in cabinets, a closet in every room, hot and cold water, combination breakfast room and kitchen, large living and dining rooms, three bedrooms and hall space in addition to two porches, the rear of which is screened. Lattice work harmonizes in color with a red tile roof. Venetian blinds and hardwood floors throughout would convince anyone it is one of the most outstanding Dawson county rural homes.

A large two-story garage was erected opposite the site, prior to construction of the home and they utilized the upper story for living quarters while work was being conducted for their homestead. At present the upper story has some furniture and could be termed a very desirable place to live, while it serves the family for storage for a bountiful supply of meat, cotton seed farm implements and put of season furniture.

He is one of the few local farmers that is sticking to team power in farming his 265 acres, under cultivation. His well improved farm has among other improvements a unique milk cooler constructed beneath a sixty barrel water tower all of which is covered with rock and concrete of the same material that is in the home. A large concrete water storage was also constructed for a water reservoir.

Their farm is stocked with poultry, swine, horses and milch cows including 175 hens that supply from 60 to 70 eggs daily. Forty-five head of swine is also a profitable income in addition to supplying the family with meat, and the few cows provide an abundant family supply of milk and butter.

The Jones family consists of Mr. and Mrs. Jones and one son, Billy. Billy is a freshman student in the University of Texas and will be home for the summer.

Bumper feed crops each year have provided Mr. Jones with ample feed on hand throughout the drouth years of seasons a few years ago. He produces enough feed when the seasons are favorably to have plenty on hand for years that may prove failures. Included in the large amount of feed now on hand are 255 sacks of cane, 16,000 pounds of sudan, five ricks of hedges, some of which is two years old and 55 tons of maize. With this large quantity it can be easily seen why it will not be necessary that he buy any feed, should this year be a failure.

Time To Start 4-H Farm Account Books Deadline Is Feb. 28

4-H boys and girls should start their farm account books at once to put them in line for an award in the fifth National 4-H Farm Account Contest which offers 805 prizes totaling \$8,500 in cash and merchandise. The contest is conducted by state and federal extension agents.

March 1 is the last date on which the books may be opened. They are required to cover 12 consecutive months and may also be started as of January 1, and February 1. Club members interested in enrolling may secure blank books and rules and the prize list through their local leader or county agent. Prizes will be awarded on the basis of individual accomplishment, alone, and all material in the record will be held confidential and returned to the owners after the judging. Contestants must also submit an analysis of their record of 1000 words or less showing the principal sources of profit and loss and suggesting how to make the farm pay better.

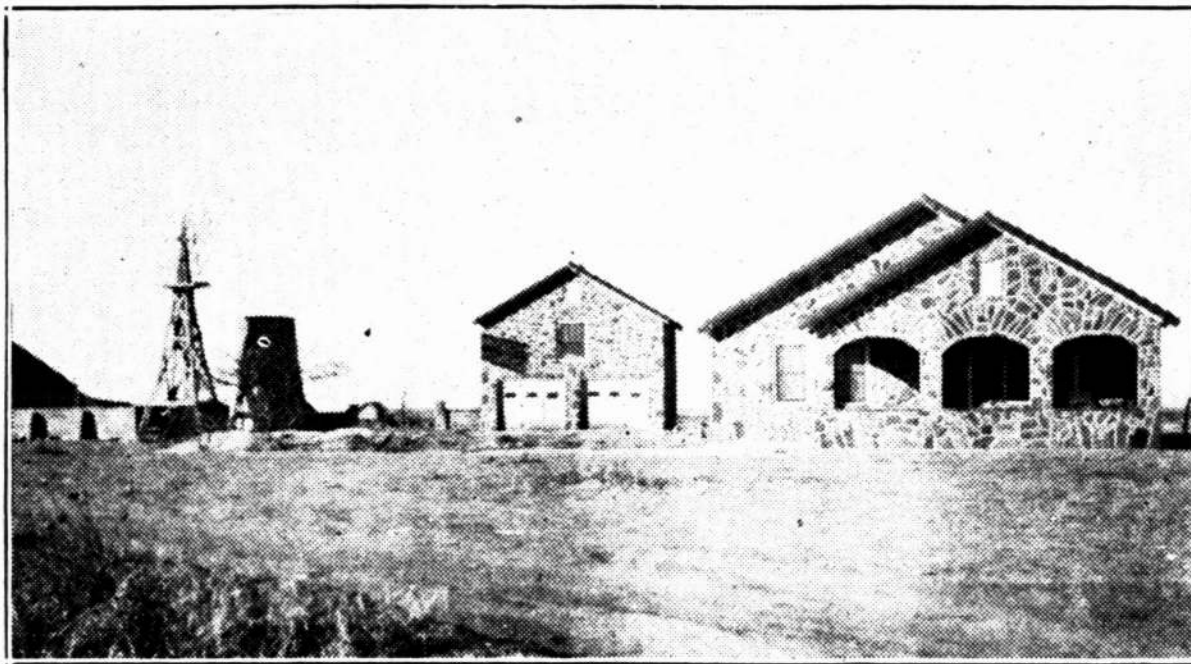

WHO IS THE HEAD OF A FAMILY

A taxpayer, though single, who supports and maintains in one household one of more individuals who are closely connected with him by blood relationship, relationship by marriage or by adoption, and whose right to exercise family control and provide for these dependent individuals is based upon some moral or legal obligation, is the head of a family and entitled to the same exemption allowed a married person—\$2,500. Also he may claim a \$400 credit for each dependent, if such dependent person is under 18 years of age or is by reason of advanced age or poor health (mental or physical) incapable of self-support. For example, a widower who supports in one household an aged mother and a daughter 17 years old is entitled to an exemption of \$2,500 as the head of a family plus a credit of \$400 for each dependent, a total of \$3,300. The \$400 credit, however, does not apply to the wife or husband of a taxpayer though one may be totally dependent upon the other.

Several factors are involved in determining whether a person who files a return as the head of a family is to be thus classified. The element of either legal or financial dependency must exist. A taxpayer who supports in his home minor children over whom

he exercises family control is classified as the head of a family, even though the children may have an income of their own sufficient for their maintenance. If he does not support them by reason of their own income, but does exercise family control he cannot be classified as the head of a family. If an individual supported is an adult and there rests upon the taxpayer a moral or legal obligation to provide a home and care for such individual, the exemption as the head of a family is allowed, provided the individual is financially dependent. If the individual is not financially dependent, the exemption, even though the taxpayer maintains the common home and furnishes the chief support does not apply.

For income-tax purposes there can be only one head of a family and the exemption cannot be divided. Not infrequently claims for the \$2,500 exemption are received from two or more members of a family.

It should be remembered that a single person, whether or not the head of a family, is required to file a return if his or her income for 1937 was \$1,000 or more regardless of whether the return is nontaxable by reason of the \$2,500 exemption.

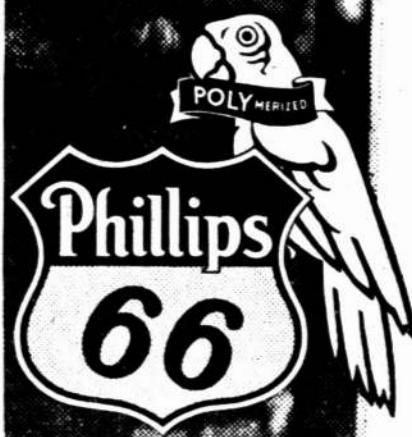

"THE REST OF THE RECORD"

By James V. Allred

An enlarged picture of the Land Commissioner's policies emerged last week from the maze of testimony developed before the Senate Investigating Committee.

Evidence was brought out to show that one group, which has been very successful with their bids before the Land Department had secured leases for small sums of money, usually a dollar an acre, with an agreement from an oil operator to pay them three dollars an acre for part interest where they paid the state only one dollar for the whole. This group of bidders was headed by two men from Burkburnett, another from Oklahoma City, and several others from various parts of Texas.

These successful bidders got one of their own employees a job in the Land Office. This man worked in the Land Office during the time the bids were being received and awarded; in fact he was the receiving clerk. After it was all over, he quit and went back to work for the bidders. They have cut him in on a one hundred thousand dollar oil deal.

One of this group of bidders admitted that they were carrying somebody on their books for a 25 per cent interest. He testified the party was a man by the name of Dawson, but the Senate committee never has been able to locate Dawson. No written record has been introduced, however, to show that this interest was carried for Dawson.

Some of the newspapers have editorialized that perhaps after all in the award of these leases it was just a question of judgment; that is, whether high cash bids should be accepted, or bids calling for high royalty. These editorials have missed the point entirely.

In private oil business, no one ever turns down high cash payments in favor of high royalties except where it is known positively that oil is present and there is an agreement for immediate development. In nearly all the leases made by the Land Commissioner neither of these elements has existed. That is we have not known whether or not there was oil; and with one exception, there has been no immediate drilling and development. As pointed out before, only one well has been commenced on State land although some of these leases are over a year old. Thousands of acres have been leased in a number of counties.

It is only necessary to look at a map to see what has been done with these leases. For example, one tract which was leased for \$310 (and on which a well has never been drilled), is offset on one side by actual oil wells and circled on the other sides by leases which the Land Commissioner sold for a total of \$458,000 in cash and \$371,000 in oil. The Land Commissioner turned down over a thousand dollars for

acre for this one tract of land in favor of a bid for \$310 and three-sixteenths royalty.

Thus has the picture emerged from the testimony, with further enlargement due as the committee continues its investigation.

Brought to Light . . .

By HARVEY SMITH

Hundreds of Dawson county families in the rural areas with radios, and also Lamesa residents, have frequently heard local amateur radio operators communicating with station operators throughout all parts of the country within the past five years. Instances have been reported where some members of the family declined to believe local radio stations actually existed. There are three Lamesa amateur stations, who are licensed members of the American Radio League, one which is station W5DSV, operated by Hubert P. Nelson, of 404 North Roosevelt, which is the foremost amateur station in the city. Nelson obtained his license from the Federal Communication Department in 1933 and has since communicated with brother "hams", a fraternal name in every state in the United States, contacting countless amateurs. He has made contacts in all five districts of Canada and has call letters from such distant countries as New Zealand, Spain, Alaska, Hawaii, South America, Mexico and hundreds of nearer foreign stations. One of his most unusual experiences was contacting on several occasions the "ham" operator at La Mesa, California, station W4GPJ. The first two units 200 replies from over the country in the first two years he operated in Lamesa. Many stating reception was outstanding even as far away as the most distant points in South America. This he has been able to keep closer in touch with situations abroad per-

haps better than anyone in West Texas. Other amateur operators include Grant "Pat" Patton, Jr., who has a rather unusual coincidence with his station W4GPJ. The first two units are designated United States District Number 5, and the three call letters are also those of his name. License are issued alphabetically in rotation. Herbie Heffernan is the other amateur "ham" and at present is back in Lamesa after an absence of two years. Local "ham" operators are equipped to handle emergency signals. During the recent Ohio floods, when all means of communication were cut off, amateurs mobilized forces and played an important part in helping with rescue and first aid. In 1935 there was an amateur operator at San Angelo, nearer home, who played a heroic part and rendered a valuable service to his community in that disastrous storm period with the only method of outside contact and brought his knowledge into valuable play.

Such stations attract many visitors who go to see them purely for their novelty appearance, but who know there may be a day when they will be brought into use for a local emergency situation messages, as they are equipped to the extent transmittance is possible ever after power is off.

Fred Lasky, prominent farmer of the Union community seven miles southwest of town, is one of the many Dawson county farmers who has not become discouraged with erratic climatic conditions in the early spring, which usually prevents a fruit crop in this county. Lasky has planted a number of young trees of various types and states they are budding out now. Like others who have budding fruit trees, he is beginning to fear a late frost which consequently would kill the hopes for several types of fruit.

According to past records there is a fair fruit crop only about once in every seven years here on the South Plains. The last such crop was grown in 1930 and if the law of average has anything to do with the situation, the comparatively few fruit growers might have some reason to anticipate a fair yield from their trees this year. Some advocate a movement that would form an organization whose sole purpose would be to study the soil, climate conditions, and select a variety especially adapted to the local conditions; one which would be a late bearing tree which would not bud out so early, and not the first type that is suggested.

A brief survey of the county indicates farmers are getting their land in shape this week for the spring planting season by turning under stubble, sudan wheat, cotton and corn stubs left after reaping the late fall crops. The work was well underway, generally speaking throughout all sections of the county with exception of the many farms where corn and cotton stalks are being left until late season as a prevention to wind erosion. Where long furrows have been bedded up prior to the April planting farmers expect to see small green sections of early sudan and silage crops within a few months as work of harvesting another bumper crop is in the offing for Dawson county.

While the farmer lays plans for his 1938 program, local business continues into another month with a general change throughout Lamesa's industrial area. New business men are appearing in the city, improvements are being made in connection with remodeling and the residential area has every indication of being expanded. Likewise, there are new plants, street improvements, school expansions and the city is humming to the tune of hammers and saws in the first real building boom since the latter part of 1929.

Everyday brings contact with some individual with a new hobby. Perhaps it is human nature for folks to adopt some kind of hobby, for most of us enjoy collecting things we admire and find pleasure and recreation in the pursuit of collections. Among the most popular collectors here in Lamesa and trade territory there are those who search for old prints, maps, flowers, stamps, pottery, antiques, firearms, snapshots, coins, arrow heads, match boxes and countless others. Stamp-

will carry you into research on geography, political history, the customs of foreign countries; and in then you collect miniature engravings and events Indian relics is a health hobby, leading into fields where Indians of a faded generation once camped and hunted.

Ira Ashley, who specializes in indirect lighting, is an enthusiastic follower of the Indian hobby and consequently has what is considered perhaps the best arrow head collection in the county on display at his place on South Austin Street.

Another local man who preferred that his name be kept secret has one of the most educational snapshot collections in the entire country, which were taken while in the service of the United States Government while in South America. There are hundreds of pictures including historical scenes in the Panama Canal zone, souvenirs and prize paintings included in the collection taken over a period of years throughout the United States and in foreign countries.

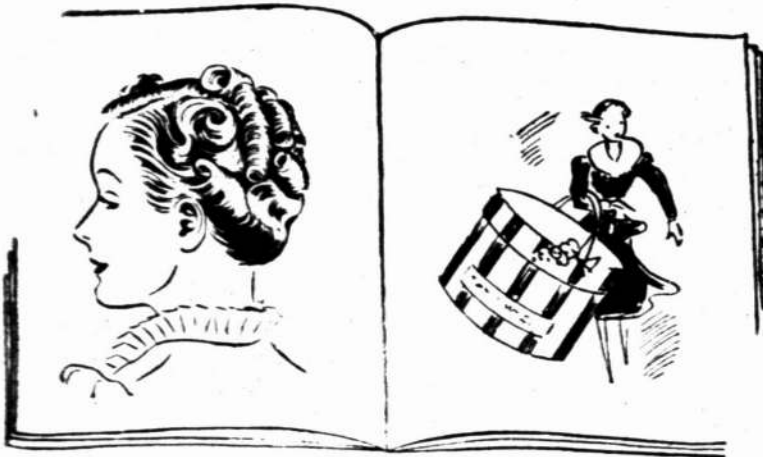

Rotary Club Hears A Beautification Project Explained

Morris and Cleve Austin were in charge of the program, which was limited mostly to discussion of highway projects with J. E. Barron and Judge W. M. Yates explaining what has already been accomplished in this county and of future developments expected.

Peterson, civic minded farmer stockman, of the McCarty community was introduced as a visitor to explain a highway beautification project being undertaken from the "Y" southeast of town to the Key community, five miles east of Lamesa on Highway 15. Mr. Peterson told the club he is interested in a project to plant Chinese elms or this highway through the county and believes, a few farmers who are cooperating with the project in this immediate vicinity will create enough interest that others will carry it on along the route.

Mr. Peterson recently purchased 1,000 elms, 26-inches to 48-inches long which were planted through the Soil Conservation Service, which he is one of the co-operators. He stated Owen Jones and J. E. Barron and J. E. Garland have agreed to plant trees along their property lines that would extend the project for almost five miles, the majority of property owners favor the program, but do not want to have to put the trees out. It was disclosed the State Highway Department, which has advocated highway beautification in the past does not have the appropriations at present to spend for setting out trees, and the purpose of his talk was to encourage club members to work toward securing some method of having the project carried on through other means.

Lamesa Rotarians agreed this project is worthy of support and said they will take every step to secure farmers in obtaining assistance.

It was revealed, J. C. Kerr, local highway engineer and a Lubbock Highway official agreed that trees could be set out on the highway right-of-way, provided there was at least Farmers will be allowed to plow and cultivate their trees for which the department will help to maintain and care for them.

At least, it isn't any more.

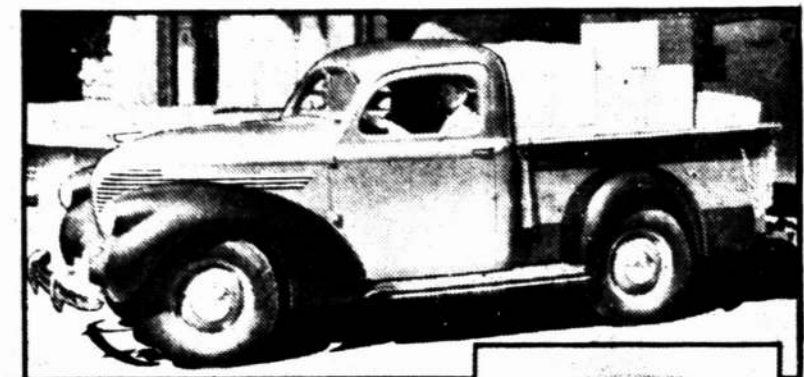
All the bond issue proposals the Plainsman knows of in the Southwest during the past six or eight years have

been roundly defeated—except the one at Lamesa.

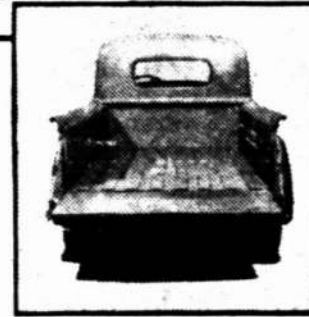
