

City Commission Adopts Building Code Ordinance

An ordinance "providing for fire limits, and regulations governing the construction, alteration, removal, demolition, equipment, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of buildings and structures" was passed by members of the City Commission during a meeting convened Thursday afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Mayor Morris Newnam presided over the session which was adjourned at 6 p. m.

The Mayor and members of the Commission were of the opinion that this type standard code is necessary in order to make Ranger more beautiful and presentable and to meet the challenges of the city's future growth and progress.

Complete text of the ordinance appears on page two of this issue of The Ranger Times. It must be published once a week for two consecutive weeks and will become effective on Wednesday, Nov. 10 — 10 days after the date of its last publication on Sunday, Oct. 31.

Mayor Newnam's appointment of Lester Crossley as building official for the City of Ranger was approved by the City Commissioners.

In other action the body voted to hire Miss Waldeen Krebs for the position of city secretary to succeed Mrs. Avis Jones, present city secretary who has submitted her resignation effective Dec. 1.

Miss Krebs will join the city staff on Nov. 1.

In other action, members of the commission discussed but took no action on a recent request of the Texas & Pacific Railway that the city eliminate the present speed restrictions on trains through the city limits.

A report on the progress of tax collections was presented by Mrs. Jones, city secretary, and the body okayed payment of routine bills.

Present at the Thursday meeting were Mayor Newnam, Fred Bennett, street commissioner, Bob Allen, water commissioner, and Doyle Gentry, finance commissioner. W. J. Van Bibber, police and fire commissioner, was unable to attend the session.

The total included \$13,652.95 in current taxes and \$756.90 in delinquent tax collections.

City taxes paid during the month of October earn a discount of three per cent. The discount reduces to two per cent in November and one per cent in December. Deadline date for payment of taxes is Jan. 31, 1966. Taxes paid after that date are subject to penalty and interest.

SCHOOL TRUSTEES APPROVE BUDGET FOR 1965-66 YEAR

The Board of Trustees of Ranger Public Schools met in a special dinner meeting Tuesday night at Young School and approved a 1965-66 school budget calling for expenditures of \$227,769.00.

Anticipated income is \$271,599 which includes balances from the past school year.

Board President Ross Hodges presided over the meeting attended by R. V. Robinson, Luther Gohlke, Mrs. Francis Cox, Gaston Dixon, Herman Stroud and Supt. James R. Clark.

Prior to the session the Board enjoyed a steak supper prepared by the Young cafeteria staff of Mrs. Helen White and Mrs. Barbara Tucker.

A new contract with Lone Star Gas Company was approved and salary adjustment was made in the high school principal's and the superintendent's salaries.

It was agreed to employ Mrs. Mae Isabell as full-time secretary to the superintendent.

The budget calls for an expenditure of \$21,180 in the superintendent's office and the tax office for salaries and other expenses.

Mavs Maul Dogs, 18-0, In Shocker!

An inspired band of Eastland High Mavericks stunned Coach Gerald Cumpston's Ranger High Bulldogs, 18-0, in a District 10-A grid duel unveiled before a packed stadium in Eastland Friday night.

It was Ranger's worst defeat at the hands of their longtime rivals since 1937 when the Eastland Red 47-13.

Hundreds of ardent Ranger fans in Maverick Stadium watched in awe as a possible District 10-A championship unexpectedly slipped from the grasp of the Bulldogs. An Eastland victory was essential. The Rangers went into the heated fray with a perfect conference record and only one defeat and that to a Double A club, Dublin.

A victory over top-rated De Leon here next Friday night and a win over Albany a week later — both chores of considerable challenge — could give the Bulldogs only a tie for the title.

But Dame Fate is fickle in football. And Friday night's nightmare at Eastland, backed by film, facts and figures, is evidence of what can happen in the thrilling schoolboy grid sport.

With ace Quarterback Johnny McGee sidelined with a critical knee injury and his understudy, Jerry Watson, also ailing, Ranger's offense

floundered in the first quarter and never really fully recovered. During most of the first half the oval was in control of the Mavericks who committed few blunders during the night while fumbles and pass interceptions were costly for the Bulldogs.

On half a dozen occasions, the Maroon & Whites moved within scoring range, but a rock-ribbed Eastland defense stopped them cold.

One of the Bulldogs' most impressive drives came late in the second quarter when Quarterback Watson got an air blitz under way hitting End Rudy Mendoza for 13, Halfback Phil Brown for 25, and another pitch to Wingback Mike Landtroop. The end of the first half killed the drive 15 yards from pay dirt.

Another stab by Ranger was halted on the five-yard stripe by an alert, almost violent defense.

RANGER HIGH SCHOOL
WINS ACCREDITATION
AT WEDNESDAY MEET

Ranger High School has been accredited for the coming school year by the Southern Association of Colleges and Public Schools according to Supt. James R. Clark, who worked on the reviewing committee for the Association in Wichita Falls Wednesday.

Clark reported that the committee he was on approved the reports of all the schools. Schools that had been warned last year had corrected their faults, he said.

The Southern Association rating is the highest a school can have in Texas other than the one by the Texas Education Agency. The Association was formed in the early 1900's by 17 Southern states who set up high standards for member schools to meet.

Eastland High School is the other member school in Eastland County.

The Ranger school faculty will study the requirements for membership over a period of several months, Clark said and may invite in a committee to evaluate our school system in all twelve grades.

"The elementary schools are affiliated this year for the first time in the Association," Clark said, "and if we are able to meet Southern Association membership requirements we may want to join the elementary division."

Four Horses Ailing

There have been only four cases of sleeping sickness among horses in Eastland County with no deaths, according to a report here this week. Reports that about 100 horses were suffering from the disease are erroneous, according to Dr. John Foster, Ranger veterinarian.

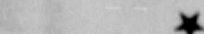

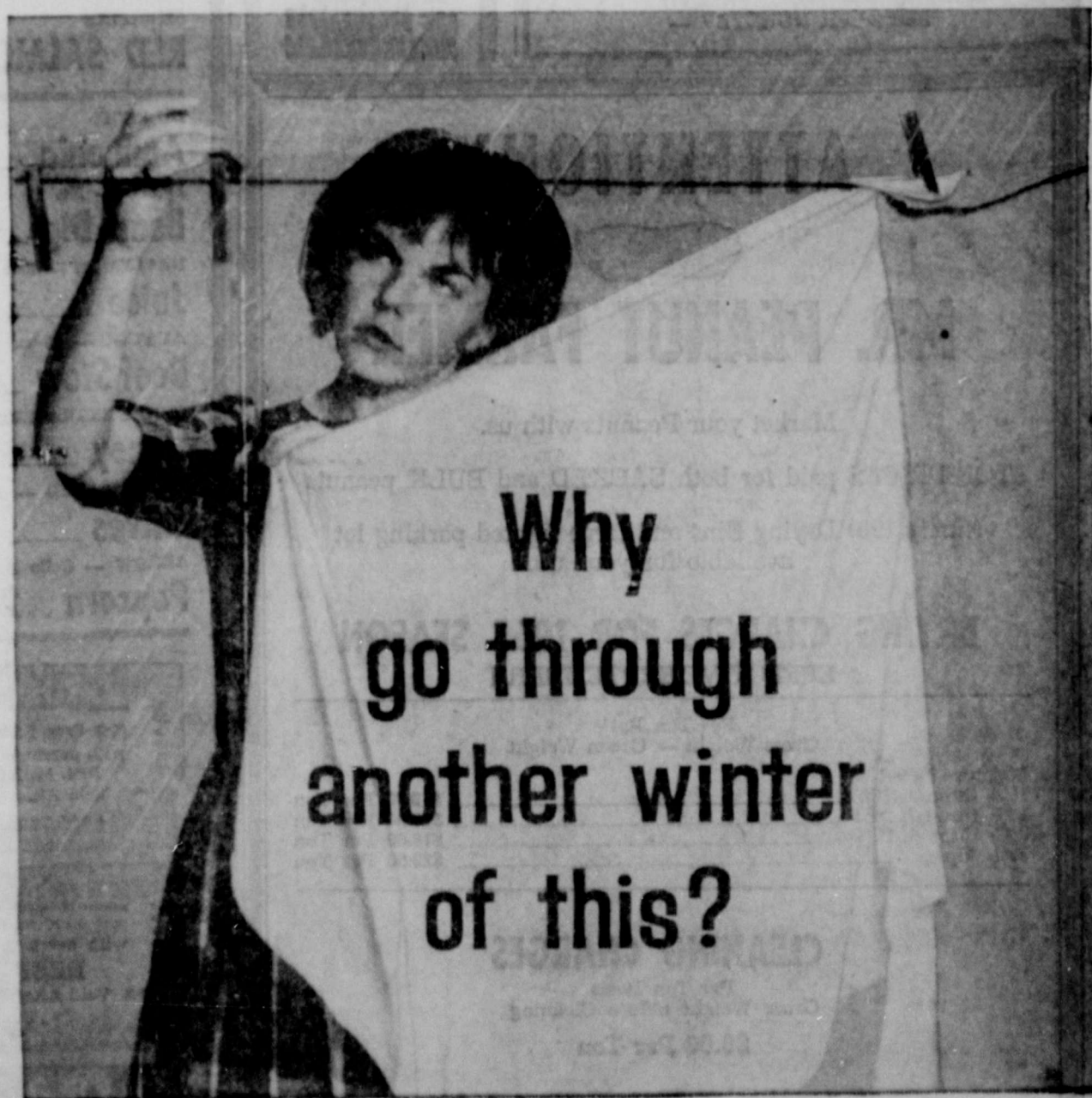

A. B. Click Co. Begins Re-Vamp Of Appeals Court

Repairs on the fifth floor of the Courthouse began last Monday, Oct. 18, after the job was given to an Abilene firm, A. B. Click & Co., according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

This renovating will include expanding the library space, rearranging petitions in order to give the judges more space in their offices; and installing central heat and air-conditioning and an electrical panel in the Courthouse. Cost of these repairs will be approximately \$42,000 and the job is expected to be completed within 90 days, Judge Bailey said.

Some time ago, a request was made to move the Eastland County Courthouse headquarters to Abilene because of inadequate library space, Bailey Stated. The court house has a payroll of about \$100,000 per year and with this fact being considered, the Eastland County Bar Association recommended that repairs be made on the fifth floor of the courthouse, bringing its standards up to those of other courthouses in the state.

"The effective administration of farm programs depends on the continuing efforts of county offices such as yours to utilize the most efficient and practical methods possible," the statement concluded.

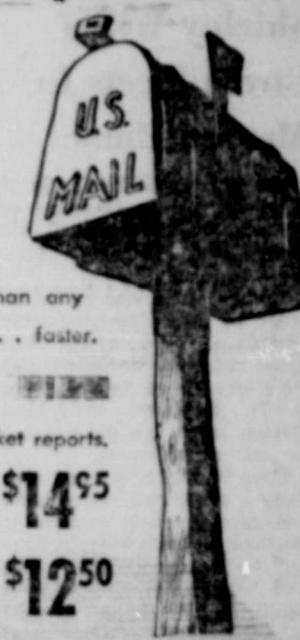
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Woman's Society Meets For Discussion of 'Peace Corps' And 'The Methodist and Race'

Miles Standish was the captain of the Mayflower.

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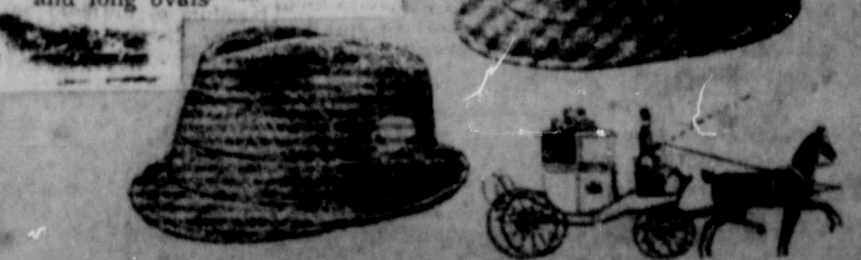
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
