Smith Nomination On Early Ballot Is Conceded Numerous Fistic Affrays Enliven Day At Houston

Wild Outburst Of Enthusiasm Meets Listing of Smith

First Battle In Platform Committee Is Narrowly Averted Between Bishop Cannon and Tynning.

CONVENTION MARKED BY DEMONSTRATIONS

Efforts To Place Banners of Antagonistic States In Smith Bandwagon Parade Bring Retaliations.

HAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 27.—Militant democrats in national convention here, sat late into the night listening to the praise of her favorite son and singing more of the spirited demonstrations for which the present gathering is becoming noted.

Gov. Smith of New York was placed in nomination to the roaring enthusiasm of his supporters, who sang him through to a quick nomination.

Senator George of Georgia, and Representative Ayres of Kansas, and Evans Woolen of Indiana, received their share of praise from those who sponsored their candidacies for president.

A great Smith demonstration was set off by Franklin D. Roosevelt, who placed the governor in nomination as the "Happy Warrior," upon whose shoulders victory always perched. During the noisy tribute to the New York governor two or three fist fights enlivened the passing, all of them resulting from disputes whether southern state standards should join the Smith procession about the hall.

Most of the floor fighting centered around the Mississippi standard, near the Alabama and North Carolina sections where outbreaks occurred in the afternoon. When the convention adjourned at 11:15 P. M. to meet again at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, Senator Reed of Missouri, Gilbert M. Hitchcock of Nebraska, and Albee Fomere of Ohio, all duly registered candidates, remained to be placed in nomination.

Grain Exchange Opens Operation

First Car Is Inspected At New Establishment Here, Now Ready To Care For Crops.

The first car of grain was inspected by the Lubbock Grain Exchange yesterday.

Officers of the exchange, one of Lubbock's newest enterprises, are located at the Burrus Elevator. The Lubbock Grain Exchange is said to be the only exchange on the South Plains which can furnish protein tests. The equipment, which has just been installed, was said by the federal supervisor of Texas to be the best in the state. He declared that the plant was much better than he had expected and that it offered its patrons the services of the finest equipped laboratories of the inspection department that can be found in the state.

C. E. Come purchased the first car to be inspected by the exchange from P. W. Walker, of Littlefield. The grain was inspected by R. R. Stuard, official inspector of the exchange.

Officials of the exchange announced last night that the plant was now in position to inspect various protein tests, and grain officials for all kinds of grains. Protein tests are furnished by the Tech.

It was pointed out that dealers would save the risk of grain rotting in shipment by having it inspected at the local exchange before shipping.

Mr. Walker's load of grain yesterday totaled number 2 dark, hard, 10 pounds, and 12 1-2 bushels.

Lubbock Citizens Told Way to Make City Attractive

Surratt, of Dallas, Says More Trees Will Help Beautiful City Attracts Wealthy, He Says.

Pointing out present serious defects in city planning in Lubbock, denouncing possible beauty spots and opportunities for greater work in the development of the city, John E. Surratt, of Dallas, secretary of the Greater Plan association, and leading student and exponent of city planning and zoning in Texas, advised a group of representative citizens to work for the adoption of a city plan for Lubbock in a meeting in the district court room last night which closed a very busy day here for him yesterday.

"If you can make Lubbock sufficiently attractive, all these people who make fortunes out in this section, in oil, cattle and agriculture, will come here to build their fine homes," Mr. Surratt said. "If you don't, they'll go to Dallas, Houston, Amarillo or other places to build their homes. It's up to you to see that the city is made a better place to live in."

City officials and prominent civic club and business leaders of the city were Mr. Surratt in his lecture, which was featured by the showing of stereoscopic views of "before and after" conditions in his own town, Dallas, and other cities. Views of beauty spots and defects in Lubbock were also shown by Mr. Surratt in the lecture which was preceded by a short explanatory talk from Charles A. Gray, chairman of the plan committee of the Board of City Development, concerning the Greater Plan association and its work. Mr. Gray presided at the meeting in which Mr. Surratt appeared yesterday.

"I am convinced that the people of Lubbock are interested in city planning," Mr. Surratt said, the attendance at the various meetings being indicative of the city's attitude. The planning of an ordinance.

Lubbock's outstanding general trend at the present time is to hold the city as a premier residential city," according to John E. Surratt, Dallas City planning expert, who was here yesterday in the interest of a definite city plan for this city.

"Not only should the city be used with exclusive residential sections formed, but trees should be planted, parks laid out, homes set back from the street, and railroad crossings eliminated. All this may be attained by proper city planning."

No Need To Crowd

"Why you have all of the land in the world out here. There is no reason for everyone hugging together in a compact district. In a crowded city it is different, but with all of this room, buildings should be set back from the street with room for two rows of trees between."

At Gives Dance Report Over Radio Is Too Much

ALBANY, N. Y., June 27.—(AP)—Within a circle of family and friends, Governor Alfred E. Smith tonight danced to the radio strains of a convention band playing "The Edgewood of New York," after hearing Franklin D. Roosevelt's speech offering him as democracy's candidate for president of the United States.

Gov. Smith sat close to the radio in the executive mansion as Mr. Roosevelt delivered his nominating address, but he gave no sign of emotion until the speech was over and the demonstration of Smith admirers had broken out.

When the band broke into the song which so long has been the hymn of the New York executive, however, the 60-year-old governor, rising with a broad smile, he danced several times around the circle formed by his daughter, Emily, her husband, Major John A. Warner, and a dozen close friends.

One Killed, Huge Property Loss In Texas Windstorm

Clay and Wichita Counties Hit By Tornado Early Yesterday; Damage Estimated At \$750,000.

(By Associated Press)

WICHITA FALLS, June 27.—Five persons are recovering from injuries received when a tornado swept eastern Wichita and western Clay counties early today.

The only death reported is that of W. N. Coombs, 16, whose body was found in a field about 100 yards from the house in which he was sleeping when the storm struck.

D. M. Splawn was picked up from his home and hurled 100 yards into a barbed wire fence just as the house crashed upon his wife and baby. Splawn was severely cut about the abdomen and his body was bruised by hailstones.

Mrs. Splawn and the baby were only slightly bruised. Mrs. T. W. Williams was severely bruised by flying timbers and hailstones and Wilma Chapmendi, 11, suffered painful bruises when the Williams home was destroyed.

Late estimates place property damage at \$750,000. Crops over a wide area were wiped out and fruit was plucked from the trees by the wind and hail.

5000 Barrels Hobbs Well Cut Loose

Showing all of the tools out of the well, the new Hobbs, New Mexico, oil well, 60 miles southwest of Brownfield, came in at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon producing an estimated amount of 5,000 barrels a day, according to word received here last night from the Brownfield correspondent of the Morning Avalanche.

The well was already a producer, producing amounts variously estimated at from 500 to 2,000 barrels, but it had not been turned loose. It was being held back so that drilling could be continued.

The Hobbs well is near the new townsite of Hobbs, New Mexico, directly west of Ocala county, Texas. The Hobbs field promises to be the center of a potentially great field.

The recent opening of the townsite of Hobbs attracted several thousand people.

George and Smith Put In Nomination At Second Convention Night Session

Delegates Listen Nonchalantly to Boosting of Favorites, Confident Superfluous Oratory Will Not Prevent Choice of Governor, After Balloting Starts

HAM HOUSTON HALL, HOUSTON, June 27.—Democrats trooped to the auditorium tonight to listen to the praises of favorite sons of half a dozen states, but still convinced that all the oratory that could be brought into play would not prevent the quick selection of Alfred E. Smith, of New York, once balloting got under way.

They came into an atmosphere of tension, caused by the uproar of today when the Smith adherents put on a demonstration. It had reached the stage of flaccidly forced attempts to force a nomination.

Charles Crisp, of America, Ga., was the first orator on the list, designated to sound the war cry for Senator Walter F. George, of his state.

Then came Franklin D. Roosevelt, for Governor Smith; Charles Howell for Senator James A. Reed, and Harvey H. Mangah for Cordell Hall, Evans Woolen, of Indiana, authorized his name to go before the convention with just a paragraph of introduction by William H. O'Brien, of Lawrenceburg, Ind.

Before the night session got under way, three bands, as usual, tried to outdo each other in entertaining the spectators.

Annual Camp For Farm Youths Has Big Opening Day

408 Boys and Girls From This and Adjoining Counties Participate; Interesting Program for Today.

A deluge of boy and girl club members, 408 to be exact, swarmed the fair grounds yesterday afternoon and last night in the Lubbock County 4-H club encampment which began yesterday.

Switch of Forty Ohio Votes To Gotham Nominee Features Day of Sweeping Victories for Smith.

FIRST BALLOT WILL BRING ACTION, BELIEF

Oklahoma Pledged Twenty Votes to Reed But Kansas Delegation Seems Ready to Turn.

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, June 27.—Enough convention votes are pledged definitely to Governor Smith to bring about his nomination, probably on the first ballot.

Although given a jolt today when Oklahoma swung to Reed of Missouri, the New Yorker picked up more than enough votes from Ohio to put him over.

In addition, some of the Kansas delegates, pledged to Ayres, showed signs of restlessness and there were predictions that they would hop in to the Smith camp before completion of the first roll call, expected tomorrow night.

Both the Ohio and Oklahoma delegations held caucuses during the day. Ohio delegates instructed their chairman, Claude Meeker, of Columbus, to transfer all votes, except those definitely anti-Smith to the New York Governor at any time during the balloting.

Meeker indicated this would be done before the first roll call result is announced. At least forty of the 48 Ohio votes will go to Smith. Outside of Ohio, the votes definitely pledged to Smith top 700. Unless there are unexpected shifts of votes from Ohio, Smith has above the 725 1-2, or two thirds needed to nominate.

Four ballots were required at the Oklahoma delegation caucus to determine the first roll call lineup in convention. It was a pro-Smith, anti-Smith showdown with a caucus finally voting out the Smith forces for supremacy by a one vote margin. The delegation was under instructions to vote as a unit.

In caucus, Smith mustered 1-2 of the 20 votes on the first ballot. Reed getting 4 1-2. Hull of Tennessee, 6. Donahay of Ohio 1-2 and Robinson, Walsh, Montana, and George each 1-2. On the second Smith had 7, Hull 1-2 and Reed 5 1-2, and on the third it was Smith 8, Reed 1-2 and Hull 4 1-2. An agreement had been reached to drop the low man, and with Hull

Serve three or four balls on a bed of carefully washed and crisped watercress. Drop a spoonful of mayonnaise at one side or in the center between the balls and serve.

BRIDGE MADE EASY

by W. W. Wentworth

3-PRE-EMPTIVE BIDS

Holding all the aces, some players bid a pre-emptive two no trump, as in this manner they hope to shut out bidding and lead-indicators. This practice more often shuts out partner's major suit declaration. Furthermore, by bidding two no trump, accurate information of your holding is not only conveyed to your partner, but also to your opponents, and they become timid about bidding. With such a strong holding you should encourage bidding to place you in the position not only of obtaining information from your partner, but of inflicting penalties by having opponents bid beyond their contracting ability.

To pre-empt originally you must bid: three in spades; four in hearts; four in diamonds (preferably five); five in clubs.

Any lower bid is merely a weak effort that will not produce the result you seek. It will in all probability prove futile, as it will only encourage bidding by opponents.

If your hand warrants a pre-emptive bid, be bold in making it—let it be truly pre-emptive and not a whimper. Unless the hand warrants a shut-out declaration, bid one in preference to any hybrid half-pre-emptive that will usually help only your opponents and accomplish nothing for you.

Don't pre-empt if you have nothing to fear.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—An impressive rally in stock prices in the face of a further advance in call money rates to 7 1/2 percent, the highest level in seven years, overshadowed all other developments in today's financial markets. Prices started forward at the opening, buoyed a bit when the call money renewal rate was fixed at 7 percent, as against 6 1/2 yesterday, then moved up again, backed down a few points when banks called \$20,000,000 in loans and the rate to 7 1/2 percent, and then again moved forward to new high levels for the day.

Final quotations disclosed a long list of net gains of 1 to 3 points in the active industrials and rails, and 6 to 12 points in a scattering assortment of specialties. Total sales crossed the 2,000,000 share mark for the first time since last Wednesday. Renewed weakness of U. S. Rubber common carried that stock down to 27, the lowest in several years. Other rubbers offered better resistance to selling pressure.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 27 (AP)—Another advance was followed by reactions in the cotton market today, but after selling off from 22.50 to 22.10 for October, prices rallied, October closing at 22.34, compared with 22.22 at the close the previous day. The general market closed very steady at net advances of 9 to 18 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 13 to 21 points on a further broadcasting of trade and commission house demand stimulated by reports of further showers in the South and bullish private crop advice.

July soon sold up to 22.30, while December advanced to 22.34, new high ground for the movement. New high records for the season, were scored by new crop months, with net advances of 29 to 35 points. Realizing recently was attracted at these figures, and selling became more active after publication of the weekly report of the weather bureau. Prices eased, and for a time the market was under pressure, July selling off to 21.88 and December to 21.95 or 9 to 12 points net lower, and about 40 to 45 points from the best.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, June 27 (AP)—Heavy loss liquidation induced by a bearish weekly weather and crop report was responsible for a decline of over 32 a bale in cotton prices today after the market had advanced in early trading to levels practically 51.50 a bale over favorable Liv-
Shorts covering, however, in the final trading forced prices up 19 to 21 points from the lows and the market closed steady at a net advance of 5 to 9 points.

The openings was very steady despite only moderately favorable Liv-
pool cables, first trades showing gains of 5 to 27 points. The initial firmness was attributed to the rather general rains reported in the belt over night. When the weather map confirmed these reports prices advanced to 22.25 for July, 22.05 for October and 22.02 for December, or 26 to 31 points above the previous close.

Bean and Sealing, with two hits apiece, led Lubbock's hitting attack, such as it was.

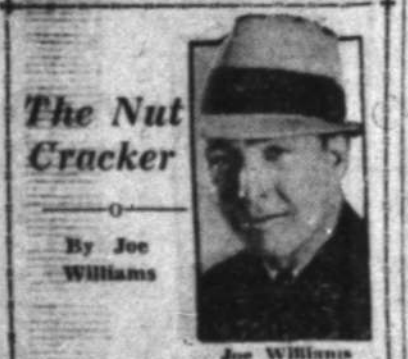

and other civic organizations to keep the subject before the public. He said that the City Commission should then pass an ordinance creating a park board and a city planning commission, which should be an advisory board only, investigating all city planning matters and referring them back to the City Commission.

Urges Expert's Advice

He next suggested that an expert city planner be obtained to work over a period of several years. His plan could be either adopted or rejected. "I would advise Lubbock to obtain the services of a city planner at the present time before any bonds are voted and before any steps are taken," Mr. Burratt said. "It might save thousands of dollars for the city and to would prevent any costly mistakes being made. He could advise in both present and future problems." Mr. Burratt declared that the park board should have power to buy and sell land and should have the initiative to do things. He said the board should be composed of about seven members who should serve overlapping terms, so that some new and some old members would be on the board at all times.

(By Associated Press) OSLO, Norway, June 27.—Search for Roald Amundsen and his five companions missing since June 18 got under full swing today as three vessels sailed from Tromsø for northern waters and other expeditions were rapidly preparing to leave.

The Norwegian cruiser, *Fredrikstad*, the French auxiliary vessel, *Quentin Roosevelt*, and the sealer *Heimland*, which the French government has chartered, left Tromsø and will search throughout the neighborhood of Bear Island. This island is midway between the coast of Norway and Spitzbergen, being directly in the path of the route which the French plane carrying the noted explorer was expected to take.

Miss Louise Boyd, an American woman who had hired the sealer ship *Hooby* for a hunting expedition off Greenland, has placed the ship at the disposal of the Norwegian government for use to search for Amundsen.

The newspapers have printed an appeal to the public to subscribe to a fund to equip an expedition to search for Amundsen and today thousands of kroner were pouring into their offices for the fund.

Agriculture Wins Skirmish To Get Platform Place

One of Committee Members Declares Agriculture To Be Paramount Issue For Campaign.

HOUSTON, June 27.—Shunting prohibition aside temporarily, friends of organized agriculture won a brief but sharp skirmish today before the resolution committee for representation on the sub-committee which is to draft the 1928 national democratic platform.

John A. Simpson, Oklahoma member, urged that Thomas E. Cashman, the representative from Minnesota, who is head of a farm organization, be among the eleven on the drafting body and when Senator Key Pittman of Nevada, the chairman, failed to include Cashman, Simpson moved his appointment.

Republicans Cited
Senator Glass of Virginia countered with a point of order against the motion, saying that if the committee tried to give representation to all of the industries of the nation it would be rowing over the personnel for the better part of the day. This aroused delegate F. J. Thomas, of Nebraska, who reminded the committee that the farmers had been excluded from the councils of the republican party at the Kansas City convention.

"We must concede that agriculture will be the paramount issue in this campaign," he added, "and the farm organizations should be represented on this drafting committee."

Senator Caraway of Arkansas, an ardent supporter of the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill, interrupted to suggest that Simpson ask unanimous consent that Cashman be added to the committee. That consent was obtained.

Other members of the sub-committee besides Pittman and Cashman are Caraway, Arkansas; Glass, Virginia; Moody, Texas; Harrison, Mississippi; Ray, Utah; Walsh, Massachusetts; Ellingham, Indiana; Wagner, New York; Jones, Kansas; and Bratton, New Mexico.

Prohibition Planks
Leaders of the drys in the convention including Josephus Daniels, North Carolina publisher, Governor Moody and Senator Glass, were on hand with strong prohibition planks for which they were determined to conduct the most vigorous fight of which they were capable. Should they fail to have the 18th amendment endorsed and the party pledged to its "sacred" enforcement they plan to carry their fight to the convention floor.

Before the sub-committee begins its work several hours of public hearings on the prohibition, farm and other issues were on the schedule.

This Chap Bowers Who Ripped 'Em As Keynoter

NEW YORK, June 27. (AP)—A rather diffident chap who has the knack of knowing how to make a roaring speech is Claude G. Bowers, the keynote speaker at the democratic national convention at Houston last night. Bowers, an editorial writer on the New York Evening World, was virtually unknown to the democracy of the country at large until the recent Jackson Day dinner at Washington when he took his hearers by storm with a fiery speech on the vigorous character of Andrew Jackson.

Bowers is no newcomer to politics. Years ago when he resided in Indiana and was running for congress, John E. Lamb, a political leader of southern Indiana, referred to him as "The fair haired boy of destiny." But Bowers lost the election.

Bowers' father died when he was very young and as a lad he sold newspapers to earn a few pennies. He never went to college but today holds honorary degrees from some of the most prominent universities.

Some optimistic visitors think the convention may conclude its business in a series of sessions tomorrow, adopting a platform, nominating a presidential candidate and his running mate.

George R. Van Namee, the Smith manager, would not predict that such an expeditious program could be carried out but he would not object.

Mr. Van Namee said nothing has come up to change his opinion that whether or not the governor's board of strategy desired a first ballot nomination, the convention would not have it otherwise.

Walker Smooths Over Turbulent Committee Row

Threatened Split Over The Wet And Dry Issue Averted As Gotham Mayor Takes Role of Diplomat.

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, June 27.—The Democratic convention's committee on rules and order of business threatened to split wide open on the wet and dry issue today until Mayor James Walker of New York, his state's representative on the committee, stepped in with persuasive eloquence and turned charges of "steam rolling" into a unanimous vote for the resolution he had presented.

The committee finally adopted the New York resolution which placed the presentation of candidates for the presidency before the report of the platform makers, the point upon which Judge N. A. Morris of Georgia, chairman of the rules committee, and Mayor Walker divided. With the mayor's consent his resolution was altered to bring out the five minute speeches of nomination seconds only on the call of the roll of states.

Lynch Davidson of Texas gave the opinion that "there is going to be a 'Kilkenny Cat' fight in the convention over the prohibition question. To my sorrow it seems inevitable that Governor Smith will be nominated. I have seen no evidence of the steam roller tactics mentioned here. But I do believe the candidate should know on what platform he is expected to stand before he is nominated."

New York's mayor assumed the mantle of peacemaker with the statement, "I hope that the convention will end in the same good temper in which it opened."

"The order of business was fixed as it was in my resolution for one purpose only, to expedite our deliberations. Let us, for once, get

business like in a Democratic convention. Let us get the presentation of candidates out of the way while the platform committee is wrestling with its problems, and remember no one asks for a vote for candidates for president until that platform is completed.

"Let us be Americans, irrespective of what part of the country we come from. Let us be good Democrats as well. Our common enemy who has just dispersed his convention forces at Kansas City is waiting, oh how eagerly, for the old fashioned friction that has unfortunately characterized so many Democratic conventions in the past. In the life past we have, with our squabbles, done more for the Republican party than that party ever did for itself. The G. O. P. is depending upon us to 'spill the beans' here; let us disappoint them."

Defeat Menaces Governor Moody

As Last Minute Move, Dan Confabs With Dry Leaders, Urging Plank Like One At State Convention

HOUSTON, Tex., June 27. (AP)—Threatened with a measure of defeat along with other Southern dry leaders, Governor Dan Moody, representing the Texas delegation on the democratic national convention platform committee, went into conference with sub-committee members grafting the platform Wednesday night, urging adoption of a dry plank along the lines recommended by the State convention.

The Governor, who has been promised support from about 10 states in the fight for his plank had not reached a showdown on it, but his highway commissioner, Cecil Johnson, of Tyler, had blazed the way Wednesday afternoon with a rock-ribbed dry speech before the entire committee.

"We stand here," Johnson said, "confronted by another question on as great a moral, socially, industrially and economically as that of human slavery which all but wreck-

ed the democratic party. Some of us who are striving to get a kick out of increased alcoholic content of liquor may get a kick from some other unexpected direction."

Governor Moody's dry fight, which has placed him at the forefront of Southern prohibition supporters, remained the center of interest Wednesday for the Texas delegation.

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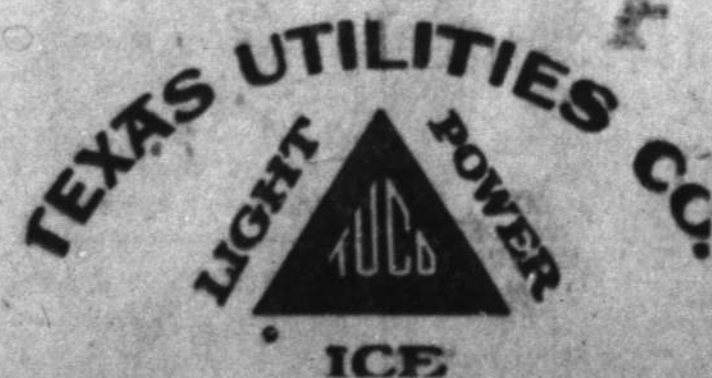

HOUSTON, June 27.—Some of the intense bitterness over the prohibition issue, which underlies the democratic national convention, came to the surface today at public hearings before the platform committee with resultant scenes of disorder and confusion and a one-point threat of a personal collision between two United States senators.

For more than two hours advocates and opponents of the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act battled back and forth in the stately auditorium of Houston's beautiful public library and even the vigorous use of a large carpenter's hammer in the hands of Senator Key Pittman, of Nevada, the chairman, failed to maintain the decorum which usually attends sessions of such a convention committee.

Wilson Position Causes Row

Before that Tydings and Joseph Daniels, North Carolina publisher and former secretary of the navy, had clashed over the position of Woodrow Wilson on prohibition. In urging his plank calling for determination of the liquor question by the individual states, the Marylander denounced his hearers that the war president had vetoed the Volstead act.

"Don't praise the great president in one paragraph of your platform and repudiate him in another," Tydings said.

The first rift in the prohibition argument came when J. A. McSparran, of Pennsylvania, said the demand for modification came not from the solidly democratic south, but from "the sidewalks of New York and Philadelphia where they do not register and count their votes, but merely estimate them."

TEXAS STANDS PAT

Look On As Others Join Al Smith Jamboree

HOUSTON, June 27.—(AP)—The greater part of the Texas delegation to the democratic national convention stood pat Wednesday night while most other states joined the riotous jamboree for Gov. Al Smith.

State Representative George Purl of Dallas, chief lieutenant of the ultra-dry anti-Smith faction headed by Senator Tom Love, held the Texas flag inviolate from clutches of the parading Smith throngs.

After those supporting and opposing the Eighteenth amendment had concluded their presentation, Senator Glass sought to clear the discussion without hearing those whom he said were neither "hot nor cold on this question." This brought a protest and argument within the committee itself which took up all but five minutes of the forty-minute session.

Chairman Pittman finally got order and announced that five minutes remained for discussion. Bishop Cannon then bluntly told the committee that if the 31 dry organizations could have only five minutes they did not care to be heard and he was roundly applauded by the audience, particularly the women.

A request for unanimous consent that the spokesmen for the temperance organizations be given forty minutes was objected to by several members and then the committee voted to give them that much time. Tydings wanted an equal time for the anti to make reply, but finally withdrew his request.

Governor Dan Moody, who had charge of the forces demanding a straight out declaration approving the Eighteenth amendment wanted the time extended so that members of the committee could be heard but he was told that they would have plenty of time to discuss the issue in executive sessions later.

other Southern states for Senator George, reminding Alabama that when she had a favorite son, Georgia had stood by him. He referred to the mediocrity of Oscar W. Underwood four years ago.

The Georgian got his first real applause when he said there had been but two "moral questions," before the country since its inception—slavery and prohibition.

"Prohibition is a moral issue," he said "and the democratic party must not compromise on that question. The gentleman I am going to nominate is in favor of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act and will not compromise that question."

The next state on the roll call was Arizona and Harry V. Benn, chairman of the Arizona delegation, announced "Arizona the baby state yields to New York's illustrious son, the next President of the United States."

Roosevelt Makes Speech

In a thunder of cheering, Franklin D. Roosevelt, came to the front of the speaker's platform and presented the name of Alfred E. Smith. At the very outset of the speech he set off a miniature Smith demonstration by opening with this sentence:

"I came for the third time to urge upon a convention of my party the nomination of the Governor of the State of New York."

As the nominator ended his speech, the Smith demonstration began.

The standards of the states crowded in with a constantly growing mixture of freak banners proclaiming the New York Governor. Only the Anti-Smith states, scattered throughout the hall kept their state placards in place.

Bandstand of Noise

Many of the delegates were cheering, many were singing, some were blowing horns and whistles. There were a few cowbells and a few rattles. The three convention bands were all playing different tunes.

A fist fight developed about the Mississippi standard while the demonstrators were at its height. Some one of the Smith marchers sought to take the standard into the parade, but Senator Stephens of that State, seated directly under the big sign post, beat him away in a tussle that resulted in the post demolishing just where it was Mississippi is pledged, for the first ballot at least, to her favorite son, Senator Pat Harrison.

Duplicate Banner Paraded

But a moment after Senator Stephens had repulsed the attack on his state's name board, its duplicate, carried by a half dozen clutched men, passed by in the Smith parade. They had brought it up from the alternate section in the rear of the hall.

Most of the New York delegates remained in their seats, watching but taking no part in the demonstration. James A. Farley, chairman of the New York Athletic commission, fell in line with the New York standard. Maryland's was borne in by Senator Tydings.

The wife of the New York Governor for whom the parade was being staged, missed the hoped her acknowledgments as the noisy procession passed, and threw kisses to some of the paraders.

Second Round

Some fifteen minutes after the din began, and while it still was going as strong as ever, a second round of flying fists about the Mississippi standard had to be settled by the police. that a fist fight nearly was started by Senator Millard Tydings of Maryland, who took vigorous exception to statements made by Bishop James Cannon Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, regarding prohibition enforcement in his state.

After the bishop had declared that Maryland had multiplied its breweries and distilleries upon adoption by Virginia and West Virginia of prohibition laws, Tydings rose to his feet and declared that he did not intend to have "my state insulted by statements which cannot be backed up by facts."

Bishop Cannon insisted that he was reciting facts and after an exchange during which Chairman Pittman of Nevada, in part sustained Tydings' exceptions to the statements, as irrelevant to the question before the committee, the Maryland senator declared that Cannon had uttered "an absolute falsehood."

Senator Carter Glass of Virginia, instantly was on his feet. He said Tydings had violated the agreement entered into earlier in the day by the committee for considering the prohibition question. After several heated exchanges Tydings who had taken his seat, jumped from his chair and started toward the speaker's platform.

Senator Cole Blanton of South Carolina, who occupied a nearby seat, grabbed the Marylander by the shoulders and pushed him back. By both persuasion and force, Tydings was finally brought back to his seat. Meanwhile Pittman, pounded vigorously with a carpenter's hammer for order. This eventually was restored and Cannon continued his appeal for a plank declaring for vigorous enforcement of the prohibition laws.

Policemen Used Clubs To Calm Disturbances

HOUSTON, June 27.—On edge from a session which saw a riotous quarter of an hour over the question of religious equality, the democratic national convention tonight approached its final decisions in an atmosphere of distinct tension.

During the day it had seen almost half a dozen fist fights on the floor during which policemen used their night sticks to quell battle over state standards. It returned to Sam Houston hall tonight to listen to the fiery nominating speeches, always inflammable among high strung men.

A brief reference to the position of Thomas Jefferson on the religious question, and a quotation of the religious liberty clause of the constitution, interpolated into the prepared address of Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas, the permanent chairman, sent the Smith forces into a wild burst of enthusiasm at today's session, which started as a parade and which ended with furious fighting among groups within ten feet of the speaker's stand, and with combats of a less spirited nature elsewhere in the hall.

Robinson had said: "Jefferson, gloried in the Virginia status of religious liberty, he rejoiced in the provision of the constitution that declares that no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification for any office of trust in the United States."

calling for a city plan commission and city park board should be the first step here."

"Plant More Trees"

"I was delighted to see so many trees in Lubbock," he continued. "But there are parts of the city where this phase of beautification is being sadly neglected. Plant more trees, they make beautiful cities and don't be so stingy with the space between your sidewalk and the curb, set your sidewalks back so that trees will have room to grow in. Trees are worth more to a town than any improvement that can be made."

Views of the railroad crossing at Avenue H, where traffic from three highways is carried, and at Broadway, Main Street, the joy in 18th Street at Avenue X, "leave-outs" in paving on 18th Street and other streets, the "joints" around the square, junk heaps, race sections, and other defects in city planning were shown by Mr. Surratt as he lectured.

Widening Difficult

"To widen it would be mighty difficult now," he said, when questioned about Main Street, "and if you could correct it now without a great deal of time and expense."

"It doesn't look very nice," he said in speaking of Broadway with its open parkways. "It's doubtful if I would be loath while to plant trees and shrub in the parkways now," he said, "at they soon become disheveled spots. To Dallas, even, they are not kept in shape."

"The Yellowhouse canyon, just east of the city, offers a wonderful opportunity for the development of a park for the city," Mr. Surratt insisted several times in his talk. He recommended that a park be made of the entire canyon adjacent to the city so that the territory just across the canyon to the east would be opened for a first residential section, such as Highland Park in Dallas and other suburbs of the city.

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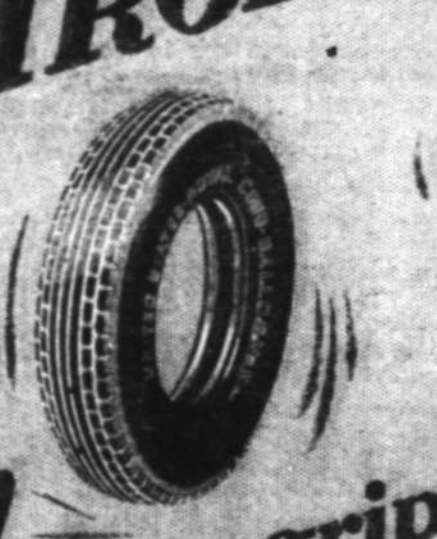
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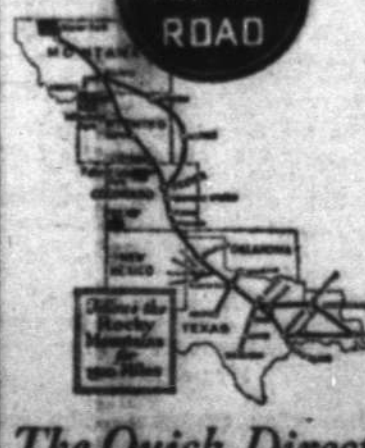
