Walton Is Speaker At Lions Meeting

He explained that he did not favor eliminating the women teachers, but thought more men should go into teaching in order that the boys would have men for leaders during their school years.

His second point was that Texas has a registration system to reduce the poll tax, in order that anyone entitled to a vote would be financially able to vote. His main topic was the sterilization of the habitual criminal, the one and those incurably diseased. He pointed out examples of how sterilization had worked in other sections.

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BRITISH WAR SHIPS STEAM TOWARD BASE

LONDON, Oct. 4.—British warships churned under forced draft from all parts of the world toward the Mediterranean sea and the Gulf of Aden today while Malta, Gibraltar and Egypt fortified themselves against dreaded eventualities of the Italian Ethiopian war.

Authorities at Malta, frankly and almost fearfully prepared for siege. Wholesale grocers were ordered to report monthly the supply of foodstuff on hand.

Military orders plunged the great Rock of Gibraltar into darkness last night while sirens wailed a practice warning of an air attack and searchlights played over the straits commanded by the fort's guns.

It was reported Egyptian troops occupied all exposed areas including Alexandria and three hundred Italian employees of British air fields in Egypt were dismissed.

LIQUOR BILL IS DEFEATED BY THE DRYS

AUSTIN, Oct. 4.—Drys and moderates of the Texas legislature stood their ground today and defeated a substitute liquor bill drawn by wets, 76 to 64.

A substitute bill by Representative Harold Hankamer and others parallels closely the bill for package liquor sales alone. The substitute provided a strict definition of an open saloon and legalized sale of wines and beers to 14 per cent alcoholic content by the drink when served with meals.

Backers of the Bradbury bill accepted yesterday, charged the attempt by wets to offer a dry bill was a parliamentary maneuver.

Had Bradbury's bill been displaced, wets behind the new bill might gain concessions when and if it goes to conference committee.

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DETROIT WINS THIRD GAME OF WORLD SERIES

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—The Detroit Tigers took the third game of the World Series here today by a score of 6 to 5 in 11 innings to take the lead by two games to one over their opponents.

The first game of the series went to Chicago by a score of 3 to 0, with Detroit taking the second by a score of 8 to 3, and the game today gave Detroit the lead in the series for the first time.

Dollar Steamers To Stop Trips to Ports of Italy

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—George Hilkins, general manager here of the Dollar Steamship Line, said today all ships of the company had been ordered to discontinue calling at Italian ports for the time being.

High war risk insurance rates necessitated the move, he said.

"Yesterday the war risk insurance was boosted to 52 1/2 cents on the dollar for ships calling at Italian ports," he said. "For this reason it has been decided that Dollar Line ships would discontinue their regular call at the ports of Naples and Genoa."

POLICE KILL RESORT CITY DESPERADO

FORT WORTH, Oct. 4.—Police early this morning fought a gun fight with the companion of Edward William Fuller, alias Ed Foley, who was slain last night in a gun fight.

Radio patrolmen found the man in a parked sedan as they pulled up to question him. The man leaped from the seat and at a command to halt, turned a fired.

The fugitive darted down an alley as police returned the fire. In his car was a blood-stained handkerchief, causing police to believe he had been struck by a bullet when he fled with Foley in a hail of lead.

The first shooting climaxed an interval of kidnaping and robbery.

Foley was shot when he and a companion, in a stolen car, were overtaken last night by a police scout car after the two had robbed a filling station.

In the gun fight Foley was shot in the groin. His body was found half an hour later in the Trinity river bottoms, in his right hand a .38 caliber revolver.

Police said he had fled to death as he crouched, gun in hand, in the brush, waiting for officers.

Foley's fingerprint record shows that on July 27, 1932, he broke jail at Palo Pinto, where he was held in a series of "Lovers' Lane" holdups near Mineral Wells. He escaped once from the Michigan prison and the Michigan state reformatory and again from a road camp.

The rewards for his capture total \$150. His parents live in Mineral Wells.

W. Blankenship to Be Buried Today

Funeral services for Willard Blankenship, 21, who died in Ranger Friday morning at 6:30, are to be conducted from the First Christian church of Ranger Friday afternoon at 5 o'clock, with Rev. H. B. Johnson, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment will be in the Evergreen cemetery following the services at the church.

The decedent was born Oct. 7, 1914. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Vera Blankenship, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Blankenship, four brothers, Roy, Junior, Timmy and Bobby, and two sisters, Mrs. Waver Haynie and Mrs. Helen Rose Britt, all of Ranger.

Willard Blankenship was suffering from acute appendicitis and underwent an operation Sunday morning at 9:30, and died Friday morning.

Suicide Cause of Death, Report at Rising Star Says

RISING STAR, Oct. 4.—The body of Claude F. Shook, aged 44 with the top of his head literally blown off, was found behind the barn at the Shook home in the west part of town last week. 16-gauge shotgun was lying at his side.

Justice of the Peace G. W. Haddin rendered a verdict that death was from a gunshot wound self-inflicted. No notes or indications of any kind were found to furnish reason for the act. He is survived by his widow and two children, also four children by a former marriage.

Three Are Fined In Ranger City Court

Three men were fined in the Ranger city court and one woman was still in the city jail Friday morning as the result of a fight Wednesday night on South Russell street.

G. O. Kimbrough paid a fine for fighting after he had been cuffed about the head and Roy and Henry Bashem, 23 and 25, were confined overnight in the city jail, being released Thursday after a hearing in which fines were assessed.

Bessie Lee Fox, who was taken into custody at the time, was remanded to jail. She had not been released Friday morning.

PLANES BOMB TWO TOWNS IN NORTH ZONE

Adigrad Captured and Aduwa Is Next Objective of Italians.

ROME, Oct. 4.—Italian troops advancing rapidly into Ethiopia have captured the town of Adigrad near Aduwa, foreign official announcements said tonight.

Italian forces, moving with rapidity, captured the town this afternoon.

The fall of the town, it was believed, would hasten the taking of Aduwa, the immediate major objective of the Italian forces operating in that vicinity.

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 4.—Italian planes rained bombs on more Ethiopian towns today and troops fought desperately on three fronts.

Nine planes bombed Aduwa, on the northern front, just south of the Eritrean border for the third time and the town of Adigrad for the second time.

Other Italian planes, bombing the frontier post of Jajadja, west of Aduwa and north of Lake Tana.

Three soldiers and two military telephone operators were wounded at Jajadja by the bombs and another wounded by machine gun fire from the planes. Casualties were not announced.

FIELD HEADQUARTERS, Italian Army, Oct. 4.—The Italian army of the north advanced into Ethiopia today in the wake of bombing planes that attacked towns in its path.

A squadron of nine heavy Caeroni planes led by Count Galeas so Ciano, Mussolini's son-in-law flew over Aduwa, scene of Italy's humiliation in 1896, and bombed it.

The planes dropped bombs aimed at the Governor's palace.

HONOLULU.—Hawaii may be far away from the other states and territories, but it is "close" to the U. S. Treasury.

For the fiscal year ended June 30, Hawaii paid into the U. S. Treasury more corporation and individual income taxes than the following 17 states:

Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Idaho, Maine, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Carolina, Oregon, Utah, Vermont, Wyoming and South Dakota.

All of these states have a larger population than Hawaii except Nevada, Vermont and Wyoming.

Federal internal revenue tax collections in Hawaii for the fiscal year totalled \$5,652,504.

have had ripe tomatoes since the first of August, and have gathered two tubs of English peas. More than 200 pounds of cabbage have been made into kraut, and there is still more in the garden. We have 700 Bermuda plants and when all are harvested, we will have several bushels of sweet onions."

KOUNTZE—A new ventilated pantry which measures five feet square has been added in the home of Mrs. J. B. Whiteley of Hardin county at a cost of \$6 for materials, according to Miss Fannie Vanoy, home demonstration agent. The ventilation, Mrs. Whiteley says, is well worth the cost because it allows light and the circulation of air which is essential to food storage.

Mrs. Whiteley has a total of 495 containers with 36 varieties in her pantry, and also has 2 1/2 gallons of honey, 1000 pounds of Irish potatoes, and 100 pounds of dried peas and beans.

LIPSCOMB—Farmers in Lipscomb county have been saving the time and expense of reseeded a large amount of wheat this fall by germination tests of the wheat they had saved for fall seeding, according to C. M. Gay, county agricultural agent. Wheat harvested this year in the county was below the average in quality and germination tests made on various samples of the wheat ran from 10 to 50 per cent germination with a large proportion of the sprouts weak.

Farmers have been advised of the low germination test obtained from this year's wheat and many are making arrangements to plant wheat that has a high germination test.

GAIL—Ten acres of blow sand on the farm of Nolan C. von Roeder of the Knapp Community in Borden county paid \$738.50 in 1934, according to Cline E. Morris, county agricultural agent. While numbers of farmers in his part of the state were worrying about what to do with their blow sand spots, von Roeder was setting out peach and plum trees on his, and as a result this 10 acres TEXAS FARMS—Gal 2 has paid higher dividends than 100 acres adjoining it.

To date, von Roeder has sold 800 bushels of peaches and plums from this orchard at 75 cents to \$1.00 per bushel and still has his late crop of peaches to sell. This will be approximately 200 bushels.

ODESSA—For the first time in several years, Henry Barrow, Ector county ranchman is gathering about what to do with their blow sand spots, according to H. L. Atkins, Jr., county agricultural agent.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

HERE I am harping on breakfast again, but it's impossible for mothers and wives to put too much stress on beginning the day right. Children need a good meal in the morning even if grown-ups want to go without breakfast altogether.

A morning in school uses up a vast amount of nervous energy as well as physical strength and food is the fuel that keeps both mind and body running smoothly. No child can work his mind who is not nourished. Listlessness, headache, irritability are often direct results of scanty breakfasts.

The reason some children don't want breakfast may be that the evening meal was too heavy and too rich. Too much food at bedtime keeps the stomach working overtime and prevents restful sleep.

Allow Time for Leisurely Eating
Sleeping conditions are another factor which may cause loss of appetite. Careless ventilation and the wrong bed covers the night before can make a child indifferent to his breakfast.

Or again, if a child feels he's going to be late for school, he can't eat even if he's really hungry.

That's why we ought to allow plenty of time for a child to eat his breakfast and have at least ten minutes between the time he finishes his meal and the time he must start to school.

The hearty type of breakfast which includes fruit, cereal, eggs or their equivalent, bread or toast and beverage make a convenient family meal because it takes care of the children. Those adults who are not active muscularly can pass by the extra dishes and limit themselves to their fruit and coffee.

As to breakfast menus, don't let yourself get into a rut. The same fruit, the same cereal and the inevitable egg pull after a few mornings.

Tomorrow's Menu

BREAKFAST—Sliced peaches or stewed dried peaches, ready-to-serve cereal, baked eggs with cream, graham and raisin muffins, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Oyster curry in rice border, toasted muffins, Chinese cabbage and sweet pepper salad, sliced cup cakes, milk, tea.

DINNER—Chicken and vegetables en casserole, head lettuce and cheese ball salad with quince honey sandwiches, peanut brittle ice cream, milk, coffee.

Vary the list by using fresh fruits alternately with stewed fruits. Let tomato juice pleasantly chilled and carefully seasoned with lemon juice take the place of orange juice occasionally. Baked apples and apple sauce will be available all winter, baked pears until after Thanksgiving.

Serve Different Cereal Daily

With cooked and ready-to-serve cereals made in all grains and in all fashions you can serve a different cereal every morning for two weeks—with plenty of rich milk or cream, of course.

When I have a cooked cereal I'm not particular about a hot drink, but if we are to eat a ready-to-serve cereal I like to have my twelve-year-old son drink a cup of cocoa or hot milk. Something hot aids digestion.

Eggs should be on the table at least three times a week. On other mornings try a creamed meat or a creamed vegetable on toast with a garnish of crisp bacon.

Crisp toast to make a child chew is good for his teeth as well as his general health. It's a good idea to allot toast to cooked cereal mornings and muffins or rolls to the ready-to-serve-cereal occasions.

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Lesson of Prohibition Ignored by Brewers

When the Bourbons were restored to power in France after the downfall of Napoleon, it was recorded that they had learned nothing and had forgotten nothing.

They had been ridden out of town on a rail, so to speak, because their blind arrogance had provoked the people beyond endurance.

After many years of bloody floundering, the people had permitted them to come back; and the Bourbons lost no time in proving that they were just as bad as they had ever been, so that ultimately the people of France got a new rail and staged another little riding party.

All this is somehow brought to mind by news that the Federal Alcohol Administration is deeply disturbed by current activities of American brewers.

Some of the largest brewers in the country, say administration officials, are returning to the bad old practice of pre-prohibition days when it was the rule for a big brewer to own many hundreds of saloons as a means of pushing his product.

This practice was outlawed under the New Deal's original alcohol administration. But this, like various other things, was carried to the realm of forgotten things when the Blue Eagle died, and the substitute legislation passed by the last Congress seems to be rather defective.

It provides that ownership or control of saloons by breweries is illegal—in states where there is a similar state law. The result is that the law is full of loopholes, and the brewers are beginning to take advantage of the fact.

An administration official says that one big midwest-brewery has already taken leases on 1000 pieces of real estate in Chicago alone.

The evils of this practice are obvious. A beer parlor owned by a brewery is interested in just one thing: in seeing as great a quantity of beer drunk as the neighboring stomachs and purses will stand for. It is out to push sales, regardless of the effect.

It was precisely this sort of thing that led ordinary men and women to grow so disgusted with the saloon that they voted for prohibition.

We gave up prohibition, at last, because its abuses were too great to be endured. Some of these abuses seem anxious to convince the public that the abuses of repeal are equally great. Back after more than a decade of exile, they seem to have learned nothing and forgotten nothing.

If the brewers generally go back to their pre-prohibition tactics, they will provoke a new wave of sentiment for prohibition just as surely as night follows day.

Roosevelt and the Need for Renewal of Welfare Services

President Roosevelt has returned to his desk on the banks of the Potomac river. He opened the 1935 "mobilization of human needs" meeting with the assertion that "in spite of definitely brighter economic strides, the problem of welfare services demands the best of both the government and private agencies." Speaking to delegates of welfare organizations of the nation he reiterated that "the government is withdrawing as rapidly as possible from the field of emergency home relief." He emphasized that the government was moving successfully toward "a substitution of work." In other words the substitution of work for the dole.

It had to come in America. Gerald Swope of New York, a famous industrialist, is the chairman of the famous charity relief welfare organization of America. The head of the New Deal administration facing Chairman Swope and a vast number of delegates placed this in the record:

"For the third time we have the opportunity, face to face, to pledge at once the substance and sinews of government and of privately organized welfare agencies in the services of the less fortunate of the land. The fact that you have maintained your support of welfare services with a shrinkage of only 13 per cent of the amount raised since 1929, is remarkable. I am glad to know that you halted the retreat at that point a year ago and now are headed once more toward the front. Let there be a general advance from that point in the 350 campaigns which have been organized for the autumn of 1935."

In other words, the federal government has substituted a wage for the dole and the 48 states and their municipalities will be asked to take the load off the shoulders of federal taxpayers. This is the sixth year of the depression. It is agreed that the dole has no place in the economic life of the country. Billions have been spent by the federal government and will continue to be spent this winter and the coming summer to make it possible to relieve human distress and suffering as well as to provide work for idlers of the nation who are fit to work.

It is not a political issue. It should be non-partisan from top to bottom and from start to finish.

Old-Time Whisky Baron Says U.S. Is Cocktail-Minded

HOUSTON, Tex.—America is cocktail-minded. Julius Kessler, 80, old-time whisky baron, is the authority for the observation.

"In the old days," he said, "people drank whisky, mixed with a little sugar or a little water, some lemon juice or mint."

"I think the reason they go in for cocktails is that the young whisky now on the market smells and tastes so bad that they prefer angostura and vermouth."

Kessler, head of a huge distillery corporation, who got his start packing liquor over mountain passes on mules during the Colorado gold rush, has his own idea of thwarting evil-tasting young whisky.

He blends drinks, taking whisky from one to four years old, adding a little heavy-bodied imported sherry, some old malt whisky and a tasteless, neutral spirit.

"This produces a palatable, smooth and drinkable whisky with a fine bouquet," he said.

He believes drunkenness is criminal and without justification. "It is a crime to eat too much; and just so, it is a crime to drink too much."

A little alcoholic stimulation is good for aged people, he believes and hopes he lives to be 200.

"When I was 20," he said smiling "my chief ambition was to reach the ripe age of 35 without dying in my boots."

Mark Twain was one of his closest friends, he said. The humorist used to visit him every summer.

"He drank a good deal of whisky, but more wine," he said.

Born in Budapest in 1855, Kessler came to America at the age of 17. He tried to join Custer, but was rejected because of his youth—thus being saved from massacre by the Indians.

At 20, he went to Denver and became a whisky salesman. He has sold whisky ever since, except during prohibition. During the silver boom, he sold his whisky at \$6 a gallon, which in turn was retailed at \$2 for "three fingers."

A Colorado bank took over several whisky firms and engaged Kessler to operate them. This led to establishment of liquor houses in St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth and Kessler prospered. In 1913 he became president of the Distillers Securities Corporation.

In the pre-prohibition years, he bought from 50,000,000 to 100,000,000 gallons of blackstrap molasses in Cuba annually. He bought cigars, 10,000 at a time, for himself and when prohibition came, he had a personal stock of 38,000.

"I still have a few cigars," he said. "I drink very little, but I don't claim to be a reformer or a prohibitionist."

25 oxen were rendered for taxation, but in 1876 212 were carried on the assessment rolls in only one precinct.

Not a single piano was listed in the rolls for 1855, but by 1876 13 families owned them in one precinct alone.

"Money at interest" is an item frequently appearing on renditions, the amount varying from \$10 to more than \$4,000. Books, silver plate, iron safes and other similar items are listed in the 1876 roll but not in 1855.

Slaves Rendered On Old Rolls

RUSK, Tex.—In the year 1855, 2,280 slaves were rendered for taxation in Cherokee county, according to early county assessment books, long forgotten, which were recently unearthed when repairs were being made in the courthouse basement.
In that year, 95 citizens in Cherokee county owned one slave, 242 owned from 2 to 10; 31 owned from 11 to 20, 13 owned from 21 to 30 and only six persons owned more than 30. The maximum number owned by one person was 66.
In that year the maximum value placed on a slave was \$1,000, while in 1863 single slaves were rendered for taxation for as much as \$1,500.

A cash prize of \$5 will be presented to the club having the highest per cent of its paid-up membership present. The chairmen of the attendance and transportation committee will accept reports at the conference and will award the prize at the Sunday luncheon.

Raboy of Eastland is president of the new Oil Belt branch club of the Business and Professional Women's Club, organized Sunday at Eastland under the direction of the Cleburne Business Club. The membership is composed of business women from Cisco, Ranger, Rising Star and Eastland and a large delegation is expected to attend the conference.

Part Time Jobs Aid High School Students of State

AUSTIN.—"Eight thousand five hundred and forty-seven part-time jobs will be given Texas high school students if school officials take immediate steps in presenting applications to the National Youth Administration," Lyndon B. Johnson, state director, stated today.

In securing funds allocated to each county in Texas participating in the \$6 per month high school aid program, the student, the principal and the county superintendent must follow certain necessary and definitely outlined steps.

"An eligible student, that is, one who is between the ages of 16 and 25, now in high school, single, whose family is certified for relief, who has ability to do high grade work in school, and who without financial assistance could not attend school, files application with the principal of the school he wishes to attend," Johnson pointed out.

"The principal, whose duty it is to place all applications received by him, also submits a list, in duplicate, of the eligible applicants to the Social Service Department in the county for verification of the relief status of the students' families. After jobs have been procured among schools throughout the county, the principal of each school submits to the county superintendent a project application in affidavit form asking for his quota of jobs at \$6 per job, together with the students' applications properly executed," Johnson said.

The county superintendent, who will be responsible for this program in each county, will upon receiving these applications from the principal sign and submit to Lyndon B. Johnson, state director, Austin, Texas, all project applications in triplicate with students' applications attached, the total amount of funds asked for in all his applications not to exceed the total allotment to his county.

A placement committee, composed of the county superintendent, the case worker in charge of that county and the city school superintendent in school districts having a scholastic population of 500 or more, will determine the amount of funds that each school in that county shall receive.

Part-time jobs assigned to students are designed to provide socially desirable work, such as clerical, library, campus improvement, playground supervision, assistance to high school nurses in giving physical examinations and in rendering first aid, acting as traffic officers at nearby elementary school as safety measures, assistance in laboratories, and similar worthwhile canopies.

"Unless school officials throughout the state take immediate action in submitting high school aid applications, it will be necessary for the National Youth Administration to take those funds declined by negligent officials and distribute them elsewhere, probably in metropolitan centers," Johnson said.

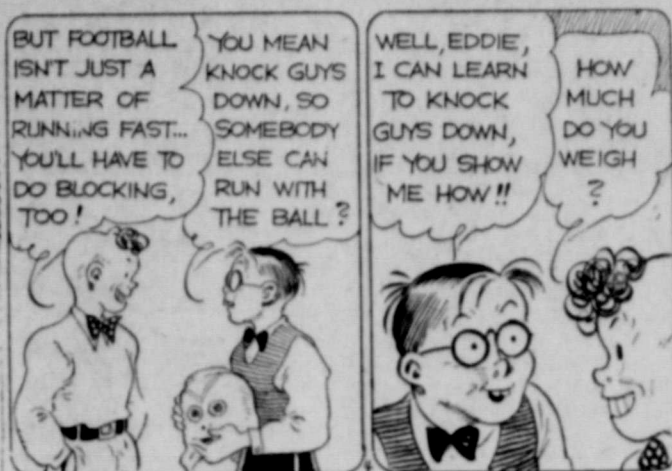

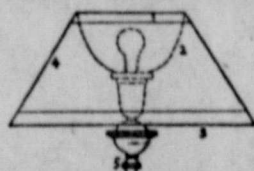

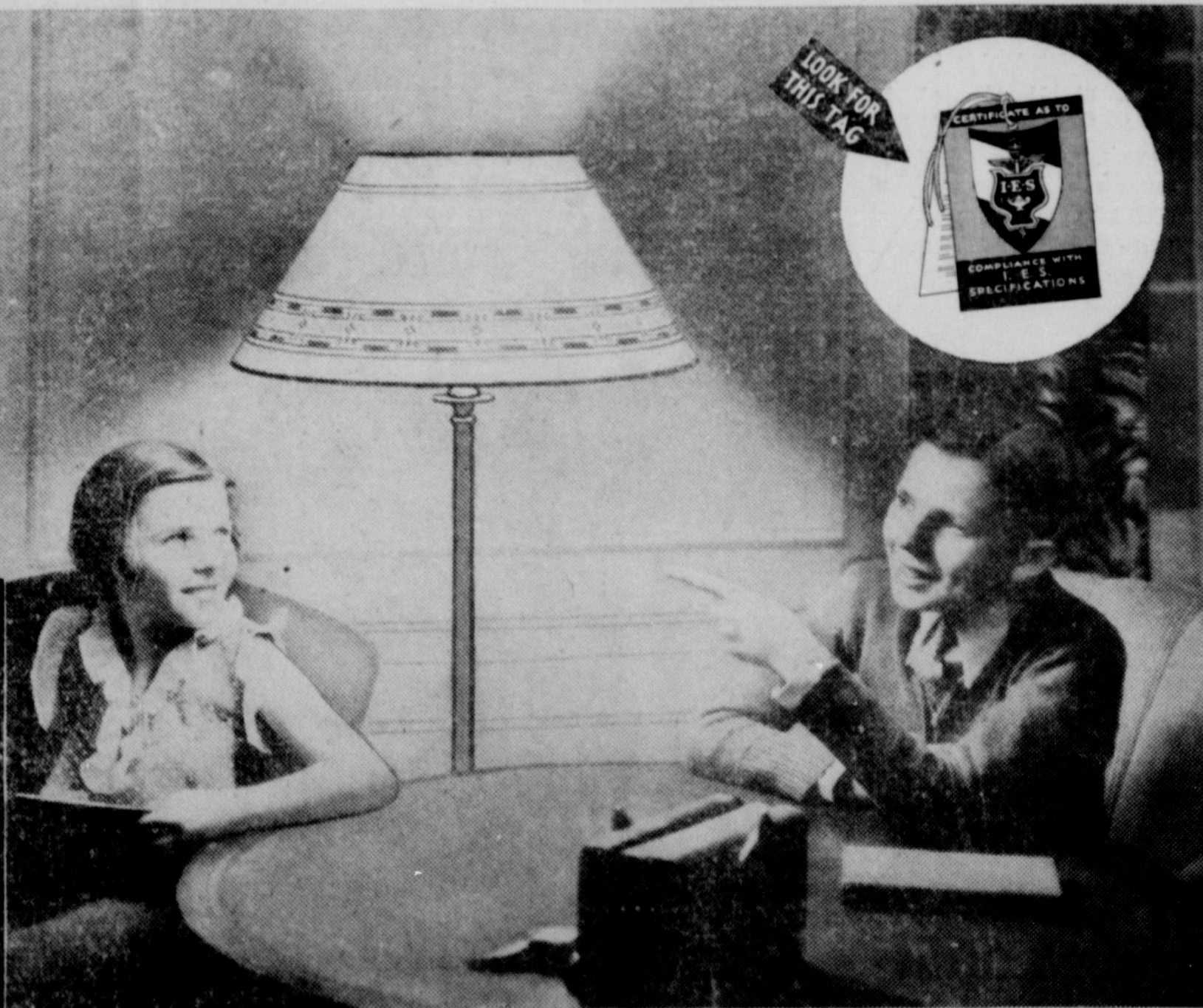

Ruins May Hide King Solomon's Fabulous Mines

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa.—The secrets of mysterious Zimbabwe, the ruined relics of a dead civilization which for years have puzzled archaeologists, at last are to be probed by a scientific expedition, which will have the support of the Rhodesian government.

Prof. Raymond Dart, the anthropologist and discoverer of the Taung skull, who knows the ruins well, believes their secrets will be revealed.

The Zimbabwe remains of great buildings which lie near Victoria, Mashonaland, for half a century have been the center of scientific controversy, both as to their age and their original purpose. They are believed by many to be the legendary mines of King Solomon, while others suppose they were fortresses attached to a great trading center dealing in the products of the neighboring gold mines. In the Towers of Silence, which dominate the ruins, the dead of a once great civilization are believed to have been cremated.

"When we find their tombs," Dart declares, "we shall be near a solution of the meaning of Zimbabwe."

The expedition is expected to work for five years.

Since its discovery by Adam Benders in 1868, there have been a number of small explorations on the site, but nothing decisive ever has come from them. The new expedition, designed on a large scale, will penetrate further into the mystery than any hitherto.

Zoo In London to Get Animal-Bird

LONDON.—The London Zoo is hoping to acquire another rare and strange exhibit—a duck-bill platypus from New Guinea.

This creature is one of nature's strangest freaks. Its appearance is singular, since it has a furred body, rather slug-like in shape, ending in a short blunt tail, short legs with webbed feet, and a small head which consists chiefly of a mouth exactly like the bill of a duck.

Its breeding habits are unusual as it is a survivor of the time when primitive mammals laid eggs like reptiles. Although a true mammal it lays eggs, incubates them in a pouch and then when the young are hatched it suckles them like any mammal. Only the echidna or spiny anteater, another native of New Guinea, shares this habit with the duck-bill platypus.

As yet, no specimen of the duck-bill platypus has reached Britain alive, for it is an extremely difficult and exactly traveler. Obtaining a duck-bill platypus is difficult enough since these animals are protected, but even after permission to export one has been obtained, there are more complications to be overcome. The animals must have access to water of a certain depth and at the same time be in a position to return at will to a dry bed.

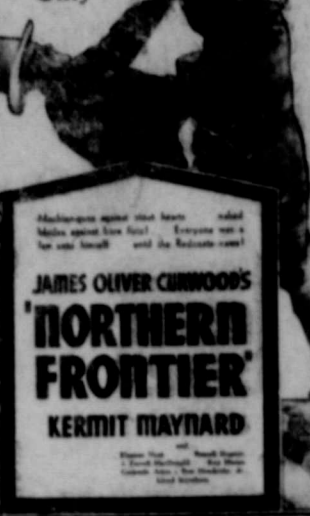
