Special from Monitor Bureau
"NEW YORK, Sept. 8—With the reopening of the schools, the United Parents' Association, with headquarters at No. 152 West Forty-Second Street, has issued recommendations to parents in connection with the school work of their children. Here are some of the recommendations:

Arrange the breakfast and lunch hours so that there is no rushing at home or at school.

Encourage punctuality and regular attendance, not permitting trifles to interfere.

See that the children are dressed simply, neatly, modestly and suitably in accordance with the weather.

Find out how much time should be devoted to home study, with good light and ventilation. Prevent interruptions as far as possible.

Show an interest in the children's school work, athletics and other activities.

Visit the classroom during open school week and at other times. Do not criticize the teachers or school within the children's hearing. Always hear both sides of every question and ask the teacher about it.

Instill in the children habits of obedience and respect for authority. Picture the school as a happy, desirable place, rather than one children should dread.

Keep in mind that the school offers unlimited opportunities to those who take advantage of them.

Mothers should arouse the interest of fathers in school activities.

A very enthusiastic meeting of the P.T.A. was held at the school auditorium on Monday, September 28th. Prof. Irvin gave us a splendid outline for this year's work. Our principal aim for this year is to raise funds to purchase books for the school, and as these books are so badly needed for the school work we are planning to raise money in a number of different ways, which will be advertised from time to time.

He further charges he believed defendant to have been a virtuous woman previous to meeting him, relying on her statements to him, and so believing married her, as he felt honor bound to do, but had he known the truth would not have married defendant. That such conduct of the defendant has rendered their

further living together insupportable. He prays for the annulment of the marriage existing between them, relief general and special. Herein Fail Not, but have said Court, at its aforesaid regular term, this writ with your thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

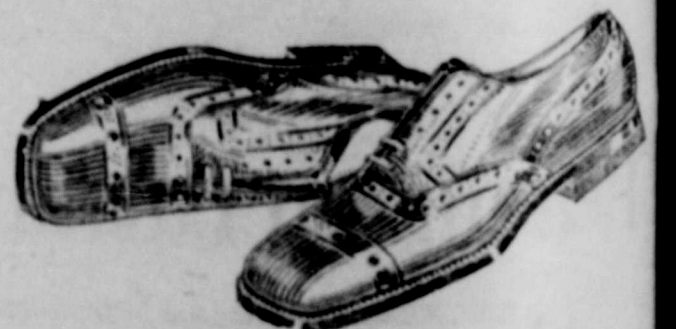

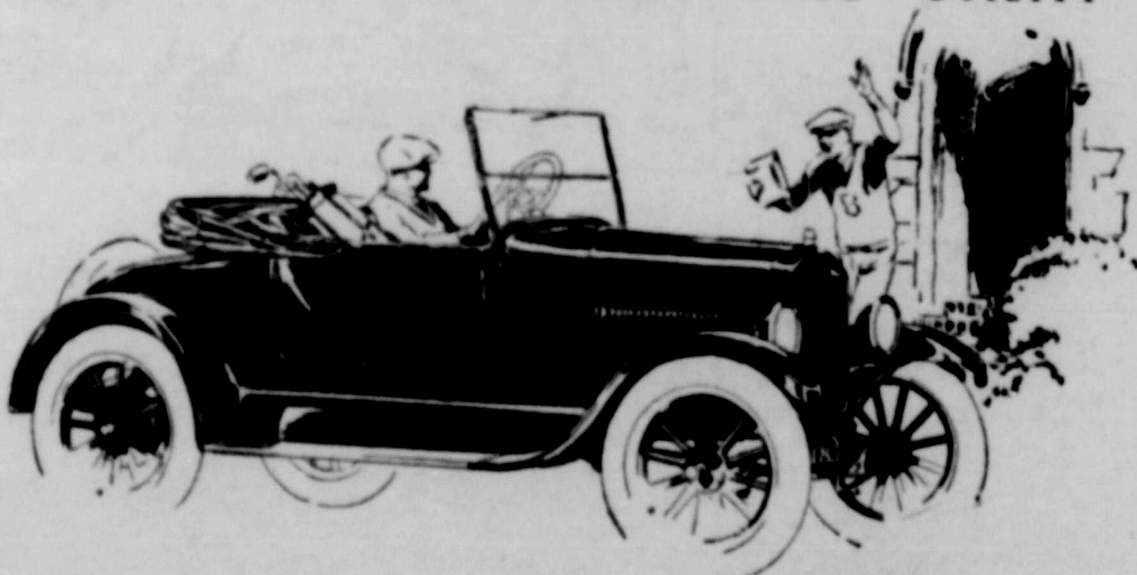

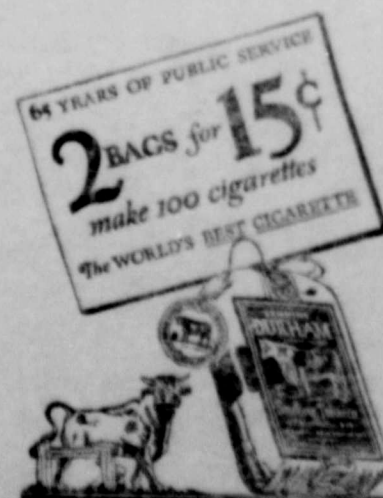

I just finished hearing a Politician, one of the Washington Boys, talk on Abraham Lincoln. The only thing I could picture in common between him and Lincoln was that they had both been in Washington. When a Politician is talking about himself he is talking about Lincoln. Lincoln has had more Public men speak of his good qualities, and fewer copy any of them, than any man America ever produced. His famous address was only about two hundred words long. No Politician has ever been able to even copy his brevity. In fact that is the last one of his qualities that they would try to copy. Lincoln said more in those 200 words than has been said in the entire City of Washington in the last 10 years, and here is a quality that no historian or speaker has ever brought out before. At the completion of the Gettysburg speech, he wisely refused one of Grant's Cigars, and borrowed a sack of "Bull" Durham from an Ex Southern private, rolled his own, got on his horse and went back to Washington.

PARASITE MERCHANTS

An enlightened public can help by refusing to buy of non-advertisers. Merchants who advertise are the leading merchants of their towns and believe in the goods they offer and are certainly entitled to the trade. The growth of advertising has been due to the fact that the public can depend upon the goods offered, and the price on advertised goods is lower than imitation on account of the increased volume of sales caused by advertising. It pays to advertise.—McLean News.

much to tell, but am such a stupid somebody, I fear I will make many grammatical errors. Well, I had a very nice trip up here. I visited two of my boys in Kansas, then went to Independence, Mo., where I visited my son, Allen A. Dowers, and also Chas. McLelland and wife, Lillian, and her little son, Dewey. Lillian's oldest sister, Opal was there recovering from an operation and was just learning to walk again. On the Sunday that I was there my son and wife and my daughter came up from Lawrence, Kansas, to see me. So we had a general good visit. Chas. and

Lillian gave us a splendid good dinner, and I think they are a very happy pair.

I will try to tell you about our little old town that I live in. It is composed of old people mostly. That is the cause of the small population, being only about 300. Times are pretty dull here at present, but so peaceable that we don't need a police or constable. We have three churches and Sunday School, and I go every Sunday. I will give you good people an idea of the make-up of our little burg, Darlington. The three churches are Methodist, Baptist and Christian and they all seem to be co-workers. There is one large store that handles most everything, one hardware, one implement, one merchandise and grocery store, another grocery, two drug stores, three restaurants, two barber shops, small feed mill and two garages. We have a good locality for a hotel but have never rebuilt since the one we had was destroyed by fire. Railway accommodations are good, the Burlington a direct route from Chicago to San Francisco, also the Wabash. We have a new consolidated high school with 160 pupils enrolled, and four school wagons to bring the children in from the country. Corn is the largest crop here, but they raise some wheat, oats, alfalfa, and do some dairying. There is all kind of fruit, and it is the good sweet of Missouri fruit, and it is the land of milk and honey. You did not know I was such a booster, did you?

Just for curiosity, I will tell you how many widows we have. There are 10 widows on our street, 11 with myself, the youngest about 40, the oldest 95, also 25 more in other parts of the town. This is such a pleasant town, that is why they live so long I suppose.

I intended to spend the winter here but when I got here and found dad in such poor health, I did not know but that I might have to go back over the road sooner than I had planned, but he is feeling quite a bit better now. He and I just get along fine—just like two kids. The worse fault we find with each other is that he wants to get up in the morning at 6 and I have the habit of not wanting to get up until 7 or 8. I got that habit in Perryton, but I am away off up stairs and can't wake up. I sure did witness some very hot weather for ten days after I came and sure did wish for a little of your Texas breeze. Everything was so still and most suffocating. I noticed it more I suppose just coming from windy Texas, but I am coming back there just the same, if it is the Lord's will. I have met many of my old time friends.

Want to tell you that we have no doctor in our town, as the Government sent him to Mexico, so if you have a doctor to spare just send him over please. I was just thinking about that little electric bath man I think his remedy would suit these old people.

I think I had better draw this epistle to a close by saying hello to all of my good kind neighbors and friends and would be very glad to get a letter from some of you.

O, I forgot to tell you that when the Civil War Veterans post was started here there were 60 members and now there are only four living. We have three lodges, I. O. O. F., Masons and K. P.

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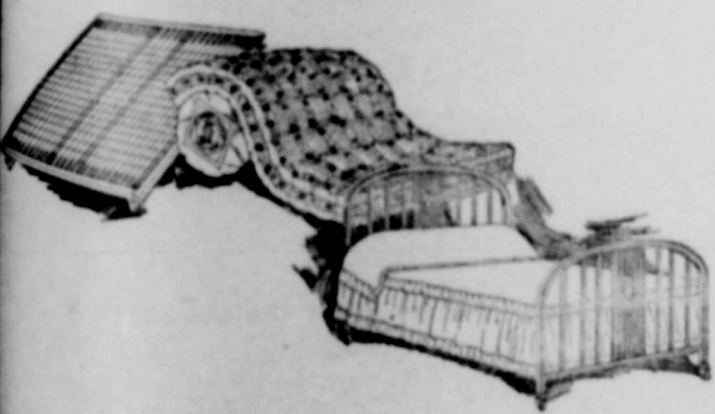

About Your Health

Things You Should Know



by John Joseph Gaines, M.D.

LIMIT THE INTAKE

Let's talk awhile about absorption. It acts invisibly and also independently of our will. It is the one process of nature that never ceases unless, mayhap, there is nothing to absorb. It is our friend, until we over-crowd it, in which instance it becomes an unrelenting enemy. Our absorbing glands and channels know no taste—no discrimination. They take up strychnine or other deadly poison with the same avidity with which they welcome taffy or gruel. Absorption takes no cognizance of results. It goes on after we are dead!

The safe-guard against absorption, is not to overburden it. Heavy meals are dangerous. Many people complain of being over-fat. The trouble is, that they are crowding their absorbents. Large quantities of fluids are taken with meals, rendering absorption quicker and faster than it should go on. It is possible to reduce flesh by taking no fluid of any kind with meals. No amount of physical contortion called "Physical Culture" can displace over-supply of readily absorbable food. It is wrong to tax the sweat-glands with work that the more gross eliminators should do. The man or woman who expects to sweat out "three squares a day" will be disappointed. Neither can their billows be removed by massage. Limit the intake and get plenty of walking exercise—thus stimulating elimination, and let the absorbents rest.

A six-o'clock dinner is too often absorbed—not digested. Food in the average alimentary canal undergoes fermentation, and even in some cases decomposition! The longer it remains there, the more advanced the process. What can be worse for mental torpor than the absorption of such poisonous matter?

FACULTY COMMENT

Some of the delayed textbooks are coming in now and are being issued to the proper grades for use. In due time all of these books will be here and we hope that our progress will not be hampered very much as a result of the delay.

The new Expression teacher, Miss Abramson of Canyon City, Texas, arrived the first of last week and has assumed her duties as teacher of Expression in the Perryton School. Miss Abramson has been a student at C. I. A., Denton, Texas, and comes to us well recommended for this work. Those interested in taking up Expression will do well to get lined up early as this will be more profitable for both student and teacher.

Mr. R. J. Cook, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, has been doing some work out in the country the last several days in connection with the wheat crop that is now being sown. Just at the present time, Mr. Cook's assistance is in rather strong demand as considerable inspection and reporting is needed for those who have taken advantage of the Santa Fe Railway Company's offer in seeding certain wheat lands.

Gradually more supplementary work is being assigned from the reading library. We have always believed that a library should be more useful than ornamental anyway. The only thing is that we do not want our books used like a boy in the first grade uses his—wear the pages out as he comes to them.

The first fire drill for the year was had one day last week. It was carried out in good shape and no confusion or congestion resulted. These drills will be had from time to time in order to keep the students and teachers in practice. The main thing for all to do is keep coolheaded and keep moving when marching out of the building.

To judge from what we have already seen of the situation, it looks as though Perryton should soon have a big school system. It is well located with reference to a good territory in all directions and draws students from the smaller schools round about after they have finished the first year or two of high school work. Its drawing power is already apparent and will no doubt increase rapidly as the school is built up from year to year.

The teachers of the Perryton School were given a reception in the basement of the Methodist Church last Friday evening by the Women's Missionary Society of that church. It was a very enjoyable affair in every way and one of the best get-together meetings we have had this year. Such a contact with patrons gives the teachers a better chance to get their view points and attitudes on school matters. The refreshments were thoroughly enjoyed and came as the climax to the warm reception tendered by these good ladies. We feel better for having attended this rich social feast.

The news staff for reporting the school news is being selected this week and all will be ready to take up their new duties next week. We hope to have a good wide-awake staff and one that will stay on job when needed for work. This practice will be good training for those who are selected as it will serve to supplement their English work at times. The art of dressing an article up for publication is a worth while accomplishment that any high school boy or girl should aspire to.

Incidentally, we note that a few more drinking fountains on the school ground would greatly facilitate the matter of quenching thirst as the students come in from recesses and noon. To see the scramble at the fountains at such times reminds one of the scrambling, wedging and shuffling around a pig trough when there are more pigs than drink. Two more fountains at the north and south entrances, respectively, would relieve the situation very materially.

The report cards for the first month went out this week and the parents will have an opportunity to see what the teachers' judgement is on the child's work. It is always much harder to know just what grade the child should have on his first month's work as teachers cannot get as good a line on him during a short time as over a longer stretch of time. When it is remembered that the school has been running only three weeks, it is only just to both teacher and pupil to say that the grades at this time represent a reasonable estimate of the quality of work which has been done. As time goes on the grades will necessarily be more accurate and indicative of the work being done.

In an eighth grade history test last week, various and sundry answers were received to some of the questions propounded. For example, in answer to the question: "What does the word Cuneiform mean?" one girl defined it as follows: "Cuneiform is the stuff or medicine that they embalm the people with. It was the medicine they put on them." The real meaning of the words is, that it refers to a system of writing used by the Babylonians. One boy in telling what the Romans passed on to the rest of the world answered: "The Romans pass they to have only one God to worship by and not to worship any but that certain one that was what they passed." In another instance where the class was asked to "Give a good account of the Hebrews and their Kingdom," one girl tells it to us in part thus: "As soon as Moses left them in the desert they went back to worshipping many gods like they had been use to before they meet Mooses." Again one boy defines "Cuneiform" as Providence.

The above are here inserted for the amusement of those who care to read it and also for those who may happen to think school teachers have nothing to do but merely "hear the recitations" in school.

It is very likely that a few demonstrations will have to be made within the next few days. A few students have been found who are not yet ready for the grades they are now in and it is only justice to the students themselves and the prestige of the school that each student be placed where he can do his best work. The standards of the school must be kept up if grades and promotion are to mean anything. Hence it is the duty of all teachers to put the child where she properly belongs.

HIGH SCHOOL

We are to have a school orchestra and a school chorus this year and these organizations will add much to the life of the school and community on special occasions during the school term. Mrs. Jas. W. Wilson will have charge of the chorus and they will meet for practice Monday and Thursday of each week in the H. S. Auditorium at 4:00 P. M.

Mr. Hyde has consented to help the members of the orchestra on Tuesday and Friday of each week at 4:00 P. M., and these meetings will also be in the auditorium.

We express our appreciation of the services of Mrs. Wilson and Mr. Hyde and assure them of our hearty cooperation in their respective undertakings. We also would encourage the pupils to co-operate with these people and remember that they are giving their instruction gratis.

On the 23 of September the 8B section of the Freshman class, with Miss Hutchinson acting as chairman, elected officers as follows: Pres., Bessie Littleton, Vice President, Odessa Trolinger, Sec. and Treas. Exie Lee Linville. The committee appointed to choose colors, flower and motto were Lorene Coffee, Bernice Winfrey, Harry Brown, William Wilson and Audrey Beever. A class meeting was held on October 2 for the purpose of adopting motto, colors, and flower. Those decided on were: motto—"Labor conquers all things"; colors—silver and old rose; flower—pink carnation.

We have a game with Pampa one week from next Saturday and expect some good stiff opposition as Pampa is reputed to have one of the best teams in this section of the country. However, we hope to let them know that we are in the running and give them a run for their money by the time the game is over.

The second month of school has started off under very favorable cir-

cumstances and things are more favorable for constant progress during the previous month, which had only three weeks as the first week was institute week for the teachers. Every one now seems to be on his bearings better and is headed in the right direction with work and progress. The "new" has worn somewhat and things are beginning to shape up better all around.

FIRE FACTS

The property fire loss in Texas 1924, as shown by reports of the admitted stock fire insurance companies operating in Texas, was \$17,221,971.88. Add to this, fire insurance losses paid by mutual and reciprocal insurance companies and losses paid by non-admitted companies and will amount to in excess of two million dollars. There was another five million dollars in losses, possibly more, not covered by insurance. The 1924 losses in Texas is fair annual average for the last few years. Individual citizens are directly responsible for 70 per cent of the burning. It is the result of our carelessness, indifference, instead of careful, indifferent instead of interested, regarding common fire habits.

The Thirty-ninth Legislature, Texas appropriated \$37,342,042.18 to take care of the State's obligation for the two current fiscal years, ending September 1, 1925 and August 31, 1927. During this time, the future by the past, will burn enough property to pay the bill, and mind you, 70 per cent of the losses will be easily preventable.
