

Seven Hurt In Belton Station Train Wreck

BELTON, May 30. (AP)—At least seven passengers and crewmen were injured early this morning when Santa Fe Train 75 en route to California crashed into the engine of an east-bound passenger train standing in front of the Belton railroad station.

Train 75, for an undetermined reason, failed to take a siding.

The drive wheels of both engines were derailed. Some of the injured were taken to the Santa Fe Hospital at Temple, Tex. The passenger coaches were moved by supply engines from 5 to 6 a. m. (CST) today and crews this morning were working to remove the damaged engines.

Flags Are Dipped In Big Spring For War Dead

Flags were to be back at full staff today after being dipped during the morning in traditional observance of Memorial Day.

Late in the afternoon, a plane will fly low over the city cemetery and 2,000 poppies will be spilled out as a tribute to the dead. This highlight of the day's observance is being arranged by the American Legion auxiliary.

State and federal agencies closed doors for the day and a few private concerns halted activities. Memorial Day, however, is not on the community calendar as a holiday observance.

According to flag etiquette, colors fly at half mast during half the day in tribute to those who gave their lives for their country. They are hoisted to full staff in the afternoon as a symbol of faith and hope.

Fighting Men Of US Honored

The leaders and the plain people of other nations joined Americans today in their annual Memorial Day tribute to America's soldier dead.

As flowers were placed and prayers said at the graves of those who died in the last war, speakers cautioned that America must not become weak through disarmament, that the peace must be won and kept.

In Washington President Truman, back from the bedside of his ailing 94-year-old mother, spent the day quietly "catching up on his work." His wreath in tribute to the Unknown Soldier was laid on the Arlington National Cemetery tomb by a White House aide.

In European nations the leaders and ordinary citizens joined in the tributes to Americans still buried in the graves near where they fell in World War Two. Florists worked overtime delivering flowers from the United States to graves in France, Great Britain, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, Italy, Sweden and Switzerland.

There were parades, speeches and the soft notes of bugles—all carrying the tenor of rededication to the task of making certain the sacrifices of the battlefields were not in vain.

V-2 Rocket Hits Juarez Cemetery

EL PASO, May 30. (AP)—Lieut. Col. Harold R. Turner, commanding officer at the White Sands, New Mexico, proving grounds, today said "an error in judgment" on the part of an unnamed civilian technician caused a German V-2 rocket to take off in a wild flight that ended just outside Juarez, Mexico, cemetery last night.

"The technician failed to push a button that would have shut off the rocket fuel supply, thereby causing it to fall within the target range," Col. Turner stated.

"The technician misjudged the course of the rocket," he added. "It appeared to him that the rocket went almost straight up, and would fall within a range of 25 miles. It carried a reduced load of fuel—1400 gallons of alcohol and liquid oxygen—and would have gone perhaps 50 miles farther if it had been fully loaded."

Army ordnance officials and civilian technicians today were investigating the wild flight of the rocket.

The four and one-half ton missile was fired at the White Sands proving grounds near Las Cruces, New Mexico, at 7:30 p. m. yesterday.

Five minutes later, after soaring over El Paso at a speed of 12 miles a minute, it plummeted into a hill a mile and a half south of the Tepeyac Cemetery in Juarez, and three and one-half miles from the heart of the Mexican border city.

Solon Says Veto Of Income Tax Bill Would Stick

Speculate Truman May Turn Down Reduction Measure

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—Senator George (D-Ga.), a leading democratic tax authority, predicted today that if President Truman vetoes the income tax reduction bill, the Senate will uphold his action.

George, who voted for the bill "reluctantly," told reporters he will not vote to override the President if a veto comes.

The President returned to Washington late yesterday, a few hours after Senate House conferees agreed on final terms of the legislation, but there was no word from the White House as to Mr. Truman's intentions toward the bill. He has said several times in the past few months that this is not the time to lower taxes.

Both houses are set to ratify on Monday the agreement reached by the conferees in less than two hours yesterday. The President has 10 days from the time the bill reaches him to approve or veto it. Meanwhile, the Internal Revenue Bureau rushed to the printer—just in case—the new tax withholding tables to be used if the bill becomes law.

Officials stressed that they have no idea, one way or the other, but are getting ready because there will be little time to meet the July 1 deadline for getting the new tax reductions into effect if the measure goes through.

The tables would guide employers in adjusting the amount of tax deductions from pay checks.

The 52 to 34 vote by which the bill passed the Senate Wednesday virtually ruled out any possibility that advocates of the tax cut could assemble the two-thirds vote which would be needed in each house to override a veto.

The cuts would range from 3.25 to 15 per cent off present taxes for this year, and from 10.5 per cent to 30 per cent for 1948 and succeeding years.

Labor Bill Veto Seen By Hatch

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—Senator Hatch (D-NM), said today he believes President Truman will veto the labor bill slated to arrive at the White House next week.

And Senator Ball (R-Minn.), said in a separate interview that if Mr. Truman does veto the measure designed to halt many union practices and curb strikes, "there is a very good chance" Congress will override the chief executive.

A two-thirds majority in both the House and Senate is required to set aside a presidential dissent.

Hatch is a personal friend of Mr. Truman, but he said he has no information about what the President plans to do about the bill as it was approved yesterday by House-Senate conferees who reconciled differences between separate measures.

"I just think myself that the bill will be vetoed," Hatch said. He added that the measure finally agreed upon "appears to be pretty much the same" as the one the Senate passed, for which he voted.

Paraguayan Civil War Nears End

BUENOS AIRES, May 30. (AP)—

The 12-week-old Paraguayan civil war appeared to be nearing an end today as jubilant government communists claimed an interrupted string of victories which took Loyalist troops to within five miles of Concepcion, the Rebel capital.

The latest communique from the government of President Higinio Moronino in Asuncion said Loyalist forces had crossed the final water barrier before Concepcion, the fall of which probably will mark the end of the rebellion.

There still is a lot of country behind the rebels and in their control but it is largely uninhabited and completely devoid of military resources.

The insurgents, including about a third of Paraguay's army of 10,000 men, have sustained themselves since March 7 in the landlocked swamps around the northern city of Concepcion. They had the general sympathy of the people of surrounding countries but the governments of those countries observed the strictest neutrality.

Barge Explosion Rocks London

LONDON, May 30. (AP)—A barge blew up on the Thames river today in a series of terrific explosions that shattered windows and spread smoke and concussion over a wide area of industrial east London.

A workman on a nearby wharf said "there were five or six men working in the hold and they escaped by the skin of their teeth. One of two of them suffered from slight shock."

First reports said two barges were involved but an official of the Lea Haulage company later said there was only one. The craft, which was moored at a lea wharf, sank.

Ft. Worth Trippers Arrive Here Today

Big Spring was to be host this afternoon for approximately 118 Fort Worth business men who were to arrive at 2:15 p. m. by special train on a trade development tour.

Plans for welcoming ceremonies were mapped in advance by the local chamber of commerce, with the goodwill and public relations departments jointly arranging details.

One special committee, headed by Elmo Wasson, chairman of the local chamber's goodwill department, was to board the special train in Stanton and accompany the visitors to the city. A larger delegation of local business men, city and chamber of commerce officials were to meet that train here at the T&P station.

K. H. McGibbon was to be in charge of the welcoming ceremonies.

Shorty Cantlon Fatally Hurt As Auto Overturns

Winner Trails Holland Until The Last Lap

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 30. (AP)—Mauri Rose of Chicago won his second Memorial Day 500-mile automobile race today, beating his teammate, Bill Holland, of Bridgeport, Conn., by a half lap.

Rose, co-winner with Floyd Davis in the 1942 race, trailed Holland by only a few seconds through most of the race and moved into the lead at the 483 mile mark on a signal from the pit crew.

Ted Horn, Paterson, N. J., continued his amazing money-making career by placing third. In eight straight races he never has been worse than fourth.

Both Rose and Holland drove brand new Blue Crown Spark Plug Specials, four cylinder jobs with Meyer-Drake engines. The cars were owned by Lou Moore of Ventura, Calif.

Rose's time was 4:17:52.17, an average of 116.338 miles per hour. It was the second-fastest race in Speedway history, beaten only by Floyd Roberts' 117.2 average in 1938.

William (Shorty) Cantlon, 43, was injured fatally when his car skidded on the southwest turn and crashed into the retaining wall in full view of thousands of spectators occupying the grand stands in that section.

Cantlon was competing in his twelfth 500 mile race. He suffered a crushed chest, a broken leg and other internal injuries. He was picked up and rushed to the field hospital where he died.

Cantlon, unmarried, was an Indianapolis automobile dealer. He was in his fortieth lap at the time of the crash.

General Strike In Uruguay Threatened

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, May 30. (AP)—President Tomas Berreta invoked a special cabinet meeting today to discuss the threat of a general strike, called for midnight by local labor unions in sympathy with striking employees of the British-owned Central Uruguayan railroad.

The walk-out has been called to protest the arrest of 30 leaders of the rail workers' union, who were detained on warrants sworn out by the railroad, charging them with violating a law which forbids public service employees to quit their jobs.

It was Jester's third veto of the session.

Member Of Chetniks Gets Death Sentence

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, May 30. (AP)—A Belgrade military court sentenced to death today a member of an illegal Chetnik group which was accused of planning "forever" to overthrow the present government with the help of Yugoslav traitors in foreign lands, among whom was Constantin Fotich, a former Yugoslav ambassador to Washington.

US-Russia Head For Atomic Showdown

LAKE SUCCESS, May 30. (AP)—The United States and Russia headed today toward a showdown on the question of the veto in atomic control.

The controversial issue is whether all functions in the atomic field will be subject to the major-power veto of the United Nations Security Council.

The pattern for the fight was set yesterday when Russia gained a minor decision in the U.N. Atomic Energy Commission.

Ship With Smuggled Rifles Is Halted

ISTANBUL, Turkey, May 30. (AP)—The motorship Ataman was halted in the Bosphorus yesterday on a run from Romania to Haifa, and the newspaper Memleket said a cargo of smuggled rifles destined for Palestine underground fighters was discovered. The captain was arrested.

INSISTS HE KEEP DOGCATCHER JOB

CORPUS CHRISTI, May 30. (AP)—Capt. Roy Lay of the Corpus Christi Police Department, is a man who likes his job. He accepted promotion to assistant chief of police "on condition that I can keep my job as dogcatcher."

Lay has been in charge of the police pound, jail and court bailiffs since 1944.

US Faces Tough Job Retaining Greenland Base

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—

Denmark has asked that negotiations be started "at the earliest possible date" looking to termination of the 1941 agreement under which the United States established wartime bases on Greenland.

The Danish note was delivered May 21 to the state department. Secretary Marshall has replied expressing willingness of the United States to negotiate some new agreement on Greenland which would protect vital American defense interests on that strategic island.

Diplomatic authorities predicted Marshall would have a difficult and delicate task in negotiating for a new defense agreement.

While Marshall himself carefully avoided stating that the objective of the approaching negotiations with Denmark will be to retain American military bases on the island, other officials made it clear privately that the United States would like to have continued in peacetime at least the right to such establishments.

Twice before the United States has sought to maintain bases on Atlantic islands—Iceland and Azores—and twice it has failed to gain its full objective.

Greenland is regarded as possibly more important than the other two because it is closer to home. A combination of nationalism and communist agitation is regarded as the main difficulty in the case of the huge island off the shores of North America.

Double Taxation Measure Vetoed

AUSTIN, May 30. (AP)—A bill providing for partition of community property to escape "double taxation" under federal inheritance tax laws has been vetoed by Gov. Beauford H. Jester because he felt a recent supreme court decision made it unconstitutional.

It was Jester's third veto of the session.

In the veto message to the legislature, he said the state court decision had made especially important the submission of a proposed constitutional amendment providing that a husband and wife may in writing partition between themselves all or any part of their community property.

39 Die As Airliner Crashes In Flames

NEW YORK, May 30. (AP)—A four-engined United Airliner DC-4 plane failed to gain altitude on a takeoff from La Guardia Field last night during a heavy thunderstorm and crashed in flames, killing 39 of the 48 people aboard in the nation's worst commercial airplane disaster.

Thirty-eight people were burned to death at the crash site. Ten were taken to hospitals. One of these, a young man en route to Cleveland for his wedding, died early today.

Observers at the field, some of them relatives of the victims, said the plane cleared the runway and started climbing, then hurtled into marshy ground beyond Grand Central Parkway and burst into flames that shot 50 feet or more into the air. Exactly how high the plane got was not known.

One of the dazed survivors was Capt. Benton R. (Lucky) Baldwin, the pilot, when questioned by Victor Levin, Queens County assistant district attorney, the pilot told him he "tried to get it off the ground but nothing happened."

The 39 bodies were taken to Queens General Hospital where Dr. Thomas A. Gonzales, the city's chief medical examiner, began efforts to identify them.

John A. Herlihy, vice president in charge of operations for United Airlines, and several aides questioned the pilot at the hospital but declined to make any statement immediately.

The Tachikawa airbase notified Far East Airforce headquarters that the plane carried eight officers, 28 enlisted men and four civilians. The Army originally reported 41 aboard the courier plane when it crashed last night as it approached Tachikawa for a landing.

First Cavalry Division headquarters said a patrol led by Maj. William Evans Smith of Ridgefield, N.J., would leave at dawn to begin the task of evacuating the bodies.

The plane, inbound from Korea, apparently exploded, crashing at a point five miles northeast of Matsudo and five miles northwest of Hadano, about 20 miles northwest of Fujiyama.

Vessels Carrying Immigrants Sighted

JERUSALEM, May 30. (AP)—Jewish sources said today the Royal Air Force had sighted a vessel believed to be the "Yehuda Halevi," carrying an estimated 450 Jewish immigrants, off the coast of Palestine.

These sources said British Naval units were proceeding to intercept the ship.

JUNGLE ISOLATES SOLDIERS—

GUATEMALA, Guatemala, May 30. (AP)—Authorities announced that the last of the 15 U.S. soldiers who parachuted from a burning Flying Fortress still were held by the fastnesses of a Nicaraguan jungle.

Supplies have been dropped and large contingents were hacking their way toward the men. Seven of their companions previously had been found and taken to Managua, Nicaragua.

The bomber, which caught fire at 14,000 feet, has not been located, so dense is the jungle growth. The men dropped in a 50-square-mile area through tropical darkness, many of them landing 10 miles from the nearest companion.

Authorities said one soldier refused to jump and had to be pushed from the plane.

Of those in the jungle, about midway between Managua and Puerto Cabezas, apparently only two had made contact with each other.

Twenty search planes dispatched from the Panama Canal Zone and other U.S. bases located the men. Some had spread out their parachutes on trees and jungle huts to attract attention and to provide living quarters.

Helicopters have been unsuccessful in picking up the men because there are no landing spots and the thickness of the jungle disturbs the air cushion under the blades.

One of the stranded men, apparently suffering from shock, has paid no attention to the search planes which have endeavored to attract his attention. He was reported stumbling blindly in circles. Part of his uniform had been discarded.

County Welfare Groups Formally Organize Social Service Exchange

Formal organization of the Social Service Exchange was accomplished Thursday afternoon at a meeting of welfare agencies at the city-county welfare office.

Capt. Olvy Sheppard, Salvation Army, was selected as chairman of the exchange, and Mary Cantrell, city-county welfare office, as secretary.

Fundamentally, the exchange is to serve as a clearing office for confidential information between the various welfare agencies to eliminate duplications of effort, time and money as well as to make work more effective.

A backlog of records gives the exchange a foundation of reports upon which to function and through a system of daily reports from the various agencies, the information will be kept current.

Any participating agency may, at any time, contact the exchange for records on any particular case. Individuals may obtain information only through one of the agencies.

Another plan of the exchange is to prepare a booklet embracing

ing the scope of service by various agencies so that there will be a minimum of confusion in directing applicants for aid to the proper agency.

After having been closed during the war years, the West Texas (Howard County) Memorial Museum is to be reopened Sunday.

Members of the Business & Professional Women's club, taking on the operation of the museum on a limited basis as a club project, will staff the building in the city park from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday. Thereafter, it is planned to have it open on Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

Working with the city, the B. & P.W. has had the museum cleaned after its long idleness. Its collection of Indian and pioneer artifacts, together with several striking examples of the work of I. W. Taylor, noted Western artist who made Big Spring his home, will be on display.

The museum is approximately 15 years old this year. It was founded by the late Mrs. Mary Bumpass, then a social science teacher at Big Spring high school, as the outgrowth of a current events class project. Until she retired from teaching here a short time before her death, Mrs. Bumpass was the guiding inspiration behind the museum.

Attorney General Gives Arlington Cemetery Talk

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—Attorney General Clark said today the "great values" of the American way of life "can be maintained only by constant struggle."

"The fight for democracy is a continuous one," he said in an address prepared for the annual Memorial Day exercises at Arlington cemetery. "Never have its defenders been able to rest from a completed task."

"There is still a clash of ideologies in the world today. However it may be camouflaged, we cannot hide the fact."

"When democracy, as we know and live it, is challenged, when thought is rigidly channeled, when news is suppressed, when misrepresentation supersedes truth, when individual liberty is destroyed, then aggression, despotism and slavery follow in their train."

"We cannot be indifferent to the tragic problems facing the world today. That means indifference to the future of America and our own posterity."

Midland Field Goes To WAA

MIDLAND, May 30.—The Midland Army Air Field was officially transferred to custody of the War Assets Administration Thursday.

The US Engineers, who have been conducting an inventory of properties at the field for the past few days, signed for the field Thursday morning, and one hour later transferred all properties to the War Assets Administration. Negotiations between the City of Midland and the WAA are expected to be completed Monday, at which time the municipality is scheduled to be granted custody of the field and buildings.

Estimated 20 Candidates In Running For House Speaker

AUSTIN, May 30. (AP)—"Everybody's running for Speaker except me."

That's a routine wisecrack in the House of Representatives. But it describes rather accurately the present muddled picture with regard to who will be swinging the gavel at the Speaker's desk two years hence.

Estimates on the number of candidates run as high as 20.

Five men appear as top contenders at the present moment, and two of these are not actively seeking the office.

The definitely recognized candidates:

Reps. Otis Lock of Lufkin, Durwood Manford of Smiley, Max Smith of San Marcos, Charles South of Coleman, and Doyle Willis of Fort Worth.

Lock and South are not campaigning for the speakership.

Friends of the two men seek to draft them into the race.

Lock, 36, is serving his fifth full term since coming to the legislature to fill out the unexpired term of his predecessor.

He has served as chairman of the highways and roads committee this session. He is considered a strong administration man. He is a veteran, served in the 63rd Infantry division.

Manford, 30, is now in his fourth term of office. He is chairman of the labor committee. He is an attorney and rancher.

Smith, 45, is in his second term of office. He is a cotton ginners and stock farmer, now serving as president of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association and a director of the national group. He volunteered in the second World War and served as an enlisted man in Air Corps supply.

South, 54, served four terms as a representative in Congress before being defeated by O. C. Fisher of San Angelo in 1942. He has been a county school superintendent, county judge and district attorney. He is a member of a Coleman law firm.

Willis, 38, is a freshman legislator. He is an attorney and a director of the Tarrant County Bar Association. He served as an administrative officer in the Air Corps in the Pacific.

Lock, should he commit himself to run, will face admitted opposition from the Liberal House faction

and from a number of West Texas representatives who fought bitterly against the Lock-sponsored constitutional amendment to finance a building program for state colleges. They felt that the plan hurt; rather than helped, Texas Tech.

Manford's backers claim he is leading the race with a great number of votes already pledged to his candidacy. Manford apparently is the nearest approach to a middle-of-the-road candidate.

Smith may be forced to step aside if Lock enters the race. Both are administration men. Smith reportedly has held the support of the Dallas delegation thus far.

South is a popular dark horse. Some legislators say he is "backing into the Speakership without even trying."

Willis made an early bid for the office, has been the most openly active candidate in the group.

The speakership carries no increase in salary over that of other representatives.

But it is more than a position of prestige.

The Speaker appoints all House committee members, and may thereby wield considerable influence over the fate of proposed legislation. To a lesser degree he is also able to control the consideration of bills which reach the House calendar.

The Speaker has frequently proved a stepping stone to higher office.

Veteran Students To Get Part Pay For Part Of May

DALLAS, May 30. (AP)—Veterans who terminated or interrupted their schooling during May are not entitled to a full month's subsistence for that period, the Dallas branch office of the Veterans Administration announced today.

Veteran students in this category who receive checks tomorrow for a full month should not cash them. The VA said, but should return them to the regional office having jurisdiction with a letter reporting the date training was stopped.

The VA explained that some schools who are ending their spring terms during May did not send in the necessary reports early enough to permit adjustment of subsistence rolls for this month. The office said that after the VA has received notice of the time veterans discontinued schooling during May, adjustments will be made.

Child Rejects Mother's Claim

SEATTLE, Wash., May 30. (AP)—Judge Donald McDonald has dismissed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus which would have given custody of Adria Shirley Scott, 12, to her mother, Mrs. Hazel Hornsby Scott, Fallurrias, Texas, bookkeeper.

"This is tragic," Judge McDonald said. "But the child hardly knows her mother and made clear that she does not want to go with her." The child indicated she wished to remain in her father's custody.

The judge stated that the modification of a divorce decree which the mother obtained in Fresno county in 1942, giving her custody of the child was not obtained "through due process of law," since Scott was not notified. Mrs. Scott claimed she was unable to locate her former husband until last week.

Following the court's decision, Mrs. Scott's attorney handed Scott's lawyer a summons on an action asking payment of \$2,400 support money.

DOUBLE TAKE FOR FISH PRIZE

BELVIDERE, Ill., May 29. (AP)—Two 13-year-old boys hooked a 10-inch bullhead simultaneously while fishing from opposite sides of the city park millrace during a fishing contest.

The boys Clarence Countryman and Clark Wyde, yanked their poles and the luckless fish dangled in the air. But sponsors of the contest awarded the lads duplicate prizes. Wyde won the fish by a coin flip—but he sold it to a sportsman who wanted it for his trophy den.

VFW Official Says Good Minds Befuddled By Red Propaganda

WASHINGTON, May 30. (AP)—Louis E. Starr, National Commander of the VFW, declared today Communism offers a "real danger" in the United States because of "well-meaning people with good minds or in high places whose thoughts have been befuddled by subtle Communist propaganda."

The Veterans of Foreign Wars chief said they include "some who are now in high seats of government, and some who were in responsible positions and still influence public opinion because of their prestige," he added.

"This classification might also apply to a past occupant of the vice-presidential chair," Starr mentioned no names in his Memorial Day speech prepared for (ABC) broadcast at 3:15 p.m. EST.

Urging adoption of universal training, which he contended is opposed mainly by Communists, the VFW official said many of the 350,000 who died abroad in World War II had to be "sent into

battle unprepared, hardly knowing how to defend themselves."

"Had they been schooled in at least the fundamental problems of self defense, today's figure of overseas dead would be much smaller," he asserted.

Starr said that "viewing the Red menace on the international scene" it is "easy to understand, and needs no explanation on my part, why the Communists are opposed to military preparedness in the United States."

He said there are "not too many" card-holding members of the Communist Party in the United States, but that "there were very few avowed Bolsheviks when the Czarist regime was overthrown in Russia."

Convicted Slayer Denied New Trial

BEAUMONT, May 30. (AP)—Criminal Court Judge Owen M. Lord yesterday overruled a motion for a new trial for Riley B. McCaine of Houston, convicted May 16 of murdering Miss Elvora Collins, Houston clerical worker, in Houston Sept. 30, 1945.

After Judge Lord's ruling defense attorneys served notice they would appeal McCaine's conviction to the criminal court of appeals in Austin. A jury recommended the death sentence for McCaine.

Defense attorneys based their motion on a claim that new evidence had been found and described it as authenticated copies of a District of Columbia hearing in March, 1944, by the commission of mental health which found McCaine "not to be sane."

Six vacation Bible schools to get underway early this month and special summer camps for young people have been announced as part of a program among local churches to keep regular Sunday school attendance during the warm months on a par with the average.

The Army vacation Bible school will feature religious education films in technicolor. About 275 are expected to enroll.

Four young people have been delegated from the First Methodist church to attend special courses in religion at a Methodist Young People's assembly in McMurray college, Abilene. Those enrolled in the instruction, which opened Friday night, are Barbara Douglas, Joyce Howard, Richard Deats and Mary Beth Morgan.

East 4th Baptist church reports that a recent revival resulted in some 50 additions to the Sunday school; revival conducted at the Airport Baptist church enrolled about 40. Other churches reporting gains in enrollment in the past month are Westside Baptist, 18; Lutheran, 8; First Baptist, 18; Salvation Army, 19. Judah's Unsteady Course

HIGHLIGHTS ON THE SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By NEWMAN CAMPBELL

(The International Uniform Lesson on the above topic for June 1 is II Kings 18-29, II Chronicles 29, the Memory Verse being Psalm 122:1, "I was glad when they said unto me, Let us go unto the house of Jehovah.")

"HEZEKIAH began to reign when he was five, and twenty years old, and he reigned nine and twenty years in Jerusalem." His first act, "in the first year of his reign, in the first month," was to open the doors of the house of the Lord and repair them.

Then he brought in the priests and the Levites and told them to sanctify themselves and to thoroughly cleanse the temple. "For," he said, "our fathers have trespassed, and done that which was evil in the eyes of the Lord our God, and have forsaken Him, and have turned away their faces from the habitation of the Lord, and turned their backs."

The wrath of the Lord was upon the people, Hezekiah said, and he reminded them that many had fallen by the sword, "and our sons and our daughters and our wives are in captivity for this."

The temple was cleansed thoroughly, and on the first day of the month the priests and Levites sanctified themselves, and on the eighth day of the month they came to the porch of the Lord. When all was ready the king rose, gathered the rulers of the city, and went up to the house of the Lord.

The sacrifices were killed and offered, and the king "set the Levites in the house of the Lord with cymbals, with psalteries, and with harps, according to the commandments of David. And the Levites stood with the instruments of David, and the priests with trumpets." After the burnt offerings were made, "the king and all that were present, with him bowed themselves, and worshipped."

Hezekiah also "removed the high places, and brake the images, and cut down the groves, and brake in pieces the brazen serpent that Moses had made: for unto those days the children of Israel did burn incense to it."

Also Hezekiah "rebuilt against the king of Assyria, and served him not. He smote the Philistines, even unto Gaza, and the borders thereof, from the tower of the watchmen to the fenced city."

Hezekiah nevertheless had one period of backsliding. In the fourteenth year of his reign the king of Assyria again attacked, and Hezekiah paid tribute to him and gave him "all the silver that was found in the house of the Lord, and in the treasures of the king's house; also he cut off the gold from the doors of the temple of the Lord, and from the pillars which Hezekiah, king of Judah, had overlaid, and gave it to the king of Assyria."

Then the king of Assyria sent his messenger; Rabshakeh, to the

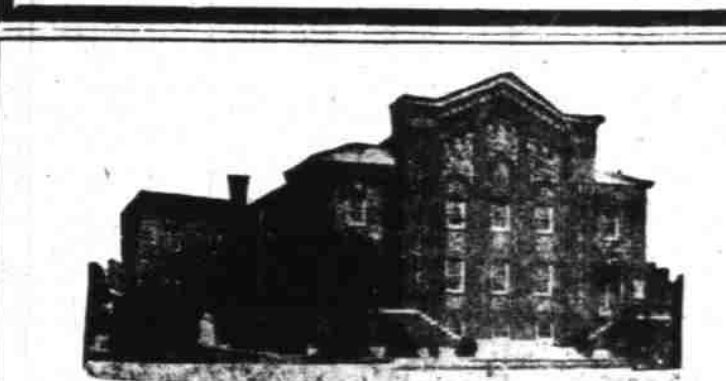

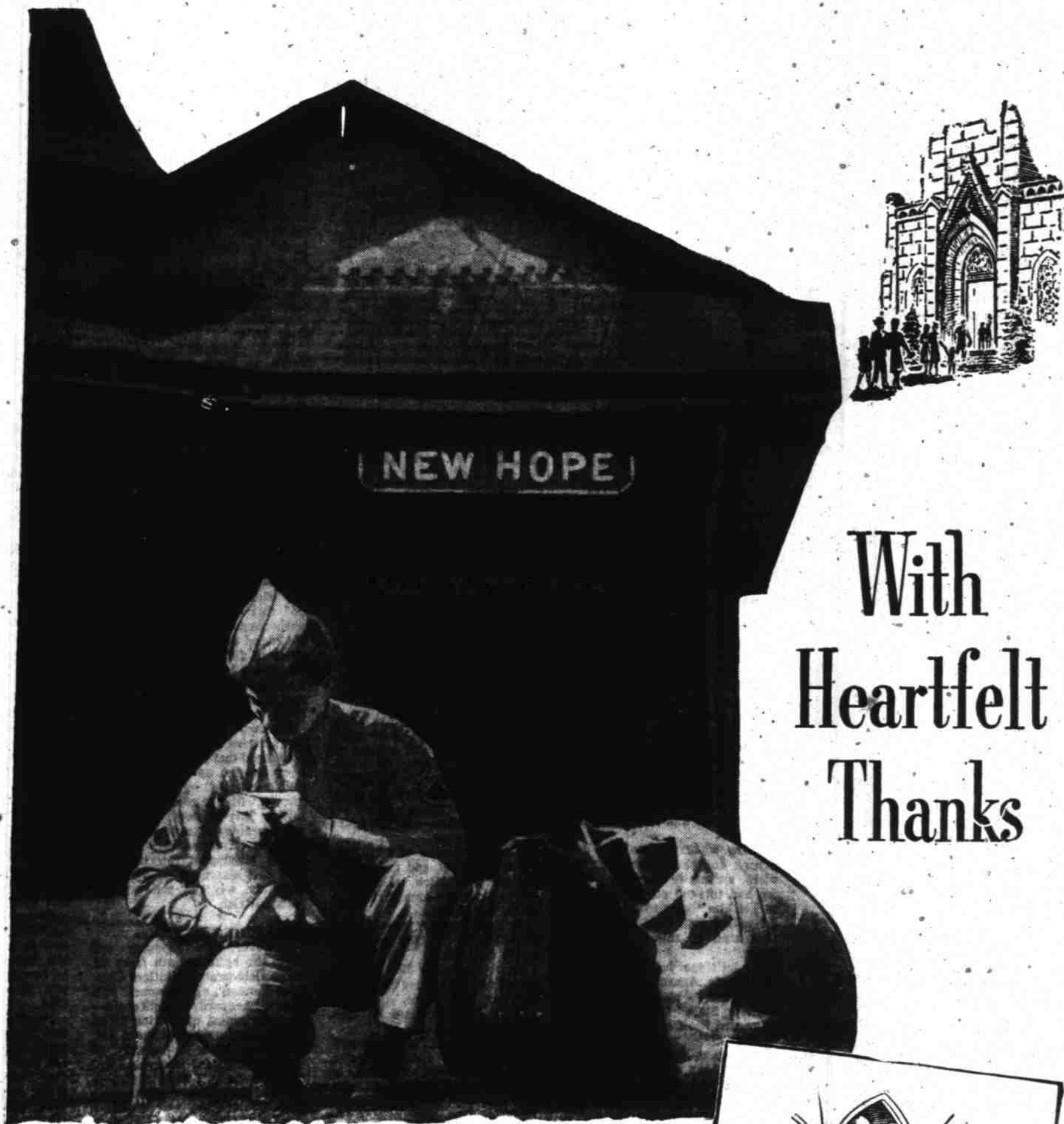

Answering With A Modern Service

Among the rail dynasty, Bob Young, a transplanted Texan who speaks of the "dambankers" with the same fluency that some old line Southerners refer to Yankees, is regarded as an impetuous and obnoxious character. For one reason, he has entered the field not by the traditional methods and contrary to some of the accepted practices of investment bankers. But more than that, he has lampooned the archaic equipment of many carriers, has ignored demands by some financial powers, and generally has been very untraditional.

His latest advertisement certainly will not be cheered by the bank-rail empire. In full page ads appearing in many metropolitan newspapers and in magazines, his line, The Chesapeake & Ohio, raises the question in circus type: "Why Railroads Can't Afford NOT to Modernize!" The galling part is that he has pictured a stodgy capitalist sitting amidst old rolling stock, enmeshed in cobwebs.

He goes on to say that his lines have ordered the latest types of equipment available and that if others had done likewise, there would be 21,000 passenger cars on order instead of a mere 3,000.

He cites a specific case in point. Last August one of the C&O lines, the Pere Marquette, installed ultra-modern trains

on its run between Detroit and Grand Rapids. Since they have been in operation, the new trains have carried 86 per cent more passengers than the old trains carried over the same route during the same period of the previous year — when war emergency had swollen traffic demands.

In less than four years, at the present rate, the increase in passenger receipts will equal the total cost of the trains, he estimates. Continuing, Young says that even bankrupt lines can borrow needed money at two per cent interest. Yet only 100 new passenger cars have been ordered this year.

This rail "interloper" may be unconventional, but so far as the travelling public is concerned, he is talking sense. It is a fact that rail carriers are subjected to discriminatory competition (railroads had their inning at this, too), but the only way to win out in a competitive field is to offer a better service at a reasonable price. And that service includes a better degree of public relations by employees than has heretofore exhibited by some old-line servants. Our own carrier is making some significant steps in both directions and we hope that it is but a forerunner of things to come.

Tired Of Hillbilly Talk

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Arkansas—yep, you still pronounce it "Arkansaw"—is just plain getting country-tired of being kidded as a hillbilly state.

The folks down this way have taken a lot of kidding about living on a barren ridge land populated by fies-bitten hound dogs, tick-ridden mules, razorback hogs and rangy moonshine-swalling mountaineers who subsist on hominy grits and salt pork and marry off their barefoot daughters at the age of seven years.

But the long-tolerance of Arkansas is wearing thin, and their home state pride is high. They think somebody ought to bring the radio comedians and the Joe Miller joke books up to Arkansas.

Deaths from pellagra dropped from 26.3 per 100,000 population in 1930 to 2.9 in 1944. A US census report showed Arkansas had the fewest number of deaths per thousand population of any state in the union. It's healthy.

Tourists spend \$70,000,000 a year or more in Arkansas—and they don't come to watch the mountaineers scratch themselves. Some 500,000 alone come to Hot Springs to take out the rheumatism they got in another climate.

A few other things Arkansans are proud of about their state: It produces 95 per cent of all the domestic bauxite or aluminum ore processed in the states. It has a reserve of 1,512,000 tons of coal, and natural gas and oil production is booming. Power rates are among the lowest in the nation.

Arkansas is breaking away from the old ruinous "one crop" system. Cotton is still the main income producer — Arkansas stands third among the states in its production—but it also ranks second in strawberries, fourth in rice, fifth in peaches and third in spinach for processing. If you think of the Arkansas as a gangling pellagra-sapped Jeeter Lester, think again.

Fight Against Farm Budget Cuts

WASHINGTON.—The 32 per cent out of farm funds, already causing so much GOP teeth-grinding in the Midwest, was not achieved without some rough verbal slugging between Republicans and Democrats in the House Appropriations committee.

Democratic Congressman J. Lee Whitten of Mississippi hotly charged that the GOP Congress was "breaking faith" with the American farmer. Everitt Dirksen of Illinois, chairman of the Agriculture subcommittee on appropriations, countered just as hotly that he and other Republicans were only trying to put the farmer "on a respectable basis" by stopping government handouts.

"We've got to quit treating the American farmer like a serf, as they do in Russia," yelled one Republican during the closed-door melee.

"Well, you folks have got the votes, so there is nothing we can do," angrily declared Mississippi's Whitten. "We of the minority are tilting at windmills. This very subcommittee has been rigged against us. You've got five Republicans on the agriculture subcommittee to three Democrats, whereas all the other subcommittees are divided four to three."

Whitten leveled his "break faith" charge mainly at the extremely large slash in soil-conservation payments—\$117,000,000. The farmers he declared, had already been "promised" this money when Congress authorized \$300,000,000 last year. He added that some farmers had received full conservation allotments for 1947 in line or fertilizer, and now the government would not live up to its agreement to pay for them.

To this, Republicans Dirksen and Charles Plumley of Vermont countered that many farmers had been "loaded up with lime they didn't ask for" by their county agents, with the result that committee investigators had found considerable quantities of lime "rotting on farms."

The Mississippian retorted that this was news to him and certainly was not true in his farm district.

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Honesty Demands Genuine Action

Repercussions are being heard in Kansas City from the heated congressional elections in 1946 when Enos Axtell nosed out Rep. Slaughter in a close democratic primary and went on to win the election.

Since that time, there have been investigations of claims of election fraud. The justice department ordered a probe, but apparently it was intended as a sop, for where it failed to produce anything, a private study by the Kansas City Star uncovered enough evidence that the Jackson county grand jury returned indictments. Moreover, it became apparent that results might have been different should claims of the investigators be borne out.

the indictments were based largely. Once again the justice department has promised that it will check into the theft.

Added significance is attached to the case because the President threw his full weight behind Axtell in the race because of a desire to purge Rep. Slaughter, who was not too friendly with the chief executive. This was bad judgment on the part of the President, for although he had no part in any dealings, it certainly is a source of embarrassment to him.

About the best course left to him is to insist that there be a real, militant investigation by the FBI and to otherwise insist that justice be done. If election fraud has been practiced, it ought to be barred and dealt with stringently regardless of personal interests in the case.

How Can FBI Probe Lynchings?

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Lynching is murder under state laws but there's no federal law against lynching.

So how can the FBI, a federal agency whose job is to investigate violations of federal laws, investigate lynchings?

Here's an explanation.

The US constitution says no state shall deprive a person of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

So, before a state can take away a man's property or take his life by executing him, he must be given a fair trial.

If a man is taken into custody or locked up, pending trial, it's the state's duty to see he is un-

harmful while he's in custody or jail.

When a man is lynched, the FBI's first question is: Did the state do all it could to protect him before the lynch mob got him?

And—

Did a jailer or sheriff or policeman, representing the state, try to protect the prisoner? Or did they conspire with the lynch mob?

If it's just a lynching by a mob, with no state officer involved, that's just murder under state law. The FBI can't bring charges.

It can't bring charges because, as noted, there's no federal law

Boxing, Wrestling Control Body May Soon Be Set Up

AUSTIN, May 30. (AP) — A separate State Department to supervise and control professional boxing and wrestling in Texas is provided for in a bill that went to the calendar of the House today.

Approved by the State Affairs Committee, which recommended passage, the measure was given some chance of survival despite the lateness of its introduction, in view of the fact Gov. Beauford H. Jester submitted it as an emergency matter.

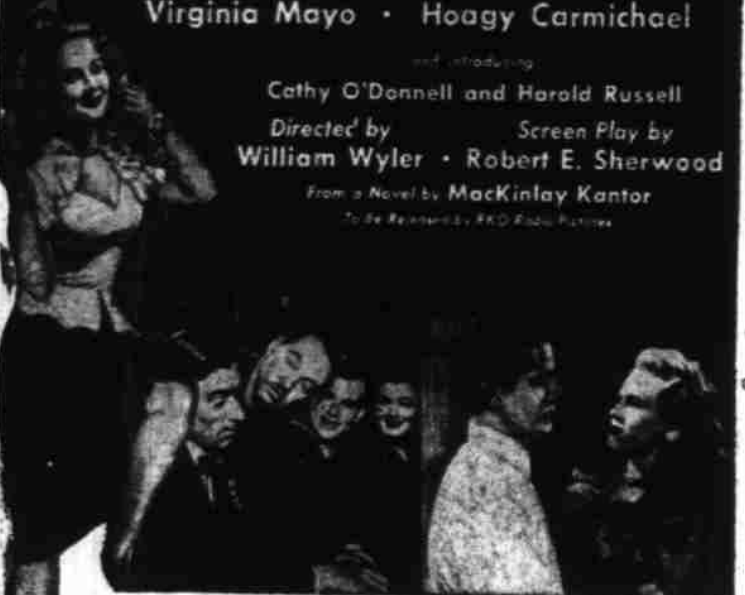

McAllen Settles Gas Supply Tiff

McAllen, Texas, May 30. (P)—The city of McAllen and the owners of the McAllen gas field have reached a compromise settling their four-year dispute to the city's rights to the gas supply from the field for its municipal distribution system, Mayor Tom Waite, Jr., announced.

Trial of a suit brought by the city against the field owners, Frank Murchison of San Antonio and V. E. Cook and C. E. Thompson, McAllen, has been postponed pending completion of the compromise contract.

Under terms of the contract now being drafted by attorneys for both sides, the city will receive 1,500,000 cubic feet of gas daily and the right to buy up to 3,500,000 feet daily additional at the average sale price in the field. Other details remain to be worked out.

Under the agreement with the original owners of the field, the city received 3,000,000 cubic feet free daily from one well.

She is survived by her husband, three daughters, Mrs. Vivian Hanson, Mrs. Velma McDaniel, both of Garden City, and Mrs. Vera Neely of Rock Springs; two sons, J. A. Bigby of Garden City and W. A. Bigby of Mingo; one brother, W. M. Laxson, Garden City; nine grandchildren; one great-grandchild and a number of nephews and nieces.

Pallbearers were to be Clyde Berry, Charlie Cox, A. J. Cunningham, Robert Evans, W. E. Underwood and Tom Shelburne Rankin.

Secretary Of War Lauds Roosevelt At Special Fete

HYDE PARK, N. Y., May 30. (P)—Secretary of War Patterson said today "no iron curtain, no censorship will hide the facts from the world" if this country does its utmost to "achieve, prove and promote democracy."

Without naming any foreign power, Patterson said in address prepared for a Franklin D. Roosevelt Memorial service:

"Men in every land will take heart from our progress. 'Our deeds, as words without deeds can never do, will prove that freedom and peace go hand in hand and that together they are a guide to a life more glorious than dictators can ever promise, let alone fulfill.'"

The United States, he said, can prove this world case for democracy. "If we strengthen our national unity, if we accept our world responsibilities without wavering, if we stand as a bulwark of freedom, if we prosper as a people and out of our prosperity extend assistance generously to people less fortunate."

Patterson said Mr. Roosevelt, as wartime commander in chief, "died in line of duty, for the cause of his country, before the final victory of the mighty forces he had organized, inspired and commanded, but in an hour when victory was in plain sight."

He added that "to all Americans he and the host that died in the same cause have left a solemn duty—to do our full part to bring to reality the hope of world peace."

SURPLUS MUSIC MAKERS ON SALE

LOS ANGELES, May 30. (P)—The War Assets Administration has for sale under the heading of war surplus:

A copy of a Stradivarius violin, a bassoon, a saxophone, an accordion, and a 46-string harp "with only one string broken."

Oltvanyi Succeeds Hungarian Premier 'Pushed' From Office

BUDAPEST, May 30. (P)—Imre Oltvanyi, a left-wing member of Ferec Nagy's small landholders party, was understood today to have been chosen tentatively as Hungarian premier, to succeed Nagy reported by a high Hungarian informant to have been "pushed" from office in what some sources called a communist coup d'etat.

Oltvanyi, former National bank president, was said to have won the conditional approval of leaders of the small landholders, communist, social democrat and peasant parties who, the informant declared, last night accepted Nagy's resignation, telephoned from his Switzerland vacation spot.

The informant said Nagy, absent from Hungary since May 14, would not come back to Hungary. Pro-American Hungarians said the shift in power was a step in the direction of a full-fledged communist police state in Hungary, which borders Russia and still is under Soviet occupation.

Nagy's advisers forecast an intensified communist drive to nationalize the National bank and three other banks owning 62 per cent of Hungarian industry, which already is 30 per cent nationalized. Panicky business leaders feared a reversion of last summer's inflation.

In 17 months in office, Nagy as leader of Hungary's majority party had fought for moderate conservatism in government in the face of contrary demands by the communist minority and its social democrat supporters and of communist pressure which forced many of his followers out of Parliament.

Over 30,000 Hungarians have been arrested this year in connection with alleged revolutionary conspiracies.

Trial Participants Working Overtime

BROWNSVILLE, May 30. (P)—There is no holiday in Brownsville's federal district court today. Instead, participants in the Santa Rosa Negro Orphanage mail fraud trial are working overtime in hopes of completing the unexpectedly long case before Sunday.

Earlier this week Judge Allan B. Hannay, at the request of the jury, added an hour and forty-five minutes to each day's proceedings. Attorneys yesterday showed evidence of trying to handle testimony as quickly as possible.

The eleven-day old trial of Mathes and Ruth Coleman, negro managers of the orphanage charged with misuse of the institution's funds, has thrown the court's crowded docket off schedule and one jury panel has been sent home four times by forced postponement of cases.

Ruth Coleman returned to the witness stand this morning to complete testimony as to her duties as secretary of the orphanage and as director of the fund-raising campaign that brought about the indictment.

She followed Mathes Coleman to the stand shortly after noon yesterday.

In relating circumstances leading to the establishment of the orphanage in the early 1930's, Mrs. Cole-

man said "the dream of our life" has been the hope to build an institution similar to Tuskegee, an institution "that would train and teach our people, morally and spiritually."

Testifying from an ambulance stretcher, made necessary she said, by a major operation last fall, Mrs. Coleman proudly told the jury that more than \$130,000 has been spent since 1941 in improving, maintaining and operating the orphanage although income from the letter campaign has totaled only \$102,000.

The additional money, she said, was realized through private contributions, from personal funds belonging to herself and her husband, and from special projects operated at the orphanage.

The letter campaign was described as "the answer to my prayers" when it was first explained to her early in 1941 by W. F. Pohlen, San Antonio advertising man.

Pohlen handled the campaign until early 1944 but the orphanage did not begin receiving regular income from the project until the Colemans purchased printing equipment and a mailing list from the San Antonian at the termination of his contract, the defendant said.

Under the contract, Mrs. Coleman stated, the orphanage received approximately \$10,000 and Pohlen \$65,000.

Since March 3, 1944, with herself supervising the printing at the orphanage, contributions have totaled \$92,000 a monthly increase of nearly \$500 over the period under the Pohlen contract, she testified.

WEDDING JUST FAMILY AFFAIR

CHICAGO, May 30. (P)—Four members of the family of the Rev. Elmer W. Palmer will take part in the double wedding planned Saturday at the Judson Baptist church in suburban Oak Park.

Dr. Palmer will officiate at the wedding of his two daughters, Dorothy Jean, 21, and Phyllis Eileen, 20. He also will accompany Dorothy Jean to the altar while his son, Paul, 15, will walk with Phyllis.

Dorothy Jean is to marry John C. Lobos, 23, of Shamokin, Pa., and Phyllis Eileen will marry Clifford Raad, 23, of Chokio, Minn.

REDISTRICTING BOOSTERS HAVEN'T GIVEN UP FIGHT

AUSTIN, Tex., May 30. (P)—The 50th legislature went home this weekend with hope in view that the session would end late next week.

Whether the final adjournment would be possible by that time appeared doubtful to some legislators. They said there was too much legislation remaining to be taken care of before a majority of senators and representatives would agree to call it quits.

Sen. George Moffett of Chillicothe crossed his fingers on the prospect of securing House approval of his plan to force legislative redistricting in 1951.

Once described as "dead," his proposed constitutional amendment setting up a redistricting board to reapportion legislative representation in event the legislature failed to do so was approved by the Senate, 23 to 7, yesterday. It now goes to the House.

There has been no redistricting of the state since 1821, though the constitution says such action shall be taken following each decennial census by the federal government.

The basic reason, most incumbent legislators don't take to the idea of "having their districts chopped up or rearranged."

Moffett expressed the belief that his proposal would "lead the legislature into complying with the constitution's directives in 1951—following the 1950 census."

The redistricting board suggested by Moffett would be composed of the lieutenant governor, speaker of the House of Representatives, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts and commissioner of the general land office.

Opposing Moffett's resolution, Sen. A. M. Akin, Jr., of Paris said that passage of the amendment would reflect on the legislature's ability to do its own redistricting.

"I don't think the people in my district would like for a supreme court, justice, or a land commissioner, or a state comptroller, or anybody else to say how this state should be redistricted," he told the Senate.

Major legislation barring the legislature from final adjournment may possibly be disposed of Monday.

House members have been informed that conference committee reports on remaining major appropriation bills will be ready for consideration Monday.

These are the appropriation measures for state departments and few institutions of higher learning. Also awaiting House action is the conference report on the eleemosynary money bill. It has been approved by the Senate.

A Senate filibuster was broken after four hours yesterday with the passage, 0 to 6, of a bill to permit co-operative development of oil fields. Competitive revision of the bill in the Senate required its return to the House.

Opponents of the measure have hammered at it as a violation of Texas anti-trust laws.

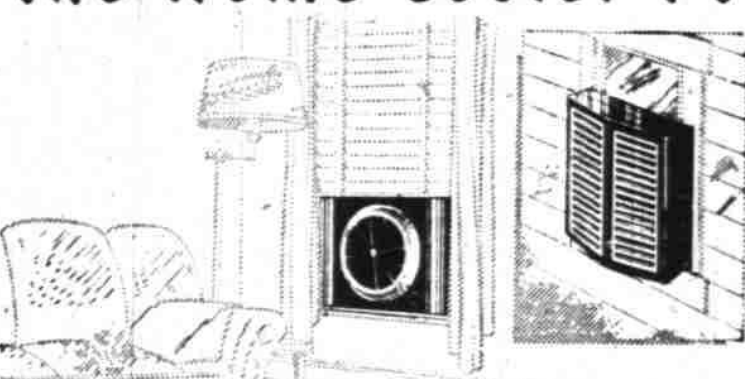
