Motivating young offenders to live a whole some life by helping them to understand why they commit offenses is the aim of "unofficial probation."

Guest speakers at the Oct. 11 Rotary Lunch on meeting were District Attorney Stanley Kirk and Frank Grant of the Probation Department. Explaining to Rotarians this new approach which deals with the offender rather than the offense, they told of hopes to expand the program, securing professional help so that psychological testing may be given these young offenders. The program has succeeded in saving many young men, 17 to 31 years of age from convictions which would have stigmatized them, and most have become useful members of society.

Bulldogs Lose 26-18 Thriller To High-Ranking Brownwood Lions

The inspired Burkburnett Bulldogs almost turned in the upset of the year, here Friday night, as they played the number one ranked Brownwood Lions down to the wire in an exciting contest, before losing 26-18, in the 4-AAA game.

The Bulldogs wasted no time in giving the fans something to cheer about. Winning the toss, they chose to have the wind at their back and kick off to the Lions. The kick that followed was an onside boot that the Bulldogs recovered on the Lion 49. With the 3,200 partisans cheering wildly, the Bulldogs drove to the twelve yard line before bogging down. On a fourth down situation, Dale Hoffman set up for a field goal attempt with Tony Hodges holding. However, the snap was not a good one, and Hoffman was forced to run with the ball and was tackled on the ten, the ball going over to the Lions. From that point, the powerful Brownwood ground machine began to grind out yardage that carried them to their first score. There was but three seconds left in the first quarter when fine running halfback Wayne Fenton scampered 14 yards for a touchdown. The Bulldogs stopped a running conversion attempt to keep the score at 6-0.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs drove to the Brownwood 49 before being forced to punt. Punting into a 45 mph wind, Dale Hoffman was astonished to see his punt coming down right into his own hands. The only choice he had was to call for a fair catch and eat the ball on his own 47.

With 4:42 left in the half, Brownwood got their second tally. Wingback Kirk Wall romped into the endzone from eight yards away, capping a short drive. Roy Spence passed for the conversion attempt, but Rollin Hunter let the ball go right through his hands. The teams went to the dressing room at halftime, with Brownwood leading, 12-0.

The Bulldogs got a good bit of luck to start the second half. Having the option, Brownwood chose to receive, but they weren't figuring on what would happen, as they fumbled on their 20 and the Bulldogs recovered. It took exactly nine plays, with fullback Rusty Todd providing the impetus, picking up 24 yards of the drive, and going the final four yards to paydirt. A passing attempt failed on the conversion play and the score was 12-6.

The Lions began another drive for some insurance after taking the kickoff. Fenton, who has to be a serious consideration for All-District honors, added the score with a 23 yard charge with 5:21 left in the third quarter. Roy Spence added two points on a keeper and the score was 20-6.

The Bulldogs tried their best to ram the ensuing kickoff back down the Lions' throats, as Jim Caddell fielded the ball on the 13 yard line and raced 67 yards before being pulled down on the Brownwood 20.

KEEP THE LID ON IT**FEDERAL ENCROACHMENT**

The Administration's proposal to establish Community Development Districts is a further and unwarranted intrusion upon the responsibilities and prerogatives of state and local governments and private institutions.

The legislation would permit the growth of a new Federal agency to direct, from Washington, economic and industrial development of rural areas.

Not only does the bill call for the duplicating of existing Federal programs but it would further weaken their effectiveness, increase Federal spending and employment, hence contribute to the growing inflationary pressures.

The Community Development Districts are administratively infeasible and would be impractical to operate. For example, the bill calls for "effective planning aids to rural areas for cities up to 50,000 population" but does not cover the rural areas served by cities larger than 50,000.

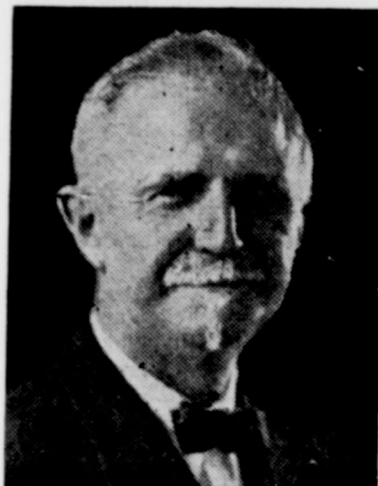
The Administration's backers of the bill recently had it removed from the House calendar minutes before debate on the subject was to begin. It is important that the members of Congress are alerted and informed that the bill should be rejected when it comes up for further consideration, because it is not needed.

.SEARCHING FOR ANSWERS

Antipollution efforts are being carried forward on countless fronts, and as is often the case, the most effective efforts receive little publicity and few headlines. The answers to the problems of preserving our environments are being found, slowly but surely, in the quiet of industrial, as well as government laboratories.

At the moment, a new government research program on "antipollution" gasoline formulas has been launched with the petroleum industry contributing \$480,000 of the needed funds and the government furnishing personnel and facilities. The task of the program will be to determine the type of gasoline which produces the cleanest auto exhaust when burned in a variety of engines under varying conditions. The program has been described as "another effort by government and industry to meet their joint responsibility for air pollution abatement."

The development of antipollution measures is a long-term proposition. It involves devices that will cost from a few dollars to millions. As in the case of gasoline, the search for solutions will reach into areas undreamed of by the average person. The search for ways to clear up pollution is not new to industry. The oil industry alone has poured many millions of dollars into air and water conservation programs. The present search for a "cleaner" gasoline is typical of the kind of government-industry cooperation that virtually assures the arrival of the day when excessive contamination of air and water will be a thing of the past. In the meantime, unnecessary rhetoric and lawmaking will only confuse the issue.

Weekly Report****THE BOND MARKET**

Babson Park, Mass. — The other day we were talking with the partner of a large financial house. He said they had been looking for an experienced trader of bonds for better than a couple of months. A number of prospects were interviewed; but, long on ambition, they were very short on the chief qualification: experience.

Back In Fashion Again

Actually, it is no wonder that experienced bond men are scarcer than hen's teeth. Common stocks have been all the rage with the average individual investor ever since the end of World War II . . . and for a spell even before that. Banks, insurance companies, and some trustees were the only ones who had much interest in bonds. As a matter of fact, even they bought more from necessity than from their love of bonds.

During the last big war, the Government and the Treasury, on the one side, and the Federal Reserve Board, on the other side, co-operated to keep interest rates low to hold down the huge expense of a soaring federal debt burden. This "accord" was highly inflationary . . . because every time the Fed bought bonds to support the bond market, it filled the banks fuller and fuller of loanable funds. At the end of the fifth decade, this accord was scrapped; interest rates started a long climb, and bonds went into a secular slump from which they have not yet emerged. Today, yields of 6% on bonds are not hard to find, and these handsome returns have attracted buyers who never before bought bonds. In a word, bonds are back in fashion again!

But What About Inflation?

With the exception of a short period toward the end of the 1950's, those who bought bonds during and after World War II have had a very bitter experience. First, most of the bonds purchased had low coupon rates . . . ranging from around 2½% to something over 4%. Naturally, as interest rates moved higher, the older, lower-coupon-rate issues fell in price. Second, during most of this period, stock prices rose handsomely . . . making bonds look like a very poor second choice indeed. Third—and most damaging to

the bond owner — prices for consumer goods climbed ever higher, so that the yearly interest received bought less and less and the purchasing power of the bond when paid off at maturity was far below the purchasing power of the original investment.

The recent swift rise in the coupon rates of best-quality bonds—to 6% and even higher—is giving the buyer a good current income and lessens the danger of any future fall in the prices of such issues. Many will tell you that the threat of infla-

tion, of further advances in the cost of living makes bonds still unattractive; but this fear may be unwarranted today. At present low quotations for many bond issues, all their owners as to a purchase them at a discount and hold them to maturity, thereby increasing his capital. This method of protecting against inflation was not available when 3½ bonds were selling close to 100. And the competition from stocks—even after their recent slump—is not very great, since many of the popular issues now yield only 3½-4%.

Tax Exemption Too

There seems little doubt that Congress will raise all income taxes for 1967. Such action will make tax-exempt bonds more appealing than they are now. Once it was thought that only the very wealthy should be interested in tax-exempt securities. However, those who pay only 26½ to 30% of their taxable income to Uncle Sam can make really worthwhile savings in present depressed tax-exempt bond markets. Many of the tax-exempt obligations issued ten and fifteen years ago, with maturities in the next five years, can be had today at deep discounts. You pay no federal taxes on the yearly interest while you hold them, and you enjoy the favorable long-term capital gains tax on the increase at maturity.

The Long View

A review of the price movements of stocks and bonds over a long sweep of history indicates that popularity may ride with stocks for many years and then swing to bonds. Since 1949 bonds have been in the discard and stocks in the ascendency. It is just possible that recent interaction between stocks and bonds may be making the foundation for the building of a new cyclical climb in bond prices.

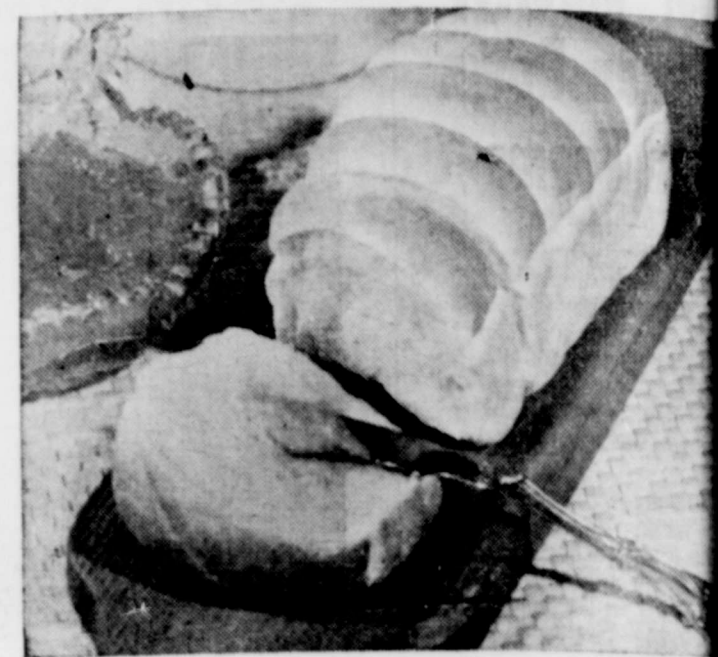

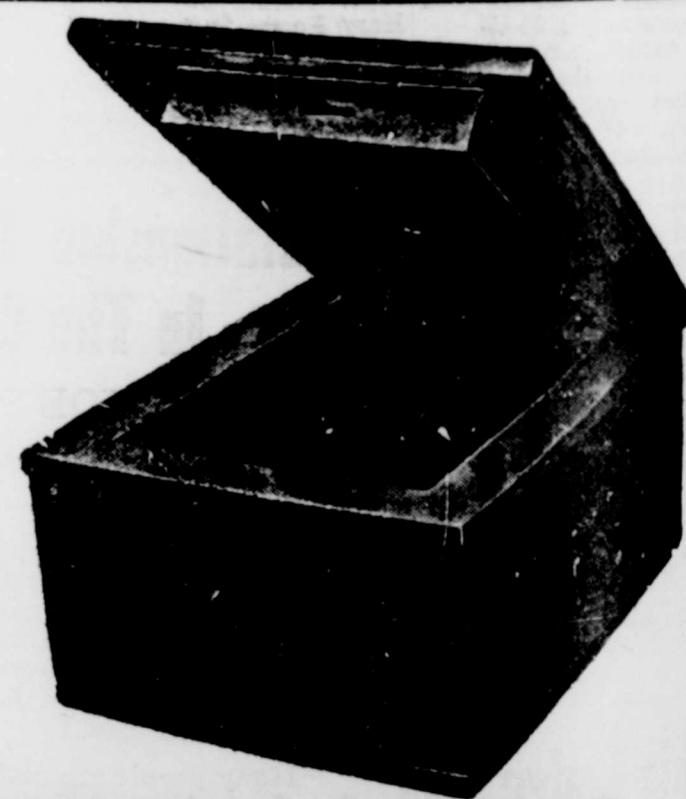

Veteran's Land Sale Is Set For Nov. 15 By Commissioner

Austin — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler announced that a Veterans' Land Board Forfeited Sale would be held on November 15, 1966, in the General Land Office. He pointed out that the Program has exceeded all expectations in its success and value to the people of Texas.

Sadler said that the delinquencies of veteran contract payments are lower today than at any time in the history of the Program. Land prices are higher and the Program is making a \$2½ million profit per year for the taxpayers of Texas, in addition to helping veterans own a tract of land that they fought to preserve.

We have purchased some three million acres of land for 35,300 Texas veterans and placed some \$243 million in circulation to boost the economy of this State. Although new purchases under the Program are no longer possible, a vast amount of work remains to be done in servicing veterans' contracts. Carving out homesteads, issuing fractional severance deeds and paid-in-full deeds, approving oil and gas leases, and issuing easements have to be performed throughout the life of a veteran contract.

"I pledge to the people of Texas, as I have in the past, that I will give them the best service possible here in the Land Office at the least possible cost to the taxpayers of the State. These sales, such as the one scheduled for November 15th, make a few tracts of veterans' land available to successful bidders with financing under the Veteran's Land Program at 5% down payment for a forty-year contract and payments being made on the contracts semi-annually at a low rate of interest. Those interested in purchasing land should take advantage of this sale," Sadler said.

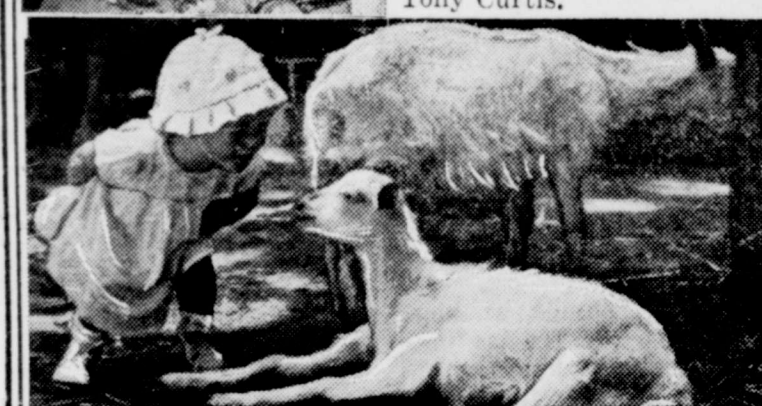

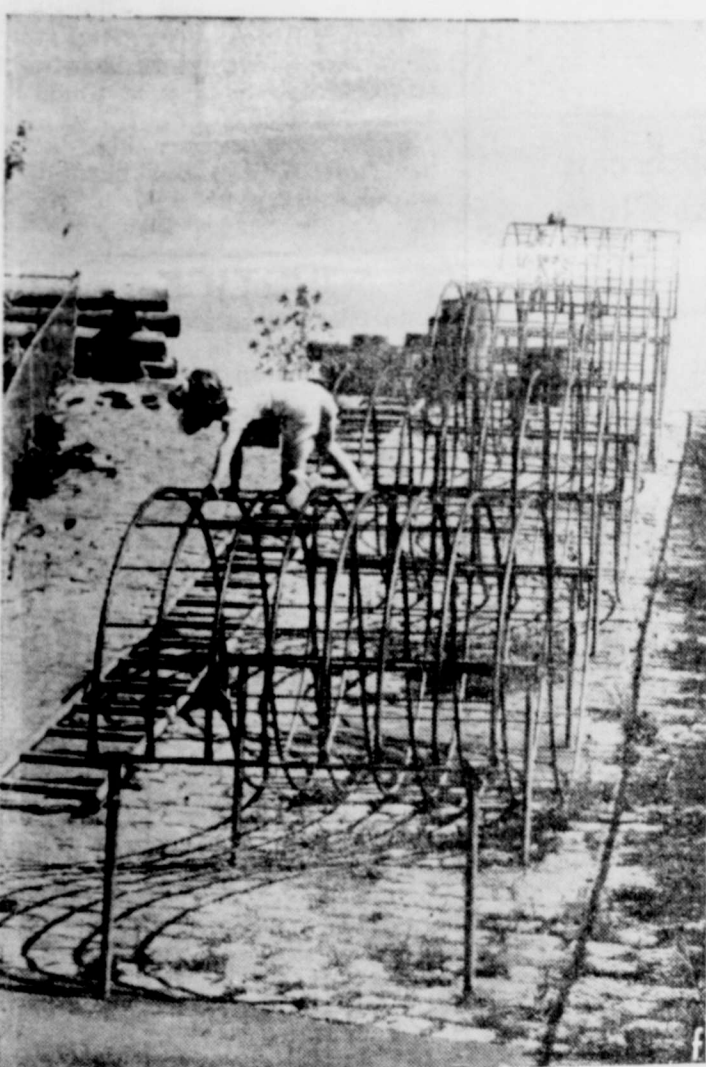
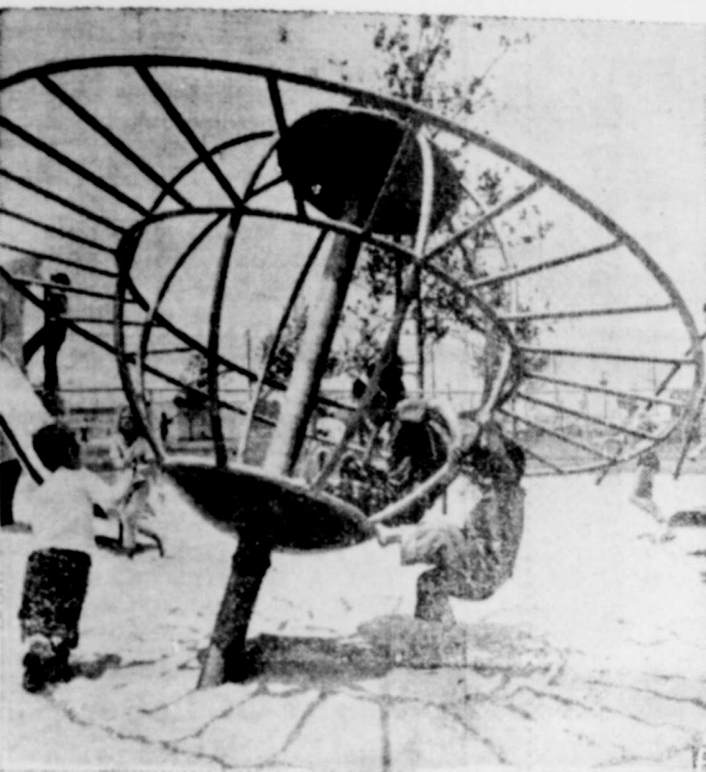
Uses For Pipe In Playgrounds

'Friends Of Library' To Launch First Public Subscription Drive For Purchase Of Library Books

The first public subscription drive in support of the Burkburnett Public Library will be launched by Friends of the Library finance committee on Oct. 15, according to Mrs. Jack Smith, finance chairman.

No public funds are available for the purchase of books for the new library, which is designed for 20,000 volumes, and when the facility opens in January every volume on its shelves will represent the donation of funds by interested individuals and organizations.

More than 100 books have already been given as memorials by friends and relatives; sums from \$25 to \$500 have been given by individuals and organizations; and \$5,300 representing CIP awards have been donated by the Council of Federated Study Clubs.

"With the cost of the average book about \$5, there still remains a great need for book funds unless the shelves are to be only partly filled when the library opens in January," Mrs. Smith said in announcing the drive.

Friends of the Burkburnett Library is a non-profit organization similar to hundreds throughout the United States, whose sole purpose is to help public libraries improve their facilities. The local group is the first to be organized in Wichita County.

The book fund drive will begin Oct. 15 with an advance gift solicitation among business establishments. The house-to-house canvass set for "Buy a Book Day," Oct. 18, has a dual purpose, according to Mrs. Smith. Not only will householders have the opportunity of contributing the price of a book to the library fund, but they will be asked to fill out a card showing their preference in reading matter.

"Our organization believes that a modern, well supported library is a basic necessity in a progressive community, for it is the only treasure house open to all comers," Mrs. Smith pointed out in discussing the Friends organization.

Since its formation in April, 1966, the Burkburnett Friends have recruited 267 members, many of whom are of school age. The membership committee is under the chairmanship of Mrs. F. T. Feity, other members being Roy Magers and Mmes. Marvin Taliaferro, Jerry Thomas, Lloyd Bloodworth, Ted Roark, James Roderick, Howard Henderson, Jess Hageman and Newton Crane.

The publicity committee, under the chairmanship of Mrs. John Erokman, has publicized the purpose of the group through entering decorated cars in

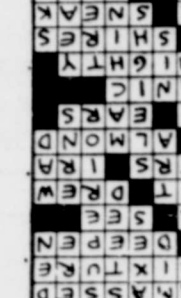

In 1965, 69% of all air search and rescue missions were flown by CAP with the U.S. Army and Navy flying the bulk of the remainder. The U.S.A.F. had turned most of its light aircraft over to CAP. CAP now flies 95% of the Air Force Search and Rescue missions. CAP works hand in hand with Civil Defense and Red Cross.

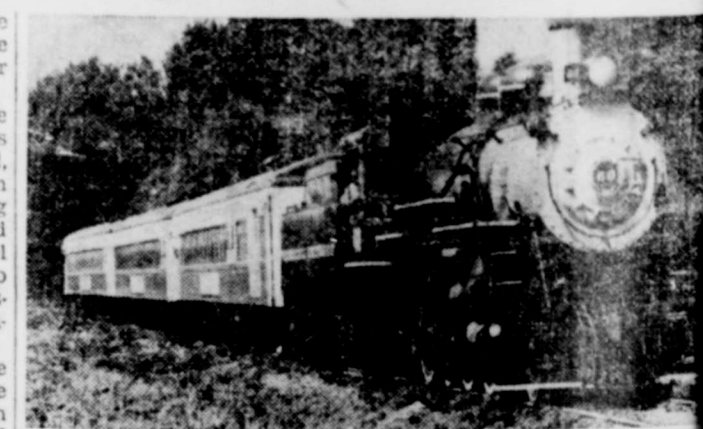

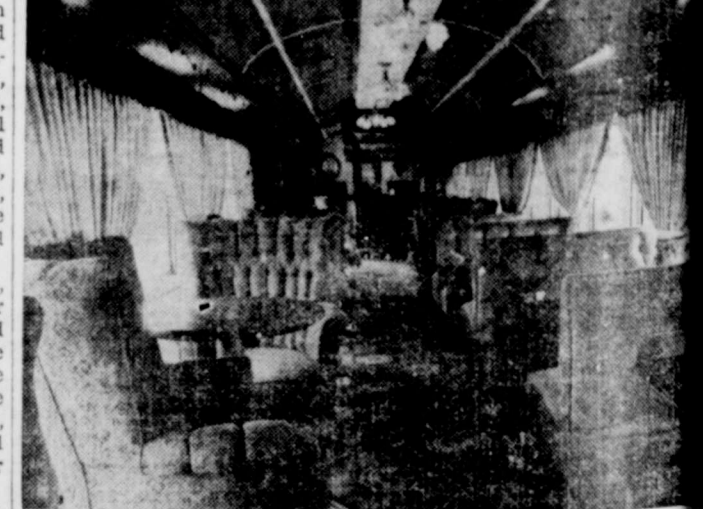
