Cornell Psychologist Challenges Myth Of Black Self-Hatred

Ithaca, N. Y. -- In a new book reflecting nearly 10 years of research, Cornell University psychologist William E. Cross, Jr., says that the idea that most Black Americans hate themselves is a gross exaggeration even though such a perspective has dominated racial identity studies and influenced school desegregation decisions.

"My book is an attempt to re-define the way in which scholars approach the study of Black identity," Cross, 51, said in an interview on his book, "Shades of Black: Diversity in African-American Identity," published in March by Temple University Press.

"For years, Black and white researchers alike have been obsessed with the idea of Black self-hatred," said Cross, and associate professor of psychology and Black studies in Cornell's Africana Studies and Research Center.

"Even when producing results that argued against the centrality of Black self-hatred, previous researchers interpreted evidence of Black psychological strengths in a way that made them appear as weaknesses," Cross said. In other studies, Black strengths were simply overlooked, creating the impression that self-hatred was the only "fact" to be discussed.

In his book, Cross argues that Negro identity research conducted in the 1940's by the husband-wife team of Mable and Kenneth Clark overlooked Black identity strengths. Because of the importance of their work, the Clarks were the first to give exaggerated significance to themes of what was referred to in their days as "Negro self-hatred," Cross contends.

Cross shows that self-hatred is an important but minor theme in how the majority of Black children, teens and adults view themselves. Cross notes that as long as Black families have caretakers who are gainfully employed in jobs or professions that provide a living wage and meaningful benefits, the children and adults of such families, be they poor or middle class, tend to find a variety of ways to achieve high self-esteem.

The author points out that race is only one of the many factors that Blacks use in constructing their identities. According to Cross, some Blacks use their profession, education, club membership or religion as the basis of an identity.

If a researcher focuses only on race, the psychological diversity to be found among Black people will be missed, he says. But he agrees that some Blacks do want to make race and culture highly salient to their identity.

Our school desegregation, Cross writes: "The social scientific literature on Negro identity written between 1936 and 1967 reported that self-hatred and group rejection were typical of Black psychological functioning. Justices of the U. S. Supreme Court employed such 'scientific evi-

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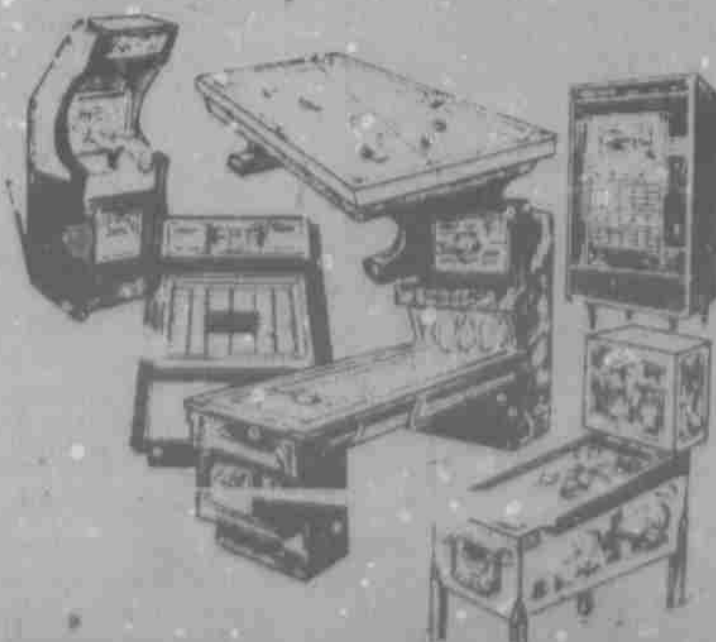
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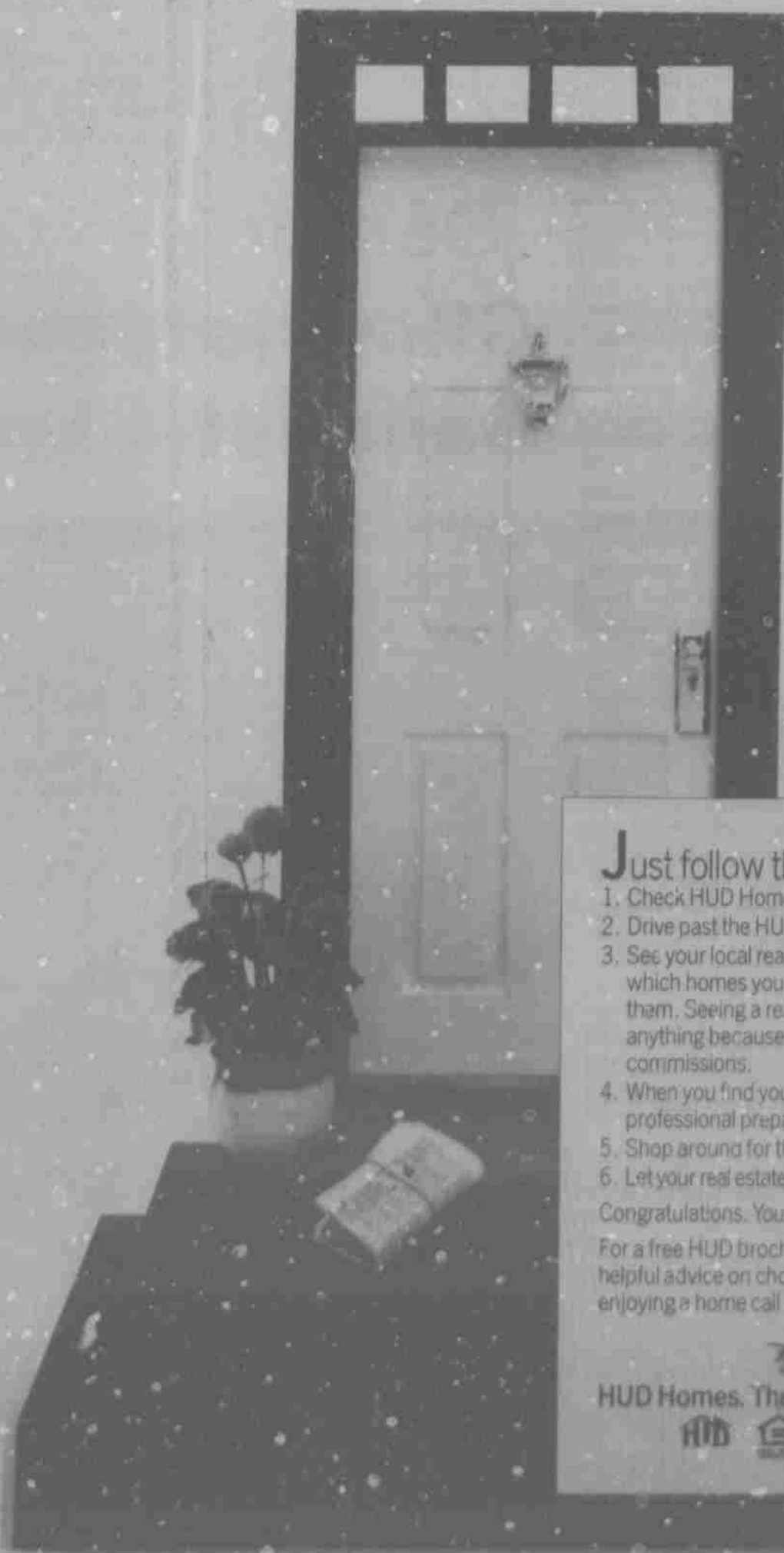

If you get the chance go by the bookstore on University Ave. and pick up a copy of the April 5th Texas Observer. There is an interesting interview of Pete Brewton that is about six pages long. He is an investigative reporter for the Houston Post. The interview talks about the S&L crisis in Texas, the Mob, Iran, CIA, George Bush and his two sons, Nicaragua, Jimmy Carter, and the Gulf War. And how they are all related. It will be a hell of a miniseries one of these days.

Last Saturday Victor Hernandez came home. He was one of the ninety or so Lubbock folks who returned home from Saudi. There was a nice little gathering at his home. I took my kids and we sat around and talked. I shook his hand a couple times and told him that I was glad he was home.

While he was gone I was a lousy friend. His daughter was born ten days before he left. I only checked on his wife and family a couple times while he was gone.

I remember when my dad came back from Korea. Just before leaving my Dad brought us back home from Delaware to Van Buren, Arkansas to be near the rest of the family. Van Buren is a little town on a bluff above the Arkansas River in northwest Arkansas.

My mom, two brothers, and I moved into a small house across a field/alley from Aunt Wilma and our three cousins. The alley was about 75 yards wide and a great place to chase lighting bugs in the summer while the trash smoldered from the evening burn. Down the road about five houses lived Grandma and Grandpa. We never went down the road to go to Grandma's house. We

would just go out the back door, slamming the screen door, and run to Grandma's back porch.

On the day my Dad came from Korea, I ran out the back door and headed for Grandma's house. In her back yard I could see a big man in a kakh uniform. At some point, probably after I got there, he took off his hat. He didn't have any hair. He didn't look like any of the pictures of mom and dad in the high school yearbooks. But it didn't matter. I don't really remember anything else. Just my daddy in the back yard and me running to see him and at some point noticing his hair was gone.

He had been in Korea a year and I was around four years old when he came back. It is my first memory of my father.

Hopefully, Victor's little girl will never have to have her father leave again. If he does, if anyone else's mommy or daddy has to leave again, I will try to do a better job at making sure things are taken care of at home.

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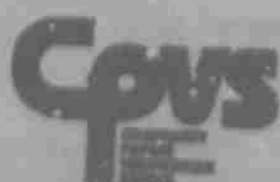

Locker-Room Interviews?

Should post-game interviews with athletes be
held in the locker rooms?

Yes. My legislation in New Jersey provides that post-game interviews may be held in locker rooms after 30 minutes elapse from the conclusion of the athletic contest. It is in no way intended to impede access to athletes by the media. There is nothing sacrosanct in my mind about 30 minutes. It could be whatever is deemed a reasonable amount of time for members of a team to change, shower and get dressed.

What has been the impact of recent locker-room incidents?

The impact has been a heightened awareness and sensitivity to the responsibilities of athletes and members of the media to each other. The public interest in following sports and the reactions of athletes to winning and losing is an integral part of the American scene. I believe both the media and a majority of athletes have learned a lot about their relationships with each other. The issue is more one of taking steps to provide an atmosphere of decorum, while maintaining the needed access to players by the media.

What are alternatives to locker-room interviews?

The most talked-about alternative has been the so-called "interview" room. I personally oppose that idea because it creates an atmosphere where it would be all too easy for players to avoid the media. I also do not believe it would be practical for members of the media who are faced with deadlines. My legislation is, in itself, an alternative to the current practice of immediate post-game interviews. My intent was to generate a public discussion of the issue resulting in an improved atmosphere for communicating between members of the media and athletes. Ed

Should post-game interviews with athletes be
held in the locker rooms?

No. The locker room should be as sacred to the athlete as the pressroom is to the reporter.

Perhaps the most significant question involving college athletes and interviews is whether male reporters should be allowed in the locker rooms of female athletes.

I suggest that such a situation is as inappropriate as female reporters in men's locker rooms. Sound moral judgment should take precedence over deadlines.

What has been the impact of recent locker-room incidents?

The impact of recent incidents involving female reporters is justification for a system which prohibits reporters, male or female, from conducting interviews in locker rooms.

Times have changed, as has the role of women reporters. We should be praising women reporters for their accomplishments, not admonishing them for their gender.

What are alternatives to locker-room interviews?

We are a prudent society. A situation such as finding alternatives to locker-room interviews should be an easy task.

Designated times and locations for interviews, seem like amicable solutions to the problem. Again, we should be cheering the progress women have made and not debating limiting that progress.

cording to data released by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

Black enrollment at those institutions increased from 34,718 students in fall 1989 to 35,941 in fall 1990, a gain of 1,223 students. Hispanic enrollment grew from 72,237 to 77,343, an increase of 5,106 students.

"Community colleges and technical institutes are playing a critical role in providing minority access to higher education in this state," said Commissioner of Higher Education Kenneth H. Ashworth. "Minority students often start their college work in these institutions. Our big challenge is to help more of them to transfer into universities upon graduation."

The commissioner said that 35,941 Blacks and 77,343 Hispanics were enrolled at community colleges and technical institutes in fall 1990. At public universities, 33,339 Blacks and 58,765 Hispanics were enrolled at the same time.

Significant gains in Black enrollment were reported in the Houston Community College System, up 558; the San Jacinto College District, up 255; and the North Harris County College District, up 118.

Colleges and technical institutes that reported strong gains in Hispanic enrollment included the El Paso Community College District, up 894; Alamo Community College District, up 752; Houston Community College System, up 520; Dallas County Community College District, up 425; San Jacinto College District, up 359; and North Harris County College District, up 255.

Other schools with significant gains in Hispanics enrollment were Texas State Technical Institute-Harlingen, up 235; Odessa College, up 234; Del Mar College, up 223; Southwest Texas Junior College, up 198; Laredo Junior College, up 148; and Howard County Junior College District, up 139.

Overall, enrollment at public community colleges and technical institutes increased from 360,886 to 379,514 students.

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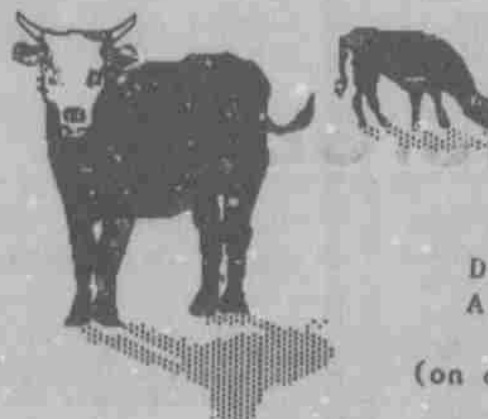
