New indictment provides more scrape iron details

Among nine indictments returned last week here by a Garza district court grand jury was one against Pat N. Walker and James Kennedy on a charge of theft "by exercising control of some 6,100 pounds of scrap iron on or about June 9, 1975, without the effective consent of Erwin Young, the owner thereof and with the intent to deprive Young of said property."

In another indictment, Felix Herrera Cavazos, the older of two Hereford youths arrested after Highway Patrolman Jerry Morris had been clubbed April 10, charged with aggravated assault with bodily injury on a peace officer.

The indictment alleges Cavazos committed the assault on Morris "by striking and beating him with a wooden club while Morris was in the lawful discharge of his official duties."

John Wayne Washington and James Veazey, both of Lubbock, were indicted for burglary, entering the H. D. Holman farm home March 23 with the intent to commit theft.

The other six indictments included: Barbara Ann Curtis, charged with unlawfully carrying a knife (See 9 indictments, Page 12)

Hail causes \$500,000 damage to roofs, cars, mobile homes

Big tornado 'scare' too

The worst hail storm to slash Post since 1956 ruined hundreds of roofs here last Wednesday evening and gave expensive "dimple treatments" to hundreds of local cars caught in the open.

Total bill for the damages — most of it insured — is expected to run to a half million dollars, or more.

It will be some time yet before insurance adjusters will have an accurate final damage figure.

But the ice bombardment, bad as it was, wasn't even the biggest weather news at the time.

Post residents were given their biggest tornado scare in a decade or so about 5:30 p. m. when three funnel clouds were sighted southwest of Post. At least one of them churned along the ground in open country south of Graham.

The community's "take cover" siren howled for 30 minutes. Everybody who could find room in a storm cellar was quickly underground — and most of them stayed there for two to three hours.

Post ate a late supper that night.

Volunteer firemen who had spent a busy Wednesday afternoon battling two grass fires on the U Laxy S Ranch were en route from there to extinguish another set by lightning on the Kirkpatrick ranch when they saw one tornado funnel and watched it dip to the ground.

Bobby Cowdrey, who lives just east of the Graham gin, sighted three funnel clouds. The Cowdrey place was battered with large hail off and on for almost three hours.

Reports that persons were treated at Garza Memorial Hospital after being injured by large hail stones were erroneous.

The only persons brought to the hospital for treatment were a woman who fainted because of fright and a little boy who cut his hand when it was caught in a car door.

All told, Post received a total of over four inches of rain last week, which included the Monday rainfall.

Official measurements here included 2.23 inches additional on Wednesday, .74 of an inch on Thursday, .40 more measured Friday and .03 on Saturday when the thunderstorms turned into a sandstorm. More sand blew in Monday of this week.

The southern part of the county received less moisture from the turbulent weather than the other parts. At Close City over 5.3 inches were recorded with over five inches reported too at Graham.

Roofing crews were swarming into Post this week and every available insurance adjuster was already hard at work with the four local insurance agencies reporting hundreds of damage claims.

Many roofs were reported "totaled" and almost every roof had some damage.

The damage area covered the entire city with some areas being harder hit than others. Some rural hail claims also were being processed.

Mobile homes here also were

reported to have suffered considerable damage.

A lot of the car damaged claims were running \$700 to \$750 a vehicle.

Post was hit twice by hail Wednesday afternoon once before 5:30 p. m. and again after

the flight to the storm cellars.

On Thursday, it was so dark by 2 p. m. that the street lights automatically came on. School children were dismissed early that afternoon because of the threatening weather, as well as the Easter holiday.

It rained for almost three hours from 4 to 7 p. m. with some small hail falling. By 7 p. m., the temperature had dropped and it was chilling cold.

One would think all that rain would settle everything down,

but the sand was blowing so bad Saturday one could hardly see across the street. That came after a little morning shower.

Some of the damaged roofs are reported to be leaking badly (See Hail storm, Page 12)

Perry Hunsaker is named new Garza hospital administrator

Perry Hunsaker, mortician for the Hudman Funeral Home and a resident of Post for the last two years, was named Monday afternoon as the new administrator of Garza Memorial Hospital.

Action came by a unanimous vote of the four members of the hospital board present after the recent hospital board election returns were canvassed and Wayne Childers sworn in as a new hospital director.

Sexton Huntley, hospital board chairman, was not present at the session as he was still out of town on an Easter weekend trip to Corpus Christi.

Hunsaker will take over his new duties May 1 at a salary of \$900 monthly with a \$100 car allowance.

Four local applicants sought the administrator's position after the board announced last week it would seek a local man for the position.

Hospital directors in a rather lengthy emergency meeting besides interviewing Hunsaker for the administrator's position also interviewed an applicant for the position of director of nurses at the hospital.

The board is seeking a permanent director of nurses. The present director is serving only until a permanent director can be employed.

The applicant was asked to discuss the work with hospital staff physicians and with Hunsaker before a final decision is made.

"I am eager to serve the Garza county residents and I

am looking forward to working together with the doctors of this community and the staff of Garza Memorial Hospital," Hunsaker told The Dispatch following his selection.

The new hospital administrator attended McMurry College in Abilene, served with the United States Air Force in Europe for two years, and was

graduated from the Dallas Institute of Mortuary Science with degrees in funeral directing and embalming.

Hunsaker is secretary of the Post Lions Club and is an active member of the First United Methodist Church. He resides at 611 West 13th with his wife, Jeanie and their two children, Heather and Dusty.

Post cited for old buildings

Mrs. Maxine Blankenship of Lubbock, chairman of the Texas Historical Commission, told Post Rotarians at their Tuesday luncheon in city hall auditorium that the state commission is "a service organization" much like Rotary.

"We provide 'how to do it' service" on museums and

historic preservations to communities all over Texas," she said in reviewing the work of the commission.

She declared that there now is an enormous demand for museum consultants in Texas. In 1969 Texas had 163 museums, but today "we have 323 established or in the process of being established," she said.

She said she has toured Post and has been surprised to find so many historical buildings worth preserving.

Mrs. Blankenship cited the Algerita Hotel and Post Sanitarium projects which already have qualified for federal funds and said that whereas Post already has two on the national register, Lubbock has no buildings as such.

She cited the Faith Lutheran Church and some two-story Dutch homes here as "other architectural treasures."

"Restored buildings cost less than new construction," she declared and cited an architect's report on the subject to prove her point.

"Restoration of historic buildings and putting them to present day use actually saves 20 to 30 percent in construction costs," she declared, adding: "Texas can no longer afford to destroy its old buildings."

She said "we lose more than an old building when we tear one down. We lose a landmark, a bridge to our past, a memory."

Child Find' is under way

A residential canvass is now under way in the Post school district to find all handicapped students between the ages of 3 and 21 years.

The state-wide effort is called "Child Find" with the purpose being to aid Texas school districts in providing special educational services for all who need them.

Making the survey here, now in its third week, are Amy Cowdrey, Alice Cruse and Barbara Reece.

Phase I of the three-phase program, which will end June 30, will emphasize the location of handicapped children not now attending school and attempt to move these students into existing special education programs or develop short-term "stop gap" measures to provide immediately for their educational needs.

Phases II and III will carry through Sept. 30, 1978, will place emphasis on development of special educational services as found to be needed by the present survey.

Election school to be held in Snyder

All county clerks and county chairmen in counties holding primary elections are asked to attend a slide presentation for election school at 1 p. m., April 27, in the Snyder county clerks office. Mr. Robert Lemens, Director of Election for the Secretary of State will direct the school.

This school will outline procedures to be followed in the polling place on election day. All situations will be covered by the presentation. It will help in making the duties of election judges and clerks easier on election day.

This will be a joint meeting with Borden County.

Protecting 'our fortune'

It is difficult to believe that the "Texas tax take" is so good that the state will have 31 per cent more tax revenue on hand for the next biennium when the state legislature convenes in January, than it had for the last one.

Translated into dollars that means the state will have \$2.6 billion more available than the \$8.4 billion available for 1976-77.

Governor Briscoe wants the state to put a billion bucks into savings "for a rainy day." Speaker Bill Clayton has gone the governor one better and suggested the second \$1 billion be rebated to Texas taxpayers through tax reductions, after the governor salts away the first billion.

State Comptroller is more realistic. He says with careful planning Texas can face the future without the threat of new taxes for years to come.

Well, all this can make us a bit giddy. But getting back to practicalities The Dispatch will readily predict the biggest all-out effort by practically everybody to raid the treasury and get their hands on some of that money just as soon as the legislature convenes.

The teachers and the state employees being the best organized will be after the most. The teachers have already signaled that they will be there with new demands.

Then there is the pitiful plight of the state highway department. It already has launched a massive statewide educational campaign to let folks know just how bad a shape it is in. And it really is pretty bad.

Either the gasoline tax is going up, or some of that extra dough the state is gathering is going to have to go to the highway system to put it back on a firm footing. No question about the fact that it is on shaky ground today.

Sign those letters please

About every year or so, we dash off a brief editorial explaining again this newspaper's letter to the editor policy. It's a pretty simple policy. We publish only signed letters — and we use the writer's name.

Of course nobody asks us to withhold their name when they are patting somebody on the back for something. It is only when the letter is critical does it often arrive unsigned, or with the request that the writer's name be withheld. Another unsigned letter arrived from an

In this regard, however, motor fuel taxes make a great recovery in 1975 over 1974 and continued growth is expected despite industry effort to develop small cars and vehicles which get better gas mileage.

We can well remember — and we bet you can too — the opening days of the last legislative session when the lawmakers spent a few hundred million in the first few hours because they had surplus and they went into Austin pledged to take care of certain things first.

With something like \$2.6 extra billion to spend, we wonder what the politicians will do this time. It could be a near riot.

When big cities are verging on bankruptcy and many states have suddenly developed the financial "shakes" due to inflation and rising demands on all sides, the prudence of Texas Governor Briscoe is apparent.

We always have been told that saving money is bad politics, because that can't get anybody any votes. But maybe the Texas voter in the day when financial considerations rank high on the political ladder has become a bit smarter than he used to be.

Maybe we can see the political virtue of running a balanced state government with money in the bank. We actually don't trust our legislative leaders to leave all that money alone though. With a May primary right in front of us and a November election still to go, we expect them to start singing that old political song "Promises, Promises."

The best way Texas can keep some of that tax money for its future is for us, the voters, to insist upon it. We can make our weight felt at these same elections.

And if we don't pay attention, it won't be long before that \$2.6 billion will be gone.



AUSTIN—Comptroller Bob Bullock now figures the 1977 legislature will inherit a \$737 million cash surplus when it convenes next January.

Legislators, according to Bullock's latest projection, will have \$2.6 billion more to spend during the next biennium than the \$8.4 billion available for 1976-77. That is a jump of 31 per cent.

Bullock credited increased consumer spending that boomed sales and motor vehicle taxes, improved tax enforcement and continued increases in oil and gas prices.

The comptroller advised setting some of the surplus aside for a rainy day, tight budgets and careful planning to avoid new taxes for "years to come."

Gov. Dolph Briscoe promptly recommended that \$1 billion should be socked away in a rainy day fund or capital reserve account.

Briscoe said the reserve fund would "insure a fiscally-sound state government for the foreseeable future within the existing tax structure."

House Speaker Bill Clayton went the governor one better, and suggested the second \$1 billion be rebated to Texas taxpayers through tax reductions. Clayton said \$600 million added revenue would take care of necessary inflationary increases.

Wiretaps Urged
Gov. Briscoe will ask legislators to authorize court-ordered and supervised wiretapping to help police organized crime.

Briscoe said the war on crime will be the No. 1 priority item in his legislative program in 1977.

The governor said there is no room for argument as to whether organized crime has penetrated into Texas. The question, he said, centers on the extent of the invasion and how it can be controlled and repelled.

His legislative proposals will include bills to make organized criminal activities a felony, allow electronic surveillance in investigations of organized crime and to permit a defendant to be tried for all organized criminal ac-

tivities in a single trial.

Shots Available

Older citizens in nursing homes can get flu shots starting about July 1.

The vaccine will be for swine influenza, together with the A-Victorian strain.

Regular swine influenza vaccine will be available about September 1.

Two million Texans are expected to get the shots this summer, according to Dr. Fratis Duff, director of the Texas Department of Health Resources.

Another eight million will be immunized in the fall.

Rates Set

A slight increase in property, fire and homeowners insurance rates for the coming year has approval of the State Insurance Board.

The increases on a statewide average amounts to about four per cent, according to board calculations. The adjustment was less than industry recommendations and less than those presented by the board staff at a February 18 public hearing.

The industry sought a 5.1 per cent increase and the staff 5.4 per cent.

Board Chairman Joe Christie said rates on a \$35,000 brick veneer home would increase about \$18 in Galveston, \$16 in Houston, \$12 in Austin and \$21 in Lubbock.

Meanwhile, the board set July 15 at 9 a.m. as the tentative date for its public hearing on automobile insurance rates.

Dispute Put Off

A hot dispute over sale of Colorado River water for nuclear power plant cooling has been postponed until June 16.

Texas Water Rights
Commission delayed a hearing on whether Lower Colorado River Authority can sell the water to Houston Power and Lighting Company for \$1 million. Atty. Gen. John Hill asked for the delay. Hill opposes sale of the water to cool the South Texas Nuclear Project plant.

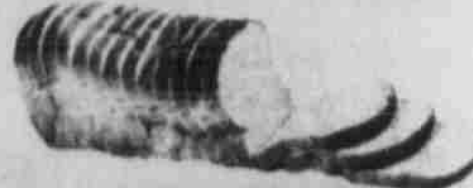

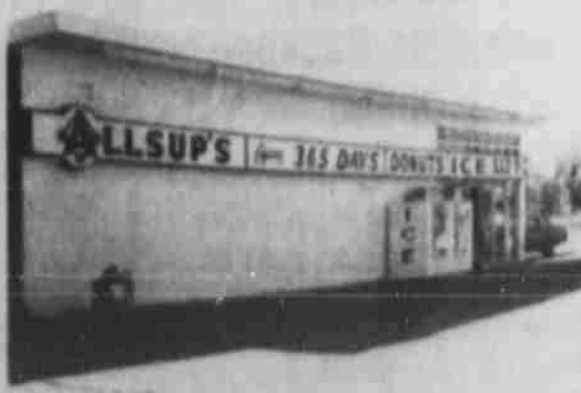

Focus on Home Economics

KEEP CLOTHES CLING-FREE. Static electricity, making garments uncomfortable and unbecoming, can be overcome—or even avoided.

Clothes that cling together or to the wearer have an excess of static electricity. Obtain temporary relief by wiping the garment with a damp paper towel.

And if several garments are involved, dampen each garment or between each layer of fabric. This procedure may need to be repeated several times.

Clinging also may be reduced temporarily in small areas—such as pant legs clinging to socks—by spraying the underside of the problem garment lightly with an aerosol hair spray. But before using, be sure the spray won't damage the fabric or the color by lightly spraying a small section on the underneath hem or seam allowance.

The best solution for removing static electricity is to relax, using a fabric softener. Remove immediately from the dryer when slightly damp. Do not overdry or brush. Many garments, particularly lingerie, are available with antistatic finishes. Carefully following recommended label care procedures is essential to maintain the anti-static electricity, but acetates, acrylics, nylons and polyesters are highly susceptible.

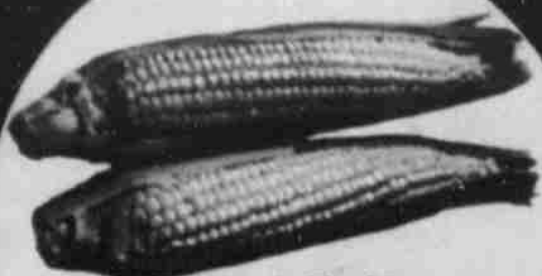

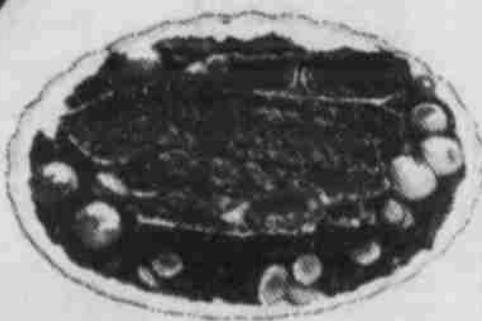

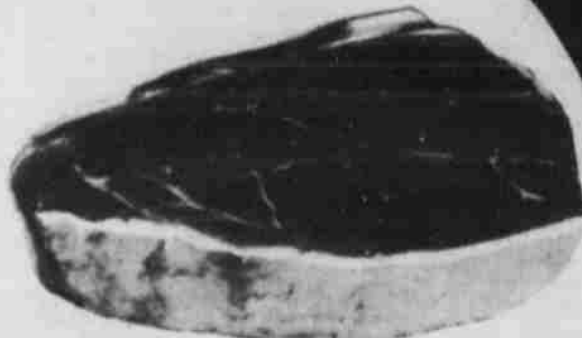

Lopes win District 4AA track crown by one point

Price comes from behind to win showdown relay

Post's Antelopes gained some measure of revenge for their only 1975 football loss Friday afternoon when they came from behind in the final event — the mile relay — to nose out the Slaton Tigers by a single point to win the District 4AA track championship at Denver City.

It was the third straight district track crown for Coach Lane Tannehill's squad.

And if one athlete was more responsible for it than any other he was Edward Price, the Lopes' senior sprinter.

For it was Price who broke the 10-second barrier for the first time in his career to win the 100 yard dash in 9.8 seconds with a wind at his back. And it was Price who won a second first place by winning the broadjump for the first time this spring.

And in the end, it was Price, running anchor on the mile relay team, who passed the Slaton runner on the final turn of his 440 lap to win by a dozen yards to insure the Post victory.

The relay team, composed of Alfred Pena, Randall Wyatt and Steve Davis besides Price, won in 3:30.5 seconds to give Post its final 20 points and a 106 point total to 105 for Slaton, 88 for Roosevelt in third, 85 1/2 for Denver City in fourth, 30 for Tahoka in fifth, 30 1/2 for Cooper which was sixth, and 27 for Frenship which was last.

No records were broken in the district meet which was postponed almost 24 hours from Thursday to Friday because of rain, wind and cold on Thursday after the seven district teams had arrived at Denver City.

The Lopes turned around and drove home and then went back out to Denver City in time to be on hand for the start of field events at 9:30 a. m. Friday morning.

Jimmy Dorland took Post's other first place with a 12 foot, 6 inch pole vault. The real surprise in that event came when Sophomore Evans Heaton cleared the 12 foot mark for a third place.

Price went 21 feet, one inch to win the long jump and Jimmy Dorland jumped 20 feet, 4 inches for a fourth.

With only first and second place finishers qualifying for the regional meet at Odessa April 30-May 1, Ralph Howell with a runnerup effort in the mile was the only other Lope to qualify for the regional other than Price, Dorland and the other three members of the

mile relay team.

Other Post points — every one of them essential to the title effort — included:

440 yard relay team of Pena, S. Davis, Bryan Davis and Price fourth in 44.6 seconds for eight points.

Randall Wyatt third in the 880 yard run in 2:06.0 for six points. Steve Davis fifth in the 440 yard dash in 53.4 for two points. Bryan Davis fifth in 42.9 in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles for two points, and Randy Baker sixth for one point in same event in 43.6.

Pena third in 220 yard dash in 23.6 seconds for six points.

Ralph Howell second in mile run in 5:02.5 for eight points, and Joel Nesmith fourth in same event for four points.

Dale Odom and Danny Saldivar tied for fourth and fifth in the shot put for six points with throws of 44 feet, 8 1/2 inches.

Saldivar placed fifth for two points in the discus with a throw of 126 feet, 6 1/2 inches, and Ray Martinez took sixth for one point with a 124 foot, 4 inch toss.

The only events the Lopes did not place in were the high hurdles and the high jump.

Missed of course was junior Mike Waldrup, out since the third week of the season with a knee injury, who would have picked up points in both the high hurdles and high jump.

Coach Tannehill plans to take his six qualifiers to Mason Saturday for the Mason regional qualifiers track meet because the six need the competition even if it is a long drive down to the hill country.

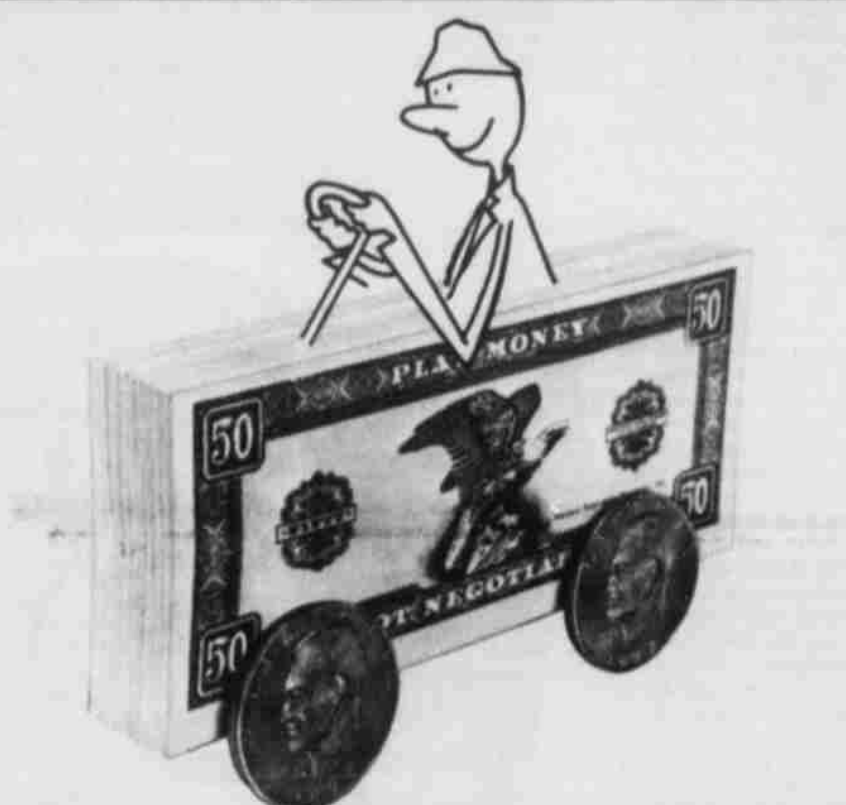

Right Around Home

ALIBATES—AN ANCIENT ARSENAL ON THE TEXAS PANHANDLE

There are nearly 300 units in the National Park System, but none has a longer name than — are you ready for this? — Alibates Flint Quarries and Texas Panhandle Pueblo Culture National Monument.

Whew! That's a mouthful — even for bureaucrats.

What Alibates preserves, in a nutshell is a 12,000-year-old arsenal. The brightly colored flint from the quarry was used by the earliest Americans to slay mammoths. Archeologists have found weapons made from Alibates flint in many places in the Great Plains and Southwest. Even as far away as Oregon.

Today you can walk over the quarry that once supplied nomadic hunters with projectile points and other tools.

Although there are no facilities at Alibates, the monument has more to offer than a 10-word title. If you combine your Alibates tour with a visit to nearby Lake Meredith Recreation Area, you have the makings of an enjoyable vacation in the Texas Panhandle.

The monument is some 32 miles north of Amarillo and 18 miles from Borger just off Texas highway 136.

Begin your visit at Bates Canyon Information Station at Lake Meredith. Guided tours through the quarry pits are conducted by park rangers daily at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. from Memorial Day through Labor Day. Off-season tours are arranged upon request by writing the superintendent at Lake Meredith.

If your trip is overnight, the closest accommodations are in Fritch, six miles north of the Alibates Road on Texas 136. A wider variety of accommodations are found in Amarillo and Borger.

Lake Meredith offers semi-developed camping areas.

But back to the quarry. Most signs of North America's earliest people have disappeared forever. The simple questions about the foods they ate, the languages they spoke are still unanswered. In most cases their own remains have vanished too. Often the only traces of human existence thousands of years ago are the tools and weapons there early people fashioned from stone.

Of all the different kinds of stone used in making tools, one of the most distinctive is Alibates flint. Normally flint has one characteristic shade, but Alibates flint has a multitude of bright colors in endless variations and patterns.

Alibates flint is a hard rock that holds a sharp edge when shaped properly. Early tool-makers were able to chip and flake it into an astonishing variety of everyday tools of survival. Archeologists have found knives, hammers, chisels, drills, axes, awls, fishhooks, buttons, hoes, scrapers, dart-points, and arrowheads — all made of Alibates flint.

Most people who used the flint were nomads — hunters who followed game trails and never built permanent homes. But for a relatively short period, from about 1200 to 1450, some people settled near the quarries to farm and bartered the flint for such items as pottery and seashells. These people are referred to by archeologists as the Panhandle Pueblo Culture —

The beginning and development of the business community in early day Garza had its humorous side. When Mr. Post was sure that the Santa Fe Railroad could someday come through his land holdings, he began to erect homes and business buildings for sale or rent.

Extensive use of native stone made an attractive and inexpensive building, but all other materials had to be freighted by wagons from Colorado City, which was the nearest rail point at that time. The numerous wagons and teams made quite a caravan. Having a head boss for the entire outfit, these caravans were a well organized undertaking, operating with very little lost motion. On one of these trips, they brought a merchant, Sam Farber, a Jew from Boston, back with them.

The cowboys soon found that Sam was a trifle uneasy about the wild animals and Indians that roamed these parts. All the tall tales the boys told around the campfires didn't help either. One night they posted guards to prevent a "surprise Indian raid". In the early morning hours the shooting started, some men fell, and excitement grew all around. Sam panicked and ran. When the shooting and excitement was over, he couldn't be found. After daylight a search party found him quite a distance away, curled up in a gully. Sam showed his good nature when he accepted the joke they had played on him, so he stayed, rented a building, and did very well with his men's store.

The Panhandle Pueblo Culture was so named because its people were Plains Village Indians whose houses show the influence of pueblo style houses of the Southwest.

Texas visitors spent \$3.5 billion in 1975

AUSTIN — Statewide participants in the Texas visitor industry are whistling a happy tune these days. It's entitled "1975 Was a Very Good Year!"

By all previous standards, last year's sun, fun and vacation business went through the ceiling, shattering all previous records for total visitors, length of stay and, most important, expenditures by travelers from out of state.

The cheerful details are contained in the state's annual Texas Visitor Industry Report released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. Their tallies, which they've been conducting since 1947, show an all-time high of 21,819,000 out-of-state visitors in 1975 who spent \$3.5 billion in Texas.

The Department points out that the number of such visitors is actually some 80 percent greater than the number of Texas residents and represents the largest numerical increase in visitors in a single year since

they started counting out-of-state license plates almost 30 years ago.

Rebounding from uncertainties of the oil embargo that cast a pall of gloom over the tourist industry, highway travelers surged back into Texas in unprecedented numbers, topping their previous year's volume by 14.2 percent.

Driving station wagons, pickup campers and herds of recreational vehicles, over 18 million visitors, two million more than in 1974, fanned out over the Lone Star State.

The average auto traveler drove 1,213 miles while in Texas, somewhat more than during the previous year but still fewer

miles than the free-wheeling pre-embargo travelers of 1973.

Twenty percent, exercising their freedom of mobility prerogative, cited no single destination for 1975 vacations. Rather, they rambled on flexible schedules sampling lakes, beaches, historic sites, scenic drives and hosts of campgrounds.

Among Texas cities, Dallas was 1975's most popular destination, followed closely by Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, Brownsville, Austin and Fort Worth.

Reflecting cost-consciousness (most tourists to Texas are family travelers, not the jet set), daily spending per person among auto visitors was \$18.78, a thrifty \$1.22 less than in 1974. However, those visitors stayed longer, 7.6 days compared to slightly less than 7 days in 1974. The net result was more out-of-state dollars left in Texas when they returned home.

Bicentennial Bits

Two traitorous men, and a Boston bookseller gave new direction to the way.

The quarrel with the mother country had been general. The suffering had been pinpointed in Boston. In 1768, troops were quartered there. In 1770, the "massacre" occurred. The "tea party" made the city a target for punishment.

Lexington and Concord and Bunker Hill insured that it would continue to be occupied. Many of its inhabitants had fled. The population shrank from 17 to 7 thousand.

Lack of provisions added to the burden of those who remained. John Andrews wrote, "pork and beans one day and beans and pork another, and fish when we can catch it."

And, surrounded by hostile people, it was not pleasant for the British troops. Officers and men became vexed, frustrated, bored and uneasy.

Smallpox "raged in the streets and cantonments." Scurvy was ever present. Food, medicine, clothing and ammunition shipped from England got lost in transit. One huge shipment fell victim to a raging storm, and to privations.

A British officer wrote home, "We are obliged to live on salt beef, salt pork, much the greater part of which is as hard as wood, as lean as carion, and as rusty as the devil. Could you view our hospitals and see how fast we drop off, your very heart would bleed within you."

George Washington, in command of the Continental Army, lacked artillery Fort Ticonderoga, on Lake Champlain, had ample cannon. To seize it became the goal.

One committee directed Benedict Arnold to raise some men to capture the Fort. Another committee authorized a soldier named Allen to take similar action.

Ethan Allen was a fiery, frontier rebel. His interests were local. His Green Mountain Boys had fought to take from New York the New Hampshire Grants, now Vermont. Arnold and Allen met at the Lake. Allen won the tussle over command.

On May 9, 1775, early in the morning, Allen pounded on the door of the Fort Commander. The sleepy Captain opened up, holding his breeches in his hand. Allen demanded he deliver the fort instantly, "in the name of the great Jehovah and the Continental Congress." (Allen was reputed to be on poor terms with both parties.)

The language may not have been persuasive. But Allen's sword held over the Captain's head, plus 83 patriots, noisily authoritative, left no room for discussion. The surrender was complete.

Seven months later, Colonel Henry Knox, who had learned soldiering reading military books in his Boston book store, offered to go after the cannon. After 300 miles of ice and snow

Pedro (Pete) Saucedo Criado and Floriano Gonzales, charged with criminal mischief in the destruction of a Chevy II Nova Super Sport car Jan. 10, 1976.

Miguel Fuentes and Dorotello Collazo Jr., charged with possession Feb. 28, 1976 of more than four ounces of marijuana.

Johnny Garcia and Abel Martinez, charged with aggravated robbery in the holdup of Mrs. Loucille Morris at the Graham Co-op Gin office Jan. 4, 1976 in which \$97.50 in cash and credit card were taken at knife point. (Tino Hernandez a third youth charged in the holdup pleaded guilty before the grand jury met and is now serving time in the state penitentiary in Huntsville.)

Lily Hernandez, charged with theft (receiving stolen property) in allegedly receiving the money and credit card stolen in the Graham Co-op gin office holdup.

Billy Frank Horner, charged with burglary of a habitation with intent to commit rape (enhanced) on Oct. 20, 1974. Horner was indicted here for aggravated rape on the same date back on Feb. 4, 1975, and a motion to dismiss the case is now pending in district court without the case having been brought to trial.

The indictment of Walker actually is a re-indictment of the local man on the same charge. District Judge George Hansard on March 23 ruled in favor of a motion by Walker's attorney to quash the first indictment because of "insufficiency of description of property taken."

This time the description of the property allegedly taken was set forth in the indictment in considerable detail.

The indictment read in part: "Theft by exercising control to-wit, 6,160 pounds of scrap iron consisting of five 12-inch by 4-foot 1 beams, three 12-inch by 5-foot 1 beams, three 12-inch by 8-foot 1 beams, one 8-inch by 8-foot 1 beam, one 10-inch by 8-foot 1 beam, one 10-inch by 4-foot 1 beam, four 8-inch by 7-foot 1 beams, two 6-inch by 6-foot 1 beams, two 6-inch by 3-foot 1 beams, one 6-inch by 4-foot 1 beam, 29 yellowjack cylinders, two yellow jacks, one jack crank handle, one 5-foot by 8-inch to 8-inch cone shaped hopper constructed of 1/2 inch steel plate, one half section of 5-foot by 8-inch to 8-inch cone shaped hopper constructed of 1/2 inch steel plate, one set of four casters mounted on eight inch channel iron; and a quantity of scrap iron, the weight and description of which is to the grand jurors unknown; of a value of over \$200 but less than \$10,000."
