Machinery Needed Gets First Quotas

On some types of farm machinery and equipment will be with the next few

harrows and planting and other types of machinery will be covered in the quota, the Texas USDA has announced.

State quotas are received, quotas will be established to all parts of the state. The board said in exchange that county quotas must be established before rationing can begin work since certificates cannot be issued in excess of the machinery to individual counties.

For the 1943 program individual contracts will be signed in under the supervision of county committees, he explained.

The census report released this week shows that 3,654 bales of cotton were ginned in Floyd County, from the crop of 1942 prior to November 1, as compared with 43 bales for the crop of 1941.

NO SET RATION FOR DAIRY COWS

There is no "best" ration for dairy cows, according to G. G. Gibson, assistant dairyman for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Every dairyman who is feeding his cows properly, Gibson explains, uses a grain mixture which is suitable to the roughage on hand. For example, sudan pasture which might run 15 per cent protein would require a different grain mixture from sudan grass having containing only about one half the protein content. The simplest method to determine the proper grain mixture for feeding along with roughage, or combination of roughage, is to find the protein content of the roughage and add it to the protein content in the grain mixture. The total should be 27.

Considering the point whether a variety of feeds is needed in grain mixtures, Gibson refers to an Experiment Station test in feeding a simple grain mixture in comparison to a complex one. The former contained ground shelled corn, soybean oil meal and some minerals, and the latter six different feeds plus the minerals. Thirty days feeding of the two groups resulted in practically no difference in production.

One of the best production records in Texas is being made by a herd receiving a mixture of 400 pounds wheat bran, and 100 pounds oats 200 pounds cottonseed meal, 400 pounds wheat bran, and 100 pounds soybean meal. It costs \$1.49 a hundred and contains 19 per cent protein. It is suitable for feeding along with a roughage containing eight per cent crude protein.

"It looks as though more soybean meal is being fed in Texas dairy herds than ever before," Gibson observes. "It is a good protein supplement and can be used to build up the protein content of the ration."

Share the Meat Campaign is Voluntary

The government's share the meat campaign, a voluntary program for consumers, aims at a fair division of available supplies among those who need them, until a system of card rationing can be set up to achieve the same purpose arbitrarily. Meat rationing is not expected until early 1943.

The two one half pounds of beef, lamb and pork allowed per adult per week is sufficient for an adequate diet, provided other necessary foods are included, says Hazel Phipps, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

But, if you are terribly fond of meat flavor and miss it for that reason more than any other, spread the flavor of meat by mixing it with other foods," Miss Phipps says.

The specialist explains that cereal foods such as bread in stuffings, hominy, rice, and macaroni are good "meat extenders." Vegetables can extend the flavor of meat in stews, soups, chowders and pot roasts. With meat rationing many homemakers will learn to become more thrifty with left-overs. They will need to save all left-over meat, gravy, or drippings and make broth of the bones. Left-over cooked meat can be sliced and served cold or in a salad. Or, Miss Phipps says, it can be combined with other foods in appetizing hot dishes such as browned hash, meat pie, stuffed peppers, croquettes, and chop suey.

It will also pay housewives to make greater use of kidney, brains, heart, and other variety meats which are not included in the "sharing allowance." Like other more familiar meats, these are good protection foods and are an especially rich source of iron and the B vitamins, Miss Phipps says.

Ball Fans May See Thanksgiving Games

Austin, November 19.—Postponement of gasoline rationing will give several thousand more Texans opportunity to see the Texas-Texas A. and M. football game here in Memorial Stadium Thanksgiving Day, Business Manager Ed Olle of the University of Texas athletic council declared Saturday.

"We expect a sellout now that there has been an extension in time for people to drive their cars," Olle declared. "This, you know, may be the last Texas-A. and M. game of this sort for some time and many fans are going to take this opportunity to see this classic once more before rationing keeps them from making such trips."

Olle said that there are still grandstand seats available for the tilt, which will be played Nov. 26 at 2:30 p. m. in Memorial Stadium. In addition, 3,500 bleachers will be erected in the South end of the stadium, Olle said.

Reports from Texas A. and M. indicated this week that the cadet corps from College Station would come to Austin in a near mass movement for the game, as A. and M. wants a victory over Texas to make the season a complete success.

4-H Club Girls do Great Work in Collecting Scrap

Texas 4-H Club girls have collected enough scrap rubber for seven battleships, 72 28-ton tanks, with a tire for a bomber thrown in, Onah Jacks, state girls' club agent of the A. and M. College Extension Service, announced in a radio broadcast which opened National 4-H Achievement Week on November 7.

In addition, 4-H members salvaged enough steel for 738 light tanks and enough waste paper to make more than 391,000 cartons for anti-aircraft shells. "With bonds and stamps you've bought, Uncle Sam can buy more than 700 machine guns with 10 rounds of ammunition each," Miss Jacks said in her radio talk addressed to nearly 38,000 club girls.

The state girls' club leader said that 4-H girls comprise a land army over 26,000 strong, and they are "on the job today—plowing, gathering crops, caring for chickens or livestock, or doing other extra farm work." In their ranks also are about eight and a half thousand fire fighters and 600 air raid wardens and plane spotters.

Besides growing food for home use all through the year, 4-H club girls have preserved enough food to supply 1,700 soldiers for a whole year. And there are enough 4-H club girls who have studied first aid and home nursing to supply each of those soldiers with two nurses each—and there would be "more than 400 nurses left over," Miss Jacks said.

Concerning the national observance she said, "This 4-H Achievement Week is intended to give you and others an opportunity to look over your work—see where it's good and make it better. This week is time—to reset your sights and to go at it again to do a finer job for your country and yourself than you've ever done before."

"Freeze" Exempts Some Fencing Materials

Fencing materials at retail levels are not covered in the recent "freeze" order on farm machinery.

However, fencing materials at manufacturer and distributor levels fall under the general "freeze" order and cannot be released until permanent rationing is begun, the Texas USDA War Board said this week.

Under the general order, most types of machinery were "frozen" as of November 1 to allow the government time to establish quotas since permanent rationing will get underway in the near future.

Purpose of the farm machinery rationing program is to route limited farm machinery into essential channels where maximum contribution will be made to the war program.

Food For Freedom Goals to be Announced

Sign-up of Texas farmers in their second year of wartime production will get underway the latter part of December.

State production goals, which will be announced at Memphis, Tennessee, December 7-9, will be allocated to counties and individual farms immediately, B. F. Vance, chairman, Texas USDA war board, said this week.

Critical bottlenecks, such as labor, equipment and transportation are cited by the chairman as reasons why goals would be more difficult to reach in 1943 than in 1942 when agricultural production hit an all-time high.

"At the same time we're running into these shortages, demand for food has increased, not only for our boys in the armed forces, but for Lend-Lease requirements as well," he said.

To date, only two production goals, winter vegetables and hogs, have been announced under the 1943 program.

Freshmen Teams Will Meet at Memorila Stadium

Austin, November 19.—As an annual prelude to the traditional Texas-Aggie football game Thanksgiving, the freshmen teams of the two schools will meet at Memorial Stadium here Saturday, November 21.

Both freshmen outfits have been particularly strong this season and the game this week-end will likely be considered a tossup.

Coach Clyde Littlefield's Yearlings have already played four games, two with service teams, but to win the tilt here Saturday to round out their season which is marred so far by a tie with the Rice Slimes.

Save Leaves, Dead Grass and Other Vegetation

Fallen leaves, dead grass and other vegetation about the place is Nature's plant food in the making. Don't burn it, says J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Save all vegetation and make it

into a compost. Composted vegetation improves the texture of the soil and prevents it from becoming hard and crusty. The more compost added to the soil the better. It is especially helpful in maintaining high quality in growing vegetables, Rosborough says.

In making compost, prepare a simple frame enclosure, then put down a layer of lawn trimmings, weeds, or other vegetative matter and cover with a thin layer of dirt. Add water if the material is dry. Let the pile remain for about 10 days or two weeks then fork it so that the portion at the bottom will be on the top. After two or three spadings he heat will have disappeared and the material then is ready for use. The decaying process will destroy the fertility of weed seeds.

Compost has sufficient nitrogen, especially if a little barnyard manure is mixed with it. But it likely will be deficient in phosphorus and potash. In order to sup-

ply adequate plant food, Rosborough suggests mixing the phosphorus with the compost and plowing or spading it six or eight inches into the soil. Additional nitrogen and potash can be applied just prior to sowing the seed.

For growing carrots, beets and cabbage in winter gardens, compost is a valuable addition to the soil, the horticulturist says.

Increased Interest In Religion is Being Shown

Perrin, Field, Texas, November 19.—Perrin Field men, like those at other army posts, have shown an increased interest in religion since entering the service, believes Captain Aljoe Watters, post chaplain.

Captain Watters ascribed the heightened religious interest to a closer relationship between chaplain and soldier than exists between minister and congregant in civil life, the respect the army accords religion, a tie with home offered by the church, and the sobering effect on the job the army has to do.

"Along with the intensive military training carried on in our camps, our government has not had its eyes shut to the necessity of depending upon a Supreme Power to aid the nation in this great crisis," Captain Watters said.

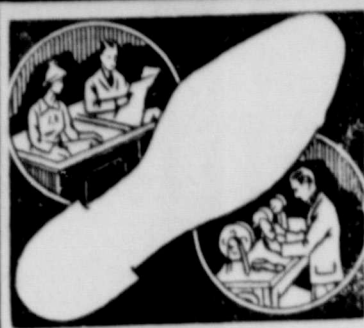
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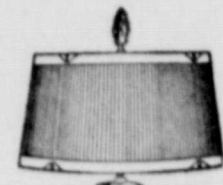

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Many Farmers are Attending Training Courses

More than ten thousand farmers of Texas are attending the 606 Rural War Production Training courses now being offered in 383 communities in Texas, according to Rob't A. Manire, State Director of Vocational Agriculture of the State Department of Education, who is in charge of the new program. M. F. Thurmond, State Supervisor of the new program, expects all of the 687 Vocational Agriculture Departments approved for offering this training to be operation by January 1.

Nearly a half million dollars in hand tools and equipment for farm machinery repair were placed in the Vocational Agriculture Shops last year for the Out-of-School Youth Training. On the new program this equipment is being used in 382 courses in farm machinery repair being offered farmers in 198 counties in Texas. These farm machinery repair courses are ten weeks in length and the meetings are usually at night, three hours a night for five nights a week. In these courses farmers bring in their farm implements that need repair and, with the aid of their instructor, make the necessary repairs of their equipment. No charge is made for attending, for the use of tools and even for certain limited amounts of consumable supplies. In addition to getting their farm machinery in a good state of repair the farmers learn how to do simple welding, blacksmith, and general repair work on their own implements. In many instances these farmers have completely overhauled their tractors, cultivators, disc plows, stalk cutters, grain drills, plows, row-binders, combines, and middle-busters; while an ever increasing number of single-row horse drawn implements are being converted into two-row tractor drawn imple-

ments. In one shop twenty cotton dusters and other needed implements were constructed from scrap metals.

The new program also provides for courses to be offered farmers, with the view of helping them increase production of certain commodities, particularly peanuts, milk, eggs, poultry, pork, beef, and mutton, lamb and wool. Only one commodity is considered in any one course, but demonstrations and illustrations cover all practical improved practices for that commodity. These courses are usually 20 hours in length and are held in two to ten weeks, depending on what meeting arrangement is most convenient to the farmers. In a few cases the Vocational Agriculture Teacher is the instructor, but he usually serves in a supervisory capacity. In most instances farmers who are outstanding in some phase of production are used for instructors because of their having had actual experience under local conditions. Even

though the labor shortage has greatly lengthened the harvest period, particularly in the western part of the State, 224 of these production courses are already in operation and are maintaining an average attendance of 17 persons per meeting.

The Federal allotment calls for a quota of 79,000 farmers of Texas to receive the Rural War Production Training during the ensuing year. This means that the 667 communities approved to offer this training must reach an average of 115 farmers, but in all probability, Manire says, "the Vocational Agriculture Teachers of Texas will see to it that our State far exceeds that number in helping the farmers produce the necessary foods to help win the war and write the peace."
