Flower Grove Youth Killed By Lightning To Build Road To New Oil Field Immediately

Merchants Hold Breakfast Here Tuesday Morning Steering Committee Of Five Is Chosen

Another merchants breakfast was held at the Plaza Hotel Tuesday morning at which time between thirty and forty civic leaders of Lamesa gathered to discuss the possibilities of the new oil field west of town.

Ways of taking full advantage of the situation were discussed by various speakers. It was decided at this meeting that the first move should be the securing of a road direct from Lamesa to the pool. The Dawson County Commissioners Court have assured business leaders that every facility of the county will be used to secure a road as quickly as possible. Although no definite route has been decided upon, it is understood that a road will take off due west from the Brownfield road to the well. The Court promises every speed in building the road, and it is understood that the Gaines County Commissioner from that precinct has agreed to take care of the Gaines County section of the road, which will be approximately two miles.

It was further announced by Judge W. M. Yates, that a road running north from the Lamesa Seminole road would be built across Gaines County, and another north from the well in Gaines county to connect with the Welch-Seagraves road.

Plans were also discussed for the hiring of a man, to be paid by the business men of the town, to establish contact with drilling crews, oil company officials, and others, who would be potential residents of Lamesa, and in general to look after the interests of Lamesa in the relation between the field and the nearest shopping point. It is understood that efforts are being made to secure a man who is acquainted with the oil fraternity and one in whom they have confidence, feeling that such a man could possibly do more than one who is not familiar with oil field operations.

The building of additional apartments and houses in Lamesa was also discussed and reports were that several new building projects are being contemplated by local capital.

The steering committee consists of S. L. Forrest, F. T. McCollum, L. B. Vaughn, W. B. Collins and Sam Richardson.

It is understood that several meetings of various groups will be held from time to time.

Air Show Will Be Staged Here On Sunday Oct. 1st Promise Thrilling Stunts For Public

He will also pull a stunt that has never been shown here when he jumps from a car running 70 miles per hour. Those who have seen this stunt, say that he is either crazy, lucky or knows how to do it as the odds are 85 to 1 that he will not be successful.

Linguist, Fort Worth; three sons, Tom, Perry and Grady of Bledsoe, 33 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Hancock school house Wednesday afternoon at 2 p. m. conducted by Rev. W. B. Wages. Interment was in the Hancock cemetery. Pallbearers were his six grandsons.

Additional Parity Checks received by Dawson County farmers Friday and Saturday brought the total received from the 1939 crop to \$127,040, divided among 917 farmers for an average of \$138.50 each. Discount Is Offered To Taxpayers Of Dawson Co.

The Forty-sixth Legislature recently passed a law allowing a discount to tax payers under the following conditions:

If 1939 taxes are paid during the month of October, the taxpayer is to receive a three (3%) percent discount. If taxes are paid during the month of November, the tax payer will receive a two (2%) discount. If taxes are paid during the month of December the tax payer will receive a one (1%) discount. If the taxes are paid during the month of January, 1940, there will be no discount.

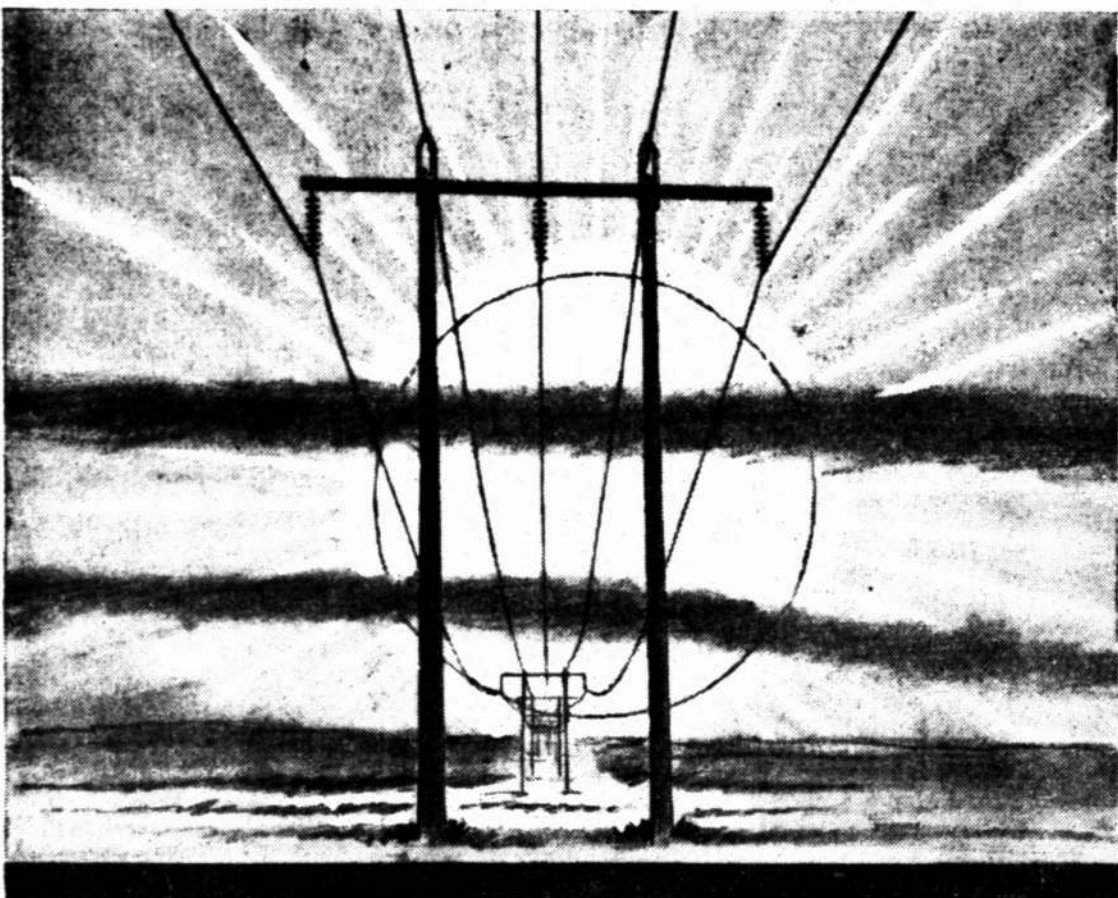

Cotton Estimate Down for 1939

Dawson County, which produced 40,196 bales in 1938, will yield only 28,000 bales in 1939, according to the estimate. Further figures reveal that Lynn County would replace Lubbock County as the leader, with Lubbock second, Lamb third, Dawson and Crosby tied for fourth, and Hockley sixth. England Moves To Save Books

England sped to remove her rare book and manuscript collections to safety a full week before war flared on the Polish front, a University of Texas scholar, now in London, has written his colleagues at Austin.

Dr. Harry Ransom, assistant professor of English, who left the campus in July to spend a year abroad, found English museum authorities gathering up great cases of materials to transfer them from London's danger zone, and reported British sentiment "united" as contrasted with the 1914 split.

Letters he wrote August 25 to Drs. R. A. Law and R. H. Griffith at Austin reveal that British newspapers were then printing no inflammatory propaganda.

"This week has provided a great change of England's self-possession into magnificent courage," he told Dr. Griffith. "I make no sense of claims and counter-claims about munitions; but if spirit has anything to do with waging war, Hitler is sure of a sad awakening when he undertakes to fight Great Britain."

Bureau Doubles Service To State

Almost doubling its fact-finding job, The University of Texas bureau of engineering research announced today it would this fall delve into four new engineering problems of the Southwest.

The bureau will bolster its present five-pronged program—ranging from Texas air-conditioning to exploitation of Texas lignite as a commercial fuel—with new laboratory research projects on (1) Texas food stuff preservation with quick-freezing methods, (2) foodstuff preservation by dehydration, (3) heating shale, and (4) low-cost Texas housing.

The expansion is permitted by a \$3,000 increase in the bureau's annual budget.

One of four cooperating agencies of the University's recently launched Texas Industrial and Commercial Research Council, the engineering research bureau is supplemented by fact-finding departments in business research, economic geology and industrial chemistry.

Quick freeze and evaporation processes are to be explored to provide an economical wedge for an invasion of the northern market by Texas foodstuffs, Dean Woolrich said.

A study of the heating shale problems confronting coastal rigs is designed to slice thousands of dollars from production expense. The bureau will also seek means of commercial exploitation of the vast quantities of Texas building material such as granite and marble, with an eye to lowering construction costs within the state, he added.

Texas Poultry Huge Industry

In poultry, Texas has an industry that grosses around \$44,000,000 a year, and the state has come from nowhere in the national picture to rank fifth in number of chickens, fifth in total value of eggs produced, and eighth in value of poultry produced for market.

The industry, often forgotten because of Texas' predominance in the production of cotton and livestock, contributes an annual gross equal to the sale of a million bales of cotton at eight cents per pound.

Texas poultry producers have an investment of \$13,000,000 in their 24,000,000 chickens, and in 1939 took in \$30,000,000 from sale of eggs, \$8,500,000 from turkeys, and \$5,000,000 from dressed poultry.

Director H. H. Williamson of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service points out that this is a creditable rating when it is considered that Texas is a long way from Eastern markets and that most of the advance has been made in the past 25 years.

"At the same time, if Texas farmers are to get what they should out of poultry, there must be an increase in the quantity and quality of poultry and poultry products offered for market," the director said.

He quoted the 1935 farm census figures showing that the average production of hen on Texas farms was only 53 eggs per hen.

Seew Lawn Now Is Advice Of Expert

Grass planted now will reap the benefit of fall rains and cool weather, and there is no better time than this month to level a lawn or to set out grass.

Sadie Hatfield, landscape specialist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, in offering this suggestion points out that grass pays big dividends the year round.

In summer, she says, it reduces glare and increases comfort of the home by giving off moisture with an appreciable cooling effect; in wet weather it decreases the amount of mud and prevents erosion; in dry weather it reduces the amount of dust.

The specialist comments that in Texas there is a large variety of grasses from which to choose. Native buffalo grass, which is similar to bermuda, is easily destroyed by cultivation, but it is also resistant to drought. Commonly known as mesquite grass, it is satisfactory in Central and West Texas. San Augustine grass does well along the coast and in areas not more than 80 miles inland. In North Texas blue grass can be grown successfully. Rescue grass does well in the winter time and will grow in the shade, she adds.

She concludes, "For a winter lawn, Italian rye grass may be sown in the early fall on freshly cut grass. When it has been watered thoroughly, it will come up and soon form a beautiful green lawn which will last all winter."

The deadline for accepting applications for 1937 cotton price adjustment payments is October 1, 1939. Applications for 1938 conservation payments must be made before January 1, 1940.

Each acre of commercial orchard on a farm as of January 1, 1939, adds \$1.50 to the regular AAA allowance available to the farm to be earned by terracing, planting legumes or cover crops, establishing permanent pastures or carrying out some other specified soil-building practice.

Commercial vegetable acreage allotments are to be set up in about 125 Texas counties for 1940. No county will be asked to reduce below acreage planted to this crop in the county in 1939. The program, which will be voluntary, merely is intended to keep commercial vegetable acreage from expanding.

Cleve Austin Writes On Wonders Of Minnesota

The following is a most interesting letter received by Mrs. Lila Cason, from Cleve R. Austin, formerly assistant postmaster of the Lamesa post office, and now Post Office Inspector, located in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Mr. Austin is well known in Dawson County, having been practically reared in this county. His letter, describing the beauties of Minnesota, as seen through a Texan's eye, follows:

Hutchinson, Minnesota
August 13, 1939

Mrs. Lila D. Cason,
General Delivery Clerk,
Lamesa, Texas.

Dear Lila:

I think that I have been telling you something about this State of Minnesota in letters previous to this, but it would be very easy for a fellow to fall in love with it. Guess that the summer is the most appropriate time to visit here for the first time and witness its deep forests, cool lakes and singing streams. The entire state and region about is replete with Indian lore and the early history of our country and frontiersmen. Just at the edge of the city square here in Hutchinson the people have erected a stone monument to the early settlers of this country who so successfully resisted an attack of Chief Little Crow and his band of Crow Indians away back just exactly 77 years ago last Friday, August 4, 1862. They have also erected a monument to Chief Little Crow himself, with his hand raised, shading his face as he looks out over the rolling prairies for the pale-faced men who relentlessly marched westward across this vast expanse. Something like this is inscribed on the foot of his statue: "We are remembering that as the sunset reddens the western sky that the blood of the Red Man runs red as well as that of the White Man". In a belated attempt to acknowledge the rights of the Indian or so it seems to me. These many lakes where the buffalo watered were always points of conquest and contest between the early white and red men.

It was through Grand Portage at Mineral Center that the early fur traders had to make their "long" or "grand" portage with their furs secured from the Chippewa Indians of the great Northwest across the lands to reach the waters which flowed eastward, with their valuable cargoes. Just opposite the town of Maiden Rock juts out a high rock, and according to the accounts of the early travelers, it was from this pinnacle that the Sioux maiden of Wabasha's band, prevented from marrying the warrior of her choice, leaped to her death, that she might avoid a union with an older brave. Fate could have been kinder to her and directed her devotion to a brave of her own tribe, it seems to me.

The Red Pipestone Quarry is located on the only soft red stone for hundreds of miles around, and it was for centuries, very probably long before the white man ever came to this country, that the Indians sent to this place some of their braves who quarried in a crude way the soft stone for their ceremonial and especially their peace pipes. The region was sacred and many legends cluster round it. One of them is that no matter how fierce the wars were waged between the fierce tribes, when their representatives met on this sacred ground, their animosity was laid aside and no blood was ever shed on this spot. Over in Minneapolis is the Minnehaha Park and with Lake Hiwatha are the Minnehaha Falls that inspired Longfellow's immortal "Sons of Hiwatha". But they are disappointing small now. You have seen many a calendar with a pretty Indian maiden by a waterfall and it does not require much imagination to picture such a scene with its natural setting in the long ago by this waterfall. The forests in the northern part of the state are so dense and plen-

tiful that it is not uncommon for a person to get lost even today in them. There have been two small boys and one grown man lost for several days each already this month in these forests. The deer abound here too. The Land O' Lakes with its excellent fishing attract so many tourists that some of them get careless and don't realize that when they are unaccustomed to finding their way about in woods they lose their direction and it results in their getting lost.

Harvest or threshing time is here and the crops have been most bountiful. Some of the best corn that I ever saw is passing the roasting-ear stage and will soon be ripe. Many of the farm homes together with their really big barns cost as much as ten thousand dollars to build several years ago. Quite a few of the farmers have retired and are living their old age in peace and free from financial worries. There are no foreigners to speak of, everyone speaking our

language. No negroes at all away from the cities, and only a few there. I think that I have seen two families of Mexicans. Of course, the Swedish dialect predominates, and they can all tell that I am from the South, but that is supposed to wear off in a few years. The Olsons and Andersons are numerous. Some of the Polish names like Kandajohi, Kamieczny, Glatzbaugh, and Cieminski, from Russian descent twist up my tongue considerably.

The duck hunting season will soon open, and yesterday we took a country route to our office of investigation and drove by and among about a half dozen small lakes, some of them covering more than a section and others larger, and some are only about a quarter or a half mile apart and on this strip between them are the "duck-passes" where hunters can stand on

dry land and shoot ducks. The season opens on pheasants soon and they are more plentiful this year, or so I am told, and we frequently see one of the brightly colored birds cross the road in front of the car. I am telling you, all in all, it would not be hard to fall in love with Minnesota. No sandstorms, no hayfever (the people here do not seem to know what hayfever is!) and plenty of attractions on the other hand. The people here will all swear by it, have landed here from the old countries and have remained here for generations. They are good, loyal citizens, too. Ask Blackmon about the Swedes coming back to Minnesota after the World War that lived here before it. I have not gotten around to the description of the winter sports of skiing, ice skating and winter carnivals as it is a little early for them now. They even fish in the winter

by cutting a hole in the ice and spearing the fish through it. I believe it was mentioned before that it was from Minnesota that Hollywood secured the expert ice skaters to make the picture, "Ice Polies of 1939." did I not? We fully intend to learn to ice skate some time in the future if the winters are spent here. There are many exciting games of hockey between expert teams during the winter too. The golf course here at Hutchinson compares very favorably with the one at Cloudcroft and reminded me of the one there the instant I first saw it.

This letter may sound like a Chamber of Commerce boost, but why not? It's all here!

Texas' New "HOT CHECK" Law

Effective September 20, 1939

Summary Of The Law!

- SECTION 1 It shall be unlawful for any person with intent to defraud, to obtain money, goods, service, labor or other thing of value.
- SECTION 2 Or, to pay for any goods, service, labor or other thing of value heretofore received;
- SECTION 3 Or, to secure or retain possession of any personal property to which a lien has been attached . . . by the drawing or giving of any check, draft or order upon any bank, person, firm or corporation if such person does not
- (A) Have sufficient funds to pay such check, draft or order.
 - (B) Non-payment of same by bank shall be prima facie evidence of intent to defraud.
 - (C) The notice of protest shall be admissible as proof of presentation and non-payment, and shall be prima facie evidence.
 - (D) Under Section 3: Removal of such personal property from the premises upon which it was located at the time of such check, draft, or order, was drawn or given, shall be prima facie evidence that possession of such property was retained or secured by giving or drawing of said check, draft, or order.

The Penalties

For the first conviction of a violation of the law, in the event the check, draft, or order, is \$5.00 or less, the punishment shall be:

By imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding two years, or by fine not exceeding \$200.

On checks, drafts, or orders over \$5.00, but less than \$50.00, the punishment shall be:

By imprisonment in the County Jail not exceeding two years, or by fine not exceeding \$500.

On checks, drafts, or orders in the amount of \$50.00 or more the punishment shall be:

By confinement in the penitentiary for not less than two years, nor more than ten years.

Penalties for second and third offenses increase under the law.

IMPORTANT

Checks, drafts, or orders filed on cannot be withdrawn. If any person who has heretofore filed a complaint with any District Attorney in Texas, alleging a violation, shall suggest to or request the District Attorney or County Attorney that such case be dismissed, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than \$100 and not more than \$500.

right on, as the people who will serve you are not strangers, but the folks you have been dealing with."

The two brothers are still here this week, and will probably remain several days longer, it was stated, to get acquainted with the set-up here.

This mill is one of Lamesa's largest enterprises and carries the largest payroll in the town. It has shown a remarkable growth since Smith Bros. purchased it, under the capable management of J. Fred Smith. There has been a steady enlargement program, which has brought it from one of the obscure unknown mills, to among the best in West Texas.

Mr. Kimbell of Fort Worth, already has some connections in Lamesa, owning the Kimbell Milling Company directly south of the mill as well as being one of the partners in Hestand-Kimbell Wholesale house in Lamesa. He has wide holdings over the entire state, in both mills and wholesale houses, as well as operating a large flour mill in Fort Worth.

Mr. Norris of Ada, also has wide holdings in cotton gin mills and oil property. This is his first investment in Lamesa, however.

Operations are now in full progress at the mill and they are turning out meal, cake, oil, and other products.

The committeemen and office officials greatly appreciate the fine cooperation of the farmers of the county in making it possible to receive partly checks along with other counties in this section and the committee is hoping this record can be duplicated in getting our soil conservation checks on time. Mr. Meeks also stated that farmers who expected to receive full payment should not sell peas, can or sudan seed from soil conserving acres.

He stressed the value of ensilage for feed, the starting of cattle slowly and adequate watering facilities, as being important factors in successful feeding for the markets.

Around The World At The Communion Table

The International date-line by which a new day is reckoned is the 180th meridian in the Pacific Ocean, west of Hawaii. Our World-Wide Communion Day, therefore, begins in Japan and Chosen, with our missionaries and the Church of Christ in Japan, and the Korean Presbyterian Church.

If they celebrate the sacrament at, let us say eleven o'clock Sunday morning, it is then nine o'clock Saturday evening in New York. Then for twenty-one hours the celebration moves around the world until it too closes at our St. Lawrence Island Presbyterian Church off the coast of Alaska.

None of us have ever sat as guests at so long a table, circling the earth, our Lord its host, and all of us who sit about it brethren under His loving invitation.

Let us follow the celebration around the world. After its beginning in Japan and Chosen there will next be the celebration in China, from Peiping in the north to Hainan in the south, all in one hour zone. In this zone also lie the Philippine Islands and the zone is one hour later than Japan.

Another hour later will be the

celebration in Siam, north and south alike in excellent edifices and in bamboo chapels. Next will be India in two hour-zones beginning at Allahabad, our easternmost station, and closing at Ratnagiri and Vengurla on the southwest coast. When our brethren gather there at Tabriz last, there will be Moslem converts at all tables in this land.

After India the celebration renews at Iran (old Persia), passing by Afghanistan, where, alas! there will be no Christian service of any kind, one of the two closed doors. Believers at Meshed will sit down first at the Lord's Table and those at Tabriz last. There will be Moslem converts at all tables in this land.

Then will come Iraq (old Mesopotamia) where we will cooperate in a union mission with the Reformed Church in a widely fanatical area where Roger Cumberland was murdered during the year. But here also the Sacrament of Love will be celebrated.

Then an hour later, the celebration will begin in Syria, starting at the desert station, Deir-oz-zore, and closing on the Mediterranean coast in Beirut, Tripoli, and Sidon. This is the oldest mission of the church and its Syrian Church is vigorous and ready to share in a world-wide program.

One hour later, far south of Syria, the missionaries and the churches of the west coast of Africa will carry on the celebration. Wide as the work in Africa seems it is one hour-zone, beginning with the easternmost station, Mombasa, and closing many miles west at the Atlantic coast in Kribi, Batanga, Douala and Benito. If these brethren gather at eleven on Sunday morning, it will be very early, 4 and 5 o'clock in New York. Here the Atlantic Ocean must be

crossed. The celebration will be renewed in Brazil, but four hours later. South America is covered by two hour-zone. After Brazil, the celebration will be held in Venezuela and an hour later still in Colombia, far in the north, and in Chile, far in the south, but both in the same hour-zone. The Table will be widely spread and the sacred words will be said in Portuguese, Spanish and in many an Indian tongue.

With the celebration in western South America will come the celebration in the Caribbean area, Guaba, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic. Here also begins the celebration in New England and New York and down the American coast to Florida and throughout the east.

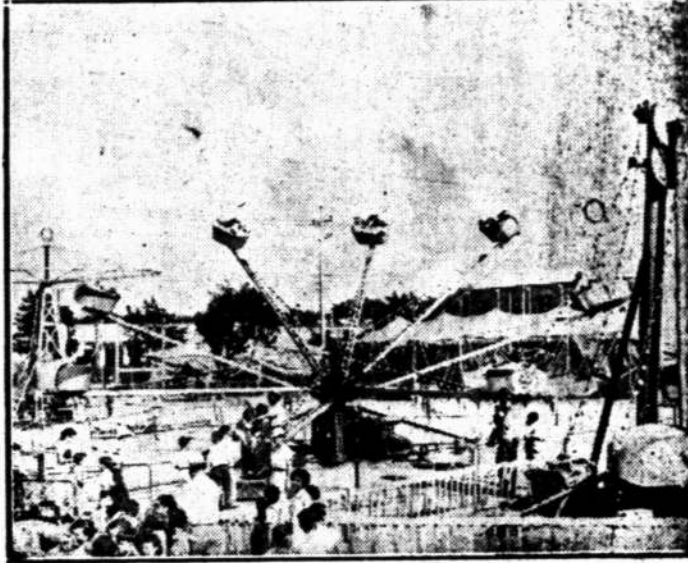
West of Ohio, the time changes and a new celebration occurs in the hour-zone of Chicago, in the many churches of the great central area of the United States. At the same time the celebration will occur in Guatemala, Central America and in Mexico.

Then will come Rocky Mountain time, from Montana to the Rio Grande, in the cities, the rural sections, the Mormon country and the Indian churches.

An hour later (with the time 2 p. m. in New York) the Pacific coast will join the celebration in the great area of the states of Washington, Oregon and California, including many Mexican churches under the guidance of their American brethren.

But the celebration does not end here. An hour later still, Alaskan brethren will take their places at the Table in all those stations from Klawock to Fairbanks, whose names are familiar to Presbyterians.

The day approaches its end in the church at Point Barrow where the Rev. and Mrs. Klerkoper are holding the fort so bravely, and in the church at St. Lawrence Island where Miss Anna Bannon holds an equally difficult outpost. There is a sentimental thrill in the fact that Mrs. Klerkoper is the daughter of a Chosen missionary who helps to

If she doesn't do something about them quickly, many of her unwelcome callers will soon be great-grandchildren. With insects large families are the rule.

Since the only reason insects come into the kitchen is to find food, the women who discovers any of these six-legged invaders should first get all food out of their way. She should see that garbage is disposed of soon as possible — that the lids on metal garbage cans be

killing ants that come out into the open in large numbers. The ordinary kerosene-pyrethrum sprays on the market are excellent for killing ants that can actually be hit with the spray.

Both ant powder and poison baits should be used carefully so they don't get into food and so that children and pets do not get hold of them. Sodium fluoride powder, which is poisonous to man as well as ants, is a cheap and easily applied control for ants — if the ants take to it. Sprinkle it about the window sills, drainboards, foundations, and other places where ants crawl, but where it will not interfere with housekeeping operations.

But if the ants keep coming on in spite of this dusting of powder, try a poison bait. No one bait can be depended on to kill all kinds of ants. And it may be necessary to try several kinds before finding one that the ants like and will take back to the colony for food. Some ants like sweets — others prefer greasy foods.

Farmers Warned To Take It Easy

There is no reason for Texas farmers to get the jitters on account of war, agricultural leaders here believe.

Commenting on a statement from Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace, George Slaughter, chairman of the State Agricultural Conservation Committee of the AAA, says farmers have every reason to operate as though the peace of Europe had not been shaken.

"Agriculture is in better shape to withstand the impact of war," Slaughter asserted, "than it was in 1914, and the same machinery which farmers have used to adjust their acreage to slackening demand can be used just as effectively to increase production should the need arise."

He quoted as follows from Wallace's letter: "There is little likelihood that any substantial increase in production of the major crops is desirable, certainly not in the near future. In any case, the need for increase in supplies can be anticipated in ample time to make any necessary increases in acreage."

"This year's wheat carryover is estimated at 254 million bushels, in comparison to 115 million bushels for the five years from 1924 to 1928. The present large supply of corn probably will make the total supply for 1939-40 even larger than the 1938-39 supply."

"Supplies of meat animals are expected to be larger next year than for this year, and continued heavy production of milk this fall is expected. Combined supplies of cottonseed oil, lard and soybean oil available for home consumption will be larger during the rest of this year and 1940 than for 1938."

"Loans which are a part of the ever-normal granary are available to prevent price collapses. They can prevent such a disaster to farmers as befall cotton growers in 1914-15."
