Campers learn how a cooperative functions by organizing and operating a Co-op Canteen during their camping period.

NEW BUILDING CONSTRUCTION ON SCHOOL CAMPUS

The Board of Education of Abernathy Public Schools met June 1 at 8:00 p. m. in the board room. Those in attendance at the meeting were: L. J. West, president; Billie Harrison, vice president; Joe Lovelace, secretary; Lon Carmickle; Joe Oswalt; David Pinnson; Bob Riley; Dr. Delwin Webb, superintendent; and Earl Carter, business manager. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented and the following reports were given: budget progress report showing that 97.88% of the current tax roll had been collected; enrollment for the year was 1123 excluding the kindergarten. It was pointed out that there is only a variance of 29 students from the peak enrollment to the end of the year enrollment.

Other reports included students insurance claims and reimbursements, reports from the school nurse and lunchroom manager, report on summer school operation at the elementary level. The elementary summer school program is operated this year on a teacher-student conference basis and not regularly scheduled classroom work. At the high school level only driver education and home economics are being offered.

The board reviewed the contract on the vocational education building being constructed by United Steel of Lubbock. The building is scheduled for completion August 1, 1970 and will include a room for power mechanics and a room for special education vocational work. The restrooms will serve the building and will be open during football games at Antelope Stadium.

Mrs. Sherry Pruner was elected as girls physical education teacher and will be assistant girls basketball coach.

In other action the board approved changes in assignments for Mr. Frank Bartlett to be junior high principal, Mr. Gid Addison to be gifted and special education director, and Mr. Wendell Jones to be evaluator/counselor for the bilingual program.

The next regular session of the board will be July 2 at 8:00 p. m. in the board room.

Plant Disease, Insect Clinic Set June 22

Plans have been made by County Agent, Ollie Linder, to have a Plant Disease and Insect Clinic in Plainview at the Reddy Room of Southwestern Public Service Company, 304 West 6th, Plainview, on Monday, June 22 from 9:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

Onhand for the clinic will be Dr. Robert W. Berry, Plant Pathologist; Dr. Don Rummel, Area Entomologist; and Jim Valentine, Area Soil Chemist, all with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock and the County Agent, Ollie Linder.

Attendance at this clinic will be on a come and go basis. Both men and women living on the farm or in town are invited to take advantage of this clinic if they have plants that are not growing just right or are discolored, or if they have insect trouble, to bring them in, get them identified within a few minutes and be on their way home in a short time. There will be no formal meeting. This is just a come and go affair for conferences with these specialists.

Everyone is encouraged by the County Agent to bring in their diseased plants and their insects for identification at the Reddy Room on Monday, June 22.

Either fight the Vietnam war like we did World War II, TO WIN, or get out.

All of the men who have died in Korea and in Vietnam, on both sides, are tragic and mute testimony that the United Nations is a curse to the entire world. These political wars, instead of military wars, came up because of the United Nations.

Had there been no United Nations, President Harry Truman would have let the late General Douglas MacArthur win a clear-out victory in Korea.

Another example of the uselessness of the United Nations is the war in the Middle East. United Nations representatives pulled up stakes, turned and ran when the shooting began between Israel and the Arabs.

-tip- Remember several years ago when a U.S. Air Force officer made the statement that communists were infiltrating the churches of the United States? He was given a stern reprimand by his superiors. With clergymen joining the rioters, and coddling AWOLs and the draft dodgers, it seems that the Air Force officer was correct in his statement. Clergymen taking such action make up only a small percent of the Nation's church leaders.

NO POWER SHORTAGE IN SWPS TERRITORY

"Don't hold back. Use all the electric power you want wherever you want in the 45,000 square mile area that we serve. There is no electric power shortage in this part of the country," Roy Tolk, president of the Southwestern Public Service Company, said today.

The statement of the electric company president was made as a result of frequent articles in national magazines and other media which leave the implication that the whole nation faces a power shortage not only this year but "in the decade ahead," as one publication put it. "At the end of last year, when we announced our plans to invest \$25,000,000 in new plant and equipment this year, I said, 'there'll be no blackouts in our service area in 1970.' That still goes. I'll add at this time that there won't be any in the future, either, as long as we have the right to plan our own future without outside interference. We have a responsibility to meet the electric service needs of this area and we have done the planning required to carry out that responsibility," Tolk continued.

Southwestern Public Service Company has generating capability reserves that are 18% greater than the peak load which has been predicted for 1970.

"That's like saying you have \$118 but aside to pay a \$100 bill that you owe," Tolk pointed out.

Adequate reserves are normally considered to be generating capability that is equal to the largest single generating unit on your system. Southwestern's reserve capability for 1970 exceeds that margin of safety by nearly 100,000 kilowatts.

Southwestern is already looking down the line at its next 500,000 kilowatts of electric generating capability. At the present time, a 210,000 kilowatt unit, the first in a new facility southeast of Lubbock, is under construction and is scheduled to go into service in mid-1971. Projected units of 280,000 kilowatts of capability are in the planning stage for 1972 and beyond.

"With the help of our area development department and in cooperation with other local industrial development groups, I have started to write to presidents of some companies and to telephone others whose organizations are interested in expansion to tell them of the availability of electric power and other resources in this area. We have outstanding people,
