OIL PRODUCTION OVER SEVEN MILLION BARRELS IN 1950

Oil production in the Talco, Sulphur Bluff and Pewitt Ranch fields amounted to 7,008,996 barrels during the year 1950, according to figures supplied this newspaper by the Mt. Pleasant office of the State Railroad Commission.

Read those figures again—seven million, eight thousand nine hundred and ninety-six barrels.

A breakdown of those figures showed that Talco field in Titus and Franklin Counties with 721 wells and an allowable of 41 barrels per day produced 5,860,778 barrels.

Sulphur Bluff field in northern Hopkins County, ten miles east of Talco's west outpost well, with 62 producing wells and an allowable of 65 barrels per day, produced 706,803 barrels.

Pewitt Ranch in northern Titus, ten miles east of Talco's eastern outpost wells, with 112 producing wells at present, produced 441,415 barrels. It must be remembered, however, that Pewitt field is less than two years old, and many wells have been drilled there in 1951, whose production is not included in the above figures for 1950. These figures will probably be more than doubled for 1951 production, due to the increase in the number of wells drilled this year.

October allowable is for 25 days, compared to 24 in September. Most of the wells in all three fields are able to produce their allowable with much more to spare. There are a few marginal wells which do not produce their allowable, some of which need to be rehabilitated.

For instance there is the well on the Unsell property in the townsite. It produced for many years and then refused to produce and was closed down for a year or two. Re-worked, it is now producing its allowable and could pump much more.

Talco Loses to Hughes Springs Friday 19 to 0

Talco Trojans lost to the Hughes Springs Mustangs Friday 19 to 0. Leo Duck, high-point man for District 15-A, was responsible for the scores.

Duck, captain and halfback for the Mustangs, made the entire score in the second half, even kicking the only conversion of the game. This brought his total score for five games this year up to 103 points, giving the Mustangs their fifth straight win.

All of the scoring was on the ground, with runs from the 48, 34 and the 12-yard lines.

Hughes Springs kicked off to Talco and recovered it on the 50 yard line. After no luck they kicked out on fourth down. The Trojans started a drive which was halted on the 1/2-yard line. For the rest of the first half the ball see-sawed back and forth.

Talco kicked off to Hughes Springs to open the second half. On the second play the Mustangs completed a 30-yard pass. From here Duck went over for the first touchdown. The extra point was run over by Duck.

Hughes Springs kicked but recovered on second down; again Duck went over. The extra point was unsuccessful.

The fourth quarter still showed no luck for the Trojans, but the Mustangs gained another TD. The extra point was unsuccessful.

Still Destroyed Three Arrested

A whiskey-making establishment near Sulphur River, was put out of commission by Deputy Sheriffs J. C. Beville and Slim Hulen, who had been joined in the raid by Federal and State officials.

The still was located shortly after a run had been completed and approximately one case of liquor awaited transfer into trade channels. Officers remained in the vicinity until late in the day when three men appeared to take possession of the illicit booze. They were arrested and the moonshine plant destroyed.

Filed on for possession of whiskey illegally they were arraigned before Judge John P. Aubrey in County Court and fined.

Fair Weather Prevails in Area

First half of October has been bright sunshiney days and much of the crops have been harvested. No rain has fallen thus far this month. Pastures and grasses which greened up after September rains are in need of a shower to increase their growth.

How Oil Divides The Profit Dollar

There's a lot of huffing and puffing from time to time about the alleged high profits made by American industry. The thing we aren't told, however, is what happens to the money industry takes in through the sale of the products which make our lives more comfortable and more secure.

Since this is Talco Oil Progress Week, when oil men of this community make their annual report to customers and neighbors, we asked one of them to take a look at the last annual financial report of his company. He checked that report carefully and here is what he found:

The company took in more than \$1,300,000 last year (not including the gasoline and other taxes it collected from all of us for the government.) Here's how each of these company dollars was divided up:

In the first place, 62.5 cents of every dollar taken in was spent for raw materials and for producing, transporting, making and selling products and services.

Next, payrolls and employee benefits took 12.5 cents out of the dollar.

Obsolescence and depreciation of properties and equipment absorbed 7.3 cents.

To keep the company progressive, 5.6 cents were put back into the business in the form of new plants and facilities.

The government took 5.9 cents which paid the company's income and other direct taxes.

Out of the fast-shrinking dollar, 5.8 cents was distributed in the form of dividends to more than 100,000 investors whose savings made this company's existence possible.

Last, 0.4 of a cent was used to pay interest on borrowed money.

The picture looks a lot different when it is viewed from the oil man's angle.

A completion reported by this newspaper two weeks ago is for the Talco field's Ralph E. Fair No. 18 I. N. Williams, Alfred Watson survey. It pumped 298 barrels per day plus 2 per cent water from 4,260-67 feet.

In Red River County, another try at finding commercial pay in the area four miles southwest of Manchester has ended in failure. Milton Weinberger No. 1-B H. M. Cole, W. B. Moore survey went to 1,938, finding insufficient oil shows in the Hill sand.

Urges Change in Asiatic Slant

New York's Gov. Thomas E. Dewey Tuesday night called on America to shift its propaganda line and begin championing "Asia for the Asians—not for the Russians."

He asked an end to "green tile bathroom" propaganda which pictures the United States as a nation of ease and comfort. This plays right into Russia's hands, he said.

Moreover, he said in an address to the Connecticut State Bar Association:

"We must stop trying to make the rest of the world over into our own image."

"In the past," Dewey said, "where our information services were not actually in the hands of leftwingers who tried to stab us in the back, they were in the hands of sincere bunglers who tried to sell America as a commodity and not as an ideal."

Titus County Man Reported Wounded In Korea Fighting

Casualty List No. 417, released by the Office of Public Information of the Department of Defense, announces that Pfc. Marshall R. Amerson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Noah P. Amerson, Rt. 2, Mt. Pleasant, has been wounded in action in Korea.

Pfc. Amerson was fighting with the United States Army, but details of how badly he was hurt, or when he was wounded, were not included in the announcement.

No Cotton Allotment Scheduled Next Year

Washington. — Despite this year's big cotton crop, the agriculture department plans no planting allotments and marketing quotas on next year's crop.

Secretary of Agriculture Brannan said Monday the cotton supply continues below the levels at which, under law, he should be required to impose production controls to prevent a price-repressing surplus.

U. S. Oil Men Out-Produce USSR 8-1

If Russia's oil production is no higher in 1951 than last year, American oil men can produce as much crude oil in a month and a half as the Soviets did in the full 12 months of 1950.

This fact was brought into sharp focus this past summer when Russian newspapers announced that oil production for 1950 amounted to 37.8 million metric tons.

This is equal to 275 million barrels of 42 gallons each—the U. S. standard.

American production of crude oil in 1950 amounted to 1.9 billion barrels—a striking example of what free men in a free country can produce in comparison to slave labor and state control!

U. S. production for 51 days in 1950 equalled the Russian production for the whole year. At current rates of production, which have been increasing steadily as the oil industry provides more and more petroleum for the American people, the U. S. can equal Russia's 1950 production in 45 days or less.

Waste Material May Have Value For Defense Use

A cottonseed oil by-product which has been thrown away for nearly 50 years may prove a valuable defense material, recent tests indicate.

A black, gummy substance derived in the processing of cottonseed oil is believed to be one material which can take a thermite bomb's 5,000-degree heat without fusing. Experimenters at Jacksonville, Fla., recently combined the cottonseed product with aluminum foil and marble pellets for roofing material. According to reports, the roofing only was scorched by a thermite bomb laid on it.

Further tests are scheduled to see if the product can be used for runways to withstand the heat of jet plane exhausts.

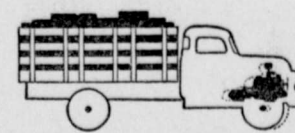

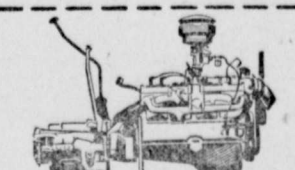

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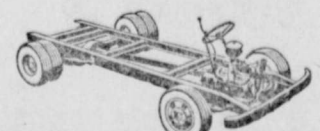

What's in a barrel of crude oil? What can it do for you—the consumer of an average of 660 gallons of oil per year?

A standard barrel of crude oil contains 42 gallons.

Gasoline: 18.1 gallons
Kerosene: 2.3 gallons
Distillates and gas oil: 8.0 gallons

Lubricants: 1.1 gallons
Residue: 4.0 gallons

Enough gasoline to operate a popular make automobile for at least 270, and often as high as 350 miles;

Enough motor oil to fill a crankcase, good for a minimum of 1,000 miles;

Enough light fuel oil to supply an average home with heat and hot water for at least two days;

Enough residual fuel oil which, if converted to electricity, will furnish an average home with electrical power for more than two weeks;

Enough kerosene to do the cooking, roasting and baking for the average family for five days—in round figures, 60 to 80 meals. That, in itself, is an amazing flow of good things from a single barrel of crude oil, but still left over are four gallons of residue which can be converted into asphalt for streets and highways, or petroleum coke, or other selected products.

Currently the oil industry is producing more than six million barrels of crude oil per day. Spurred by the intense competition which is traditional within the industry, the nation's oil men are setting new highs continuously in their operations to provide the American people with all of the petroleum products they want, where they want them and when they want them.

Follow a Deer That Has Been Fired Upon

It's less than a month until the deer season opens in Texas. Some folk in this area will be hunting these animals for the first time, due to open season in nearby counties.

Perhaps a little information concerning the following of a buck after he has been shot at might mean the difference between happy success in bringing in a buck or disappointment, due to failure to trail him, following the shot or shots.

This editor has hunted deer for many years, and on some hunts members of the party have wounded bucks and let them get away. Upon one occasion the writer looked for a wounded buck for three hours before finding him stone dead. He did not leave a blood trail.

A story recently appeared in Texas Game and Fish of a study made by fourteen biologists and six game wardens for the counties of Llano, Mason, Gillespie and Kerr. Hunters numbering 250 and the same number of property owners were checked. Nineteen per cent of those hunters had wounded and lost deer.

There are two tell-tale signs a hunter can rely upon to learn if his bullet has found a vital spot. If the buck is running and is hit fairly hard he will throw his tail between his legs and increase his speed if he is able to do so. If he is walking or standing still, a heart shot will cause him to hunch his shoulders and lower his tail, stagger and maybe stop dead still to look and listen for the metallic sound of the action of the rifle and to locate the direction of the hunter.

Anyway, take a good look after a shot. He may travel several hundred yards before blood signs show, but don't crowd him. Give him a chance to die undisturbed or you may jump him and he will run again, and you may lose him.

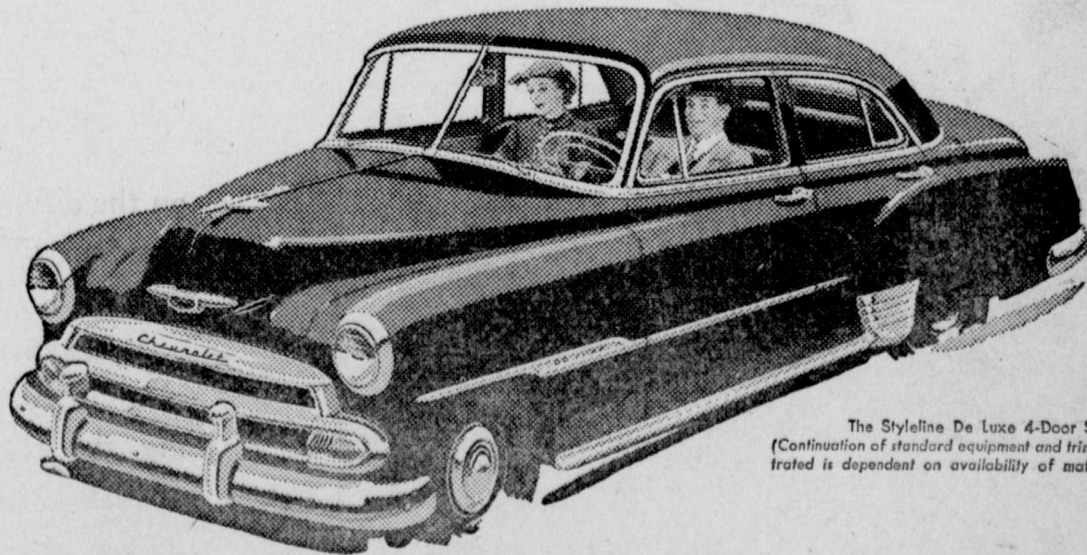

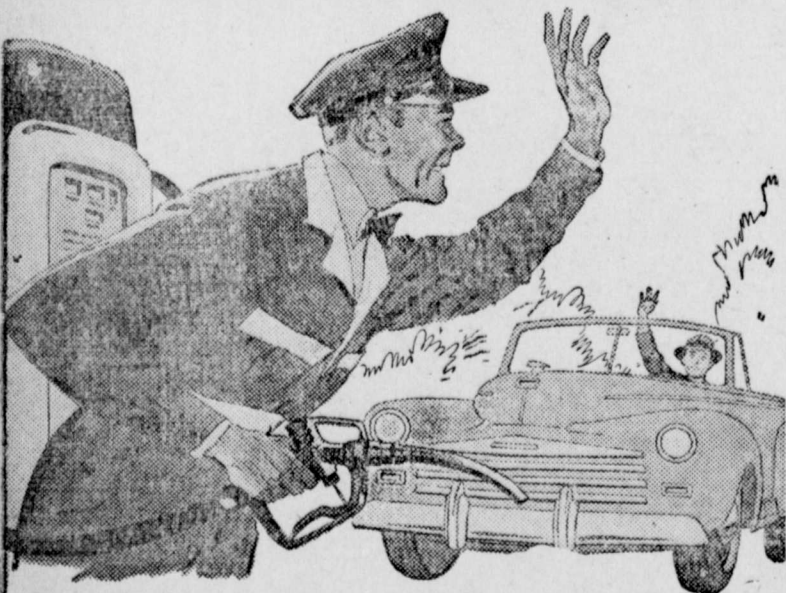

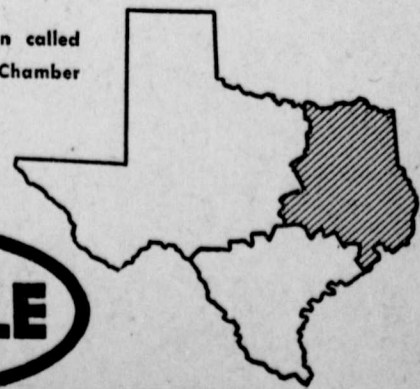
