LENGTHENING THE HEN'S DAY

Lengthening the hen's working day during the winter months by

means of artificial light in the poultry house and thereby increasing her feed consumption with a view to greater egg production is advisable within reasonable limits, says the United States Department of Agriculture. Overstimulation of the hen, however, may cause a spring molt or other undesirable results with a consequent lowered egg yield. The laying hen should be regarded as a machine for the manufacture of eggs which, if operated under too high pressure, will be worn out prematurely.

pounds of beef bone, add three quarts of water and let simmer six hours. Peel and slice six small onions and cook in enough butter to prevent burning, until soft. Strain the beef stock—there should be three pints—add two and one-half teaspoonfuls of beef extract, the onions and salt to taste. Cut bread in slices, remove crusts and toast. Place the toast in a tureen, add the soup, sprinkle with grated parmesan cheese and serve.

Stuffed Peppers.—Wipe four green peppers and parboil ten minutes in one quart of water to which has been added one-fourth of a teaspoonful of soda. Cut into halves lengthwise, remove the seeds, fill with creamed oysters, cover with buttered crumbs and brown under a gas flame. Wash a quart of oysters and cook them in their own liquor until plump. Drain and add to a sauce made of three tablespoonfuls of butter, three and one-half tablespoonfuls of flour, one and one-half cupfuls of milk, three-fourths tablespoonful of salt and a few grains of pepper.

Frozen Tomato Salad.—Turn a quart of canned tomatoes from the can and let stand an hour. Rub through a sieve, add three tablespoonfuls of sugar and season highly with salt and cayenne; then turn into half-pound baking powder boxes, cover tightly and pack in ice and salt, using equal parts. Let stand three hours. Remove from the molds, cut in slices, arrange on lettuce leaves, sprinkle with walnut meats and serve with mayonnaise.

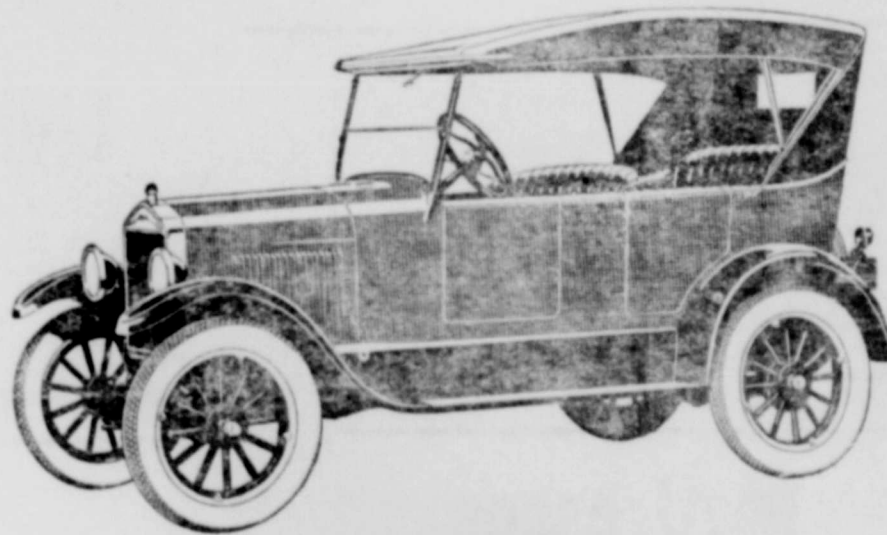

Pulling Horses Through Winter

The condition of the farm work horse that has been wintered in the open is usually better at the end of the winter than that of the stabled horse. Weather conditions in some sections, however, will not permit this practice. Where the horse must be kept indoors the stable should be made as sanitary and comfortable as possible, and have an abundance of light and proper ventilation throughout the year.

A system of ventilation with floor outlet ventilators will tend to carry off foul air and regulate temperature, especially in colder climates. Where windows are relied upon for both light and ventilation they should be high up from the floor, and open inward from the top, in order to protect the horses from direct drafts.

Stalls should be well bedded and cleaned daily. Clay floors are doubtless the best if correctly built, and properly attended to. They must be kept smooth, with slightly more slope for drainage than for other types of floors.

In connection with the stable, a large paddock or enclosure, especially a sodded one, helps considerably to keep in fit condition horses that are worked irregularly. Thorough grooming is a further aid to the health of the horse.

SMALLPOX VACCINATION

Board of Health Urges Vaccination as Best Preventative Measure

As much as smallpox has recently been reported in several sections of the state, vaccination against the disease is urged by Dr. H. O. Sappington, state health officer. "Vaccination," he stated is the only known preventative of this disease, the history of smallpox epidemics proving the fact conclusively.

Data gathered on an epidemic of smallpox in one of the large municipalities of the country in 1924, show that no one contracted smallpox who had a scar of recent successful vaccination, notwithstanding the fact that there were 928 known persons among these scars who were intentionally exposed to smallpox by being in personal contacts with cases of the epidemic.

The smallpox case-rate in the United States is, according to the report of the Surgeon General of the United States, the highest of any country in the world. The following the World War had a decline of this disease, but a let up of the vaccination practice, an almost steady increase has been registered.

With all the evidence showing the danger from smallpox by vaccination, it is strange that anyone would neglect this preventative measure. Smallpox is often a fatal disease and leaves its scar on victims for life. In order to prevent the further spread of this malady within the state, vaccination of all persons who have not been successfully vaccinated is urged."

PUBLIC SALE OF '49

W. Wilson of the Sherman-Wilson Motor company, unearthed an old newspaper clipping, yellowed with age, containing a reprint of an old public sale bill, the date of which was March 1, 1849. The following is reproduction.

Having sold my farm and am leaving for "Oregon Territory" by ox team will offer on March 1, 1849, all my personal property to wit:

Two teams except two teams, one stand Ben. and Tom and Jerry; one cow, 1 gray mare and colt, 1

pair oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron foot of popular weather boards, plow with mole board, 1000 three foot clap boards, 1500 ten foot fence rails, 1 60 gallon kettle, 5 sugar troughs made of white ash timber, 10 gallons maple syrup, 2 spinning wheels, 30 lb of mutton tallow, 1 large loom, made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles, 100 empty barrels, 1 22 gallon barrel of Johnson-Miller whiskey 7 years old, 20 gallons of apple brandy, 1 40-gallon copper still, 1 dozen real books, 2 handle hooks, 3 scythes and cradles, 1 dozen wooden pitchforks, one half interest in tan yard, 1 32 caliber rifle bullet mold, and powder horn; rifle made by Ben Miller; 50 gallons of soft soap, bacon and lard, 10 gallons of sorghum molasses, 6 head of fox hounds, all soft mouthed except one.

At the same time I will sell my six negro slaves—2 men, 35 and 50 years old, 2 boys 12 and 18 years old. Will sell all together to some party as will not separate them.

Terms of sale, cash in hand, or note to draw 4 per cent interest with Bib' McConnell as security.

My home is two mile south of Versale, Kentucky, on McCoons ferry pike. Sale will begin at 8 o'clock a. m. Plenty to drink and eat.

SWEET CLOVER SOWING

Where winter wheat is grown an excellent way to obtain a stand of sweet clover is to sow unscarified or even unhusked seed on the wheat about the middle of February, says the United States Department of Agriculture. It is not advisable to sow any kind of sweet clover seed much earlier than this date, because it is likely to germinate during a warm period in mid-winter and the seedlings be killed by later freezing weather. On the other hand, unscarified seed should not be planted much later than the middle of February or it will fail to come up that season. One advantage of sowing in February is that if one does not get a stand there is still time to sow scarified seed in March or early April. Scarified seed is seed that has had the hard coat scratched so it will germinate more readily.

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

REPORTED BY PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT OF WEST TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Haskell—Work on the city hall here is progressing nicely. When completed, the building will hold offices of the mayor, city secretary and water department as well as housing equipment of the Haskell Fire Department. A city jail is also included in the building, occupying part of the ground floor in the rear of the structure.

Stamford—Nine of the 15 men named as Master Farmers of Texas in the recent contest of The Progressive Farmer are men who live in the territory served by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Though West Texas entrants in the contest were noticeably in the minority, more than fifty per cent of the winnings were carried off by the western section. The Master Farmers of West Texas came from the following counties: Comanche, El Paso, Medina, (2), Hale, Kerr (2), Lubbock and Howard.

Plainview—Hale County has added 6 fine registered bulls to its bull circles. The animals were brought from Ohio by Paul Huey, county agricultural agent.

Shamrock—A two story hotel containing 24 rooms is being erected here. Each room is to be equipped with hot and cold running water and will be heated by gas.

Pampa—Brick work on the new Schneider Hotel has started, and the building will be ready for occupancy by May 1, according to the contract. Several colors of bricks are being used in the work.

Stamford—Approximately a quarter of a million dollars annually will be saved by shippers of the South Plains section due to activity of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in their behalf. The West Texas Chamber through its traffic department has successfully presented the Santa Fe differential cases to the Railroad Commission and as a result South Plains shippers will be relieved of paying the western differential.

Lampasas —Lampasas' 24,000

egg capacity chick hatchery has opened for 1927 operations. C. R. Oakley is in charge.

Borger—Outlining a booster and advertising campaign to be launched this month, the local chamber of commerce directors at a recent meeting chose the slogan, "Buy it in Borger," as the initial move toward civic promotion and development. The Booster Campaign is to extend two weeks.

Levelland—Contract has been entered with the Texas Utilities Company for maintenance of fourteen street lights for the business section of the town. The lights are to be of 100 candle power and of the pole and bracket type.

Paint Rock—Possibilities of Paint Rock as a summer and health resort are to be exploited if movement on part of leading citizens goes through. The town believes its location near the banks of the silvery Cancho make it an ideal spot for a summer playground where swimming, boating, fishing, and hunting can be had in abundance.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

A cup of water placed in the oven when a fruit cake is baking helps to keep the right amount of moisture in the air and to prevent the cake from drying out.

When you are having an afternoon party and want to serve baking-powder biscuits, cut the biscuit dough into very small rounds. Moisten the

top of one biscuit with a little rich milk, and place a second biscuit on top of it. When baked these tea biscuits are attractive in shape, easy to open, and delicious spread with butter or served with honey or preserves.

If you have some jelly which is not firm enough to use on the table, it will do in place of cider or grape juice in fruit cake, or mincemeat.

If you are using figured curtains in a room, choose a material with a background the same color as the walls but slightly darker. The principal color in the design of the cur-

tain material should repeat the color of the rug, or upholstery. Use figured curtains only when the walls give a plain effect.

All bean soups should have a little flour added to them as a binder, to prevent the thick part from settling to the bottom.

When you cut up material for salads, make the pieces large enough so that you know what you are eating, and small enough to be dainty. Do not mix with the dressing until serving time, except in the case of those salads which call for special treatment.

SOLDIERS FOLLOW LOANS? LAUGH MONTH. JUST SPOILED. SHE FLATTERED HIM

Senator Shipstead, of Minnesota, hasn't been in Washington long enough to know what respectable legislators owe to high finance, and will investigate American bankers, loans to South American countries, including Nicaragua. Investigating such loans might explain landing of United States troops here and there. Troops sometimes go where loans go.

Senator Shipstead says Americans made a seven million dollar loan to Nicaragua in 1912, during a conservative regime. That would be seven million good reasons for American intervention to keep Nicaragua Liberals from kicking out a Government that they don't want, as this country did in 1776.

All of those private loans to South American republics, like loans that some of our bankers are making in Europe are dangerous, especially when, as is usual, they are thoroughly USURIOUS loans.

Dr. Charlotte De Galiere Davenport, charming lady who lectures on health, looks about forty, and is actually 102 years old.

The lady has Russian and French blood, both good for long life. And, most important, she weighs 126 pounds. Your body is an irrigation farm. Your heart the pump. Your blood the water. A light body calls for light pumping, making the heart's work easy. Cut down your weight, wisely, and add to your life. Every added pound means more work for the heart.

The month of January, 1927, in which good resolutions are now oozing away, is to be "national laugh month." Moving picture potentates and others have decided and arranged it. Americans are to laugh and thus keep up their "morale."

It would be better to locate laugh month in December. For looking back over eleven months of much promise, much resolving and little performance, laughing would be easy.

There is such a thing as overdoing laughing, for laughing is like smoking. When you do either, you don't think. And what the American people need is more THINKING.

J. N. Moore, University of Illinois sophomore, wrote, before killing himself, "it raises the devil with me to think of having to slave around and work like the devil and just grow old. I can't see the idea of wading through school, then dash bravely out and get a big old job at a hundred a month."

In six words of his letter the young man explains what is really the matter with him, "I am just spoiled, I suppose." If all the spoiled children in this foolish country committed suicide, there would not be enough graveyards.

Mrs. Katherine Trilling, on trial for murder in Denver, married Herman Trilling in New York, when tuberculosis had reduced him to ninety pounds weight. She worked in tailor shops to pay his expenses at

a sanitarium for consumptives, then sold her furniture and everything she had, raised a thousand dollars and took him to Colorado to save his life.

"She says she shot him by accident. The prosecuting attorney says she shot him purposely in the back because she was jealous. What will the jury say?"

Mr. Bruce, Australian Premier, says we are too modest in this country—that's quite a surprise—and we ought to tell the world what wonderful things we have done and are doing. "I do not suppose there is a country on the civilized globe more misunderstood and unjustly vilified than the United States," he says.

The Australian Premier knows that men do not like their creditors, especially when they don't intend to pay. And the United States does not need good will propaganda among other nations as much as it needs the right kind of fighting air fleet and other equipment for defense, and retribution.

CORN-ON-COB MEAL

Corn is sometimes fed in the form of corn-and-cob meal, and in that form is particularly suitable for horses which lack the necessary time or proper teeth to chew thoroughly unground corn. This meal is of about the same feeding value pound for pound as shelled corn. Certain precautions must be taken in feeding it, however, as when stored for a time it has a tendency to generate heat with the consequent formation of mold. For this reason it is best to grind the grain only as needed.

BACK TO THE SOIL

Where manure is used as fertilizer, cows on home-grown feeds, under proper management, will return to the soil about 80 per cent of the fertility taken from the land in growing their feed.

CITY LIFE NOT SO ROSY!

During the past year, according to a report made by the Department of Agriculture, there has been a decrease in the farm population in the United States of nearly half a million.

The year before that it decreased \$2,000.

The population of the country as a whole is increasing; that of the rural districts is decreasing.

The definite trend is away from the farm to the city.

A cable from Paris tells the same story.

The population of the country districts of France continues to flow to the large cities in spite of all efforts of the government to stem it.

The general census, just taken, shows a declining population in all rural areas there except those adjacent to large industrial centers.

In America the automobile and the movie have been the two big elements in accelerating this movement from the farm to the city.

In olden times entertainment was found in country affairs; now trips to the city are substituted.

The automobile, making quick runs to the city after supper for movies and other entertainment possible, has given young people of the farming communities a taste of city life in its brightest aspect.

They see the city relaxed. They see it in the role of play-boy. And they like it.

The movies, shown in every crossroads village, picture life in the big city as one of adventures, fine clothes and quick wealth.

There is no hay to pitch, no mules to curry and no meadow larks to listen to before dawn.

However, the dust-filled, sardine-can subways and the high cost of living in the city are left out of the picture.

"The farm is where they work; the city is where they play."

This idea abetted by the auto and movie has its effect in leading young people on the farms to choose the city when they grow up.

It has played a large part in the trend toward urban life which has been noted in recent years.

About Your Health

Things You Should Know

A FIRESIDE CHAT

"Keep the feet warm, the head cool, and the bowels open." I was told by the old college professor, that strict obedience to this command would insure a healthy body at all times.

I can think of at least fifty serious disorders, including fatal disease of the kidneys, and dangerous liver disorders, that have their origin in constipation. From ordinary auto intoxication we go down from bad to worse; the kidneys break down in their futile attempts to carry away the body-poisons; the gall-bladder becomes infected; the stomach rebels; the blood becomes more vitiated; the heart finally weakens dangerously—and all because of neglected bowels. A stitch in time is worth nine applied too late.

The question of cold feet is increasingly evident in these winter months. The low-pattern shoe is the correct thing in fashion; but I am not unconvinced that the low shoe is not a shortener of life, and I know it is a menace to health; especially for women. The silk stocking, the "goose pimples" beneath and the congested lung make the thoughtful physician wonder if the added attractiveness is worth the price!

Light head dressing should be worn, summer or winter. Tight fitting hats are conducive to bald heads, which are perhaps minor effects of head wrapping; both scalp and face are freshened and invigorated by contact with winter air. The idea of enveloping the neck and head in fur and feathers, and the lower third of the person in thin silk, carries little appeal from the healthy race standpoint.

BETTER RANGE PASTURE

Grazing the herbage of bunch grasses on cattle and sheep ranges of the West when its average height is four inches or less not only fails to satisfy the hunger of the animals but also stunts the vegetation, say grazing experts of the forest service, United States Department of Agriculture. Furthermore, the shortage of forage of good food value and the high succulence and comparatively low nutritive value of young herbage sometimes causes serious livestock losses early in the spring. Bunch grasses, as a general rule, should be about six inches in height before grazing begins, and the earlier-maturing plants should have flower stalks showing.

Grazing closely twice or even three times in a season, provided the first grazing is late enough and the in-

tervals are sufficient for the vegetation to recover fully from each cropping, ordinarily does not affect the yield and vigor of the plant.

Maintenance and improvement of native pasture lands, the forage on which is composed largely of bunch grasses, is dependent upon the periodical production of a fertile seed crop. To insure seed production of the more palatable forage plants requires prevention of too early grazing, avoidance of overgrazing and effective control and distribution of stock.

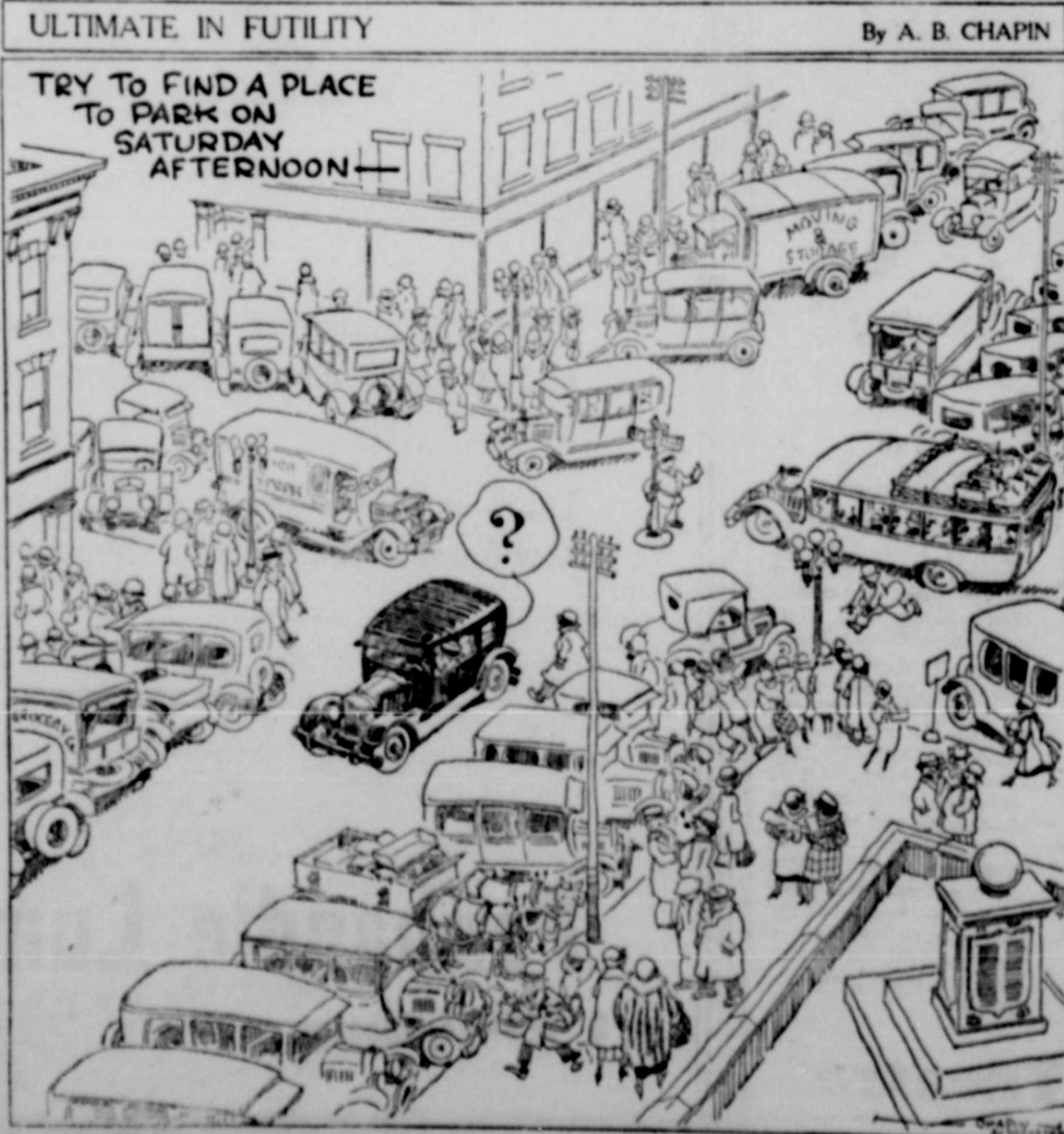

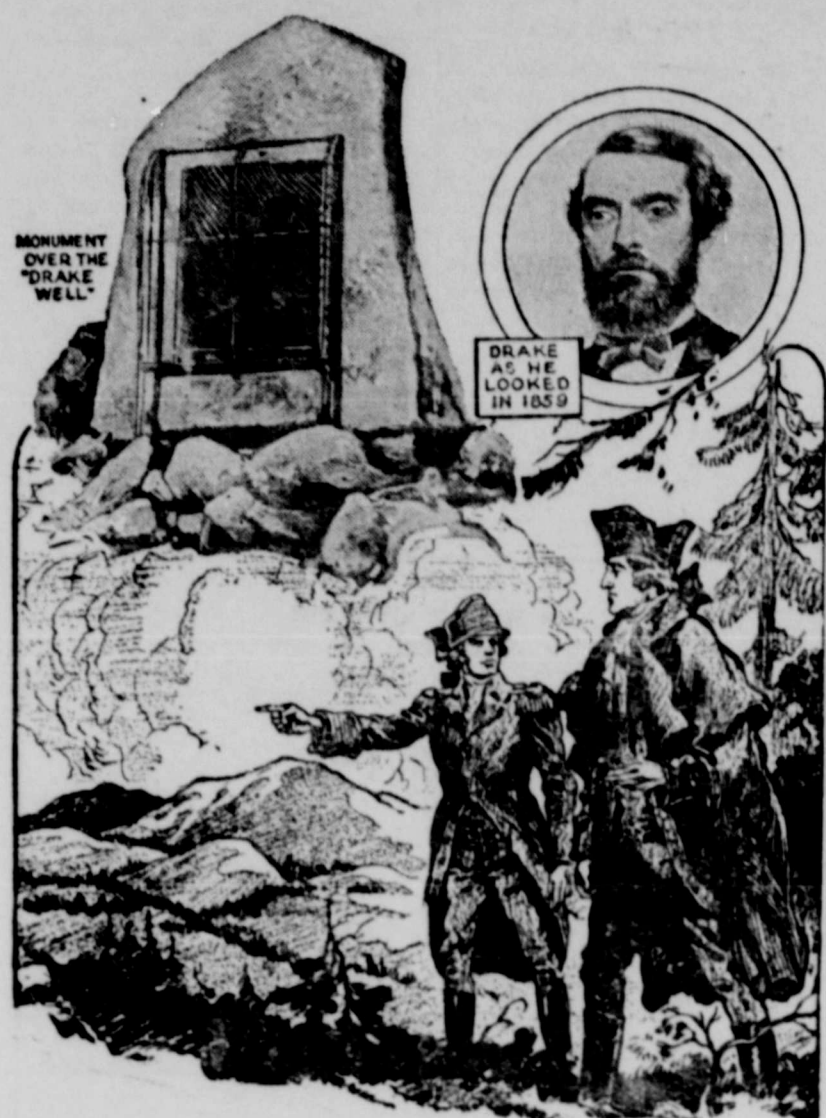

Washington's Early Adventures Now Assuming New Significance



By HENRY BOTSFORD

AFTER well nigh a century and three-quarters a new interest has recently been aroused in the earliest military adventures of George Washington. When barely twenty-one years old, in 1753, Washington was sent by Governor Dinwiddie of Virginia into the far northwestern wilderness—that is, northwestern Pennsylvania—to warn the French that they must cease their efforts to occupy that region. Recent researches have given a new historical significance to that expedition, during which Washington, always reckless of his personal safety, had one of his narrow escapes from death at the hands of a treacherous Indian guide.

The French at that time occupied Canada and claimed the Mississippi and Ohio Valleys. Though the fringe of English speaking colonies along the Atlantic contained the chief European population, France maintained sovereignty over most of North America's area. They were apparently determined to occupy northwestern Pennsylvania, partly because it was known even then to be rich in petroleum.

Region's Wealth Known
Pioneers and missionaries, English, French, German and Dutch, had all reported to their governments that the petroleum was of great potential value. There is, however, no reason to believe that Washington knew of its existence or value until his adventure of 1753. Then he learned that the oil had long been used by the Indians and the pioneering whites for fuel and light, for medicine and in making war paint. Washington was so much impressed with its possibilities that he later became owner of a large area of oil-bearing lands. Although the petroleum industry in its modern form was then undreamed of, Washington was so sure that a fortune resided in his oil-bearing lands that in his will he listed them as his most valuable holdings. In the property schedule attached to the will he wrote:

"This tract was taken up by General Lewis and myself on account of the bituminous spring which it contains, of so inflammable a nature as to burn as freely as spirits and as nearly difficult to extinguish."

The Will of Washington
Some historians declare that in an earlier will Washington dedicated this "burning spring" to the public. At any rate, it had passed from his ownership before his death. He sold this tract for \$200,000, but, suspecting it might revert to his estate under a mortgage, he warned his heirs that should it do so it would be worth much more than the \$200,000.

Although Washington's first knowledge of petroleum was gained within a few miles of the place where the first oil well in the world was drilled, that first well was not opened until one hundred and six years later, 1859. In that year Edwin Laurentine Drake bored the first well, just south of Titusville, Pennsylvania, and really started the modern petroleum industry.

A Development Wonder
Today the American industry is the major part of the world's oil business. Americans are directing oil developments all over the world. It is all part of the huge problem: to make sure that the tomorrows shall see America's requirements met. Every decade the production of petroleum has doubled. Science and technical progress have met all demands. Foreign investment and development are in the nature of insurance for the future.

In the days of Drake and the industry's beginnings petroleum's value lay in lubricants and kerosene. The age

of machinery was only beginning, with its insatiable demand for lubricants, while kerosene, though the best illuminant ever known, was dangerous because poor refining left gasoline that was liable to explode. It is difficult nowadays, when the world is being combed for more petroleum to make more gasoline, to realize that gasoline was once a nuisance and a menace. The internal combustion engine created the demand for gasoline, now the primary product of petroleum. The demands of millions of motor cars increasing constantly, invention and chemistry were set at work by the captains of the industry to make the barrel of petroleum turn out a larger and larger proportion of gasoline. This was done by the cracking process, through which every year now sees a larger proportion of crude oil turned into gasoline.

High and Growing Demands
Today well-nigh 2,500,000 barrels of petroleum are required every day to satisfy the demand for motor cars, tractors, trucks, buses, artificial gas plants and the innumerable by-products. Invention is constantly finding new uses, as enterprise just as constantly finds new supplies of petroleum. The wonderful and rather mysterious fluid has revolutionized social habits and industrial methods; yet it is only two-thirds of a century since the industry had its feeble beginning in the Pennsylvania oil country.

This year the country will use about 750,000,000 barrels of petroleum. The country will use 700,000,000 gallons of gasoline and will export 1,900,000 more. The production, processing and marketing of petroleum is probably second only to agriculture among American industries.

A True Social Service
Perhaps the most nearly revolutionary result of Drake's modernization of the petroleum industry is to be found in the change it has brought in the life of rural America. It has carried the city to the country, the country to the city. It has by making possible the cheap and quick transportation that everybody nowadays enjoys, enabled country and city to know and understand each other as they never did before. It has brought social and educational privileges to country dwellers that a few decades ago seemed absolutely denied to them. On the one hand it has enabled the cities to spread out into suburban areas and the zone of country estates; on the other, it has enabled the people of the open country to have neighbors, society, church and school privileges, intimate acquaintance.

It is a historic fact that the tendency toward division of interest and understanding between city and country is the most serious internal menace to the security of nations, to the integrity of society.

More than anything else, country and city need to know and understand each other and each other's problems. The easy transportation, the ready opportunity for association and acquaintance that have come with the Age of Petroleum have made possible, in this favored country at least, exactly this new intimacy and understanding.

CHEVROLET STANDS UP IN ROUGH COUNTRY

Driving a Chevrolet car daily in the rough, hilly districts of Missouri for a total repair cost of \$23.85 for 20,000 miles of driving over a period of six years is the record attained by Mrs. Olen Gentry of Mill Grove, Mo.

The sturdy endurance of the Chevrolet never was attested better than through its popularity among those who live in the mountainous localities, according to Mrs. Gentry.

In August, 1920, Mrs. Gentry purchased a Chevrolet touring car and in December of 1926, the owner figured that it was about time to buy a new model. "Although my old car is still giving excellent service, I expect to turn it in soon on a new 1927 Chevrolet coupe," Mrs. Gentry said.

The old car which she is now driving was purchased only after an earlier model Chevrolet has given her steady service, from 1916 to 1920. Rough, rocky roads feature the mountain country and only cars with powerful motors, combined with launch construction, are able to withstand the terrific grind of daily use, the owner says.

MORE MUSICIANS THAN CLERGYMEN

Musicians in the United States considerably outnumber the clergymen and lawyers. There are almost three times as many people earning a living through music as there are drilling teeth or playing behind the footlights. These figures are for people entirely dependent on music for a livelihood. It does not include the tens of thousands doing part-time work teaching, singing in choirs or earning extra dollars on the side with violin or saxophone.

Another interesting comparison is that there are five times as many musicians as there are journalists. Journalism has for some years been a recognized vocational subject in the public schools, involving elaborate equipment, school publications, miniature printing presses and the like in order that the boy who wants to be a second Pulitzer or Joseph Medill may get his preliminary training and experience at the same time he is learning the three R's and without additional expense. But until recently music in the schools has been largely confined to assembly singing and regarded as a cultural rather than vocational part of the curriculum.

Of later years, however, school bands and orchestras have been greatly on the increase and the economic value of giving any art pupil the foundation of a musical education is being more clearly recognized each year.

rapidly becoming one of the leading musical nations in the world is found in the increase of the manufacture of musical instruments. In 1914 there were \$119,000,000 worth of musical instruments manufactured while nine years later in 1923, this figure had more than doubled, amounting to \$242,000,000.

Established symphony orchestras are to be found in nearly one hundred of our leading cities, to say nothing of less pretentious ones all over the country. Civic and community bands are the rule rather than the exception everywhere, not to include the large body of industrial, school and university bands and orchestras. Grand operas, that most difficult of all musical flowerings to keep healthy, is flourishing in thirteen distinct grand opera companies which, going on tour, cover most of the United States.

If these encouraging evidences of a musical consciousness exist today, what may we not look for when two or three more generations have studied instrumental music in school as a part of their regular work, and when every family can furnish its own chamber music as well as being intelligent and appreciative audience?

STRONG FERTILIZER

A concentrated fertilizer differs from the ordinary mixed fertilizer in being richer in those constituents which increase the growth of crops. In the ordinary fertilizer these constituents amount to only about 15 per cent on an average. When the amount present is increased to between 15 and 30 per cent the mixture is called a "high analysis" fertilizer. In a concentrated fertilizer the fertilizer constituents amount to 30 per cent or more.

WILD LIFE PROTECTION

The protection of game animals and birds, fur animals and fish is backed by the federal government, by state governments, and by international, national, state, and local organizations, and is encouraged by Audubon societies and other nature clubs. Although the functions of all these groups have to do with the encouragement of wild-life conserva-

tion in an educational way or otherwise, actual enforcement of game, fur, and fish laws is in the hands of federal or state governmental agencies.

HOUSEHOLD HELPS

Crisp salads offer a most appetizing way of getting enough fruits and vegetables in the day's meals. Serve some kind of a salad every day.

Information about oil burners for house heating is available upon request from the United States Department of Agriculture.

If the lower part of the kitchen wall, which receives the hardest wear and gets soiled soonest, is marked off five feet above the floor by a wooden strip and painted or stained a different tone from the rest of the wall, that part can be clean or refinished without making the upper wall look shabby.

Soaking any kind of fresh meat is a mistake. It draws out the juices which give the characteristic flavor and add to its food value. If the meat needs cleaning, wipe it off with a damp cloth or trim it.

To make a soup more interesting or festive, as well as to improve its flavor, add to each plate at the last minute, a little minced parsley or a half slice of lemon, or both, if it is a meat soup. A spoonful of unsweetened whipped cream is good on many kinds of soup. Toasted squares of buttered bread (croutons), farina balls and other garnishes often seen in restaurants are easily made at home.

In making quick breads and cakes allow in general 1 to 1 1/2 teaspoons of baking powder for each cup of flour. Butter cakes that have a great deal of egg white may, however, need less. Pop-overs and sponge cakes are the exception and require no baking powder at all.

The kitchen is, above all else, a place to prepare and serve food. Limit it to this use if possible, and arrange for laundering, and such work to be done in another place.

Any home maker can become a good cotton picker at the white sales these days. Send to the U. S. De-

partment of Agriculture for the bulletins on "Selection of Cotton Fabrics" (1449-F) and "Principles of Window Curtaining" (1516-F). These tell how to judge weaves, finishes, and dyes in cotton fabrics for many uses.

About Your Health

Things You Should Know

"LUMPS"

Any enlargement felt beneath the skin of any part of the body is generally described by its possessor as a "lump." Sometimes they occur as a result of bruising, or other forceful contact. In others, they appear without apparent cause; particularly in this true of lumps in the female breast.

Visiting one of the large clinics in Baltimore, in 1916, I witnessed the removal of one of these by a very skillful surgeon; he explained while operating: "This is not a malignant growth," he said; "It is smooth, almost round, not very hard; not painful; freely movable; about the size of a small English walnut, harmless, pity to operate, but she was morbid—would have it out; no, we shall not take the entire breast—it's not necessary; just the thing itself—pity to do that."

Upon my return home, I was consulted by a lady with the same sort of "lump" in her breast. I advised leaving it alone, in the meantime keeping her under observation; it is giving her no trouble today, ten years later.

Not all lumps of the breast are

ancerous. But if you discover a lump in your breast, please go at once to a skilled physician or surgeon—one who knows. Don't put the examination off for a single day. Don't trust the advice of neighbors, or of the various cultists that infest our land. Some of these lumps are malignant; a skilled scientist may be able to detect the difference—the ignoramus cannot. And, remember this: no "serum" or "protein" has yet been discovered that will cure cancer, no matter what the claim.

CHINESE ELMS MAKE REMARKABLE GROWTH

Most East Texas farmers would consider it absurd to spend money experimenting on shade trees in order to find the variety best suited to their section of the country. However, when one travels over the plains of west Texas, he realizes the seriousness of this particular problem. A few years ago, Superintendent R. E. Karper, of the Lubbock station, went on record for the Chinese elm. He thinks it capable of more rapid growth than any other tree and that it is the most suitable shade tree under west Texas conditions.

The Dalhart Experiment Station showed the writer Chinese elms which had four years' growth from seeds and were 15 feet high and had limbs covering a diameter of 10 to 12 feet. There are four Chinese elms on the city square at Canyon which were planted two or three years ago at the same time that several elms of the old variety were planted. At the present time the Chinese elms are 5 to 10 times as large and are far more thrifty than the old variety of elms.

the Lubbock Experiment Station in the spring of 1925 at which time they were the size of a lead pencil. Now their bodies are three or four inches in diameter and they have reached in height the roof of a garage nearby and has as beautiful foliage and as well spread limbs as one could wish. The writer is firmly convinced that all the shade trees which he has found growing under west Texas conditions, that the Chinese elm is the most valuable to the farmer. While this tree will respond well to irrigation, it has been found at the Dalhart station that it will make remarkable growth on less than 18 inches of annual rainfall.

The writer saw at the Chillicothe station 409 two-year-old Chinese elms six or seven feet in height, and well developed in shape.—Frank Phillips, in The Progressive Farmer.

FIRE TOLL

The fire waste for last year has been placed at \$570,000,000 and it has been estimated that \$160,000,000 represents the losses from fires on farms, says the United States Department of Agriculture. This tremendous fire loss took a toll of 16,000 lives and it is claimed that at least 3,500 were residents of farming communities. Although some of the causes of these fires on farms have

been determined, practically one half of the losses have been assigned to spontaneous combustion of farm products or unknown causes. The loss from the spoilage of farm products due to spontaneous heating where there was no combustion and for which there would be no fire loss adjustment, is even greater than loss from fire.

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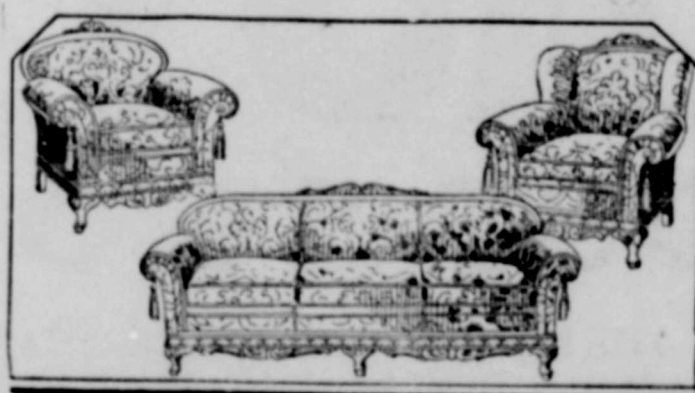

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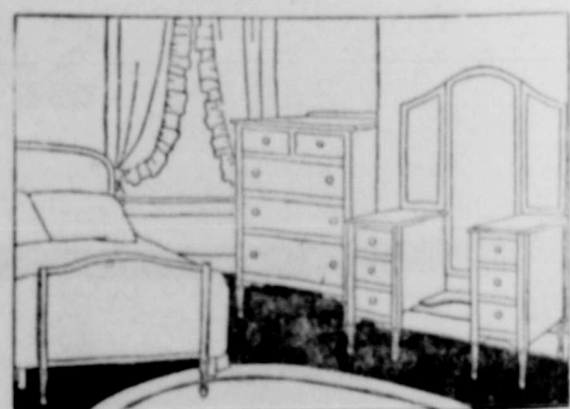
