PICKETERS IN STRIKE GIVEN RELEASE TODAY

BEAUMONT.—Officers released 235 striking seamen from Jefferson county jail here today after the men signed pledges not to engage in picketing the Port Arthur waterfront.

District Judge George C. O'Brien postponed until Dec. 7, contempt hearings from the seamen who were arrested Wednesday night, for violating his order against picketing ports in this area in connection with the marine strike.

Judge O'Brien and Sheriff W. W. Richardson, who made the wholesale arrests, warned the seamen to "behave themselves." Today's action amounted to release of the men on their own recognizance.

Officers said about 60 of the strikers refused, at first, to sign the pledges, but that they later relented from their stand on advice of their leaders.

Tanner to Begin Secretary Work On December 1

H. J. Tanner, appointed by directors as secretary of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, will begin his work Tuesday, December 1.

The appointment was made to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of H. C. Davis, recently.

Tanner is the son of Dr. H. B. Tanner, former secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, who died in 1933. For a time after Tanner's death his son filled the secretary's post.

The new secretary has lived in Eastland intermittently since the oil boom. At one time he was general superintendent for the Warner-Quinlan company in charge of their operations in Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico and other states.

Football Banquet Is Being Talked For Ranger Squad

Plans were being discussed in Ranger today for a football banquet, to be presented in honor of the Ranger Bulldogs, who, though they did not win a game this year were termed the "gamest little team that has ever represented Ranger."

Going into the season knowing that they were seriously handicapped through ineligibilities and with the entire squad being inexperienced, the Bulldogs continued to fight with a spirit that was amazing, even to fans who have become accustomed to game football teams, and the banquet was being talked in order that the appreciation of the Ranger fans might be demonstrated to those who had the pluck and fight and determination to go through a season, knowing that they were hopelessly outclassed, but ready to put out everything of which they were capable.

The 90 to 0 defeat at the hands of a much larger, older and more experienced Brockbridge team did not detract from the determination of the football fans to show their appreciation, but added to the incentive to continue plans for a banquet.

No time has been set for the annual banquet as yet, but it was believed today that it would be arranged for some time next week.

Queer Inventions Are Registered In U. S. Patent Office

WASHINGTON.—Mr. Faw Yap Chuch, who doesn't like the wrappers hens put on eggs, and Mr. Nicholas Becker, who abhors the sight of skinny women, have become inventors of the week.

They received this award through their careful observation of nature, their notations of its deficiencies, essential and esthetic, and their remedies therefor.

Mr. Faw Yap Chuch's improved eggs, which he intends to manufacture, and Mr. Nicholas Becker's false front for flimsy ladies, which he is already building in wholesale quantities, both received letters patent from the U. S. Government.

Mr. Faw Yap Chuch ate many an ordinary egg in his San Francisco home, and when he said "ordinary" he meant just that. The trouble, he observed, seemed to be that when an egg took on age it also took on other qualities which need not be mentioned here.

After studying this phenomenon carefully, Mr. Faw Yap Chuch decided hens turned out excellent eggs, but that they didn't package them properly. For thousands of years hens have been putting out eggs improperly wrapped, in old-fashioned shells, he said.

This was a challenge to Mr. Faw Yap Chuch. Not only did he believe an improved egg shell would garner him a fortune, but also it would prevent many an American from suffering many an uneasy moment at the breakfast table.

To his laboratory he took eggs, as wrapped originally by their manufacturers. He coated them with another package of his own devising, dipped them in a bucket of dissolved alkaline earth compound and then placing them on the window sill to dry.

The result became patent number 2,660,926. The alkaline compound coated and impregnated the shell with an airtight cover, thereby giving each egg a vacuum pack, like coffee. A patented, Faw Yap Chuch egg will last for no telling how long, as fresh as the day it was laid.

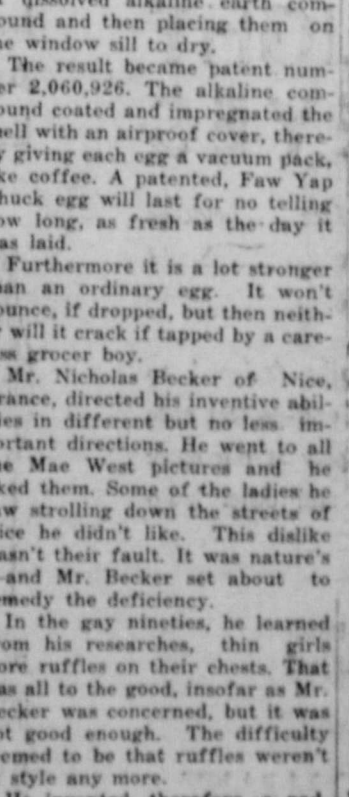
Furthermore it is a lot stronger than an ordinary egg. It won't bounce, if dropped, but then neither will it crack if tapped by a careless grocer boy.

HIGH COURT RESTRICTION IS URGED BY A F L

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 27 — The American Federation of Labor climaxed a sharp convention floor battle today by instructing its executive council to study proposals limiting the powers of the supreme court.

The demand, designed to restrict legislation as "the price of survival" in the machine age.

The six-hour day and the five-day week were set as the paramount objective of the federation. The executive council was called upon to take every necessary step to have such legislation enacted to the next session of congress.

"Every citizen should be enlisted in favor of the movement," the committee report said. "The grave problem should be of vital concern to every citizen. There is no escape from the staggering cost that unemployment levies on all society."

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Indianapolis Flies President's Flag On Many Cruises

WASHINGTON.—The cruiser Indianapolis long has been favored by President Roosevelt as his personal cruise ship, and has the necessary facilities for his comfort and convenience.

The President embarked on the Indianapolis at Campobello on July 9, 1933, and cruised on it until arrival at Annapolis, Md., Aug. 1. At that time, incidentally, the President had only recently been inaugurated while the Indianapolis had just completed her "shake-down cruise" in Central American waters. Officially, they are virtually contemporaries, as the President was elected and the Indianapolis was commissioned in the same month.

In September, 1933, the Indianapolis took Secretary of Navy Swanson for an inspection of naval stations in the Canal Zone, Territory of Hawaii and the West Coast, and in January, 1934, this cruiser was assigned as flagship of the commander, Scouting Force.

President Roosevelt reviewed the United States Fleet on the bridge of the Indianapolis outside New York harbor on May 31, 1934.

The Indianapolis has accommodations for an admiral and 14 staff officers. Her complement is 688 enlisted men and 60 marines.

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Takes Over Rail Empire Direction

Ball, manufacturer and philanthropist, and Tomlinson, head of a fleet of Great Lakes ships, gave the financial aid that enabled Van Swearingen to retain control of his rail lines when onerous setbacks threatened loss of the properties.

Duluth Docks Open To Foreign Ships

DULUTH.—All-water freight and passenger service between Duluth and European ports became a reality with the arrival at Duluth of the Norwegian freighter Taborgjell completing an inaugural voyage of more than 5,000 miles from Norway.

The Taborgjell brought more than 1,000 tons of stock fish, sporting goods, household merchandise and cod liver oil for Duluth, Twin City and Chicago wholesale and retail firms. Agents from more than a score of firms which sell the goods met the freighter at the dock.

Together with two sister ships, the Taborgjell will comprise a fleet giving 14-day passenger service between Chicago and England. The round trip fare on the boats is reported to have been set at about \$125.

Each ship can accommodate 30 passengers. A crew of 25 mans the boats.

General Calls Red Peril Real

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Ky. Communism is a serious menace to the institutions of the United States, in the opinion of Brig. Gen. Charles M. Bundel, commander of the general staff school here.

"My apprehension is not the product of a jittery mind," Gen. Bundel said. "This thing is real."

"There are two things this government must watch. One is the menace from without and the other is the menace from within. The army can take care of the first."

"Skulking behind all laudable endeavors for progress, stalks the Red menace of destruction. It is highly organized, trained and financed, skillfully conducted on a nationwide front with the avowed purpose of utterly destroying our beliefs, our institutions, our social, political and economic structure, our religions and our very philosophy of life."

"It intends, unless stopped, to tear down these things and put in their place a theory of life scraped from the gutters of Europe. This is a definite and serious threat to our nation that no longer can be ignored."

Soviet Invites U. S. Biologists to Meet

SCHENECTADY, N. Y. — Dr. Ernest E. Dale, Union College professor of biology, has been invited to exhibit results of his petunia research at the Seventh International Congress of Genetics at Moscow next year.

Dr. Dale's work is concentrated especially in the problem of variations (genetically unstable characters).

He has conducted his research on petunias since his graduate work for a doctor's degree at the University of Michigan. During the summer he worked on petunias at the experimental gardens of the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena.

Dr. Dale's research will have important bearings upon genetic problems in general, and possibly practical application in horticulture and agriculture.

Australian Town Has No Laws, Taxes

SYDNEY.—The town of Colarembri, 455 miles from here, claims more of the comforts of home and fewer of the municipal discomforts than any other town in the world.

As for the lack of municipal discomforts, it has no mayor, no alderman, no property rates, no fire department, no brick building, no unemployment, no crime and no golf.

As to the real municipal comforts of home, the population prides itself on its modern hospital equipment including X-rays, its river water pumping station and its electric light and power plants, without the necessity of any local body to control these things. The population plays tennis instead of golf.

The town operates under the control of the state works department which makes unnecessary any council, city ordinances or levies to worry about.

Bombing Crews To Navigate By Stars

LONDON.—The new bombers now being built for Britain's expanded air force may be flown by crews trained in the use of astronomical aids to navigation as well as in the more usual methods of finding the way through the air.

Greatly increased cruising speeds, longer ranges, the ability to operate at heights of 20,000 feet and more, and the untimeliness of radio bearings in time of war demand something more than "dead reckoning," officials believe. Hence, the need for development of navigation by the stars, which has led to production of a satisfactory form of bubble sextant and to the devising of simple methods of making the required mathematical calculations.

British bombing planes are fitted with the automatic pilot, which simplifies astronomical navigation because it insures that, whether the horizon be visible or not, the aircraft may be maintained in flight on a level keel. So equipped, the bomber affords an excellent platform for the taking of sights, and experts believe that a high standard of accuracy in astronomical navigation is attainable.

Blood for a transfusion was furnished Hightower Thursday by George Brogdon, Jr., and D. L. Childress, Jr., of Eastland.

The sick youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Hightower.

ROOSEVELT IS SPEAKER AT RIO DE JANEIRO

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, Nov. 27 — President Roosevelt called for peace in the new world in a strong denunciation of war before a joint session of the Brazilian Supreme Court, Senate and Chamber today.

"I think I can say that if we live without war," he said, "Democratic governments throughout the America's will prove its complete ability to raise the standard of life for those millions who cry for opportunities today."

The President's audience, including President Getulio Vargas of Brazil, was moved deeply by his earnest address.

"There is room for all of us. . . . There is no American conflict which cannot be settled by orderly and peaceful means. . . . We are happily free from ancient conflicts which have brought so much misery in other parts of the world."

Referring to the Pan-American peace conference in Buenos Aires, which he is to inaugurate next Tuesday, the President said:

"In this conference we have the opportunity to banish war from the new world and dedicate it to peace."

President Roosevelt was given a tumultuous reception after landing from the cruiser, Indianapolis, and riding through the military lines on Avenida Rio Branca, beside President Vargas.

In another passage, Mr. Roosevelt said:

"The motto of war is 'let the strong survive, let the weak die.' The motto of peace is 'let the strong help the weak to survive.'"

The President suggested that the new world can present to the rest of the universe a convincing proof that peace is easily attained if problems between nations are met with understanding and good will, as they are being met in this hemisphere, from Canada to Cape Horn.

Parties Agree On Delayed Judgment In Gas Controversy

Written briefs will be submitted within 10 days to Judge George L. Davenport of 91st district court by attorneys in the suit of X-Ray Gas company against the Lone Star Gas company, arguments in which were completed Tuesday. Testimony in the case began November 4.

By agreement of the parties, judgment will not be rendered by Judge Davenport until the next term of court which begins Monday, Dec. 7.

Approximately \$40,000 is sought by the plaintiff, who alleges the defendant did not take gas from a well in Erath county in compliance with a contract.

SEARCH TO BE CONTINUED FOR TWO HUNTERS

AUSTIN.—Governor James V. Allred today, pledged himself to solve the mystery of the disappearance of Luther and John Blanton along the gulf coast ranch country.

"They must be found," the governor declared. "They will be found if it is possible."

Allred said the search is in the best hands possible. "If Captain Bill McMurray cannot clear up the matter I do not know who can. Allred said. "He is a second Capt. McNelly (a famed Confederate army leader and Texas Ranger). The way McMurray has handled the situation thus far shows me that he is the man for the job."

Allred added.

Executive Secretary Will Tucker of the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, said that so far as he knows there had been none of the department in the area near the time the missing men were last heard from.

"One of our wardens from another section told me there was much feeling in the area because of the Blanton disappearance and suggested that the game warden from that area either be withdrawn for his own safety or be given protection."

"The worst thing the game department could do would be to give up when there is opposition to enforcing game laws, so our men are being kept there with adequate protection," Tucker said.

Are We Questionnaire Filler-Outers, or Men?

Someone ought to get up a tasteful little memorial of some kind for the school teachers of Hartford, Conn., who rose up in their feminine wrath the other day and refused to sign a bunch of questionnaires which had been handed to them.

They deserve a memorial because this questionnaire habit is getting to be one of our major American pains in the neck.

Students trailing Ph. D. degrees, advertising counselors trying to find out if the man in the street prefers red or pink cellophane on his potato chips, public information services eager to learn the prevalence of "pink toothbrush" among blue-eyed orphans—a whole legion of these inquisitive folk have the questionnaire habit, and it is an obscure person indeed who is not, sooner or later, asked to answer a lot of personal questions for the benefit of some total stranger.

This Hartford questionnaire was passed out by a research unit making a survey of the cost of living among school teachers. That, heaven knows, is a worthy cause. But the unsuspecting school ma'am found themselves called on to answer a long string of questions, such as:

How much did they spend in the last year on food? On housing? On clothing? On taxes? On health, transportation, gifts, luxuries, insurance, financial aid to dependents, furniture, laundry, beauty shops, toothpaste, postage, and domestic service.

Were they (a) single, living away from home; (b) single, living at home; (c) married, living with husband and maintaining a home; or (d) married, living with husband, but living as a family group with near relatives?

All this was just a little too much for the ladies. One young woman looked at the questionnaire and exploded with a "What! No fingerprints?" Others spoke of regimentation, invasion of privacy, and the unmitigated nerve of some people.

The upshot was that the takers of the questionnaire had very bad luck indeed with the schoolmaams of Hartford.

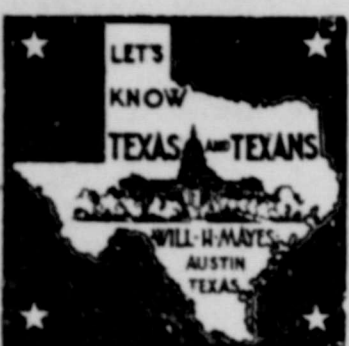
Now it may be pointed out, of course, that it can be important for the authorities to know what the cost of living among school teachers really is. It can be argued that, by furnishing the desired information, the teachers might well have drawn nearer to a pay increase.

No matter. These young women just couldn't see the sense of answering a lot of questions about things which, after all, were strictly their own business. And their rebellion is an encouraging straw in the wind.

Leaving out of the question the motives of this particular set of questionnaire-takers, it must be said that the lousybody habit has become rather strong of late. From the cradle to the grave, the American is bedeviled by people who want to know all about everything. He rebels all too seldom.

Let him form in ranks behind the schoolmaams of Hartford. They seem to have a healthy understanding of what is the public's business and what is their own.

Q. What was the Spanish evaluation of Texas before Anglo-American migration began in 1821? N. C.

A. It can be gathered from a report of a Spanish official at the end of 1819, which stated that it was inhabited by "barbarians and will be a waste, with the exception of San Antonio de Bexar and the Presidio de Bahia (Goliad), the only settlements of Spaniards and they are but small." The combined population of these two places was then only about 2,500.

Q. How did it come about that the defenders of the Alamo were fighting to preserve the Coahuila constitution and not in anticipation of the declaration of Texas independence R. F. M.

A. Assuming that to be a fact, it could only have been because they had not learned of the Declaration of Independence of March 2, or the assembling of the convention, and regarded themselves a part of an army of the Texas provisional government, created by the consultation of November, 1835, which by a vote of 33 to 15, had asserted its loyalty to the Mexican constitution of 1824 and had declared it would remain faithful to Mexico so long as it was governed under that constitution.

Q. How many and what county sites has Angelina county had? N. G.

A. When the county was organized in 1846 the county site was at Marion, now known as Marion's Ferry on the Angelina River; Jonesville, near the center of the county, became the second county site; the third being Homer; fourth located at Lufkin, the present county site.

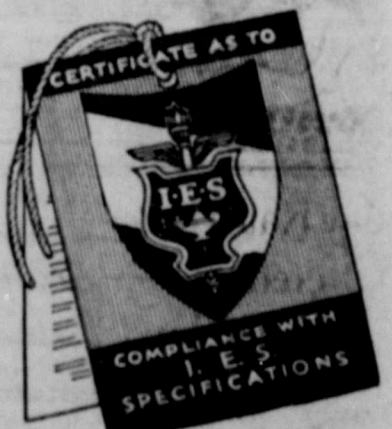
