Thunderbirds To Demonstrate At Sheppard AFB

A dining-in Friday, Sept. 8, and a performance Wednesday, Sept. 13, by USAF's official aerial demonstration team, the Thunderbirds, are scheduled to highlight ceremonies at Sheppard Air Force Base in honor of the graduation of the first German Air Force (GAF) class to be trained at Sheppard under the Undergraduate Pilot (UPT) program.

The members of Class 63-02 entered training at Sheppard Aug. 24, 1966. The training conducted by personnel of the 3630th Flying Training Wing took the students through all phases of indoctrination in the Cessna T-37 "Tweety-Bird," and the Northrop T-38 Talon jet trainers with Wednesday's official ceremonies slated to cap the 55-week schedule for the 21 members of the graduating class.

The graduation ceremonies Wednesday will start at 9 a.m. on the ramp of the 3630th Flying Training Wing with a group of dignitaries inspecting the Thunderbirds, who are scheduled to arrive at Sheppard Tuesday, Sept. 13.

The group will include General McNabb, Brig. Gen. Harold V. Larson and GAF Brig. Gen. Peter Bensien.

General Larson, who will be guest speaker at the graduation exercise, is director of military assistance, deputy chief of staff, Systems and Logistics, Headquarters United States Air Force.

Gen. Bensien, who will fly here from Washington, is the military representative of the Federal Republic of Germany to the United States and Canada.

Following the invocation, General Larson will speak and graduation certificates and pilot's wings—both German Air Force and United States Air Force—will be presented to the members of class 68-02.

Presentation of various outstanding awards to class members is also on the agenda. In the skies overhead, the Thunderbirds will perform their world-famous exhibition as an aerial demonstration team. Starting time is 9:55 a.m. This demonstration will be preceded by a fly-by of the T-37 and T-38 aircraft used in the UPT program.

A benediction will take place as the Thunderbirds return to the ground and the completion ceremonies will be followed by an open house and static display of aircraft in the 3630th area.

A "silver wings" reception for the newly-graduated pilots will be held at the Officers Open Mess during the time the open house is taking place in the 3630th area.

The reception and the open house will finish at noon. Lt. Col. Stanley Houghtby has been named Center project officer for the graduation day happenings. Wing project officer is Maj. William McVeigh.

Prior to Wednesday's official ceremonies, the "Maverick" organization from Wichita Falls will sponsor a barbecue picnic for the GAF students and their invited friends.

Members of the Thunderbirds are expected to attend the barbecue which will be held Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. in the picnic area of the 3630th FTW.

The barbecue will complete a busy day for the Thunderbirds, who will arrive at 11 a.m. and visit a number of schools and hospitals in the afternoon.

The Wednesday schedule for the aerial demonstration team, followed by their in-the-skies performance, will also feature a number of personal appearances in the area.

During the colorful show the Thunderbirds will make turns, climbs, descents and other maneuvers which thrill crowds wherever they appear. There

The Sheppard performance is expected to be witnessed by thousands of Wichita Falls area residents who will be welcomed to enter the base.

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A WINNING PLATFORM

With the growing list of Presidential candidates who
are "not running," it may be appropriate to set down a
platform for them. A winning platform. The mere fact
that a winning platform is in being may move some of the
"undecided," and prompt them to detail for us how they
would propose to implement the planks of the platform.

Plank 1: Immediate and drastic reduction of govern-
mental expenditures by abolishing unnecessary agencies
and consolidating departments and bureaus.

Plank 2: A Federal budget balanced annually, based
on accurate estimates.

Plank 3: A sound currency to be preserved at all
hazards.

Plank 4: Remove Government from all private enter-
prise except public works.

Plank 5: An Army, Navy and Air Force adequate for
national defense which will not burden people with expendi-
tures of many billions of dollars.

Plank 6: A firm foreign policy based on no inter-
ference with other nations; the sanctity of treaties and the
maintenance of good faith and good will in financial obli-
gations.

Plank 7: Condemn the disastrous action which made
the Government a speculator of farm products and the
unsound policy of restricting farm products.

Conclusion: To accomplish these purposes and to re-
cover economic liberty, pledge the nominees of the conven-
tion the best efforts of a great party pledged to the doc-
trine which guides us now in the hour of our country's
need: Equal rights for all; special privileges for none.

How do we know this is a winning platform?
It contains the principal provisions of the platform
on which Franklin D. Roosevelt ran and won election in
his first campaign 35 years ago.

And the planks in the platform remain unused to this
day.

Any candidate, irrespective of party, who could per-
suade the voters that he would put those planks into use
after all these years, would win by the biggest landslide
ever recorded in a national election.

WELL-PLACED FAITH

When an industry has the vitality and the foresight
to rise above problems of a current nature with an eye
on a long-range goal of expanded, more efficient operation,
it need not worry too much about the future. It will move
ahead with the country. Such is clearly the case with the
railroad industry. In the face of impending strike threats,
inflationary cost increases, restrictive tax and regulatory
policies and serious competitive handicaps, the rails have
moved ahead with a stamina that has commanded public
confidence and respect.

Not long ago, the industry ran a series of colorful
dramatic advertisements illustrating how modern rail
transport goes about its job. The advertisements, both in
words and pictures, embodied a sense of motion, even as
they graphically called attention to revolutionary trans-
port techniques.

One advertisement showed a newly designed machine
placing highway trailers on a rail car. "As easily as a
giant cat moving kittens . . ." Another shows a car with
100 tons of woodchips (paper in the raw) being tilted on a
giant platform which emptied the car in two minutes.
Other ads in similar vein have appeared in recent months
in many of the nation's leading publications. They carry a
message that breeds faith in the capability of the U. S.
transport system to meet every demand that the future
may place upon it.

FACT AND OPINION

By the year 2000, the United States could have elec-
tric generating units in the 3 to 4 million kilowatt range,
reports the Edison Electric Institute, trade association of
the nation's investor-owned electric power companies. The
largest unit in operation today is capable of generating
one million kilowatts.

Railroad history was made in 1897 when a steam loco-
motive in east Texas was completely powered by natural
gas. The first and only gas-fired steam engine in history,
it ran for 20 years before being retired. Today, 50 years
later, liquefied natural gas is being developed as a fuel
for supersonic transportation.

According to the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers As-
sociation, more than 30 per cent of the new drugs intro-
duced last year in England, France, Germany and Italy were
developed by American scientists.

Southern States Industrial Council**AMERICAN TEXTILE
INDUSTRY IN DANGER**

While the exotic new indus-
tries with electronics and space
age metallurgy receive much
public attention and considera-
tion, some of the most impor-
tant basic industries of the coun-
try are accorded second-class
treatment by the federal govern-
ment and are more or less
ignored by the public.

The textile industry, unfor-
tunately, is one of these basic
industries which continually
gets a raw deal. For years,
American textile companies
have had to wrestle with unfair
competition from Japanese
mills which have modern equip-
ment purchased with U.S. aid
funds.

Sad to say, the State Depart-
ment's disinterest in the fate
of the U.S. textile industry is
not the only problem afflicting
this form of American enter-
prise. There is another serious
threat against the prosperity
and well-being of an industry
which is a major employer es-
pecially in the Southern States.
This threat is a union takeover
which, if accomplished, surely
would render the industry un-
economic to the point where it
could not compete against for-
eign textile concerns. The re-
sult of such a failure to com-
pete would be damage to ma-
jor investments in textile
plants and the loss of thou-
sands of jobs. The reactionary
attitude of union leaders is evi-
denced by their desire for a
law to restrict the making of
synthetics which are among
America's modern marvels.

The union war against the
textile industry has been going
on for a long time. A fresh of-
fensive is under way, however.
It is being led by the Indus-
trial Union Department of the
AFL-CIO and the Textile Work-
ers of America. One company
has been selected as the prime
target — J. P. Stevens & Co.,
which gives employment to 44-
000 persons at 51 plants in the
two Carolinas. The union or-
ganization in charge of the new
offensive already has reported-
ly spent in excess of \$1.5 mil-
lion to carry out its mission.

Walter Wingo, associate edi-
tor of Nation's Business, re-
cently pointed out that "un-
ion bosses are angry because
the firm's (J. P. Stevens) em-
ployees have consistently vot-
ed against joining the Textile
Workers Union of America.
AFL-CIO." Robert T. Stevens,
president of the J. P. Stevens
mills recently told a House La-
bor Subcommittee that "the
crime of which we are accused
is that our 44,000 employees
have not indicated a desire to
join any union." He charged
that the head of the TWUA
"brazenly demands that free
speech be silenced, and that
our employees be delivered, will-
ing or not, into the keeping of
the union by government de-
cree."

The pressure, to be sure, is
not only from the union coali-
tion. It comes in even more
menacing form from the Na-
tional Labor Relations Board.
Anyone who has ever attended
a NLRB hearing and seen one
of the agency's trial examiners
in action surely knows that free
enterprise is the victim of
anti-business bias. The busi-
nessman just can't win when
he comes before the NLRB,
which is oriented toward the
aims of Big Unionism.

It is easy for liberal critics
to dismiss the textile industry
as a low-pay industry. Obvi-
ously, companies engaged in the
manufacture of cloth — and
facing competition from Asian
textile firms — are not in a
position to pay wages compar-

able to what is offered in the
aircraft industry, for example.
It is a fact of economic life that
some industries, producing
high-cost items for a develop-
ing market are in a better po-
sition to pay top wages than
are firms in less lucrative
fields.

The unionization of the tex-
tile industry in the South
would reduce these companies'
overall economic health. Invest-
ors would be scared away. In
the long run, unionization of
the Southern textile industry
would prove to be a great break-
through, not for the employes
of the U.S. textile firms, but
for the Japanese and Hong
Kong firms. Unionization, in
short, seems nicely calculated
to put the American textile in-
dustry out of business by forc-
ing them into an unprofitable
position.

The textile companies have a
hard time presenting these
facts to their employes. Fed-
eral labor laws are rigged
against employers, so that man-
agement is far from free to
spell out the overriding econo-
mic facts to the people they
hire. A textile company that
aggressively presents the econ-
omic facts of life to its em-
ployees is sure to have a head
on collision with the NLRB of-
ficials who apparently are de-
termined that people working
in the industry obtain only
one-half of the story.

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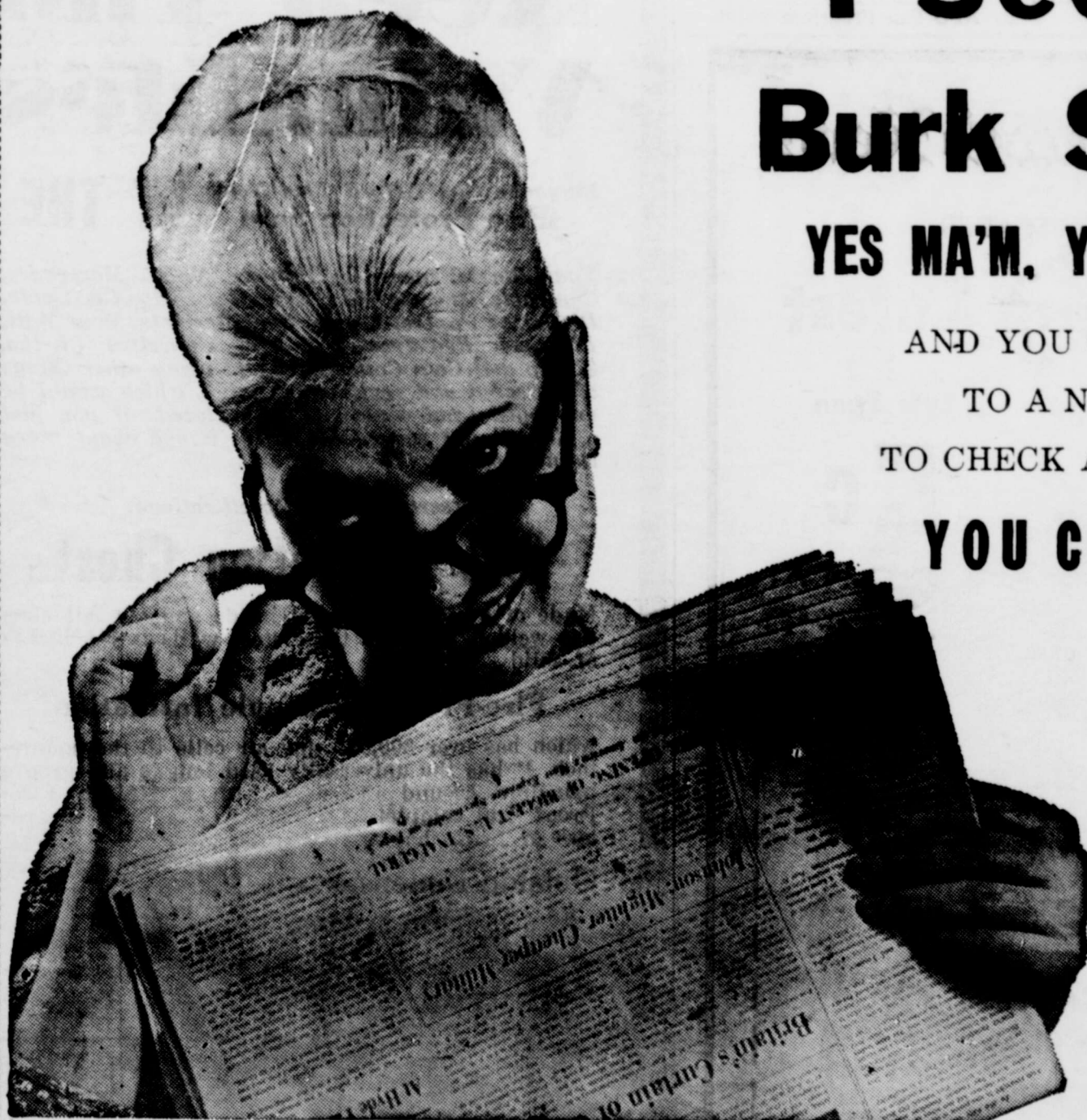

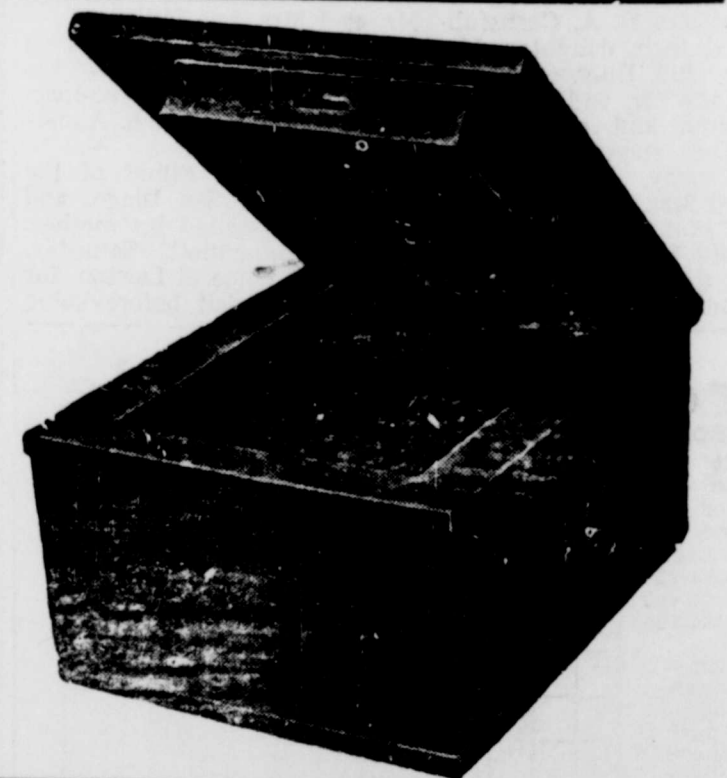

Middle East Halt Of Oil Imports Shows Oil Industry's Importance

Events in the Middle East have underscored the importance of a healthy domestic petroleum industry.

According to Oil Facts, state and federal officials and petroleum industry spokesmen agree that the crisis, which halted the flow of oil from that area at least temporarily, drove home two vital points:

First, U.S. security depends heavily on this country's petroleum reserves and on the in-

dustry's ability to produce and transport, during emergencies, far more oil than is normally needed.

Second, only a strong and healthy domestic producing industry can continue to provide this "margin of safety" for the U.S. and its allies.

The publication points out that among the factors credited with maintaining a strong U.S. oil industry are tax laws which encourage exploration for oil and gas, and policies which limit imports of crude oil.

Petroleum conservation techniques developed by oilmen in cooperation with state regulatory agencies are also cited as a key factor in maintaining the nation's role as the world's leading oil producer.
