Mrs. J. B. Maxwell of Lubbock is Council cookie chairman, assisted by Mrs. Oscar L. Crain, also of Lubbock.

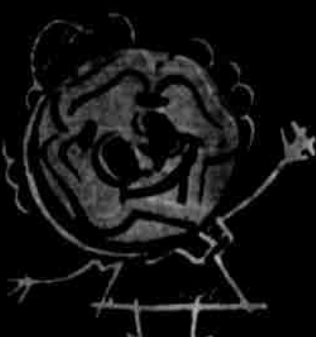
Mrs. Alton Clary of Post is the local neighborhood cookie sale chairman.

AUSTIN—Reported cases of infectious syphilis in Texas increased by 28 per cent last year, a tabulation of State Health Department records shows.

Communicable disease control authorities say the figure is still significant, but the rate of increase is so much lower than the 93 per cent gain registered for 1960 that they are cautiously optimistic about further improvements.

The discovery of penicillin in 1943 marked the beginning of a new era in venereal disease control. Prior to the development of the new drug, treatment was so long and unpleasant that most patients never completed it.

Penicillin made successful treatment possible in a matter of days rather than weeks or months. Using it as a tool, medical practitioners and public health officials began an intensive campaign to force syphilis into the ranks of "has been" diseases.

Many infectious patients were located when various states passed laws requiring pregnant women and couples contemplating marriage to have blood tests. Mass blood testing by industries and institutions located still others.

Techniques of interviewing "contacts" of known patients were developed and as each chain of infection was traced and identified, additional cases, came under medical treatment. By 1948 the incidence of infectious syphilis began to decline.

The decline continued until 1955 when complacency—perhaps due to over-confidence—caused a lack of interest in syphilis control. The downward spiral leveled off and case incidence remained fairly constant until 1958.

The following year's statistics revealed the disease to be on the increase throughout the United States. Texas recorded a gain of 47 per cent during 1959 and that astounding 93 per cent in 1960.

To counteract the menace, the Texas State Department of Health in July 1960 accelerated its syphilis control program to emphasize:

1. Greater activity in detecting infectious patients and their con-

tacts, and a rapid exchange of information by long-distance telephone concerning possible contacts.

2. Close cooperation between private physicians and health department personnel in matters pertaining to venereal disease contact investigation.

3. Continuous evaluation of techniques to reduce the number of unproductive contact investigations and interviews.

The lowered rate of increase in the number of new cases is evidence that the accelerated program is paying dividends.

the state has no airport aid to offer at the present time, but may have some limited funds in the not too distant future. He said that most federal airport aid coming into Texas goes to the big cities and that Post would be a "marginal case" for federal aid consideration because of the small number of based planes and its county's population.

He suggested that the possibility of federal aid be looked into and perhaps an application made before the 1962 deadline of March 15.

The federal government will pay 50 per cent of land and development costs but work must be done according to federal specifications.

One thousand private planes are being added annually to Texas' air fleet, the visitors emphasized.

Louie Burkes, Postex Mills head, in answer to a question said the local facilities are not adequate to bring Burlington's executive plane into Post.

It was estimated by Mayor Shytle it would cost about \$25,000 for a paved airstrip, 50 feet wide and 4,000 feet long, with a farm to market road base used.

Minimum lighting for such an airport would cost under \$1,000, the TAC men said.

Irby Metcalf asked both Judge Parker and Mayor Shytle their reactions to the proposal of a city-county airport. Judge Parker said he would have to meet with the court to discuss it, but the commissioners were interested in this area's aviation future.

The TAC men offered a considerable amount of literature on building and developing small airports and said they would be available for advice and aid in any problems or site selection. They recommended development to a Class IA facility which would call for a paved single landing strip, minimum lights, and gasoline facility with waiting room.

Seventy-five other Texas towns with TAC encouragement already have developed such airports, they pointed out, and paid for them individually or with their counties.

Considerable interest was shown during the meeting in airport development here. The conclusion at the end of it was for the Chamber to get an airport committee busy and work out something specific to present to both the city and county for their consideration.

Those attending the session included Parker, Shytle, Bryan J. Williams, Metcalf, Kuykendall, Arnold Parrish, Chamber Manager John Hopkins, Burkes, Victor Hudman, Henry Tate, Giles McCrary, Jim Cornish and Mrs. Joan Stewart.

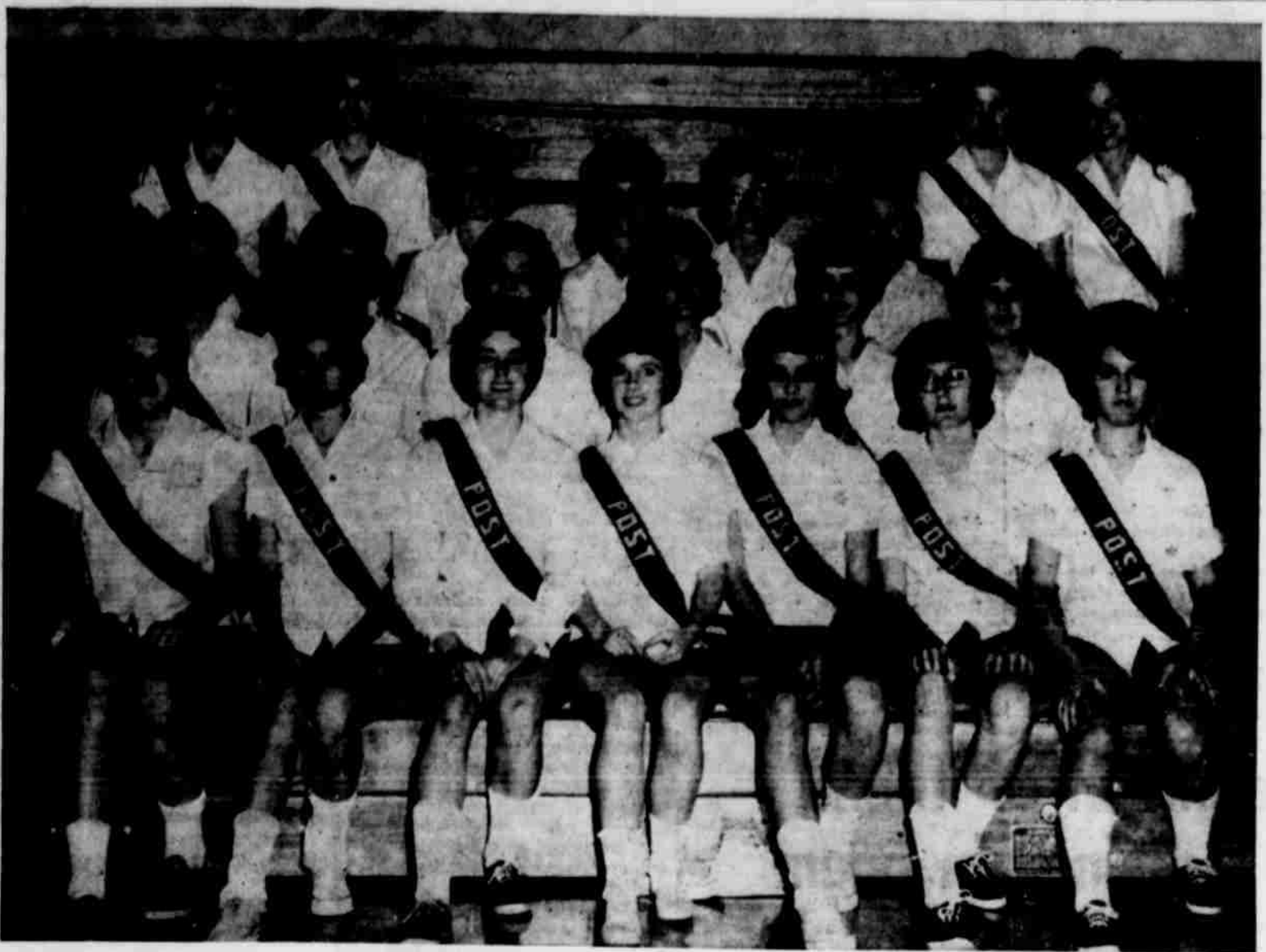

I Give You Texas ...

When I was editor of the Piggott Banner in 1920, Arkansas had a wide-open race for governor. There were seven or eight entries with the high man the winner—in other words, no runoff.

The best bet in the early stages appeared to be an able lawyer who had master-minded two or three successful campaigns for the governorship for other candidates.

But there was one entry who apparently was running with no hope of winning but just to keep the favorite from finishing first.

The other candidate devoted almost all of his speech to an attack upon the "lead buck," a big, broad-shouldered man who walked with steady tread. His appearance caused the rival to refer to him in contemptuous tone as "the proud peacock-Napoleon of the Ouachita."

The vitriolic one finished well down the list.

Tom C. McRae had been in Congress 30 years before and was reputed to be 70. Furthermore he was a banker—which meant, to the average voter in Arkansas in those days, that he was rich—yet so effective was the cutting-down to size done on "the proud peacock-Napoleon of the Ouachita" by his enemy that McRae was the high man.

And incidentally he made a fine governor.

Your columnist was McRae's campaign manager in Clay County. When he spoke in Piggott, someone asked, "How about so-and-so?"

Space capsules to tour nation in bonds drive
WASHINGTON, D. C.—Three Project Mercury manned spacecraft replicas of the famous "Freedom 7," "Liberty Bell 7," and "Friendship 7" which carried America's first astronauts into space will tour the country for U. S. Savings Bonds during the Treasury's Freedom Bond Drive in May and June. The public will be invited to examine at close range the entire spacecraft, including the interior of the capsule.

The tour, which is made possible by the cooperation of McDonnell Aircraft Corporation of St. Louis and the Chevrolet Motor Division of General Motors Corporation, Detroit—two of the nation's best promoters of the Treasury's Payroll Savings Plan—was announced by William H. Neal, national director, U. S. Savings Bonds Division.

The McDonnell Corporation, which designed and built the Mercury capsules for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, is now making the three full-size replicas for the Freedom Bond Drive. The spacecraft will be lent to the Treasury Department for the bond drive period, and returned to the company after touring the nation.

Chevrolet will provide as a public service three trucks and trailers on which the spacecraft will be mounted, as well as drivers, display signs and public address systems.

Third place at Amarillo

Post cagers win trophy

Post's independent basketball team, sponsored by the First National Bank, defeated Sporting Goods of Amarillo, 82 to 78, at Amarillo Saturday night to win third place in the regional TAAF tournament.

Earlier in the day, the Post team had been swamped by Graham Plow, 121 to 52, to be eliminated from championship contention.

The Post team, managed by L. L. (Bud) Avant Jr., received a handsome third place trophy, which is on display at the bank here.

In the third place game, Post got off to a fast start by scoring 27 points in the first quarter to their opponents' 18, and led all the way.

Richard Souter led the Post scoring with 32 points, followed by Wilbert Bigott with 28. Both are members of the Post schools' coaching staff.

Cold shooting contributed to Post's one-sided defeat in the first game. They managed only four points in the first quarter on a fielder by Souter and two charity tosses by Bigott. The latter's 20 points led the Post scoring. Bigott and Tom Buchanan, Southland cage coach, scored 11 points each.

The Graham Plow team won the tournament championship to qualify for the state TAAF meet.

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DIVISION OF ESTATES EXPLAINED

The death of an intestate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigated the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either, before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property—cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate—is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants. In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Where no parent survives, but there are brothers and sisters and descendants, the full one-half is divided among these survivors.

And, if there are no parents or brothers and sisters (and their descendants) surviving, then the surviving husband or wife inherits all of the real estate.

Prehistoric tusks found at Muleshoe

MULESHOE — A pair of elephant tusks about eight inches in diameter have been uncovered here by workmen using a ditching machine to install a sewer line.

A Texas tech geology professor set the age of the tusks at between 10,000 and 11,000 years after examining them.

The tusks were imbedded in one side of the ditch, about eight feet below the surface. The tusks apparently had been cut off right next to the skull by the ditching machine.

Also uncovered by the workers was a large tooth, presumed to be that of one of the elephants.

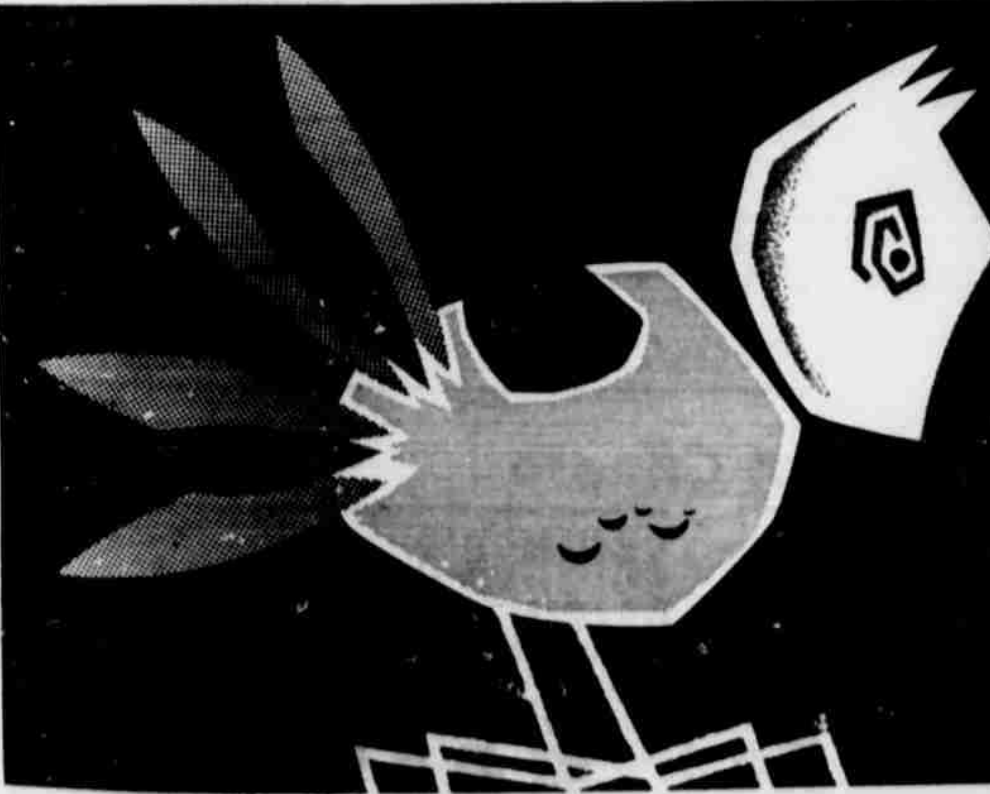

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Based on many different types of testimony at different times before the Senate Small Business Committee, it has long appeared that the United States Defense Department is quite calloused in its attitude toward small business.

But just recently it has come to light that the Defense Department, whether by design or stupidity, has become a party to schemes which are defrauding independent contractors.

When four Nike sites were constructed in the Cincinnati area, a Pennsylvania general contractor was awarded the general contract.

A sub-contract to build the sliding doors was given to a Covington, Kentucky firm. However, when they learned the condition of the general contractor, the sub-contractor requested payment in advance for the custom made doors.

Not only was this refused, but the sub-contractor was also threatened with suit if it did not complete the contract.

After the Nike sites were completed, this sub-contractor, and sixteen other sub-contractors, have never been paid.

When the sub-contractor had requested advance payment, they were told that under the so-called Miller act, they were fully protected.

However, when they proceeded to seek to collect from the bonding company which had

for not holding primary elections in every county and precinct, the GOPs embarked on a campaign to finance a primary in every county.

Paul Desrochers at Republican State Headquarters said, "We're working like mad to get a primary in every county." Two obstacles stand in the way: Getting funds in about 235 counties where the party has county chairmen, and getting chairmen for the other 19 counties.

Some Republican candidates have a regional flavor—like the 12 senatorial candidates who hope to represent 67 counties; or the 76 House of Representative hopefuls for 77 counties; and congressional candidates in all but seven districts. Republican party still wants general ballot representation for the winners among its two gubernatorial candidates, two candidates for lieutenant governor, and those seeking posts as congressmen-at-large, commissioner of agriculture, general land office and on the railroad commission.

A step toward solicitations was made by GOP state chairman Tad R. Smith who appointed Dudley C. Sharp of Houston, former US Secretary of the Air Force, chairman of the Republicans' finance committee.

I Give You Texas ...

When I was in Memphis, Tenn., attending high school, once a month the installment collector for the furniture company would come to our front door. He made his rounds with a horse and buggy. The buggy was black and had a top which he always kept up against the cold and wind in winter, the sun in summer and the rain which came at all seasons. This was along about 1914.

During vacation that year or maybe it was even later than 1914, I visited relatives in Clay County, Ark., and Uncle Frank drove a buggy. It was a sporty affair—no top, the wheels a bright yellow.

In 1919 when I went to Piggott to edit the Banner, Lon Vonnell drove a horse to a cart, really a racing sulky, drawn by a mare which was the champion trotter of the county-fair circuit.

In November 1920, I stepped off the train in Laredo and there were at least a dozen horse-drawn vehicles, with shouting drivers.

Now about the only time, you see a horse-drawn vehicle is in a parade. Hot Springs, Ark., has one or two carriages for the tourist trade; it is quite the thing to have your picture made in the victoria, I believe it is. Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, back in the 1930's, had two or three carriages—also for the tourists, and still may have.

These days, we still speak of horsepower—but it is produced by gasoline.

When I was a little fellow, I parted my hair in the middle. One day my father's best friend remarked in my hearing, "Boyce parts his hair in the middle to balance his brain." I immediately started parting it on the side. And still do—what there is of it.

Norman Hapgood, the magazine

asked Texas Research League to make a study of the commission's operations and the system of dividing the responsibility for Texas' water development among several state agencies.

The problem of water development and conservation in Texas is so great and controversial that the already-burdened League researchers estimate it will be 1963 before they can begin such a time consuming, comprehensive study.

Judge Otha F. Dent of the Water Commission expressed deep concern about meeting water requirements for 1980. Not only is it necessary to develop plans for constructing dams and reservoirs to fill the expected need, but the business of condemning land and building these projects involves as much as a decade.

One stage of the long-range development plan includes a \$65,700,000 reservoir on the lower Navasota River. But supporters have run into the problem of excessive chloride content caused by oil field salt water waste disposal—a problem repeated in many Texas streams. John Vandertulip will submit a report on the source of this pollution next week.

TOP ENGINEERS and administrators from the state highway departments of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana will gather this week to discuss uniform use of highway and street signs, signals and markings in an effort to increase driving safety.

Governor Daniel announced that traffic deaths over the past five years have averaged 230 below the 1956 toll. There were 2,611 traffic deaths in 1956, and the yearly average since then has been 2,381. Daniel credited the joint efforts of groups interested in traffic safety with the preservation of many lives.

1/2 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup cream, whipped

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Chill until thick and syrupy. Add mayonnaise and gelatin until smooth, then add diced Washington apples, celery and nuts. Fold whipped cream into mixture. Turn into 1 quart mold which has been oiled in cold water. Chill until firm. Unmold onto salad greens.

It's National 4-H Club Week

This is National 4-H Club Week, and the brightest spot of the local observance is that Garza County's agents for the Extension Service are under way with plans to broaden the program to include more boys and girls of high school age.

As explained by County Agent Syd Conner and Home Demonstration Agent Leta Smith, there are only a few 4-H members of high school age in the county and these few are scattered among the various clubs.

A meeting was to be held Tuesday night of this week as one of the steps of getting more of the older boys and girls into the program.

Right now, there are 124 members of 4-H clubs in the county and there are 11 clubs. If the current expansion program is successful, the number of members could be increased to near the 200 mark.

The agents also point out that there is always a need for adult leaders and that right now this is most keenly felt among the boys' 4-H clubs. Many Garza County men and women have given and are giving unselfishly of their time and efforts in serving as adult leaders but, as in the case of the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and other youth organizations, there is always room for more adults to help point the way.

All in all, the 4-H program in Garza County

has been a well-organized and successful one down through the years, but there is always room for improvement.

Today, nationwide, more than 93,000 4-H clubs, from Maine to California, are well into the 1962 program.

The agency that directs 4-H work is the Cooperative Extension Service, an educational arm of the land-grant system and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. One of its functions is to supervise extension personnel and 4-H activities in some 3,000 counties, involving 400,000 volunteer adult leaders and 2.3 million 4-H'ers between the ages of 10 and 21 years.

As times have changed and population shifted, so have the Extension Service and its 4-H program, devoted to the four-fold development of boys and girls: Head, Heart, Hands and Health pledged to clearer thinking, greater loyalty, larger service and better living.

The entire nation joins this week in the celebration of National 4-H Week. President Kennedy has taken time to convey a special message to the 4-H'ers, and plans to see a delegation in the White House office.

Another good reason for us to rejoice over our 4-H clubs is that they now have counterparts in at least 70 foreign countries.—CD

The sales tax is paying off

The pennies, dimes, quarters and dollars which the shoppers of Post have been ponying up in retail sales taxes since last Sept. 1 have helped run into money—\$52 million through Jan. 31.

At the rate of collections reported for the first four months of the sales tax, the total amount for the first fiscal year should come close to the \$258 million foreseen by State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert. That will go a long way toward making up the more than \$300 million of new revenue needed to take care of estimated state spending in 1962-63, and absorbing the deficit in the general revenue fund.

The sales tax program still has its shortcomings, but there is no doubt that it is paying off. It is well on its way to becoming what it

was designed to be—the master key to the solution of the state's exploding fiscal problem.

Meanwhile an extensive program of training a large field force of examiners and auditors to see that the sales taxes are paid is under way by the comptroller's department. When these enforcement agents get into full operation, collections should increase. But they first must be trained for the work.

Whether the increase in tax collections to result from efficient enforcement will exceed the amount of salaries to be paid a full field staff remains to be seen. In any event, the field forces are essential. In addition to seeing that the sales taxes are paid, they will see that merchants are licensed and have the proper permits required to collect the various taxes due.—CD

Help bring a foreign student

With Public School Week in Texas drawing to a close today, The Dispatch points out that tonight's benefit "basketball game" between the Post High School girls team and the Rotary "Dames" has something important to do with education.

The affair is scheduled to raise funds to bring a foreign student to Post the next school year to live in a local home and to attend high school classes here.

That is the top project of the high school's student council, but one which requires between \$550 and \$750 (estimated) to finance.

The Rotary Club has underwritten half the cost and this is one means of raising part of

those funds.

Bringing a foreign student to Post next year is going to give an added educational quality to student life around the high school next year. He, or she will be a "teacher" right at the teen level—teaching a different outlook on many things, especially things American.

It's a wonderful project. School will be out tomorrow for the annual weekend of teachers' meetings so the kids should be out in force tonight to enjoy the local cage windup of the winter season.

You can participate in it by coming out tonight and laughing your head off at the court antics you will see.—JC.

A still deeper significance

The hero's welcome accorded to Astronaut John Glenn—which began in Washington and was continued last week in New York—had heartfelt participation in 50 states and around the globe, wherever there were Americans to share in their pride over an achievement that was very literally out of this world.

But, fantastic as it still seems to most of us that a human can be shot into the airless void 150 miles above the earth, circumnavigate it three times in succession and return safely to a predetermined spot, the pent-up emotion released by his return home has a deeper significance.

This is the first time in many disheartening

years that Americans as a nation have had good news to celebrate. It is the first time since the unrequited gallantry of Korea that Americans have had the opportunity of saluting the sort of courage that presses ahead in the face of the known perils and the unknown as well.

While men live, nothing can tarnish the exploit of Col. Glenn and the 30,000 teammates whose toil and devotion and competence backed him up. But if, as the emotional wave he stirred gives us to hope, his fellow countrymen will tune themselves to the message implicit in his devotion to duty, then, certainly, his voyage will be a proud sequel to that of Columbus.—CD.

AT THE RISK of having some of our own glaring mistakes thrown back at us, I just can't help mentioning hearing a radio announcer say the other day, "The exact time in Lubbock is approximately 6:45."

This is Public Schools Week in Texas and if you like statistics, here are a few from Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar for the 1960-61 school year:

—Approximately 8,000 school buses transported 423,000 students more than 493,000 miles per day, enough to create a traffic jam 51 miles long. School transportation costs the state about \$16,224,000 annually.

—Texas schools ranked second in the nation in vocational education enrollment, with 331,939. Texas leads all states in vocational agriculture enrollment, is second in distributive education and home-making education, and ranks third in vocational industrial education.

—Almost 600,000 children in Texas public schools participated in the national school lunch and milk programs. They drank approximately 174,000,000 half-pints of milk during the 12-month period of 1961.

—Twenty-two Texas public high schools have taken advantage of a new State Board of Education authorization to advance superior and talented students at their own rate through advanced standing and advanced credit examinations.

—By investing the Permanent School Fund, \$18,360,000 of non-tax funds were provided for public school use last year. Current rate of return is 3.49 per cent. PSF investments at par value totaled \$445,091,644 at the end of November.

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Experts Back Versatile Youths

When 400,000 men and women volunteer their time and know-how to help 2.3 million 4-H club members "learn, live and serve," the results are no less than spectacular.

For instance, the Head, Heart, Hands and Health youths finished nearly 4 million projects in more than 40 different categories just this past year.

In almost every instance, the completed project benefited the entire family and in many cases, the community as well.

The information comes from the Cooperative Extension Service which directs 4-H club work.

Further proof of the far-reaching effect of 4-H was found in 1,900 record books maintained by state award winning club members. The records were reviewed in the headquarters of the National 4-H Service Committee last November, said Norman C. Mindrum, director, for the purpose of selecting boys and girls for scholarships and trip awards to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Miss Sheila Nixon, 20, of Pomona, California, winner of a \$400 Ford scholarship, commented: "The awards we win in 4-H work aren't totally ours. Many people have helped us win them."

Another national champion, who won a Sears-Robuck Foun-

dation scholarship for leadership, is 20-year-old Hoosier farmer Wayne Buck. He has a 4-H record so long "it would fill a book." Now a student at Purdue University, Buck credits 4-H training with teaching him how to accept responsibility, and to better understand the world and the people in it.

President Kennedy expressed a similar feeling when he said in a recent message to 4-H members: "I would commend you especially for your constructive and worthwhile efforts in learning to live and work cooperatively with others."

In the beginning, 4-H Clubs were intended for farm youngsters, and offered only projects in crops, livestock, home canning and cooking. The present program embraces a wide range of agricultural, home economics and scientific programs. With the exception of a few such as livestock, tractor and field crops, the projects can be carried on in town as well as on the farm.

4-H Moves to Town
Today, membership in 4-H Clubs is about equally divided between farm and non-farm boys and girls. The main reason for this shift is the disappearance of the small farm from the American agricultural scene.

Meanwhile, more and more business people are participating in 4-H as it moves into suburban and urban areas, Mindrum points out. National 4-H Club Week, National 4-H Club Congress, Farm-City Week, achievement days, county and

state fairs, Farm-Safety Week and the like are but a few examples, he said.

Director Mindrum, who is a former 4-H member and state extension official, has this to say: "To sum up 4-H achievement one should call special attention to the concurrent efforts of many which, over the years, have made the 'learn by doing' program the success it is."

Business Gives Cash
"Besides the paid and volunteer workers who carry out the teaching-training aspect, there are business people who contribute know-how and money," he added.

Approximately 60 different business concerns provide funds for 4-H through the National 4-H Service Committee, he said.

No extension on car inspections

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today there will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection of all motor vehicles in Texas.

"The April 15 deadline this year falls on a Sunday, a day when most inspection stations are closed," Garrison noted. "We are not asking these stations to remain open on that day, and, under the

law, there can be no extension of the deadline."

He said approximately 2,000,000 vehicles in the state remain to be inspected during the remaining 10 weeks of the 1962 inspection period. He urged motorists to get their inspection stickers early, pointing out that as the deadline approaches waiting lines will begin forming.

"We would like to point out that the purpose of motor vehicle inspection is to discover any defect that might become a link in a chain of events leading to an accident," the DPS director said.

"It is encouraging to note that since the inspection program began in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to three per cent."

Under the law, persons operating vehicles without the 1962 inspection sticker on and after April 16 are subject to arrest. Authority to enforce the provisions of the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in the patrolmen of the Department of Public Safety, sheriffs and their deputies.



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TROOPS FOR WEST

The business of withdrawing troops from Manassas, where they are not wanted, to Kentucky, where they are wanted, is already begun by the rebel leaders. Gen. Beauregard, we are told, in leaving for his new command in Western Kentucky, took with him 15,000 men. This depletion of the rebel forces on the Potomac at the very moment when the expiration of the term of enlistment is about to diminish their numbers still more seriously, will no doubt suggest to our General-in-Chief, if not the possibility of an army in front of his lines, the propriety of transferring a large body of his troops, no longer needed for the defense of the Capital, to the seat of war in the West. —The New York Times (reprinted in Texas newspapers).

Gen. Butler has returned from Washington, and from the fact that he has given large orders for provisions, it is believed that his expedition will at once proceed. There are some 500 or 600 men at Lowell, and nearly a full regiment at Pittsfield, awaiting orders. There are also several regiments in Maine which it is expected will be attached to his command.

INDIAN DEPREDATIONS

We regret to learn that on Friday last, 10 Indians visited Boerne, Blanco County, and killed five persons, whose bodies have been found besides two or three others are missing, and it is feared are killed. The names are Donop, about six miles north of Boerne; Baptiste, near Boerne, and Reinhart, living in Boerne. Two of Kendall's shepherds are killed, two escaped, and

one missing. The Indians are finely mounted on American horses, and do not appear to wish to steal, but to murder. The bodies of all the killed had been stripped. This is truly a lamentable state of things. Boerne is about 35 miles north of San Antonio. We also hear that the Indians have again visited Atascosa County, stealing Mr. Durand's horses and making their escape.—San Antonio Herald.

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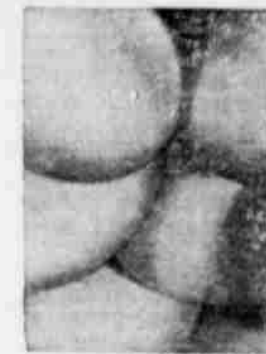

City Council told Monday night

Water troubles crop up early this year

Predictions that Post's water shortage problem might be more serious this summer than in the last two or three years were voiced at Monday night's meeting of the city council.

While no definite action was taken toward overcoming a possible water shortage, Mayor Powell Shytles advised the councilmen to be "thinking about it," particularly about the extension of the city's present water field.

The only other action taken by the city council Monday night was the closing of the filing date for the city election to be held April 3, and the decision to list the candidates' names on the ballot in the order in which they filed.

★ ROTARIANS PREP FOR 'BIG' GAME

Playing Coach Frank Blanton is keeping mum on his starting lineup for the Rotary Dames, who tonight face the Post High School Does in a benefit basketball game in the high school gym.

Tipoff time is 7:30 p. m. and a good-sized crowd is expected with all receipts going to the Student Council's fund to finance bringing a foreign student to Post for the 1962-63 school year.

For some unexplained reason, the Rotary squad has been hard hit by a rash of "injuries" and "illnesses" as game time approaches.

Some 18 Rotarians turned out Monday night for a practice session with Irby Metcalf and Rev. Ed Herring looking "especially sharp." Others who missed Monday night promised to be on hand tonight.

The pressing water problem was emphasized by City Supt. Henry Tate, who told the council that an alarmingly high 17,000,000 gallons-plus of water were used here in February. On one day, Feb. 13, more than 800,000 gallons flowed through the water lines, which Tate said was unusually high for this early in the year.

The city superintendent sounded further warning by saying that the present capacity for daily use is a little less than 1,000,000 gallons, as compared with a peak capacity of 1,250,000 gallons.

A sharp decline in the pumping capacity of the 18 city wells now in use was given by Tate as the reason for the threatened shortage.

The council also discussed and decided to do something about their contract with S. C. Storie Sr., with whom they contracted a few years ago for city water from his wells.

Mayor Shytles explained that Storie's complaint of pumping problems seems to be well-founded and that it is something a competent engineer should go out and try to evaluate.

Mayor Shytles' suggestion—and the council agreed with him—was that in any expansion the city stay as close as possible to the present water field and system.

It was pointed out by the mayor that it will be anywhere from two and a half to three years before the city can be furnished water from the White River dam project.

"In the meantime," he said, "we'd better do something pretty quick about increasing our water facilities."

The city superintendent was authorized to get prices on water pipe pending expansion of the water field and tying in to present facilities.

At Monday night's meeting, the city council also discussed a Land Use Plan, submitted as the second interim report of Kock & Fowler and Grafe, Inc., who were employed several months ago as engineers for the city planning project.

Copies of the Land Use Plan, which were first submitted last week at a meeting of the City Planning Commission and some of the city councilmen, were handed out at Monday night's meeting.

The first interim report from the engineers was made several months ago on projected population.

Councilman Roy Baker, who was injured in a fall at his home here last October, was present at Monday night's meeting, the first he had attended since before his injury.

Chamber to look into airport development

The Post Chamber of Commerce has accepted the assignment of spearheading an effort to investigate the possibility of a city-county airport for Post and Garza County.

This development came at the conclusion Wednesday afternoon of a meeting of Post Chamber directors. Mayor Powell Shytles, County Judge J. E. Parker, and other Post business men with three representatives of the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

The three TAC men flew into the Post airport, inspected the facilities, and were brought into town by a greeting committee for the session in city hall.

Cliff B. Green, executive director of the Texas Aeronautics Commission from Austin, told the local group that his commission "is trying to see that all Texas towns are accessible by air."

"You people are ahead of many towns and are fortunate to have your present facilities," Green said, referring to the private leased airport on FM-122 three miles north of Post.

He was accompanied here by John G. Uranga and Laddie J. Roark, both flight safety advisors. Spencer Kuykendall, local flyer, in answer to a question by Green, said the present airport site had been leased for a ten year period by himself and Victor Hudman and has two based aircraft. He said both the county and city aided with equipment and labor to help these facilities last year.

He termed it "fairly well adequate for the time being," but added, "more business aircraft would land here if we had better facilities."

Green pointed out that leased facilities are hard to develop because one hesitates to risk major improvements such as paved runways if the airport might lose its site.
