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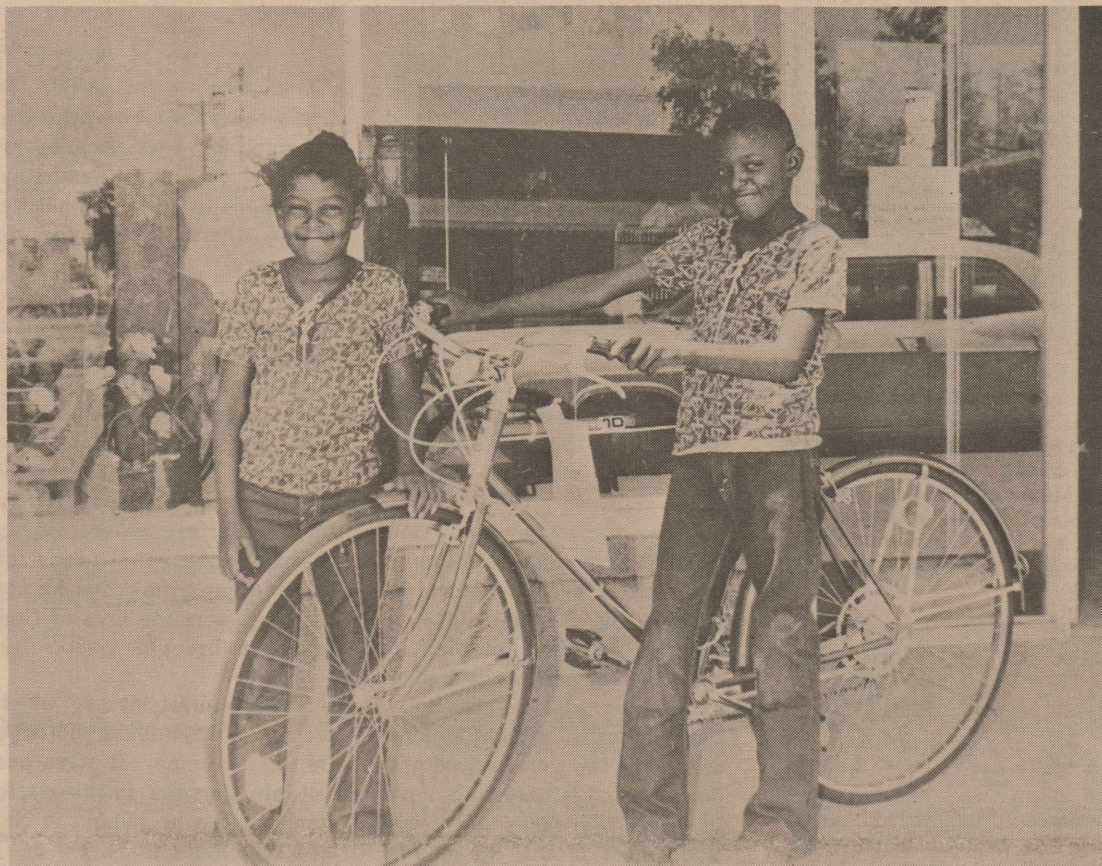

The Hart City Council issued

the following plea:

"Due to the tremendous demand for water, our city wells need some help during this hot dry summer. Please do not water your yards or

gardens until after 9 p.m.

"It may be necessary to further limit our water usage until we get some rainfall. Any other water conservation will help the situation."

Lanny Tucker, Vo Ag Teacher, To Attend Annual Meeting

Lanny Tucker, vocational agriculture advisor of Hart High School, will attend the Annual In-Service Education Workshop sponsored by the Agricultural Education Department of Texas Education Agency in Austin July 29-Aug. 2 in Houston.

Some 1400 agriculture teachers will attend the four-day meeting which will be held in the Shamrock Hilton Hotel. The first general session will begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday.

Award tenure pins will be presented Tuesday evening in the Annual Awards Program. James Blakely of Wharton, acclaimed at America's number one intellectual humorist, will address the group.

Club members are sponsoring another interest in the Hart Day celebration. They will give away a 22 automatic rifle with scope at 10 p.m. that evening.

School Board Adopts Policy

School board members, in their July meeting, adopted a sick leave and personal leave policy for personnel of Hart schools. The policy reads:

(1) All Professional employees of the Hart Independent Schools will be allowed five days absence per scholastic year with no limit on accumulation on account of personal illness or death in the immediate family and may receive full pay for such absence.

(2) Professional employees of the Hart Independent School

shall have five days of personal leave time in addition to his sick leave time. Personal leave time is not cumulative and no more than five days may be so charged during any ten month school term. When an employee claims personal leave time, the school will withhold \$17.50 per day from his earnings.

(3) Employees of the Hart Independent Schools may serve as jurors when selected. Exemptions are permissible when executing proper forms. There shall be no deduction from their pay for days missed from their position in the school. In accordance with state law, they will remit to the business office for deposit to the credit of the school district such funds as may be paid them for jury service. All employees shall return to their duty promptly upon being excused from jury service whether such excuse is temporary or final.

(4) For absence on the part of a teacher beyond the sick leave period, the teacher's pay shall be reduced at the rate of 1/190 or a full days pay of the regular annual salary, except for the personal leave time provided in board policy.

Total production for the county was 1,800,000 lbs.

Because 1973 had one of the latest freezes in recent history, harvest started several weeks behind schedule, with rapid progression until the end of the year, White said.

Other counties in the top five in castor bean production include Lamb, Parmer, Bailey and Hale.

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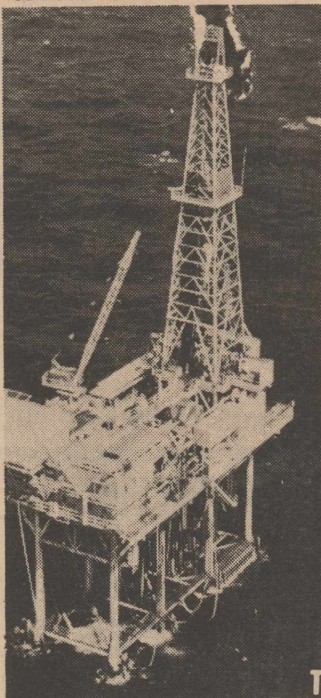

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Thought For The Week

"The mountains may depart and the hills disappear, but my kindness shall not leave you...My Promise for you will never be broken, says the Lord who has mercy upon you." (Living Bible)

These words were spoken to a people who had lost heart. They had so long been captives in that they could hardly believe the prophet when he made them take the chance that was open to them to return home. How could they be sure they would have the strength to rebuild their shattered city? What could they depend on that would give them the power to meet the future and rebuild the past?

The answer of Isaiah was clear. There was one thing in life on which they could utterly depend, the steadfast love of God.

As we survey our world and look into the future, there is nothing we need so much as faith in the steadfast love of God. Countless people, of course, do not believe in God or even think of the possibility that He exists. Others looking around on the world's need and distress find it hard to believe in a God who cares and loves. But behind all this the love of God is always breaking through in one way or another.

To those who have eyes to see, God's steadfast love, in spite of all that hides Him, is always reaching out to find us.

For many He breaks through in the loveliness of nature. In Jesus the word was made flesh and dwelt among us. His coming is God's final breakthrough. The last place we would expect to see this is at Calvary. Yet it is there in the sacrifice of Christ that it is most clearly and gloriously revealed.

His steadfast is waiting to

lift us from the depth of despondency which so often meets us when the sense of sin overwhelms us and we feel there can be no hope of forgiveness. God's love has room in it for those whose memories seem to dark for hope.

Our concern for others is God's steadfast love breaking through, for God uses every gift which our sympathy compels us to give. All that we do for others is promoted by His grace.

A speaker was haranguing a crowd about the sorrows and misery of the world and using them to deny the existence of God. Someone interrupted to ask where he got the sympathy that made him so sensitive to these suffering. Where did his concern about the needs of others come from? Did he not realize it was the love of God breaking through?

The steadfast love to which we are so often blind will have its final triumph. It stretches out into eternity. In this world it may often be hidden in the veil that hides God from us.

Here Paul says, "We see through a glass darkly, but one day the dawn will break through and we shall see Him face to face."

SQUASH CASSEROLE

1/2 can green chilies
2 c. squash (cooked) salted
3 T. butter
1/2 c. mushroom soup
1 T. minced onion
2 boiled eggs (chopped)
1/2 c. cracker crumbs
1/2 c. milk

Place in a baking dish; top with grated cheese and bake in oven at moderate temperature.

PECAN PIE SURPRISE BARS

1 pkg. Pillsbury Yellow Cake Mix
1/2 c. butter, melted
1 egg
1 c. chopped pecans

FILLING

2/3 c. reserved cake mix
1/2 c. firmly packed brown sugar
1 1/2 c. dark corn syrup (Karo)
1 t. vanilla
3 eggs

Grease bottom and sides of 13x9 inch baking pan. Reserve 2/3 c. dry cake mix for filling. In large mixing bowl, combine remaining cake mix, butter and 1 egg; mix until crumbly. Press in prepared pan and bake at 350 for 15 to 20 minutes until light golden brown. Meanwhile, prepare filling. Pour filling over partially baked crust; sprinkle with pecans. Return to oven and bake for 30-35 minutes until filling is set. Cool, cut. For filling, mix in large mixer bowl, combine all ingredients; beat at medium speed 1-2 minutes.

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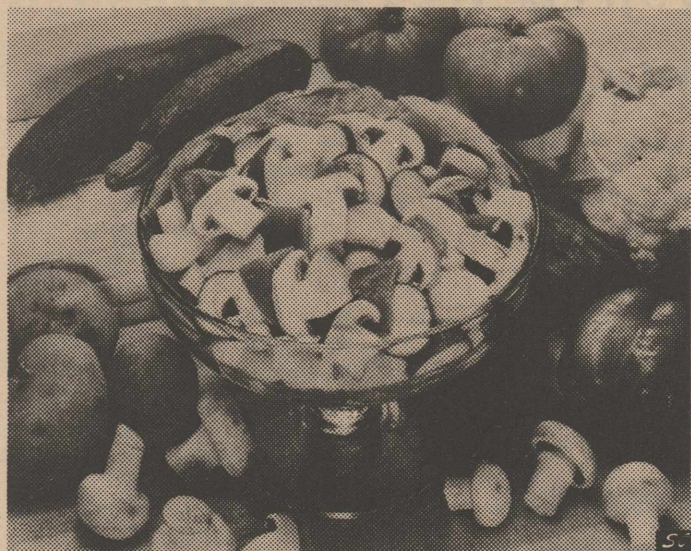
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Mushrooms Star In A Summer Salad



When the weather gets hotter and hotter, it requires extra ingenuity to dream up appetizing meals. This Hearty Mushroom Vegetable Salad gives off an inviting aroma; teamed with cold cuts or a simple cheese or egg dish it makes an ideal lunch or supper.

Mushrooms give this salad a meaty, satisfying texture tossed with potatoes, zucchini and green peppers or other vegetables from your garden or nearby produce counter. These alternates might be crisp-tender green or wax beans, cucumbers, cauliflower, tomato chunks, spinach or other leafy salad greens.

It's a good idea to marinate the cooked potato chunks in the dressing for at least an hour. The other vegetables — especially the mushrooms — pick up dressing if mixed just before serving.

HEARTY MUSHROOM AND VEGETABLE SALAD

¾ cup salad oil	¼ teaspoon ground black pepper
½ cup wine vinegar	1 quart potatoes cut into ½-inch chunks
½ cup chopped scallions	1 pound fresh mushrooms or 2 cans (6 to 8 oz. each) sliced mushrooms
¼ cup chopped parsley	2 cups sliced zucchini
2 teaspoons salt	1 cup diced green pepper
1½ teaspoons sugar	
1 teaspoon oregano leaves, crumbled	

Combine oil, vinegar, scallions, parsley, salt, sugar, oregano and black pepper; mix well. Cook potatoes in boiling salted water to cover for 15 minutes or until tender; drain; place in a large bowl. Stir oil mixture; pour over potatoes; mix gently; cover and chill thoroughly. Rinse, pat dry and slice fresh mushrooms or drain canned mushrooms. Add mushrooms to potatoes along with zucchini and green pepper; toss lightly. Serve in a lettuce-lined bowl, if desired. Yield: 8 portions.

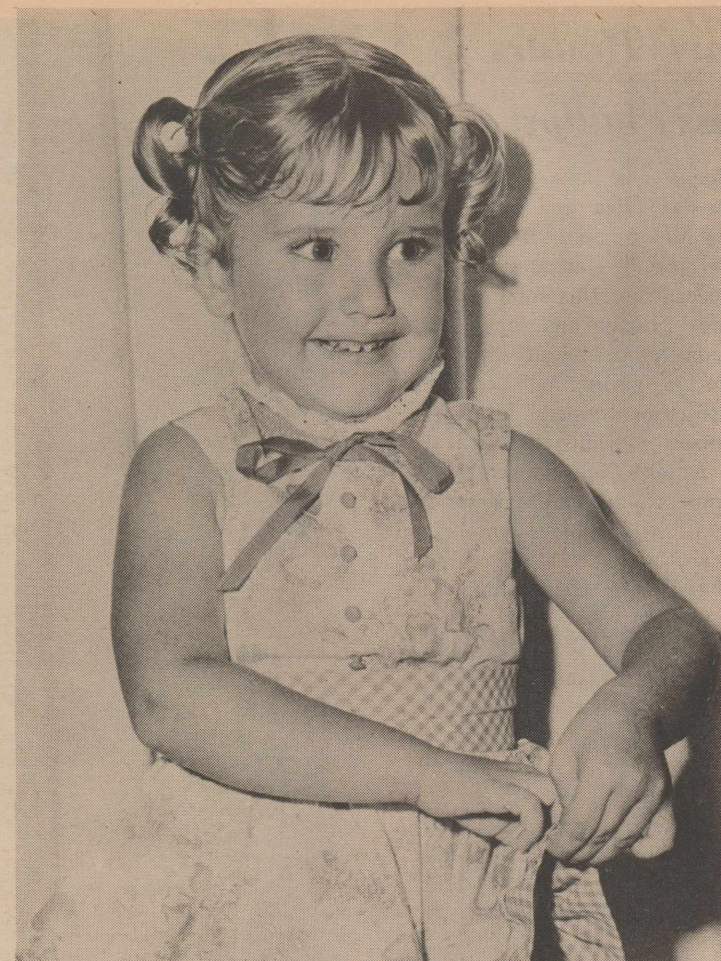

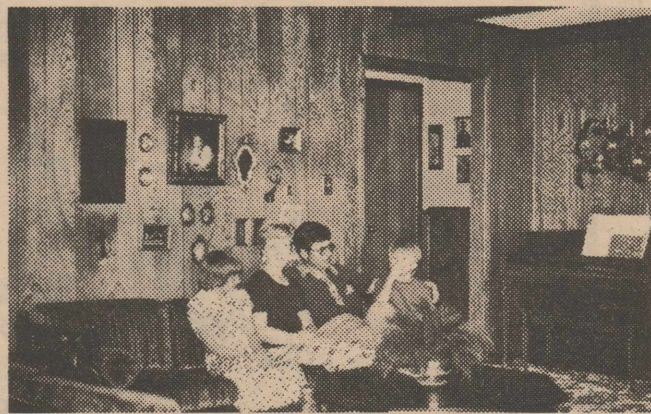
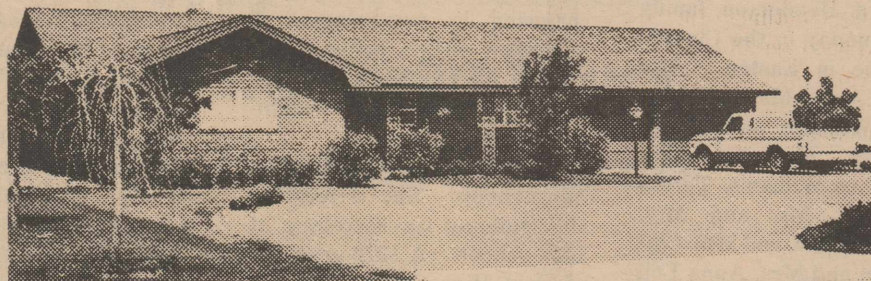
Hart Junior Riding Club won first place Saturday in the Swisher County parade. They also rode in the grand entry at the rodeo. Fifteen riders participated.

Animals Decorate Walls

Clifford and Diana Ray became "overnight interior decorators" this summer when they transformed one of the rooms of their home in Odessa into a fascinating and lively nursery complete with gaily decorated walls and furniture.

A pink lion, yellow giraffe with orange dots, a seven-foot white rabbit and a long-legged road runner with blue and green body and yellow legs stretched out in running position are just some of the life-sized animals which decorate the room prepared as a nursery for the couple's first child expected in September.

Other life-sized animals include a horn-playing elephant with music notes and a mother snail with two babies.

The project was one that neither of the prospective parents had ever attempted. They are not sure what gave them the idea of painting the home-created nursery walls with animals.

"Neither of us are artists," Diana confesses. "But the tempa paint was so easy to work with. If we messed up we just went back over it with a wet rag and started over again."

"It didn't take that long is what's amazing...three days for the animals and three days for the furniture," she says.

The Rays outlined the animals in pencil on the walls of the room and took tempa paint and brush and ventured into the project.

Married five years, the young Rays painted the nursery furniture in green and orange. The baby crib and a portable crib belonged to Clifford's sister-in-law who used the furniture herself as a baby over 30 years ago.

"Trying to find 'childproof' green and orange paint was a real chore. Cliff looked all over for it and finally found some," Diana says.

She says they considered drawing the animals on cardboard, cutting them out and then painting them.

"We figured the baby would have them down eating on them so we figured why not do it on the wall," she says.

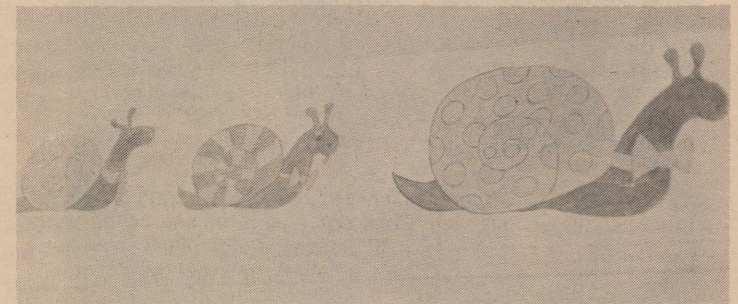
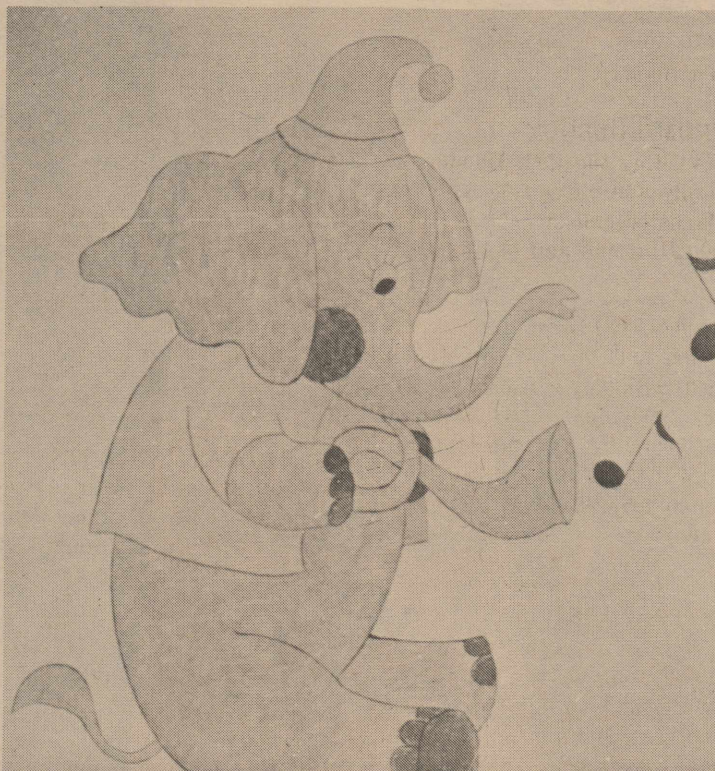
After the figures were painted on the wall, they were sprayed with a sealer so the

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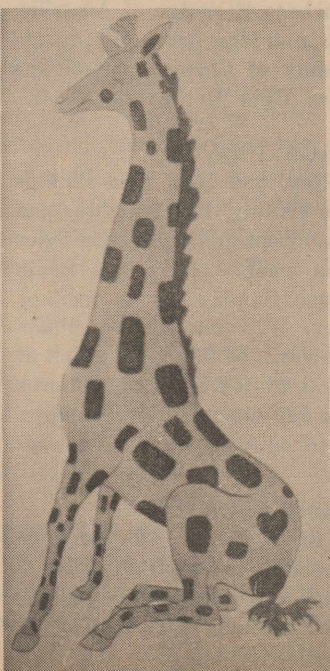

Kitchen Shower Honors Miss Miller Thursday

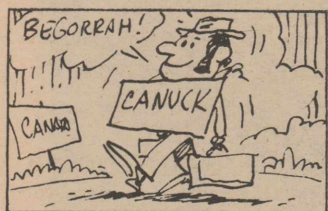

Vegetables Big This Summer



Whether home garden grown or harvested from the produce counters, now is the time to make the most of vegetables. A change from the usual hot cooked vegetables are those marinated, chilled and served cold with a dressing of real mayonnaise. Although the platter here calls for specific vegetables, use whatever is in season and supplement, if needed for color or flavor, with frozen or canned vegetables.

MARINATED VEGETABLE PLATTER

- | | |

| 2/3 cup corn oil | 1/4 pound sliced fresh mushrooms |
| 1/4 cup lemon juice | 16 asparagus stalks, cooked |
| 1/2 teaspoon salt | or 1/2 pound whole green beans, cooked |
| 1/4 teaspoon tarragon | 1 head lettuce |
| Dash pepper | Tomatoes, if desired |
| 1 cup cooked sliced carrots | 1 cup Hellmann's or Best Foods real mayonnaise |
| 1 cup fresh cooked corn, or 1 can (8 ozs.) whole kernel corn, drained | |

Mix together corn oil, lemon juice, salt, tarragon and pepper. Put vegetables into separate bowls. Pour marinade over each. Marinate 2 hours, stirring occasionally; drain. Arrange marinated vegetables, lettuce and tomatoes, if desired, on platter. Mix together real mayonnaise and 2 1/2 tablespoons marinade. Serve with vegetables. Makes 4 servings.

Notes Interest Rate Change

John A. "Dick" Perrin, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Dimmitt, announced today that the Federal Land Bank's billing rate on farm and ranch variable interest rate loans would be increased from 7-¾% to 8-½% effective August 1, 1974. The billing rate on rural residence loans will be increased from 8-¼% to 9% on the same date. the variable interest rate loan plan was introduced by the Houston Bank in July, 1969 with a billing rate on loans outstanding to "float" with the variations in the money market.

In making this announcement, Perrin stated, "The Bank's decision to make this change was necessary because of the increased cost of bonds sold which had increased with every issue since the beginning of the year, with the most recent issue selling at an all time record high of 9.21% average effective rate. The Bank had delayed action in raising the billing rate in order to assess the duration of

present high interest levels, and there is nothing in the present monetary situation to indicate any improvement in the immediate future."

The Federal Land Bank of Houston makes long-term real estate loans on farm and ranch land and rural residences throughout Texas and now has more than 913 million dollars in volume of loans outstanding. The local Association makes and services loans in Castro County. Officers and directors of the Association are Ed Drerup, Jack Summers, Irvin Ott, Wade Mills and George Sides.

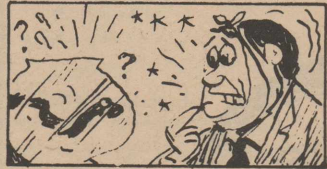

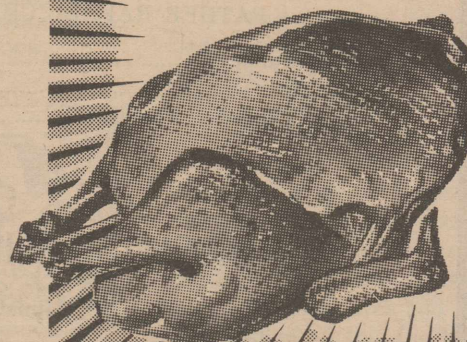
