

Olton Forgery Trial In 1938 May Bring Lifer's Freedom

State Appeals Court To Hear Charges of Rights Violation

A jury trial in Olton nearly 29 years ago that helped send J. F. Romines to the state penitentiary for life may soon help him go free.

Criminal Court of Appeals, beginning sessions in Austin today, will consider the man's claim that the Olton trial is void on grounds that a district judge denied him right of council in the trial here where he was found guilty of forgery.

The five-year sentence was the first of three felony convictions eventually leading to Romines' life term 11 years later.

The original ruling was handed down Aug. 29, 1938 by 64th District Judge C. D. Russell in the days when Olton was the seat of Lamb County.

A second felony conviction followed in Lubbock in 1942. A Hale County jury, finding Romines guilty on a robbery charge, determined that he should be confined for life in the state penitentiary at Huntsville as a habitual criminal.

A ruling voiding the Olton felony conviction would mean freedom for Romines, now 61, since three felony convictions are required under Texas law before a man can be given a life sentence as a habitual criminal, according to his attorney, Plainview lawyer Paul Lyle.

Lyle said his client's plea is based on a 1963 U. S. Supreme Court decision (Gideon vs. Wayne Wright) which overturned the conviction of a Florida man on similar grounds that he was denied right of council.

Romines case came to light in January of this year when he wrote letters of inquiry to the 154th District Clerk's office in Littlefield about the conduct of the 1938 trial.

Dist. Judge James A. Joy at Plainview June 24 granted the convict's petition for a writ of habeas corpus and ordered state authorities to deliver the prisoner before the Criminal Court of Appeals this month. Judge Joy also appointed Lyle to represent Romines at the hearing.

Lyle said George Beto, head of the Texas Prison System, would probably appear before the appeals court within the next

Hearing Called On Injunctions

A hearing will open at 9 a. m. today in 154 District Court at Littlefield to consider pleas of injunction filed June 30 against the board of directors of the new Earth Spring-lake Hospital District.

The request, made in a petition to Dist. Judge Pat Boone Jr. who called today's hearing, would prevent directors from conducting business in behalf of the hospital district until a contest over the validity of the district and its board can be resolved.

Twenty-two voters in the May 27 election which created the district charge what they term "so many and such grave irregularities" in calling and conduct of the election that it was impossible to determine the true results.

They contend the injunction be made on a temporary basis, pending a thorough investigation and a new election, with the injunction becoming permanent if the original propositions voted on in May fail to pass at the polls.

The petition goes on to allege violations of the Texas Election Code, "illegal" or "unjust" actions by county officials in calling or holding the vote, and illegal voting by at least 60 persons while some eligible voters were denied the right to vote.

County Judge O. J. Mangum and County Attorney C. R. Wilkinson (et al) answered the dissatisfied voter's reply filed in the same court July 24 by challenging them to show proof of their allegations.

two weeks, to give cause for his client's confinement. The contested trial here stemmed from charges that Romines, using the alias J. G. Laney, passed a forged check for \$5,20. He entered a not guilty plea at the time.

Under current Texas law--not in effect in 1938--forged instrument under \$50 are treated as misdemeanors and carry fines or imprisonment in county jails.

Huckabee Plans For Greenbelt

Jimmy Huckabee can stop waiting and start practicing this week to play in the Greenbelt Bowl All-Star Football Classic to be kicked off in Childress Aug. 12.

The 18-year-old former Olton Mustang star was named to play in the annual game by coaches in this district at the end of last season.

Jimmy, standing six foot-four and weighing 170 pounds, played defensive linebacker and some offensive positions during his senior year, 1966-67. He had played two years on the varsity squad.

Similar honors went to Mustangs Dennis Givens and Darrell Glover two years ago. Kathline Carson, 16, was chosen to represent Olton in the queen contest held in conjunction with the game. Each player is allowed to list his own nomination.

Huckabee will leave for Childress and the Greenbelt grid iron Monday for two-a-day workouts in preparation for the game.

He will be joined by 43 other outstanding athletes who graduated last year from 2-, 3-, and 4-A schools throughout this part of Texas.

The group will be divided into West and East teams. Coach of the West will be Max Bumgardner, head coach at San Angelo State College. Head Coach Buddy Forbes, assisted by coach Ronnie Giles, both of McMurry College in Abilene, will lead the East team effort. "There will be football scouts from all over," Huckabee said.

Victors Named

Louis Hair, Houston Hamby, and Dr. Lynn Fite carried away the "lion's" share of the honors Tuesday when the Olton Lions Club handed out trophies and golf balls to winners in their annual 36-hole golf tourney at the ORC last week.

Hair, fresh from his victory at the Club Tournament here earlier last month, took first in the championship flight with a 146 gross score for the three-day match.

Charles Polk came in second in the top flight, and Andy Andrew placed third after placing first for the past two years.

Hamby took first place in the first flight competition with a gross score of 161. Net was 135. He was followed by Bob Duncan and Ralph Glover, respectively.

Dr. Fite's winning gross score in the third flight was 173 for a net total of 134. Next highest contenders in his class were Russell Strain, second, and Bill Kelley, third.

New golf balls went to members who placed below first in each flight.

Hair was holding another trophy before presentations were complete--the second one was for turning in the lowest gross score. He also picked up three new golf balls as prize for winning the driving contest.

Andrew, who missed his usual first on the links made up for it by winning the 18-hole putting contest. His effort included five aces.

Little Grower Thinks Big

C. K. Boozer has the biggest little garden in town. Almost everything he grows on his 50-foot by 140-foot lot in east Olton is literally a bumper crop. Boozer said he began setting out seeds there three years ago just to have something to do.

Now the passtime has grown all out of proportions.

His okra, for example has to be picked one pod at a time instead of by the traditional hand full-- simply because one of his pods is a hand full, or more like an arm full

Each pod measures about 35 inches in length at maturity and weighs more than five pounds. The unorthodox okra originated in Japan.

Boozer explained he got the seeds from a stranger who passed through here two years

ago and admitted had never seen such plants before and knew nothing about them except that they were good to eat and had a taste like squash.

"I planted them (the vines) along the fence the first year," he said, "and they weighted it down." This year Boozer enforced his vines with poles and heavy mesh hog wire.

Other oddities in the Boozer garden include three foot beans which, as the name implies, grow to be about three feet long.

He ordered the bean seed from a seed company in Iowa. Boozer, who is in semi-retirement, admits his hobby has developed into more of a job than he had expected.

He works as much as 10 hours a day caring for the heavy water demands of the large plants and the normal needs of his more normal crops in the plot.

"All I get out of it is the joy of growing it and giving it away," he said.

Boozer also grows a variety of fruit trees, tobacco plants, potatoes, and flowers; but they do not seem to hold the fascination for him or his neighbors that the giant varieties do.

Better Season Seen For Olton Mustangs

Coach Says Good, Writers Say Great

Olton's arm chair and bleacher-bound quarterbacks will be giving their annual intuitions a workout Aug. 14 as this year's Mustang hopefuls take to the field for the first athletic workout of the 1967 season.

Head coach Don Beck is expecting approximately 65 boys to turn out for the rigorous two-a-day practices. Training will be restricted to a morning schedule for the first few days he said.

Socks and shoes will be issued next Wednesday. The coach predicted nine seniors would be among those returning. Another 15 are likely to be juniors, 17 sophomores, and 25 freshmen.

Players and positions, to be released later, may shift considerably on both varsity and freshmen lineups between the first day of practice and the first non-district tilt of the season with the Morton Indians there Sept. 8, according to Beck.

Fourteen lettermen are planning to return to the grid iron to help better the Mustang's 5-5 won-loss record in regular season play last season.

At least four consistent starters in last year's lineup will see action in 1967. Among them will be tackle Steve Burleson, guard Eddie Hooper, and half backs Charles McClain and Benny Akin. All of these players started in at least eight of Olton's 10 regular season games last year.

"If things go good for us we could win district," said the Mustang mentor. "We are going to improve our record over last year," he said, adding "but how much will depend on how the ball bounces for us, how many injuries we get, and things of that nature."

Sports prognosticators writing in the latest issue of the Texas Football Magazine showed considerably more optimism for local material than their coach. Their annual predictions showed Olton first in District 3-AA for the coming season.

Beck said the choice was probably made largely on the strength of the Mustang defeat of the 1966 state playoff representatives last year.

The magazine poll ranked

Memphis second, Floydada third, Friona fourth, Lockney fifth, Dimmitt sixth, Abernathy seventh, and Hale Center eighth in this season's district contests.

The team racked up a 4-3 district won-loss record last year to capture third place under Beck's first year of leadership here.

The head coach, voicing the cautious pessimism traditional with football coaches, warned against whole-hearted faith in the periodical's predictions. He recalled the magazine had picked Hale Center to win district at the beginning of last season, but the team landed in the bottom by the end of the year.

Abernathy, named as runner-up to Hale Center in 1966, did, in fact, follow the forecasted leader--to a position next to the bottom.

Memphis, which took the title last year with a 5-2 district record, remains Beck's personal choice as strongest competition in the district race again this time. Seven starters are due back in the team's fast, big lineup.

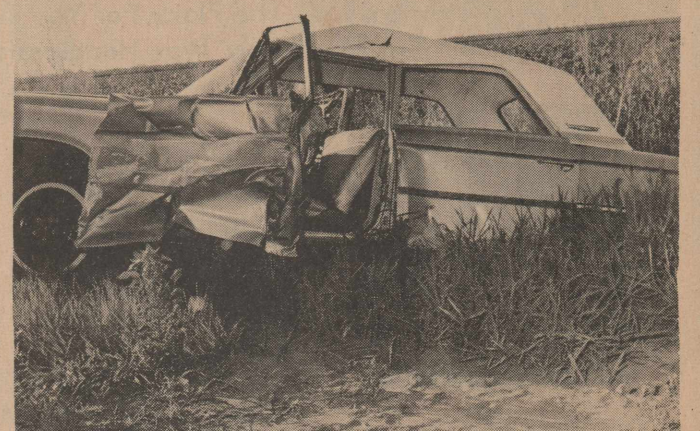
He also considers at least two other teams as threats in the season to come.

"Everybody is overlooking Hale Center," Beck commented of the predicted cellar dwellers. "It's going to be a bad mistake." He noted that two sprinters from Hale Center's fleet-footed relay team would have to be surpassed in the Mustang drive for victory.

Floydada, second district challenge on the Mustang schedule, will be another team to watch out for, according to Beck. The team has seven boys returning this year weighing over 200 pounds each.

Beck stressed that luck and spirit would ultimately mean the difference between victory and defeat for every team in the district.

"This is a well-balanced district," he said. "There's not a team in the district that couldn't beat any other team. The team that's freer of injuries and the team that's highest will be the team that wins the ball games."

Former Olton Man Gives Gift

(Editor's note: The following editorial, which appeared in the Del Rio News Herald, relates the undying generosity of Alvin N. Ogden, an Olton pioneer. His wife, Amarena (Lott) Ogden, taught school here from 1925-26 and her husband served as school bus driver. He left Olton in the late 1920s to enter the immigration service, but the family continued to visit here until his death in Del Rio two years ago.)

The gift of sight is a wonderful thing most of us take as a matter of course but to a 16 year-old girl in San Antonio the gift of sight is a miracle made possible by a Del Rio man whose identity she will never know.

Nor did he know her. She had been sightless for 11 years but now she sees in one of the demonstrations of cooperation that restores our faith in man's concern for his fellowman.

The Del Rioan became interested in the Lions Club eye bank some time ago. After careful thought this man, who had spent his life in a life of service, became an active participant in the program. He was the first person from Del Rio to make such a contribution and the 13th in Lions District 2A2 since the organization became operative about November of last year.

When he died recently, the cornea of his eyes were transplanted to those of the young girl to give her back her sight.

From the time he expired until the operation was completed, a rare demonstration of cooperation saw many persons working together for the good of the teen-ager they did not know.

The attending physician in Del Rio made the proper arrangements for transportation of the cornea; Border Patrolman James Blocklinger worked to get the precious cargo flown from Del Rio to San Antonio; other physicians worked in San Antonio to make the operation and within a few hours the young girl had regained the miracle of sight.

Morris Rubin of Del Rio is the Lions Club member who is responsible for the program in District 2A2, which is a very large district. He is also secretary-treasurer of the Lions Eye Bank program.

When men are in moral conflict over the globe, it is heartwarming to know that a Del Rio man was generous enough to give a priceless gift to a girl he did not and never would know.

Soften gelatin in water in top of a double boiler. Add sweetener and lemon juice; heat, stirring until gelatin dissolves. Remove from heat and add crushed berries. Let stand until mixture begins to thicken; then beat until light and fluffy. Beat egg whites until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Spoon into six individual molds or a large three cup mold, lightly oiled. Chill until firm.

Farming For Fun

Mrs. Lee Sherman said she began working in a field when she was a young girl on a farm in Arkansas. Today, many miles away and many years older, Mrs. Sherman, 77, still works in the field -- behind her home at 202 Ave. A.

"I've never known anything but work," she said, thinking back to memories of rocky farm land in Arkansas now tucked far back in her active mind.

Mrs. Sherman explained that she was forced to work to keep her four and a half acres of land free from weeds and mosquitoes. After a moment, however, she added: "The biggest reason I do it is to have something to do."

She said she enjoyed working during the early morning hours in her garden. She pointed proudly to the huge onions -- the likes of which she had never seen before -- which are her current crop.

She confessed that her son Basil, who also lives in Olton, often worried about her work schedule.

"But I don't pay him any mind," she laughed as she tugged at the strings of her ever-present bonnet. "I know more about what I can do than he does."

Basil is only one of Mrs. Sherman's big family. Others include Earl, Tampa, Fla.; Alman, Port Arthur; Hugh, Victoria; Leon, Odessa; Albert, who died in infancy; and a daughter, Mrs. Vera Simpson, Port Arthur. Her husband died two years ago, she said.

She has planted peach trees, plum trees, apricot trees, grapes, oversized onions (though not realizing it at the time they were out of the ordinary), and a multitude of flowers. And as any good field hand knows, plowing is essential for any good yield. So it is a common sight to see this "Lady Farmer" in the field and behind a hand plow at 8 a.m. Other times she is often on the work end of a hoe breaking a path to her barn through weeds as tall as she is.

When will she retire? "When I die," she snapped back with a smile. "I just get miserable when I don't do anything." The smile faded from her normally beaming face as she thought about quitting.

"You sit around and feel sorry for yourself and don't get anything done and never have anything and pretty soon you get to where you can't do anything," she reasoned. "If you stay busy, you'll stay -- a long time anyway."
