TO PASS ON TRANSFER OF GAS FRANCHISE

Next week the City Commission of Ballinger will authorize Barney Carter, oil and gas man of Ranger, to transfer the gas franchise of this city to G. L. Ohrstrom & Co., of New York, which corporation will finance the building of the gas line from Coleman county to Ballinger, via Talpa, on to Rowena, Miles and San Angelo, it was stated Saturday morning by Mayor S. B. Raby.

Mayor Raby said that the commission here would take the same action that the San Angelo commission took in regard to the transfer when the proposition was put up to them, and action is expected early next week.

The new concern was given the transfer with a promise of quick work in construction of the line, according to the San Angelo Standard. Gas will be here on or before October 12, this year, it was stated in San Angelo, and will be furnished the citizens by that date.

The franchise of this city was granted to D. C. Boyd of Cisco, last year. He worked on the plan for some time and then transferred it to Mr. Carter, his associate.

Following is the story telling of the action taken by the San Angelo commission:

"San Angelo will have natural gas piped to the city and delivered to citizens not later than Oct. 12th, this year, according to present plans. The city commission Thursday afternoon, authorized Barney Carter, who has held a franchise since Oct. 1926, to transfer it to a corporation, with the restrictions that the obligations of the original franchise be contained and that the company assume all of the burdens and obligations that were therein contained.

"Before permitting the transfer of the franchise, the commission wired the National City Bank of New York, in order to ascertain the ability of G. L. Ohrstrom & Co., to finance gas distribution plants for the cities of San Angelo, Ballinger, Miles, Winters and Rowena.

"The wire was answered by the New York banking institution giving full details and information concerning the reliability of the company to fulfill the contracts made, and recommending the company.

"A good natural gas supply, serving as a cheap fuel, will be an incentive to industries to locate in San Angelo. An interview with Louis M. Roberts, head of the western office of G. L. Ohrstrom & Co., permitted some idea of the possibilities that may be expected from the natural gas developments.

"We intend to start work on the project at an early date and hope to have it finished at the earliest possible time," said Mr. Roberts. "Work will be started on the main pipe line and in the cities of San Angelo, Ballinger, Winters, Miles, and Rowena at the same time.

"The company is fully organized to do the work, the preliminary survey has already been made and we have secured bids for the construction of pipe lines and distributing systems in the various cities.

"In mentioning the gas supply, Mr. Roberts declared that his company had a supply from a field in northern Coleman county, with 27,000 acres under lease, and with four producing wells at the present time.

"The wells under open flow would produce more than ten times the actual requirements of the cities served," said Mr. Roberts, "and this assures an abundant supply of gas for all time."

"In discussing rates, Mr. Roberts said that they will be the same as provided in the original franchise or 75 cents per 1,000 cubic feet for domestic purposes, less a 10 per cent discount for the payment of bills before a certain

BRUSSELS CHEERS "SLIM" ON VISIT

(By Associated Press)
BRUSSELS, May 28.—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, American trans-Atlantic flyer, landed here this afternoon.

His monoplane was landed amid a great storm of cheers. He was escorted from the Franco-Belgian border by two Belgian army planes acting as escorts. Trailing him were several other planes which had acted as an escort from Paris.

PARIS, May 28.—Feted and honored by France for the last week, Captain Charles A. Lindbergh hopped off today for Brussels, where King Albert and his subjects waited to pay him tribute.

Flying "The Spirit of St. Louis," the plane in which he made the non-stop flight from New York to Paris, the young American aviator departed to the roar of a great crowd of well-wishers.

BRUSSELS, May 28.—King Albert received Capt. Lindbergh at the royal palace today soon after his arrival from Paris.

It was a meeting of the "flying king" with the "king of the flyers," the Belgian sovereign having himself spent many hours in the air.

Lindbergh was also introduced to Queen Elizabeth and all other members of the royal household.

WASHINGTON, May 28.—The award of the Distinguished Flying Cross to Capt. Charles A. Lindbergh, was approved today by President Coolidge.

114 DROWN IN MISS. FLOODS

NEW ORLEANS, May 28.—One hundred and fourteen persons have lost their lives thus far in the Mississippi flood, the American Red Cross reported today.

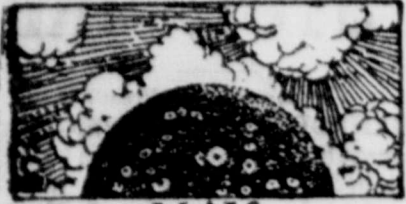

Gravity Affects the Moon



THE MOON AT LAST QUARTER SHOWING CRATERS.

INSTITUTION OF WASHINGTON.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 28.—
Dr. Fred E. Wright of the staff
of the Carnegie Institution, chair-
man of a committee of dis-
tinguished scientists who are
making a special study of the
moon, is convinced that "gravity
is one of the most important
of the many factors which must be
taken into account in the consid-
eration of geological problems."

On the moon the gravitational
pull is only about one-sixth of
that on the earth and is too weak
even to hold an atmosphere to the
surface. Under such conditions,
he explains, a 75 millimeter gun,
which has a range of five to
eight miles on the earth, would
shoot from 130 to 280 miles
on the moon, while "Big Bertha,"
which threw shells into Paris
from a distance of 72 miles
during the World War, would be
able to hit an object 2,250 miles
away.

Materials hurled into space by
volcanic action with initial veloci-
ties comparable to those on the
earth would be flung far out in-
stead of falling back into the
crater. This, he thinks, could
account for the cleanly chiseled
appearance of some of the craters
disclosed in photographs of the
moon.

Even if the craters are not

volcanic in origin, but are caused
by meteors, as one theory ex-
plains them, the lack of gravita-
tional force would still be a
factor, since the absence of atmos-
phere would permit them to
strike the moon with unimpeded
speed and penetrate the crust to
a considerable depth, setting up
an aureole of intense compres-
sion which would rebound elas-
tically and eject a quantity of
material.

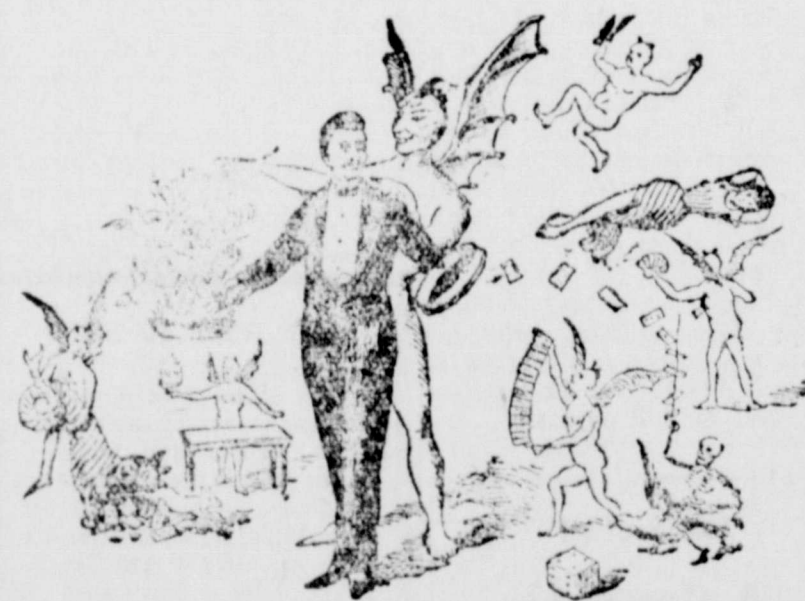

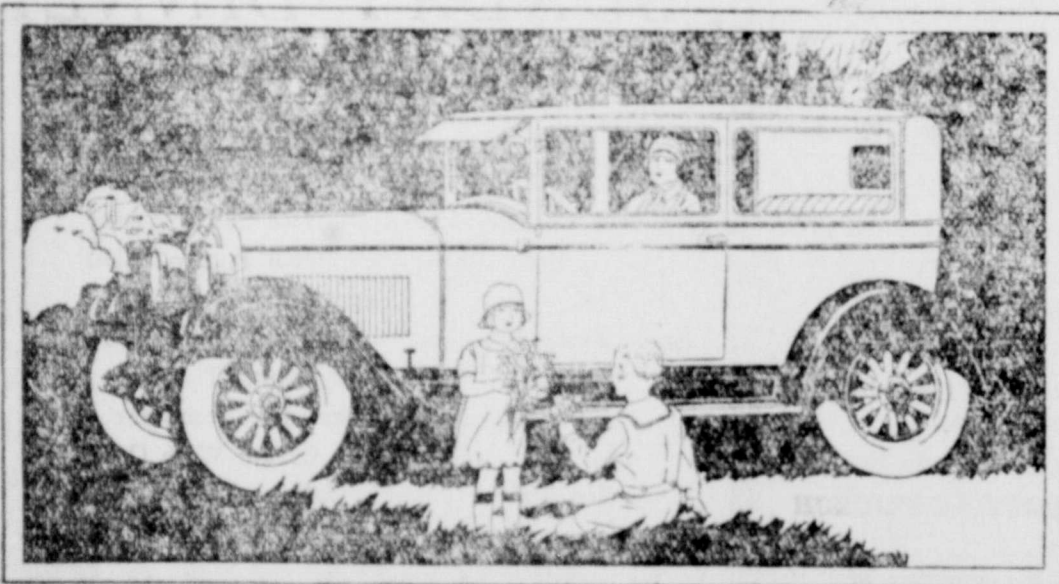

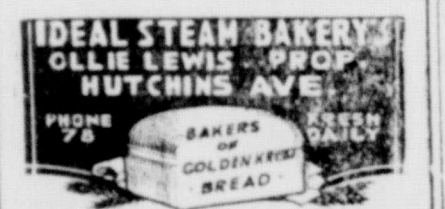
