### Johnny Baumann Welding Skill Winner

Welding skill, plus the ability to describe in a written entry why and how they built their shop project, has won awards totaling \$15,000 for 272 boys taking shop courses during 1963-64 in the nation's high schools and trade schools as announced by Charles G. Herbruck, Secretary, The James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation, Cleveland, Ohio.

These boys, representing 160 schools in 34 states, received awards in the annual program sponsored by the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation of Cleveland, Ohio, to recognize outstanding achievements in the nation's school shop.

First Award in the vocational Agriculture Division went to Mike J. Gates, 17, Mt. Whitney High, Visalia, Calif., with a field spray rig for use on his family's farm.

Winning Fifth Award in the program was Johnny Baumann, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Baumann of Loraine and a Senior in Loraine High School. His entry was a Combination Cattle Hay-Grain Feeder which was constructed in the school shop. He received a certificate, a sterling silver tie-rack along with a check for \$50.00 for winning fifth.

Awards were made by a board of judges headed by Dr. E. E. Drees, Chairman of the Department of Electrical Engineering, Ohio State University.

A binder containing the award entry was returned to Loraine High School for display or whatever help it can be in stimulating or guiding students in future participation in this competition and to be kept as a permanent school record. The entry was under the supervision of Raymond Holt, Vocational Agriculture Teacher in Loraine High School.

### Bulldogs Defeated By Stanton Buffaloes

Loraine's Bulldogs were defeated by the Stanton Buffaloes Friday night in Stanton, the final score being 50-12. This was not a district game.

In the first half, tailback Larry Rankin passed to halfback Randy Britton for Loraine's first touchdown. The play covered 38 yards.

Stanton's David Dunn made 3 touchdowns covering 102 yards with Johnny Swanson scoring the two extra points. Dink Polson covered 5 yards for a score in the first half.

Buffalo Mike Hall opened the

third quarter with a touchdown covering 23 yards and also kicked the extra conversion.

Polson went 77 yards for another score for Stanton with Hall adding the extra point.

The Bulldogs scored again in the fourth on a six-yard run by Rankin for Loraine's final run of the game.

Hall booted a 37-yard field goal for Stanton in the Fourth and Johnny Graves scored on a 33-yard pass from Larry White. Hall kicked the conversion.

In reading Silver Answer, one is thrilled as the story discloses the Colorado boom towns and Denver in the 1890's are the colorful, crowded back drop to the dramatic story of a spirited lovely woman and her struggle to preserve her happy marriage to a courageous young minister.

Bridge To The Sun is a beautiful, tender and moving love story, the true report of an international and inter-racial marriage of a Japanese diplomat and an American girl from the mountains of Tennessee. They were married in 1931, just as tension between their two countries was mounting, and their constant dream was of a "rainbow across the Pacific".

In Mexico any exchange of pleasantries between the sexes leads either to the altar or to bullets, but Elizabeth Borton did not realize this when she went south of the border on a week's newspaper assignment. Unknowingly she danced an entire evening with charming Luis Irevino, and visited with his parents, and tasted some of Macmacita's dainty cookies. All Monterrey knew what this must mean. Only Elizabeth was surprised to find herself engaged and to return there one year later as Luis bride. This is the fascinating story as unfolds in My Heart Lies South.

In the story of "White Mother," we find two ragged little negro girls, who see a white angel. So it seems to Veanie and Mingi, seven year old twins in a small Florida town, half savage, motherless, caring for their paralyzed and dying father. Alone they fought for their lives, stole food, struggled against a hostile world. Then chance led them to the white section of town and the door of Mrs. Rossie Lee. It proved to be the door to a new life. This is a true story.
