TELEGRAM IS RECEIVED BY MAYOR BERRY

The proposition worked out between representatives of the city of Cisco and the Bondholders Protective committee at New York city for settlement of the city's huge municipal debt on the basis of 25 per cent of the total, has been accepted by the committee. The action means that \$4,700,000 will be sliced from the more than \$6,200,000 principal and interest that the city owed, and that the new principal of \$1,598,335 will be funded in 40-year term bonds bearing interest beginning at one per cent graduated up to five per cent over a 16-year period.

Lake Cisco Water Revives Sandy Creek

Water released from Lake Cisco to flow down the dry stream bed of Sandy creek, filling dry holes and quenching the thirst of thousands of cattle, Friday evening had reached a point about 16 miles north of Cisco, Water Comm'r Winston and Street Supt. Joe Clements, who went to that place, said. Stockmen along the banks of the creek were happily watching the revivifying fluid as it poured over the dry sand.

COST OF BLDG. MATERIALS ARE REDUCED SAT.

Prices of building materials in Cisco, and in other communities in this code district, dropped Saturday 10 to 15 per cent. The lower prices were authorized at a meeting of the district code authority in Mineral Wells Friday, it was announced by F. E. Harrell, Eastland county code authority chairman. Harrell called a meeting of the Eastland county committee for next Tuesday evening at 7:30 at Eastland to determine details left to the jurisdiction of county boards by the district authority.

COMMITTEES ON BOOSTERS' PLANS NAMED

Committees to develop projects in which the Cisco Boosters, young men's town development organization, are interested were named at a meeting of the board Friday night in the Laguna hotel. Vice Pres. Hubert Seale presided. Discussion of a number of cardinal projects took place, and committees named in each instance. A meeting of the full organization on Friday, September 7, was decided upon.

Corn Produces Well In Spite of Drouth

Ears of corn that produced an estimated 15 bushels per acre on unirrigated ground were exhibited in Cisco Saturday by A. H. Lockhart, seven miles south of Cisco on the Rising Star highway. Mr. Lockhart showed ears of white and yellow Supercrop and Bloody Butcher corn, each of which was filled to the tip. The corn made without rain, he said.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18 — AAA officials today pondered the plan of Sen. Bankhead, Dem.-Ala., for increasing the cotton loan rate from 10 to 13 cents a pound. They refused to indicate the proposal's ultimate fate, but were understood to regard it favorably.

Moore Back in Race On Ferguson Issue

DALLAS, Aug. 18 — Fergusonism as an issue was emphasized in a new place in the democratic run-off campaign today when State Sen. Joe Moore of Greenville jumped back vigorously into the race for lieutenant governor of Texas. Senator Moore had sent notices to all newspapers in the state announcing that he would withdraw from the race, but before time for the statement to be released he read that former Gov. James E. Ferguson had endorsed his opponent, Sen. Walter Woodul. With that, he changed his plans, sent telegrams cancelling his statement, and announced that he was back in the campaign fighting harder than ever.

Body of Assaulted Girl, 16, Is Found

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 18 — An all-night search for pretty Celia Cota, 16-year-old high school girl who failed to return from a short walk last evening, ended today with the finding of her body behind a shed near a park. She had been slugged and criminally assaulted, authorities said. In reconstructing the crime, they said the girl had been strangled to death following the assault.

Humble Station Is Robbed Saturday

For the second time in recent weeks, the Humble service station at A Avenue and 16th street was entered by burglars early Saturday morning. Theft of several grease guns, a considerable quantity of oil and gas and other loot to total between \$50 and \$75 in value was reported. Entrance was gained by jimmying a window. A few minutes before the night patrol arrived to discover the robbery a car left the station in a great hurry, leaving a gasoline hose still draining gas from a pump officers said.

Minister Freed by Trio Near Nashville

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 18 — The Rev. R. H. Askew, 28-year-old minister of Goldsboro, N. C., kidnaped from near his home Tuesday night, was freed by three captors ten miles from here today. He caught a ride to Nashville with a farmer. Announcing his identity, Askew told officers he was kidnaped at Raleigh, N. C., Tuesday afternoon. Near Goldsboro, he said, a strange man stopped him and asked him to take him to Raleigh where the stranger's daughter was sick. After reaching there, three unidentified men forced him into a large sedan, he said.

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MANY PHASES OF ECONOMIC INFLUENCE PROVIDED BY PROPOSED BRAZOS RIVER CONSERVATION PLAN

A great concord of projects linked in a net of influence that will directly affect one-sixth of the area of Texas and one-seventh of the state's population will be presented to congress next January when a measure is introduced to appropriate \$50,000,000 for flood control and power development on the Brazos watershed. F. E. Harrell, a member of the executive committee of the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation district board, returned from a meeting of the board with members of congress at Waco Wednesday. Cong. Buchanan, chairman of the house appropriations committee; Cong. Mansfield, chairman of the house rivers and harbors committee, and Cong. Cross, member of the banking and financing committee, conferred with the board. The three, Mr. Harrell said, were even more enthused over the project than the board, if that were possible. Buchanan promised to do everything in his power to have the necessary legislation passed, he said. New in Phase The project is both unique and one of the most important conservation programs in the country, said Mr. Harrell. It is the first example in the United States of an effort at united stream flood control. The Brazos river, he pointed out, is the only river in the state that has not been cluttered up with water rights, so that legal phases of the program are relatively easy of handling. An appropriation of \$50,000,000 will be sought of the federal government to construct a series of 12 major dams and a number of smaller units and to build a larger hydro-electric power plant at one damsite, the other dams to serve as "feeders" to this main site. The revenues from this plant are expected to amortize the debt over a period of 50 years without interest. Power would be generated at an estimated cost of 5-10th mills per KWH and sold to power companies at 1.5 mills per KWH, who would pass along the saving in generation costs to their customers and continue to realize their profit. There is no intention of entering into competition with private utilities, said Mr. Harrell. The lower cost of water power generation would be passed to the public through private systems just as the

LONG-BOSSED SOLONS ENACT 26 SPITE LAWS

BATON ROUGE, La., Aug. 18 — Fights broke out in the gallery and on the floor of the Louisiana house early today, a few minutes after Huey P. Long's legislative steam roller voted to exclude the press from its sessions. A newspaper photographer was slugged in the gallery by several guards, presumably a part of the Long political machine. A reporter rushed to the photographer's defense and there was a brief engagement. On the floor two members scuffled but finally were separated by the sergeant-at-arms. At 3:30 a. m. both senate and house adjourned sine die, having been in session since Tuesday and having approved, under the noisy and spectacular domination of Long, 26 laws that removed from the city of New Orleans practically all rights to govern itself.

Greetings Are Sent From Stratosphere

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18—A letter designated as "stratosphere mail" and carried aloft more than 60,000 feet in the gondola of the National Geographic society—army air corps balloon, soon display in the physics section of the Franklin Institute museum.

The document was sent to Dr. W. F. G. Swann, director of the Barto Research Foundation of the Franklin Institute, who supervised the

construction of instruments used in the stratosphere trip made recently from North Dakota.

It is signed by the three air men, Major W. E. Kepner, pilot; Captain A. W. Stevens, scientific observer, and Captain O. A. Anderson, alternate pilot.

The letter to Dr. Swann follows: "This letter brings you cordial greetings from the stratosphere.

"It was carried aloft by us in the airtight gondola attached to the largest free balloon ever built and upon our descent was dispatched to the post office nearest to our point of landing to be forwarded to you by air mail. The altitude attained on the flight, which will be determined officially by the National Bureau of Standards, also was attained by this cover.

"This letter conveys to you the sincere greetings and good wishes of the National Geographic society and the United States army air corps, and our own personal salutations."

GOVERNORS AND CANDIDATES ARE PRODUCTS OF INTERWOVEN FORCES

By RAYMOND BROOKS. Governors and candidates for state office are the product not only of ambition and ability, but of many forces, many of them fathered by persons remotely concerned with the fortunes of the individuals they affect.

James V. Allred and Tom Hunter, remaining candidates, between whom Texas will choose next week its future governor, are made the final candidates not alone by their choosing to make the race, and the ballots of a million voters this year, but by the political fortunes of an uncounted number of Texans who have played a part in public affairs.

It is only a short distance from the home of the Governors Ferguson. Wallace has still two years from next January to serve on his present term.

Twice there was trouble at Travis county relief headquarters, which like state headquarters is in Austin. Relief Director Adam Johnson, who had employed former Ranger Captain Frank Hamer as a relief investigator, stationed him at county headquarters. Since then, there has been no trouble.

At any rate, Hunter's vote would have been so slight, his public following so unimportant that his taste for the office would in great probability have become, ash, or had he run again, his strength would have been utterly inadequate.

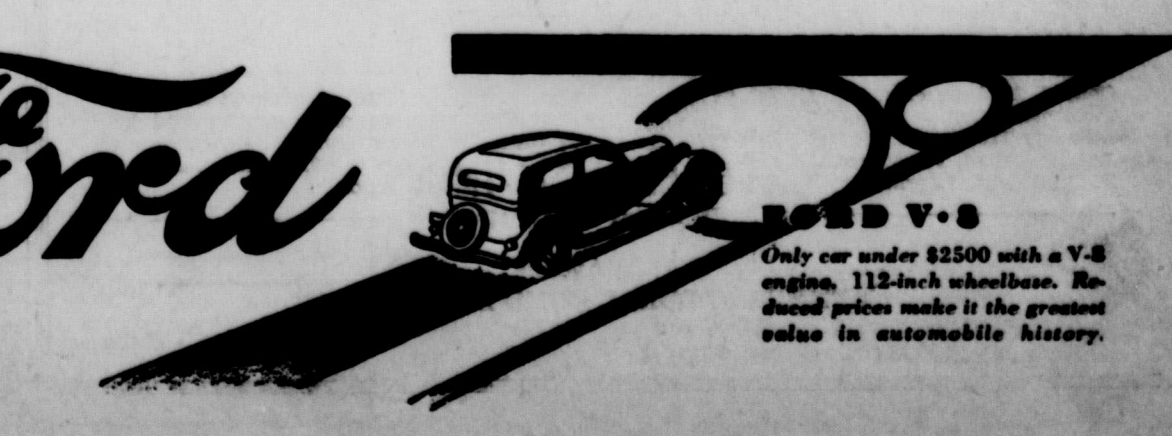

current is now distributed.

Effect Several-fold

The series of dams would impound floodwaters in rainy seasons and release them gradually over dry periods. Effect of this would be several-fold:

1-It would insure against floods on the watershed and along the gulf coast, thus protecting property as well as conserving supply.

2-It would conserve floodwaters of the Brazos valley for orderly and profitable disposition through irrigation and power generation.

3-It would make the Brazos river navigable to a considerable distance upstream by providing for a consistent and even flow of waters.

4-It would prevent soil erosion and increase the fertility of the soil in the Brazos river basin. A soil erosion program is to be carried along in connection with the project.

5-It would provide dependable supplies of water for municipal and industrial consumption.

6-It would protect against such destruction drouths as now afflicts the area. With an abundance of water to be released through the dry period, crops and livestock would be saved from the damage that is now being done because of

a lack of water. To emphasize the point, Harrell pointed to the recent release of stored water from Lake Cisco to fill water holes along Sandy Creek and to the release of Brownwood lake water to rice growers 500 miles away.

Increased Values

Harrell is certain that the increase in property values and the increased revenues from taxation that would accrue to the state would more than pay for the project, even though power generation were not considered.

He said that fear of silt filling the dams was dispelled when it was shown that the great number of dams to be erected would prevent any one of the number catching a considerable portion of such silt. It took 11 years for the Colorado dam at Austin to fill, he pointed out, and that dam caught the entire burden of Colorado river sediment. Since the smallest of the contemplated Brazos dam would be 20 times as large as the Colorado dam, he explained, it would require, on that basis, 220 years for such a dam to fill up even if it caught all the silt carried by the stream.

State's Move

Cong. Buchanan, whose support as chairman of the house appropriations committee is powerful, told the board the state should set aside a small portion of the taxes already collected over the Brazos area to

show the state's interest in the project and demonstrate its good faith to congress. So far, said Mr. Harrell, Texas has only spent \$10,000. This was expended in making a complete survey of the area, which has been finished.

John A. Norris, chairman of the state board of water engineers, is engineer in charge.

The members of the board, by act of the legislature creating it, were to get \$10 per day and expense, but so far, Harrell said, none has been paid and each has borne his expenses.

Ebert Woods, who was at the filling station when the trio drove in, said one man entered the station office and fired two shot at Walker. Woods said the shots were fired while he was talking to the two who remained in the automobile. Officers were unable to explain the shooting.

Smith Cites His Comm'n Experience

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 18—Years of dealing with the problems that come before the railroad commission have given him qualifications for the post which cannot be claimed by his opponent, Lon A. Smith, candidate for re-election to the commission, declared here Friday.

"My opponent is an oil man," he said, "but the oil business is not the only industry which is regulated by the commission. It must deal with the problems of railroads, bus and truck lines and gas companies.

"There is no complaint against me from any quarter with respect to being qualified for the office. The qualifications of my opponent are open to serious question.

"Because of having been in the oil business, he claims to be qualified for a post on the commission. And yet he has publicly said that he favors the creation of a separate oil and gas commission. How, then, could he profess to be qualified to sit at commission hearings? Does he claim to know all about railroads, busses, trucks and gas companies, also?

"I submit that I am qualified by experience to continue on the commission, and that my integrity in this important post has been proved and has gone unchallenged."

Pickets patrolling highways and streets leading into the city seized trucks and poured out several hundred gallons of milk. In none of the cases were efforts made to harm truck drivers or destroy the trucks or milk cans.

Pickets also were stationed at creameries to block any deliveries that might sift through the highway pickets.

A. R. Cartwright, chairman of the strike committee, said that reports indicated 85 per cent of the creameries supply had been halted.

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force a 100 per cent settlement under the terms of the municipal bankruptcy act.

It is expected that this resort will be made, because some of the bonds are held by institutions whose agent are not authorized to accept reductions in principal, and the federal court mandate is necessary. Under the terms of the law 51 per cent of the debt must be represented in application for an order and 75 per cent must agree to the terms of the settlement upon which the order is issued.

The New York group represents 56 per cent and the consent of a sufficient number of other bondholders or bondholders agents has been secured to insure the essential 75 per cent, it was stated.

Bond Purchase Feature

Under terms of the agreement, the city promises to keep enough money in the sinking fund at all times to pay six months' interest on the refunding bonds and to use what money accumulates in the fund above that amount to purchase bonds at lowest figures bid in or in event none is offered, to call the bonds by lot and retire them at par and accrued interest.

This is expected to materially cut down the outstanding principal during the first years of the bonds when they will probably be offered at extremely low prices, it was said.

Interest schedule on the refunding bonds would be:

1 per cent for the first year; 1-2 per cent for the second; 2 per cent for the next four years; 3 per cent for the next six years; 4 per cent for the next six years; 5 per cent thereafter until maturity.

The agreement was reached in negotiations between the city commission represented by the mayor and its members, and Attorney F. D. Wright, bond litigation counsel for the city, and City Attorney R. E. Grantham, and Arthur E. Nelson, St. Paul, Minn., counsel for the New York committee.

The only expense to be incurred by the city in the refunding agreement is the printing of the bonds which will be paid for out of sinking fund money, and payment of legal costs.
