Crash Victims 'Lucky'

Eight persons were "lucky" Sunday evening when they escaped serious injuries in a grinding two-car crash that demolished both vehicles. Three of the persons were hospitalized overnight in Plains Memorial Hospital for observations. The others were unhurt or were treated and released.

Department of Public Safety patrolman Jackie Gunnells and Rick Bentley of Dimmitt investigated the accident which occurred shortly before 7 p.m. on Highway 194.

Fifteen-year-old Sabina Reyna, driver of a 1976 Chevrolet, attempted a left hand turn into the drive of Peggy's Barbecue. Her car was struck by an eastbound 1972 Ford driven by Pedro Vega, 30, of Lubbock.

Miss Reyna, alone in her car, received injuries to her nose but was treated and released at the Dimmitt hospital.

Sunflower Possibilities Explored For Area Farmers

Approximately 125 people attended an informative meeting Monday evening in the agriculture community building in Olton. The meeting was called to discuss with the area farmers the possibilities of growing sunflowers as a money crop.

Monday's meeting was attended by representatives of Master Farmers brand seeds

whose sunflowers have been grown over most of the United States. The hybrid sunflower is processed for food oil. The empty husks are made into a meal which is 30 percent protein and used as food for feedyard cattle.

Also present at the meeting were three representatives of Procter and Gamble. Negotiations are underway with that

company concerning the possibility of securing contracts to offer area farmers.

Another meeting is being planned to share information concerning the proposed contracts. The meeting was arranged and negotiations are being made by Garland DePrang, Wister Clevenger and Larry Garvin.

James Campbell Places Second In State Soybean Production

James Campbell placed second in the 1978 State Soybean Production, according to an announcement at the State meeting which was held in Paris, Jan. 25 and 26, says David Gibson, County Extension Agent, Swisher County.

James placed second on a yield of 68.3 bushels per acre, using the Motchell variety. The first place winner was Dale Arthur from Hale County, who produced 71.6 bushels per acre with the variety Multivar 100.

James' soybeans were planted on May 20, 1978, on his farm 15 miles west of Kress on Highway 145.

15 gallons of Treflan. Entry dates for the 1979 contest will be announced in the summer. To be eligible each entrant must grow 25 acres of soybeans and designate the particular area to be harvested. The area chosen must be at least 5 acres

in size. All production practices are at the complete discretion of the producer.

It wasn't pointed out that this yield was produced on only a 2.8 acre plot either. We liked this particular variety and we will plant some more; however, just about any variety of corn would have produced well on this plot. There were a couple of other varieties planted on the section with this one and the yield on 300 acres was only 6800 pounds per acre.

Personally, I think these yield contests on such small acreage are nonsense because all of us have

spots that make high yields. The contests would be better, to me, if they were conducted on 300, 500 or 1000 acre plots.

In closing, I would like to say that the most important factors in this yield were a lot of luck and about 20 inches of the finest Texas "silt" you've ever seen.

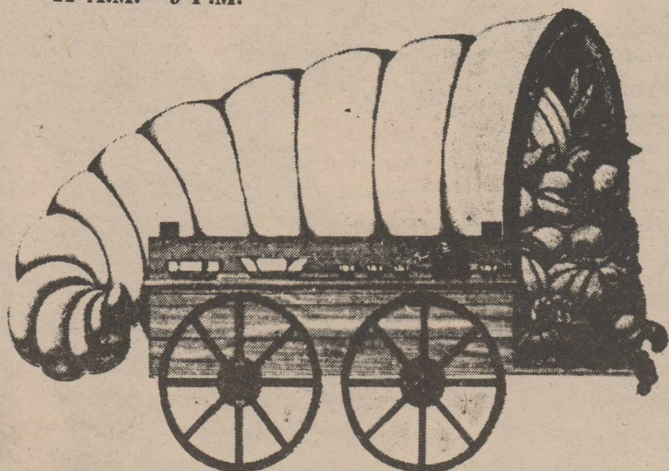

GREEN CHILI HOMINY

2 cans hominy
1 carton sour cream
1 sm can chopped green chilies
garlic salt to taste
1/4 lb longhorn cheese (reserve some for top)

Drain most of liquid from hominy. Heat hominy, chilies and garlic salt 10 mins. Remove from heat and stir in sour cream and cheese. Pour in buttered baking dish. Sprinkle remaining cheese over top and bake in 350° oven.
Bake in 350° oven till hot.

DANG GOOD PIE

9" unbaked pie shell
3/4 stick oleo, melted
3 eggs
3 T flour
1 1/2 c sugar
1 c crushed pineapple, drained
1 c flaked coconut

Mix all ingredients together and pour in unbaked pie shell. Bake in 350° oven 1 hr. or until set.

BROWN SUGAR POUND CAKE

1 c oleo, softened
1/2 c shortening
1 lb brown sugar (2 1/4 c firmly packed)
1/2 c white sugar
5 lg eggs
1/2 t baking powder
3 c flour
1 c milk
2 T vanilla
1 c chopped pecans

Combine oleo and shortening. Cream together, adding sugars, until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Combine dry ingredients, add alternately with milk beginning and ending with flour. Add vanilla and

pecans. Bake in greased and floured tube pan in 350° oven 1 hr 10 mins. or till done. Cool in pan 10 mins. then turn out and finish cooling.
