To Vote Veterans Land Program

Constitutional Amendment No. 3 to be voted on Nov. 11 would revive the Veterans land program and give veterans of Vietnam, who have not had an opportunity to take part in the program an opportunity to buy land in Texas, along with other veterans who fought in World War II and the Korean War. It would include any veteran who served from September 1940 to the date of formal withdrawal of troops from the present armed conflict in Vietnam. All veterans who entered the service from Texas and are presently living in Texas would be permitted to purchase under the program. All those who have moved to Texas and have resided in Texas for at least five years prior to making application to purchase under the program would also be eligible.

If the Constitutional Amendment to be voted on Nov. 11 is approved by the people of Texas, the Veterans Land Board will start purchasing land for the veterans of Vietnam and other wars. The Veterans Land Program has been most successful and throughout the years has not cost the taxpayers for its operation and the purchase of land. On the contrary, it has made it a profit for the people of Texas over and above its cost of operation.

Deer Season Open Nov. 11 in Lamar Red River Co.

Deer season in Red River County opens November 11 and runs through November 28. Deer season in Franklin County is the same as Red River. The bag limit is one buck.

Deer season in Lamar County will be Nov. 11 through Nov. 15, with bag limit one buck.

In Delta and Hopkins Counties the season opens Nov. 22 thru Dec. 1, with one buck as the bag limit.

In Red River County deer must be checked through check stations if provided by County Commissioners Court.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset.

Former Talco Pastor Tells of Charitable Work in Vietnam

Fort Jackson, S. C.— "Tender loving care," is the way Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Frederick H. Ogilvie, Fort Jackson's deputy Post Chaplain, describes the assistance given the children of the Men Thanh Gia Orphanage in Saigon, South Vietnam, by men of the 1st Signal Brigade.

Chaplain Ogilvie returned in July from a year's duty as chaplain for the Signal unit, and was assigned to Fort Jackson on August 10, 1967. He will travel to Leaksville, N. C., on Nov. 2, to address members of the Leaksville-Spray Junior Women's Club on the orphanage's child care programs. The Leaksville group has joined in sponsoring the charitable work of the 1st Signal Brigade.

A native of Melissa, Texas, and a graduate of Baylor University and the Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Ogilvie entered the U. S. Army in 1950, from pastorate of the Calvary Baptist Church at Talco, and has served in Korea and Alaska, prior to going to Vietnam in 1966. The chaplain, 46, is married and has one son, James, 19. He and his family reside on-post at the Fort.

John N. Garner Dies Tuesday

John Nance Garner of Uvalde, former vice president of the United States, died at Uvalde Tuesday, just two weeks before his 99th birthday.

Garner, a native of Red River County, was born four miles northeast of Deport in a hewed log cabin. The son of John N. and Sarah (Guest) Garner, "Cactus Jack" as he was known in politics, began his public career when in 1898 he was elected to the Texas Legislature. Beginning in 1903 he served 30 years as representative from the 30th to the Texas Legislature. Before being elected vice-president in 1932. He was the first man in American history who presided over both Houses of the Congress from 1931 to 1941. He retired from politics at the end of his second term as vice-president and lived a quiet life in Uvalde. His wife, the former Mariette Rheiner of Uvalde, died several years ago.

Surviving is one son, Tully Garner of Uvalde and a granddaughter.

Burglary Suspect Given 15 Years

Charles Gene Grammer was sentenced Friday in Marshall to 15 years in federal prison after entering pleas to charges of bank burglary.

Grammer had entered pleas last week to charges of burglarizing the Talco State Bank and the Fannin National Bank at Windom. The two sentences of 15 years each are to run concurrently.

Grammer entered pleas to two more counts of bank burglary Thursday. They were the Donie State Bank where \$675 was taken from the vault and the First National Bank at Bynum where less than \$20 was taken. He was assessed a penalty of five years but U. S. District Judge Joe J. Fisher suspended the sentences for five years.

Clarksville Rally Tops Rebs 28-14

The Clarksville Tigers had to come from behind in the fourth quarter Friday night to overtake stubborn Rivercrest Rebels, 28-14 and clinch at least a tie for the District 15-AA championship. The Tigers rallied with two TD's in the final period in the exciting contest played in Rivercrest stadium.

For the first three periods of play the Rebels had the Tigers bottled up and threatened a major upset.

The Tigers blocked a Rivercrest punt to move into scoring position and a first period lead when Pruitt went in from 10 yards out.

The second quarter saw the Rebels coming back for two touchdowns, the first coming when Levine Norman bulled over from one yard out. The touchdown capped a 67-yard drive. Later in the quarter, Cory Minter scored after taking a pass from Norman. The play covered 30 yards, and capped an 80-yard drive. Norman ran the extra points and it was 14-6, Rivercrest, at half-time.

Ballew set up the second Clarksville score when he returned a punt 35 yards to the Rivercrest 44. The Tigers moved to the 6-yard line where Ballew carried over. The extra point attempt failed and the Rebels held a 14-12 edge going into the final period.

Pruitt put Clarksville in front again in the fourth quarter when he scored from six yards out. Ballew ran the extra points.

McGuire tacked on an insurance touchdown late in the game when he intercepted a Rivercrest pass and returned it 20 yards for a fourth Clarksville touchdown. Ballew ran the extra points.

Clarksville, now 4-0 in conference standing, plays second place Mt. Vernon, 3-1, Friday night at Mt. Vernon for its final engagement. Mt. Vernon must win to gain a playoff berth.

Rivercrest closes the season Friday night in Commerce.

Dismuke Retires After 26 Years

Colonel Jerry W. Dismuke, 1939 graduate of East Texas State College, in Commerce, retired October 31, 1967, ending a 26 year career in the U. S. Air Force. The ceremonies took place at Barksdale AFB, where Colonel Dismuke was serving as Second Air Force director of intelligence at the time of his retirement.

Prior to coming to Barksdale he served as Chief of the Plans and Training Division at Headquarters Military Assistance Command-Vietnam, headquartered at Saigon.

Starting his career as a flying cadet in 1940, Colonel Dismuke received his flight training at Cal-Aero, Ontario, Calif.; Good-fellow AFB, Texas; and Barksdale AFB, La.

Early in 1942 he was assigned to Columbus Field, Miss., where he helped open an advanced twin-engine flight training school.

He returned to civilian life in 1946 and was recalled in 1951 to active duty. During part of his 26 year career he served on the Joint Strategic Target Planning Staff at Strategic Air Command Headquarters, Offutt AFB, Nebr.

At one time Colonel Dismuke operated the Dismuke Paint and Wallpaper firm in Mt. Pleasant. He was one of the organizers of a new computer data service, National Data Corporation, and plans to join the firm's Atlanta, Ga., office.

Colonel Dismuke is married to the former Marjorie Cato, of Talco. They have three children, Woody, 24, Darra, 21 and Bill, 12.

Austin. — It's election week once more all over Texas.

Voters in 254 counties will decide Saturday (Nov. 11) whether they want six more amendments to the State's Constitution. According to Secretary of State John Hill, voters in five areas of Texas will choose legislators to fill vacancies created by death or resignation. There are six vacant seats in the House of Representatives and one in the Senate.

A light-to-moderate vote is predicted. November 11 is opening day of the deer and turkey hunting season in most counties. This means a lot of hunters will be in the field instead of the voting booth.

However, election day also is Veterans Day, and backers of the proposed amendment to revive the veterans land program are staging an active get-out-the-vote campaign. So are supporters of two other amendments — the one authorizing the state to issue bonds to finance expansion of the Texas parks system and that permitting state officials and employees to hold more than one office.

Seventy candidates, including 14 Republicans, are running for legislative places. Republicans hope to improve their position. Presently they have only three representatives in the 150-member House and one senator in the 31-member Senate.

There are two representative races in Harris County; another in Cameron County; one in Matagorda and Wharton Counties; one in Travis County; and another in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties. Twenty Dallas candidates are running for the Senate seat of the late George Parkhouse.

Six constitutional amendments are on the ballot in the following order:

No. 1. To authorize counties to place all their tax revenues in a single general fund, rather than separate, special-purpose funds.

No. 2. To let local political subdivisions which have hospital districts spend tax money for mental health and mental retardation services.

No. 3. To revive the veterans land program through an additional \$200,000,000 bond issue, permitting war veterans, including those of the Vietnam conflict, to purchase land on low-interest, 40-year-payback loans.

No. 4. To permit counties to pay medical benefits for their law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

No. 5. To authorize a \$75,000,000 state bond issue (supported by an admission fee at selected parks) for park land buying and development.

No. 6. To permit non-elective state officials and employees to serve on state and federal boards and commissions if there is no conflict of duties.

This is the first general election in Texas since the "scratch out" method of voting was eliminated. Now an "X" indicates your choice.

GRANDSON TALCO FAMILY AWARDED SILVER STAR

Pfc. Charles Riley Jennings, grandson of kMr. and Mrs. Jack Riley of Talco, has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in combat in Vietnam.

The presentation was made in October in ceremonies at a base camp of the 1st Inf. Div., U. S. Army, with which Pfc. Jennings has served since March of this year.

Pfc. Jennings, 20, was wounded in an engagement with a Viet Cong unit near Saigon in July and had already received a Purple Heart.

Charles attended school in Talco for several months when he was in the third grade, after the family returned from living abroad, and again when he was a freshman in high school.

His mother, Mrs. Charles Jennings, and sisters, Susan and Katie, live in the Washington, D. C., area.

TAX PICTURE BRIGHTENING? — Top legislative budget planners took a new, slightly brighter reading on the tax outlook last week. But taxpayers still won't be exactly overjoyed.

Legislative Budget Board staff members trimmed their unofficial estimate of revenue needs in 1968 from \$192,900,000 to \$149,000,000. However, the latter calls for rigid budget economies which lawmakers will find hard to effect in the face of rising costs, growing population and increasing demands for better services.

LBB staffers estimated 1969 general fund spending at \$455,800,000. This is just \$3,000,000 above the 1968 level. Figure does not include \$258,500,000 in automatic foundation school fund transfers and \$1,500,000 in water development fund allocations.

Governor's budget office, pointing to an error in general revenue income estimates by the comptroller's office, said it appears that the 1968 tax bill, which legislators must pass in their special session, probably will be in the \$130,000,000 to \$150,000,000 range. Executive office earlier insisted that \$100,000,000 to \$130,000,000 would be adequate.

UNEMPLOYMENT TAX CUT

Forty per cent of Texas employers will pay lower unemployment compensation payroll taxes next year—and save about \$15,000,000.

Reduction was made possible because the program trust fund exceeded \$300,000,000 on October 1. Under the law, tax is cut one-tenth of one per cent for each \$5,000,000 or portion thereof by which the fund passes \$300,000,000. Balance now is \$319,000,000. Cut is four per cent for employers affected.

Fifty-four per cent of the employers already have earned a minimum statutory rate of 1 per cent. Another six per cent are "excess cost employers" with earned experience rates of 3.1 per cent or more. Neither of these groups will be affected by reduction.

POLLUTION RULES HIT — Texas Air Control Board heard complaints from industry representatives concerning its proposed regulations for controlling pollution due to smoke and flying particles, outdoor burning, sulphur compounds and motor vehicle exhausts.

Board announced its plans following an extended hearing to adopt a version of the new rules within six weeks. Objections centered on a proposal that the burning of waste must be outside a defined standard metropolitan statistical area.

Petitions bearing signatures of 5,112 Harris County citizens, were handed the Board. Demand was for legal action against Houston ship channel industrial plants allegedly in violation of pollution control rules effective last June 1. Board promised to begin enforcing regulations governing smoke and particulate matter if local governments do not.

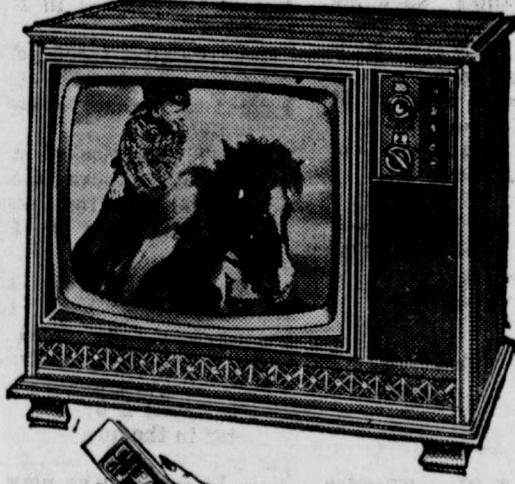

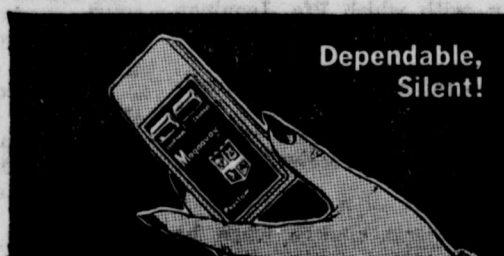

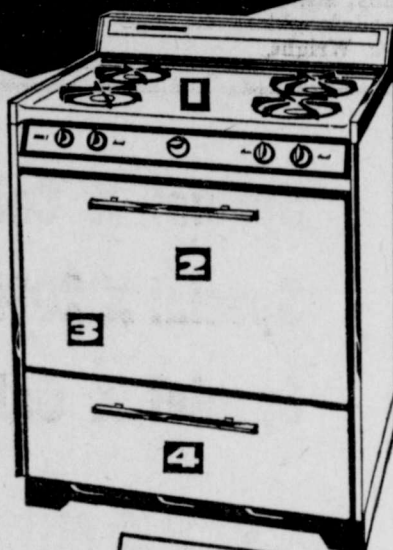
